## Crane Lose To McCamey 29-17

Playing hard against a team which was at least a foot taller to the man, the Cranes lost to the McCamey Badgers by a score of 29-17.

The Cranes showed much improvement, but it seemed they lacked the needed "punch" when thrown into close places. The floor work and passing of the Cranes was good and the offense used showed much improvement over that used in previous games. The Badgers showed skill in making long shots.

The Cranes scored well in the first half of the game, but seemed unable to score during the last half until the last two minutes of the play when they scored six points.

For McCamey: Hatley and Colby at forwards, Latham at center, Pittman and Lewis at guards.

## Crane Begin Play Before Entire Team Arrives

Due to unavoidable delays the Cranes were forced to begin their game before Coach Murley and three of the first string men arrived. They battled with relentless vigor, however, despite the difficulties, until the remaining part of the team arrived at the end of the first half. The score at the end of the first half was 17-6, but after the arrival of the other members of the team, the Cranes were able to run the final score to 25-17.

As usual the defense and floor work of the Cranes showed to advantage. The Alpine team outclassed the Cranes in height, but in every other department the local cagers showed equal to their opponents.

## Rankin Wins Against Alpine In Final Game

The Rankin and Alpine teams played in the final game of the tournament on Saturday night. Both teams had shown up well in the previous games and the game between them was the most interesting of all the games played. Rankin was able to win by a 40-23 score thus winning the tournament and being awarded the trophy.

## All-Tournament Team Chosen

Following the tournament an all-district team was selected by the various coaches of the district. Those chosen were: Hord of Alpine and Dorr of Big Lake, forwards; Garner of Rankin, center; Stack of Alpine and Green of Sanderson, guards.

## New Equipment For H. E. Dept. Arrives

Eight Hoosier table cabinets for use in the home economics kitchen have arrived this week, and work on re-arrangement of the kitchen is now under way.

The cabinets are finished in ivory and blue, and have enamel sliding tops. The cabinets will afford individual working space for each girl taking the foods course.

Two new perfection oil stoves have been purchased. Oil stoves were selected to supplement the two Hotpoint electric ranges now in use, because the majority of the girls taking the foods course use oil stoves in their homes. Girls will work half time on oil stoves and half time on electric ranges.

One new sink has been bought to supplement the three now in use. The sinks are to be re-arranged and placed nearer the cabinets and stoves, so that the working unit will be complete.

Curtains have been ordered for the kitchen windows. These will be of English print in green with orchid trimmings.

The former storeroom has been converted into an office. A new locker which provides space for the girls' wraps and books, has been built.

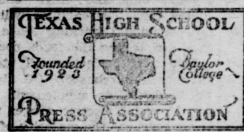
