

# PAVING TO START ON HIGHWAY NO. 9 THURSDAY

## DAWSON COUNTY SINGERS TO MEET IN LAMESA, SUNDAY, JULY 14

### MATERIAL FOR CONSTRUCTION OF CCC CAMP ARRIVING THIS WEEK

#### NORTH END TO BE PAVED FIRST

Engineers in charge of the paving on Highway No. 9 through Dawson county, report that unless something unusual happens, pouring of the asphalt will start on the north end today (Thursday).

Six miles of this highway, from the Lynn county line south towards Lamesa are ready for the paving and the balance of the highway will be ready within a few days.

Road oil is being poured on the south half of the highway and it is expected that the pouring of the asphalt will begin here within the next three or four days.

Thus after months of preparations during which time innumerable delays caused by dry weather, washing rains and lack of funds, caused many to think that the work would never be completed, Highway No. 9 thru Dawson county is to receive its topping.

It is expected that the work will be completed within the next sixty days.

This will be Dawson county's first paved highway and with this as a start it is hoped that within the next few years that every highway into Lamesa will be paved, as well as those roads now leading to Stanton and Brownfield that are not as yet designated as highways.

#### LAMESA POSTAL RECEIPTS SHOW INCREASE IN 1935

In common with most of the other post offices of the State, the Lamesa office shows an increase in postal receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1935 over that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1934. The receipts for the fiscal year 1934 were \$16,702.49 and for the fiscal year 1935 were \$17,892.83, showing a net increase of \$1,190.34 or 7.1-8 per cent according to information given out by Postmaster James D. Dyer.

## Revival Meeting To Begin At First Baptist Church Sunday

### REV. JAMES, OF CISCO, TO CONDUCT SERVICES.

There will be a two weeks meeting started at the First Baptist Church on Sunday morning, July 14. Rev. James, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Cisco will do the preaching.

### \$3,371 Added to Per Capita Fund in County

Dawson county's school fund will be augmented by \$3,371 this year due to the action of the State Board of Education which last week set the per capita apportionment at \$17.50 for 1935-36, this amount being the statutory maximum. The apportionment was \$16.50 for 1934-35.

In addition to the \$17.50 State apportionment, there will be approximately \$1.00 per capita county apportionment, making a total of about \$18.50 available for each child within the scholastic age in Dawson county.

The scholastic census for Dawson County according to Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, County Superintendent is 3371. Lamesa has 1140 scholastics. Scholastics for other independent districts are: Ackerly, 125; Key, 79; Hancock, 74; Klondike, 149; Common school districts 1804.

It was calculated the \$17.50 apportionment would grant \$28,000,000 state funds to schools. In addition the state provided \$5,000,000 for rural aid and school benefit equalization, the largest in its history.

#### LOCAL LABOR TO ERECT CAMP HERE

Materials for the building of the CCC camp to be constructed here are being received this week, the erection to start in the very near future, according to officials in charge.

Local labor will be used in the erection of these buildings, Mr. Gorman of the National Reemployment Office here stated this week. He asked that all skilled unemployed carpenters, plumbers, and electricians register at his office as soon as possible. Men of the above mentioned trades in the county who are not employed more than three days a week may also register for this camp construction work.

Following is a letter received this week from Mr. H. V. Harber, superintendent of construction and utilities, at San Antonio:

"The fabricated sections for Lamesa camp will be shipped in the near future. We plan to use local labor at the prevailing local wage scale in the erection of the camp. All plumbing and utilities will be handled by the construction officer in charge and local dealers will be given every consideration. The material for any additional buildings required will be purchased locally."

The materials for this camp were purchased from the Readycut House Company of Houston and were delivered to the government at that place.

#### Standardization Of Schools Is Urged

Standardization of rural schools is urged by the State Department of Education, according to Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, superintendent of Schools. To standardize a school must meet certain requirements with reference to building, grounds, and equipment, and teacher certification. In addition to the physical requirements, the District Supervisor passes upon the class of work done by the teachers. This is determined by the giving of standard tests in all the grades.

Schools applying for standardization must be properly classified. One teacher schools may not teach more than seven grades; two-teacher schools may not teach more than seven grades; three teacher schools may not teach more than eight grades; four teacher-schools may not teach more than nine grades; five-teacher schools may not teach more than ten grades; six-teacher schools may not teach more than ten grades; above six teachers go in the accredited class.

Beginning with the school year 1935-36, pupils from non-standardized rural schools will be obliged to take entrance examinations when entering an accredited high school. These examinations are sent from the State Department of Education, and students failing to pass them, cannot be admitted into an accredited high school.

To encourage standardization, the State Board of Education has added \$5.00 to the salaries of teachers and principals teaching in standardized schools.

Standard schools and those applying for standardization are to be checked and scored each year by the District Supervisor and the county superintendent.

### Senator Duggan Is Speaker at Luncheon Club Tuesday

Senator Arthur P. Duggan was the principal speaker at the regular meeting of the Lamesa Luncheon Club Tuesday noon. Some 45 business men were out to hear the Senator.

Some startling statements were made by Senator Duggan, who served as chairman of the Senate Tax Committee for the past ten months. He said in part: "Only 30 per cent of our people are paying any taxes at all and more than 80 per cent of all the taxes are being paid by real estate and real property. The cost of government is continually raising all the time and everybody is crying to not tax them but tax the other fellow. Every good citizen really desires to do his part in taking care of the cost of government. There is a need for a wider spread and greater distribution as to who pays our taxes." Other good things were said by Senator Duggan and those present really enjoyed his talk. Following the luncheon Senator Duggan met many of his friends here.

The invocation was delivered by J. D. Dyer. The songs were led by V. Z. Rogers and Owen C. Taylor. Mrs. Rountree presided at the piano and she and Miss Asalie Key entertained with vocal numbers while the members dined. An election committee was appointed for report of nominations next meeting. The cabinet will be awarded when the demonstrator completed this fall.

The movement to mark the most historical spots in West Texas is a most laudable one and should be en-

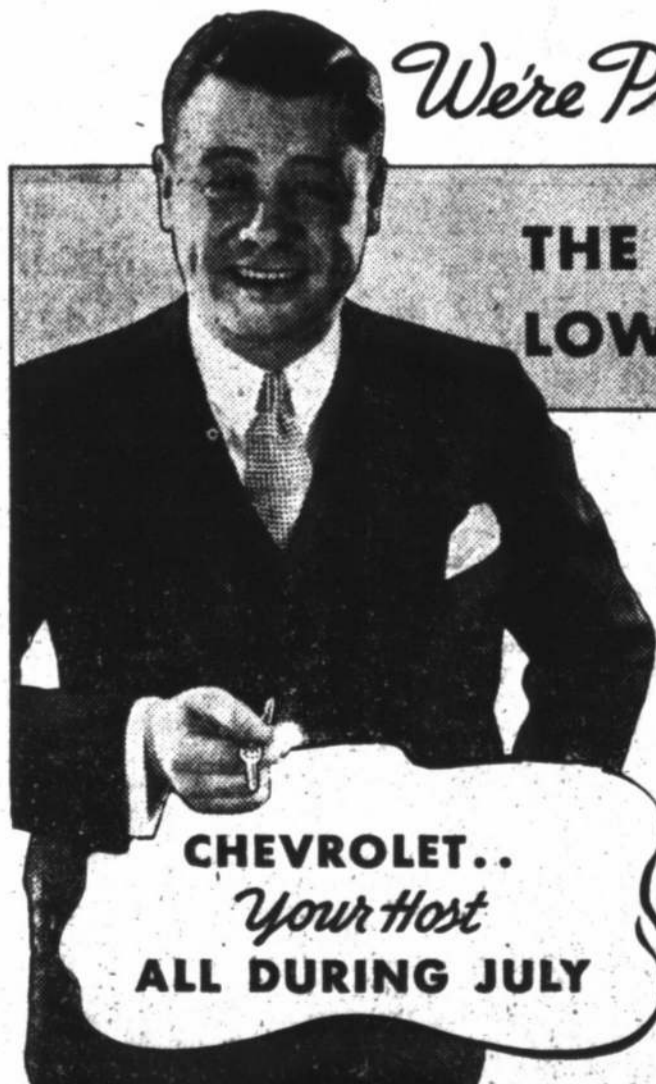

Many of the early settlers, and probably some of the very earliest are yet living, and a vast fund of information can be secured from them.

Edward LeFevre's article, "When in Doubt, Tax Twice," reminds us of the three Arkansas frogs just after a big rain. A little frog in a very feminine voice croaked, "Quinine, quinine, quinine." A big bullfrog pompously bellowed, "Double the dose, double the dose," while a tiny frog just emerging from the tadpole stage, piped, "Do it quick, do it quick."

A suggestion recently made by a noted college professor, before the Texas Geographical Society, that the "conversion of the Western Texas Plains to grass land, as a means of ending the destructive dust storms" will meet with little or no response from those who live on the Plains. Granted that the dust and sandstorms are both vexing and destructive, and that it takes fortitude to stay on the Plains and endure them year after year, yet the happiest people, and generally the most contented, are those who came early, established themselves, many in "dug outs" endured the privations of pioneer life, and are now reaping the

**Mrs. Olon Earnest Wins In County Wardrobe Contest**

Mrs. Olon Earnest, wardrobe demonstrator in the Five Mile home demonstration club won first in the county wardrobe contest. The following is her story of her work:

"I began my wardrobe work with a determination to learn how to make my money go farther and still be dressed nice and neat, and how to help my club women, neighbors, and last but not least, my two daughters. I believe the work that I have done will show for years to come through the ones I have helped.

"Our club goals are for every club woman to have a foundation pattern and to know how to use them. Ninety eight per cent have reached this goal. The other members have the materials for their patterns.

"I have two cooperators who have helped me in the pattern work. We have 22 members and 19 of them have completed their patterns and have learned to use them with great success. We have made patterns for three non-club members who have used their patterns. I made one club girl a pattern and she has made three dresses and one slip and one pair of pajamas by it. I have made three young married women in my club patterns and whom I taught to sew. They now make their dresses and sew for their babies.

"I have made 52 garments for people besides my family and helped to fit 12. There have been two closets, remodeled and two made among the members of the club.

"The closets in our house had never been finished inside. I used a broom handle to make a rod on which to hang clothing. The closet is 4 feet deep and five feet long with a storage space for quilts above the storage space for clothing. The door to this opens from the outside and above the other door. I cleaned the closet inside and papered it with ceiling paper left over when our house was papered. It is very light. I now have a dust and mouse proof closet and quilt chest. I found some scrap lumber and made three shelves 18 inches deep. On the top shelf I keep blankets and extra quilts to be handy when I have company. The second shelf is used for linens. The other shelf is used for clothes that cannot be hung up. I bought 30 cents worth of white duck and made a shoe pocket and tacked it to the wall. This will hold four pairs of shoes. I had a laundry bag and I hung this on the inside of my closet door. The clothes rack reaches from one side to the other and will hold thirty hangers. I can open my closet door and air my clothes by raising two double windows in the south end of my bedroom. The total cost of repair of the closet was 90 cents.

"I have made by my foundation pattern 10 dresses, two pair of shorts one pair of pajamas, one blouse, 3 smocks, 4 aprons, 3 slips, and one skirt. The women of the club have made: 68 dresses, 20 slips, 4 aprons, 4 blouses, 2 skirts, 2 pairs of pajamas, 4 pairs of trunks, making a total of 108 garments having been made by foundation patterns.

"In planning for a \$59 wardrobe I have spent \$16.67 for dresses, \$9.80 for footwear, \$3.03 for under-

**TEACHERS SALARY SCHEDULE GIVEN**

Miss Pauline Bulsterbaum, county superintendent has received at her office the past week a salary schedule for teachers for 1935-36.

The schedule states that the base pay for any teacher having two years college is \$80. \$2.50 is added for three years college work, and \$2.50 is added for five years experience. Additional pay is added for a degree and for more than five years experience.

The maximum salary for any teacher is \$95 in the non-accredited schools.

Base pay for principals is \$85 in one teacher schools, \$90 in two teacher schools, \$95 in three teacher schools, \$100 in four teacher schools, \$105 in five teacher schools and \$110 in six teacher schools. Additional pay is added for more than two years college training and for five years experience or more.

The salaries for teachers and principals are slightly higher in partly affiliated schools.

The base pay of any teacher, principal or superintendent with less than two years college training is \$75 per month.

**FLIES BREED IN FILTH AND SPREAD DISEASE**


Austin, July 9.—Flies spread disease. They are reared in filth and through life make frequent trips from filth to food. Germs causing dysentery and other intestinal disorders are transported on the hairy feet of flies. These insect pests are regarded as having played a leading part in causing food borne epidemics of typhoid fever, stated Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer.

Flies multiply rapidly as soon as warm weather comes to stay. A female deposits more than a hundred eggs at a time in organic material

such as manure or in an insanitary outdoor toilet. The life cycle from egg to larva (maggot), to pupa to adult male or female fly requires but ten days. A week later, fifty females under favorable conditions, are ready to deposit a total of 50,000 eggs. During the summer season nine generations of flies may result from one female that laid the first batch of eggs in the spring. It is estimated that if the offspring of a single overwintering female were to survive through nine generations, descendants in the fall would number over five and a half trillion.

Fortunately modern sanitation and knowledge regarding the life history and habits of the house fly render possible complete control over the fly nuisance. Proper disposal of human and animal wastes in urban areas and on farms will prevent the breeding and multiplication of flies. Practical suggestions relative to methods of fly control may be obtained from the State Department of Health and U. S. Department of Agriculture



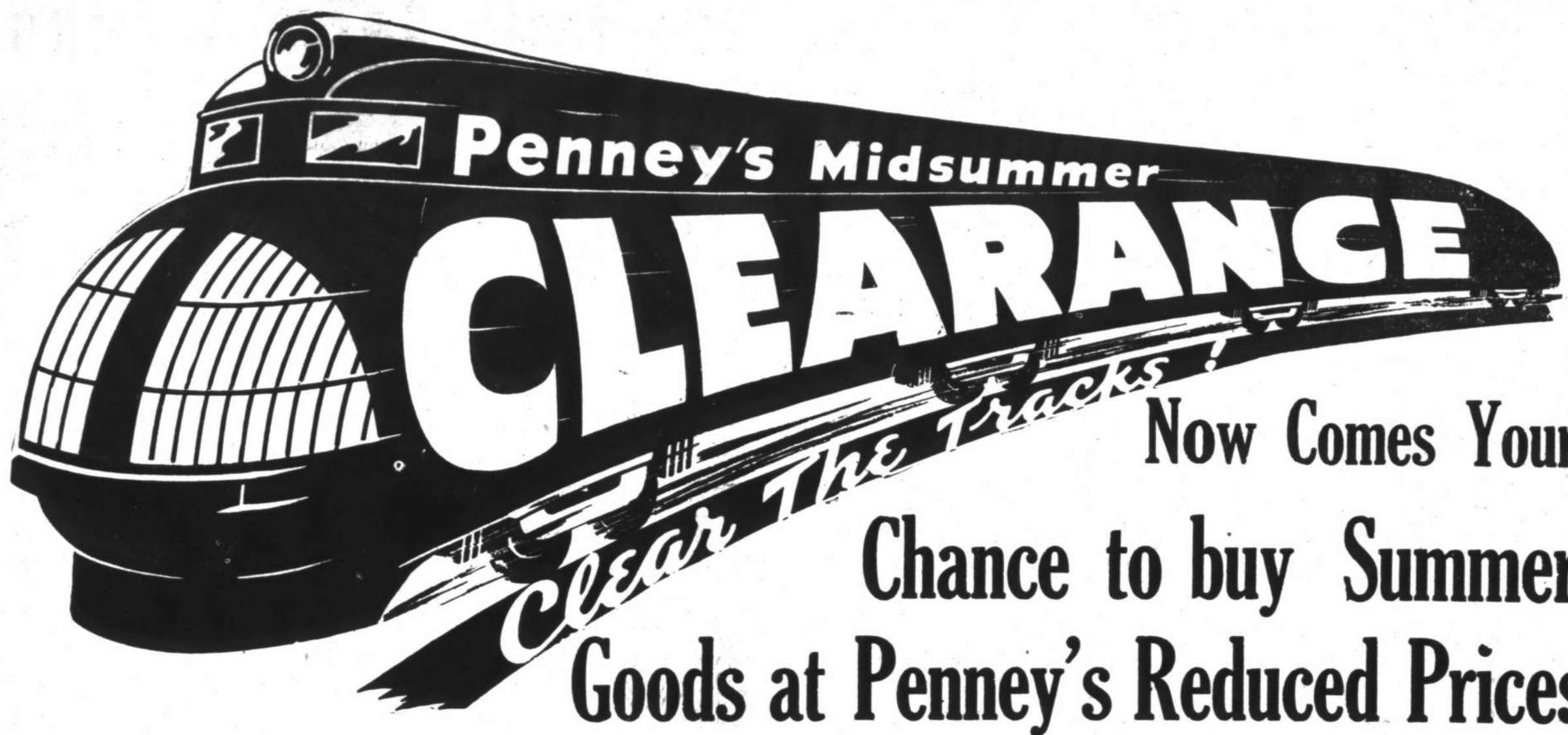

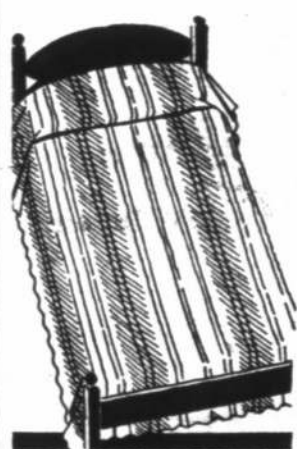
