



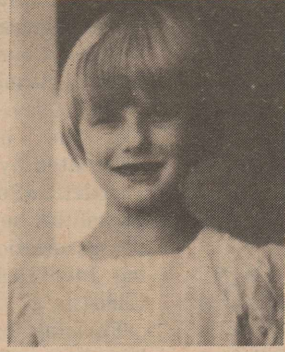

Texas-New Mexico Sugar Beet Growers Association Incorporated board of directors learned Friday that the Sugar Amendment was passed Thursday afternoon.

Executive Secretary, James W. Witherspoon, notified board

members of the approval and stated that "When the votes were counted and the President realized he had lost, he withdrew his opposition Thursday afternoon.

"This shows we do have some strength in Congress when everyone puts their shoulder to the wheel, and when we get a few breaks like we did by the government declaring the .02 cents portion to be unconstitutional," Witherspoon said.

Ray Joe Riley Selected 'Man Of Year In Texas'

Ray Joe Riley has been named a "Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture" for 1977 by Texas County Agricultural Agents Association.

One of seven Texans selected for the honor, he was nominated by county agents in District 2 (South Plains). The award will be presented during the association's annual meeting July 31-Aug. 3 in Corpus Christi.

Farming in the Hart-Springlake area, Riley has served Texas through his knowledge of plant breeding and has managed a family-owned seed business, Riley Yieldmaster, the past 18 years. He is generally concerned with cotton, sorghum and corn production.

Riley has served on the National Cotton Council and as director of the Texas Corn Growers Association along with top seats on the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. and Texas Certified Seed Producers Association. He is also affiliated with Texas Association of Cotton Producer Organizations, Grain Sorghum Producers Association and Water Incorporated.

An active supporter of Extension Service programs, Riley has served on the Castro County Program Building Committee and is an active

supporter of 4-H work. He is a member of Castro-Lamb Counties Pest Management Committee.

Riley holds a BS degree in agronomy from Texas Tech University. He did graduate work at Tech and taught agronomy before beginning the Riley Yieldmaster seed business.

As a 4-H youth, he was a national winner in the Field Corps Program in 1951 and held county and district offices.

Riley and his wife, Jo Eddy, are parents of two sons, Kevin and Jody. He is the son of Castro County pioneer, the late Ray Riley.

Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Beavers, seventeen-year-old Connie has taken time out from a busy summer schedule to share three of her favorite recipes, pecan pie, hush puppies and mouth-watering banana crunch cake.

Connie is a native of Hart. She is actively involved in school functions, having been a member of Future Homemakers two years and Future Farmers, three years.

She has been in band six years and played basketball three years. She was in home and family one year.

"She sews faster than I do," states her mother, commenting on Connie's sewing skills.

"I just get anxious to wear whatever I'm making," Connie confesses.

Reading, cooking, sewing and tennis are some of the activities that, in addition to twirling,

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teaspoonfuls into hot deep fat (375°) and fry until golden brown, then drain.

BANANA CRUNCH CAKE

$\frac{2}{3}$ c margarine
 $1\frac{1}{3}$ c sugar
3 eggs
 $1\frac{1}{2}$ c mashed bananas
 $2\frac{1}{2}$ c flour
 $1\frac{1}{4}$ t baking powder
 $1\frac{1}{4}$ t soda
1 t salt
 $\frac{2}{3}$ c buttermilk

Cream margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs and bananas; beat well. Add combined dry ingredients to mixture alternately with buttermilk, mixing well after each addition. Pour into greased and floured 13x9 inch pan. Bake 350° for 50 min. then spread topping over cake and broil until bubbly.

Crunchy Topping:

$\frac{1}{3}$ c margarine, softened
 $\frac{3}{4}$ c packed brown sugar
1 $3\frac{1}{2}$ oz can flaked coconut
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c chopped pecans
2 t milk

Combine ingredients, mix well.

PECAN PIE

3 eggs
 $\frac{1}{2}$ c sugar
1 c dark corn syrup
1 c pecans
1 t vanilla
 $\frac{1}{2}$ t salt

Beat eggs, add sugar, syrup, pecans, vanilla and salt. Mix well, pour in to pie crust that has to be partly cooked. Bake at 350° for 40 to 50 min.

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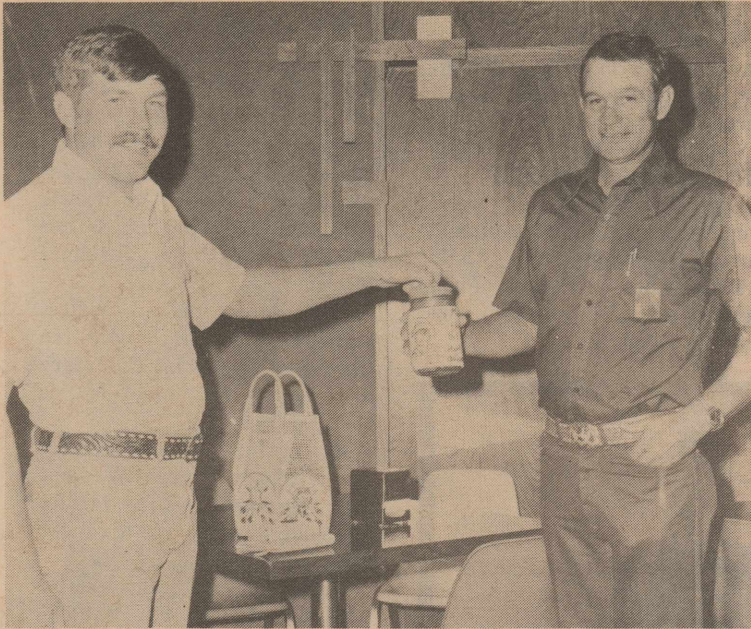

Officiating was the Rev. Marvin Roark, pastor. Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

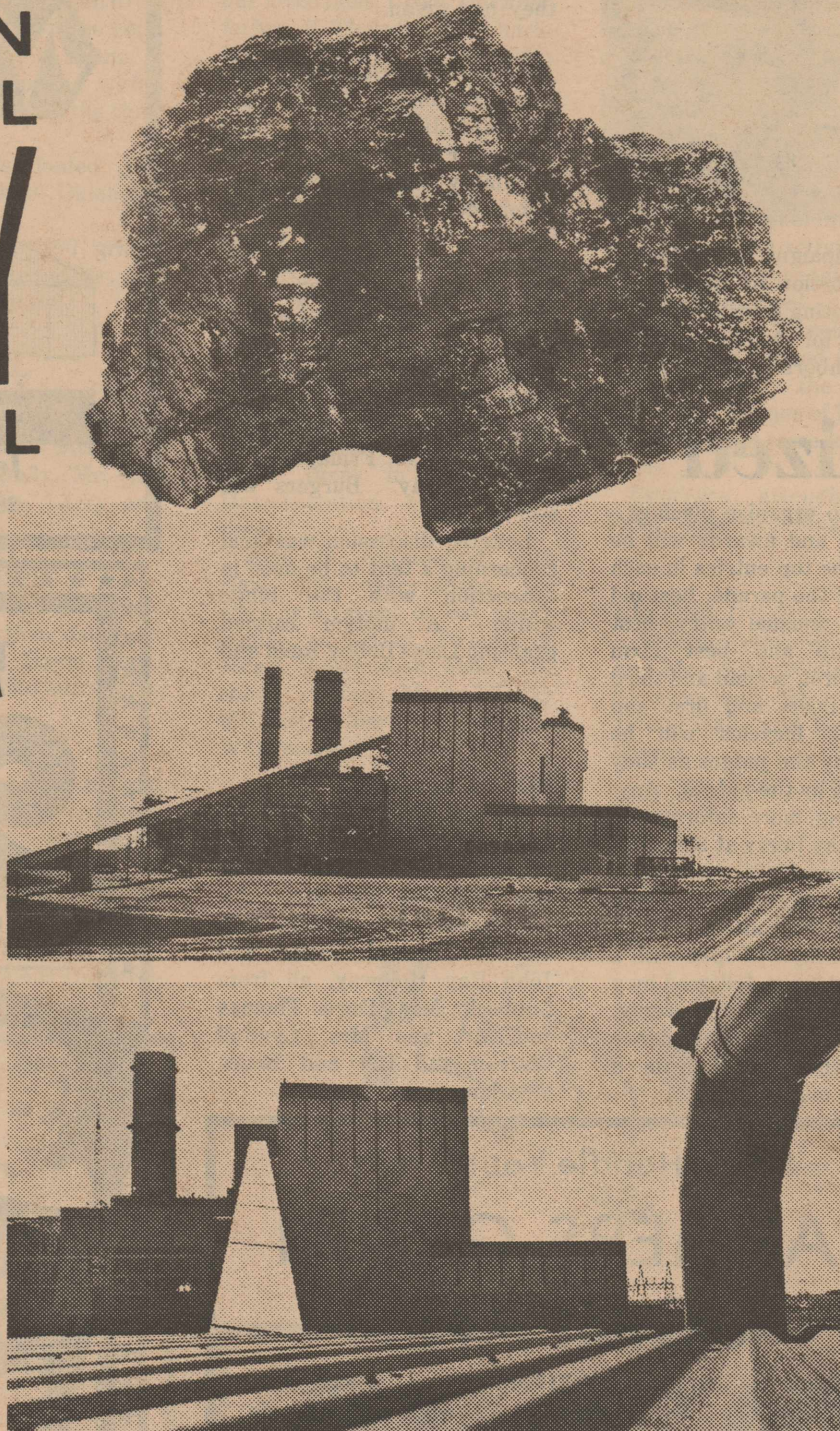
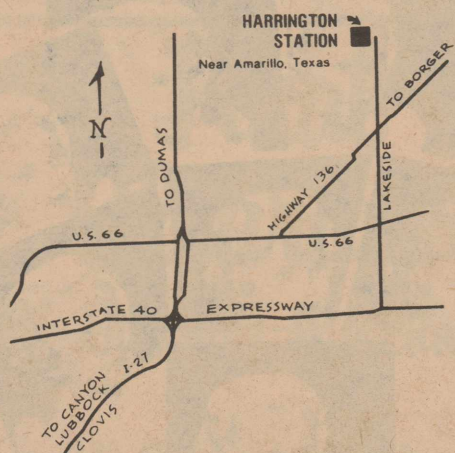

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Five Minutes With The Bible

REVEREND? WHAT'S IN A NAME?

This week's slip of the tongue, "May I present Reverend Louvier?" No, emphatically. Reverend should never be used as a noun. It is not a title like doctor, captain or mayor.

Well, is it better to say, "May I present my Pastor, Mr. Louvier?" No, this is incorrect also. The term pastor is reserved for those who are elders or overseers of the local congregation. It is a synonymous term with bishop, presbyter, shepherd, elder or overseer.

A very careful reading of Paul's address to the Ephesian elders in Acts 20 will show that all of these terms are used synonymously to refer to the elders of the congregation of the Lord's church at Ephesus. The only way that a minister as myself could wear the title of pastor or elder in accordance with the Bible would be for me to occupy the office of preacher while serving as an elder of a local congregation at the same time.

Well, is it wrong for me as a minister to sign a letter as "Yours sincerely, Rev. Randy Louvier?" Yes, it is incorrect for a minister of the gospel to speak of himself as Reverend or to sign himself as Rev. It should be kept in mind that reverend denotes worthy of reverence, honor, or respect. It is merely an adjective like

courteous, portly, handsome.

The actual term reverend appears only one time in the Scriptures in Psalm 111:9, "He sent redemption unto his people: he hath commanded his covenant forever: holy and reverend is his name." This is speaking of Almighty God, not some mere mortal man! Therefore, How can any physical human being take on a title that is reserved only for Jehovah God?

In light of this, it is very wrong for us to say, "I'm glad to see you, Reverend." Would one say to the mayor: "I'm glad to see you, Honorable?" or say to a justice of the Supreme court, "How do you do, Dignified?"

What title, then, should one use in speaking to a minister of the gospel? Just simply address him as Brother or Mr. Jones.

In addressing a letter to a minister, or in referring to or introducing a minister, use either of these correct forms: Brother John Jones, or simply, John Jones, the minister of the Church of Christ. But never, let it be emphasized, "Reverend Jones, or, worse still, Rev. Jones D.D. (More next week) Bible Questions of the week:

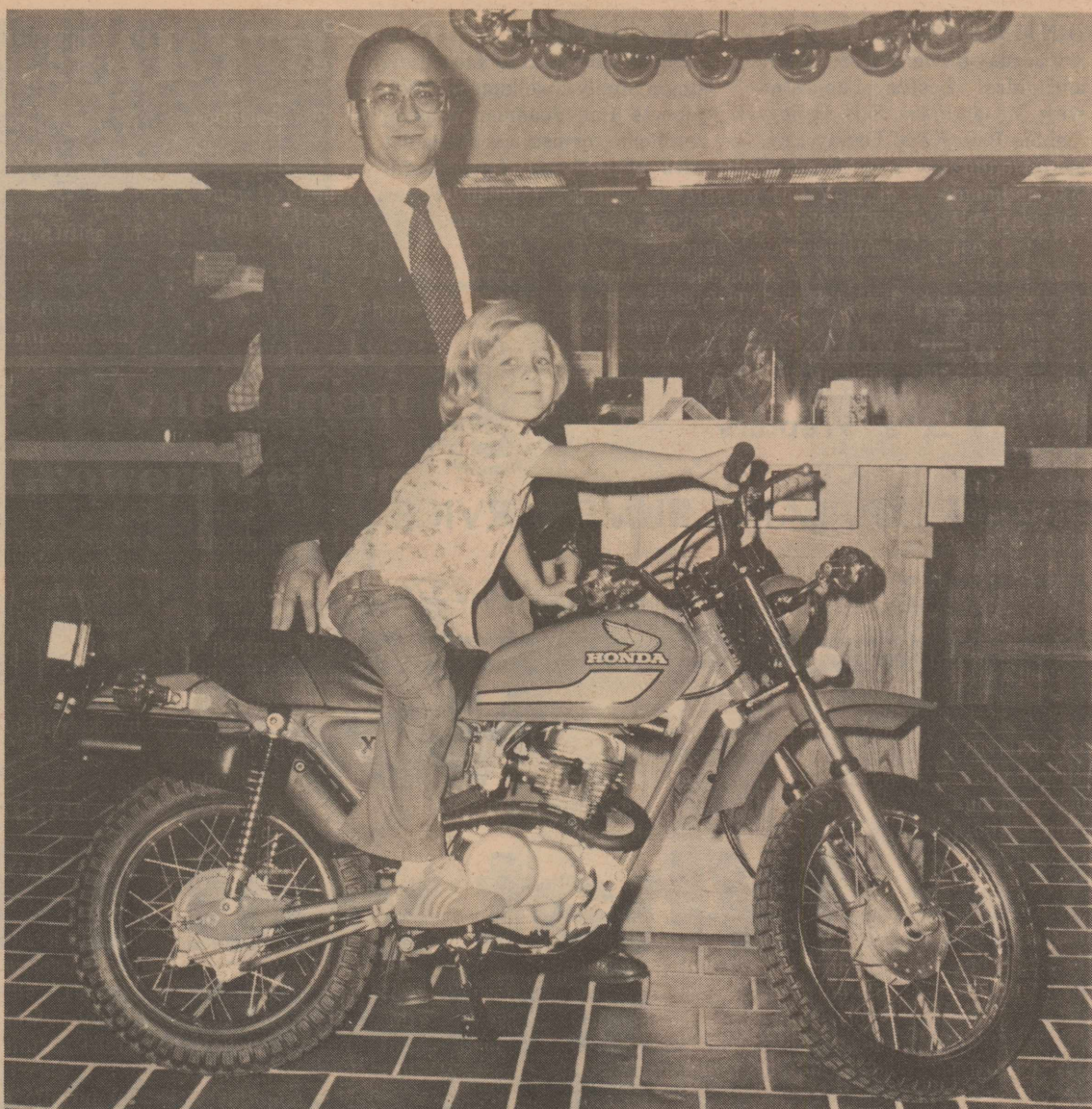

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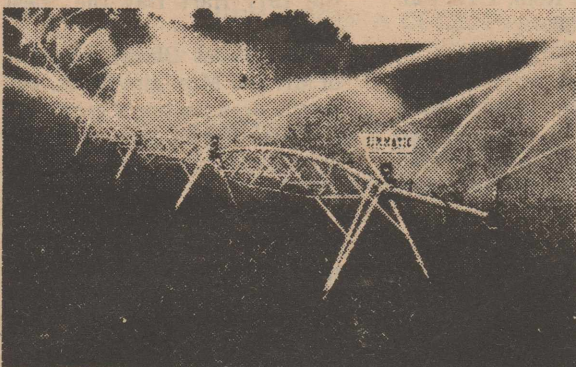
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BLACK BEANS
