Mr. Allen said that it is estimated that 95% of all cotton farmers in the county had been contacted personally by members of the AAA office or by one of the five authorized sales agents. AAA employees signed 178 contracts over the counter while 138 were signed by sales agents.

It is believed that Motley county may have one of the highest per centages of insured cotton crops in the state.

April 25—Come and gone
April 25 was the last day to accept applications for cotton crop insurance for the 1946 crop. The date has finally come and gone—with more farms than ever before in Motley County covered by Federal all-risk Cotton Crop Insurance. Our records

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show 72.7% of all cotton farms in the county insured which exceeds all previous records for crop insurance participation in this county. A full and more complete story on this year's participation in this program will be found elsewhere in this paper.

Final Date for Submitting 1st Quarter 1946 Dairy Sales

May 31st is the final date for reporting all evidence of sales made during January, February and March of 1946. Bring or mail your cream tickets and evidence of sales of milk to the AAA office on all sales made during the first quarter of this year before May 31, if you desire the subsidy payment.

Termination of Beef Production Payment Program
An announcement has been made that the Beef Production Program is scheduled to end on June 30, 1946. It must be understood that sales of cattle after June 30, 1946, will not be eligible for payment and that all applications under this program must be submitted not later than August 31.

Deferred Grazing

The deferred grazing period for Motley County begins on June 15 and extends for five consecutive months. Only ranches of 1920 acres or more of grassland are eligible for this practice. Ranch operators who desire to carry out this practice are urged to obtain their prior approval as soon as possible as our fund for carrying out practices under the 1946 program are disappearing fast.

1946 FARM PLAN SHEETS

Producers who have not already signed their 1946 Farm Plan Sheet are urged to do so at once. These plan sheets should be executed by all operators in view of the fact that basic information concerning the 1945 production of wheat and cotton must be permanently recorded for crop insurance purposes; and for reference if and when marketing quotas should be put into effect again.

The eight distinguished guests represent such centers of medical learning as Johns Hopkins, Duke University, Mayo Clinic and University of Michigan.

Parents Urged To Protect Children Against Measles

With the incidence of measles more than sixty percent higher than the seven year median, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a statement concerning the use of gamma globulin for protecting very young or frail children from an attack of this perennial childhood disease and its often serious complications. "If you have a child less than five years old who has been exposed to measles, your family doctor may recommend giving him gamma globulin," Dr. Cox advised. "Through city, county, or state health departments, doctors can obtain gamma globulin free to be used as they think advisable. Infants and children, whose health makes it inadvisable for them to suffer an attack of measles, may postpone the disease if gamma globulin is administered within eight days from the time of exposure."

Survey Reveals Insect Increase

The overwintering area of the screwworm and fly for the past winter was restricted to approximately 70 per cent of normal, or 50 per cent of last year's areas, according to the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, Uvalde, Tex. The area was south of a line from Comstock to Camp Wood, thence to Kingsville on the Gulf Coast.

The population of the adult fly in this restricted area was approximately 80 per cent of normal for the first half of March and was extremely spotted. A very restricted area in the West Nueces Valley had 160 per cent of average adults for this period, a reflection of the extremely high population of the fly in this area for November, 1945.

Prospects for late spring and early summer is that the fly will appear from two weeks to a month later in the eastern area than normal; from one to two months later in the western area than normal; and in less numbers than usual.

Blowfly populations are developing rather rapidly and in local areas have built up extremely high populations. They are attacking dehorned cattle and long-wool sheep, mostly on

The State Health Officer emphasized the fact that gamma globulin cannot give a child permanent protection against measles and added that the protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration. However, there is no limit to the number of times it can be used, and a baby who is protected by it now can be protected by it again in June or July. Gamma globulin can go on shielding him against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without serious consequences.

During an outbreak of measles, Dr. Cox said that it is well to keep children under five years of age, and more especially frail children, from all other youngsters who might serve as sources of infection. Statistics show that nine-tenths of all measles deaths occur in children under five years of age.

Fl. Worth Pastor Resigns Church To Become Evangelist

DALLAS—Old-fashioned revival meetings may be on the way back to every county in Texas, according to plans projected by leaders of the Baptist denomination. To head this work in the state, the Rev. C. E. Matthews has resigned as pastor of Travis Avenue Baptist church, Fort Worth, effective May 1.

Although he has served that church nearly 24 years, and has become outstanding as a pastor, Dr. Matthews has never ceased to be an evangelist. He has been called upon constantly to lead meetings in other churches and to conduct city-wide campaigns. He has baptized into his own church over 4,000 converts.

With the advent of the atomic bomb and the uneasy peace, Dr. Matthews has felt strongly with President Truman and Gen. McArthur, that the hope of the world lies only in a spiritual revival. He impressed his idea so successfully on his brethren in the state that they prevailed upon him to give up what he had thought to be a lifetime pastorate to take the leadership in evangelism in Texas.

So he has resigned his church of over 6,000 members, and, at a smaller salary, is assuming the difficult task of co-ordinating revival meetings in a program of revival meetings. Plans include services in the largest churches as well as in abandoned church houses and in unchurched communities, urban and rural, bringing the impact of a unified effort to match the atomic age with a message of a compassionate Christ.

All work chairman have been named for the year by the president and attendance is expected to exceed last year's record.

They were accompanied home by Miss Velda Mae Rattan of Amarillo, who had been at her mother's bedside for several days.

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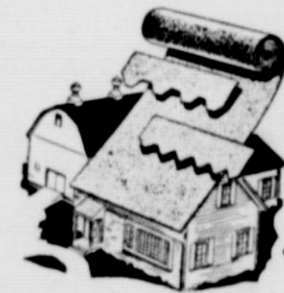

HOSPITAL FUND TO HONOR OBSERVANCE OF MOTHER'S DAY

Baptist churches thruout Texas will observe Mother's Day, May 12, with their second annual Mother's Day Hospital Fund collection to provide charity care for the needy sick in the five Baptist hospitals of the state. Sunday schools, church organizations and all church organizations will participate with every member invited to make a gift to the sick poor as a personal tribute in honor, or in memory, of his own mother. In the initial collection last year, Texas Baptists gave \$30,000. All gifts are used solely for giving free hospitalization to critically ill patients in need of hospital therapy but unable to pay for such treatment. The five Baptist hospitals are Hendrick Memorial Hospital, Abilene; Baylor University Hospital, Dallas; Valley Baptist Hospital, Harlingen; Memorial Hospital, Houston; and Hillcrest Memorial Hospital, Waco. Patients cared for under the fund are accepted from all parts of the state and need not be Baptists nor of any denomination. The annual charity service of the five hospitals runs to more than \$200,000 a year and in the past has been paid out of hospital operating budgets, which are inadequate to meet the need officials said. It was with the hope of providing sufficient funds specially allocated to charity service that the Mother's Day observance has been instituted. Approved by the Texas Baptist Executive Board and the Women's Missionary Union Board, the observance will be a permanent annual event. Patients cared for under the plan are, upon discharge from the hospital, given a bill marked "Paid by the Baptist Churches of Texas."

Directing plans for the observance are Robert Jolly, Houston; Lawrence Payne, Dallas; E. M. Collier, Abilene; Julian H. Pace, Waco; and K. P. Walker, Harlingen. Crosbyton will have a survey made for a dam near that city within the next few weeks. Throckmorton is staging a membership drive for a new memorial hospital. Denver City plans a new community center, sponsored by city and civic club members.

Cheap Oil Costs School Children of Texas Millions

"You have heard it said that you can't eat your cake and have it too, but in this instance you can, because nine-tenths of the oil produced in Texas goes outside the state and if our friends of the north and east want our Texas oil, they should pay a fair price which would mean real profit to the taxpayers of Texas and to the boys and girls who are the future hope of our state." House paid tribute to the great services rendered by the women of Texas during the war and expressed the opinion that, since there are nine places on the board of regents of the University of Texas, it would be quite fitting to have at least one of those places occupied by "a capable, patriotic, Christian Texas woman."

Texas farmers are being urged to increase their planting of grains, especially corn and sorghums, in order to help alleviate the critical feed shortages.

Prospective acreage reports, based on intentions that Texas farmers are falling far short of reaching the acreage goals set for corn and grain sorghums, according to B. F. Vance, State PMA Director.

The corn planting goal for 1946 is 4,950,000 acres, while prospective acreage is only 3,921,000 acres, 79 per cent of the goal. For sorghums the goal is 7,800,000, and indicated acreage is 7,045,000 acres, 90 per cent of the goal.

The Texas record for wheat and oats planting is much better. Vance declared, with 3,994,000 acres of wheat planted, 115 per cent of the 5,200,000 acre goal. The oats acreage is 1,849,000, slightly more than the 1,830,000 acre goal.

Name Texas Head Of State Chicken Breeding Program

Appointment of F. Z. Beanblossom, extension poultryman of Texas A & M College at College Station, Tex., as state chairman of the Chicken-of-Tomorrow Committee opens the way for Texas poultrymen to compete with breeders from other states in the nationwide effort to produce better meat-type chickens.

Goal of the three-year program is to develop a chicken which will yield at least 10 per cent more meat in relation to bone structure, said D. D. Slade, Lexington, Ky., chairman of the national committee, in announcing Beanblossom's appointment. The breeder who produces the best example of a meatier bird will receive a \$5,000 cash award from A & P Food Stores, whose officials initiated the program. Other awards will total \$3,000.

Objective of both the Texas and national committees is to stimulate production of meatier chickens that will grow more economically, Beanblossom said, in announcing plans for the contest. The hatching date for this state has been set for the week of May 12 to 17 inclusive. The birds will be judged when they reach the age of 14 weeks in August.

"The contest is open to every poultryman," Slade said, "but it will require more than just the selection of an outstanding bird and sending it in to be judged. Each breeder must start with from 100 to 300 baby chicks of known origin and develop a strain or type of chicken that can be reproduced in commercial quantities. Only by such a program of development can poultrymen assure the nation's consumers that chickens of the future will be the source of superior meat."

In order to acquaint homemakers with some of the methods, the Home Service Department of the West Texas Utilities Company offers the sound picture, "Frozen Foods", at the Rogue Theatre, on Tuesday afternoon, May 7th, at 3 o'clock. The picture, which is filmed in full-color, shows preparation steps for freezing fruits and vegetables and the cooking of frozen foods. Also included are details on some methods of cutting and some types of packaging and wrapping for meats, fish and poultry.

The West Texas Utilities Co. is bringing this picture to Matador as a public service which ties in with the national food preservation program. Because it preserves food values near their original state, freezing is regarded as a good method of food preservation. Meat is only one of the many foods that can be preserved in frozen lockers and modern home freezers. Many fruits and vegetables, including strawberries, peaches, pineapple, berries, peas, spinach beans and corn can be prepared for freezing with less work in a shorter length of time than that required for canning.
