Farmer Suicides After Wounding Wife, Mexicans

Hawks Regains Mark For West-East Flight Across United States

VALLEY STREAM, N. Y., Aug. 13.—Beating by more than two hours the transcontinental air record which Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh took from him last April, Capt. Frank M. Hawks flew from Glendale, Calif., to Curtis Field today in 12 hours, 25 minutes and three seconds.

By bettering the Lindbergh time of 14 hours and 45 minutes Hawks became holder of the speed record for crossing the country in both directions, for just a week ago today he flew the east-west course in 14 hours, 37 minutes and 43 seconds, beating the record for the westward flight by Roscoe Turner by more than four hours.

Hawks twice before has held the west-east record, once beating his own time and losing his second record to the Lindberghs. On today's flight he stayed at about 8,000 feet altitude, considerably lower than the Lindberghs. He averaged about 200 miles an hour but at one time, east of Wichita, he made 250.

Leaving the west coast at 5:16:27 (E. S. T.) this morning he touched ground here at 5:41:30 shooting to earth like a red and white meteor flung from the red glowing disc of the setting sun. He made refueling stops at Albuquerque, Wichita and Indianapolis.

Mine Bombers Are Named by Young Airman

Two Men Implicated by Flier Sought by Authorities in Kentucky Coal Field Demonstrations Early Monday

MURPHYSBORO, Ill., Aug. 13.—A confession by Paul Montgomery, 25, local aviator, that he was hired by two or three men to pilot his airplane in a bombing raid over the Providence, Ky., coal field early Monday, and that one of the men accompanied him on the trip, was in the hands of department of justice and county authorities tonight.

State's Attorney Fletcher Lewis said Montgomery had named two men, but withheld their names pending their arrest, expected shortly. Reports from some other official sources were that three men had been implicated.

Montgomery's story, according to Lewis, was that after he was hired to go on the bombing raid he was told he and members of his family would be killed if he did not carry it out. He said he received no money but was promised financial reward, the amount not being specified.

The state's attorney said Montgomery confessed that the dynamite bombs dropped on the mining community, but without loss of life or property, were made at the local airport by two men, one of whom took them in a sack and accompanied him when he took off for the 10-mile flight to the mining district before dawn Monday.

Montgomery was quoted as saying he maneuvered his plane so that none of the bombs would land on homes or mining properties where any damage would be done or persons injured. He then returned his passenger to the field here.

Protest Given To High Food Prices

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. (AP)—The first protests of increased food prices since the drought set in were made to President Hoover today as governors began arriving for the White House conference tomorrow to discuss a widespread relief organization.

Representative LaGuardia of New York carried a complaint to the White House that either wholesalers or commission merchants were taking "undue advantage" of the protracted dry spell by selling fresh vegetables in New York City at an increase of from 25 to 50 per cent in price.

At the suggestion of the president, LaGuardia took his case to the agriculture department where he asked Secretary Hyde to publish a daily bulletin on the amount of vegetables arriving in New York and wholesale prices paid the farmers to determine "at least whether the farmer is being held up."

R-100 Starts Return Flight Over Atlantic

Giant British Dirigible Is Soaring Toward England on Second Ocean Attempt; Hope to Reach Home Sat.

ST. HUBERT AIRPORT, MONTREAL, Aug. 13.—Great Britain's monarch of the airways, the dirigible R-100, soared away from her mooring mast at 8:28 tonight (EST) bound for England on her return crossing of the Atlantic.

Squadron Leader Booth was in command and a party of 15 newspaper and Canadian technical officers were aboard, in addition to the ship's complement of 44 officers and men. Peering downward, the passengers saw in huge letters of gold illuminated by floodlights, the words "bon voyage R-100-Canada."

Expect Favorable Wind

In spite of the fact that only five or six knots were in action, the officers expected favorable tailwinds to aid them in achieving their second record for the ocean flight. They expected to make the return trip in 48 hours, tying up at the Gardington mooring mast Saturday morning.

The huge airship pointed her nose down the St. Lawrence river and was scheduled to branch off over Cape, cruise across the gulf of St. Lawrence and leave the North American coast at Cape Race.

Government meteorological experts predicted excellent weather for the flight. They pointed to clouds along the St. Lawrence to night but promised good visibility. Atmospheric conditions were generally favorable over the gulf and half-way across the Atlantic, they said.

TRIAL NEARS JURY

HOMER EDWARDS ENTERS PLEA OF INSANITY IN MURDER CASE

HONOLULU, Aug. 13. (AP)—The jury which was expected to receive tonight the case against Homer G. Edwards of San Antonio, charged with the murder of John W. Bradshaw, whose body was found in the Guadalupe river April 10 near Waukegan must either find the defendant insane or convict him of murder.

The defense closed at noon today without denying the allegation of murder contained in the indictment. The case went to the jury with two statements signed by Edwards in evidence in which he admitted shooting Bradshaw, ripping open the body, filling it with stones and casting it in the river. There was no word denying his guilt. The only defense brought forward was that of insanity.

Caverns Highway Progress Cited

Endurance Fliers Aim at Goal of 1,000 Hours In Air After Record Broken

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 13.—The world's premier sustained flight pilots, Dale (Red) Jackson and Forest O'Brien, tonight rode the air above Lambert-St. Louis field in their trim cabin monoplane "Greater St. Louis" as companions once more.

After breaking the world's refueling endurance flight record at 9:52 a. m., these two veterans skyweavers nosed their craft toward a goal of 1,000 hours in the air. At 4:11 p. m. Jackson and O'Brien had been aloft 961 hours and forty minutes set in Chicago last month by the flying hunter brothers of Sparta, Ill.

Veteran Political Leaders Emerge as Primary Favorites

Two veteran political leaders—Senator Norris of Nebraska and Robinson of Arkansas—who began their congressional careers at the same time in 1893, have weathered the storm of another primary contest.

Norris, in independent Republican who campaigned for Alfred E. Smith for president in 1928, received the Republican senatorial nomination in Tuesday's primary in Nebraska after a bitter campaign.

Robinson Big Leader

At the same time, Robinson, the Democratic leader and vice-presidential candidate in 1928, emerged victorious by an overwhelming majority in the Arkansas contest. He advocated national prohibition in his campaign speeches.

Norris and Robinson served for 10 years together in the house of representatives and then were elected to the senate. The only break in their joint service occurred in 1913. Robinson resigned his house seat January 14 of that year and was inaugurated governor of Arkansas two days later. On January 28 he was elected senator and took his seat March 10.

The Nebraskaan, who defeated William M. Stebbins, regular Republican candidate, will oppose Gilbert M. Hitchcock, former senator, in the fall election. Hitchcock won the Democratic senatorial nomination over Dr. Jennie M. Calhoun.

The return of Robinson to the senate, however, is virtually assured.

Verdict by Coroner Will Frank of Taft was that the death was due to knife wounds self-inflicted.

Last year a supervisor was added to the teaching staff of the schools and better work was done than ever before in the building of health habits. Next year all teachers will be expected to have prepared themselves in a special way for this work, either by private study, through correspondence courses, or by courses taken in college during the summer.

In the fall the local dentists will again make an examination of the teeth of school children and an effort will be made to have every defect corrected.

Commencement Exercises for School Scheduled

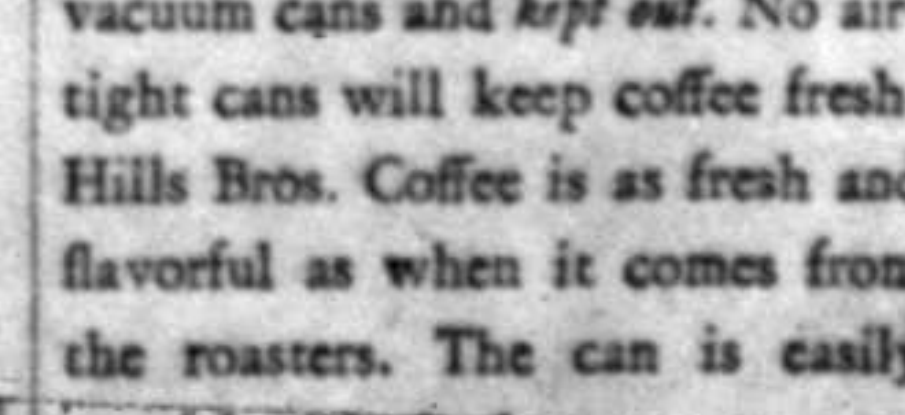

Lubbock Chest Plans Talked

Directors of 1931 Campaign Meet Wednesday to Discuss Drive; Another Meeting to Be Called Here Soon

Directors of the 1931 Community Chest campaign discussed plans for the drive Wednesday in the city hall. Seven of the 10 directors were present. E. L. Klett, president presided.

After a session of nearly two hours, it was decided to call another meeting soon to make definite arrangements for the drive to gain funds for the Community Chest. The campaign probably will begin about October 1, when the fiscal year closes.

To Be Handled Locally

"We are not going to have any outside executives in charge of the financial campaign," President Klett said. "All the arrangements and so-

licitation will be handled locally." Policies and plans for the campaign are to be more clearly set forth at the next meeting, it was said.

"Our financial report showed a balance of \$773 in the treasury," Mr. Klett explained. "We made full payment as of August 1 to all agencies receiving assistance."

Pledges Delinquent

"Unless the delinquent pledges now due and unpaid, are met during this month, the directors will have to make a drastic cut to all agencies on the first of September. There is enough unpaid pledges due to more than meet this need."

"All of the agencies are in need of their full amounts at this time of the year."

Directors present, besides President Klett, included: A. H. Leidigh, C. F. Drexel, J. W. Gamel, W. P. Jennings, Charles Nordyke and J. I. Kilpatrick.

Opposes U. S. Rail Control

Martin Insul Gives Building Up American Railway System as Argument Against Government Ownership

UNIVERSITY, Va., Aug. 13. (P)—The building up of America's great railroad systems by private initiative and enterprise was offered by Martin J. Insul, president of the Middlewest Utilities company, as an argument against government ownership and operation in a discussion before the round table on business and government at the institute of public affairs today.

These pioneers, he said, not only built railroads, but also developed cities, evolved manufacturing plants, created steamship lines, harnessed water powers, built power plants and covered the country with power transmission, telegraph and telephone lines.

"All these industrial developments

are the result of the scientific knowledge and inventive genius of our people—not of our government," Mr. Insul said. "Government is not designed for the purpose of inventing, owning or operating, but to govern to the end that these functions may be for the greatest number of the governed."

"The Utilities executive was answered by Norman Thomas, former candidate for president on the socialist ticket.

"Common sense," he said, "to say nothing of the belief in Democracy, would suggest that whenever an industry or service is vitally affected by the public interest it ought to be publicly owned and operated for use rather than private profit."

He found little to favor in the present system of regulation, "the best that can be said for regulation is that it is better than nothing," he said.

THOUSANDS JOBLESS

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13. (P)—A total of 234,854 jobless or 3.4 per cent of New York City's population of 6,909,190 was announced for the nation's metropolis today in the census bureau's unemployment count.

Saunders Fails To Gain Control

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 13. (P)—Back from a conference with New York bankers, Clarence Saunders said today negotiations had failed to realize his hope of regaining control and reorganizing the Clarence Saunders Stores, Inc., a unit of his grocery chains now in receivership.

Saunders said the bankers who hold notes for \$500,000 against the unit in receivership, offered to purchase the Clarence Saunders Pacific Stores, Inc., a California chain, but he refused. He said he will go to California soon to manage the stores there.

The 153 units of the Clarence Saunders Stores, Inc., mostly in southern states, were petitioned into receivership last month. The banking syndicate, headed by Bertels, Rawes and Donaldson of New York obtained appointment of a second receiver to represent them and other large creditors.

NEGRO FACES CHARGES

Houston Black Held in July Attack and Robbery

HOUSTON, Aug. 13. (P)—Diamond Roberts, 34-year-old negro yardman for former Mayor Holcombe, was held today under charges of robbery in connection with the holdup of Percy Foreman, attorney, and a girl companion on the night of July 31. Foreman identified the negro as the one who took \$301 in cash and jewelry from him and his companion and made assault overtures to the girl.

The negro attempted to drag the young woman from the automobile but was resisted by Foreman and left the scene.

RUSH CONSTRUCTION

BROWNFIELD, Aug. 13. (Special.) Work is being rushed on construction of the new high school building for this district and contractors promise that it will be ready for occupancy in time for opening of schools September 8th. Work is also being rushed on the gymnasium building in an effort to complete it about the same time.

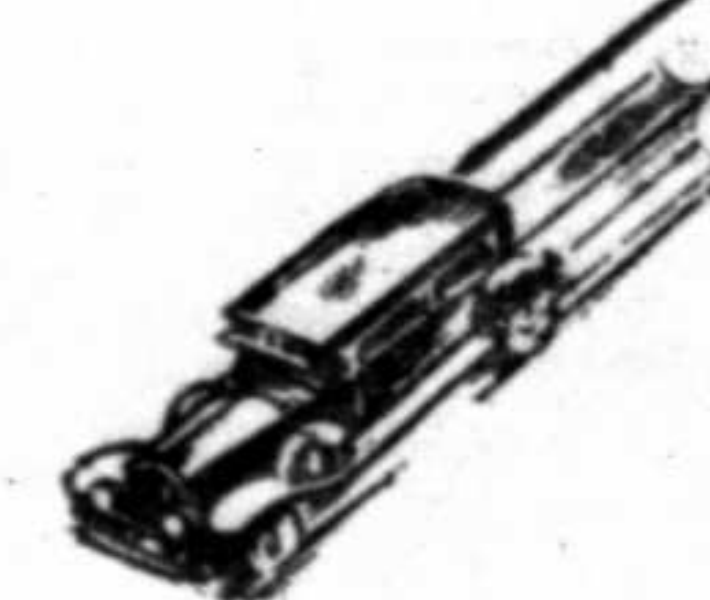

'HAYWIRE BILL' AND 'FARMER JIM'

COMING events, newspaper advertisements tell us, "cast their shadows before"—but The Morning Avalanche hopes that Oklahoma's experience, in awaiting to find 'Haywire Bill' Murray carrying the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, will not be repeated in Texas on August 23.

Riding high upon a platform of 'hokum,' including the announcement that he is 'the farmer's friend and will live in the garage of the governor's mansion if elected,' 'Haywire Bill' heads Democracy in the neighboring state. His platform reminds one of that issued by the Fergusons in that they too, are 'the farmer's friend and Jim will carry in the wood and water while Ma occupies the chair.'

In the Oklahoma run-off we Texans stood on the sidelines and watched a shrewd politician use a pitchfork to great advantage and for a business office, a self-made business executive who was handicapped by the fact that he has made a success of his own business. We watched the poor deluded Oklahoma decide upon a colossal failure when they had an opportunity to select a real leader—one who could hold the job and keep the respect of the balance of the nation. In other words, we watched politics of the old order triumph over common sense and now it appears almost certain that a Republican will be the next governor of the Sooner state.

The Morning Avalanche sees a parallel in the Oklahoma and Texas primaries. To be sure, Jim Ferguson is a smarter man than 'Haywire Bill' Murray ever dreamed of being. But we, of Texas, have seen Fergusonism on parade in the Capitol before as we, as a real business executive, it calls almost unbelievably.

It is to be hoped that Texas will profit by Oklahoma's gross error. It is to be desired that Texans pull themselves up short and say to each other, "Look here. This is the kind of man we are liable to get into our hands. Let's keep the respect of the rest of the nation, the confidence of big business and the peace of our great state. Let's don't be foolish, as Oklahoma was, and be swayed by prejudice and hokum. Let's vote for a business man for a business office—and profit by it."

Coming event may, as the advertisements warn, cast their shadows before. We prefer, however, to believe that Oklahoma's misfortune will be Texas' gain and that our people will profit by their neighbor's error.

THESE NEED EDUCATION

Twenty-one American cities have in operation one or more schools in which crippled children are educated in conjunction with necessary correctional, medical and surgical treatment. Remarkable results are being obtained by these institutions.

The crippled child is a social problem. Generally he or she is unable to keep up with normal classmates and formerly was permitted to drop out of school to go through life handicapped physically and mentally. Education is more valuable to the physically deformed or crippled than to the physically normal.

Smaller communities cannot finance special schools and hospitals for the instruction and treatment of these children, but there must be a way for every community, no matter how limited in population and financial means, to give them an education at least. Every physically defective child society makes independent through schooling or correctional treatment is a good investment. Were that child to continue through life a public charge, the cost to society would be far in excess of the other cost.

Citizens and civic organizations are concerned and should help make it possible to give these unfortunate children the attention they so sorely need.

On the Firing Line at the Nation's Capital

HOOVER'S EXPERIENCE IN EAST KEEPS MARINES OUT OF CHINA

By Charles P. Stewart

(Central Press Staff Writer)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 13.—President Hoover has lived in the far east himself, which doubtless explains why huge naval reinforcements were not ordered immediately to quell the flare-up in chronically smoldering and frequently acutely inflaming China.

"More marines!" was Secretary of State Kellogg's invariable reaction to such alarms. Not knowing any more about actual conditions in that part of the world than his cabinet chief, President Coolidge let him have his way about it.

As a matter of fact, the Americans in China, who can be protected at all, can be protected just as well by comparatively a few marines as by ten or a dozen times as many. Those who are scattered hither and yon over the face of the republic could not be protected by a million.

Anyone who knows Shanghai knows how all the foreigners in China, who live bunched together in the most important community of them, but the others differ from it very little, except in the number of their alien inhabitants.

The foreign city of Shanghai, then, is built on a narrow strip of land extending along the Whangpoo river, a few miles from its junction with the big Yangtze, about an hour's steaming from the point where the latter empties into the Yellow sea. American, European and Japanese warships have no difficulty (or not much, crossing Wusung bar, at the Yangtze's mouth) in getting up to the town, and there fifteen or twenty of them lie, from year's end to year's end, about a baseball pitch off the bund, or waterfront.

These craft are obsolete tubs, because there would be no sense in wasting modern men-o-war on such duty, but they can shoot, and their batteries always are in readiness to lay down, all around the settlement, a barrage that no native force possibly could break through.

Wherever there are 'foreign cities' in the republic they are planned on the Shanghai model and stand on similar sites—on the coast or the banks of navigable streams—safely under the guns of a fleet of armoured old vessels, but invincible against anything China has to offer.

To be sure, Peking (now Peiping), where the legation staffs were penned up during the Boxer troubles, is in a class by itself—being inland. However, the diplomatic quarter there does not rate as a 'foreign city'—nor is it mentioned as in danger at present, or likely to be.

It is true that China's foreigners might find some of their footholds untenable if their supplies were cut off from the landward. They themselves could get away on ships, but perhaps at the cost of abandoning everything they owned to be plundered. This could hardly happen at a port like Shanghai, which, being close to the ocean, could easily be provisioned from the sea, and probably could withstand a siege indefinitely, as could Tientsin, the former German port of Tsingtau and other coastal settlements.

The hazard at the triple cities of Hankow, Hanyang and Wuchang (on the three land angles formed by the entrance of the River Han into the Yangtze) is much greater—not to the foreigners' lives, unless they were to linger over-long ashore in the face of peril, but to their property.

The white folk's portion of Hankow (Hanyang and Wuchang are factory districts) is a miniature Shanghai, but instead of being only two or three hours steaming from tidewater, it is nearly 1,000 miles (not quite so far, in a bee-line overland) up the winding Yangtze.

Ocean-going boats do ascend the stream and tie up at the Hankow bund. Rescuing the inhabitants presents no difficult problem, but the place itself is not as defensible as Shanghai. It could be defended, of course, but it would be a large-scale military undertaking.

Changsha's recent fate shows how hard alien colonies, far up Chinese rivers, are to protect. Theoretically it ought to have been possible to safeguard the town from the River Shiang, but low water hampered the gunboats so much that the best they could do was to take foreigners off.

As for relieving remote missionary and trading stations, even a vast army could not do it, for it would have to stick together, to take aid to a handful of colonists here and there. The country is too big, for one thing—about the size of the United States.

Foreign merchants and diplomatic officials in China unquestionably favor the dispatch of formidable military expeditions of their various nationalities to the revolution-ridden republic—and demand them in the name of protection, because they consider that the best excuse.

In reality they are not much afraid; at worst, they could get away if they chose. What they actually want is intervention, with a view to permanent, dependable foreign domination of the whole country, to cinch their own commercial interests.

LIVER AND OTHER EXTRACTS ARE OF GREAT VALUE IN FIGHTING PERNICIOUS ANEMIA

By Dr. Morris Fishbein, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association, and of Hygiene.

In the condition known as pernicious anemia there seems to be a deficiency of the total number of red blood cells. A lessened number of cells may be due to the fact that they are being destroyed too rapidly or to the fact that they are not being created sufficiently rapidly and in sufficient quantities.

In the condition known as pernicious anemia their number decreases so rapidly and stays decreased so certainly that serious condition occur affecting life itself. The number of red blood cells may fall to 1,000,000 or 1,200,000, instead of the four to 5,000,000 that represents the normal.

One of the greatest discoveries of recent times was the development of the knowledge that the liver contains a substance, which has the specific power of raising the number of red blood cells, apparently by stimulating the production of red cells in the places in the body where they are produced, notably in the bone marrow. Concentrated extracts have been developed which cause rapid formation of cells and which give the possibility of life instead of the formerly fatal result.

Continued investigation now shows that there are substances also in the wall of the stomach and in the muscles which have this specific power. It is obvious that only the very forefront of this unknown land has been invaded. Much more needs to be known as to the nature of the red blood cell, its method of formation, the materials from which it is formed, the factors governing its formation, growth and destruction.

The substances used are gross compounds which must be analyzed down to their fundamental ingredients. Whereas one began by eating tremendous quantities of raw liver, one may now take a concentrated power. It seems possible that the time will come when the active principle of this powder will be isolated in the shape of some chemical element.

The red blood cells perhaps have something to do with the ability of the body to resist the germs of disease. Certainly they can be sensitized in such a way that they will clump together or dissolve when certain substances of bacterial or chemical nature are injected into the body.

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"Dope" Queen Under Arrest

EL PASO, Aug. 13. (AP)—Ignacia Juarez De Gonzalez, known in Juarez as "El Nacha" and morphine queen of the border city, was arrested last night after an investigation by Feliciano Anaya, Juarez secret service agent.

American narcotic agents had been watching her many months in connection with alleged narcotic activities. When arrested the woman had 20 grains of morphine in her possession, Anaya said.

She is the wife of "El Pablito," known as the morphine king of Juarez. She was charged with trafficking in drugs in the Juarez federal court.

Anaya said the woman was back of the drug smuggling operations around El Paso and that she was one of the leaders in the Juarez dope ring.

She was seen frequently crossing the Santa Fe street bridge to El Paso and American officers searched her car thoroughly a number of times but were never able to find narcotics.

Following the death of her husband, Mrs. Spencer went to Washington to reside with her only sister. Since that time she had often visited Lubbock and expressed a desire to be buried on the prairie which she regarded as home.

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Slaughter of 1500 Reported

Red Attack Believed Part of Well Coordinated Movement to Overthrow Foreigners and Form Soviet Regime

SHANGHAI, Aug. 13. (AP)—Estimates indicating 1,500 persons were slaughtered during the sacking of Changsha and reports charging the red attack was part of a well coordinated, revolutionary movement to oust foreigners, overthrow the government and establish a soviet regime throughout China, reached here today.

Investigators reported they were convinced after reading communist newspapers found in Changsha that the red movement in south central China was a well planned campaign, with apparently isolated communist groups really working under a central command.

The communist goal as the investigators saw it was the overthrow of all foreign influence, destruction of the nationalist government, downfall of the Chinese military, and the establishment of a soviet regime, and establishment of Soviet rule throughout the country.

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Brownfield Doctor Released On Bond

Accused of having sold 30 quart-grains of morphine to satisfy drug addiction, Dr. H. H. Hughes of Brownfield was arrested Tuesday afternoon by federal agents and charged with violation of section 2 of the amended Harrison narcotic law.

The charge was filed before Victor Lindsey, United States commissioner, of Lubbock. Dr. Hughes evaded jail by posting bond of \$2,000 soon after his arrest. He is scheduled to appear at the November term of federal court. Officer charged that he sold morphine to satisfy addiction, rather than in the course of legitimate medical practice.

Cotton Activity Develops
In Cotton Market

Cotton

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 13. (AP)—The cotton market developed fair activity in today's trading but the price was downward and October broke through the 12 cent line to a new low level for the present movement as well as in the life of that option. Liverpool cables were much better than due but prices here showed opening gains of only 1 to 4 points and soon lost 3 points on some realizing. After the weekly weather crop summary was issued, prices declined to losses from the early highs of 3 points.

The market continued to ease off in the late trading making new lows 33 points under the early highs and after recovering 3 points at the end on covering closed steady at net declines for the day of 17 to 18 points.

Liverpool Better
Liverpool came in 7 to 9 points better than due after easing off 3 points the local market fell on the absence of adequate rains in the south and October advanced to 12.22 and December to 12.43 or 11 to 13 points up from the early lows.

After the weekly weather report was issued the market weakened on a search interpretation of it and October declined to 11.94 and December to 12.14, down 20 points from the highs.

The market made new lows in the late trading at 11.90 for October and 12.10 for December, or 33 points below the early highs. There was a slight rally for 3 points at the end and October closed 18 points net lower and December 17 net lower.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Aug. 13. (AP)—Cotton was lower today, with all most of the making new low ground for the movement under heavy liquidation and rather more aggressive selling which was said to have come partly from Wall Street and western sources.

The failure of the weather report in the weekly report of the weather bureau, which was more buying together with the weakness of grain, seemed to stimulate the selling. New October contracts broke to 11.90 or 11.92, with the general market closing 17 to 18 points net declines of 17 to 18 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 3 points to a decline of 2 points.

Steel, which sold down to 133 1/2.

The commodities finally settled into a slump. October cotton sold well below 12 cents for the first time in four years after publication of the weekly weather report and the market closed only moderately above the bottom at net declines of 17 to 18 points.
