(By Associated Press) **FELTS FIELD, SPOKANE, Sept. 22.**—Failure tonight met the efforts of Eddie Stinson of Detroit, and C. A. "Duke" Schiller of Windsor, in their projected non-stop trans-continental air derby from New York to Spokane.

Stinson was forced down at Missoula, Mont., by a broken engine and a stuck valve. He was persuaded from continuing in the plane by Fred Koerber, his mechanic, who said it would be dangerous. Stinson finished the flight in the plane of R. A. Duke of Pittsburgh, landing early tonight at the airport.

MARINES STAVE OFF ATTEMPTED RAID IN NICARAGUA

TOWNS PILLAGED

TWELVE OF NATIVES WOUNDED IN BATTLE AT TELPANECA

(By Associated Press) **MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Sept. 22.**—Bandits who again attacked the garrison of the United States and Nicaraguan constabulary at Telpaneca last night were repulsed after two hours of fighting with the loss of twelve wounded. There were no casualties among the marines or constabulary men.

Bandits also attacked the ungarri-soned towns of Sahlin and Quetzaltenango, pillaging and robbing.

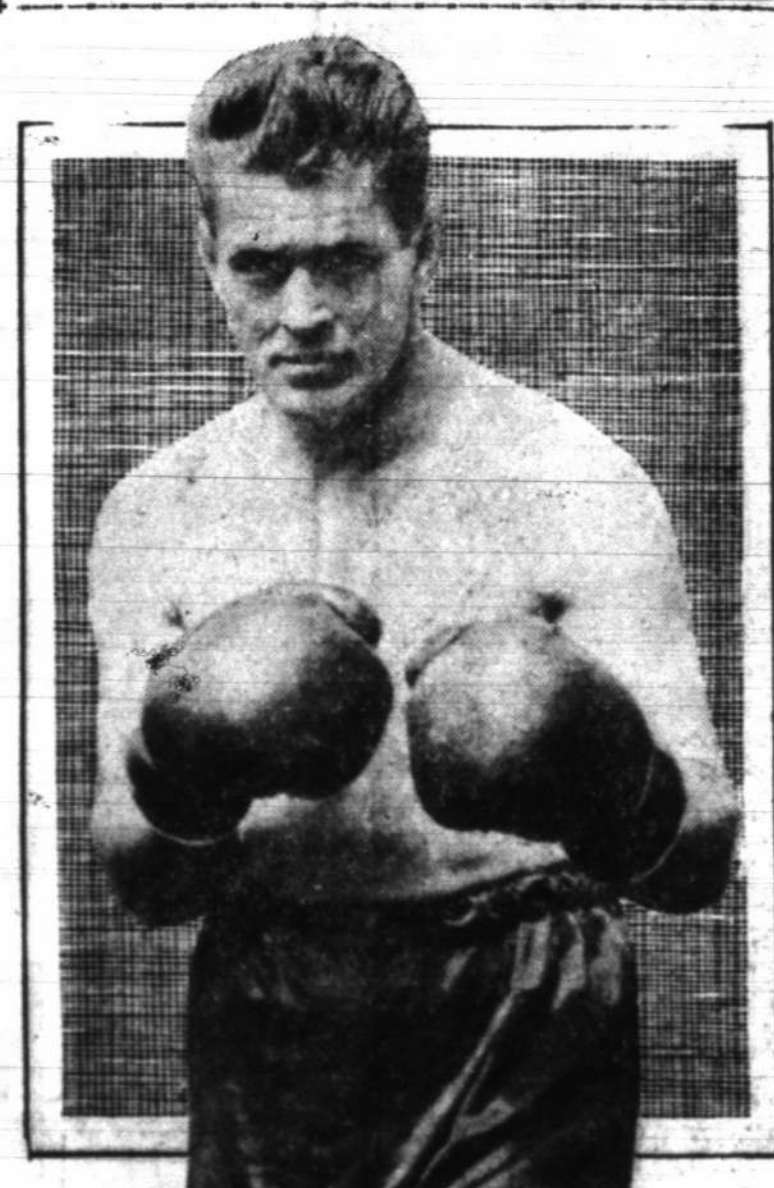

LOCATION MYSTERY

CARRIED BUNDLE OF LETTERS DESTINED FOR DEMPSEY

(By Associated Press) **HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Sept. 22.**—The whereabouts of the airplane "Spirit of Hollywood" in which Miss Marion Mack, picture actress, left Clover field, Santa Monica, yesterday, with a bundle of congratulations from the film colony to Jack Dempsey in Chicago remained a mystery today.

No word definitely locating the plane had been received since Captain Frank Tommick, army air corps reserve officer, piloted the plane off the field at 5:23 a. m.

The plane had got away cleanly enough on its third start, but over the Hudson river near Hastings, N. Y., engine trouble caused the fliers to turn back. To make landing easier it was decided to dump the heavy load of gasoline. The dump valves were opened and 300 gallons were allowed to drip. Wind blew the fumes back into the cockpit.

SIX YEAR TERM FOR OIL FRAUD

FRANK E. WOOD PLEADS GUILTY; ALSO IS FINED \$10,000

(By the Associated Press) **LOS ANGELES, Sept. 22.**—Frank Wood of Muskogee, Okla., today pleaded guilty in federal court to eleven counts of using the mails to defraud and was sentenced to serve six years in the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas. He was also fined \$10,000, payable immediately.

Three other defendants who were associates of Wood in the promotion of the Invader Oil syndicate schemes in Oklahoma and Texas also pleaded guilty and were sentenced to serve a year and a day each in an unnamed federal prison. The sentences of these three were suspended for two years. They were J. L. Nourse and L. C. Boyd, also of Muskogee, and E. S. Ogilvy, of Chicago.

Wood also was ordered to turn over all of the properties of the Invader oil promotions to trustees who were to be named later. He was sentenced to serve two years on each of the eleven counts, but with the sentences on the first three counts to run consecutively and those on the remainder concurrently, making a total of 6 years.

CHAMPION BACK IN GREAT RALLY AT THE FINISH

FLOORED IN SEVENTH GENE MAKES PLUCKY FINAL STAND

WINS BY DECISION

DEMPSEY FLASHES IN OLD FORM ONLY AT INTERVALS

SOLDIER FIELD, CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—Gene Tunney, the man of destiny, is still heavyweight champion of the world but his crown was perilously close to being toppled from his head tonight by the gallant thrust of the old warrior, Jack Dempsey, in the greatest boxing spectacle of all times.

Tunney's hand was raised in victory at the end of a slashing, smashing battle but only because he had the courage and fighting power for a sensational finish after being knocked down for a count of nine in the seventh round by Dempsey's vicious two-handed attack.

Only one second, this seventh round, separated Dempsey from the greatest victory of his career, and an achievement no other ex-champion had ever recorded, but Tunney, back on his feet, slipped from range, cleared his head and weathered an vicious assault as he has ever experienced.

Strong Towards End.

Safely past that crisis, Tunney finished the last three rounds like a champion, regaining confidence, taking the aggressive and beating Dempsey into defeat with a two-handed, well-timed attack to the head. With his title in danger, Tunney had the stuff to put on a victorious rally. At the close of the final round, Dempsey, both exhausted and badly bleeding, was groggy and reeling, "out on his feet." So battered was the old champion, his last hours expended, that he did not seem to know the battle was over and had to be led to his corner.

Tunney's victory was not without its dispute, however, for there were scores in the ringside sections who thought the champion was moved from losing his crown in the seventh round by a count that was actually "seven" seconds longer than the toll of nine.

A "Long Count"

It was unquestionably a "long count"—from 13 to 14 seconds in all—to take the varying count of ringside observers—but its explanation lay in the fact that Illinois boxing rules compelled the fighter to count the knockdown to go to his corner before the count starts. The time elapsing during Dempsey's backing off to a corner accounted for the late start of the count, boxing commissioners explained.

Tunney took the count with his left hand holding the ropes. He was groggy, and in bad shape but fully conscious of the count. Had it started sooner the probability would have been able to regain his feet but he might have been weakened and an easier target. As it was, he had the advantage of the count, seconds added rest, a chance to collect his faculties and ward off Dempsey's attack.

Crowd Of 150,000

The mightiest throng in fight or sporting history, estimated at 150,000, paid the record-smashing sum of \$2,500,000 to see the heavyweight ex-marine weather the spectacular challenge of the old master and to defeat, as convincingly if not as decisively, the man from whom Gene took the crown a year ago in the rain at Philadelphia.

Victory unquestionably went to the better man, the craftier boxer, the faster and stronger fighter, but was his only after the closest call he has ever had.

The drama of Tunney's title defense, ending as it was his dominion, was enacted so masterfully in that seventh round. For it was here that the flashing old fighter's spirit of Dempsey, making his greatest bid, came so close to accomplishing the unprecedented.

Through the first half of the battle Tunney fought coolly and cautiously, shooting only when he saw his target and shooting accurately, while Dempsey always going in, found himself brought so close after time by joining rights to the head of Tunney left jab.

NEW HEAD LEGION WAS HERO IN WAR

SPAFFORD WAS COMMANDER OF DESTROYER THAT SANK U-BOAT

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Edward H. Spafford, who was chosen national commander today of the American Legion at the Paris convention, is the first navy man to head the veterans' organization.

Spafford is attached to the law firm of Fischer and Stigman, of this city. He was graduated from the U. S. Naval academy with honors and rose to the rank of lieutenant commander, but resigned his commission in 1924. At the outbreak of the war he reentered the service and commanded a destroyer, sinking a U-boat.

Spafford became commander of the New York state department of the American Legion in 1922 and held that office for one year. Subsequently he served as chairman of the national naval affairs committee and in 1924 met Senator Smith in a debate over the then pending soldiers' bonus legislation.

He was born in Springfield, Vermont, in 1878 and made a record in scholarship and athletics at the Springfield schools. After he had graduated from the naval academy, he refused appointment to the staff of Admiral Fighting Bob Evans, who led the United States fleet on a world cruise, when Roosevelt was president, because his duty was for a sea voyage.

After his retirement from the navy he began the study of law at Columbia university, but his work was interrupted by the outbreak of the World War. In July 1918 he was assigned to a destroyer which targeted and sank a German U-boat in the Strait of Gibraltar.

At the outbreak of the World War Spafford was commander of Company L of the Louisiana national guard which was federalized in 1917. Rum-Running Dives In Bahamas Make Old "Wild West" Look Tame

This article concludes a series in which Rodney Dutcher has described the bitter warfare along the Florida coast between the U. S. Coast Guard and rum runners.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22.—Some of the wildest, wickedest "hell-holes" on this hemisphere have sprung up in the West Indies since the first rum-runner established a base there for operations to the Florida coast.

The rum-runners who smuggle liquor into Florida and who inhabit the little Bahama villages where the stuff is loaded on board are, for the most part, the most lawless of characters, according to the description of the Coast Guard, which has captured quite a few of them in the course of 100 seizures made in Florida waters since February.

Exiles From U. S.

Many criminals who would not dare appear in some sections of the United States inhabit the smugglers' nests.

The headquarters of these bands are located in some of the islands of the Bahamas group lying nearest the Florida coast.

The notorious Gun Cay, which is about a mile long and very narrow, lies less than seven miles south of South Bimini Island. Small boats can find good shelter within the bay by passing around the southern end. Gun Cay is only six miles southeast of Miami.

Another rum-runners' nest is the Cat Cays, two narrow wooded islets some 40 feet high separated by a small channel and about four miles southeast of Gun Cay.

NEW HEAD LEGION WAS HERO IN WAR

SPAFFORD WAS COMMANDER OF DESTROYER THAT SANK U-BOAT.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Edward Elwell Spafford, who was decorated with the Legion of Merit by the American Legion at its Paris convention, is the first navy man to head the veterans' organization. Spafford is attached to the law firm of Fisher and Strahan, of this city. He was graduated from the U. S. Naval academy at Annapolis and rose to the rank of lieutenant commander, but resigned his commission in 1924. At the outbreak of the war he re-entered the service and commanded a destroyer over the Atlantic. He won the Distinguished Service Medal.

Spafford became commander of the New York state department of the American Legion in 1922 and held that office for one year. Subsequently he served as chairman of the national naval affairs committee and in 1924 met Senator Borah in a debate over the ethics of the navy's bonus legislation. He was born in Springfield, Vermont, in 1878 and made a record in scholarship and athletics at the Springfield schools. After he had graduated from the naval academy he was appointed to the staff of Admiral F. D. Evans, who led the United States fleet on a world cruise when Roosevelt was president, because his duty was for active service.

After his retirement from the navy he began the study of law at Columbia university but forsook his course at the outbreak of the World War. In July, 1918, his war record shows, he was in command of a destroyer which torpedoed and sank a German U-boat in the Strait of Gibraltar, in the Mediterranean sea.

VICE COMMANDER SERVED DURING FLOOD.

SHREVEPORT, Sept. 22.—Daniel W. Sparlock, of Shreveport, elected a national vice commander of the American Legion at Paris, has just completed a year's service as department commander of the state of Louisiana being commanded during

the floods of the summer in which Sparlock was promoted to major and assigned to command of the 42nd machine gun battalion. Later he was promoted to lieutenant colonel and after the armistice was assigned to the 23rd infantry of the second division.
