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Kansas Norther Needed to Send Doves To Texas

All Texas dove hunters need now is a good norther in Kansas. This is the information from H. D. Dodge, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, who has made a personal check on the North Zone dove scarcity.

Slight weather changes in Kansas already have been responsible for some improvement in the shooting condition around Lake Texoma, especially in cut-over grain fields, according to reports.

"I talked by phone to officials in Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas, and Nebraska recently," said the Secretary, "and they reported on the bird situation in their states. Oklahoma officials say the bird shooting there is embarrassing.

Arkansas has a normal supply of doves, and hunters there are having a fair shot, Kansas and Nebraska officials reported plenty of doves still can be found all across those two states.

"This abundance of birds in those states means that when the cold weather moves into that area, Texas should get a big share of the birds as they migrate south," continued the game official. "I expect these flights should begin pouring into the State shortly after Oct. 1. Officials in Kansas and Nebraska said they have had some cool weather already but the birds are still hanging on.

"Hunters in some areas of the State have been very disillusioned because of the lack of doves. This report of large numbers of birds north of us should brighten the outlook for some good hunting yet in these areas. To get to where they will be going, the birds must cross Texas."

The Ranger College Bulldogs won their first big game of the season and their first conference game by defeating the Cisco Junior College Wranglers in the first Peanut Bowl game held in Eastland Saturday night.

When players of the Cisco team were asked their opinion of the game Friday, they replied, "We can't wait for Saturday night."

Certified Seeds Save Farmers Much Trouble

Texas farmers are very likely planting more weeds when sowing small grains as wheat and oats, surveys reveal. "Don't plant future headaches for yourself by relying on untested seed," says R. J. Hodges, Extension Service Agronomist.

"Texas registered or Texas certified seed is the best investment you can make in insuring yourself of varietal purity," Hodges said. A survey of the quality of seed, farmers planted in Deaf Smith, Hamford, Ochiltree and Lipscomb counties made by the Texas Agriculture Extension Service came up with these findings:

1. Too few Texas farmers are planting the recommended varieties of wheat.
2. Farmers are planting too much weeds with their seed including such noxious weeds as blueweed and goatgrass. A few farmers were planting bind weeds.
3. Wheat growers in the four counties tend to use their own seed for planting.

"We recommend that growers use certified seed of a recommended variety. If a farmer has clean, fertile land, can harvest without the danger of mechanical mixtures and has ideal storage conditions, he may be safe in planting a few acres of certified seed each year for seed purposes," Hodges said. "Not all farmers have the conditions to grow good planting seed," cautioned Hodges.

Similar surveys in Oklahoma and South Carolina showed that farmers in those states, too, do not place enough emphasis on quality seed. In fact, 83 percent of the South Carolina farmers whose seed was sampled had no idea what percent of their seed would germinate, and several were actually planting the costliest of all seeds—that with 0 percent germination.

"This type of seed costs less to buy than certified seed. But in the end, it is the most expensive seed a farmer can purchase," Hodges said.

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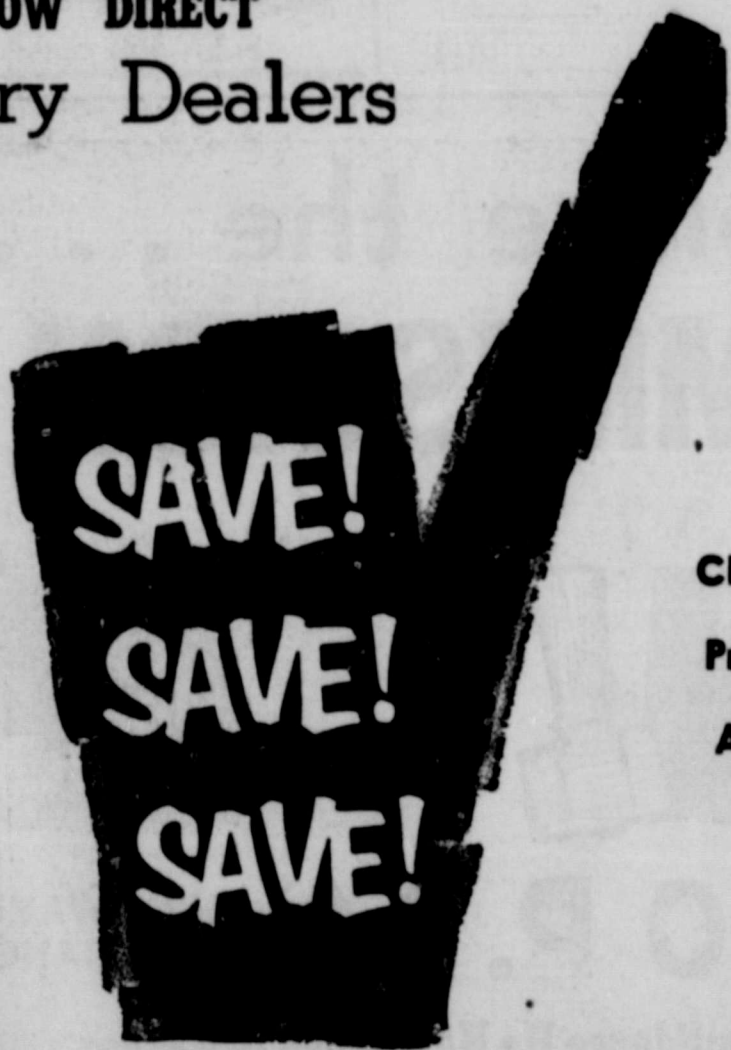
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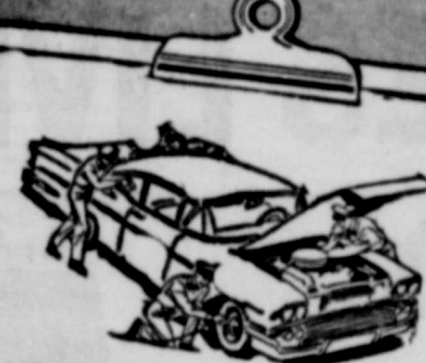
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Chassis Redesign Proven Feature of New Chevy Truck

Refinements in the highly successful chassis design introduced a year ago, further expansion of models, and styling identification changes mark the Chevrolet truck line for 1961, on display at Anderson Chevrolet Co. in Ranger.

"The wide acceptance of our 1960 chassis redesign, featuring independent front suspension with torsion bar springing and significant innovations in rear suspensions, confirms our conviction that truck owners approve extensive design changes which translate into economic benefits for them," James E. Conlan, assistant general sales manager for Chevrolet trucks, said.

"This highly successful design is continued in our 1961 trucks, with evolutionary refinements throughout the line to enhance the ride, handling, durability, comfort, and handling efficiency," he added.

Included in the 1961 line are three new 4-wheel drive models for light-duty, maximum traction application. The 127-inch wheelbase, 1/2-ton vehicles are available as cab-chassis, wide-box pickup and conventional box pickup models rated from 4900 to 5600 pounds gross vehicle weight.

All Chevrolet 4-wheel drive units for 1961 feature a new 10-inch diameter clutch, standard 3-speed transmission, and 7.10 by 15-inch tires on the 1/2-ton models. Thus equipped, they meet the majority of light-duty, maximum traction requirements.

Identifying styling refinements for all except tilt-cab models highlight a new front appearance, new group classification nomenclature and new seat trim design. Eight new exterior colors are offered buyers in addition to the seven previously available.

Higher net engine power, fast warmup, and increased economy result from a new, optional temperature-controlled hydraulic fan drive for light-duty models with the V8 engine. The fan is disengaged unless it is actually required by radiator air temperature.

In line with truck industry interest in problems of exhaust emissions in areas of high vehicle concentration or unfavorable climatic conditions, Chevrolet will offer an optional crankcase ventilating system. It will duct unburned hydrocarbons from the crankcase to the inlet manifold where they are funneled into the combustion chamber and burned with the fuel mixture.

I GIVE YOU TEXAS

One of the "landmarks" of Fort Worth when I moved there in 1931 was a thin, gray-mustached man, who could remember seeing the race between the Robert E. Lee and the Natchez. (I came into the Star-Telegram office and pounded out a feature story but the city editor informed me that the man had been written up seven times already.)

Then there was an elderly former State Senator who, in his youth, had lived in Breckenridge at the time that Sam Bass and his gang, on the dodge, were reported to be hiding out in Stephens County. The youth joined a posse which set out to capture the outlaws. (They did not succeed.)

Another Fort Worth citizen was portly and middle-aged. He had served as commissioner of Indian affairs and had been a member of the Texas delegation to the 1912 Democratic national convention in Baltimore. The delegation became known as "Immortal Forty" because of its unflinching support of Woodrow Wilson, who, at one time, seemed destined to lose to Champ Clark but emerged as the nominee.

There was a frail man who was a veteran of the Spanish-American War. He related (and I

wrote the story for the paper) that he climbed to the mast of a warship and, from his perch, he could see a Spanish battle vessel which was over the rim of the horizon to those below him. As the gunners fired, he would signal that the miss was to the right or left, or that it was short, and so the sights were adjusted until hits were made and the vessel was knocked out.

He was probably the first man in history to guide the firing of cannon at an unseen target. At that time of the interview, he was operating a little stand, in the lobby of an office building, where he sharpened old razor-blades.

Then there was a man in the 1930's who attended sessions of the City Council and almost always he spoke, and with great volence. No one understood what he was talking about, probably not even himself, but at least his some of the council members sometimes—never did any harm.

A familiar sight was a big man with cascade of whiskers. He was Commodore Hatfield, who later navigated the Trinity—in fact, he guided his boat all the way to the Mississippi and on to Chicago and back to Fort Worth, a fact which made him Admiral of the Trinity. This voyage was made to publicize the proposed canalization of the Trinity—which, by the way, still has not been done.

A man who had held a responsible government position for many years wrote poems in his spare time and, after he retired, he spent hours each day in the

Public Library, writing. Sometimes, in five minutes, he would write a poem about one of the others in the reading room. He composed more than 12,000 poems, of which perhaps 12 were published.

Yes, Fort Worth has changed greatly since that April day of 1931 that I arrived. The "landmarks" have all disappeared.

How's that? Did you say that I am a landmark?

Leaflet Prepared On Control of Household Pests

It is next to impossible to observe a home and its surroundings without finding some form of insect life. This is not strange because insects and related species constitute the largest number of animals found in the world.

Some insects feed on fabrics, contaminated food, attack dwellings, bite humans, carry diseases, cause secondary infections and make themselves generally obnoxious. On the other hand, some insects are very beneficial to mankind. But, generally the control of insects in and around the household is a very real problem, says C. F. Garner, extension entomologist at College Station.

Certain pests may be found and controlled outside, but some live entirely within the home. The only way to control these household pests is to apply insecticides, either sprays or dusts, inside the home, Garner continues. Fumigation is seldom necessary, but in case it is, the homeowner should rely on a professional exterminator.

Chemical control should be supplemented with sanitation—a good housekeeping if it is to do its job properly. Insects live in cracks, under bits of wood and other debris, in the walls and beneath the floors of homes, and in almost any dark, quiet place. Hiding places such as these should be cleaned, but even the most spotless homes may occasionally become infested.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service has prepared a leaflet, L-311 "Texas Guide for Controlling Household Insects," which contains the latest recommended controls for 24 pests. In addition to the controls, the leaflet contains a section on insecticidal formulation and one on equipment needed for application. A copy of this guide may be obtained from the local county agent.

Another important section of this leaflet is a list of cautions. Garner says that anyone using insecticides should read, learn and observe the do's and don'ts contained in this list.

"Remember, he concludes, 'insecticides are poisonous to species other than insects.'"

Oyster Reefs Improved By Dredging

Oyster dredging in San Antonio and Mesquite bays has been restored under regulation of the Game and Fish Commission, it has been announced by Howard Lee, director of marine fisheries. It is now lawful to use dredges in these bays, under a proclamation effective September 1. Dredging had been closed in these areas under authority of the Commission for the protection and improvement of the oyster reefs.

Lee also issued a report covering the catch of drumfish in Laguna Madre in Cameron and Willacy counties for the past season, which ended in May. Commercial netting is permitted in these waters only under contract.

During the fishing period, which began in December, 16 contractors took 516,353 pounds of fish, in a total of 997 man-days of netting.

Persons desiring contracts for drum fishing in the waters of the lower Laguna Madre, must apply to the Marine Laboratory at Rockport for permits. They also must be able to post \$1000 bond, conditioned upon faithful performance of the contract regarding regulations, reports, etc.

No fishing other than black drum will be permitted on equipment operating under this contract and a record of all catches must be kept.

Stored Grains Need Attention

Grains cannot be stored and then forgotten. Insects such as the rice weevil and Angoumois grain moth may infest the grain in the field, and infested grain may be brought into storage. C. P. Garner and R. L. Ridgway, extension entomologists, say that fumigation is the best protection against insect damage to stored grain.

Several fumigants are effective for killing stored grain insects, the specialists continue. They are formulated as various combinations, and are sold by companies under different trade names.

When applying liquid fumigants, the storer should be careful to spray the entire surface of the grain. Fumigant application may be accomplished with hand pump sprayer for small quantities of grain, or with some form of power operated sprayer for larger amounts. The bin should be closed

after the fumigant is applied, and it should not be opened for at least 24 hours—preferably 4 or 5 days. As a safety precaution, at least two men should be present when the fumigants are being applied, the specialists continue.

Garner and Ridgway suggest that anyone planning fumigation contact the local county agent. He can supply specific information for the particular situation, and he can also offer valuable suggestions and advice.

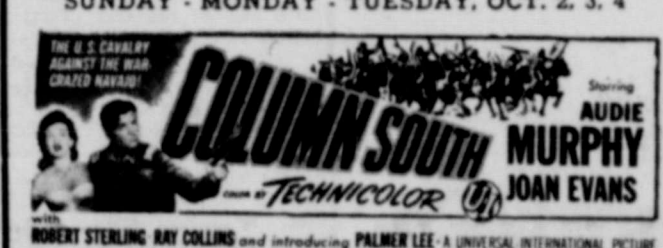

further, crawling up under the house looking for eggs than any of them ever have."

A candidate for sheriff in a West Texas county, many years ago, promised that his first act would be to fire the deputies that the incumbent had. The candidate declared, "Them fellows officers! They couldn't track an elephant through the snow."

Squeaky floors are not the results of overactive spooks in our homes. But regardless of the cause, a squeaky floor is a nuisance. Fortunately, it can generally be eliminated.

The squeaking of wooden floors is caused by the rubbing of the tongue of one strip of flooring in the groove of the adjoining strip. Floors will squeak if the floor joists and sub-floor foundations are not straight and anchored tightly. A slight deflection can be sufficient to cause movement between the tongue and groove joint and create squeaking.

Floor squeaks can be eliminated in several ways. Finish nails can be driven through the face of the offending flooring strips to prevent movement. These nails should be driven close to the tongue edge of the strip, through the sub-floor and, if possible, into a joist. The nails should then be set about 1-16" deep and the hole filled. Another method to control squeaking is to fasten the sub-floor to the finished flooring with screws from underneath. Often, floor squeaking can be controlled by lubricating the tongue and groove joints with small amounts of mineral oil.

The new poultry foods open up new vistas for gourmets, Beamblossom continues. And for the person

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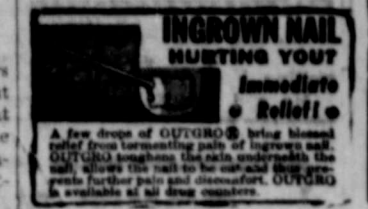
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who likes to eat but must watch his waistline, the specialist points out these foods are low in fat and high in protein.
