

REDS RULE IN REIGN OF TERROR

Census Books Of Lubbock Are To Shut On Monday

'ZERO HOUR' HERE FOR LUBBOCK AS APPEALS ARE BROADCAST FOR BETTER CO-OPERATION

The 'zero hour' in taking of the Lubbock census was reached today with the announcement from Dr. I. E. Barr, supervisor, that books of his office will be closed at noon on Monday. "All citizens not enumerated by that time simply will not be enumerated," the census chief said, in broadcasting an appeal for co-operation on the part of the citizenship.

Doctor Barr, who has charge of census taking in Lubbock and adjoining counties, said his force was working as hard as humanly possible to reach everyone by the time his books are closed but that doing a 100 percent job is impossible without the aid of the public.

Duty Is Stressed
"It is everybody's duty," he pointed out, "not only to see that they are enumerated but also to help us get others, who are thoughtful or careless in the matter. Thus far, our co-operation has been fine but we can stand a lot more."

Officials of the chamber of commerce and Board of City Development have been helping to check sections of the city covered by enumerators and cards have been passed out through the schools in a further effort to "count every nose in the city." It is probable, however, that everyone will not be reached unless additional activity is forthcoming.

Fear Is Expressed
Census figures already announced for a number of West Texas and South Plains cities have been far from flattering and Lubbock business men are fearful lest so many be missed here that the city's expected population of between 19,000 and 21,000 will not be approached. Information for those wishing to aid in the final drive will be furnished through the chamber of commerce, phone 2083, or through Doctor Barr's office, phone 184.

STAYTON SAYS PLAN TALKED

PRO LAW OPPOSITION HEAD SAYS LAW FACES TEST

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 1.—William H. Stayton, chairman of the board of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, testified today before the Senate Judiciary committee that four members of the Hoover Law Enforcement commission had told him they were "trying to work out some other plan for distribution of liquor than under the present law."

Doubts Enforcement
The witness gave this testimony after Chairman Cawaway questioned him about a letter he wrote last February to Charles E. Wood of Philadelphia, which expressed the opinion that President Hoover "is beginning to doubt whether prohibition can be enforced."

Stayton said he drew this "inference" after appearing before the law enforcement commission at its request and after talking with senators and representatives.

Continuing his testimony, Stayton said six members of President Hoover's cabinet thought prohibition a failure. He named them as Secretaries Lamont, Davis, Brown, Mellon, Adams and Stimson.

EVEN LAW AIDS SOL FOR GAME

DALLAS, May 1. (AP)—Even the law came to the assistance of Sol Dreyfus, new owner of the Dallas Stars, in his effort to fill the ball park for the Beaumont-Dallas baseball game today. Remembering Dreyfus' announcement that every one would be admitted free to the game—the first free-for-all baseball game in Texas League history—Judge Gavin Muse of corporation court told those arraigned before him, "go to the baseball game, or pay a fine."

Thirty persons took advantage of the offer and were told taxicabs would take them to the park. A taxicab company volunteered to provide transportation. A private box was reserved for Judge Muse, his staff and reporters. Defendants were given seats in the grandstand and the ego section.

BORAH'S WORK EXPECTED TO AID PASSAGE

CHAIRMAN OF GROUP OF RELATIONS FOR LONDON PARITY

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 1.—Renewed assurances of Senator Borah's sympathetic attitude toward the London naval treaty today bolstered the expectation of the administration that consideration of the pact by the senate would be expedited and ratification ensue.

As chairman of the powerful foreign relations committee, Borah holds a position of great strategic importance in the senate contest over ratification. His approval of the pact, which is still of a confidential nature, is regarded by those close to the president as a notable preliminary victory.

"I seek to have it considered and passed upon by the committee as speedily as the importance of the matter will permit," Senator Borah said. "It is an important treaty and should have careful and deliberate consideration, but I do not assume that there will be any attempt at delay. My own position is one of a friendly attitude, but I want to hear all about it."

YOUTHFUL FLIER LANDS AT EL PASO

EL PASO, May 1. (AP)—Frank Goldsborough, 19-year-old transcontinental flier, arrived in El Paso this morning at 6:30 a. m. M. S. T.

The flier was forced down by darkness last night in the desert between Midland and El Paso about 100 miles east of here, he said. He spent the night in his ship and took off at daylight for El Paso.

FATAL ENDING FEARED TO 'LITTLE JUAREZ' FIGHT WEDNESDAY

While the condition of Margarita Garcia, 25-year-old resident of the Lubbock Mexican colony, is reported as showing slight improvement, Adelenia Garcia, 22, is being held in the city jail awaiting developments as to the condition of the former, following a cutting affray last night in "Little Juarez."

The two women are not related, Adelenia told officers.

Margarita was rushed to the West Texas hospital in a serious condition, after she had sustained deep cuts in the abdomen, lungs and back. The altercation occurred at 7 o'clock last evening.

Physicians held only slight hope that the victim would live through last night, but today they announced that there is a meager chance for recovery.

No charges have been filed against Adelenia, who related to officers that she attacked Margarita after the latter had approached her with a knife. Argument is said to have developed over question as to ownership of a ring which Margarita was wearing.

Roy McMurtry, Silverton, sold 400 heifer yearlings to Kansas parties.

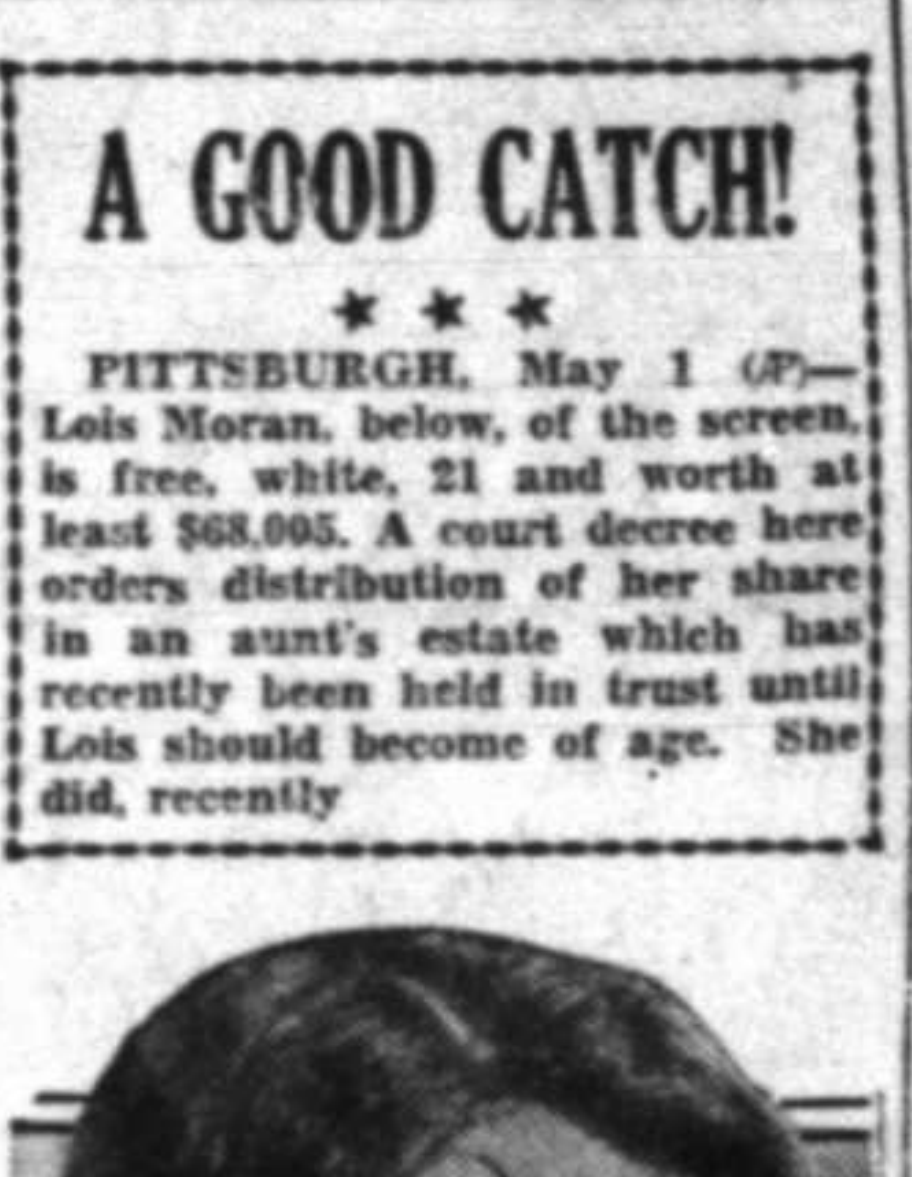

LAWYERS AND TAX STATUTES HIT

U. S. C-C LISTENS AS BANKER, RAILWAY CHIEF SPEAK

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, May 1.—A bank president and the head of a railroad today described the nation's tax situation before the Chamber of Commerce of the United States as a "combination of many muds" and recommended a "legislative holiday" and "eased economy" as the solution.

Meanwhile, a committee struggled in executive session with a resolution that would chart the course of business and the chamber in regard to the Federal Farm board. A discussion of the subject yesterday precipitated a fiery debate.

Indiana Man Talks
Felix M. McWhirter, Indianapolis banker, addressing the chamber today, said taxes levied by the United States and its branches were "iniquitous, too high, too numerous and too complicated."

Fred W. Sargent, president of the Chicago and Northwestern railway, urged abandonment of the practice that he said each year saw "48 states and the federal government making new regulations, creating new crimes by statute, and adding more burdens on the back of the already oppressed American taxpayer."

FOREIGNERS FLEE AS COMMUNISTS SLAY, BURN AND STEAL

(By Associated Press)
SHANGHAI, May 1.—A reign of terror in Lungchow, southwestern Kwangsi province, was reported in dispatches from that area today.

Communists were said to have gone on a rampage of burning, looting and massacring and all foreigners were reported to have evacuated.

Much missionary property, including buildings of the Seventh Day Adventists mission and the Christian Alliance, was said to have been destroyed.

MINOR CLASHES ARE SEEN OVER WORLD
Early May Day demonstrations, traditionally the occasions for radical organizations to let off steam, were held peacefully in most places throughout the world. Minor clashes occurred here and there.

In Paris, police quickly suppressed three demonstrations, one in the city and two in the suburbs, and arrested 223 persons on various charges. About 30,000 workers in the main industries were on strike, and no taxicabs were operating.

The day dawned in Berlin with no signs of impending disorder. Activities were confined principally to orderly parades and speeches.

TECH TO HAVE PHYSICS SHOW

SCIENTIFIC OFFERING IS TO FEATURE STUNTS 'IMPOSSIBLE'

An iron rod will be heated white hot by immersion in water during the physics show to be held at Texas Technological college next Friday and Saturday, directors of the program announced today.

Other items on the program, which at first appear dubious to the layman's mind, are: lighting fires with the naked hand; an axe jump talk; boiling water by pouring cold water over container; moving picture of human voice; and beautiful display tubes illustrating northern lights.

Horns Are Set
The show will be staged by the department of physics during the following hours: Friday, 7:30 to 8:30 p. m. and 9 to 10 p. m. Saturday, 3 to 4 p. m. and 7:30 to 8:30 p. m. On account of the smallness of the lecture room admission will have to be by ticket only. Tickets will be issued free to the capacity of the room.

This show is being put on largely at the request of high school physics teachers in other towns of the South Plains.

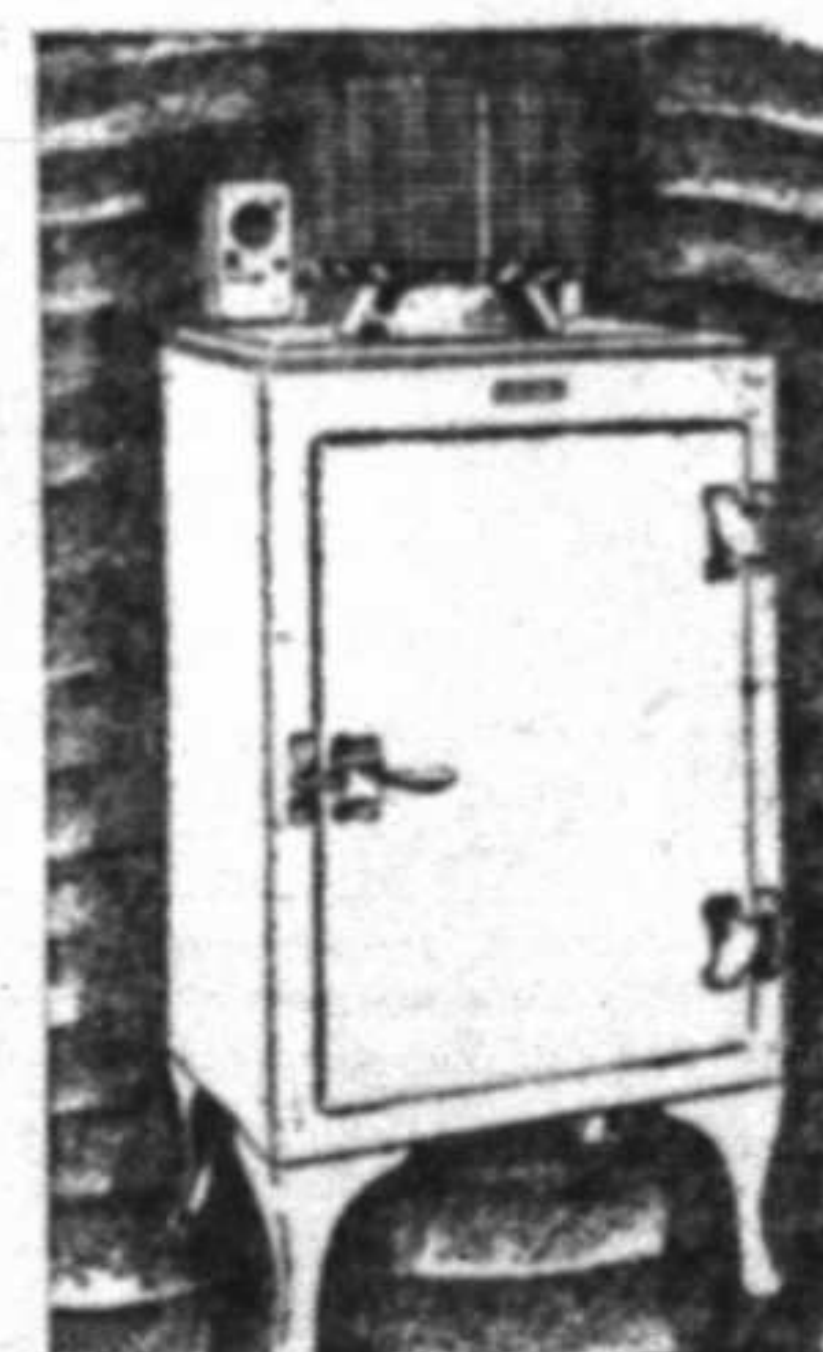

DALLAS CLUB THROWS BIG FREE PARTY TODAY

BILL CISELL LEADS CLUB'S GOOD PLAYING

TEAM IN 1ST DIVISION BUT RANKED BELOW; SENATORS LOSE

Among the numerous surprises that have cropped up in the early weeks of the major league campaign must be listed the showing of the Chicago White Sox. Chicago, like Washington, was listed as a probable second division club, and has been right up among the leaders.

The White Sox were shoved down into third place yesterday as the Detroit Tigers gathered in four runs in the first inning for a 6 to 4 victory, but they still are among the first ranking teams. With four regulars batting in the 300 class and a flock of pitchers working on good form, the White Sox have earned the present rating of 500.

Cissell is leader

Bill Cissell, current co-leader of the American league batters, has been the spark plug of the team this season after a few years of rather disappointing performances. He connected with Leon Hogsett, Detroit's big Indian hurler of sinker balls, for three of Chicago's 13 hits yesterday, but the rest of the Sox were not able to keep pace with him.

Washington, still the leader of the American league, was another high ranking club to meet defeat yesterday. The Senators, after eight consecutive victories, bowed to the pitching of George Piggas of the New York Yankees and were shut out, 9 to 0. Piggas, who has pitched in two of the three Yankee victories, gave but five hits while Brown and Burke allowed 12, and the Senators contributed four costly errors.

Another Brown Wins

Another Brown, Clint of Cleveland, took the leading role as the Indians beat the St. Louis Browns for the third time in succession, 4 to 3. The rookie hurler from New Orleans gave St. Louis but three hits for his third victory of the season.

The Village

The present census apparently is
going to show us a few things about
the mysterious new course our nation
is taking.

Nothing that the enumerators
have turned up so far has been as
interesting as their disclosure that
the small town of the middle west
seems to be heading for oblivion.

Nearly 60 per cent of the small
towns counted in Illinois and Indiana
showed a marked decline in
population during the last 10 years.
Some have been abandoned altogether,
and even those that have increased
in size are increasing less
rapidly than the normal birth
increase. In adjacent states the same
tendency is noticed.

The small town, evidently, is going
the way of the one-horse shay.
For generations it was perhaps the
most purely American thing on the
continent. Now it is going.
The census of 1940, undoubtedly will
show its decline carried still further.

A good many things are to blame.
The automobile and the hard-
faced highway probably head the
list. They have freed the farmer of
his dependence on the crossroads
store, the village doctor, the di-
minutive country bank and the
small town professional man. Moving
radio and daily newspapers prob-
ably have played a part too. The
rural hamlet, in other words, has
outlived much of its usefulness.
People no longer need it as they
once did.

This change indicates a shift in
a basic part of American life. These
rural villages would not be dwindling
unless some very profound
change were coming over us. Our
population seems to be getting con-
centrated; yet, at the same time, it
is altogether impossible just now to
tell what the final result will be.
Will we all, eventually, be grouped
into big cities? Or will the cities, in
their turn, begin to split up as im-
provement in transportation con-
tinues, so that suburban villages will
be scattered over a 100-mile radius?
Either thing can happen; it will
be years before we can see which it
is to be.

Meanwhile, let's not shed too
many tears over the passing of the
small town—if, as the figures seem
to indicate, it really is passing. Life
in the small town was never quite
as idyllic as we often suppose. The
small town had a way of breeding
provincialism and narrowness. It
had no sin, but it cramped many
a life quite as effectively as a
crowded city tenement district. We
may not be losing quite as much as
we think we are.

At any rate, for better or for
worse, we are changing. Modern
life is setting us on a new high-
way, and no one is wise enough to
say where it will lead. We are in the
midst of a tremendous re-arrange-
ment. The census figures can only
give us a glimpse at a few of its
major tendencies.

Justice

Trene Shrader, Pennsylvania's

ster that is important now.
With his mother sentenced to the
electric chair, the boy is starting
life under a considerable handicap.
The courts have seen to it that he
is placed in a good, wholesome
home, where there is another lad of
about his own age who can be his
playmate. Let's all hope that little
Donnie is allowed to forget the
whole dreadful business as fast as
he can. The shadow of this tragedy
must not be allowed to spoil his
life.

Four Proposals For Unemployment Relief Will Be Given.
Congress' Attention Soon, Correspondent Dutcher Says

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is
the second of two stories in
which Rodney Dutcher, Wash-
ington correspondent for this
newspaper and NEA Service,
discusses the unemployment
situation.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Four
main proposals are heard as those
most interested seek for methods
to meet periodical severe unem-
ployment. None of them is new
but all have received increased
attention as a result of the em-
ployment slump of the past few
months. They are:

1. Expansion of the
public works program in the
Department of Labor so that a
continual, accurate check may be
kept on the amount of unemploy-
ment.

2. The timing of public construction
work in accordance with the
employment situation.

3. A national system of state aid
employment offices co-ordinated
and partly supported by the federal
government.

4. Extension of the five-day work-
ing week and the six-hour day.

The first three proposals were
voiced in bills introduced in the
Senate by Senator Robert F. Wagne-
r of New York. The first two
were given preferred position on
the Senate calendar. Consideration
of the third was blocked by Sena-
tor Bingham of Connecticut, who
has close relations with manufac-
turers. This measure also had
strenuous opposition from the Na-
tional Association of Manufactur-
ers.

The five-day week and six-hour
day are urged with increasing ve-
hement by leaders of organized
labor faced with increasing techno-
logical unemployment, recurrent
industrial depressions and the prac-
tice of laying off workers at low
limits.

Many workers already have the
normal five-day week. The National
Industrial Conference Board
recently located 270 manufacturing
establishments which had adopted
it, including Henry Ford's plants.

Many building trades workers have
a regular five-day week and the
practice is increasing, though slowly.
The Conference Board—an em-
ployers' organization—reported that
its evidence "removes the five-day
week from the status of a radical
or impracticable administrative ex-
periment and places it among the
plans which have demonstrated
both practicability and usefulness
under certain given circumstances."

The six-hour day is finding more
and more favor among labor
leaders. Secretary Frank Morrison
of the American Federation of
Labor says that if the world's work
can be done in 30 or 35 hours a
week then industry must come to
the 30-hour or the 35-hour week in
order to avoid "catastrophic unem-
ployment." President A. F.
Whitney of the International
Brotherhood of Teamsters says we
must have the six-hour day or get
ready to continual doles and bread
lines.

When I have time between the
sweeping and the dish washing, and
whenever I can I bake some bread,
cakes and do a little canning. Then

evening before the children have to
be put to bed and after that I
plan my menus for the next day.

MAY FIRST HEALTH DAY
FOR CHILD

May Days
(The following article I wrote last
year. I am repeating it by request.)

It is May Day.
We are the children of long
ago, of prehistoric and primitive
times.

Food is scarce, and the struggle
for existence is

sacrificed, aban-
doned, drowning
and abandoned
to the elements,

If we happen

Ages. He points out that more
than 50 industries now operate
on the six-hour day.

The Wagner bill to set up a na-
tional system of employment offices
would provide an initial appropriation
of \$4,000,000. The supervising
bureau here would co-ordinate the
work of the offices by furnishing
and publishing information as to
opportunities for employment in
various sections, maintaining a
system for clearing labor between
the several states and "aiding in
the transportation of workers to
such places as may be necessary."

The federal government and the
states would contribute equal
amounts for maintaining the office,
except in states refusing to co-
operate, where the bureau would
be authorized to operate its own
agencies.

Wagner's public works bill is de-
signed to advance the planning
and regulated construction of pub-
lic works, stabilize industry and re-
duce unemployment during slump
periods. It would create a federal
employment stabilization board
which would follow business trends
and watch out for prospective un-
employment, reporting to the pres-
ident so that he might at strategic
times recommend to Congress
emergency action on public works.
Congress would adopt as a definite
policy the construction of public
works in a manner designed to aid
stabilization of industry and em-
ployment through proper timing.

The other Wagner bill would di-
rect the Bureau of Labor Statistics
to obtain complete figures on em-
ployment and determine the extent
of part-time employment. It would
give the bureau enough money to
do this work, which it has never
had before.

Congressmen Mead of New York,
Cable of Ohio and McLeod of Michi-
gan have introduced unemployment
bills in the House, but although
leaders of that body were complain-
ing that they had nothing to do be-
cause of the Senate tariff delay
none were given any hearing before
committees. They were referred to
the Judiciary Committee, which
gave wet and dry works for pro-
hibition hearings—perhaps on the
theory that there were more mil-
lions who wanted a drink than were
out of work who wanted a job.

It is May Day.
We are the children of the present.
We have oceans of fun! It is our
festival day. We have plays, May
poesies and pageants.

It is May Day.
We are the children of the pres-
ent.
We have come into our own.
It is understood now that if we are
sound physically, mentally and
spiritually, we are as rocks upon
which the nation and the race are
to be built, and if neglected we are
as shifting sands.

We have sympathetic under-
standing. Laws are being passed to
prevent our having to labor at all.
It is known that to know, love
and serve us is the most satisfying
and soul-filling of all human activities.



NEW YORK, May 1.—You're not
even sure of "free air" in New York
any more.

In fact, the value of air seems
rapidly to be going up. To be sure,
you can have plenty of the carbon
monoxide mixture encountered on
the highways. But they're beginning
to pay good coin of the realm for
the air encountered up in the sky-
scrapers. The latest quotation to
reach me shows the value to be 89
cents per cubic foot.

If this seems slightly incredible,
please remember that the gentle-
men who build the steel giants to-
day are showing more than a little
concern over the matter of light
and air. If their buildings are to
be shut off by some adjoining cloud
reacher, as many a building is, then
what price sunshine and ozone?

Wherefore, the more thoughtful
owners are now buying nearby space
in an effort to protect their \$10 bit
of air against invasion.

Thus, according to a few statisti-
cians I have just received from one
Julius Nelson, he had to buy 2,800-
000 cubic feet of air for his new
45-story "Nelson tower," which hap-
pens to be the tallest building in
the cloak-and-suit mid-town sec-
tion. This set him back something
like two and a half millions of dol-
lars.

It seems that he has set aside
5,000 square feet of a 20,000-foot
property "to insure a future circula-
tion of light and air." And since
the building rises some 560 feet into
the atmosphere—well, figure it out
for yourself.

This is, however, nothing un-
usual in this day and age, since
future builders will be giving cool
consideration to such problems. As
many have in the past. And the
cost of air will probably continue
to rise as the skyline grows.

Tom Hoey, New York's one and
only farmer, is preparing his sheep
for the "spring shearing."

This, if you please, is the most
incongruous event in the entire
program of the Manhattan year.

Incredible though it may seem,
there is a good old-fashioned barn-
yard sheep-shearing once a year,

the children are disposed of and
the lambs are retained. After the
shearing the city holds a "wool"
sale, which invariably attracts a
curious crowd.

The shearing itself draws crowds
of pop-eyed natives who haven't
the slightest idea whether this is
done with a lawnmower or a pair
of manure scissors. Crowds of
youngsters, who never saw a farm
are taken out to gaze upon this
spectacle, just as country lads are
brought forth to scan some new-
fangled dangle brought from the
big town.

By heck, we go rural in this town
every now and then!

Which reminds me that one of the
piglets in Mrs. Murphy's farm—
also in Central Park—hasn't been
doing so well, much to the concern
of the Fifth Avenue Fauntleroy,
whose nurse maids let them gaze at
pigs, cows, geese and such through
the iron bars of a cage.

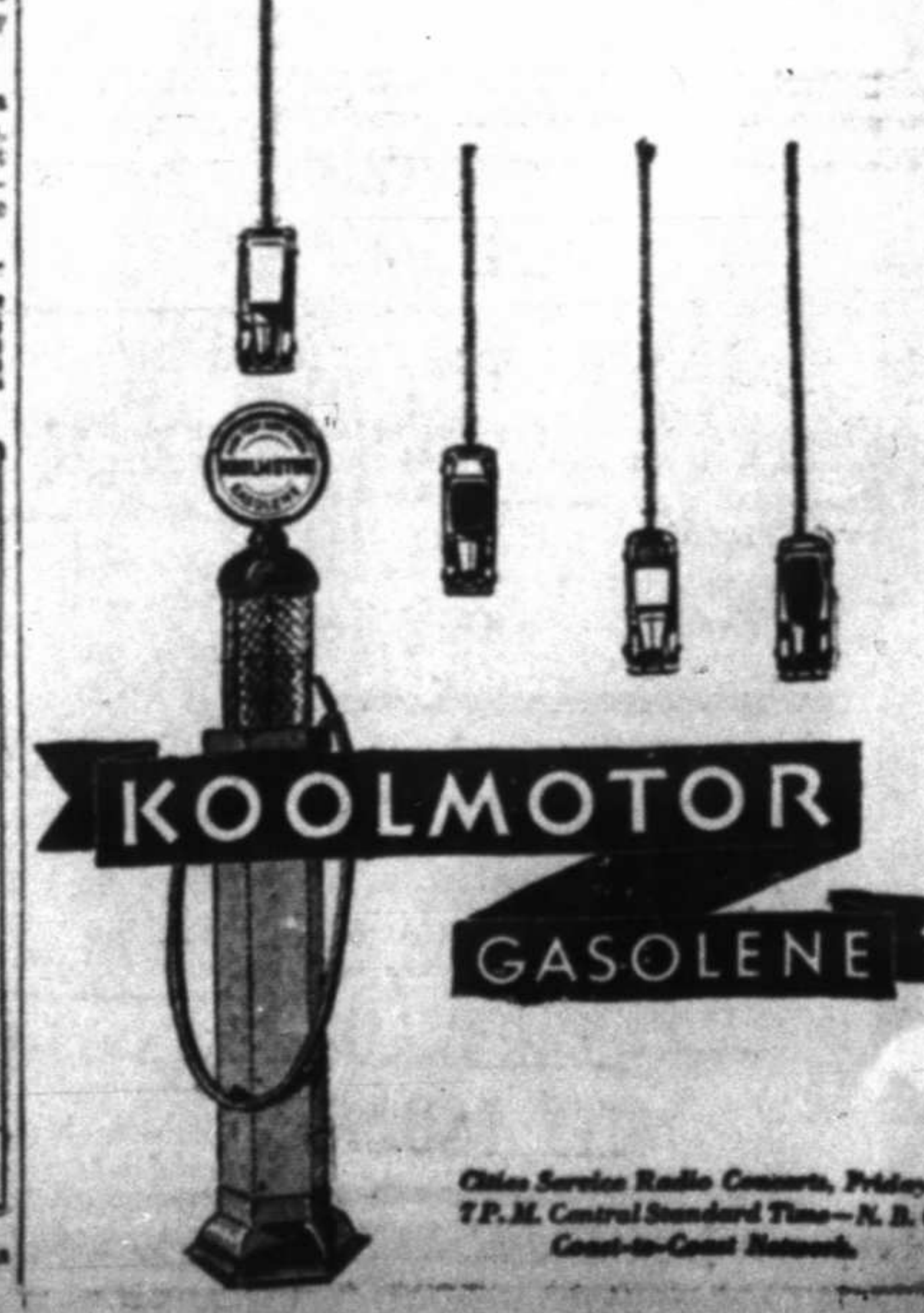

NEW UNOFFICIAL GLIDER MARK SET

JAN DIEGO, Calif., May 1. (AP)—Jack Barstow, sail plane pilot, landed at Point Loma at 2:58 o'clock Wednesday, ending a flight of 16 hours and 12 minutes duration that unofficially established a new world's record for gliders sustained flight.

Barstow took off at 12:44 p. m. Tuesday and had the advantage of a favorable breeze to circle San Diego and Point Loma until he passed the American glider mark of 9 hours, 5 minutes and 32 2-5 seconds, established several months ago by Hawley Bowles, glider manufacturer.

The official glider record is 14 hours and 45 minutes, and was established in Germany. As his flight was unofficial and he carried no barograph, Barstow cannot claim a new official mark.

Norman Convicted Of Woman's Death

COLEMAN, May 1. (AP)—John Norman was convicted by a jury Wednesday of a charge of murder growing out of the death of Mrs. Fannie Casey of Belton in an automobile collision near here June 15, 1929. His punishment was fixed at two years' imprisonment.

Attorneys for Norman said they would seek a new trial and if they were denied one they would appeal.

SCHOOLS ARE ASKED TO AID CENSUS WORK

CARDS ARE TO BE
DISTRIBUTED IN
SCHOOLS

Cooperating with enumerators, Lubbock public schools and the chamber of commerce are working toward taking of census of all persons who have children attending school.

Cards to be used in this program, were delivered to the schools yesterday by the chamber of commerce. School officials will pass these cards to each student in the school system and the students will be required to take the cards home, have them filled out, and then returned.

Provide Information
The cards provide for the name and address of the parent and in addition to having a blank to record the information as to whether or not the family has been enumerated, it likewise provides for a list of friends, neighbors, and servants.

After the cards are gathered up and inspected the enumerators will call upon those who have not been included in the census thus far.

Parents will be asked to fill out the cards, even though they have already been enumerated. Parents who have more than one child in school are asked to fill out each card that might come to the home.

EXHIBITS TO BE SHOWN IN SCHOOLS

Final preparations are being made for the annual exhibit of the Lubbock public schools which will be held Friday afternoon, between the hours of 2 and 4 o'clock in every school in the city.

This year's method of handling the exhibit differs from that of other years. Superintendent M. H. Duncan has pointed out. Representative work in all subjects will be on display, said Miss Lula Jones, principal of Sanders school.
