ND Re-Elects Three Trustees

In the heaviest vote cast in a trustee election at New Deal, three incumbents were re-elected in Saturday's school board election.

The total vote of 245 broke a record of 242 votes set in 1962. Successful in their bids for re-election were Donald (Pete) Edwards, E. C. Parrish and Glen Wages. There was a field of eight candidates for the three board places.

The vote tabulation according to Jake Scharnberg, election judge, was: Edwards, 163; Wages, 144; Parrish, 135; Darrell Burress 70; Grady Baze, 66; Fred Ford, 66; Billy Jack O'Brian, 42; and H. G. Lorenz Jr., 41.

Scharnberg was assisted by J. W. Vanstory and Royce Hess, clerks, in the election, which was held in the New Deal School building.

Monty Gartin Injured In Accident Here

Monty Gartin, the five-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Gartin of Abernathy, sustained serious damage to two of the fingers on his right hand in an unusual accident March 30.

Monty accompanied his mother, who is a Cub Scout Den Mother, when a group of Den Mothers and Cub Scouts visited Abernathy city jail, on a tour. He was injured when the heavy steel door that leads from the police office into the jail run-around shut on his fingers.

The tip of his little finger was severed and his ring finger was almost severed by the accident. He received emergency treatment at Abernathy Medical Clinic and was sent to a specialist at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, where he remained over night. The portion of the ring finger was stitched back in place in hopes it could be saved.

After being examined Monday of this week, the physician advised the parents that the damaged portion of Monty's ring finger probably will have to be amputated at the first joint from the tip of the finger. The physician, however, wanted to allow a few more days to be certain that surgery is necessary. Monty will be taken to the hospital Thursday, and if surgery is necessary it will be performed Friday.

Conn Is New Trustee Here

Burford Conn, farmer in the County Line community, topped the Abernathy School Trustee election ticket Saturday, receiving 270 votes. This probably is the most votes any individual has ever received in an Abernathy School Trustee election. He will follow Ralph Davis on the Abernathy School Board of Trustees. Holdover trustees are Loren West, W. D. Sanders, Bob Riley, Joe Oswalt and Joe B. Lovelace, who was named to serve the unexpired term of the late Eliza Wayne Lambert that term expires in April, 1966.

He and his wife, the former Billie Petty, are graduates of Abernathy High School. They have three sons in school. They are Mark, 12, in the 6th grade; Lane, 10, 5th grade, and Kent, 7, in the 2nd grade. Harrison has been on the school board here the past six years.

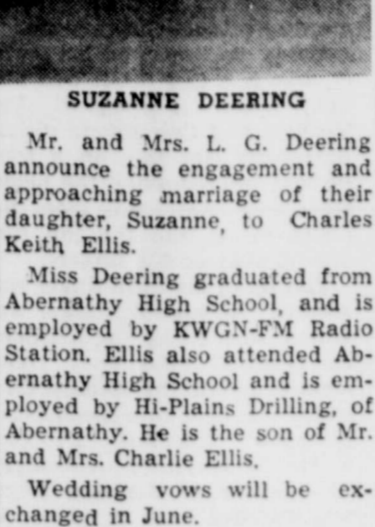
She received gifts for her home from those present and others who were unable to attend.

Dear Friends:

As we try to think of words to express our thanks and gratitude we cannot seem to find the words that we want to use. It is with praise we greet you again. God has marvelously answered prayer for our little country of Burundi, Praise Him! But we would encourage you to PRAY even harder for our country and not slack off for that would be just what the devil would want.

Many have asked about the climate here at Kayero. We are at a high altitude of over 6,000 ft. Thus making for pleasant and beautiful surroundings but the altitude seems to sap the strength. Since we are in the rainy season we have many chilly damp days. A fire in the fireplace feels good most of the day. There isn't much variation in the temperature throughout the year. We have two seasons. Rains usually begin somewhere around the middle of September and continue through the middle of May. Then we have the dry season.

At our annual meeting we were made to realize anew the great need for more laborers. We would ask you to join with us in praying for more REAP-

TALK In Print

Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Pearce, pioneer residents of the Abernathy area, were featured in pictures and historical write-up, by Mrs. O. S. Bristow, in The Plainview Daily Herald Sunday, April 4.

Herb Hilburn, and other owners of the Plainview Daily Herald for many years, recently sold the newspaper to Allison Communications, Inc., of Midland.

There are a number of reasons why I regret Mr. Hilburn's leaving the Plainview paper. One of them is a reminder that I am getting old. Now that Mr. Hilburn is not with the Herald, that leaves me "The Old Man" of newspapering in Hale County. I have been with the Review in one capacity or the other since 1932. I do, however, have a Hale County newspapering elder in age. He is Mr. J. L. Suits, who with his son, Tom, own and operate the Petersburg Journal. My association with the Review began a number of years before the Suits family bought the Petersburg paper from E. R. Gibson.

There has been such a turnover in ownership and personnel of newspapers on the South Plains over the years that I may be the Number Four "Old Man" of newspapering on the South Plains, or I may be Number Two. I know that Charles Guy has been associated with the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for more years than I have been with the Review. And possibly Frank Hill of The Lynn County News, Tahoka, and Hubert Curry of The Crosbyton Review may have been with their respective newspapers longer than I have been with the Review.

When the Plainview paper was sold to the Allison chain, Dalton Wood of Sudan was named news editor of the Plainview daily. He is married to the former Lenda Cain, a daughter of J. M. Cain, former Abernathian, now of Denison, Wood, for the past several years, was associated with the publication of weekly newspapers at Anton, Amherst and Sudan.

Last week, Wood sold his Four-County News at Anton to Jimmy Rambo. Jimmy is a second generation newspaper man. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tom Rambo, own and operate the Hale Center American. His father began newspaper work of the Petersburg Journal, but his career there was interrupted by armed forces duty during World War II. AUTO INSPECTION DEADLINE NEARS

There will be no extension of the Motor Vehicle Safety Inspection deadline of April 15, 1965, announced Captain Alan Johnson of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Texas Department of Public Safety, for this area. "Only two million of the five and a quarter million registered vehicles in Texas have been inspected. This leaves over three million vehicles to be inspected in about five weeks," said Captain Johnson. Many thousands of vehicle owners can expect to wait in long lines in order to get their vehicles inspected by the April 15 deadline.

It is almost apparent now that many vehicle owners have waited too long for the inspection stations to safely inspect their vehicles by April 15. "Any driver operating a vehicle registered in Texas that is required to be inspected, on public roads after April 15 without a valid 1965 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law," stated the Captain.

The DPS supervisor said, "The purpose of the motor vehicle inspection program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident, and by removing the link, prevent the accident."

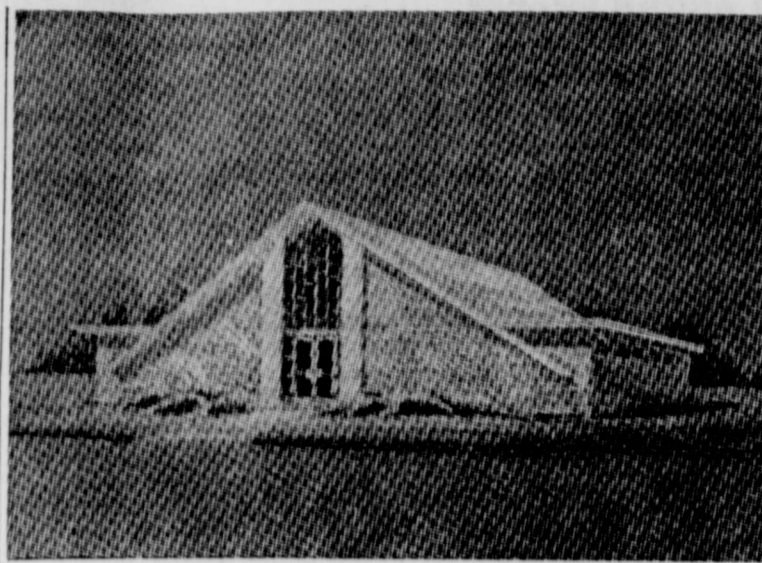

'Lopes Take Kress Crown Over Olton

The relay-strong Abernathy Antelopes brought home all the laurels from the Kress Invitational Track Meet held Saturday. The 'Lopes beat the Olton Mustangs by five points and for the 4th consecutive meet, brought home the 440-yard relay trophy, along with a new record and their fastest time of the year. Lane Wade brought home the only other first place in the broad jump event, but the 'Lopes placed enough to put them ahead of Olton by five points, 109-104.

In near perfect weather, Dale Murphree of Friona vanquished two records set by Antelope Tom Ritchey in 1963. Murphree ran the 220-yd dash in 22.5 to beat Ritchey's record of 22.7. In the 100-yd dash, Murphree ran a 10.0 in the preliminaries to erase Ritchey's mark of 10.1. In the finals, Murphree barely nosed out Lane Wade with a 10.1 time.
