AMBASSADOR TO RUSSIA IS ANNOUNCED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Joseph Davies, wealthy socialite and former head of the federal trade commission today was appointed ambassador to Soviet Russia. Davies, supporter of Roosevelt and former husband of Barbara Hutton, had been rumored for the position for some time. President Roosevelt signed the appointment before he left for South America, but announcement was withheld pending receipt of assurance from Soviet Russia Davies would be acceptable. The Moscow post had been vacant for several months. It was formerly held by William Bullitt, who took the ambassadorship to France.

Britain Trains Malay Troops

SINGAPORE.—The newest regiment in the British Empire—the Malay Regiment—will leave its experimental stage and become an effective part of the Imperial defense forces in Malaya this month.

Sir Shenton Thomas, High Commissioner of the Federated Malay States, shortly will present awards of honor to four Malay officers at Kuala Lumpur, the Federal capital. They are the first members of their race to hold commissions in the British Army. Among them is Lieut. Raja Lope, son of the Sultan of Perak. The Sultan himself will attend the ceremony.

The new officers have received special training in a staff course at the Singapore garrison. The commandant of the regiment, Lieut. Col. G. McT. S. Bruce, is returning to Malaya from leave this month to supervise the final stages of their training.

Raja Lope was one of the first 25 Malay soldiers recruited in 1933. In the following year the regiment consisted of one company, 150 strong. Now the total establishment is nearly 700, and the military authorities at Singapore are extremely pleased with the progress of the Malay soldiers. At first it was feared that the Malay, pleasure-loving Malay character would prevent them from becoming good soldiers, but training under British Army officers brought out a fighting spirit of the race.

Trained to use all the modern apparatus of warfare instead of the daggers and spears of old-time warfare, the regiment will become an integral part of the defenses of British Malaya and of Singapore, the great British fortress, naval and air base in the Far East.

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—Pres. E. A. Burnett of the University of Nebraska was elected president of the national association of state universities as it ended a two-day meeting here today.

America Warned To Keep Ships Out Of Spanish Harbor

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—The United States received indirect warning from the Spanish national government to keep all American naval and commercial vessels out of the port of Barcelona, which is under threat of a bombardment. Acting Secretary of State Walton Moore announced receipt of a warning which came through Lisbon and the American consul at Seville.

Pipes Replacing Strings of Piano

LOS ANGELES.—A new musical instrument, the Symphonette, resembling a small piano which plays on pipes instead of strings, has been introduced here. It has 55 piano keys which send padded hammers humping against 55 reed-like metal pipes ranging from 6 to 28 inches in length. The long pipes produce the deep notes, and the short pipes the high section of the scale.

Music of the new instrument is a cross between the xylophone and a fast-played chimes. High notes resemble chimes. Low notes, with the steps released, so that each blow on the pipes vibrates, can be made to resemble with weird accuracy the far-off striking of a tower clock.

Tone range of the instrument is about six notes short of a small piano's scale. Uses ranging from symphony orchestra to jazz are stressed by the inventor, Harry F. Noake, newspaperman. Because it weighs only 150 pounds and cannot get out of tune, he says, several churches are considering its use for foreign missions.

Noake worked two and one-half years developing the instrument, and has applied for a patent. He says the construction cost is less than that of a moderately good upright piano.

Farmers Are Urged To Aid Nature In Great Grass Belt

WASHINGTON.—Natural revegetation of many eroded and abandoned farms in the Great Plains could be speeded with proper co-operation from farmers, so that they once more could carry a heavy grazing load in half the natural time, according to E. A. Aldous of the Soil Conservation Service.

When left entirely to nature, Aldous said, the restoration will be a long process—probably requiring from 25 to 35 years—dependent on growing conditions, quality of remaining soil, species of vegetation growing nearby and the intensity of grazing.

The restoration of grasses, essential to revegetation, can be hastened, Aldous believes, by improvement of the structure and humus content of the soil.

STATE DEFICIT REACHES NEW HIGH RECORD

AUSTIN, Nov. 20.—The deficit in the state general fund hit an all-time high today of \$13,964,163. Collections have been insufficient this month, said State Treasurer Charley Lockhart, today.

Such calls are usually made twice each month. On the last call date, Nov. 5, the general fund deficit was \$13,136,537. The deficit in the confederate pension fund today was \$5,349,186.

All doubt of financing old age assistance this winter was dispelled, however, with the award of a contract to the Republic National Bank of Dallas to loan \$3,000,000.

The borrowed money will be used to pay pensions until the payment of new taxes furnishes the needed amount.

CCC Enrollees to Become Volunteer Arctic Explorers

WASHINGTON.—One hundred amateur arctic explorers have chugged across Lake Superior to Isle Royale, where they will be isolated from civilization for the next seven months by blizzards, gales and 30-below temperatures, while they chop trees and catch moose. These pseudo Admiral Byrds are civilian conservation corps enrollees, who volunteered for an assignment as rigorous as any undergone by wanderers in the land of penguins and icebergs. By Dec. 13 they will be snowed in.

On the island they will stay, with no visitors except moose and wolves, until the ice in the lake begins to break up in May. Each man took with him six blankets—and a comforter to throw on top when it really gets cold. They will live in an abandoned lumber camp and eat only the food they brought with them. This includes six tons of fresh beef; 2,000 pounds of bacon; 2,700 pounds of onions; 30,000 pounds of tomatoes; 1,000 pounds of prunes; 600 pounds of corn flakes; and 2,400 pounds of coffee.

One of their principal problems consists of those pesky moose. The island is overrun with 'em. They stroll all over it, trampling down young trees, mooring love songs to each other, and scaring the living daylights out of summer vacationists.

There is, fortunately, a big demand by cash customers for the moose. Zoos all over the land want 'em and want 'em badly. They pay \$50 per moose, F. O. B. mooseland. If it doesn't get too cold, the youthful conservationists will build a stockade, with an open gate. They will sprinkle bark and leaves and hay and other mossy delicacies on the ground and when Mr. Moose walks in, they will shut the gate. They've got to be careful and not scare the moose, because a moose with a cracked antler or a skinned leg is more of a liability than an asset. The Michigan State Conservation Commission, incidentally, will get the \$50 per moose captured.

The other problem of the \$30 per month explorers, is the stand of forest on the island, which was ravaged by fire last July. Ground fires burned out the roots of tall trees and brought them crashing to the earth, where they remain hazards threatening future fires. In the summer these broken plants could not be burned out because of starting future fires.

With snow sixteen feet deep or some such this winter, however, the woodsmen can fight fire with fire.

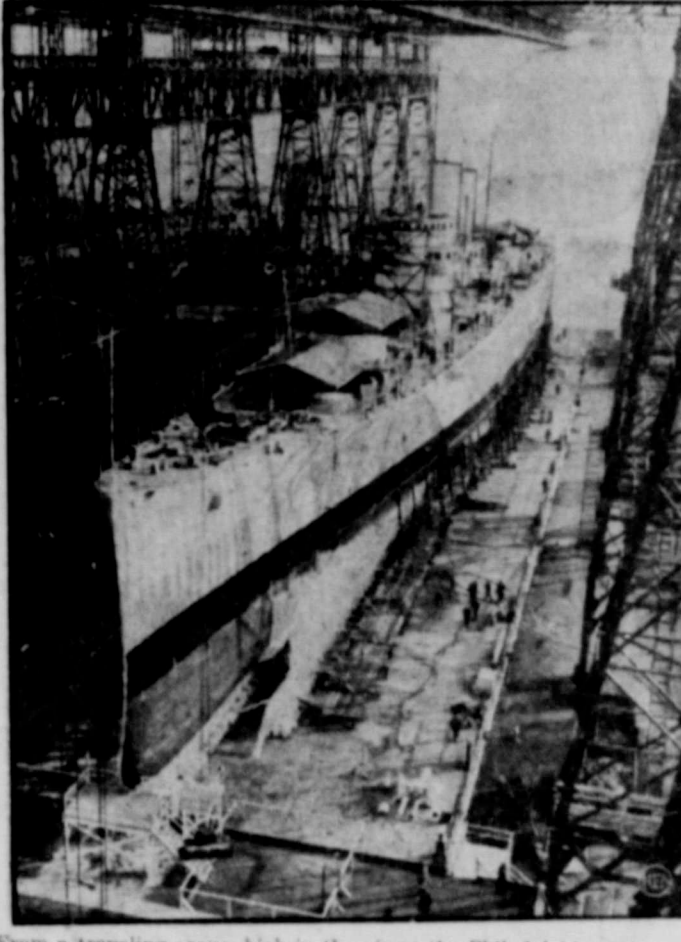

A grandson of the late pioneer, Noah Byars of Eastland, is expected to attend.

SPANISH WAR MAY DEVELOP BIG PROBLEMS

Indications were the international developments may have a greater bearing on the outcome of the Spanish revolution than the struggle for possession of Madrid. The capital has a slight respite from attack when a drizzle held the besiegers in check. Artillery shelling continued throughout the morning, however, bringing new destruction.

Complications surrounding a threat to bombard Barcelona, appeared of extreme importance. The question of how far Great Britain will go to protect shipping was aired in the House of Commons in London.

Anthony Eden read a communication from the insurgent government warning foreign shipping to leave the harbor.

Eden disclosed that the government had asked Sir Henry Clifton, British ambassador to Spain, to arrange with the rebels for safety zones at Barcelona, as at other ports attacked by the nationalists. This was accepted to mean that Britain would recognize the privilege of the rebels to attack the city.

A significant editorial in the Journal of Italy and Rome recognized as Premier Mussolini's mouthpiece, said Italy "and other strong powers" had decided to prevent establishment of a red republic in Spain. The editorial hinted Italy may take steps to prevent Soviet ships carrying supplies to the loyalists from reaching Spanish ports.

It was announced Jose Antonio Primo de Rivera, fascist leader and son of the former dictator of Spain, had been executed by the loyalists.

L. & A. STRIKE IS ENDED BY AN AGREEMENT

BATON ROUGE, La., Nov. 20.—The two-months old strike on the L. & A. Railway ended today when company and union officials signed a conciliation agreement. Eight persons died during the strike while trains were being operated by strike breakers. Gov. Richard Leche, who summoned company officials and officers of the brotherhood into a peace conference a week ago, announced an agreement had been reached on all points. The terms of the settlement will not be announced for several days. The 500 trainmen will return to their jobs then.

Ohio Wage Law Is Upheld by Court

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 20.—Ohio's minimum wage law for women and minors was upheld today as constitutional by a three-judge federal court here. The decision permits the state to continue enforcement of minimum wage regulations, but the victory for the state may be only temporary, since the U. S. Supreme Court last June invalidated a New York law that was practically identical to the Ohio statute.

Murder Case Ended By Man's Suicide

TYLER, Nov. 20.—The State's case against Barney Blackshear, 35, awaiting his fourth trial for the killing of Mrs. Viola Brimberry in an oil field shack in 1932, was closed today by Blackshear's death. Blackshear, sentenced three times to die in the electric chair, killed himself in his jail cell last night by slashing his wrists with a razor.

Large Persimmons Grown at Cheaney

Mrs. J. B. Griffith of the Cheaney community was today displaying two large persimmons that she had picked from a tree at her farm home. The persimmons, although still green, are good for seasoning in fruit cakes and pies, Mrs. Griffith said.

All Illegitimate Children Barred From Stork Derby

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 20.—Justice W. E. Middleton today upheld validity of the baby race clause in the will of the late Charles Vance Miller, which started Toronto's 10-year \$500,000 maternity marathon. The justice ruled the fortune could go only to the mother or mothers of legitimate children. His decision eliminated one of the seven mothers now apparently tied for leadership with nine children each. The justice said he would reserve judgment on the method of which the winner should be chosen.

Green Says United Labor Means End To Dictatorships

TAMPA, Fla., Nov. 20.—President William Green led the American Federation of Labor and representatives of British and Canadian workers today in a violent denunciation of dictatorship and a summons to the world workers to "stand like the rock of Gibraltar" in defense of democracy.

"The church may fall, the chambers of commerce may be impotent and civil leaders may lack power to deal with dictatorship," Green shouted. "But the trade union movement at which dictators strike first, has the strength to prevent dictatorship in any form."

Jury Deadlocked In Murder Trial

WAXAHACHIE, Nov. 20.—Still deadlocked, a jury deliberating evidence in the trial of George Patton had made no report at noon today on testimony involving the murder of four members of the J. W. McGehee family, near Athens.

The present trial involved only the charge that Patton, a Henderson county farmer, slugged to death Mrs. Carrie McGehee.

Hawaii, Alaska Fear a Shortage Of Food Stocks

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—Food shortage in Hawaii and Alaska became a matter of official alarm as the maritime strike added more ships to the growing list. Gov. Joseph Poindexter of Hawaii appealed to the department of interior to relieve a "precarious" food situation.

Gov. John Troy of Alaska also appealed to the department, asking that emergency government ship service be started "the soonest possible" because many communities reported critical food shortages.

Our Everyday Problems Need Help of Science

What is science good for, if its research can't be applied to the ordinary problems of everyday life?

Is it right for scientists to pursue abstract knowledge at the price of neglecting those pressing human needs which might be met if science would give them a little earnest attention?

These questions are almost as old as science itself, and they usually make scientists angry. To hunt truth for its own sake is a lofty calling; it is disturbing to have the multitude demanding that science be harnessed for the solution of sordid material problems.

The point was raised very effectively the other day at the sessions of the American Institute of Physics, in New York. A young industrialist from Boston, John Ely Burchard, who has been working with this new pre-fabricated dwelling idea, bluntly told the physicists that they would do well to spend a little less time on the mysteries of interstellar space and a little more time on such an acute social issue as the housing problem.

He quoted these words by Grosvenor Atterbury:

"We are spending millions to build 200-inch telescopes to scan the universe and determine whether it is getting measurably smaller or incalculably greater. All of which, in the present state of the realm, seems brilliantly useless, especially when you consider the millions who cannot afford decent homes because none of our great minds has ever been focused on the basic, everyday problem of human shelter."

There is a point here which scientists as a class would do well to consider.

The housing problem is one which science can solve. A distressingly large percentage of our people live in dwellings that are below the minimum requirements for comfort and decency. They need new houses very badly; the country needs the industrial boom which construction of those needed houses would provide.

But the houses aren't being built because no one yet has found out how to build them cheaply enough that people who need them can buy or rent them.

As Mr. Burchard points out, if a small amount of such brains as are now concentrated on research into the Einstein theory were applied resolutely to the task of finding out how to build better and cheaper houses, it would not be long before millions of Americans would be infinitely more comfortable and happier.

And the point of it all is that we live in an age in which many of our most pressing problems need just this sort of scientific attention. The era of applied science has opened infinite possibilities.

To cash in on them, we must have a body of scientists who are constantly awake to the social responsibilities of their high calling.

The height of embarrassment would be that of the hitchhiker with a cavity who found himself on one of those Indiana dental office autos.

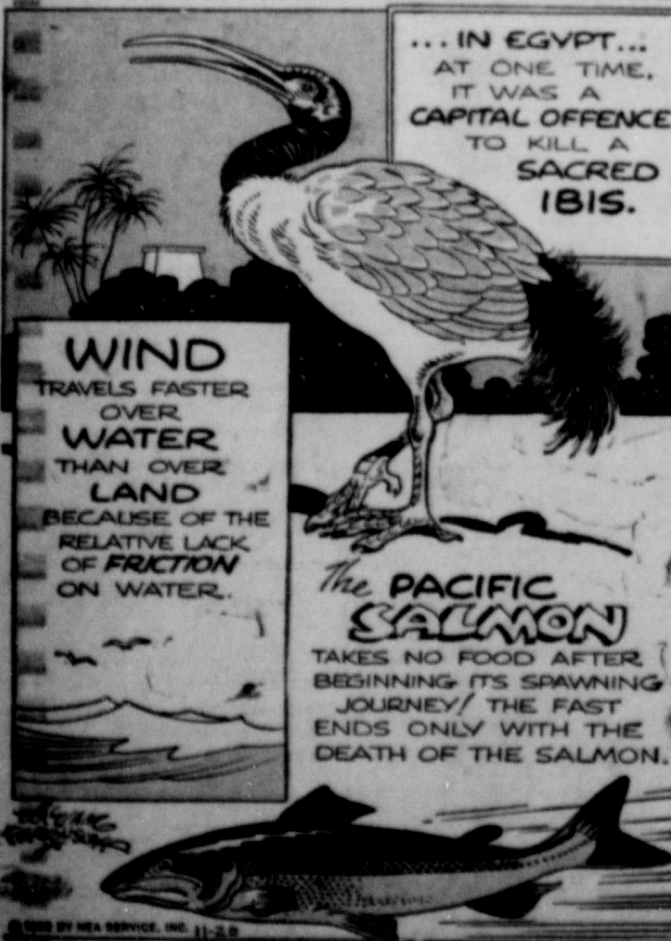

Expert Studies Corporate Tax

By United Press

NEW HAVEN, Conn. — Despite the corporate surplus tax, corporations still can build up reserves, according to Benjamin Graham, Columbia University's lecturer in finance and president of the Graham-Newman Investment Corporation.

Corporations, he says, can capitalize any desired part of their earnings either by paying taxable stock dividends or by other readily available devices. Graham asserts that since the act should work no fundamental change in corporate fiscal policies, he believes the position of bondholders will not be impaired. He also anticipates that the law will have a beneficial effect on stockholder-management relations, since it would curtail numerous advantages frequently gained by insiders through manipulating dividend policies, and since the advantage of retaining earnings rather than selling new stock accrues more to the management than to the stockholders.

According to Graham, the statute's only objectionable features are not in the principle of the tax, but in numerous "unfair details" of application.

One of these unfair details rests in the fact that the act leaves all stockholders as a great tax disadvantage as compared with partners. An ironical aspect of the provision which effects this result is that it was absent in the house bill as originally drawn and was only inserted after business leaders, inveighing against the act, convinced Congress that the desired tax yield could only be realized by retaining, the time-tried corporation tax. Thus, "business" seems to have talked itself into a higher tax bill, Graham says.

Lumber Cured By Below Zero Cold Thought Possible

SILVERTON, Ore.—A revolutionary experiment may cause frozen lumber to be brought directly from iceboxes to the world's consuming market and enable lumbermen to escape their biggest loss which results from the dry kiln process.

W. L. McGinnis, superintendent of a sawmill here, has started tests at sub-zero temperatures to remove moisture from lumber. Case-hardening, which occurs frequently in the accepted dry kiln operation before the moisture is removed from the center of the lumber, can be avoided by freezing instead of drying by heat, he believes.

Moisture content of green lumber runs from 35 to 40 per cent. Common grade lumber is dried until content ranges between 16 and 18 per cent and "clear" lumber is taken down to 6 per cent. McGinnis' experimental icebox has reduced the moisture to 16 per cent in 6 days, but the success of the operation will not be known for several months.

The McGinnis icebox is a small building in which a partition separates the motors from the lumber locker. Moisture is blown by two large fans, one at each end of the locker, to pipes overhead where it is held by the cold. Tests are being made at a wide range of temperatures to find the most efficient operation.

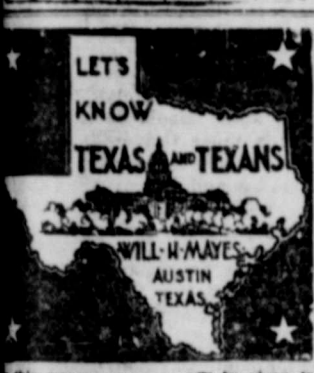

WASHINGTON LETTER

WASHINGTON—No one ever knows how much money has been spent during a presidential campaign. Experts have estimated a normal outlay of \$20,000,000 to \$25,000,000, and all the evidence indicates that the campaign of 1936 was abnormal enough to set an all-time record.

The last pre-election statements of the Republican and Democratic national and congressional committees showed the G. O. P. had spent about \$7,500,000 and the Democrats about \$3,500,000.

NO one knows the total of expenditures by state, county, and city committees. County expenditures are often larger than state committee expenses, because they usually cover the big cost of getting out the vote.

The Democratic national committee originally estimated its budget at \$2,000,000, raised that to \$3,000,000, and was going much stronger than that at the finish.

The Republican committee's budget was \$8,636,000 and almost certainly no less than that was spent.

The American Liberty League, the National Union for Social Justice, and the United Mine Workers each spent more than \$500,000 this year. Labor's Non-Partisan League, with its state organizations, spent an estimated million dollars.

The Good Neighbor League and the Progressive National Committee, both working for Roosevelt, each spent more than \$100,000. So did the Jeffersonian Democrats.

PERSONAL expenditures of congressional and senatorial candidates have been estimated as high as \$2,000,000 and money spent for local and state tickets has been placed between five and ten millions.

IRON Ore Seen Yielding Less

By United Press

PITTSBURGH—Although there need be no alarm over general exhaustion of iron ore reserves, the day probably will come when the steel industry must depend upon a lower grade of ore to keep its mills operating.

That and several other interesting findings are expounded by Marion Worthing, writing in a publication of the Bureau of Business Research of the University of Pittsburgh.

Pittsburgh is conceded to be the center of the steel industry in the United States, but Miss Worthing says that a shift in the locale of iron ore mining might put Pittsburgh at a disadvantage. The article confined itself chiefly with the ore industry of the Lake Superior region due to the fact that a large part of the iron ore used in the United States is produced there.

One of the most interesting of Miss Worthing's discoveries is that there has been a steady decrease in the amount of iron ore consumed per ton of iron an steel produced. In 1913 about one and one-half tons of ore were used for each ton of iron and steel, whereas in 1935 only about nine-tenths of a ton of ore was used for each ton of iron and steel.

This change has come about, Miss Worthing says, because of increases in the proportion of scrap charged in steel furnaces.

GRIDIRON HEROES

First 'Trailer Town' to Be Doomed by Court Ruling



National interest was drawn to this trailer colony in Orchard Lake, Mich., when it became the first in the country to be doomed by court decision. Justice of the Peace Arthur R. Green held that the trailer at the left violated an ordinance prohibiting construction of dwellings with less than 500 cubic feet of space per occupant. The owner, Hildred Gurnsoll, factory worker, is pictured before his trailer, from which he had removed wheels while building an addition. Six other families facing similar suits will be allowed to move without being brought to trial. In Orchard Lake this new mode of living thus was banned completely, since another ordinance levies a prohibitive license fee of \$100 an acre on persons renting property for use as trailer camps.

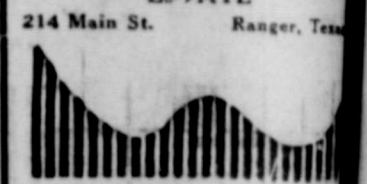
