SAFEGUARD AGAINST DIPHTHERIA, IS WARNING OF STATE HEALTH OFFICER

AUSTIN, Dec. 8 — "No one needs to have diphtheria, but it will not be conquered until all parents realize that they and their children must be safeguarded against it," declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. "After the first six months of life nearly every child is susceptible to the disease and should be immunized. Adults also have diphtheria, but are not as liable to 'catch' it as children. A successful immunization gives complete protection against the disease."

Other diseases for which there is immunity are: smallpox, lock jaw and whooping cough.

Dr. Cox advises parents to consult their family physician and gives these instructions for parents to follow concerning immunization.

"Vaccination against smallpox at any age during an epidemic, but routinely between 3 to 12 months of age. Repeat at 6 to 12 years of age and during an epidemic. Revaccinate after any exposure.

"If immunization is to be given against diphtheria only, start between 9 and 12 months of age. If single vaccination against whooping cough (pertussis) is employed, start at 6-9 months or at any subsequent time. It is questionable whether pertussis vaccination should be employed after 6 years of age.

"Multiple combined vaccines are now being used safely against diphtheria, tetanus (lock jaw) and pertussis, starting at 3 months of age."

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Hickok Hits Lake Sand In Owens; To Drill Further

Prospects appeared bright today for at least a small oil producer on the eastern boundary of Cisco as Hickok Producing and Developing Corp. announced they were setting pipe at the top of the Lake Sand in their Owens No. A-1, a semi-wildcat located just south of the N. D. Gallagher Clay Products Company plant on Highway 80.

The Lake was topped at 3,334 feet and drilling operations were stopped to await the setting of pipe. When the cement is set the sand will be drilled deeper to determine the possibilities of the well. It will probably be next week before a decision can be reached.

The well was begun several weeks ago but drilling was hampered when water was hit at around 300 feet. Several days were required to shut off the flow. The well is being drilled with cable tools.

Nearest Lake Sand production to the new well is in the Kleiner Field northeast of Cisco and if the Owens is completed as a good producer it will open up a new drilling area in the Cisco section.

Original plans on the well called for the testing of all possible zones to the Mississippian. If the Lake fails to produce as expected, drilling operations will be resumed as first planned.

New Firm Takes Over Bakery

Formation of a partnership that has purchased the old Rupert Bakery at 204 West 8th St. was announced today by Harry Bosworth of Cisco and Ray Kennedy of Austin. The new firm, the B. & K. Bakery, took over the bakery on December 1.

The new firm has announced that it will offer the people of Cisco and the trade territory a complete line of breads, cakes and pastries. In addition to their retail trade, they will continue to wholesale bakery products and will specialize in special orders of all kinds — birthday, party and wedding cakes.

Mr. Bosworth, who has been with the City of Cisco for the past year, is a veteran baker of some 24 years experience. He is well known here as a baker.

Mr. Kennedy lived in Cisco until 1936 when he joined a large baking concern in Austin. For the past seven years, he was production superintendent of the firm. He is moving here.

The new partnership purchased the bakery from George Rupert, who operated the bakery here for many years. In recent years, he has conducted only a wholesale business.

Texas 4-H'ers Win Special Recognition

OUTSTANDING records of achievement in the National 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts, Frozen Foods, Poultry and Home Grounds Beautification program have won four Texas club members state championship honors. The winners and brief outlines of their records follow:



Patsie Scales, 18, of Brownfield, achieved State honors in the 1949 National 4-H Recreation and Rural Arts program. During four years in 4-H Club work, she has led songs and games at community meetings. She was mistress of ceremonies of the talent show at 4-H Club round-up. At county camp this year Patsie was in charge of all recreation, including vesper services and flag raising. She has given craft demonstrations on glass etching, bracelet making, and plaque making. Patsie will be among those whose records will be judged for national honors. The reward is an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, provided by United States Rubber Co., program sponsor.

It's June in January at the Probst dinner table in Bastrop, because fresh delicious fruits and vegetables from the family freezer are served in mid-winter. Also previously frozen and now appearing on the menu are meats, chicken and pastries. Daughter Lorene, 18, has made all this possible by participating in the National 4-H Frozen Foods program. Proof that she did a first-rate job is the \$50 U. S. savings bond she won as 1949 state champion. The award was provided by International Harvester Co., program sponsor. Lorene worked diligently on 51 projects during her six years in 4-H, and was active in club and community projects. Sixteen projects in five years of 4-H work is a record worth crowing about. And that's just what Diana Behlen, 15, of Bebe, is doing. All of these activities were conducted under the direction of the Extension Service of the State Agricultural College and USDA cooperating.

because she won state honors in the 1949 National 4-H Poultry Achievement program. Altogether Diana tended a flock of 1,556 fowl. She and her brother share a poultry project. They raise New Hampshire Reds, Indian River crosses and Liens Golden Breds. The money Diana and her brother earned selling capons was used to buy trees and grape vines. Diana made 22 poultry exhibits and won many high awards. She shows an income of \$1,400 from poultry sold. Even though many hours of hard work went into her projects, Diana has found time to serve her club in almost every office including Junior leader. Her reward was an all-expense trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, provided by Dearborn Motors Corp., awards donor for the program.

To receive State honors in the 1949 National 4-H Home Grounds Beautification program means that a lot of planning and hard work have gone into the project. It means, too, that the results not only reward the winner, but provide lasting joy and beauty for other members of the 4-H family. This honor went to Doris Rudolph, 16, of Fashing, who completed 52 4-H projects during seven years. Doris helped haul dirt to fill in the yard and level it off. A driveway was constructed, grass and flowers planted and 35 shrubs put in. With the help of her family the home grounds have been greatly improved at little cost. 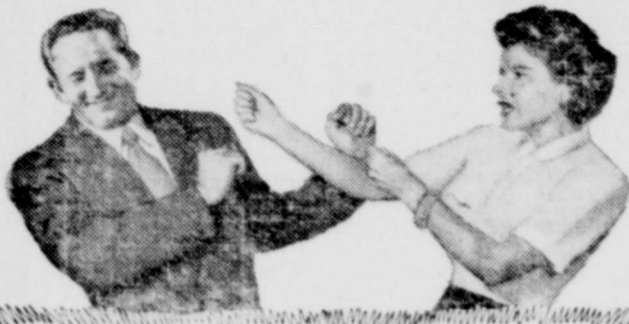
