FELIX F. JONES, 76, LONGTIME TALCO BANKER, DIES SUNDAY

Felix F. Jones, 76, longtime former president of Talco State Bank, died Sunday in Memorial Hospital at Mount Pleasant after an illness of about one year.

His funeral was arranged for 3 p. m. Monday at the Church of Christ, Talco, of which he was a member, with L. L. Gieger of Dallas, Earl Smith of McLean and Jack May, local minister, officiating. The chorus from the church-supported Boles Orphans Home, sang at the services. Mr. Jones being a former member of the home's board. Burial was made in Talco Cemetery by Smith-Bates Funeral Home of Mt. Pleasant.

Born at Commerce, Feb. 28, 1893, Felix Jones was a son of F. A. (Grundy) and Janette Novell Jones. He was married to Ruth Cato March 17, 1925 at Mt. Pleasant by the late J. C. Foster, and to them were born eight children. She survives besides the following children:

He was married to the late Ethel Mayfield and to this union were born four children, Boyd, deceased, Mrs. Farris Brown of Talco, Mrs. Fred Blackard of Mt. Pleasant, F. A. Jones of Tyler.

He was head of Felix Jones Insurance Agency, chairman of the Board of Talco State Bank, where he had served from book-keeper in 1917 to his position at the time of death. He served as an Elder in the Church of Christ since 1926.

Jas. R. Childers Killed In Dallas

Funeral services were held at 11:30 a. m. Tuesday in Laurel Land Memorial Chapel, Dallas, for James Robert Childers, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Childers of Dallas, and nephew of Miss Melba Childers of Bogata. Interment was in Laurel Land with military services at graveside.

Childers, a Vietnam veteran, was knifed to death about 11 p. m. Saturday in the Oak Cliff area of Dallas after a group of youths rammed his car following a freeway hubbub. The 21 year old Childers died about 10 minutes after reaching the Methodist Hospital emergency room.

A 19 year old companion told officers that Childers was visiting his parents in Dallas while enroute from Vietnam to an Army base in Georgia. He said they were driving toward Oak Cliff on R. L. Thornton Freeway when an old car pulled alongside and three youths inside with a girl began cursing and making obscene gestures.

Officers said after leaving the freeway, the cars collided and halted. As Childers fought with one of the occupants of the other car, another stabbed him in the abdomen with a long-bladed knife.

Childers, whose father was a native of Bogata, often visited here with his grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Jim Childers and his aunt, Miss Childers. The latter went to Dallas Monday to be with the family. She was accompanied there by Mrs. Britt Lassiter, Mrs. J. N. Lee, who returned to Bogata Monday.

Deceased is survived by his parents; a brother, Rodney Doyle Childers; a sister, Mrs. Gregg Hamilton, all of Dallas.

AUSTIN. — APPOINTMENTS Governor Smith named Charles D. Mathews of Dallas to Texas Board of Insurance and designated Ned Price, formerly of Tyler, chairman of the major state agency.

Smith picked Reynaldo Ferrer Luna of San Diego and Frank Randall Nye Jr. of Rio Grande City as judge and district attorney respectively of the new 299th judicial district, for Starr, Duval and Jim Hogg counties.

At the same time, he selected Ted Zanderson Robertson of Dallas judge of Juvenile Court No. 2 in Dallas. Senate quickly confirmed all three. Jackson B. Smith Jr. and Wallace Harland Miller of Houston were named to domestic relations and juvenile court benches there.

Smith placed on the new Commission for Rehabilitation Mrs. Marjorie Cone Kastman of Lubbock, John David Simpson Jr. of Austin (Chairman), Dr. John James Hinchey of San Antonio, Dr. Clifford Stanley Nape of Waco, John Thomas Bean of El Paso and Jack Burris Dale of Houston.

Capt. Richard Gerald Johnson of Beaumont, Capt. Theodore Ralph Morgan of Groves and Capt. Samuel William Levings-ton, Daniel Jackson Simonton and Harold Edwin Weaver, all of Port Arthur, were designated by the Governor as branch pilots for Sabine Bar, Pass and Tributaries.

James L. Ray of Plainview will serve on Smith's staff and assist the new Committee of Human Relations.

GUEST RULE DELAYED — Tough new rules of the Liquor Control Board to curb temporary guest card abuses at private bottle clubs cannot be enforced pending appeal of a court test case here.

District Judge James Meyers concluded that LCB rules are valid, but they should not be put into full effect until final disposition of the case on appeal.

In the lawsuit, Dallas clubs claimed the rule would close 75 per cent of Texas private clubs, many of which aren't so private. Rule would require guests to be personally introduced or physically accompanied by a club member. Bills would have to be paid by members on monthly statements, not in cash by guests.

LCB said applications for late hours (2 a. m.) drinking permits for clubs and taverns are being screened carefully. Only 18 were approved in the week before the new curfew-stretching law went into effect September 1.

SADLER INVESTIGATION REQUESTED — An investigation of allegations made against Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler under careful procedural safeguards has been proposed to the

House by Rep. Temple Dickson of Sweetwater, one of the men who fought an attempt by Rep. Frances Farenthold of Corpus Christi to censure Sadler.

Dickson's resolution would require any investigating committee to give any person under investigation a bill of particulars on what is to be investigated, including all allegations made by members of the Legislature. It would require the committee to allow the subject of an investigation to be present at its meetings either in person or by counsel and be entitled to cross-examine all witnesses. Bill also would require that all testimony be under oath and that it be transcribed by a court reporter. And it would give the committee subpoena power, both inside and outside Texas.

Resolution directs Speaker Mutschers to refer the matter to an appropriate committee. Mutschers already has said that he will refer it to the House General Investigating Committee, and that Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria will be chairman of that committee.

577 PASS BAR—Five hundred and 77 new lawyers will be licensed in Supreme Court ceremonies here Sept. 15. Four separate ceremonies will be held because of unusual size of class.

Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System ratified sale of \$14 million in student loan bonds at a rate of 5.41 per cent to First National City Bank of New York.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will hold regulatory hearings September 16-17 prior to setting seasons and bag limits for game and fish for Ector, Scurry, Upton, Zapata, Harrison, Hemphill, Kent, Willacy and Lee counties.

James Connally Technical Institute, near Waco, now is Texas State Technical Institute with its own governing board, has an additional campus at Harlingen with 500 students and is negotiating with the federal government for part of the inactive Amarillo Air Force base as home of a third branch.

Chief James R. Smith of the Capitol Police officially was commended for outstanding service to state officials and visitors to the Capitol by Governor Smith.

Texas' overheated economy shows little evidence of responding to anti-inflationary efforts, according to University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.
