Officials Are Named For Livestock Show

Various ranchers and livestock men have been named to head up the various sections of the annual Eastland County Livestock Show on March 11-13, according to Robert Kincaid, Morton Valley rancher, who will again serve as general superintendent of the show.

Buck Wheat, Morton Valley, will serve as the assistant general superintendent. He served in the same capacity at the 1964 show.

Ross Wilson, Gorman, and Raymond Beck, Eastland, prominent Hereford breeders, will be superintendents of the beef cattle division while Ben McKinnis, Eastland, will have charge of the fat steer division.

Norman Richardson, Ranger dairyman, will be in charge of the dairy cattle section.

The Angora goat division will be headed by W. O. Cantwell, Bullock. Cantwell has one of the few flocks of

registered Angora goats in the county.

The breeding classes of beef cattle and goats will be open both to the junior as well as to adult exhibitors. Other divisions of the show are open only to the FFA and 4-H Club boys and girls, it was explained.

Bill Claborn, Eastland, and Gaston Boyd, Cisco, will superintend the fat lamb division. Jimmy Horn and M. L. Terrell, Eastland, will have charge of the breeding classes of sheep.

Park Plambeck, Pleasant Hill, will have charge of the breeding classes of swine. Hoot Ferguson, Cisco, and Jack Therwanger, Eastland, are superintendents of the fat pig classes.

Ring officials include James Wright, Eastland, announcer; Clyn Gilliam, Ranger banker, who will award the ribbons, and C. M. McCain, Eastland, who will award the cash to the winning exhibitors.

Plans Underway For 4th Industry Seminar

Vets Questions and Answers

Q — I am 35 years of age and my \$10,000 World War II GI Life Insurance is still on the term plan. Next month it must be renewed for another five year term at a premium cost of \$90 per year. Should I convert to one of the permanent plans — say 20 or 30 Payment Life?

A — Term insurance costing you \$90 per year at age 35 will cost \$470 per year if you have to renew it at age 65 and \$731.60 per year if renewed at age 70. Premiums on permanent plans never increase. In addition, the permanent plans provide more than protection in the form of cash, loan and other reserve values. For complete information, get in touch with your VA Regional Office or write to the VA Office where you send your insurance premium payments.

Q — How can I find out if I am entitled to hospital care from the VA?

A — Get in touch with your

nearest VA hospital or regional office. If you submit your claim by mail, be sure to identify yourself with a claim or serial number and give dates of your military service.

Q — Is a peacetime veteran protected by re-employment rights?

A — Yes, if he left other than a temporary job to enter service and if this service did not exceed four years. Usually he must apply to his former employer within 90 days after separation from active service. However, reservists and National Guardsmen who perform service of from three to six months must apply within 31 days of their release from active duty.

Heart Disease Tops State's 10 Killers

Ten killers are at large in Texas.

These killers aren't bandits or criminals — they are the ten leading causes of Texans' deaths.

The ten leading killers account for a giant share of 82,692 Texans who died in 1963.

The latest statistics released by the State Health Department categorize, profile and dissect the leading killers.

This is how they stack up on paper.

Heart disease took the lion's share — one out of every three deaths in the State. National statistics also show the same leading cause of death.

Cancer ranks second, taking 15 per cent of the State's total number of deaths.

Apoplexy — or stroke — is classified as the third most deadly, with 11 per cent of the death total.

Accidents, as the fourth leading killer, claimed 5,999 lives, or seven per cent of the total. Death due to accidental cause takes the largest percentage of lives for the age groups between one and 45.

Disease of early infancy, fifth in sequence, takes its

toll — of course — below the one year marker.

Pneumonia ranks sixth in the line-up of killers claiming five per cent of the deaths.

General arteriosclerosis, diabetes mellitus and congenital malformations are the seventh, eighth and ninth cause of death, respectively.

Suicide is the tenth leading cause of death. It first ranked tenth in 1958. Deaths from suicide increase in number each year.

The ten leading causes of death and other vital statistics are released yearly by the Health Department's Records and Statistics Section.

Rather than being cold, impersonal statistics, these figures represent your friend, neighbors and loved ones. Takes these facts personally, they are killers.

EASTLAND WILL SELL WATER TO OLDEN

Eastland City Commissioners agreed to sell water to the proposed Olden water system at a rate of cost, (to be calculated annually), plus ten per cent, during a harmonious huddle with Olden residents at the regular commission meeting Monday evening.

However, the city of Eastland cannot enter into a 40-year contract, the Olden people were told because Eastland is presently ten years gone on a 40-year contract it holds with the Eastland County Water Supply District.

The flexible rate would benefit both parties it was explained, in the event water consumption continues to increase as it has in the past. Based on last year's figures, the present rate, if Olden were to begin buying immediately, would be 33 cents a thousand gallons, City Manager Lewis Tiner explained.

This is based on the cost, which last year was 28.9 cents per 1,000, plus 10 per cent. Cost has gone down in recent years, he explained, pointing out that cost in 1961 and 1962 was 36.2 cents; 31.4 in 1963; and 28.9 in 1964.

Asked what the "cost" included, Tiner explained that it includes the seven cents a thousand paid to the Water District for the treated water, plus a proportionate share of the fixed amount of \$3,750 the city pays the District monthly under contract for the retirement of bonds, and a proportionate share of the \$12,000

paid annually by Eastland residents to the District in taxes. It does not include normal billing expenses or maintenance expenses which the city pays, and which affect the cost of delivered water in Eastland.

The Olden residents agreed that they would have to meet with their engineers to see if a 30-year contract can be negotiated on the proposed FHA-financed system that is being considered.

AUCTION

A total of 227 cattle, 90 hogs, 40 sheep and goats were sold to 39 buyers at Eastland Auction sale last Tuesday. There were 55 consignors.

Prices were reported as follows: butcher bulls, 16 to 17.60; stocker bulls, 14 to 19; butcher cows, 13 to 15.50; stocker cows, 12 to 17; carners and cutters, 9 to 13; butcher calves, 17 to 21; stocker calves (light choice) 19 to 21; stocker calves (heavy choice) 17 to 20; pairs of cows and calves, none offered; butcher hogs, 16.50 to 17.30; and sows, 13 to 15.

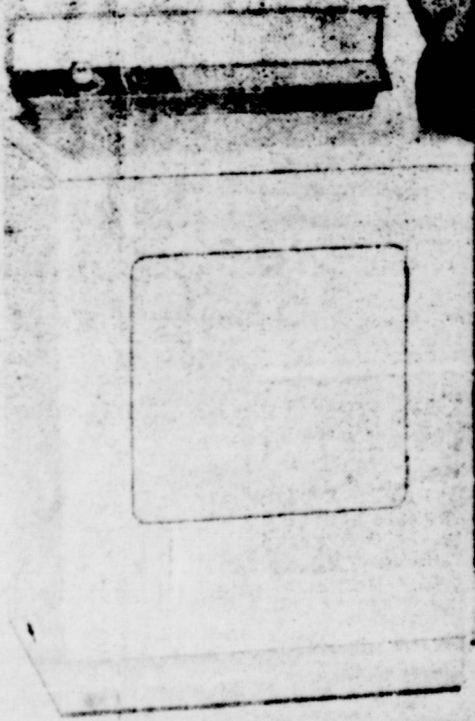
