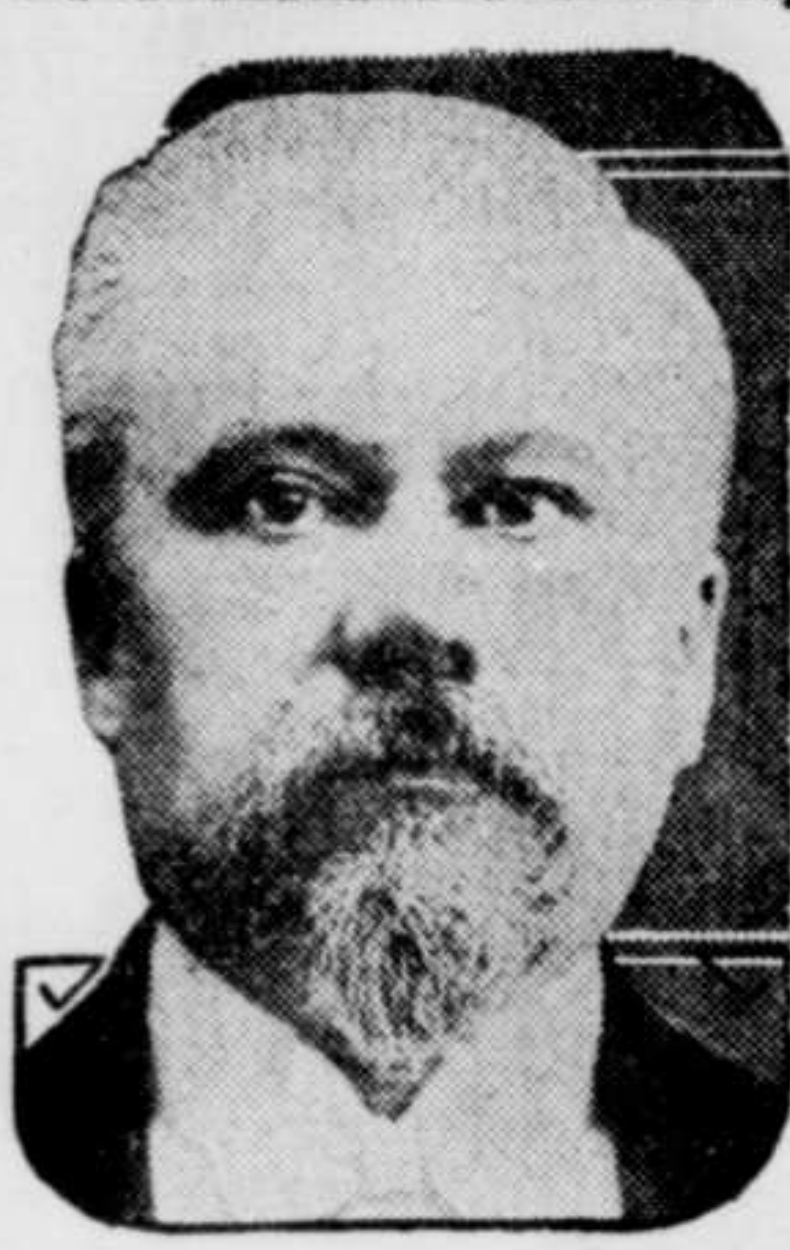

Regular Session Of Legislature Is Closed Thursday

Legislators Go Home For Thirty Days To Return In Special Session, April Fifteenth

Leave Much Work

Major Issues Are Unsettled By Deliberations Of Past Two Months; Moody Has Bills To Consider

AUSTIN, Mar. 14.—Winding up a regular session of 68 days, the 41st legislature, which took leave of Austin today, is confronted 30 days hence with an extraordinary session in which it will find itself compelled again to go over much ground covered in the period just closed.

Forced to consider appropriation bills the legislators will face the necessity of financing the highway department for the next two years; enacting some kind of legislation in an effort to rescue the penitentiary system from its ascertained chaotic and disconnected form, regulating public utilities and caring for other public exigencies.

Called Back April 15. Governor Moody, invited to address the two houses before adjournment, told the members that he would call them back after an interim of about 30 days, or on April 15.

With adjournment set for 12 o'clock noon, the hands of the clock were turned back to permit the enrolling room to complete bills it was working on so the speaker of the house and lieutenant governor could sign them. Although the hands of the legislative clock pointed to the hour of 12 when the adjournment came, it actually was 1:50 p. m.

Having lived a turbulent life the house became restless again as it waited and just before the curtain descended the handful of members who had remained at the deathbed, flared into disorder and acrimonious debate.

Hoobler Is Given Death For Murder

Jury Deals Out Sentence To Alleged Slayer Of Rich Oklahoma Farmer; Written Confession Introduced

WICHITA FALLS, Mar. 14.—D. J. Hoobler was convicted of murder and given the death penalty here tonight by a jury which tried him for the slaying here last January of Arthur Pendergraft, wealthy Oklahoma farmer.

The state introduced an alleged written confession from Hoobler, which was read in court, and saying it was obtained under duress. Hoobler pleaded that he killed Pendergraft, his employer, in self defense. After authorities had searched for the missing rancher for two weeks Hoobler led them to a desert ranch, 10 miles from here, where the body was hidden.

The jury deliberated about four hours. Hoobler showed no emotion when the verdict was read. His attorneys gave notice of appeal.

MAN'S BODY FOUND

Unidentified Man Is Found In Creek In Dallas

DALLAS, Mar. 14. (P)—The body of an unidentified man, about 60, bearing marks of violence was found in Turtle creek here today. Deep lacerations and bruises on the head led officers to believe the man had been slugged and thrown in the creek.

Robbery evidently was not the motive, as \$5 in bills was found in his pockets.

Tariff And Farm Relief To Face Special Session

Congressman Jones Ordered To Plan Legislation

ONLY two major issues, confronting the United States at this time, are to be considered by the special session of Congress, called for opening on April 15, and these are the farm and tariff questions, Congressman Marvin Jones, of Amarillo, stated upon his arrival in Lubbock yesterday afternoon.

"It is my hope that the new administration at Washington will outline a farm program of effectiveness," Congressman Jones said, "as everybody knows this problem is the source of considerable vexation on the part of farmers of the South, southwest and middle west, and needs early settlement."

Notified Of Plans

Being a member of the agriculture committee, of which Congressman Gilbert U. Haugen, of Iowa, is chairman, Mr. Jones yesterday received notification from Washington to meet with this committee on March 22, when they will get busy drafting appropriate farm legislation, this committee meeting is at the request of President Hoover.

As the author of considerable legislation affecting the agricultural and industrial development of the nation, including the investigation of new uses for cotton, the warehousing amendments, and other legislation of similar nature, coupled with his membership in the agriculture committee, Congressman Jones is familiar with farm legislation problems and farm needs of the country in general. His particular work has been valiant efforts at alleviating the south's problem of taking care of surplus cotton production.

Eaker To Carry Diplomatic Mail On Panama Hop

BROWNSVILLE, Mar. 14.—Diplomatic mail for Mexico, Guatemala, Nicaragua and Panama will be carried by Lieut. Ira Eaker, when he hops off here Saturday morning in his tiny Boeing pursuit plane for an attempted dawn-to-dusk flight to France Field, Panama.

H. J. Adamson, secretary to Truette F. Davidson, assistant secretary of war, landed here at 4:15 p. m. today to supervise details of the flight. He said the diplomatic mail would be franked by Postmaster G. W. Dunnett of Brownsville.

Adamson expects to leave tomorrow, for Puerto, Mexico, where Eaker is scheduled to make a stop for fuel on his dash to Panama. Adamson's plane will be piloted by Lieut. J. E. Upson, of Kelly Field, San Antonio.

Adamson believes Eaker's speedy ship should average 140 miles an hour on the Panama flight, even if head winds are encountered.

Search For Child In Snow Abandoned

GORDON, Neb., March 14. (P) Hope of finding six-year-old Melvin Reeves alive has been abandoned and a search by several hundred men who had pushed through a blinding snow storm for nearly 60 hours was given up tonight.

A search for his body will be made after the snow melts. The boy left the ranch, eight miles north of here, to look for a pair of lost kittens, and never returned.

ANNOUNCE BOND ISSUE

Missouri Pacific To Issue \$46,392,000 In Bonds

NEW YORK, March 14. (P)—The Missouri Pacific railroad today announced a \$46,392,000 20-year 5-1/2 per cent convertible gold bond issue, subject to approval of the Interstate Commerce Commission. This is the third piece of major railroad financing listed this week.

The Missouri Pacific bonds are part of an authorized issue limited to \$100,000,000 at any one time outstanding, and will be convertible at the holder's option after May 1, 1931, into common stock at \$100 a share.

Swollen Streams Force Residents To Top Of Houses

Appeal For Aid Is Made To Entire State As Waters Continue Rising In Town; Many Lives Endangered

TROY, Ala., Mar. 14.—Grave fears were felt tonight for the safety of the 4,000 inhabitants of Elba, Ala., 32 miles south of here, cut off from all communication late today by flood waters of Pea river and White Water creek that rose suddenly to block all means of progress.

Urgent appeals for help were received from the stricken town before telegraph and telephone communication was broken, presumably by rising waters that flooded offices.

Boats Must Reach Town

Scores of lives were endangered unless boats reached the town by midnight. A. E. Lee of Enterprise, informed local relief workers. Lee said his last reports were that water flowed through streets of Elba up to a depth of 10 feet in mid-afternoon and still was rising as the torrents came down from the water sheds of Pea river and White Water creek. Rains that poured throughout last night continued unabated here tonight, adding to the torrents feeding creeks and rivers throughout this section.

Poultry Authority Appears at Snyder

Charley Weeks Visits Scurry County Town On Air Tour Of Section; Stresses Intensified Agriculture

SNYDER, Mar. 14.—The first commercial airplane to land in the new 200 acre Snyder airport known as Yoder Field landed here today when Charles Weeks, internationally known poultry expert of Wichita Falls arrived with Pilot G. F. Ridenour. The plane was a monoplane. The Scurry county chamber of commerce met the plane at the airport and later had luncheon.

Mr. Weeks, who had been making an airplane lecture tour this week at Lubbock, Big Spring, Colorado, Snyder and Amarillo, is bearing a message to this great section of West Texas on intensified agriculture. The coming of weeks here was the result of the recent West Texas chamber of commerce motorcade to the west coast when nine Scurry county farmers inspected the famous \$5,000,000 one acre poultry tract at Owensmouth, California. Cales Garner, local farmer after closely observing the project there returned to Snyder and at the present time has under construction a poultry ranch to house 6,000 laying hens.

Jones Gives Trees To W.T.C.C. Office

STAMFORD, Mar. 14.—The young cypress trees received by the West Texas chamber of commerce from Don L. Jones, superintendent of the Lubbock Experiment Station have been planted around the office building of the regional chamber and are thriving.

The trees were seeded at the station and are now about two years old. The cypress is a tree which grows faster as it attains age, being about ten feet high at four years, and as high as forty feet at maturity. Boy Scout Workers To Meet Today For Final Drive Work

Only Half of Budget of Ten Thousand Dollars Raised; Indications Are That City Will Fall Short

Officials of the boy scout organization have issued a call to workers to meet at the city hall this morning at 9 o'clock to finish up the work connected with raising the annual budget for the organization.

An appeal to those who have not contributed and have not been solicited to mail a check to the organization has also been sent out.

Half of Budget Raised. Only about half of the \$10,000 budget has been raised, however, the workers who will meet at headquarters today, will not be expected to raise the entire remainder of the budget. About one-third of the cards carrying names of the prospective supporters have been returned unworked. These cards will be distributed to workers this morning and the committees will go out to see the prospective contributors.

Present indications are that Lubbock will fall far short of the needed budget this year unless an unexpected number of citizens respond to the appeal that is being issued to mail in checks and unless an unusual amount of money is collected by the workers today.

Debts Are Pressing. Half of the unusual large scout budget called for this year will be used to pay off debts contracted by the council in past years. Some of this debt is in the form of prepayment improvements at the scout camp called for this year. Scout officials plan to operate on a more economical basis this year, cutting down on a number of necessities, in order that the council may emerge from the year 1935 with a clear record and may not be in debt when the new year in 1936 begins.

Boren Test Is Watched Closely

Investors Expect Development From Well As Pump Is Placed; Other Drilling To Be Made

(Special to the Avalanche) SLATON, Mar. 14.—As a result of producing well being brought in three miles east of Junction, 45 miles southeast of Slaton, local investors in that area, after watching intently for something to happen there during recent weeks, are considerably excited.

This well is known as the Boren No. 4, and was drilled by the Emerald Oil company. It is located in Section 136, Block 5, Garza county. Drillers estimate it to be good for 50 to 100 barrels.

At a depth of 2,575 feet, drillers were about ready to abandon the test, when it was discovered that the well was standing several hundred feet in oil. It was decided to shoot the well before leaving it. Fifty-two minutes after the shot, oil gushed 15 feet above the derrick and flowed at that rate for several minutes.

The well is being placed under pump. Other drilling is in prospect in that vicinity now, and leases are said to be selling at good prices.

TOWN IS BOOSTER

McCAULEY, Mar. 14.—This town, a small one of three hundred population which is in Fisher county on the Orient Railroad, is located in one of the best oil fields in West Texas. Wells are producing and are being drilled in every direction from town. McCauley is also in the heart of an ideal agricultural country which produces cotton, corn and other grains.

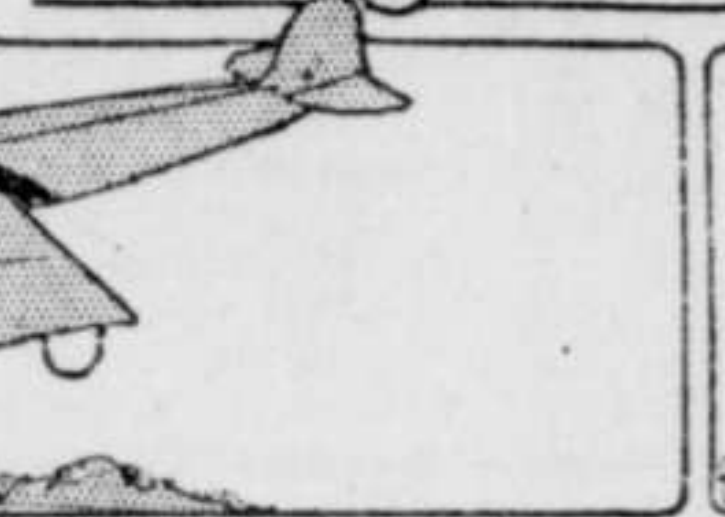
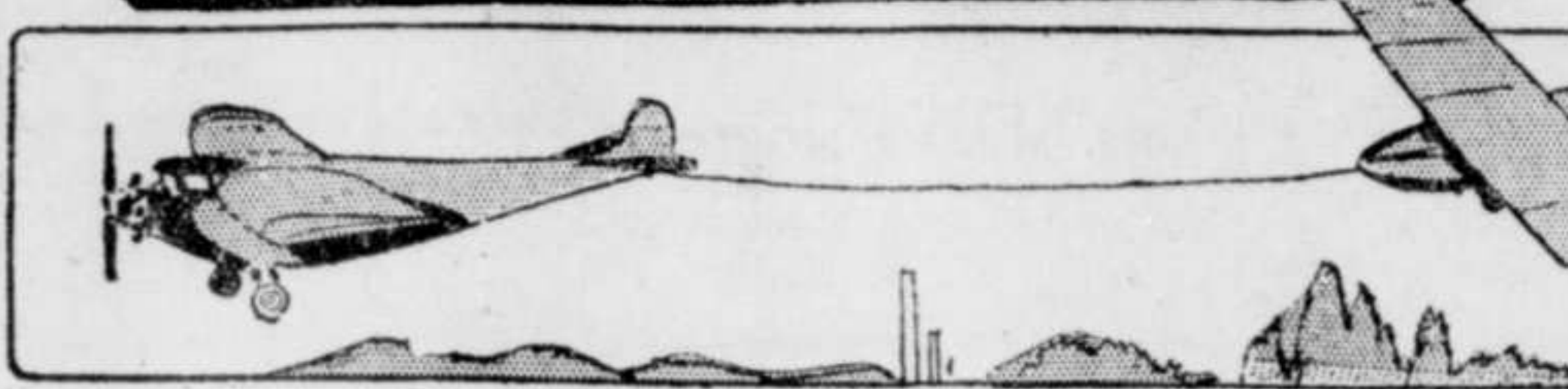
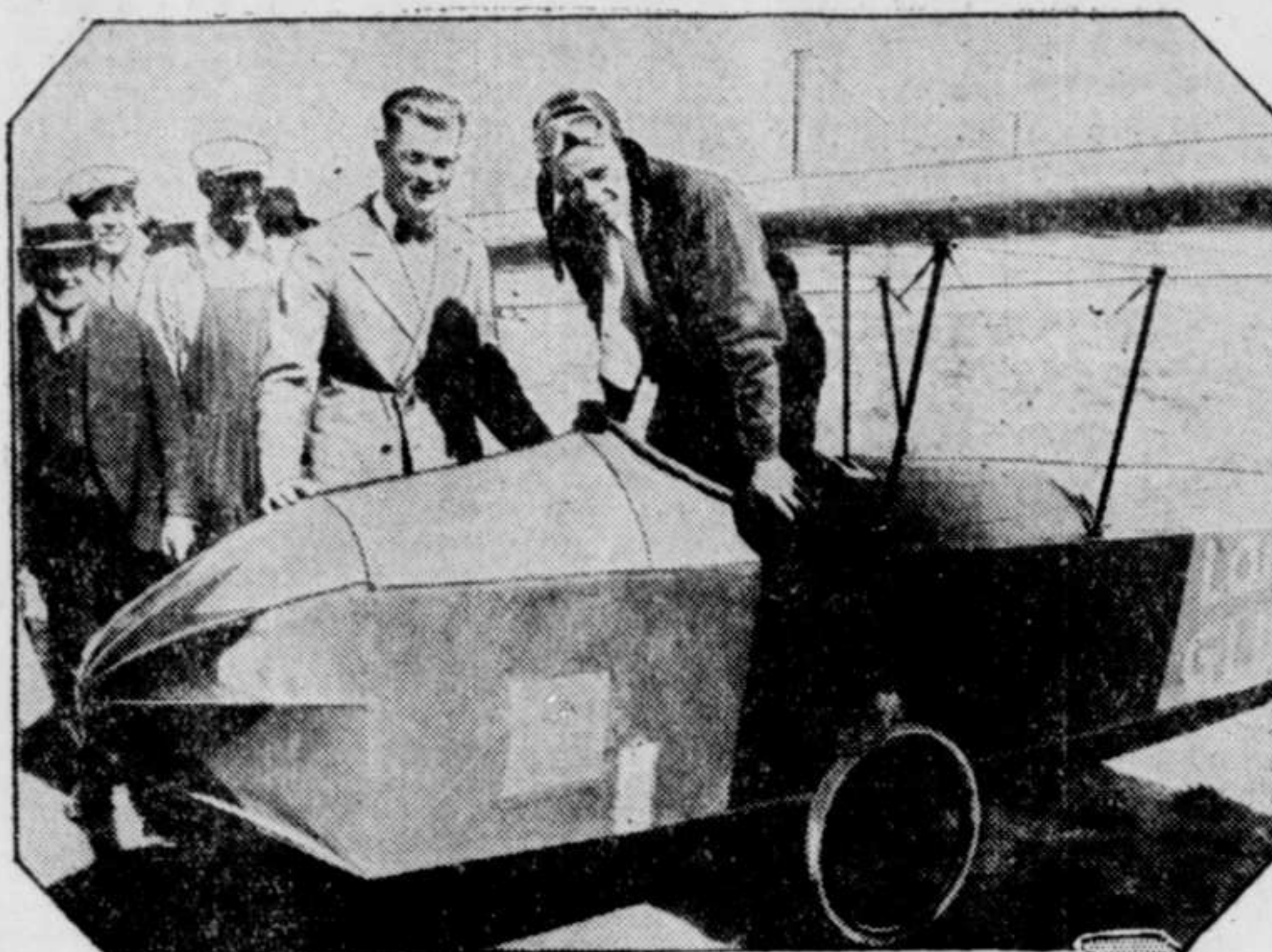

They don't need motors in airplanes any more, and these pictures prove it! At the left is Dale L. Drake emerging from his tiny motorless ship in which he was towed, at the end of a 500-foot rope, for 200 miles behind a big Fokker, piloted by Lloyd O'Donnell. O'Donnell is greeting Drake as they land at Long Beach, Calif., from Reedy, Calif.

After 175 miles they were forced down by a broken tow rope, but the rope was speedily repaired and the flight resumed. One can vision the day when there will be whole trains of airplane trailers in the sky. In the center is William H. Brown, of San Diego, Calif., inventor of the motorless "sail plane" which is seen soaring over the build-

ings at the right. This "sail plane" has a wing spread of 44 feet, is 28 feet long and weighs 150 pounds, empty. The pilot sits in the fuselage in front of and below the wing. The little plane has a gliding ratio of 20 to 1. Brown was a co-designer and builder of Colonel Lindbergh's Spirit of St. Louis and has been building gliders since 1914.

Big Spring Men To Aid Texas - Pacific Extension Of Line

Business Men Pledge Assistance To Project Into New Mexico; Shorter Haul Claimed By Route

(Special to the Avalanche)

BIG SPRING, Mar. 14.—At a meeting of the business men's club here today attention was drawn to the application on the part of the Texas and Pacific railway now pending before the Interstate Commerce commission for a permit to continue construction of their branch line out of Monahans from its present terminus to Lovington, New Mexico, this application being opposed by one on the part of the Santa Fe system for an extension of their own road from Seagraves to Lovington, New Mexico with branch south as far as Henry, New Mexico but not continuing to a junction with Texas and Pacific lines.

The point was brought out that this seventy miles of country has al-

ways been commercially tributary to the Texas and Pacific system and that the desire of its inhabitants is that it should so continue. Attention was called to the many curtailments of the Texas and Pacific trade radius during recent years and the argument advanced that it was to the interest of all towns on the Texas and Pacific system to defend the remaining opportunities.

The question is not merely that of securing tonnage to the T. and P. truck line but also that of securing to the inhabitants of Lea county, New Mexico, the shortest haul to primary markets for their commodities, which could be best offered by the Texas and Pacific. This question was discussed at the last meeting of the directors of the Big Spring chamber of commerce and decision made to offer their services as interveners in support of the Texas and Pacific extension. The project was explained in detail to the ninety members of the business men's club present and an expression of their attitude requested, and by a rising unanimous vote the club pledged its assistance to the Texas and Pacific railway in every way.

Fresh Fruits Are Essential In Diet

By NEA Service.

Climate, age and occupation are the influencing factors which should control our daily diet.

During the winter months the body has craved foods that could supply heat and the foods that do this are the starches, sugars and fats. A diet that is made up of these foods and meat without vegetables would prove inefficient and provide opportunity for disease.

Although we may have used plenty of vegetables all winter we must keep on using them while we add fresh fruits for dessert in place of pudding.

It's vitally essential that we keep in our "ration" both fresh fruits and vegetables as well as milk. This means adults as well as children. While the amount of fruit required for adults is less than that for children a pint of a day should be calculated for grown-ups. This can be used in cooking.

Fruits and vegetables are bulky and not concentrated foods. To keep "fit" we must have some material that will give the digestive tract its needed exercise. The French have called spinach "the broom of the stomach" and in the last few years we have learned that other vegetables can be substituted for spinach to good effect if this much lauded vegetable is personally obnoxious.

Vegetables and fruits are mineral-rich foods and have a distinctly tonic-like effect. It seems most interesting to know that even an iron tonic taken as medicine cannot do the good work that the iron-rich foods can do. Provided of course, the body has not been starved and actually ill from the lack of iron.

Perhaps a list of these foods so rich in iron will be convenient to have at hand to refresh our memories: spinach, cabbage, lettuce, asparagus, string-beans, celery, radishes, raisins, prunes, dates, olives, lean beef, oatmeal, eggs and whole wheat.

Vegetables and fruits keep the blood non-acid. In other words, it's wise to keep the blood as alkaline as possible by using enough fruits and vegetables to counteract the effect of meats and cereals which leave an acid ash when dumped in the body. Try to include fresh fruit in some form in two meals a day and use at least two vegetables as well as a salad in two meals.

GRAPEFRUIT AND CABBAGE SALAD

Two cups sliced cabbage.

1 large grapefruit, 1-2 cup seeded raisins, 4 tablespoons salad oil, 1 teaspoon sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, paprika, lettuce.

Let cabbage stand in cold water for 30 minutes. Drain and chill. Remove sections of grapefruit from rind and skin. Sprinkle with sugar and oil and let stand on ice for 30 minutes. Drain and add to cabbage. Plump raisins in boiling water. Drain and dry between towels. Add salt to oil and grapefruit juice and pour over cabbage and grapefruit sections. Arrange on lettuce, sprinkle with raisins and dot with paprika.

"I hear they think I am soft," said the little outfielder as he sat on the bench at the training camp and thoughtfully pounded a big catcher's glove he had been using to stop the shots of a wild young pitcher who probably soon will be kicking on umpires' decisions at Shawnee, Okla., or Scottsdale, Pa.

"May be I am not so soft as some of the critics think," he said. "It is true that since I have been a manager I have never made a practice of calling a player in front of the other players and a stand full of people. But you won't have any trouble in finding players who will tell you that if I thought I should issue a call, I have managed to do it. But the reprimands are made in private and not on the field."

Billy Southworth became a manager last year when he took charge of the playing end of one of the

eight Cardinals' farms, winning the pennant for St. Louis. He was named to command of the mother club which seems to place him as ex officio generalissimo of all the farm hands, for he is looking at 50 players daily at Avon Park. Only half of them are on the Cardinal roster.

"I like managing," he said, "and I am hopeful that we will do well. I believe we will. As I left the club such a short time ago, I know most of the players and what they can do. I have no fears that they will fail to come through with the best efforts. Everything I hear of the ones coming up is good. Of course, I know Charley Gelbert is a great ball player for I had him with me at Rochester."

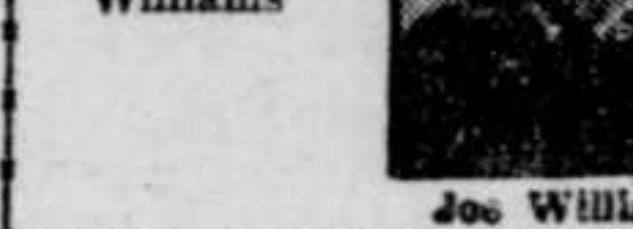

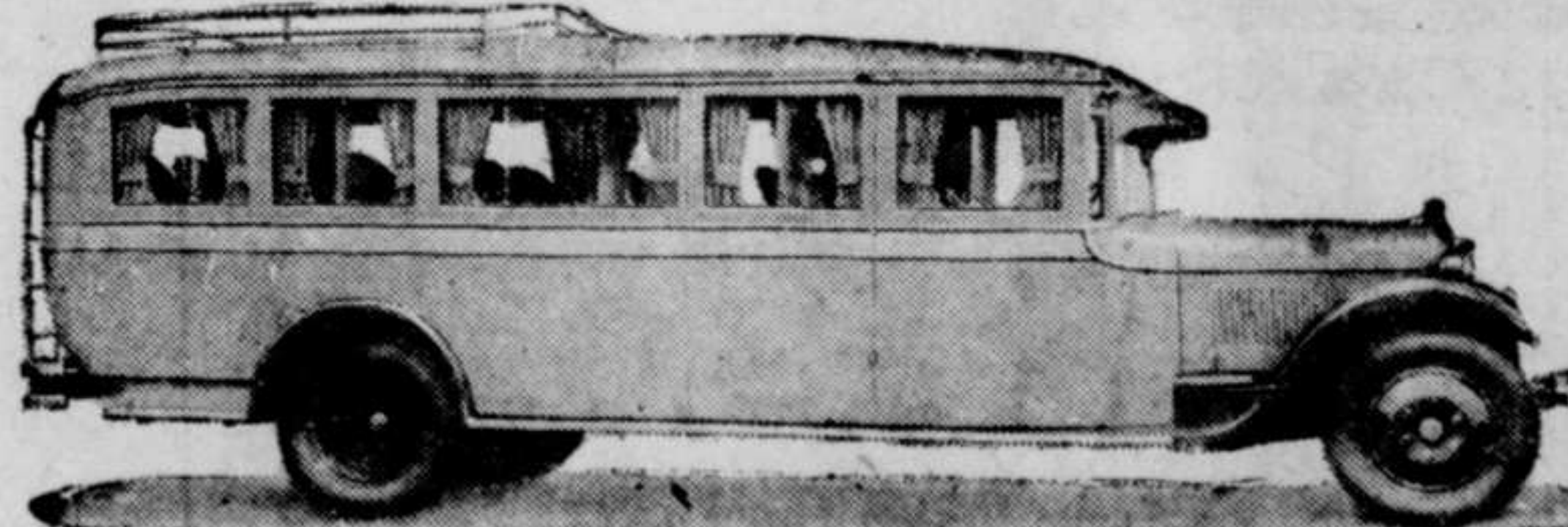

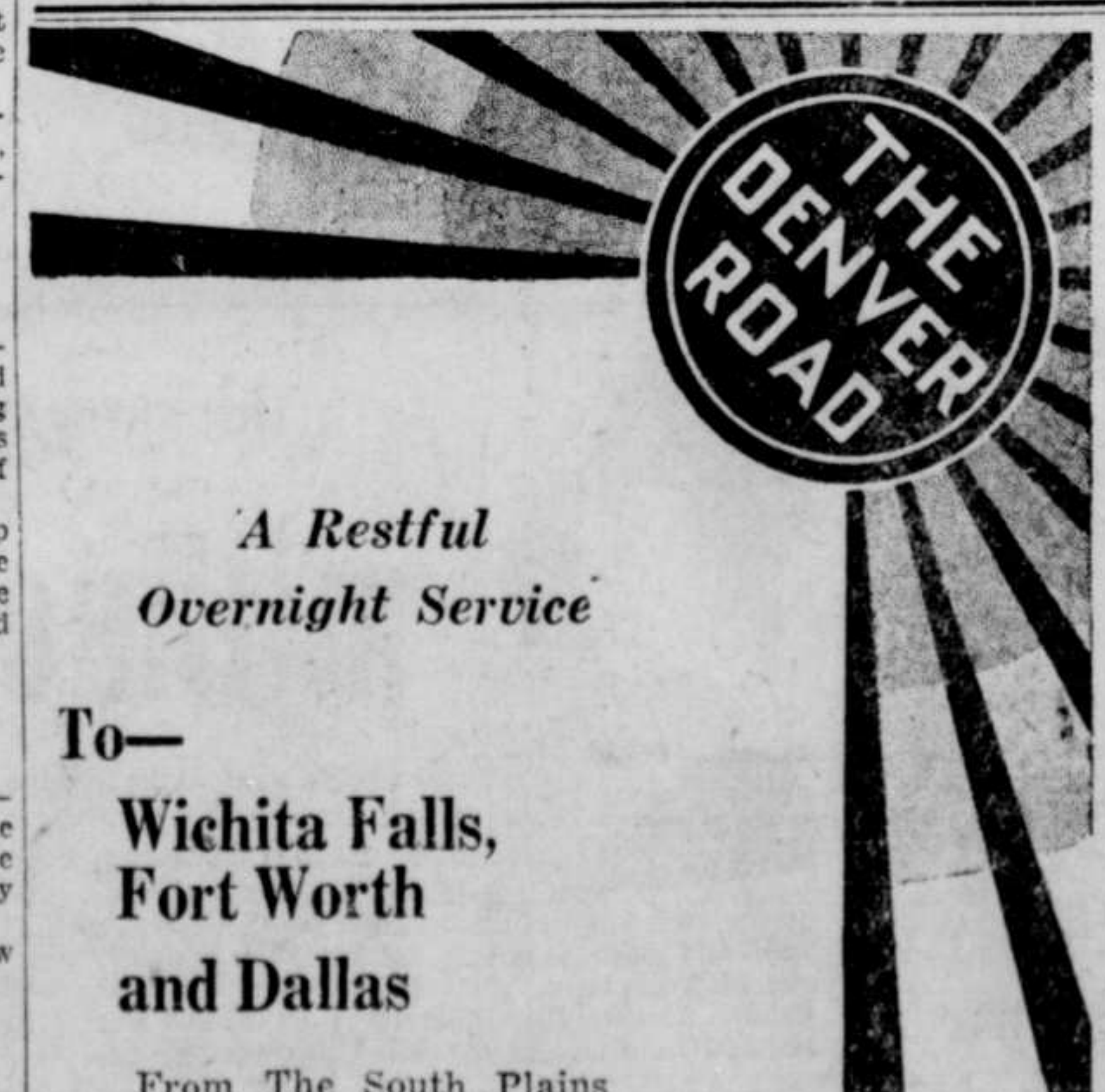

NEW YORK, Mar. 14.—Just across the river in Hoboken, comparatively young men have grown grey. For three months they have been carrying on an exhausting search. And the hunters have come home with meager quarry.

Listening as the beer mugs clink in "the last secessant of Bohemia," it is possible to hear the wistful refrain: "Fifty million fore-fathers must have been wrong!"

Otherwise would there not be a dozen damsels in this great metropolis who would have, figuratively speaking, carried on the architectural traditions of 1866?

They Don't Fit the Pattern
Believe it or not... Christopher Morley, Harry Wagstaff Gribble and Cleon "Truckerton," the three guiding geniuses of the Hoboken Theatrical Company, have inspected thousands of applicants without finding a quorum to fit that particular hour-glass pattern established by the chorines of "The Black Crook."

It all seemed comparatively easy a few months back, when a revival of "The Black Crook"—that terrible shocker of grandpa's time—was contemplated.

"But we bumped our heads against no end of difficulties," recites Morley. "First of all we found that there was practically no such thing left in the world as black cotton tights. These were essential if we were to duplicate, in any measure, the original production. We finally arranged to have them manufactured,

But then we found that those hour-glass figures had all but vanished from our midst. We had to have the tights padded in such fashion as to reproduce the shapes of the Sixties."

Chorines Don't Faint Now
Checking back over the history of the time, the producers have unearthed some interesting statistics. The chorines of today, for instance, can go through their terrific dancing routines with pep, abandon and freshness. But in the days of "The Black Crook," at least one of those Amazon ladies was certain to faint in the course of every show. The tightly corseted wasp-waists, checking the circulation, caused this, it would seem. Those huge limbed damsels of yesterday were, in fact, mere shrinking violets when compared with our modern girls.

Furthermore, the impression was obtained that the chorines of sixty years ago were more mature, more "womanly." Looking over the pictures of the performers of that day, this impression would seem to be well founded. The facts are that, because of the style of dress and the manner of wearing the hair, they looked older than the girls of 1929—but actually their years were as tender as a Ziegfeld chorus.

Mass Meeting in Protest
"The Black Crook," as your patriarchal ancestors could tell you, was the progenitor of the modern musical show. And what a commotion it caused. It was about the last word in shockery. And you'd never guess where the loudest protest came from—well, it was The Police Gazette!

It was the Rev. Charles B. Smythe, trying to save Manhattan from damnation, who left a historic picture of chorine wantonness. Calling a mass meeting in Cooper Union hall, he related to 3,000 persons what he had personally observed upon attending a performance—purely in the interest of uplift, you understand.

"It is the immodest dress of the girls which first strikes the eye," said he. "They have short skirts and garments of thin gauze-like material. Parrish Honored In Senate Voting

Lubbock Senator Nominated For Office of President Pro Tem Of Senate; W.R. Cousins Gets Place

These business men will in all probability be the same workers that have several days of their time recently for this cause when only about half of the \$10,000 budget was raised.

Great service can be rendered Lubbock in the bettering of the future citizens of this city and with the exception of the schools, there are few, if any, organizations that are doing better work toward than is the Boy Scout organization.

Those in charge of the scout organization are sending out an earnest appeal to all citizens interested in boys and their welfare to meet at the City Hall to help finish up the job. They are also appealing to every citizen of Lubbock to do his part toward raising the budget.

It is impossible to see every citizen. Therefore those public spirited citizens who have not been solicited may do a worthwhile service to the scouts for their part of the annual budget. Just mail the check to Boy Scouts, City Hall, Lubbock, Texas. The citizens who have already contributed of their time and money are still working. Those who have contributed neither should at least mail a check to pay a part of the budget.

TEXAS' NEW MARRIAGE LAW
In our opinion the new law concerning marriage in Texas is a forward step in the science of eugenics, and a first aid measure in behalf of future mothers, future off-spring and the general betterment of the human race. It is a law that should have been enacted long ago and even now it may be just as strong as it should be but it is an entering wedge that we are sure will mean a great deal in the future.

The law requires advance purchase of marriage licenses which gives all persons concerned an opportunity to register any objections that they might have to the marriage and show good and lawful reasons why the marriage should not be, and to take effective steps to prevent it. It is a hedge against hasty marriages. "Wedded in haste and repented at leisure" has been the case too often and this may have a tendency to correct this part of it. This feature requiring pre-announcement for some days prior to the event will cause impulsive youngsters to reflect on the seriousness of the marriage vow and the profound significance of such a bond to all after life. It will checkmate those hasty alliances based on romantic vagaries and growing out of unbridled passion. It will serve as a jolt to the unthinking thousands of youngsters who imagine that they may live on dreams and set up housekeeping with only a hammock and a lampshade.

Marriage is the holiest relationship that can exist between man and woman. It can not be entered thoughtlessly without disaster to all of life. It would be an infinitely better plan for young people to contract marriage on their knees than on a midnight auto ride. Reflection before marriage is better than detection after marriage. There would be fewer divorces for foolish causes if there were fewer marriages for foolish reasons. The binding force of the marriage vow is weakened in proportion as the seriousness is taken out of the engagement and the solemnity out of the ceremony.

SHOULD CAPITAL PUNISHMENT BE INSTITUTED?

There seems to be fewer people each year who believe in capital punishment. Some of the leading lawyers of the nation are taking the stand that it should be abolished. Clarence Darrow, one of the nation's greatest criminal lawyers, is seeking to put on a conspiracy to get the death penalty removed from the constitution of the United States. His big argument is that it works a hardship on the poorer class of people.

He contends that the rich commit crimes and are able to hire legal talent that more than equals the ordinary criminal lawyer, and save some mimes from the gallows or the electric chair.

It seems Mr. Darrow has some grounds for his contentions. He was the one who defended the famous alleged murderers, Leopold and Loeb, and we are all familiar with this case. It seemed to the general public that there was nothing for them but to hang, but their millions employed legal talent that was able to twist things around in a way that they received instead a penitentiary sentence. Now it looks like they may be at liberty before many more years, while if they had been poor their bodies likely would have been lying beneath the sod in some lonely cemetery.

It may be a long time before this will come to pass, but there is a possibility of it becoming a law in years to come, and capital punishment will be a thing of the past. The idea that capital punishment is right, may not deserve any criticism, but the argument that it inflicts greater punishment on the poor than on the rich has grounds for a logical contention, and no doubt will some day have its weight toward getting the question very thoroughly discussed to say the least of it.

COLD WAVE HELPS MINERS

It is, as the old adage says, a very ill wind that blows no good to someone.

A frightful cold wave has gripped Europe recently, causing a great amount of suffering and death. But to England it has been a blessing in disguise.

The unprecedented cold weather has caused a new demand in Europe for England's coal. Thus England's most ailing industry has been given temporary stimulation. The net gain has not been enough, to be sure, to relieve the depression in the industry as a whole, but it has enabled some mines to remain open when they otherwise would have been shut down, and it has kept a few, at least, of England's dependent miners in funds for a brief time.

A Washington Bystander

WASHINGTON IS RATHER TOUCHY REGARDING SOCIAL PRECEDENCE

ASHINGTON, March 14.—Precedence is no joke in Washington. Every official has his place in the social scheme of things. Some are not very particular about it. Others raise hob unless they get just their right seats at table, or if anybody gets through a doorway, at a party, ahead of somebody else who thinks he ought to have gone first.

Each official's wife has a place among the women, in the order of precedence, corresponding to her husband's place among the men.

Unfortunately, disputes arise and occasionally one of them causes terrible and prolonged trouble.

Regular rules exist in all European capitals. They cover every imaginable contingency and there is no getting around them. Here a few broad general principles are tacitly recognized but details have to be guessed at.

Consequently, it is impossible to settle any difference of opinion authoritatively, especially if it involves a highly-complicated technicality.

For instance, the president obviously is the nation's first citizen. As his official heir apparent, the vice president is No. 2. There is no room for argument about it.

The president's wife just as clearly is the "first lady." Naturally, the vice president's wife is second on the list.

It happens, however, that Vice President Curtis is a widower.

The question arises—is his sister, Mrs. Edward E. Gann, in whose home he has lived in Washington, entitled to the same social recognition that would be accorded to his wife, if he had one?

If Mrs. Gann were matrimonially unattached and the mistress of her brother's domestic establishment, Washington society might answer this query affirmatively.

But she has a husband—a Washington lawyer with no official ranking whatever. It will not be easy to treat Mrs. Gann as of social consequence next after the first lady and Mr. Gann as nobody. Yet Mr. Gann can't precede everybody in Washington except the president. It would provoke an insurrection.

Besides, his sister has not been mistress of Vice President Curtis' household. He has had none. Instead, he has lived with the Ganns—boarded with them to put it prosaically.

Yet Mrs. Gann seems inclined to claim the social ranking of "vice presidential lady."

The row started with her candidacy to succeed Mrs. Charles G. Dawes as president of the Senate Ladies' club, an honor supposed to go to the vice president's wife. The club turned her down in favor of Mrs. George H. Moses, wife of the president pro tem of the senate.

Bitter was the feeling. It promises to become a lot hotter.

Washington's last historic fight over "precedence" raged throughout Chief Justice Fuller's long incumbency on the federal bench.

He claimed the right to "precede" ambassadors, who, in turn, insisted on preceding him, because, as they said, they represented their respective sovereign countries, while he simply was head of one branch of this government. They never settled it.

The ambassadors bow to Chief Justice Taft, as an ex-president, but who knows?—it may start all over again when he retires—unless ex-President Coolidge is appointed to succeed him.

Your Health

FIND NO RELATIONSHIP OF DIET TO CANCER

Man does not live by any single article of diet alone. If he is wise he eats a variety of substances. He knows that the fundamentals of a wholesome diet include fresh fruits and vegetables and that a well balanced diet contains proteins, carbohydrates and mineral salts. Such things can be had in meats, eggs, milk, cereals, sugars, butter, oils and many other food substances. One of the ideas promoted by food faddists of one type or another is that the eating of any special food substance may be the cause of cancer and that abstinence from some single article of diet will prevent cancer.

Cancer Research
In Great Britain research has been undertaken during the past year to find out whether there was any connection between cancer and deficiencies in the diet.

A number of well controlled experiments were made with the feeding of vitamins A and B and with diets deficient in these vitamins. Cancer did not develop in any of the rats used in these experiments.

Dr. J. A. Murray, director of the Imperial Cancer Research Fund, concludes that there exists no trustworthy evidence, experimental, clinical or statistical, of a causal relationship between cancer and the absence or presence or excess of any particular constituent of the human diet.

It has been shown that the absence of certain vitamins from the diet will result in the appearance of various alarming symptoms and that vast over-doses of some vitamins will have toxic or poisoning effects.

However, the poisonous doses are apparently far beyond any quantity that one might get in ordinary diet.

Food Fanatics
Hardly enough has yet been learned to make positive statements or to give definite advice as to the quantities of vitamins to be taken by different persons under different circumstances. Enough is known to say that no definite relationship exists between vitamin intake and cancer.

This announcement will not, however, affect in any way the claims of the food fanatics or food cultists. They are not interested in facts; they are salesmen of propaganda.

Q.—Does excess fat tend to make a person less efficient?
A.—Yes. Excess fat represents just so much extra burden to be carried about and so much extra tissue involved in the human metabolism.

WORKING AND EARNING

Figures from a typical American city show that more men are now employed than ever before in the history of the city. Wages, since the World War, have gone up faster than the cost of living, though for many that seems hard to believe. There are always exceptions. In certain lines the cost of living has kept ahead of the rise in wages. But taken as a whole, the worker receives \$2.31 today for every dollar he received before the war. He pays about \$1.65 for what used to cost a dollar. Compared with England both wages and the amount of work make us appear to be living in a paradise. But it might be said we have 100 temptations to spend money that the average worker abroad does not have. We live in a motor owning telephone using, radio running, installment paying country.

THE MIDDLE OF THE ROAD

It is a comfort to find a man who is willing to walk in the middle of the road and to be known for what and who he is. Most of us seek constantly to have people keep opinions of us that are not in accordance with the facts. We may like to be thought rich when we are not rich. Or we like to be thought poor when we are rich. We like to be thought "drys" when secretly we are "wets."

We pretend to believe in prohibition when we are actually in violation. Prohibition is a national and moral mistake. We boast that we never deal with bootleggers, but we are willing to accept what others buy of bootleggers. We make silly distinctions, thereby trying to whitewash our personal behavior. We say, "ordinarily I don't do this sort of thing, but I will this once." When, if we were simply honest, we would say that we always do this sort of thing if we think we can get away with it.

So goes life with its foolish, self-deceptive distinctions and "exceptions." The middle of the road, to be seen as we are, ought to be a comfortable and simple path. Most of us are afraid of it.

Your Income Tax

NO. 32

Various penalties are imposed by the statute for failure to file a return and pay the tax on time, and for making a fraudulent return. Distinction is made between failure and "willful failure" to file a return. For failure to file a return on time, the penalty is 25 per cent of the amount of the tax, unless a return is later filed and it is satisfactorily shown to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue that such failure was due to a reasonable cause and not to willful neglect. If a taxpayer exercised ordinary business care and prudence, and nevertheless was unable to file a return within the prescribed time, the delay is due to a "reasonable cause."

For willful failure to make a return the penalty is not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than 5 years, or both, and in addition 25 per cent of the amount of the tax. For willfully making a false or fraudulent return, the penalty is not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than 5 years, or both, and in addition 50 per cent of the amount of the tax.

PRESS COMMENT

BUSINESS ETHICS WINS A VICTORY

The Continental Trading company bonds transactions in which Col. Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, took a leading part constituted a gross and foul chapter in American political and financial history.

The courts found nothing criminal in these transactions. The careless public condoned and re-elected overwhelmingly the political party responsible for the scandal. It has remained for the John D. Rockefeller, senior and junior, to clean the slate in part, to reestablish faith in the doctrine that those who sow the wind must reap the whirlwind.

The financial power of the Rockefellers is a mighty power, and the brain of the aged wizard of oil hasn't lost its consummate cunning but it is comforting to believe that the Rockefellers won overwhelmingly in their fight to outdo Stewart from control of the Indiana corporation by virtue of the fact that they were thrice armed with the strength of right.

As head of the gigantic petroleum concern of the Hoosier State, Stewart has been eminently successful in a business way. The company's profits last year ran into the millions, breaking all previous records. The lure of fat profits is reflected in the fact that more than 99 per cent of the 3,600 employees voted in favor of Stewart's retention—among them numerous prominent as church leaders.

Big stockholders rather than little, men and women of wealth, made the Rockefeller victory possible. There is food for thought in this development. It does not coincide with the often stated belief that lefty honesty is an attribute peculiar to the common people.

The Rockefeller interests made it plain that their fight was directed solely against Stewart and solely on the belief that he was morally unfit to continue in control of the Indiana company. Their good faith in advancing this claim was convincingly shown by the slate of new officers and directors. Edward J. Seubert, who had fought side by side with Stewart was re-elected president, and only one member of the board was dropped, in addition to the chairman.

The position taken by the younger Rockefeller, with the approval of his father, and the zeal with which the offense against Stewart was pressed to victorious conclusion, merit high praise from the right-thinking citizens of America. Not in this generation has another such signal object lesson been taught or a more praiseworthy example set by men at the pinnacle of the world of dollars.

It detracts nothing from the praise due to the Rockefellers and those who sided with them to add that the maintenance of a high ethical code is a rigid necessity to the survival of American big business. The era of commercial piracy, tainted transactions, bribery of public officials, unhampered by use of money to influence public opinion, may not be ended but such practices are arousing more savage opposition as the years advance, and the opposition is being ably led by financial magnates who subscribe to a more exalted concept of their relation to the public.

Such men as Colonel Stewart jeopardize the entire business structure and heighten the clamor for increased state and federal regulation of business—a regulation already approximating in a few fields, the socialistic scheme of public ownership. —Houston Post-Dispatch.

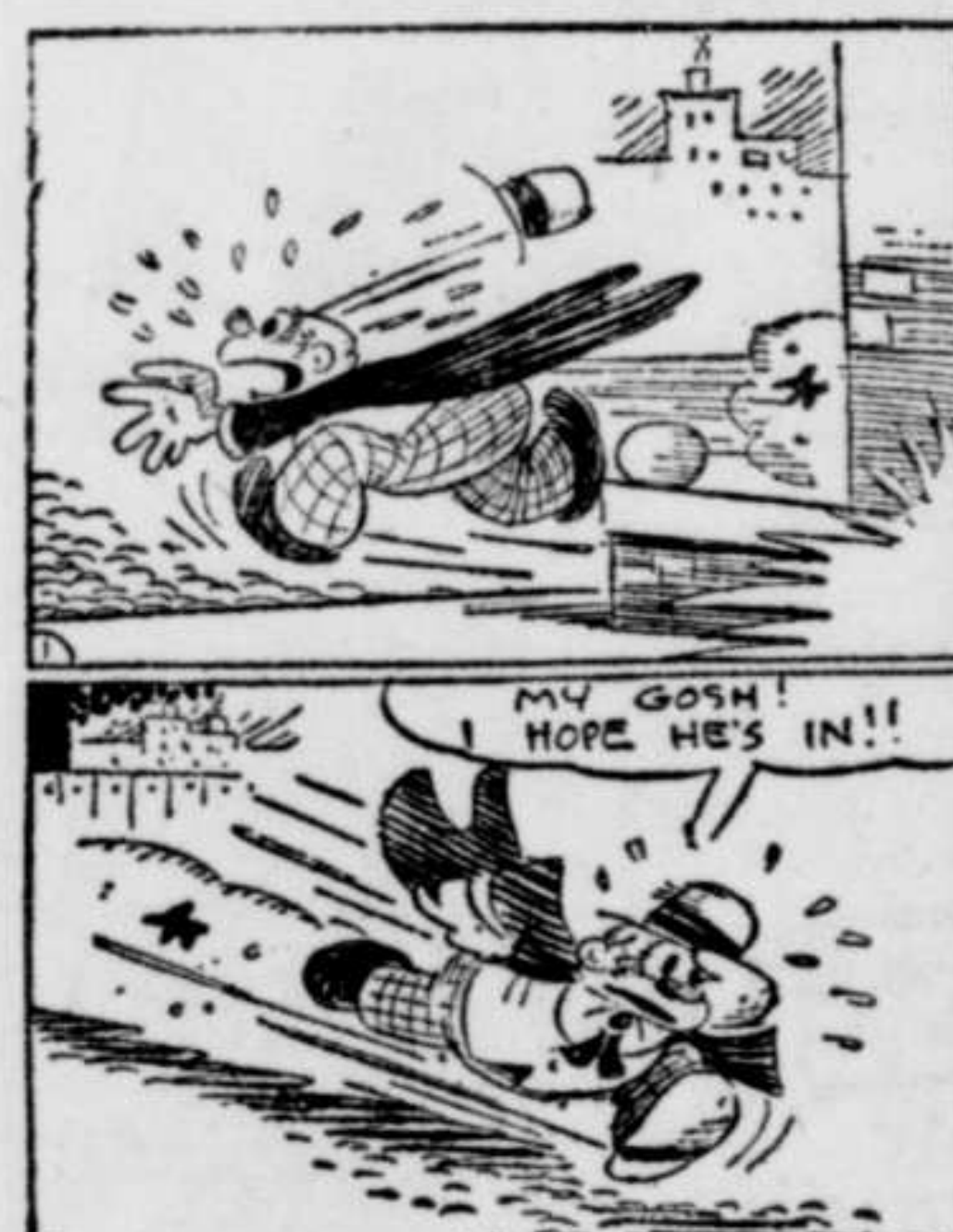

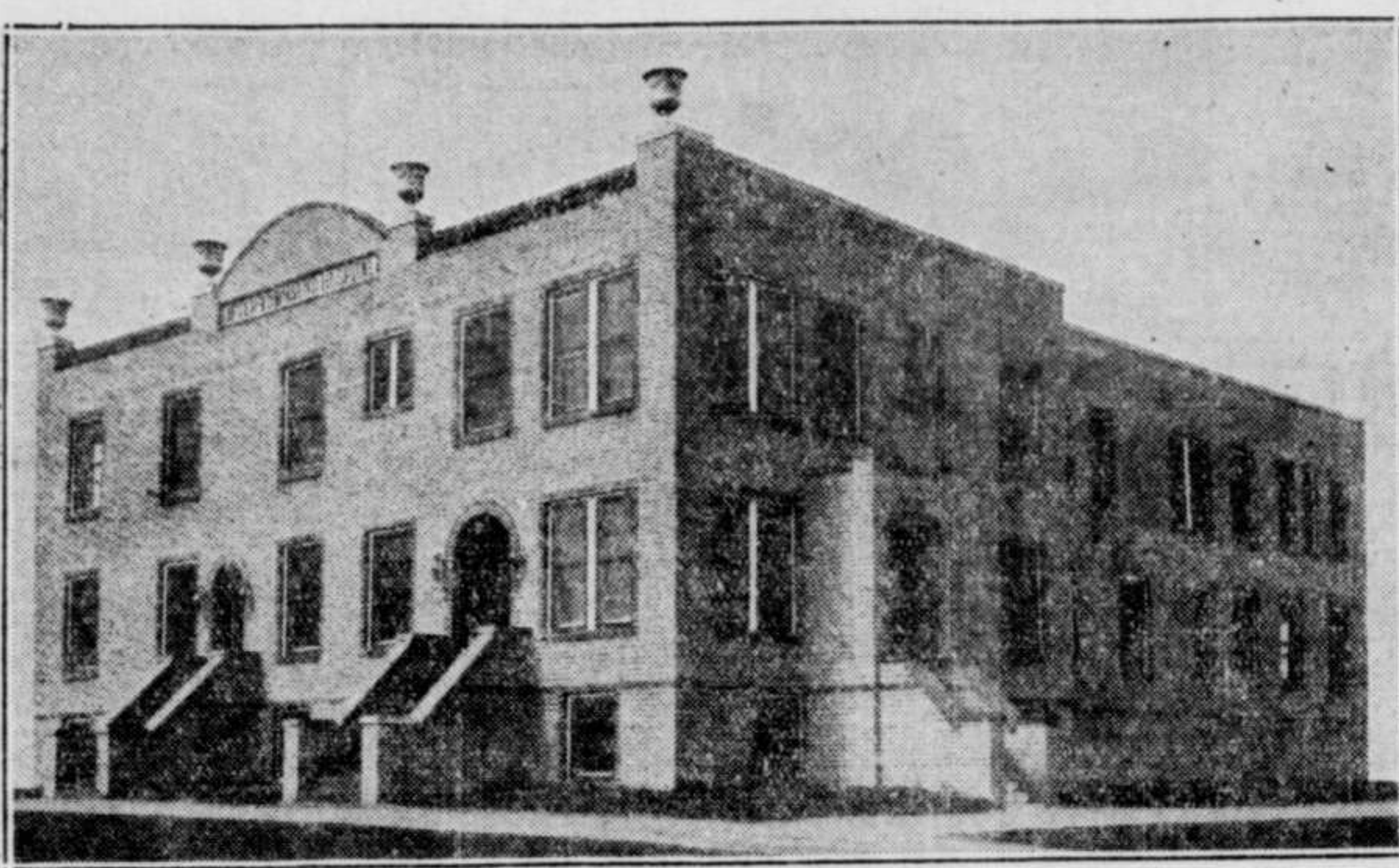

Exhibit Rules In State Fair Likely To Be Changed

Lubbock County's Exhibit Last Year Creates Desire For New Regulations For Judging Winners

Such a wide impression was made by Lubbock county's unique exhibit at the Dallas Fair last fall, together with similar impressions made by the county exhibits of Hale and Floyd counties, that changes in the rules for such exhibits are likely to obtain at not only that exposition but a number of other fairs over the state, it was learned at a meeting held yesterday afternoon in the chamber of commerce offices.

Although the Lubbock, Hale and Floyd county exhibits were not intended to compete with other county exhibits, because of their extreme difference between the ordinary, score card county exhibit, the resultant publicity obtained, particularly by Lubbock county, has created a future throughout the state of Texas.

Leidigh Attends Meeting
At a meeting held in Fort Worth last Sunday, which was attended by Dean A. H. Leidigh, of Texas Technological college, officials of the Dallas Fair association took up the question of whether or not the score card system of exhibits will be used as formerly, or that modifications are to be made in their rules, either to permit such exhibits as Lubbock county had to be displayed in the agricultural building at the fair, even though they do not compete with ordinary county competition.

Lubbock county's plan of exhibit has been, and is now, to display things that will best show to the outside world what are the outstanding resources of this county, featuring agriculture, but not limiting the display entirely to agricultural products.

More people will be attracted to agriculture buildings of the various fairs, if more counties will create unique exhibits, such as Lubbock's of last year, it is thought. The discussion yesterday also centered around whether or not the coming Panhandle-South Plains Fair will take a step farther than fairs have done in the past and permit any sort of a county exhibit to enter its buildings, regardless of whether or not they are entered to compete on a score card basis.

Houston Official Has Much Praise For City's Growth

With this being his first visit to the South Plains country in 10 years, the development to be noted since 1919 was so astonishing that T. G. Kenney, assistant manager of the Domestic and Foreign Trade Extension department of the Houston Chamber of Commerce, upon his arrival in Lubbock yesterday, declared he could find few words to express his bewilderment.

"I have never before seen such phenomenal growth anywhere," he said. "And Lubbock is in reality a metropolitan young city. It's what might be termed a young Houston. Your town, with its wide streets of paving everywhere, its spic and span appearance generally and the hustle and bustle, makes a fellow sit up and take notice of what's been going on here on the plains. I had no conception of what I have seen with my own eyes the past few days that I have spent in this section."

Invites Cattlemen
Mr. Kenney, speaking for the Houston Chamber of Commerce stated that he brought a personal invitation to every cattleman in this section to attend the Cattleman's convention to be held in Houston on March 19, 20 and 21. "We want all Lubbock and South Plains citizens to know that a hearty welcome awaits them and we guarantee royal entertainment during the convention, the sessions of which will more than likely be held in Sam Houston hall, the mammoth auditorium that housed the national democratic convention last summer."

The purpose of Mr. Kenney's visit to this section is to spread the information that Houston, as a shipping center, as well as a port, offers to Lubbock and South Plains shippers cheaper freight rates on a large number of commodities than does the city of Dallas. From charts he exhibited he claimed that shippers would save half a cent on class 1 commodities by routing via Houston, over routing by Dallas, or 5 1-2 cents on class 2, 10 1-2 cents on class 3 and 15 1-2 cents on class 4 shipments.

Anthony Wins In Suit Of Nichols

A verdict for the defendant was given by a jury in the Seventy-second district court yesterday, before Judge Homer L. Pharr, in the case of E. J. Nichols versus J. F. Anthony, Lubbock plumber.

The case involved the claims of Nichols that he had rented a house from Anthony, moving his furniture into it, and that he was gone from the city for about 30 days, returning to find that Anthony had moved the furniture from the house. Damages of \$2,000 were asked, \$1,000 of which was to cover the value of the furniture and the rest other damages.

Anthony's testimony portended that Nichols moved his furniture into his house, but did not pay any rent and that he made attempts to locate Nichols, but not knowing his name and failing to locate him, he moved the furniture into a warehouse and rented the house to some one else, after about 30 days.

Bull Party Holds Forth Thursday As Stocks Go Up

Fifty Leading Industrials
Are Lifted To New High
Record; Call Money Is
Placed At Seven Per Cent

By CLAUDE A. JACGER.
Associated Press Financial Writer.
NEW YORK, Mar. 14. (P)—For the first Thursday in several weeks the stock market today refused to take on a doleful aspect before the weekly federal reserve meeting, and the bull party held an old-fashioned carnival, with radio again providing the fireworks.

The old radio stock, which has but a few more days of grace before being stricken from the board, was hurried up into the 500 class for the first time, making a net gain of nearly 34 points. The new stock was accumulated in tremendous volume, crossing the 100-mark in a rise of nearly seven points.

The Associated Press index of 50 leading industrials was lifted five points to 218.8, a new high record, surpassing by nearly a point the previous high record of 217.8. Trading took on new life, the day's turnover of 4,625,350 shares reaching the largest volume since March 1.

No Increase Made.
The fact that the New York federal reserve directors made no increase in the bank's rediscount rate after the close of the market had been regarded as fairly definitely forecast in the morning when the bank of England made no change in its rate.

Call money renewed at 7 per cent and held at that rate all day, although some was available as low as 6 1/2 per cent in the afternoon. Time money, however, held at the highest level since 1920, giving no hope of permanent improvement in the credit situation. Taking of about \$8,000,000 in gold in Germany was reported, bringing the current movement of to about \$18,000,000. It was rumored, however, that some of this gold was for the purpose of pegging German exchange and preventing further losses of the yellow metal to New York.

Loans Decreased.
A decrease of \$20,000,000 in federal reserve brokers' loans, announced after the close, was better news than had been expected. An increase had been looked for as the new radio stock had to be paid for this week.

Steels attracted strong support of the extraordinary cheerful tone of the weekly steel trade reviews. Bethlehem, earnings of which are expected to approximate \$4 a share for the first quarter, mounted about five points to a new top at 108 5/8, and U. S. Steel touched 188 in a like gain.

Motors made one of the best showings of the year, with General Motors touching a new peak at 85 1/8, up more than five points. Chrysler, Hudson and Packard also made good headway. Greene Cananea was a strong point of the copper, making an extreme gain of six points.

Pacific Telephone, ordinarily inactive, rose nearly 25 points to 20, but lost nearly half its gain. Russia insurance sold up nearly 14 points to a new top, American Reator, International Telephone, Burroughs Adding Machine, Du Pont, General Electric, Porto Rican American Tobacco A. and Wright Aero were among issues selling up 6 to 10 points.

Commodity markets were steady to firm, save for grains, which eased on more favorable domestic crop news. Cotton turned firm on unfavorable weather reports.

Foreign exchanges eased, with sterling cables dropping 3-16 of a cent to \$4.85 1/4. The Canadian dollar ruled at a discount of a full cent.

Tax Collections Are Good In Lynn

TAHOKEA, Mar. 14.—School taxes totaling \$29,000 out of a possible total assessment of \$31,223 have been collected by J. S. Weatherman, assessor and collector for the Tahokea school district. This is said to be a very high percentage, and is indicative of the good financial condition that this section is in. Part of the remaining amount is upon real estate and can be collected, but some of it is on personal property and will be difficult to collect.

Cotton Prices Are Generally Higher On N. Y. Market

NEW YORK, Mar. 14. (P)—While early advances were followed by reactions under renewed realizing, cotton was generally higher today. New crop months were relatively firm on unfavorable weather reports from the South and apprehensions of spring overflows in the Mississippi valleys.

After selling up to 21.33 at the start, May contracts reacted to 21.05 but rallied and closed at 21.15. October sold up from 20.35 to 20.51 in the late trading and closed at 20.52.

The general market closed steady at net advances of 1 to 21 points. The market opened steady at an advance of 10 to 19 points on buying stimulated by relatively firm cables, large domestic consumption figures and reports of rains in the Eastern and Central belts. March sold up to 21.33 and the new October contracts to 20.51, but this advance seemed to attract a good deal of realizing.

A few spot orders were uncovered as prices worked downward. The decline extended to 21.10 for March and 20.50 for July during the middle of the day, making net losses of 7 to 8 points on the old crop. The new crop sold back within 2 or 3 points of yesterday's closing quotations.

Offerings again tapered off as prices approached the 21 cent level for May contracts, which seemed to meet renewed support as well as considerable trade buying. The market firmed up again during the afternoon.

The feature was the strength of the new crop positions, which appeared to be attracting considerable demand from both trade and speculative sources. Influenced apparently by talk of further delays in farm work, New contracts for October and later deliveries made new highs for the day in the late trading. The closing difference between May and October was reduced to 63 points compared with 81 points at yesterday's close.

The census report showed domestic consumption of 598,098 bales for February compared with 572,873 last year. Private cables reported general buying on the Southern rain news in Liverpool.

Trotzky, Neither Dying or Prisoner, Wants In Germany

CONSTANTINOPLE, Mar. 14. (P)—That Leon Trotzky is neither dying nor any longer a prisoner was proved today in an interview which he granted the correspondent of the Associated Press in his room at the Tsakalain Hotel overlooking the Grand Rue Pera.

It was the first direct conversation he has had with a foreign correspondent since he became shrouded in mystery after his arrival at Constantinople from Russian Turkistan.

The famous beard and moustache are shaved off, but otherwise the former war lord looks as powerful as ever. His blue eyes were snapping behind bone-rimmed spectacles and his now iron-clay hair was bristling with his energy.

"I am not a dying man," he said, his lion's voice shaking the small room, "but it is true that I have need of a German physician's care, for German physicians operated on me formerly in Russia. I expect to remain here until my request to enter Germany is answered. I will not go to Angola and if I am not admitted to Germany I presume that I shall stay here permanently."

Texas Livestock Receipts Short

FORT WORTH, Mar. 14. (P)—Trade in cattle and calves at Fort Worth today was rather poorly tested, owing to the unusually short receipts. As a result of limited supplies, the market presented a peddling appearance with demand fairly active for most classes of cattle and calves. Two or three loads of slaughtered steers that were included in the offerings sold at prices fifteen cents to a quarter higher, while slaughter yearlings and other classes of cattle and calves ruled about steady.

Carlot sales of slaughter steers reported at 10.75 and 11.00, and a part load of choice fat yearlings consisting of expositions sorts topped at 13.00. Other slaughter yearlings changed hands at 11.50 and less, the plainer kinds on down to 10.25 and less.

No straight loads of desirable fat cows received but some small lots of good fat cows up to 8.50 and a limited amount of business and heavy grades transacted around 7.00 to 7.25. Occasional sorts of low-cutters at 5.25 to 5.50; with trashy sorts touching the bottom at 5.00. A few package lots of sausage bulls sold at 7.50 to 8.00 and choice heavy individuals reported up to 9.25.

Packers purchased a few fairly good heavy slaughter calves around 11.00 with plainer grades scattered on down the list. Cull sorts mostly at 7.00 to 8.00.

An active demand was provided for available supplies of stock cattle and calves, the few stockers on hand bringing prices that appeared strong or even higher compared with recent advances. One load of good to choice heavy stock calves, steers and heifers mixed sold at 12.00 and some choice stock steer yearlings sold out at 12.50.

A further decline of ten to fifteen cents occurred in today's hog trade. Smooth butchers in carlots made a top of 10.60 and bulk of the medium to choice, 150-250 pound carlots sold at 10.40 to 10.50. Best truck hogs brought 9.60. Packing sows sold steady at 8.25 to 9.25 and feeder pigs sold at 7.25 to 9.25, considered strong to quarter higher.

Texas, just now, is attracting attention of big business interests, primarily because of the fact that nearly 50 per cent of all the new railroad mileage constructed in the nation, during the past two years, has been constructed in this area. I had heard some talk of need of gain on the Plains, but when I traversed the section today, everything looked mighty fine to me," he said.

In speaking of the tariff problem, Mr. Jones was of the opinion that the tariff should be made to apply on the raw products of the south as well as upon the manufactured products of the north and east. "As we are to have a tariff bill, I intend to vote to include within its provisions all of the commodities which come into this country and which compete with the products of the farm and ranch.

For years we have had a tariff on the manufactured articles, but not on the raw products. The people of the South have for a half century been howling at this discrimination, and all they have secured out of it has been a howl. I believe that any tariff measure should be a uniform one, and should cover the basic or raw materials as well as the finished articles."

Congressman Jones, while in Lubbock, is visiting with his brothers and their families, Hub, Frank and Earl Jones. He will be here probably all of today, meeting with his innumerable friends and acquaintances, before returning to Amarillo to depart from there to Washington for the meeting of the agriculture committee on March 22. He said he hoped that the next session of congress would not last for more than two months.

Escobar Asks For Aid From Followers

JUAREZ, Chihuahua, Mexico, 14. (AP)—The declaration by General Jose Gonzalo Escobar to thousands of his followers at Torreon that the rebels were ready for a "final fight" and a general exodus of Americans and fugitive Mexicans from the embattled industrial center of Coahuila today brought tangible evidence to Juarez of the expectancy of a major battle in the Mexican revolution.

In a statement to more than 3,000 citizens and Agarians in the historic public square of Torreon, General Escobar denounced "the tyrants and the double-crosser that was not satisfied with corrupting the Mexican government" and called on the people to "support the renovating movement."

General Escobar declared 23 generals had given active support of the "renovating movement"—the term applied by the rebels to the present revolutionary movement. Meanwhile each train arriving in Juarez from Torreon brought an ever increasing crowd of Americans and Mexican citizens fleeing from the military zone. Passengers took turns standing and sitting on the crowded trains, and a train of Pullman's was made up in Juarez to return waiting throngs anxious to return to the United States until the trouble is over.

NOGALES, Sonora, Mar. 14. (AP)—Mexican rebel headquarters here announced tonight that 300 agriculturalists, who had been armed by Governor Abelardo Rodriguez in Baja California, had revolted south of Ensenada and were marching on Tijuana and Mexicali.

The rebel camp also declared that federal soldiers who had been garrisoned at San Luis, Sonora, on the Baja California border line, had been reported withdrawn to Mexicali, Governor Rodriguez's military headquarters.

JUAREZ, Mexico, Mar. 14. (AP)—Mexican rebel cavalry captured 280 federal soldiers and a large number of guns in a brush with the federals today at the Ojo Caliente ranch, near Higuera, revolutionary headquarters here was advised by General Marcelino Caraveo, rebel commander at Chihuahua City. Higuera is between Saltillo and Monterrey.

county, reached here at 3:30 P. M. in a telegram to the mayor saying, "send help at once. All Elba flooded."

Operator Stands At Post

A plucky telephone operator in Elba, with water sloshing about her ankles, replied to a telephone call and briefly described the grave situation of the citizens of the town, before rising floods cut the shabby telephone line that remained.

Since then nothing definite from the town has been received. Meanwhile, citizens throughout this section of Alabama moved to aid the flooded town, and at Montgomery, Governor Bibb Grave acted, ordering two companies of Alabama National Guard to the scene to aid in rescue work.

The National Guardsmen, it was reported here, equipped with motor boats, were expected to leave Montgomery in a truck and motor caravan over the treacherous roads. This city itself has been cut off from rail transportation by washouts along rail lines. It was believed here that the Montgomery boats could not reach Elba before 3 or 4 o'clock tomorrow, and those in closest touch with the situation feared that before that time some citizens trapped in single story houses would be drowned.

Relief Crew Sent Out

While the Montgomery relief expedition was mobilizing, volunteers in Enterprise, Ala., 18 miles southeast of the stricken town and here, bent every effort to carry relief to the marooned residents. A relief crew of 100 men in boats and hastily constructed rafts set out from Enterprise this afternoon and were reported to have reached the city about 3 P. M., but at 7 P. M. no word had been received from them and none had returned.

The swiftness of the current of Pea river and the wide expanse of water that must be traversed to reach Elba or a point of safety after leaving it added to the gravity of the situation and endangered those who volunteered to make the hazardous venture.

Reports of conditions in the flooded town varied, but all agreed that inhabitants had been forced to the second stories, attics and roofs of their homes. Approximately 1,000 persons were said to have sought refuge in the court house, the lower story of which was flooded by five or more feet of water.

School Children Marooned

Meanwhile, a courier reaching the office of the Dothan, Ala., Eagle said 350 school children, marooned on the second floor of the Elba elementary school, were out of control of the teachers and screaming for aid. The courier said water was flowing through the first floor of the building.

Scores were marooned on the second floor of hotels and many crouched in the attics and on the precarious sloping roofs of their homes as the waters surged beneath them.

One report received here said White Water creek was a mile and a half wide and a number of smaller houses in Elba had been carried away by the swiftly flowing water. This, however, lacks confirmation, but increased the apprehension felt for the persons who depended on the attics and roofs of one story houses for safety until help arrived.

Conditions elsewhere in South Alabama were reported as serious, with a steady rain continuing to night and rivers and creeks spreading far beyond their normal bounds. Brewton, inundated in 1925, tonight feared an even worse flood this year as Burnt Corn and Murder creeks went out of their banks late today and were rising at the rate of six inches an hour.

The state convict department ordered sixty prisoners removed from a camp at River Falls, on the Conecuh river, where the stream was rising rapidly. The Louisville and Nashville dispatcher at Florida, reported the citizens of Geneva, Ala., evacuated the town before the threat of the rapidly rising Choctawhatchee river.

Andalusia reported 12 inches of rainfall in the past 24 hours and feared serious danger in Covington county from flood waters of the Conecuh, Patsaliga and Yellow rivers.

So far only one death has been reported, a negro farmer was drowned near Geneva today when his wagon overturned on a flooded highway.

South Central Part Of State Is Isolated

ATLANTA, March 14. (AP)—South Central Alabama virtually was isolated today by the third deluge of flood water within three weeks and several other southern states reported inconvenience occasioned by a 48-hour downpour of rain.

A trestle washout caused two train wrecks in Alabama, resulting in serious injury to three trainmen. A half dozen fast passenger trains were derailed after a delay of several hours. Highway traffic in South Alabama was paralyzed.

A tornado that accompanied the deluge in South Carolina last night took nine lives in six mile community, near Greenville, and probably fatally injured two other persons.

Streams In Middle West
Are Less Turbulent

CHICAGO, March 14. (AP)—Swollen streams of the Middle West were less turbulent tonight and flood waters which had grown deeper in several sections were receding slowly.

At Galena, Ill., were the Galena river yesterday reached its highest flood stage on record and washed out the day's business, the high water had receded from the business district and the river was returning to its banks.

Other tributaries of the Mississippi in Wisconsin, Iowa and Nebraska also were less rampaging today as ice continued to break up and melt, permitting flood waters to pass on down stream.

a group which he termed "The Highway Department Bloc," for its defeat of the automobile registration fee bill carrying a reduction of 50 per cent.

The bill had gone down to defeat after it had passed both houses, when opponents refused to permit the quorum-short house to concur in an amendment reducing the maximum amount counties could retain of the fees from \$300,000 to \$200,000. Absence of a quorum made it necessary for the house to concur by unanimous consent.

The house members still were rowing on the registration bill when they were cut off by Speaker Pro Tem Fred Minor to recognize Representative Thompson of Houston for the sine die adjournment motion.

The members left behind for Governor Moody some hard nuts to crack in the Wirtz bill, which if signed will give the democratic executive committee power to bar from the 1930 primaries as voters or candidates members of the party who voted for Herbert Hoover, the measure making it lawful for moving pictures to operate on Sunday, and several others of a controversial nature. In addition there were scores of other bills which the governor has said he will scrutinize carefully.

Boiling Wrath Lingers.

Wrath of the element in the party which bolted Governor Smith last November lingered in the senate until the last, after that body repeatedly had repulsed Senator Love of Dallas, leader of the defunct group, in his moves to prevent legislation bearing on the question. They defeated him again when he brought the Hoover-Smith incident into the closing hours in nominating for president pro tem at interim of the senate, Senator Parrish of Lubbock Parrish was defeated by Cousins of Beaumont. The vote was 16 to 12, the greatest number ever recorded on any proposition at the end of a session.

The legislature turned its back on most of Governor Moody's recommended legislation. It failed to pass legislation bearing on concentration and relocation of the penitentiary system; refused to submit the \$175,000,000 highway bond issue and voted down his requested civil service and short ballot reforms.

Constitutional amendments to be submitted to voters at special elections include: Increasing the supreme court to nine members; providing for continuous session of the

supreme court; making it possible to invest University of Texas permanent funds in bonds of the United States, state, counties and municipalities; increasing the length of the regular session of the legislature to 120 days and fixing the per diem at \$10; fixing the salary of the governor at \$10,000, and taxing lands belonging to the University of Texas for county purposes.

CALLS SPECIAL MEET

Governor Dillon Says State Appropriations Excess

SANTA FE, N. M., March 14. (AP)—Saying the general appropriations bill passed by the ninth state legislature was greatly in excess of revenues available for the next two years, Gov. R. V. Dillon today called a special session of the legislature to meet April 2.
