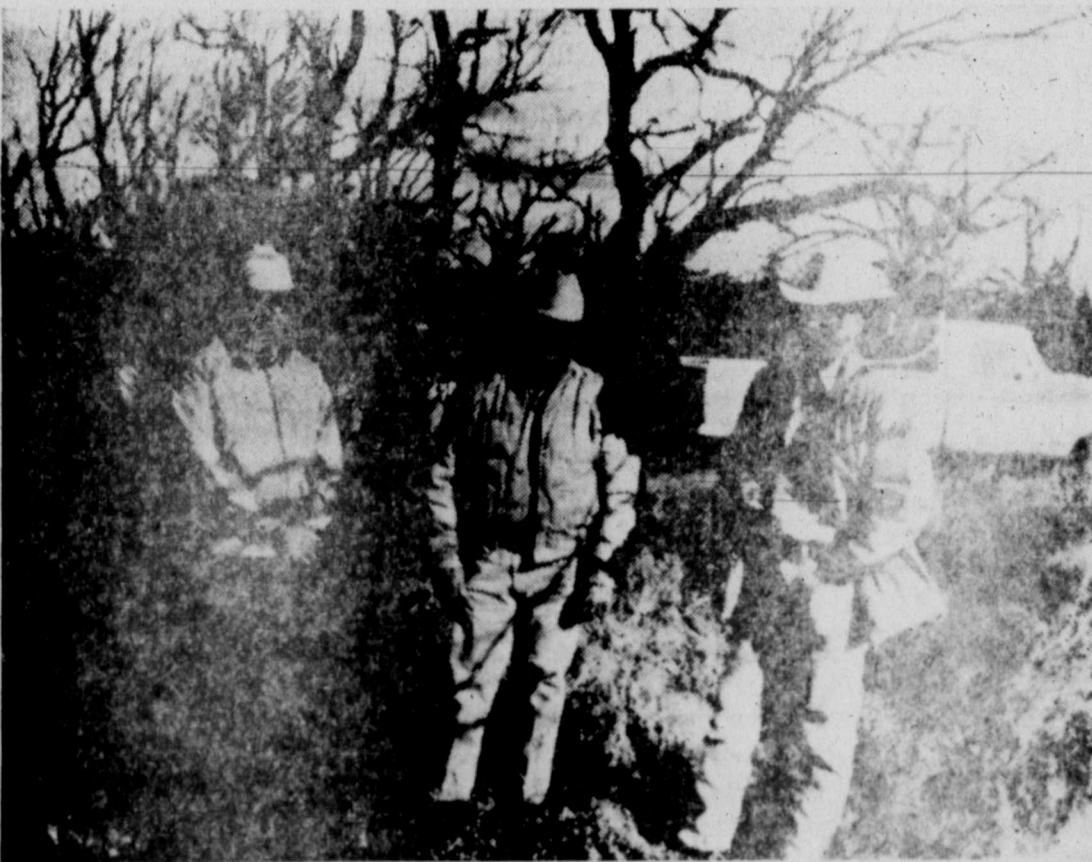

WINTERS WINS 32-26

Rally Fails For C-City

TWICE THEY came from behind to move into the lead. And in the final minutes, they warmed up their passing attack to score ultimately with an 8-yard scoring play in another desperate rally.

But the all-around power of Winters' offense prevailed and the blizzards walked off their home field with a 32 to 26 triumph over Coach Truman Nix's Colorado High Wolves.

IT WAS the kind of a game spectators don't forget, neither do the players. For it was tough, bruising with tremendous offensive excitement as both teams moved by ground and air for a combined total of almost 600 yards.

Winters, with the victory making them three wins and only 1 loss in District 5-AA competition, kept its title hopes warming — just one notch behind undefeated Stamford.

For the Wolves, the verdict changed their 5-AA mark to one victory, 1 tie and two losses. In other words, it ruined whatever outside chance they might have nursed for championship contention.

NOBODY expected the high-scoring thriller when the two teams took to the field. For in the best game measuring stick, Colorado City had played district-leader Stamford to a 6-6 tie and Winters, just the week before, had dropped a 60 decision to the Bulldogs. So you looked for one of

those low scoring, grueling contests. But the fireworks burst quickly and the game continued right on to the final whistle.

It was Winters' ability to move on the ground — often through the middle — that turned the winning trick for the blizzards.

AL DUNN, the 175-pound Winters quarterback, sent the blizzards into the lead first time they got the ball in opening quarter. He rammed five yards on a sweep — his damaging specialty — to end the game — to end a 61-yard drive and send his team into a 6 to 0 lead. A few minutes later — the second time Winters had the ball — Dunn scored again at the end of a 36-yard drive to stretch the lead, 12-0.

The Wolves came bounding back, effectively so. Their defense toughened up and forced Winters to punt. With their offense sputtering, the Wolves quickly moved into scoring position. Big damage came on a 42-yard pass play with quarterback Glenn Nix connecting with End Riley Tilley.

THAT PUT the Wolves on the 1-yard line from where Nix sneaked over for a touchdown. A try to two-points failed and the Wolves trailed, 6 to 12.

Again, Colorado City stifled Winters' offense, forcing the blizzards to boot a poor punt to the 26. Five plays were all Colorado City had left.

1 OF 4 SENTENCED HERE

Forger Heading For 8th Trip To Prison

William Clark Connel is headed back to a familiar trip.

He received a seven-year prison sentence here Friday in 32nd District Court for forgery.

And his trip to Huntsville will be his sixth to the Texas penitentiary. Twice more he was an inmate in California correctional institution — making a total of eight prison sentences.

Connel, who began his losing partnership in crime back in 1944, pleaded guilty

to forging a \$44.88 check here last Aug. 25 to Billy J. Wood.

The same offense had sent him to Huntsville prison in 1952 for two years, 1954 for three years, 1956 for three years, 1959 for seven years. In addition, he was sent to Huntsville in 1963 for theft by false pretense and twice in California — 90 days in 1953 and for a year in 1957.

All total, there are 29 entries on the FBI record sheet of Connel dating back to an arrest in 1941 on suspicion of burglary in Dickens County. His long list of arrests stretch across Texas, up into Nevada and to numerous points in California.

Connel was one of four defendants prosecuted by District Attorney Weldon Kirk in felony trials Friday before 32nd District Court Judge Austin McClelland.

Albert Warner Jr., 40, of Fort Worth, received a five-year prison sentence after admitting to theft over \$30 at Village Food Store last Oct. 1 with a bad check.

That same day in October Warner, who is wanted on a forgery charge in Fort Worth and for violation of probation in Bryan, passed smaller checks at Landau's, Max German's and E-Z Way Superette.

Two defendants received probation with their first felony convictions.

Gundalpe Corona of Culbertson community had a 4-month jail sentence probation after pleading guilty to second offense DWI. His subsequent offense was last Oct. 15 after previously being convicted Aug. 30, 1964.

John Emerson of Colorado City, who admitted theft of over \$30 in two batteries and tools from Lynn Hamilton at Lorraine, last S.p. 12, had his three-year sentence probation.

Bids Asked On Trucks, Bridge Job

Commissioners Court will take sealed bids Nov. 22 for major repairs to a Colorado River bridge and for purchase of three new trucks.

The bridge project will be for new floor and steel runners and other repairs.

It is scheduled for the river bridge south of Colorado City in Lower Community near the C. E. Welch farm.

Repairs are expected to cost approximately \$12,000 because the bridge is 408 feet in length and is 12 feet wide.

Money for the project will come from the County's Road and Bridge Fund.

Decision to advertise for bridge bids came at the Thursday meeting of Commissioners Court.

At the same time the commissioners voted to advertise for bids to be opened the same day, Nov. 22, for two new dump trucks for Precinct 4 and for one new truck for Precinct 4.

A 1946 International truck will be offered as trade-in in the deal for the Precinct 4 vehicle.

Rural Leaders For Campaign

Mitchell County's Red Cross fund campaign moved into the rural communities this week.

More than 20 volunteer leaders will carry the drive into every area of the county outside Colorado City.

Goal for the entire campaign, which will continue Nov. 25, will be \$6,600.

She Hammet county campaign chairman, reported good response in the drive which began officially Saturday with volunteers making their first calls in Colorado City, Lorraine and Westbrook.

"Not only have citizens exhibited a fine attitude in volunteering for assignments in the campaign," Hammet said, "but the actual contributions in this very early stage indicate a successful effort for Mitchell County."

The Red Cross drive is the first individual fund-raising project by a welfare agency

since Mitchell County United Fund decided to cancel its annual campaign this fall.

Lorraine Rites for Hal Bennett, 79

Robert Hal Bennett, 79, resident of Lorraine for 53 years, died at 8:05 a.m. Thursday in Lorraine's Johnson Hospital after a long illness.

Funeral was conducted Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock in First Baptist Church at Lorraine with the pastor Rev. Jack McKee officiating. Burial was in Lorraine cemetery under direction of Kiker & Son Funeral Home.

Mr. Bennett, born Dec. 27, 1887, in McClelland County, was married here in Colorado City to Miss Stella Welch Sept. 7, 1919.

He was a veteran of World War I, had served on the Lorraine school board and was trustee-at-large for No. 10 County schools for a 13-year period.

He was a retired farmer, member of First Baptist Church and had served as deacon and Sunday School superintendent for 22 years. Bennett was a member of the board of directors of Federal Land Bank Association in Colorado City and had served also on board of supervisors of Mitchell County Soil Conservation District.

Surviving are his wife of Lorraine; a daughter, Mrs. Joe Reeder of Irving; one son, Robert Charles of Midland; a brother Earl J. Bennett of Tucuman, Okla.; half-brother, R. L. Bennett of Parsons, Kan.; two half-sisters, Mrs. J. E. Lundberg of Longview and Mrs. Ray Palone of Hammond, Ind. and four granddaughters.

MITCHELL County citizens go to the ballot box today to cast their votes in General Election and express their opinion on 16 amendments.

Local political observers here predict less than 2,000 voters will show up at the county's 10 polling places. Some say the turnout may be closer to 1,500.

Top interest, of course, centers on the U. S. Senate race in which Attorney General Ramsey Clark, Democratic Party nominee, challenges Senator John Tower, Republican.

Eleven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution will appear on the ballot, too, and these are likely to draw as many voters to the polls as the few contested races.

INDICATIVE of the slack interest in voting is the fact that only eight persons went to the Courthouse to cast absentee ballots during the period for absentee voting. And only 20 persons requested absentee ballots in the mail.

If the county has a turnout of about 1,500 voters, then Mitchell will be voting less than half its total potential.

On the ballot — which elects officials from local precinct offices to governor and U. S. senator — the Republican Party is contesting in only eight races. That's one less than the Constitution Party, which has candidates on the ballot for nine offices.

Students See . . . Too Many Feet

Stop On A Dime ?

High school students took eye-witness observing positions here Thursday to learn the distance to stop an auto at speeds ranging from 20 to 40 miles per hour.

The tests — with drivers from among their classmates, teachers and local police — were on dry, clean street pavement at the school under ideal conditions.

And they quickly saw that the distance required for stopping more than triples as the speed of the car increases.

Drivers were at the controls of a car specially equipped with electronic detector on front bumper which fired yellow paint bullets to indicate distance required to stop in an emergency.

Signal to stop for each driver came with firing of

first shot, which marked the pavement. Second bullet fired automatically when brakes were applied, and third fired when the vehicle stopped.

Then, a quick measurement between yellow pavement markings revealed the exact distances required to react to the signal and to braking.

David Stubblefield, student, driving at 20 miles per hour required 11 feet 9 inches to react to the braking signal and 15 feet 9 inches more to stop. So, his total distance for stopping at 20 miles per hour was 27 feet 8 inches.

Coach Doug Chitsey, driving 30 miles per hour, used 22 feet 2 inches to react and 39.5 feet 3 inches more for

braking — a total of 61.7 feet.

State Highway Patrolman Buddy Hertenberger, driving 40 miles per hour, reacted in 19 feet but needed 68 feet 11 inches more for braking. Total distance was 87 feet 11 inches — three times more than Stubblefield used at 20 miles per hour.

The demonstration was conducted at 2:15 p.m. by Don Bullard, assistant safety director, Texas Farm Bureau, at Colorado High. And the same eye-witness tests were conducted in the morning for Lorraine High students.

Before the driving tests, Bullard presented a film on the tragic toll of auto accidents and discussed the desperate need for safe driving.

Sen. Spears Urges Defeat

Senior Citizens Are Target Of Amendment 7

State Senator Franklin Spears of San Antonio has called on Texas voters to defeat Constitutional Amendment 7 at the polls Nov. 8.

The amendment, if passed, is supposed to repeal the poll tax, but actually it creates a confusing and misleading voter registration system.

Spears said he favors defeat of Proposition Seven because: "1. It is no longer necessary to repeal the Texas poll tax. The courts have already done so.

"2. Proposition Seven is misleading because its language does not reflect what passage would actually mean."

Spears said passage of the amendment would mean:

"1. That all voters must register—even those over 65 [who] do not now have to register.

"2. That all voters must register each year—thus not allowing the Legislature the chance to decide whether registration should be annual, biennial or permanent."

"If Proposition 7 passes," said Spears, "Texas would be the only state in the nation with annual registration. Annual registration is bad because it has no protection against voting fraud. Re-registration by voting is far more preferable." Re-registration by voting is sometimes called permanent registration.

Under such a system, said Spears, "voter lists are available the year 'round and can thus be purged of those not qualified." "Also, he pointed out, no dead persons would be listed, nor can convicts or other ineligible voters—because these names are automatically furnished to the voter registrar who removes them."

Persons who move from one county to another under permanent registration must re-register and are automatically removed in the county of their former residence.

"Finally," said Spears, "the cost of re-registration by voting is only one-tenth as costly as would be the system set up by Proposition Seven—25 cents per voter as opposed to 2.5 cents.

"The strongest democracies in the history of man are those where citizen participation is greatest," said Spears. He added: "Proposition 7 would drastically limit participation by people in their government."

Texas is already low in citizenship participation—in the last two Presidential elections we ranked in the bottom seven of the 50 states in the percentage of eligible voters who actually voted.

"Under Proposition 7 the Legislature is given no chance to provide for greater participation."

provision of the constitution to provide for the creation of hospital districts.

Amendment No. 12, providing for the dissolution of hospital districts.

The law now provides for the creation of hospital districts but does not provide for dissolution. This amendment authorizes the legislature to provide for the dissolution of such districts.

Amendment No. 13, providing for the consolidation of the functions of government in a county having 125,000 or more inhabitants and providing for intergovernmental contracts between political subdivisions of the county.

This amendment, now applicable only to Harris County, since it is the only one with this many inhabitants, would permit counties, cities and other subdivisions to consolidate such functions as police protection and water supply.

Amendment No. 14: Allowing members of the armed forces to vote in Texas.

Many members of the armed forces may not now vote in Texas. The amendment would make it possible for them to vote when they have been in the state long enough to satisfy residence requirements.

Amendment No. 15: Authorizing state acceptance of money from private or federal sources for assistance of physically or mentally handicapped persons.

This amendment is an attempt to remove an apparent conflict between the Texas Constitution and the Federal Vocational Rehabilitation Act. It provides that private and federal funds for rehabilitation centers be channeled through "State agencies and be subject to state auditing control."
