Handley relative had visited Eastland.

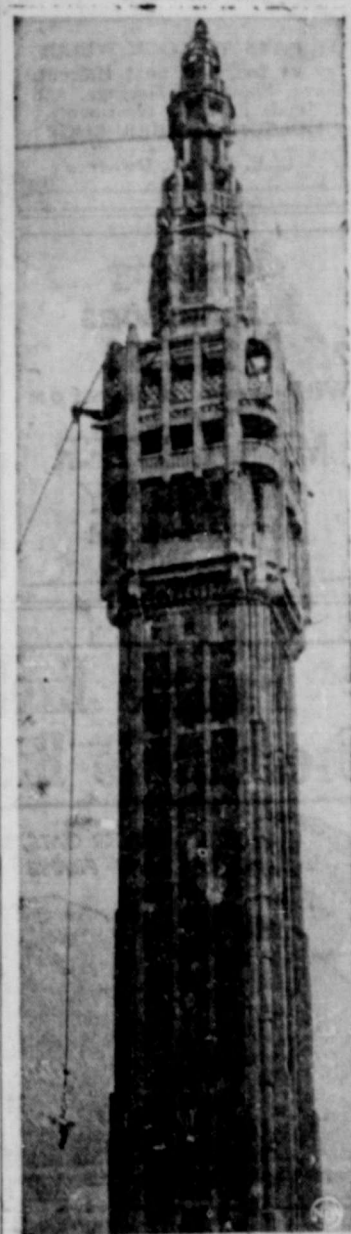

Vandenburg Scores U.S. Regimentation

DETROIT, Sept. 17.—The United States is "too big to be successfully regimented from a central bureaucracy and too American to be driven into goosestep," Sen. Arthur H. Vandenburg, Rep. of Michigan, said in a Constitution Day address.

The senior Michigan senator, reviewing the Constitution's 150 years of life, observed that "has repulsed every assault and every treachery whipped up in the inevitable storms and passions of recurrent strife."

Holbrook Widens Break With Allred

AUSTIN, Sept. 17.—Differences between Gov. James V. Allred and Sen. T. J. Holbrook of Galveston, chairman of a state Senate economy committee, were widened today by Holbrook's assertion that the governor had failed to obey the state budget act.

When the same point was recently raised at a press conference, Allred said he received a budget from the board too late to make a detailed recommendation for appropriations for the board of control and that a blanket recommendation was made to the legislature, excepting specific increases for care of insane persons.

Munitions Unloaded From U. S. Freighter

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Sept. 17.—The government-owned freighter, Wichita, was bound for Manila today without the cargo of munitions and airplanes with which it started out for Hong Kong.

The two cases of revolvers, two cases of cartridges and 19 fast "mail" planes, which were readily convertible into Chinese bombers, were unloaded here to avert the first crisis arising from President Roosevelt's ban on transportation of war shipments in government-owned boats.

MISSIONARY CAPTIVES ARE GIVEN RELEASE

PEIPING, China, Sept. 17.—Three Catholic missionaries held captive by a Chinese Volunteer army of nearly 2,000 men since Aug. 30, were released today.

Along with three other Catholic missionaries they had been forced to accompany the marauding bands for nearly a month. The volunteers, who called themselves the National Peoples' Army, had constantly engaged the Japanese in gorilla warfare.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 16.—Chinese, seizing advantage of heavy rains that immobilized Japanese airplanes and tanks, attacked them ferociously all along the Shanghai front today.

Infantry "dare to die" units smashed at the Japanese lines in three sectors. The reports from the front told of savage hand-to-hand fighting in which the Japanese called for re-enforcements.

The Chinese continued their gradual withdrawal to a new defense line, but it had become evident that their retreat was a planned one for the movement of the scores of thousands of men involved seemed affected with clocklike precision and rear guards challenged the Japanese at point after point.

PIRATE POLICY EXTENDED TO PLANES, SHIPS

GENEVA, Switzerland, Sept. 17.—The power extended their war on piracy in the Mediterranean today by deciding to include warships and airplanes as well as submarines and at the same time disarm almost all pretense of non-intervention in Spain.

The air and surface accord provide that patrolling ships shall open fire immediately on craft attacking vessels contrary to the London Naval Accord of 1936.

The conference decided that any airplane surface vessel or submarine not carrying well-marked identification or flag, would be considered pirates and fired upon.

The entire day's proceeding, in London and in Paris constituted a direct snub of Italy.

Announcement was made both in London and Paris of abandonment of the naval patrol of the Spanish Coast to prevent munitions from being shipped in.

Britain and France, without awaiting Italy's next move, acted swiftly and in unison.

Youths Respond To Farm Work Need

AUSTIN, Texas.—The response of Texas youths to the demand for seasonal agricultural workers is indicated, at least in part, by the reports of Junior Placement Service offices in Texas, J. C. Kellam, Texas Youth Director, said today.

During August five Junior Placement Offices obtained 1,507 jobs for young people. These offices are operated in Dallas, Fort Worth, Waco, San Antonio and Houston by the Texas State Employment Service and the National Youth Administration. The services of the Placement Service are available without charge to any youth who wishes to register.

Besides the youths placed in private employment through the Junior Division, 217 other youths in cities which have no Placement Offices were reported as having obtained private employment during the month. These 217 youths all were from National Youth Administration work projects.

The Placement Office figures show that 856 regular jobs—that is, jobs expected to continue more than six months—were obtained during August. The remainder of the placements were in temporary employment, most of them in seasonal agricultural work.

San Antonio Boy Sentenced to Serve 20 Years In Prison

SAN ANTONIO, Sept. 17.—A district court jury today found Sam Owens, 20, former San Antonio high school youth, guilty of the murder, in February, of Juan Salinas, and penalty was set at 20 years in prison.

Owens pleaded self defense.

Testifying at his trial he said he believed Salinas and another man and woman who were wounded in the shooting were trying to hijack him.

Leases Awarded On State-Owned Land

AUSTIN, Sept. 16.—Award of oil leases on 196 tracts of submerged lands, part in the Gulf of Mexico, were announced here today by State Land Commissioner William H. McDonald. Bids totaled \$70,430 cash and \$3,689,477 to be paid out of oil above the one-eighth royalty. Bids on these and other tracts were taken September 7.

Price of Corn Shows Attempted Corner

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—The price of corn for September delivery rated wildly on the Chicago board of trade today as the exchange waged an undercover fight against reported attempts to corner the American market. Corn closed at \$1.13 1/2, which was 3 1/2 cents above the day's low.

Department Store Sales Are Higher

AUSTIN, Texas.—Department store sales in Texas, as measured in dollars, during July were well above those of the corresponding month last year and the decline from June was considerably less than the usual seasonal drop. The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research has announced.

Reports from 108 representative Texas establishments show an increase in sales during July of 4.5 per cent over a year ago. The decline from June was 17.6 per cent, where as the normal seasonal recession is nearly 22 per cent.

There was a slight increase in the percentage of credit sales compared with a year ago, while the percentage of outstanding accounts collected remained virtually the same.

CONNALLY SAYS BLACK ROW IS JUST POLITICS

HOUSTON, Sept. 17.—Sen. Tom Connally, Dem. Tex., charged today that most of the furor arising from the appointment and confirmation of Hugo L. Black to the Supreme Court bench was politics, apparently aimed to embarrass President Roosevelt.

In a prepared statement Sen. Connally said that the "effort to embarrass the President is wholly without merit and I am wholly out of sympathy with such efforts."

He defended Mr. Roosevelt's appointment of Sen. Black and said that the President had stated he had "no knowledge when Justice Black was appointed as to any prior affiliation." Black may have had with the Ku Klux Klan.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—The controversy resulting from a newspaper expose alleging that Supreme Court Justice Hugo L. Black was a life member of the Ku Klux Klan was extended today. Sen. Burton K. Wheeler, Dem. Mont., demanded that President Roosevelt appoint an "impartial board" to investigate.

Their capture led to the discovery of the source of seven saw blades smuggled into the jail.

Charges of smuggling were filed against Mrs. Selma Canedo, wife of a convicted murderer, Louis Rodriguez, trusty and a friend, Estella Garcia.

AUSTIN, Sept. 17.—Gov. James V. Allred was due to return to Texas today from his trip to the governors' conference at Atlantic City, N. J. He was expected to reach Wichita Falls during the day and go from there to Amarillo before returning to his office here.

Bidding On State Oil Lands Proves Complicated Task

AUSTIN, Texas — Greatest amount of state land opened for oil leasing at one time was approached but not equalled this month. Land Commissioner W. H. McDonald estimated the total acreage on which bids were taken Sept. 7 at 140,000. Former Land Commissioner J. H. Walker offered 256,000 acres at one bidding.

The offering of large quantities is believed by the commissioners to attract bidding. Unless the area is proven territory, bidders are not interested if they can not bid on a large acreage. They do not want to put down a wildcat well in a territory unless they control enough of the territory to make it worth while.

Neither the 140,000 acres nor the 256,000 acres were offered in one tract, but sufficient territory was listed in various parts of the state to make the prospect attractive.

Methods of bidding are very complicated for the uninitiated. The offers may vary from a specified cash bonus to a "logarithm bid." The latter term is used for the contingent bids that many times are received. The amount to be paid to the state varies greatly depending on production allowed under state production and the price of oil.

Even a non-logarithmic bid may be complicated. At this week's session of the state board of mineral development a bid was read on a lease in the Colorado River bed. The secretary read the bid twice on request. Then Railroad Commissioner Chairman C. V. Terrell asked to see the bid himself. He looked at it. Next Gov. Allred had to see it to understand it. Award was delayed for further inquiry.

Appendicitis Took 786 Lives In the State During Year

AUSTIN. — During the past year 786 persons died of appendicitis in Texas, according to vital statistics compilations of the State Department of Health. Many of these deaths might have been prevented had the patient been more aware of the disease and its symptoms.

There are two forms of appendicitis, acute and chronic. The form that appears suddenly, with great pain and sickness, is acute. Chronic appendicitis may extend over a long period of time and consists of slight attacks at intervals, but, at some time, there will usually occur an attack worse than any before and the disease

may then become serious. "In the presence of abdominal pain, give nothing by mouth. Never give laxatives. Apply an ice pack. Call your family physician. Abdominal pain which persists over a period of six hours is usually serious," advises State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox.

Hospital records show that the above advice has reduced appendicitis deaths 75 per cent. When otherwise healthy people are operated upon soon after the beginning of the "pain in the stomach" caused by appendicitis, little danger is experienced, but the surgeon's work is made more difficult and the patient's chance of recovery considerably lessened when there is a long delay in seeking medical help, and especially if a cathartic has been given.

How to prevent appendicitis? Keep the body in perfect health as long as possible. Watch your teeth, your tonsils, and place that an infection may occur. Get plenty

Junior Tennis For Texas Participation Urged by Penick

AUSTIN. — Dr. D. A. Penick, president of the Texas Tennis Association, has started a campaign to interest junior tennis players of Texas in the national championships.

Dr. Penick said many young players did not know how to go about entering the tournaments.

This can be done, he said, by playing in tennis center tournaments. The tennis centers are designated by the United States Lawn Tennis Association at the request of state or sectional associations. Tournaments at the centers must be completed at least two weeks before the corresponding national event is scheduled to begin.

Texas has had three such centers for many years. This year Texas requested and was granted six new centers. The list now includes Austin, Beaumont, Dallas, Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston, San Antonio, Tyler and Waco.

Despite a late start this year, tournaments were held in Austin, Beaumont, Dallas and Tyler. Representatives from each went to the national tournament at Culver, Ind.

Next year, Dr. Penick said, a start will be made in time to hold more tournaments. Additional centers by that time may be sought.

Texas Now Produces Bulk of Dairy Products Being Consumed in State

LUBBOCK. — Back in 1920, Texas was known as an importer of approximately 60 per cent of the dairy products consumed within the state. Today it produces the bulk of all these foods used within its boundaries and actually exports some of these Texas commodities.

This may in part explain why the South this fall will be honored for the first time by the staging of the Dairy Industries Exposition, largest regularly occurring industrial exposition in America, at New Orleans, Oct. 21 to 27 and the annual conventions of the International Association of Ice Cream Manufacturers and of the International Association of Milk Dealers at Dallas, Oct. 18-29, and Oct. 21-23, respectively.

The South has grown to such an extent that these great groups can no longer overlook its importance, and Texas has done its share in bringing this about.

According to Kenneth M. Renner, head of the Department of Dairy Manufactures, Texas Technological College, Lubbock, the bulk of the state's progress in dairying and dairy products manufacture has been made in the past 17 years.

"Butter manufacture," he points out, "has increased from approximately 9,500,000 pounds in 1920 to over 28,000,000 in 1936. In the same period, ice cream manufacture has increased by several million gallons."

"There is no record of manufacture of condensed milk, evaporated and powdered milk in 1920, yet today Texas ranks fourteenth among the states of the Union in the production of condensed milk; twenty-first in evaporated milk and twenty-third in dry milk."

"Cheese manufacture has skyrocketed. No regular factories on manufacture were reported in Texas as late as 1925, while today the state boasts of 28 cheese factories and ranks tenth among the states producing cheese. Milk casein manufacture was started only last year."

"The future of dairying in Texas is bright. The number of good dairy cows is increasing. Dairy herd improvement work is making rapid progress in raising the standard of Texas dairy cattle. Land reclamation and soil erosion service is putting more land back into pasture crops. All this means more economical production and economic security for the future dairy farmer of Texas."

Texas is rapidly assuming its place in the manufacture of dairy products. Competition is much keener than in 1920. The manu-

facturer who wishes to stay in business today must be an alert, energetic, capable business manager. He must keep in touch with the latest information regarding his particular line of business. Equipment must be kept up-to-date in order to meet competition and produce a quality product.

"New merchandising methods, new processes, new services and new and improved dairy supplies, which are a necessary part of our future progress in Texas, will be on display at the Dairy Industries Exposition. It is an opportunity to learn about the great dairy industry."

Texas Capitol Is Called a Firetrap In Need of Repair

AUSTIN, Texas.—Complaints are becoming numerous that when the legislature votes money for fireproof schools and hospitals, it sits in one of the "worst fire-traps" in Texas, in a building of proven danger to occupants so acute that some state senators have said their families are not permitted to come into the senate halls.

The Dairy Industries Exposition is justified in going south in 1937, and that Texas is interested in the continued growth and development of the dairy industry."

Glass and plaster have fallen in the senate chamber, in the board of control offices and in the corridors. Heavy fans have fallen from the 25-foot-high ceiling in the appellate court offices.

This year the senate almost voted \$200,000 to start repairing the half-century-old structure. It ended up by granting about \$50,000 for emergency repairs and fireproofing, and to stop a few leaks in the ceiling. Last year, it spent \$30,000 for a new floor and a few firelocks in the basement, and \$30,000 more for an underground vault to house 50 million dollars of state securities.

The capitol was built in exchange for 3,000,000 acres of land, given the Capitol Syndicate, in what has become the far-flung XIT ranch. Since, oil on some of the land, improved values of the land for farm purposes, and the growth of towns on the land, have rendered it worth \$100,000,000.

Be Prepared for War on Infantile Paralysis

The cost of being caught unprepared for one of the greatest single enemies that American boys and girls must face—infantile paralysis—never was so fearfully illustrated as in the early September flurry of the disease in numerous communities, from coast to coast.

In Denver, the life of one girl might have been saved if there had been just one more "mechanical lung" in the Rocky Mountain area. She had to share the only such device available with another paralysis sufferer.

In other towns and cities, measures to combat the spread of the disease were not begun in earnest until the paralysis threatened to reach epidemic proportions. And before the public finally was stirred into counter-attack, a grievous toll of death or deformity had been exacted from helpless youngsters.

There might be some excuse for being caught off guard in the case of a strange, new plague, unfamiliar to doctors and scientists. But, while we don't know everything about infantile paralysis, we do know what persons it attacks most readily, what measures will prevent its spread. And we do know much about treating persons who have contracted it.

Where, then, is the difference between preparedness for this kind of an enemy and the kind of enemy who moves in on the nation with battleships, airplanes and troops?

More than \$900,000,000 was appropriated in the last session of Congress for army and navy building in anticipation of a war at arms which not only doesn't exist, but which doesn't even threaten.

Now the so-called iron lung apparatus costs only a few hundred dollars. And it isn't necessary to wait on the slow-grinding federal machinery to provide those dollars. A few cents from each person in each community will buy a modern mechanical breather and install it in a hospital for year-round emergency use.

Furthermore, the apparatus is useful not only in treating paralysis victims, but in many other emergencies as well—pneumonia, electrical shock, near-drowning, broken neck, to name a few.

Here is a chance for the nation to try out constructive preparedness, the kind that augurs for health and happiness, and provides disease-stricken folk with a chance to make a fair fight for life.

Organization of the defenses ought to be the next big public welfare goal of every community. And the job ought to be started right now. Disease makes no proclamation of war, and postponing action until the "next time" may be fatal.

In spite of the glory, the average Englishman probably would rather have a crown in his pocket than one on his head.

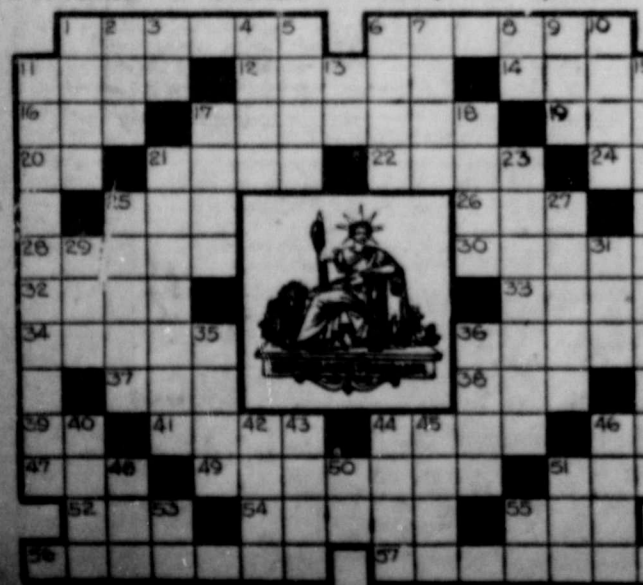

Older students will be what to do in emergency to administer first aid, summon fire trucks, ambulances and physicians, rules also will be studied.

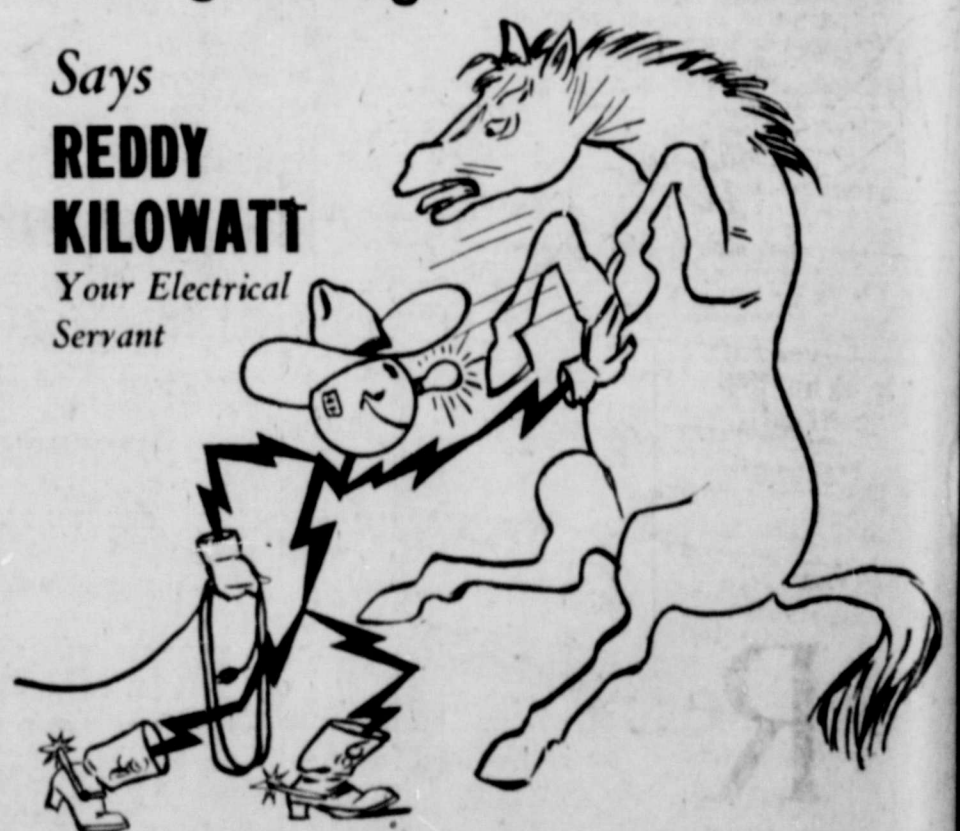

Pilot Merrill Only One Who Flew Over Atlantic, Pacific



Veteran of more than three million miles of air travel, Pilot Dick Merrill is the only man in history ever to make two round-trip flights across the Atlantic Ocean. He holds the record for the fastest two-way journey ever completed over the Atlantic.

Merrill returned to America from his Coronation flight to England in less than five days after he had first taken off at Floyd Bennett Field in New York. His 3600 miles eastward trip had been covered in 21 hours and 2 minutes with an average speed of 170 miles per hour, and his average speed for the return flight home was 144 miles per hour. His flight covered a total distance of approximately 7,000 miles in less than five days.

Pilot Merrill is credited with being the first pilot to bring his plane to and from Europe without an accident. His Coronation flight, which was his second round-trip ocean crossing in less than a year, was the first commercial flight ever made across the Atlantic. As representative of a

newspaper syndicate, he procured and returned to America pictures of the colorful Coronation.

SISTER MARY'S KITCHEN

IT may be salads that put the "it" in Hollywood. Movie stars watch their diet, seek streamlined figures and vital energy. They demand salad bowls with every meal. Yes, right through the year. It's getting along toward fall now and they begin to change from summer to fall types of salads. The recipes given below will take you behind the scenes of many a star's kitchen and reveal how they eat for health and glamor.

A few notes first on salad bowls themselves. Use a wooden one and keep it for green salads and nothing else. Wood is absorbent, so after being rubbed with garlic and anointed with oil over a period of time, your wooden bowl will achieve a delicious personality and play a leading role in making your salads taste better. To clean the wooden bowl, wipe it out with a damp soft cloth. Let it dry in the air but not in the sun. Never dry it on a radiator or near intense heat. Follow these simple rules and that flavorful bowl will never warp or crack.

Prevue Night Lettuce Bowl (4 to 6 servings)

Two cups canned salmon, or cooked halibut, 1-2 cup chopped cucumber, 1 cup chopped celery, 1 green pepper, 1 head iceberg head lettuce, broken into pieces, 3-4 cup salad dressing mixed with onion juice, 1-4 cup chopped sweet pickles, 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped, 3 tomatoes.

Combine fish with cucumber, celery, green pepper and tomatoes. Arrange in bowl with lettuce and toss with French dressing.

Malibu Beach Lettuce Bowl (6 servings)

One small head cauliflower, 6 small stalks broccoli, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup highly seasoned

Tomorrow's Menu

BREAKFAST: Honeydew melon, creamed ham, popovers, orange marmalade, coffee, milk.

DINNER: Grapefruit on halfshell, pot roast of beef with vegetables, buttered noodles, Frenched beans, asparagus tip salad, pineapple sherbet, sweet wafers, coffee, milk.

SUPPER: Cream of mushroom soup, Malibu Beach salad bowl, toasted rye bread, fresh coconut layer cake, coffee, milk.

French dressing, 1 head crisp lettuce, broken into pieces, 1 large grapefruit, 2 tomatoes, peeled and quartered.

Cook broccoli with salt until tender, about twenty minutes; drain, marinate broccoli and uncooked cauliflower in French dressing. Place lettuce in a salad bowl and mix with vegetables, grapefruit and tomato sections. Toss lightly with French dressing.

Salad Bowl Toluca (6 servings)

Six peach halves, 2 oranges cut in round slices, 1 avocado, walnut halves, parsley, tart jelly, 2 heads iceberg lettuce.

Break lettuce into mouth size pieces. Fill center of peach halves with tart jelly. Marinate orange wheels and avocado strips in French dressing. Garnish with walnut halves and parsley.

Lettuce Bowl Eric Blare (6 to 8 servings)

Two heads crisp lettuce, 1 large avocado, 1-2 cup French dressing, 1-4 cup stuffed olives, sliced thin.

Line a large salad bowl with large outer crisp lettuce leaves. Add lettuce hearts and spoonful of avocado. Toss with French dressing mixed with sliced olives.
