Rountree Addresses Lions Club On All-Out War

People Urged To Write Or Wire Govt. Leaders

"Work Or Fight" Program Is Asked For All Classes Of American People

Judge Carl Rountree, prominent Lamesa attorney, was the principal speaker at the regular weekly meeting of the Lamesa Lions Club, at the Plaza Hotel, Thursday noon.

Judge Rountree used as his subject "The 40-Hour Week."

In beginning his address Mr. Rountree stated that he knew it was in violation of most civic club regulations to discuss a subject of political or controversial nature, but that the present situation was of such importance that he didn't believe that many members of the club were different in their beliefs.

"The foremost thought in the minds of the American people today," Mr. Rountree said, "is to win this war, and to win it just as soon as possible. It isn't just the 40-hour week that is causing this great and unparalleled uprising of public opinion, but the fact that the average American citizen knows that there are some few, both in the ranks of labor and in high political office, who are not going all-out to achieve this victory."

That the American people are not awake to the critical situation, has been disproven in this rising tide of indignation, the speaker pointed out. "There is not a man present," he said, "that wouldn't be willing to join up tomorrow, if it meant a final and lasting victory. Funeral Services For Ervin Bailey Held Monday

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon for Ervin T. Bailey, 48, of Lamesa, who met his death Saturday afternoon when he came in contact with a high-voltage electrical wire, while doing some work on the line near the Price Hospital. Mr. Bailey had been working on a transformer pole, running a 220-volt service wire to the hospital. He had completed work and started to descend the pole, and had stepped on the cross arms above the transformer. His foot slipped and he fell back against a 6,900-volt lead from the fuse cut-out to a lightening arrester, making contact with the back of his neck and right hand which was on 220-volt service line. The automatic switch kicked out at the sub-station and all current was off in town west of the railroad tracks. This occurred immediately upon the contact of Mr. Bailey's body with the lines, but the first flash of current was powerful enough to cause immediate death. The first flash ignited Mr. Bailey's shirt, and most of the burns on his face and upper body were caused by the burning of his shirt and undershirt.

Contrary to popular belief, the instant Mr. Bailey's body made contact with the live wires, the current went off, and did not come back on until after his body was brought to the ground.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Methodist Church, with Rev. E. D. Landreth and Rev. E. F. Cole officiating. Interment was in the Lamesa cemetery.

Survivors include his wife and three daughters, Glenna Faye, Jo Ervin, and Anna Marie; two brothers, three sisters, and his mother.

More Candidates Are Asking For City Offices

With last Saturday at noon being the final date for filing for a place on the city ballot, several candidates for the office of City Commissioner placed their names on the ticket.

Nelson Cope, whose name was placed on the ticket by friends, and M. Hatch, pioneer Lamesa grocerman, have authorized the Courier this week to place their names in the political column, and state that they will make their formal statements to the voters within the next few days.

Politics on the city front have picked up considerably this week, and all candidates are getting down to business and going after the votes. The City Election has been set for Tuesday, April 7, which isn't so long off, and the various candidates are losing no time hunting votes.

More Counties May Be Included In Food Program

Fifteen additional counties in this area may be included in an extension of the federal food stamp program if present plans, now under discussion, are carried out.

Announcement that a study of such an extension was underway was made by C. B. Hodges of Austin, state supervisor for the stamp plan, who is in the area for conferences with county officials on the subject. Details for extension of the plan were expected to be completed following a conference with representatives of officials of eight counties in Lubbock Tuesday, at which the Dawson County commissioners' court was present, and a similar meeting Wednesday morning at Dickens at which time seven other counties will be represented.

Participating in the Lubbock conference were representatives of Lamb, Cochran, Hockley, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Dawson and Scurry counties.

Scheduled to meet with the state supervisor and several members of his staff at Dickens Wednesday were representatives of the commissioners' courts of Dickens, Crosby, Kent, King, Garza, Stonewall and Foard counties.

These conferences have been hastened largely because of the interest of Congressman George Mahon in extending the food stamp plan to them, Hodges said.

Defense Rally To Be Held Here March 27th

AN EDITORIAL . . .

From every part of the American Nation, including Dawson County and Lamesa, comes the cry of an aroused citizenship demanding an "all out" participation in this war by men on the production line, the chiefs of industry and the holders of political offices both high and low.

Amid the rejoicing over General Douglas MacArthur's elevation to supreme command in the Southwest Pacific, we learn that shipbuilders' profits run as high as 300 per cent on government orders. America wants that stopped—not ultimately but NOW. Donald Nelson, head of the War Production Board, calls upon us to double our war production to save the nation, but the President in a press conference says that overtime and the 40-hour week are standard. He says that the time has come for more flag-waving in the war effort and some labor legislation ultimately, but not now. The President demands that the country awake and that dawdling cease.

But the office of Civilian Defense is cluttered up with newly appointed \$1-a-year men as Co-ordinator of Badminton, Co-ordinator of Archery, Co-ordinator of Bag-punching, Co-ordinator of Billiards, Co-ordinator of Canoeing, Co-ordinator of Code Ball (does anybody know what code ball is?), Co-ordinator of this, and Co-ordinator of that.

Do the men on Bataan have a 40-hour work week? Do they have a Co-ordinator of Bullets? Are they striking for higher wages and overtime pay? Do they take off for holidays if they don't get double time?

Every true-blooded American citizen, who wants to see the elimination of the 40-hour week, a law with "teeth" in it to halt strikes during the war emergency, the elimination of profiteering by capital, and the complete stoppage of two-bit politics in Washington and everywhere else, is urged to sit down today and write their lawmakers and the President and tell them so.

Congressman George Mahon, Senators W. Lee O'Daniel and Tom Connally have been and are outspoken in favor of these measures. Write them today commending them on their stand and URGING THEM ON.

Write or wire your President, TODAY, respectfully as befits a citizen-sovereign writing the most distinguished public servant in the land. Offer him all you've got—and demand all he's got—for AMERICA. Tell him that any man in Washington who won't get down to winning the war NOW, won't go back next time.

Washington is a long way from where the people live. It is a pity that it is such a long, long way from where our boys are fighting and dying in the foxholes of Bataan and in the splinter-strewn waters of the Pacific.

A citizens mass meeting in Lamesa sent a telegram to Mahon, Connally and O'Daniel last week. This week the Lamesa Delphian Club, composed of mothers and sisters of men in the armed services are sending a telegram to the same persons. Do it individually, in groups, by clubs, but wire or write to your representatives in Washington TODAY. And this includes the Chief Executive.

Their addresses are the same. Each may be reached at "Capitol Station, Washington, D. C."

Cattle Raisers Elect Victoria Man President

VICTORIA, Tex., March 19 (AP).—Cattlemen of the Southwest turned their eyes toward this section of the great Texas coastal county for leadership during the coming 12 months.

Meeting in El Paso under the banner of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association, they elected genial Claude K. McCan, scholar, banker, business leader, and more to their liking, the most popular cattlemen of the Victoria area.

Upon taking over the reins from the past president, Jay Taylor of Amarillo, he enthusiastically told the cattlemen that dark days were ahead and that their uppermost thought must be to help win the war.

"We must think most about winning the war—not what we will do after the war," was his straightforward way of putting it.

McCan was born in Victoria on August 3, 1899. He attended public school here, and later enrolled in college in Maryland and the University of Texas. From the latter he received his BBA degree.

In 1923 he married Miss Sue Ragsdale, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Ragsdale. They have two children, Sue and Kerry.

He is a member of the firm of Welder and McCan, and is trustee of the J. A. McFaddin estate. Upon the recent death of James F. Welder Jr., he was elevated to the presidency of the Victoria National Bank, on the board of which he has served for a number of years.

McCan has been a member of the cattle raisers' association for 20 years, serving the past 13 as a director. In 1940-41 he was a vice president.

He also is interested in agriculture, being a director of the Gulf Coast Council on Agriculture.

Land Use Planning Committees Are Active Over The State Of Texas

Although Texas' county and com-
munity land use planning commit-
tees engaged in a large number of
activities in 1941, their principal
work was on local problems, with
resultant plans put into action
wherever possible.

Among these activities was the
organization of approved variety
wheat counties in the Panhandle
area, says C. Hohn, of the A. and
M. College Extension Service, who
acts as land use planning leader.
County committees sought the
varieties adapted to produce the high-
est wheat, at the same time give
a high acre yield. It is estimated
that 95 per cent of the wheat sowed
in Hansford County, one of the
leaders in the movement, was Tur-
key, Tenmarq, or Kanred, the se-
lected varieties. A definite increase
in cash return to farmers resulted.

Prevention of prairie fires, a pre-
valing hazard throughout the dor-
mant season, prompted committees
to set up fire fighting organizations
throughout 22 counties comprising
Extension District No. 1. Childress
County developed a model organiza-
tion in which each county commis-
sioner acts as fire chief in his pre-
dict. Ranchmen agreed to carry
wire pushbrooms in their pick-ups
and to provide fire guards, espe-
cially along the main highways. Vo-
cational agriculture students im-
proved flails of shovel handles topped
with rubber flaps. The school board
authorized the vocational agricul-
ture teachers to carry students in
the school bus to fight fires. The
local siren was used to announce
grass fires with a special signal, and
the 34 members of the Childress
City volunteer fire department
agreed to lend aid.

During the year all counties which
employed a large amount of migra-
tory labor organized labor sub-com-
mittees which prepared monthly re-
ports on the labor situation. These
reports were summarized into a sepa-
rate state report by the state sub-
committee on farm labor and sent
on to Washington and the counties.
The result was to create a closer
understanding between the farm
people and the state and federal
agencies working with farm labor.
A study of the Young County land

use planning committee made during
the year demonstrated that the peo-
ple can do something about tax re-
form. The Texas Agricultural Ex-
periment Station, which with the
Bureau of Agricultural Economics,
co-operated in the study, assembled
data from tax rolls and other sources.
Farmer committees placed assess-
ment on each property in the county
which was then compared with the
assessment levied by county offi-
cers. After studying a completed
report, the committee offered its
services to the commissioners court
on equalization of taxation. As a
result of the work done on equali-
zation, the sub-committee on tax-
ation took a leading part in the dis-
cussion of the budget prepared by
the court for the ensuing year. A
consequence of the active partici-
pation of the people in taxation prob-
lems is that the commissioners
court of Young County is consider-
ing adoption of the county unit sys-
tem of road and bridge work.

Of the 252 counties which have
land use planning committees, 149
have community planning commit-
tees as well. Over all is the state
land use planning committee com-
prising 18 farm members — one
from each type of farming area; 6
farm women — one from each two
extension districts, and 24 State
and Federal agency representatives.
The State committee in 1941 de-
voted most of its time to the devel-
opment of the State Unified Agricul-
tural program.

Public To Know More About U. S. War Effort

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—
The Office of Facts and Figures
issued a comprehensive statement
of the government's policy on war
news tonight, including an an-
nouncement that casualty lists will
be made public.

The statement also promised that
"the War Production Board will
publish at intervals a production
communique which will enable the
public to judge whether production
program is progressing satisfactori-
ly or not."

In regard to military information
the statement was principally an
outline and explanation of the pol-
icy already followed but it announced
that "the joint chiefs of staff
will shortly begin the publication of
bulletins from time to time which
will furnish an authoritative gen-
eral review of the military situation
in various theatres of war."

The casualty lists will be made
public with the stipulation that
newspapers not publish and radio
stations not broadcast the names of
any victims outside their own lo-
calities. The statement said that
the lists would "be made available
with all possible speed."

Women's Army Corp Voted By Representatives

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—
A bill establishing a women's
army auxiliary corps of volunteers
to take over many of the military
forces' behind-the-lines assignment
was passed today by the House de-
spite protests that it was silly and
an affront to American manhood.

The measure was sent to the Sen-
ate on a roll call vote of 249 to 86
after Rep. Edith Nourse Rogers
("R-Mass"), its author, took the floor
to remind her colleagues of the
heroism of women in the nation's
early days, and to assert that those
of modern times were as willing to
make sacrifices for their country.

From scattered seats on the House
floor during the three-hour debate
came vigorous outcries against for-
mation of the petticoat corps, after
the bill's backers argued that it
would release thousands of soldiers
for combat duty.

Without opposition, the House
adopted one amendment to limit
the strength of the feminine force
to 150,000, but rejected several oth-
ers, among them provision which
would have:

Prevented the Army from sending

any of the volunteers overseas with
the American expeditionary forces
without their consent.

Given them the same present—or
future—pension rights, compensa-
tion and disability benefits, and
hospitalization as that written into
law for the regular armed forces.

As drafted, the measure would
give the WAAC volunteers the bene-
fits prescribed by law for govern-
ment civilian employees who are in-
jured or killed on duty—a provision
which Rep. Nichols (D-Okla.) des-

cribed as far from adequate.
The legislation, which has been
supported by the War department,
would open up the ranks to women
21 to 44 years old, inclusive, who are
able to pass the physical require-
ments. An attempt to lift the cell-
ing to 50 years was turned down,
45 to 21.

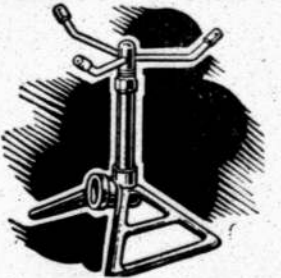

To Interview Navy Physical Instructors

Physical instructors and well qualified athletes with college degree will be interviewed on March 30 and 31 at the Navy Recruiting Station in the Post Office Building at Dallas, by a representative of Commander J. J. Tunney, director of the Physical Fitness program of the United States Navy.

Accepted applicants will be enlisted as Chief Specialists with beginning pay of \$99.00, plus allowance of \$34.50 per month if they have dependent. After a six weeks vigorous course in Naval indoctrination and training at Norfolk, Va., they will become full fledged physical instructors and be transferred to the various Naval activities.

Applicants must be between the ages of 21 and 35 and have in their possession at time of interview, a transcript of their college record, a birth certificate, a small photograph taken within the past week, and a discharge if they have had previous military service. Men without college training should not apply.

Dr. Cox Says:

In his recent May - Day Child Health Day proclamation, President Roosevelt stressed the vital importance of the health of children to the strength of our nation. He urged that all Americans exert every effort to conserve child health, not only through the application of positive health measures, but also by reducing the incidence of the more devastating childhood diseases.

Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent appeal to all Texans to co-operate whole heartedly in this health conservation program.

"While it is true that science has had at hand for years the means to reduce almost to the vanishing point the incidence of diphtheria and small pox," Dr. Cox stated, "nevertheless, the actual control of these two diseases is largely in the hands of parents."

Children should receive toxoid treatment between the ages of six and nine, he declared, and pointed out that the necessity for immunization at this early age is based upon the fact that nearly two-thirds of all diphtheria deaths occur in children under six years of age.

"I cannot emphasize too strongly that to deprive your children of the protection that science has made available amounts almost, if not altogether, to criminal negligence," he warned. "The family physician and the public health workers can only point the way and urge action, but the essential factor still lacking in most diphtheria illnesses and deaths is parental co-operation."

Loans May Be Extended On Stored Grains

All 1941 farm stored wheat, rye, and barley loans may be extended to April 30, 1942, according to P. C. Colgin, state AAA commodity loan specialist.

Only grains in good, sound condition on which required inspection fees have been paid are included in the new regulations which apply in certain eastern and southern areas to be announced later, he said. Present maturity date for all these loans is April 30, 1942.

Loans on excess wheat stored on farms or in approved warehouses, may also be extended to 1943, Colgin explained.

The Commodity Credit Corporation will advance 7 cents per bushel storage on farm stored wheat resented at time of extension, if the allowance has not been made previously, with an additional 5 cents per bushel allowance due at time of delivery, the AAA official said. Both storage allowances will be considered upon delivery of the wheat to the Corporation at maturity.

Farm stored wheat not of quality for resealing may be delivered prior to maturity date, April 30, 1942, subject to approval of county AAA committees and provided CCC is in position to accept it. Full storage payment of 7 cents per bushel less deficiencies for grade or quality are due producers who deliver this type wheat.

All wheat sales programs, except

sales for feed, alcohol and exports, were discontinued temporarily on March 14, for the purpose of giving farmers the opportunity of selling 1941 loan wheat before maturity dates. Grains on which loans are defaulted will either be sold in satisfaction of loans or title will be secured by the CCC. Grains will not be continued in producers' pool formerly.

"Producers should make definite plans for increasing storage on the farm for all new crops because the present facilities are already crowded to capacity," Colgin said.

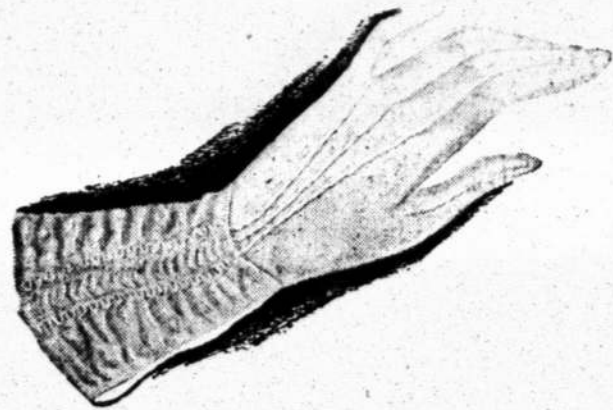

Another problem is thin, brown grass. This may be due to allowing the grass to grow too tall and then cutting it too short, thus destroying a large part of the food supply. Grass should not be cut shorter than one and one-half inches.

Also when watering the lawn soak

the soil and then allow the ground to become somewhat dry. This causes the roots to grow deep and makes it more drought resistant.

Mrs. Guy Orr discussed "Suitable Trees and Shrubs for West Texas." She emphasized the fact that we should not over plant and that the house is the picture and the plantings the frame, thus the picture should not be covered by large trees and shrubs. However, if this has already been done, the home grounds may still be attractive if they show the proper care.

Mrs. Ralph Stuart gave an interesting article on conditions in England, bringing out the point that if we fail to feed England, we will be letting down the most courageous people the world has ever known.

Families Urged To Take Care Of Washing Machines

Families fortunate enough to own electric washing machines had better take good care of them, for production of war equipment has curtailed the supply of new washers.

Mrs. Bernice Claytor, Extension Service specialist in home improvement, says rural electrification has made it possible for many Texas farm and ranch families to install washing machines as one means of

saving homemakers a great deal of hard work. To these families she offers some suggestions on making the present machine last longer and serve more efficiently. Here are some of them:

Follow the manufacturer's directions for oiling the motor, wringer gears, or any part of the machine. Do not over-oil any part.

Keep the washing machine clean. Rinse and drain it well, wipe out any lint, and dry the machine inside and out. To keep the outside from rusting, if it is made of steel or iron, rub it occasionally with a little oil. If the machine is out in the open, cover it to provide added protection. Between wash days, leave the drain faucet open and prop the lid open an inch or two, the specialist suggests.

Now that rubber is scarce it is especially necessary to take care of rubber rolls in the wringer. "Don't stall or strain the wringer by putting too much clothing through at once," Mrs. Claytor warns. Buttons and buckles should be folded to the inside of clothes before they are wrung out.

After every washing the rubber rolls should be wiped clean and dry and the pressure on them released. One added warning is: Never use harsh scouring powders on any part of the machine, especially on the inside.

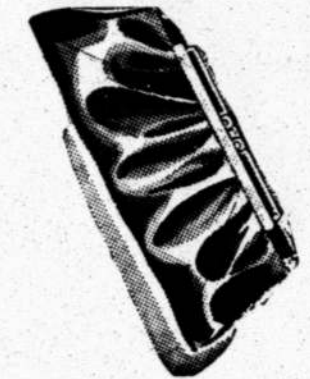
