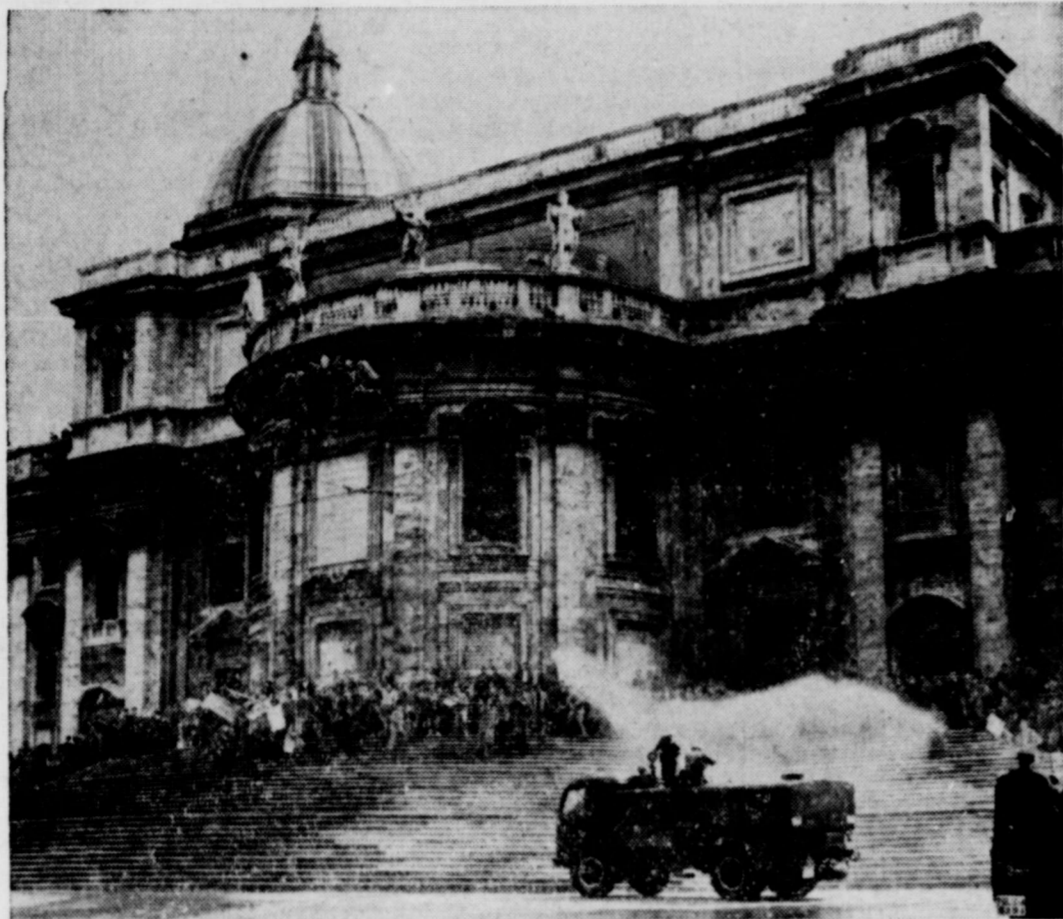
It wasn't our idea. It was the suggestion of students of junior high.

Two Jersey heifer calves are to be returned to the committee at the dairy show and will be awarded that day to Kitty Ingram, Scranton 4-H Club and Benny Warren, Eastland F. F. A. Chapter.

College Men To Get Opportunity To Join Marines

T-Sgt. Wims of the local Marine Recruiting Station at Abilene announced today that Cisco area male college graduates and seniors will have an opportunity to earn commissions in the Marine Corps this summer.

By June 1 the expanding Marine Corps will enroll a total of 1,000 officer candidates, according to Sgt. Wims. Candidates begin their training July 14 at the Marine Corps Schools, Quantico, Virginia.

Married or single college graduates between 20 and 27 years old are eligible for the program. Seniors who will graduate at the end of the current semester also are eligible, but must apply before the June 1 deadline.

Married men will receive family allowances as soon as their candidate training begins.

Candidates successfully completing the 10-week training course will be commissioned second lieutenants in the Marine Corps Reserve. Following this they will receive five additional months of specialized officers' training, also at the Quantico Base which is located 35 miles south of Washington, D. C.

Sgt. Wims said that the necessary application forms are available at the recruiting station. He stated that it would be advisable for prospective candidates to apply as soon as possible.

It was also announced that members of organized or volunteer Marine Corps Reserve units may apply if they meet the requirements.

Official Ballot To Be Ready Soon

Three county officials will be unopposed in the Democratic elections in Eastland County this summer, it was reported today after the May 5 deadline had passed for filing for a place on the ballot.

Without opponents for re-election were County Judge John Hart, Tax Assessor-Collector Stanley Webb and County Attorney J. M. Nuessle.

Although the County Democratic Chairman had not prepared the official list of candidates, it was understood that the only name added Monday and not previously reported was that of W. W. (Bill) Tackett of Eastland, who entered the sheriff's race. Others in that race are Sheriff J. F. Tucker, seeking re-election, and F. E. Solomon of Cisco.

For Congress (17th district), there were two candidates, Jack Cox of Breckenridge and Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson, seeking re-election.

Three men filed for places for Commissioner of Precinct 4 — the Cisco area precinct. They are: J. E. (Ed) McCanlies and Robert Tucker, who are contesting Commissioner Arch Bint, who is running for re-election.

Three men are seeking the 91st District Judge's office — Fleming A. Waters of Cisco, Earl Conner, Jr., of Eastland and T. M. Collier of Eastland. Judge George Davenport did not file for re-election.

Four men are running for county treasurer, including Hugh H. Hardeman, J. H. Pittman, E. C. Fisher and Richard C. Cox. Three men are in the race for county clerk, George A. Fox, Jr., Johnson Smith and A. J. Blevins, Sr.

In the Cisco precinct, two men were in the Justice of the Peace and the Constable races. W. E. Brown, incumbent, is being opposed by Henry H. Curtis for Justice of the Peace. In the Constable's race, A. W. Dawson and Allen Jones are candidates.

The Democratic Chairman's official list is expected to be released this week. The names listed above are those who have announced with The Press, and is not the official list.

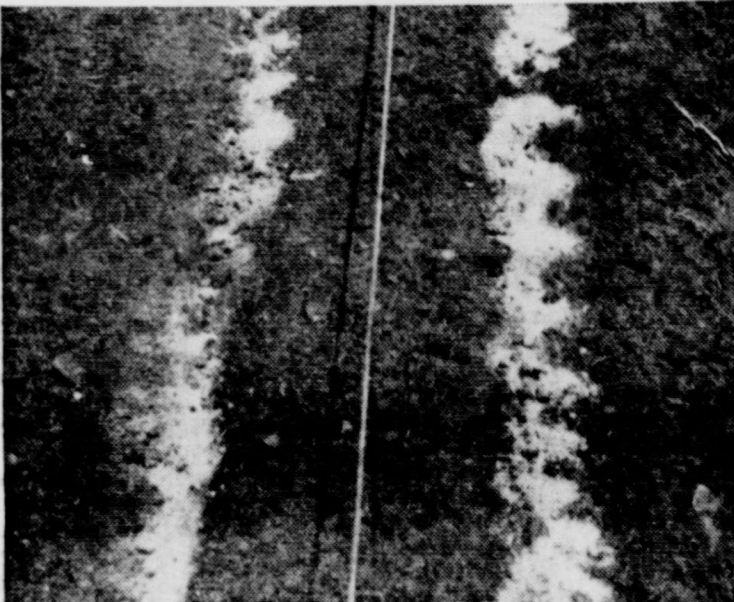

Apply Plant Food on Each Side of Row, Several Inches Away From Seed.

Feeding Home Garden Pays High in Yield and Quality

There is a lesson for all home gardeners in the remarkable results which farmers are achieving by increasing the quantities of plant food used on their crops. Reports of increased yields are often astonishing.

The expense of feeding is so small in comparison with the heavier production, either of food or of beauty, that a home gardener profits by it as much as the farmer.

If you can get six inches to a foot of well decayed barnyard manure to spade into the garden soil annually, you may not need commercial plant food. Otherwise your chief reliance must be on the commercials.

The plant food content of humus which you can make is small; and it is a rare home garden which can make enough humus to maintain its soil properly.

Four to six pounds of balanced commercial plant food per 100 sq. ft. will be adequate for the average garden annually. Two-thirds of it should be applied in the spring before planting.

For the vegetable garden, or a new flower bed or border, the following methods will get best results: 1—On soils which are acid, testings below pH6, plant food should be concentrated in bands or pockets not touching plant roots but within easy reach.

2—On sweet soils testing above pH6, spade plant food into the soil, evenly and deeply. To apply the first method, when setting out a plant mix plant food with soil at the bottom of the hole, a tablespoonful for tomato plants, up to a handful mixed with a bushel of soil for trees and shrubs.

In sowing seed for row crops, make a furrow four inches deep on each side of the drill in which seeds will be sown. Pour plant food into each furrow, a pint to fifty feet. Then cover with soil and sow the seed. When the roots get long enough to reach the plant food the plant will be old enough to use it.

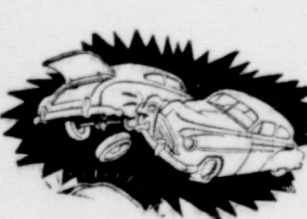

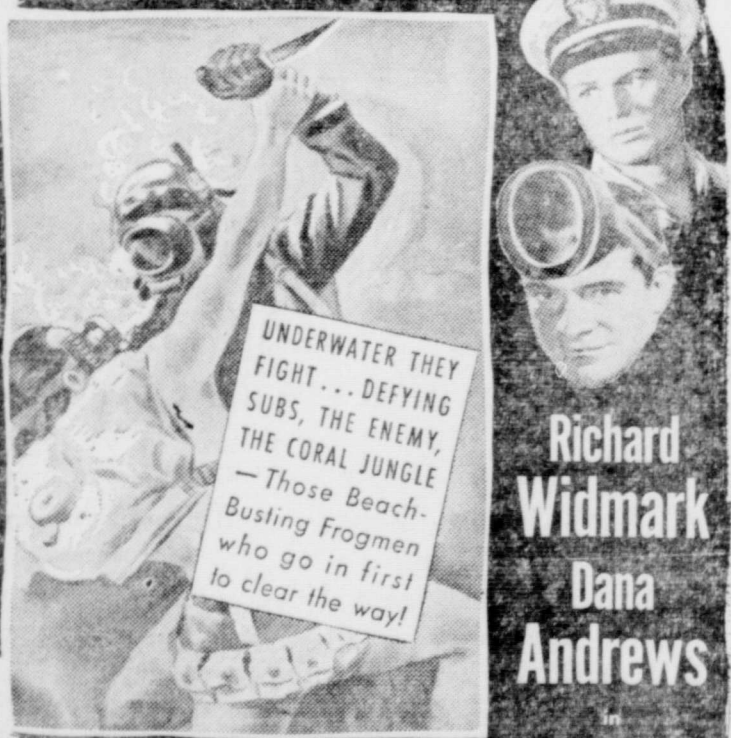

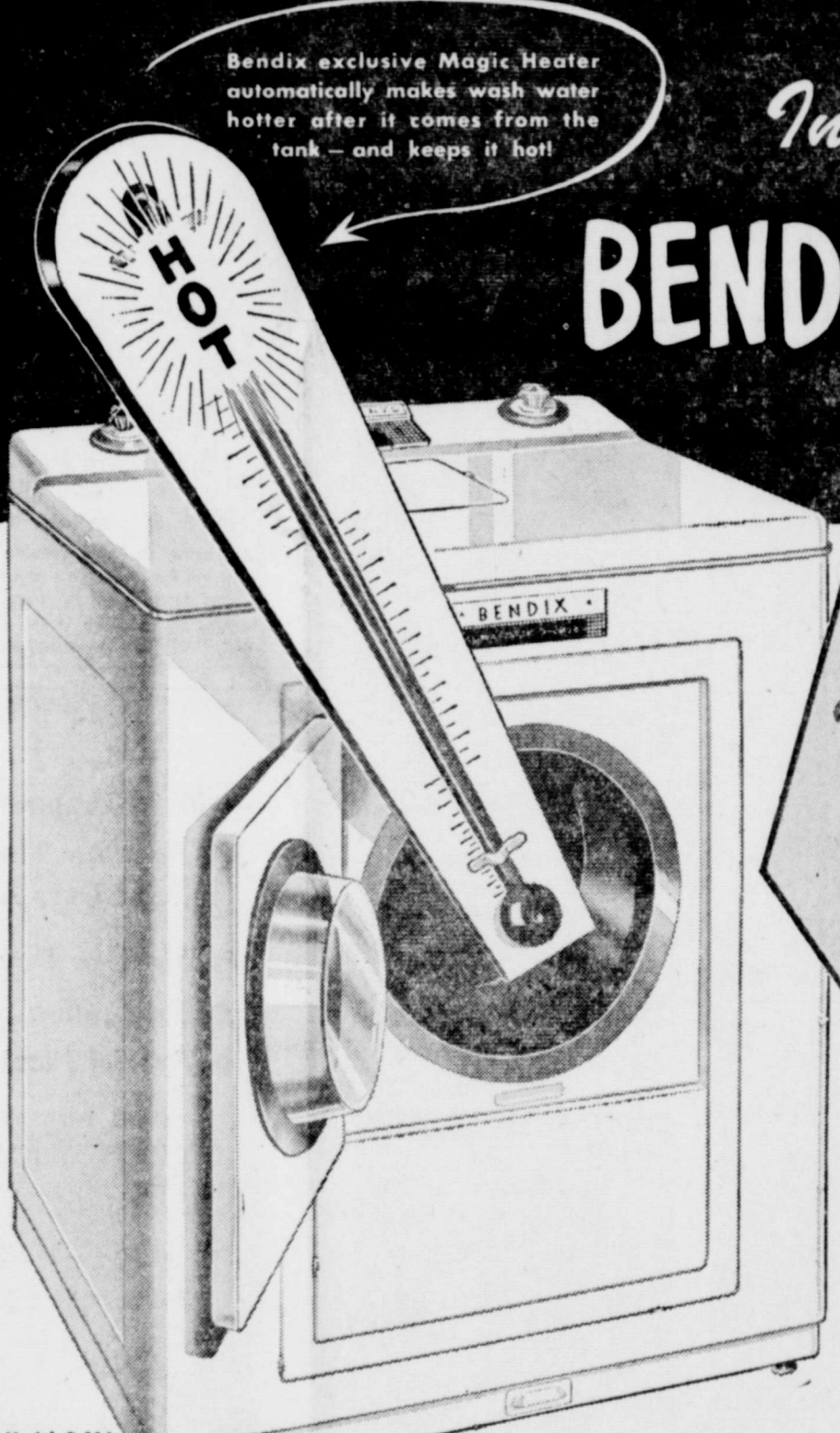
