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WILD THROW IN NINTH GIVES HUBBERS LAST MIDLAND GAME

HILL EMERGES AS VICTOR IN HARD CONTEST

SEVEN HOMERS FEATURE SNAPPERS' WIN FROM CATS

SCENE SHIFTS TODAY TO COLEMAN AFTER A FINE EXHIBITION

Lagunas' wild throw to first base for Ray Robinson allowed the Snappers to win the first game of the series final with the Midland Colts here Sunday and the final count of the game stood 3 to 1. It was one of the most interesting West Texas games the home town boys have been privileged to witness.

Red Hill Hubbers' old head on the mound, locked horns with Foster Cook, former Howard Payne college athlete, in a nine-inning game. Hill dished out eight wild pitches while Cook was touched by eleven.

Two Homers Feature
A pair of home runs sent out by Cheever and Bryan. Colt snappers gave the Midland outfit their thrashing for the afternoon. Bryan hit his over the right field wall in the fifth frame and in the sixth with Bob Lewis on the base paths. Cheever rapped out a blue darter that bounced high over the right field barrier to score two runs.

Old Drap Hays, veteran Colt catcher, who has managed more clubs than there are in the West Texas League, was the batter. He stepped into one of Red Hill's oases sending the game far into the interfield which looked for a moment like one out of the lot, and was ticketed for at least two bases.

All of the time the boys were watching the course of the ball. Williams, Hubber outfielder, was chasing after the ball. Suddenly he swooped over toward the fence and pulled it down. Bryan knowing the ball was well up and would go for at least two or maybe three bases started for home plate and before he could get back to his starting place he was doubled out after Williams relayed the ball to Sealing and on to Sealing's double. May's single and Robinson's double in the fourth inning started the scoring for the Hubbers as they put over a pair of homers.

Batting High Triple
In the sixth frame Dick Raftis tripled, to left centerfield and former Burch scored him with his sacrifice bunt in front of the pitcher's plate.

In the eighth Sealing started the best rolling ball that winning in with his single, stole second base, and when Ray Robinson rapped out a long grounder to shortfield, Lagunas, with no possible chance for Robinson there wide to Ryan at the first sack to allow Sealing to score the winning run.

Immediately after the game the Hubbers left for Sweetwater where they were to remain over night and then proceeded on to Coleman this morning where they will have a three game series with Bob Coleman's Bobcats.

Farrell Takes Place as Third of Triumverate
(By Associated Press)
CHICAGO, June 25.—Johnny Farrell, newly crowned open golf champion of the United States at the age of 27, steps forth today to survey his kingdom, reap the \$50,000 reward that goes with it and take his place as the third figure in the greatest triumvirate of shotmakers America has ever had.

The slim young Irishman with the contagious smile and the fancy sweaters beat the master marksman of this trio yesterday, Bobby Jones, king of the amateurs, in a spectacular 36 hole play off for the championship, 143 to 144. He outscored the other, debonaire Walter Hagen the day before in the final half of the 72 hole competition that left him and Jones deadlocked at 294 strokes each with Hagen in a tie for fourth at 296.

Jones, on the last two holes, shot two successive birdies, but could not break down Farrell's morale or gain a single stroke.

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OLYMPIC HOPES HALF CINCHED BY BUFFALOES IN DOUBLE WIN

The winter of the pole vault at the Paris Olympic games in 1924, who also holds the world's record in the pole vault, is a candidate for Olympic honors again this year. He is Lee Barnes, brilliant pole vaulter the past three years at the University of Southern California.

Barnes won this event at the Paris games with a vault of 12 feet 11 1/2 inches. At that time, he was just out of high school. He made the world's record a few weeks ago when he topped Sabin Carr's 14 feet leap by one inch.

The Olympic champion has shown steady improvement in his favorite event since the last Olympics and is expected to battle with Sabin Carr, of Yale, for first place at Amsterdam this summer.

Barnes lives in Los Angeles. He is 21 years old and was a senior at Southern California this year. He weighs 150 pounds and lacks four inches of six feet in height. He has worked his way through school and while doing so assisted in supporting his family, as his father has been an invalid for years.

Farrell Takes Place as Third of Triumverate

CHICAGO, June 25.—Johnny Farrell, newly crowned open golf champion of the United States at the age of 27, steps forth today to survey his kingdom, reap the \$50,000 reward that goes with it and take his place as the third figure in the greatest triumvirate of shotmakers America has ever had.

The slim young Irishman with the contagious smile and the fancy sweaters beat the master marksman of this trio yesterday, Bobby Jones, king of the amateurs, in a spectacular 36 hole play off for the championship, 143 to 144. He outscored the other, debonaire Walter Hagen the day before in the final half of the 72 hole competition that left him and Jones deadlocked at 294 strokes each with Hagen in a tie for fourth at 296.

Jones, on the last two holes, shot two successive birdies, but could not break down Farrell's morale or gain a single stroke.

Making Them Live

In Honolulu there is a man named
Manuel who is known to everyone
as "the statue worshiper." Daily
Manuel appears before the statue
of Kamehameha I, Hawaii's
king of long ago, and does obeisance.
He is awaiting the day when
the statue of the great leader will
step down from its pedestal and
move across the street into the
place. On that day Manuel is
going to be ready to serve.

It is rather a weary business,
waiting for a statue to come to life.
Manuel has his sympathy. Indeed,
we in America ought to feel some
kindship with him. In our own way,
we are waiting for a statue to
move.

A good many years ago a group
of patriots in the American colonies
threw off the domination of the
British king and formed a new
government. The nation they estab-
lished was so to speak, a monument
of statue of the ideal of democ-
racy. And ever since then Amer-
icans have been trying to make
it live; to make it not only a mag-
nificent, beautiful emblem, but a
living, breathing fact.

It hasn't been an easy task. To
begin with, other things didn't
like this idea. This American
statue was too much of a beacon
to their own people. So they put
all the obstacles they could think of
in the way. But these obstacles
failed of their purpose.

Then there were hindrances at
home. Mass ignorance, sectional
local jealousies, narrow-gauge poli-
tician, financial oligarchy. All of
these things ingly and jointly kept
the great figure of Democracy from
stepping into full life.

It has been a long wait and a
hard battle. Now and then the
statue has flamed into glorious activity,
under the prodding of a for-
tunately, it has lagged into placid im-
mobility, unmoved by corruption in
high places, frozen by the apathy
and indifference of voters.

Yet we keep our faith that some
day, somehow, we will make it live.
For the statue is, when you stop to
think about it, rather fine. A great
many young men have died for it.
A great many earnest men and
women have spent their lives to make
it go. Unnumerable hopes and as-
pirations are wrapped up in it. At
times it has loomed high as a sym-
bol for oppressed and discouraged
people all over the world.

So we are waiting and hoping
like Manuel, waiting for the statue
of Democracy to be ready—ready to
follow the living, breathing emblem
of democracy into a newer, finer
day.

Women Will Likely Play Larger Part In Demo Meet Than They Did In Kansas City Confab, Rodney Dutcher Says

WASHINGTON, June 25.—The
Democrats treat their women bet-
ter than the Republicans.
There will be something like 150
women delegates sitting in the
Democratic national convention at
Houston this year and about 260
women alternates. As was the case
at Kansas City, there are fewer
women seated than in 1924, a re-
duction from about 500 to 400
among some 2000 delegates and al-
ternates.

The Republicans had less than
half as many feminine delegates
and a few less alternates.
Many of the ladies will split
their votes with men, so that their
actual voting power will be some-
where around 100 votes.

For some reason or other, the
women at the Democratic conven-
tion are considerably more inde-
pendent than their Republican
sisters.

AN excellent example of Demo-
cratic feminine independence is the
case of Mrs. Emily Newell Blair.
Mrs. Blair was national commit-
teewoman from Missouri and for sev-
eral years vice chairman of the
national committee.

When Senator Reed wanted the
Missouri delegation to vote only
for him, Mrs. Blair, a good Wilson
Democrat, led the fight to prevent
his endorsement. Mrs. Blair, of
course, was eliminated from active
leadership in Missouri politics as
soon as the Reed faction gained
ascendancy at the state conven-
tion. She will be succeeded as com-
mitteewoman by Mrs. C. B. Paris,
a Reed supporter and wife of a
federal judge. Reed's other foes
joined with his friends to endorse
him and save their skins.

The nominee will select Mrs.
Blair's successor as vice chairman,
but she will be active at her head-
quarters here during the conven-
tion. She is regarded as the polit-
ically best informed woman among
Democrats and retires after a bril-
liant administration of her posi-
tion.

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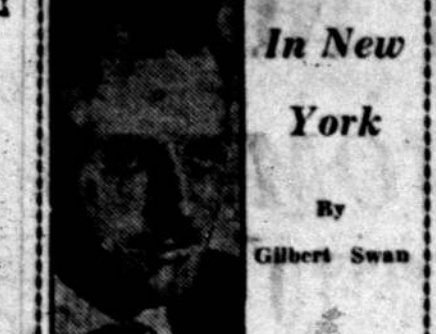

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SMITH FORCES CONFIDENTLY SEE EARLY SEEPING VICTORY

MAIN INTEREST SMITH CLAIMS CENTERING ON IN TEXAS VOTE RUNNING MATE ARE DISPUTED

TOTAL VOTE CLAIMED SWELLED BY MANY NEW ARRIVALS

HOUSTON, June 25.—Winding up almost in silence one of the quietest pre-convention campaigns by hundreds of the national convention delegates, a new twist was given to the presidential nomination which goes with it.

As arriving delegates swelled the supporting of Governor Smith stood today in the pre-eminent position of having all but captured in advance the democratic nomination of a generation.

Waiting phalanx behind the New Yorker, it became apparent even to his still defiant enemies that he was on his very threshold of definite victory. The boldest estimate of the minority strength against him left him within less than fifty votes of the nomination. No other man so situated ever has failed of a quick and decisive triumph.

Turn To Running Mate
So satisfied were his followers that many of them were talking more of a running mate for Smith than of first place on the ticket. Of the score of names brought into the fast-whirling pre-convention gossip, that of Evans Woollen, Indiana's favorite son, found at once a place of prominence. Senator Robinson of Arkansas was among the others ardently supported by some sections of the Smith bloc of delegates, but the net conclusion of all the talk was that the time for a definite measurement of vice-presidential stature had not yet come.

In the final hours before convention day, prohibition became more than ever the center of such disagreements as remained for the party to settle and its committee to iron out. While a baniless, ballyhooless, almost voiceless Smith headquarters received arriving delegations with modulated words of welcome, there was much tumult elsewhere. And prohibition was its dominating note.

Need For Amendment
Senator Reed of Missouri, who thumped noisy staves against the quiet Smith movement, started the excitement by firing off a statement declaring the eighteenth amendment must stand until a better method is found for dealing with the situation. Called a wet main times by prohibition leaders, the Missouriian's utterance was embraced immediately by these leaders, and it appeared likely that he might have attracted to his slender column of delegate strength some anti-Smith delegates who otherwise would have voted for others.

Just how this was to affect the final balance, or at what point it was intended to cut into the Smith majority, was not apparent. But the Reed statement greatly encouraged the dries, and set them to work all over again, under leadership of Daniel R. Roper of North Carolina, in an attempt to organize a bloc sufficient to veto his nomination and white into the platform the kind of ultra-dry plank they want.

Smith headquarters said nothing. Some of the lesser Smith lieutenants, however, passed word around that even while Reed was preparing his statement and Roper was gathering his band of dries, there had been bandwagon accessions to Smith in such numbers that a first ballot nomination could be accomplished almost without a struggle, if it were desired. One report that went around with persistence was that Indiana would be released by Woollen almost at the beginning of the balloting and would cast most of its strength for Smith.

Balloting Maybe Thursday
The presidential balloting will be reached before Thursday, or possibly Friday. The deep-dyed anti-Smith contingent, centering largely in the South, insists that within this space of time, all things are possible in politics. To which the Smithites reply that once a presidential bandwagon starts on its way, nothing short of a political earthquake can stop it.

The convention program is not yet complete, but leaders are considering a plan that would confine the daylight sessions within the briefest possible limits, and leave the real work of the convention to be done at night. It is possible that when the 1,100 delegates come together at noon tomorrow, they will separate again within a few minutes, after having disposed of necessary preliminaries only. That plan would postpone the keynote speech until a Tuesday evening session and later on would leave other interesting convention features, including perhaps the nomination itself, to the evening hours, when temperatures are lower and the convention's vast radio audience is at its maximum.

HOUSTON, June 25.—Conflicting claims as to the strength of Governor Smith in the Texas 3-delegation to the democratic convention will be settled at the state caucus tonight when the delegation will be polled for its first choice for president.

Advisors of Governor Dan Moody, who is against Smith, said today that a thorough canvass of the delegation through written communications and personal interviews show 32 of the 40 Texas votes to be against Smith. R. L. Henry of Houston, one of the Smith leaders, is claiming 18 to 22 votes for the New York governor. Smith supporters continued to "work on Moody followers, whom they considered amenable to persuasion, in efforts to get a Smith majority lined up before the caucus at 9 P. M.

Moody Prepares Statement
Meantime, Governor Moody was preparing a statement of what he thinks Texas and the south want in the way of a prohibition plank. It will call for strict enforcement of the prohibition laws, and a "progressive strengthening" of them. The governor expects to offer the plank to the national platform committee. There may be some effort to harmonize this so-called "southern dry" plank with one said to be approved by Governor Smith, being brought here by John W. Davis, 1924 presidential candidate. Texas leaders expect the governor and Davis to get together in the interest of harmony before the platform committee meets.

Claims of the Texas Smith supporters, who are wearing ribbons reading "Texas for Smith," were regarded by the Moody followers as exaggerated in efforts to promote "victory psychology."

Dr. M. L. Cox of Canton, third district delegate, said he had been classified as a Smith delegate but that he would follow Governor Moody.

No Nomination Seen
"I have said that I would support Governor Smith if nominated but I think the others will do that also without doubt, and still not vote for his nomination," Dr. Cox said.

Some of the Smith supporters do not want Governor Moody on the platform committee, but unless they can realize the remote chance of getting control of the delegation, the governor's election to that post seems to be without question. His primary mission to the convention is to work for a dry plank and dry candidate. He is perhaps the outstanding southern dry leader and his membership on the committee would be the most likely way, his friends think, to give voice to what he considers the prevailing southern attitude on prohibition.

Justice Joseph M. Proskauer strolled about the lobby of the Rice hotel renewing Alabama acquaintances.

George R. Van Namee, manager of the New York governor's pre-convention activities, continued his daily conference with newspapermen, but his chief topic of conversation seemed to be about Houston's weather.

Mrs. Alfred E. Smith and four of the five Smith children will reach Houston late this afternoon, soon after several hundred other

New York and New England Smith boosters, coming by train and boat.

Efforts to learn the preference of Smith's friends for a running mate for their candidate, if he is nominated, get nowhere. "Our candidate is for president" is the stock reply.

The New York delegation, meeting tonight, will name its representatives on the convention committee. Mrs. Caroline O'Day of Rye, vice chairman of the democratic state committee, will act as chairman of the biggest delegation in the convention.

Strategy of the Smith pre-convention movement has indicated that New York's first thought is the candidacy of Governor Smith and, by no big part, was expected from its representative in building the platform. The New York delegate, however, will be able to say if proposed planks conform with the position of his delegation, representing Governor Smith of Houston.

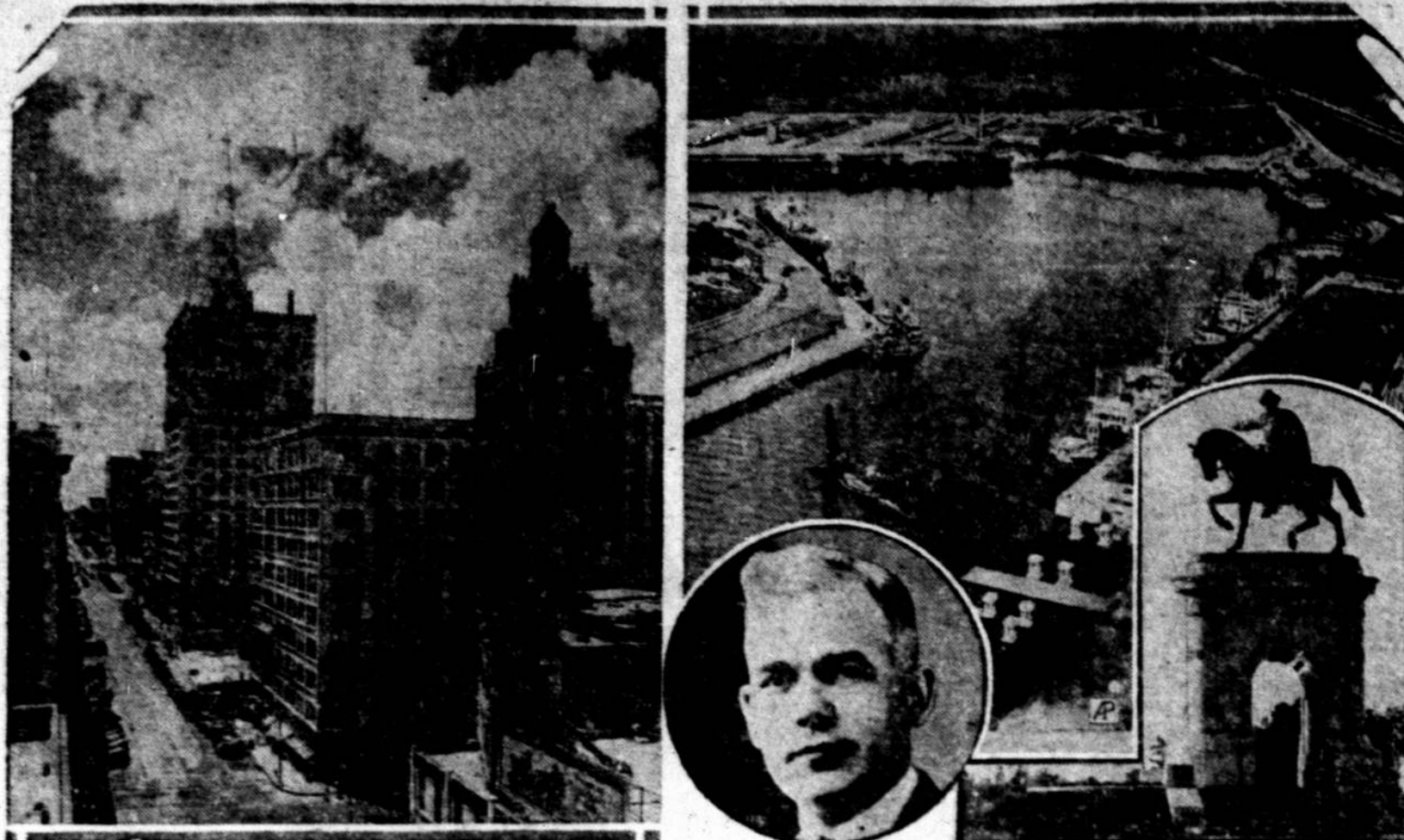

REED ACTIONS GIVE HEART TO MILITANT DRYS

NORTH CAROLINA MAN LEADING FIGHT ON SMITH FORCES

By FRANCIS M. STEPHENSON
HOUSTON, June 25.—Heartened by the prohibition pronouncement of Senator Reed of Missouri, the anti-Smith forces were feverishly rounding up their troops after perfecting an organization at a series of secret Sunday conferences.

Daniel C. Roper of North Carolina, one of the supporters of William Gibbs McAdoo in the memorable 1924 campaign, was revealed as leader of the southern dry hopefuls mobilizing along the Missouri senator, who has held the trenches so far against the swelling tide of Smith delegates.

Reed and Roper Confer
Reed held an hour's conference early this morning with Roper at which the drive to halt Smith's nomination was understood to have been gone over in detail. Although there was no announcement of any concerted action, it was apparent that no disagreement existed between the two.

Earlier in the night the militant Missouri had set the prohibition fires burning with a statement that the "eighteenth amendment will stand until and unless the moral forces of the nation become convinced that there is some better way of dealing with the liquor problem."

A few hours later the southerners were at work. After a brief night conference, Mr. Roper, who has been quietly conferring with many factions since Friday, made the following announcement:

Roper's Statement
The elements of this convention which are convinced of the necessity of saving the democratic party from multiplication of the eighteenth amendment, and from Tammany control of the federal government, are in agreement upon the course of procedure to be followed in the fight.

The "course of procedure" of the "elements" involved were not disclosed by the former international revenue commissioner who named a steering committee representing each faction having a candidate other than Smith in the field.

Confidence was expressed that the necessary one-third vote of the convention—367—was available to stop Smith, but there were no figures and with many a state delegation preparing for caucuses today which will determine the course of their first votes, the anti-Smith group was sending messages about headquarters at merry clip.

While Senator has given the word to his Missouri delegation that they are not to fight any one candidate but are to work only for their own goal, his prohibition statement was regarded hopefully by both his own men and some of the "die-hard" anti-Smith folks as the bridge making possible a co-ordination between all elements opposed to the New York governor.

Stop Smith, is Plea
So far, it appears to be the strategy of the band of southerners who are understood to be counting strong on the support of Governor Moody of Texas, to have votes kept in line for Representative Hill of Tennessee; Senator George of Georgia; Evans Wooten of Indiana, and other favorite sons. No one man has been determined upon as their candidate with all attention centered now on stopping Smith.

There seems to be no doubt that part of the program also calls for a considerable bloc of votes from the southern states for Governor Donahay of Ohio, a dry, Allice Pomerene is the present choice of Ohio for president, but it is the understanding that the Ohio convention instructed its delegation to vote for any other native son of that state.

The original first day schedule had called for Bowers to speak shortly after noon tomorrow, but at a meeting of the democratic national committee today it was decided to delay the speech until evening to insure better radio distribution.

Ratification of the membership of the various committees at the first brief session tomorrow will enable these groups to get down to work during the afternoon recess, with a view to submitting their reports Wednesday. Members of the national committee seemed desirous especially that the platform committee lose no time in getting organized.

Fred Stephens of Slaton, was in Lubbock on business this morning. THREE COUNTS ARE LODGED IN STEWART CASE

PERJURY CHARGED TO OIL MAN IN PROBE OF SENATE ROW

WASHINGTON, June 25.—Robert W. Stewart, head of the Indiana Standard Oil company, was indicted on three counts of perjury today as the result of his Continental Standard Co. testimony before the senate oil committee. It was the same testimony that caused John D. Rockefeller, Jr., to demand his resignation as chairman of the corporation's board of directors.

Return of the indictment was followed by charges of Stewart's counsel that it represented "the last word in the outrageous abuse of court processes for political purposes" in a "vindictive attempt to overcome" his acquittal twelve days ago on a charge of refusing to answer questions asked by the committee. Stewart, they said, would seek immediate trial, confident of acquittal.

Conviction on a perjury charge carries a penalty of from two to ten years in prison.

At the committee hearing last February, Stewart was asked if he had any knowledge that would lead him to believe any organization or individual had received any of the \$3,000,000 of the liberty bond oil profits of the Continental and replied: "No sir."

Appearing again before the committee on April 24, the chairman of the Indiana Standard Oil company said he had received \$750,000 in liberty bonds from H. S. Osler, president of the Continental. He maintained, however, he did not profit from the transaction, as he had turned the bonds over to a trust fund he had established for his company and finally did turn the bonds over to it in April of this year.

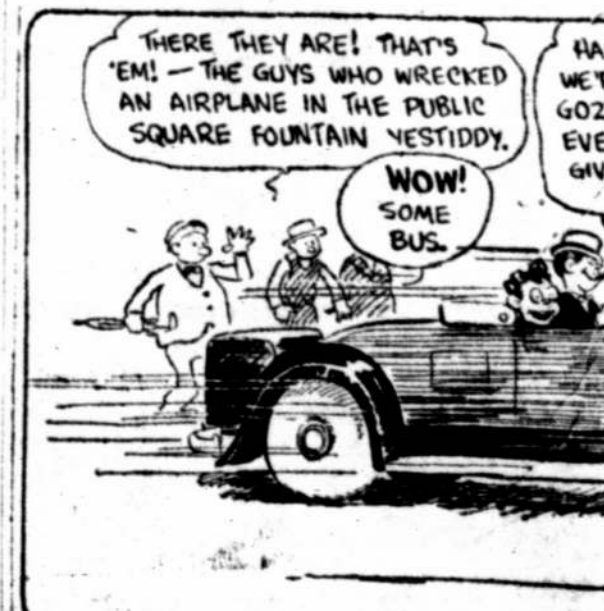

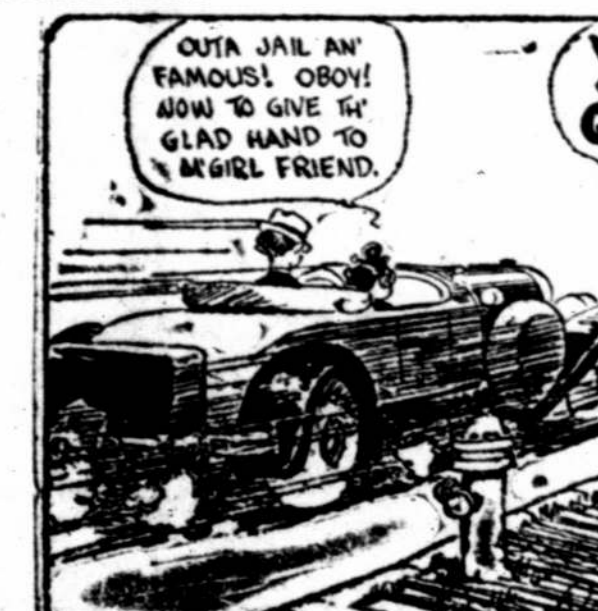

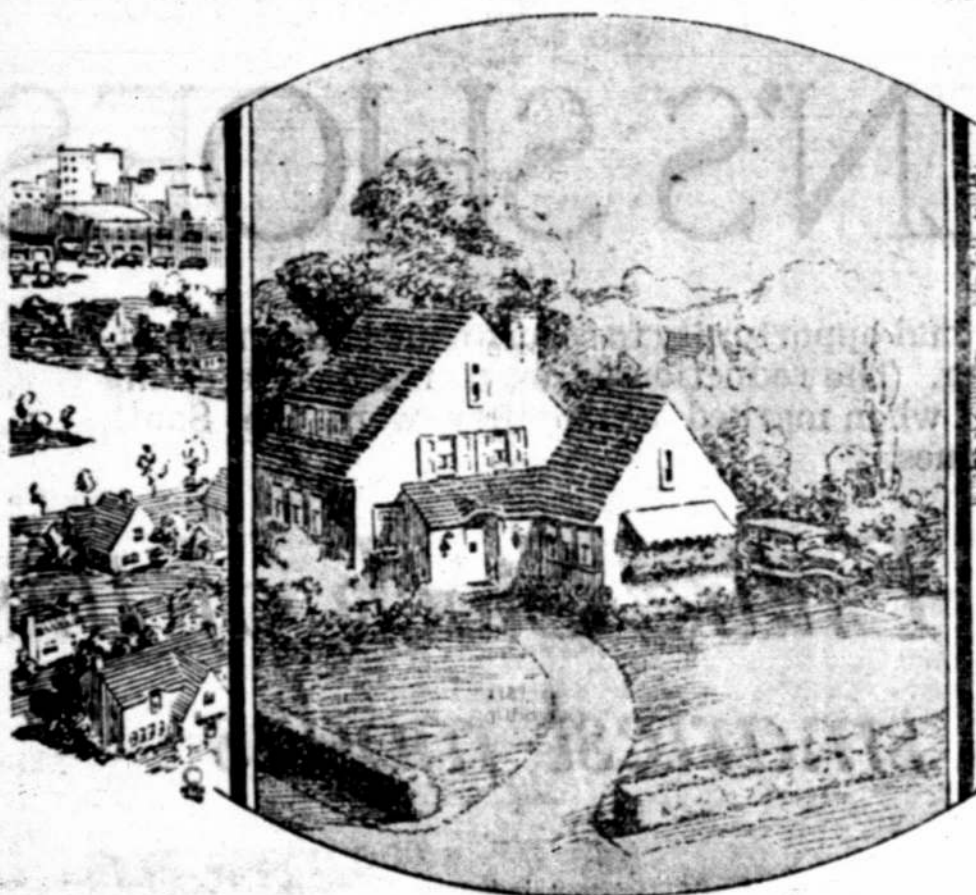

STEAMER GETS RADIO REPORT OF LOST CREW

SOVIET SAYS SHIP IS
IN COMMUNICATION
WITH AMUNDSEN

LONDON, June 25.—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Paris says the Russian newspaper "Pravda" is publishing a report from Moscow that the Russian icebreaker Krasin is in communication with Roald Amundsen and his five companions missing in a French seaplane. The dispatch said that the Russian aviators would attempt to rescue the men with a Junkers plane which is aboard the icebreaker.

The Krasin sailed from Bergen for Kings Bay, Spitzbergen, last week and was to cover virtually the same route which Amundsen had planned to follow.

Amundsen was accompanied by 121 Dietrichsen, Norwegian explorer, and four French naval aviators under the command of Rene Guilbaud, noted flier.

Lundborg Rescue Sought By Fliers

OSLO, Norway, June 25.—Aviators from Spitzbergen state that Swedish aviators are starting today from the vessel Quest in an effort to reach Lieutenant Lundborg who crashed on the ice at Nobile's camp off Northeast Land while attempting to rescue the stranded crew.

Nobile Is Resting Well, Report Says

ROME, June 25.—General Umberto Nobile injured when the dirigible Italia crashed on the polar ice cap has a fractured shin, and a contusion to his back. His recovery is expected in forty days.

An official medical bulletin issued today said his injuries were: "Incomplete fractured right shin bone, now healing. Dislocation of right foot and tendon torn. Also heavy contusion lower right back with abundant hemorrhage."

He will probably recover in about forty days.

Report Tells Of Rescue Of Nobile

ROME, June 25.—Advises today from General Umberto Nobile whose injuries from the crash of the Italia will take more than a month to heal explained that he alone of the party of six had been rescued by a Swedish airplane and taken to the base ship Citta Di Milano.

When the Swedish flier Lieutenant Lundborg descended on the ice floe upon which Nobile's party had been adrift since May 25, Nobile said that the party should be taken off in this order: Nobile, Cocconi, motor chief whose leg was broken, Professor F. Brhounet, meteorologist, Filippo Tromas, engineer.

General Nobile, Lieutenant Alfredo Vaglieri, navigator and Giuseppe Biagi, radio operator.

Lundborg replied that he was ordered to take Nobile off at once, that the commander could give directions for pressing the search for the seven men who drifted eastward in the balloon part of the Italia and the three missing since they started across the ice on May 25 from the Nobile party.

The flier and Nobile's marooned comrades all firmly insisted on this.

Realizes Situation

Nobile realized that they would be under in mind if they knew he saw of the base directing searching operations. He also realized that there must be no delay in taking the party off the ice so yielded to the wishes of his companions against the dictates of his own heart.

Before leaving he turned over command of the group left behind to Lieutenant Vaglieri.

JUNIOR SENATOR FROM IDAHO IS CALLED BY DEATH

GOODING, Idaho, June 25.—Death has terminated the second term of Senator Frank R. Gooding of Idaho.

The junior republican senator from Idaho died yesterday at the home of his daughter in the little town he founded and which bears his name. He came here to rest after an operation, the forepart of this month. He had not been in the best of health since contracting influenza at Washington, December last. Death was attributed to cancer of the trachea.

Senator Gooding started his political career as governor of this state during the turbulent days when "Big Bill" Haywood was on trial charged with implication in the slaying of Governor Frank Steunenberg. Following two terms as governor, he returned to active direction of his sheep business.

In 1918, Mr. Gooding again became a candidate for public office and was defeated for the senate by John F. Nugent. Entering the race again in 1920, he was successful.
