## Bulldogs Again Should Be Tough

With seven starters back on offense and eight on defense, the Tahoka Bulldogs football team should again be right at the top of the district battle, but again may find the competition plenty tough, says head coach A.D. Shaver.

Shaver started his Bulldog candidates working out this week, and sees defense as a strong point and lack of experience in the offensive line as a possible problem for the Blue and White this season. And, of course, the

competition from other district teams, especially Post and Slaton, should be fierce. One football magazine predicts Tahoka will win district and another sees it as a tossup between Post and Tahoka. But Shaver cautions that not only Post, but some other teams could be rugged. "Slaton is always tough, and Roosevelt has eight returning starters," he observed. He also noted that Frenship has hired Bobby Davis, formerly a highly successful coach at Post, as head coach.

The Bulldogs will scrimmage Morton here at 4 p.m. Aug. 21 and will scrimmage Olney at Haskell at 4 p.m. Aug. 28. Regular season opens at Stanton at 8 p.m. Sept. 4.

### All Bigger

Several returning starters, nearly all of whom are bigger than they were last season, will be back. At quarterback will be senior Mark Hudlin, up to 185 from last year when he was a starter and a good option runner. Junior Tony Garcia was the junior varsity starter last season and provides some good depth at quarterback.

Johnny Alvarado, who played tight end and did the punting for the Dogs last season, has been shifted to

fullback, and he is up to 223 pounds. Halfback candidates will be Danny Thompson, 202, James Wells, 170, and Willie Ray Mitchell, 160. All are seniors.

At offensive ends the Bulldogs may offer Daniel Garcia, 185, and Marcus Del Toro, 150, both of whom played last year.

### Baseball Injury

Jeff Jennings, 175, is working at center, since another center who played last season, Malcolm Chancy, broke an arm recently playing baseball. Greg Curry, 165, and Marty Cooper, 205, are looking strong at guards. Richard Payne, a starter at tackle last season, is back at 200 pounds, and Roger Dockery, 185, has been working the other offensive tackle spot. Roddy Williams is another and expected to see lots of action.

In the secondary, Alvarado is being tried at middle linebacker, and the coaches are looking for some other linebackers. Hudlin and Del Toro should man the corners and Wells may be one of the safeties. Curry and Payne are lettermen in the line, and Thompson, a fierce pass rusher at defensive end last season, should be there again, with Danny Garcia at the other end.

Shaver's first assistant again will be Budd Todd, and other returning assistants are Tommy Boyd, Bill Montgomery and T.A. Bell. New coaches recently hired are Ben Blair, who will be the head basketball coach and will handle freshman football, and Felix R. Fabila, who formerly coached 8 years at Alderson Junior High in Lubbock.

Blair, who formerly coached at Wilson, comes to Tahoka from Raton, N.M.

## Burglars Steal 19 Firearms In County

Either the dissidents are arming for a big uprising or--as is more likely--thieves have found a good market for guns. In the last week 19 shotguns and rifles have been stolen in Lynn County.

Twelve of the firearms were stolen at the home of Mickey Pearce, Rt. 1, O'Donnell, last Wednesday. Also stolen were clothing items, jewelry, stereo and other items, with the entire haul valued at \$5,460.

The other seven guns were reported stolen Saturday. The home of Carl Griffing, Rt. 4, Tahoka, was hit by burglars who took the guns and also some meat from the deep freezer.

On Friday Rosendo Flores Escobedo, Rt. 4, 2 miles east of Petty Gin, reported a stereo, Kay guitar, clothing and miscellaneous items valued at a total of \$698 taken by burglars.

A Tahoka man arrested by city police Friday night on charges of disorderly conduct and public intoxication was assessed an unusually stiff fine of \$226 on the disorderly conduct charge after some other persons allegedly tried to keep officers from arresting the man. The suspect

## Fees For Serving Papers Increase

Lynn County commissioners Monday voted to increase fees charged for process serving by the sheriff's department official about the possibility of more farm-to-market roads in the county.

Commissioners also voted to notify all department heads in the county of the current status of their departmental budgets and remind them they are expected to operate within those budgets for the rest of 1981.

It was voted to authorize Pct. 3 commissioner Bart Anderson to borrow \$20,000 to pay on equipment.

C.W. Nall, district engineer with the Texas Hwy.

Dept., told the group construction of some new farm-to-market roads is being considered in the county, and the group advised him their first priority would be an 8-mile section running north and south, from a point on U.S. 380 10 miles west of Tahoka to connect with FM 1317 north of the city.

An amendment to the revenue sharing budget, transferring \$8175 into each of the four precinct funds, was approved, as was transfer of \$1718 into each precinct fund from road and bridge funds.

Fees for process serving were increased to \$10 for small claims court, \$15 for justice courts, and \$20 for all other courts. Currently these charges are \$5, \$8 and \$10. For certain other services, such as writ of attachment, fees are being increased to \$25 from the current \$10 or \$12.

The group also discussed joining cities and school districts to implement court suits on delinquent property taxes.

All commissioners and Judge Melvin Burks were present.

## County Rainfall Heavy

The second big rain for Lynn County in as many weeks Tuesday and Wednesday silenced those farmers who had complained after the first one that it wasn't quite enough.

Rainfall was general throughout the county, averaging from an inch to more than 2.5 inches, and some portions such as the New Lynn area which previously had received very little moisture did get good rains, reportedly up to 2 inches.

In Tahoka the rain officially measured .76 on Tuesday and 1.52 up to 10:15 a.m. Wednesday.

## C-C Thanks Cleanuppers

Tahoka Chamber of Commerce directors last week expressed appreciation to those who cut weeds, carried off trash and otherwise spruced up their property, both business and residential, during the recent cleanup campaign.

"A lot of places really look better since the cleanup," a spokesman said, "and it's a nicer view for those driving around town, particularly making a better impression on visitors."

It was noted that some still are keeping the cleanup going, and the chamber group expressed gratitude for this also.

## America Faces Morality Crisis Speaker Says

He cited the fact that America was founded by people fleeing European bondage to gain freedom of rights, thought, and religion.

David Clary, local high school student, at Tres Ritos, N.M., also made a short talk on the annual summer Rotary-sponsored camp that he and Todd Lockaby attended recently. He was impressed by talks made there by several outstanding men, and declared the camp is a great influence in building youths into worthwhile citizens.

### WOODWORK

EVERYBODY KNOWS that honesty is supposed to be the best policy, and greater minds than mine have pondered the question of "What is truth?" But while I agree that telling the truth is the best policy most of the time, there are times when some kind of evasion, or outright fib, is the kindest thing for all concerned.

We discussed in Sunday School one day whether it is better to tell the truth, flat out, every time or if it is sinful to tell a kinder lie. For instance, suppose someone calls you up and asks you to come over and eat some chocolate ice cream in a few minutes. Do you say, "Gee, that sounds great, but I'm afraid we can't make it this time...my wife just rolled up her hair." (or I'm not feeling too well, or we're expecting a call from President Reagan, or we just finished eating dessert, or whatever).

Or do you tell the truth: "I'd really rather stay home and watch TV, and besides, I hate chocolate ice cream"? Or "We'd like to come over, but we're sick and tired of hearing about your grandchildren." Or "everytime we come over there your blamed cat rubs all over us, and we can't stand cats."

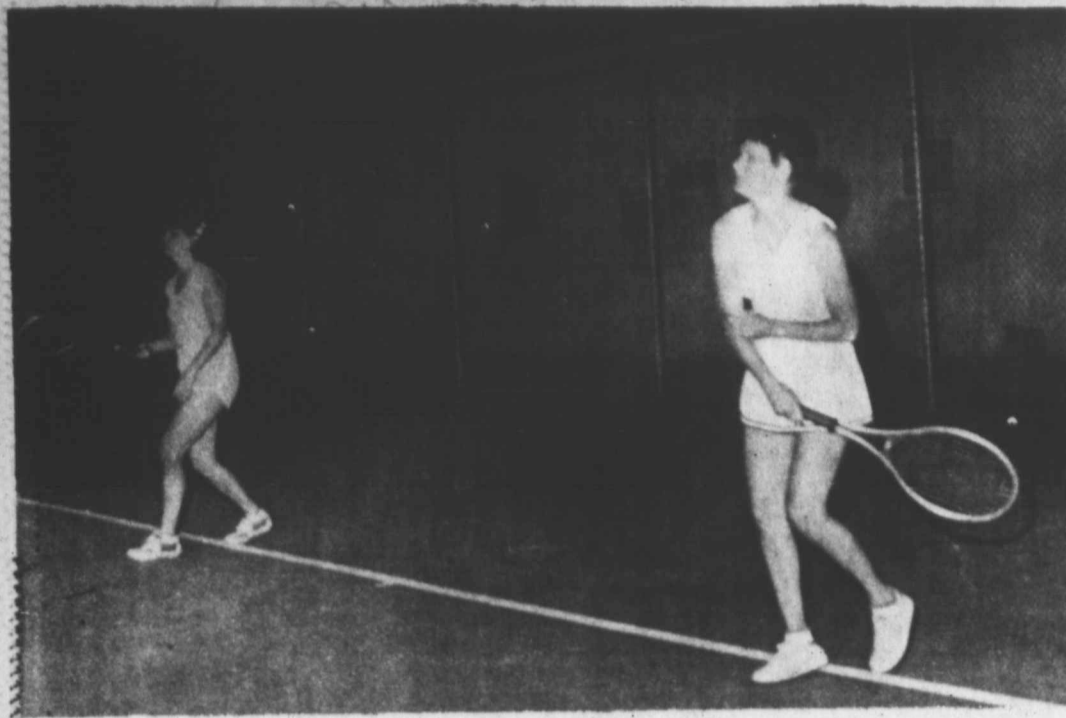
Suppose your 12-year-old daughter bakes cookies and hands you one that tastes a little strange and then looks up and asks you, all big-eyed, if you liked it, and did it taste good. Do you tell her it tastes terrible, but you love her anyway, or do you brag about how good it is?

So maybe it is a sin to tell a lie, except when it is necessary.

There are some other examples of not telling things like they are that we have to deal with occasionally. For example, in obituaries, we try to avoid printing that someone "passed away" or "expired" or "crossed over the Great Divide." Sometimes those things get past us, but usually we just change them to "died." It's a lot plainer and sounds more dignified. I try to tell our staff that only old quarterbacks pass away, and that only subscriptions expire.

I'm going to get in trouble here, probably, but I also think it's kind of dumb for people to say about their pets that "I had to have poor little Poochie put to sleep."

We have had several dogs we were quite fond of, and couple of them we had to have killed because that was the merciful thing to do. So call it killed, or put to death, or murdered, but it's not sleep.

My wife and I have been having an ongoing "friendly dialogue" concerning life insurance for her. She maintains she doesn't need it and doesn't want it. I say it's a good idea. Can you arbitrate?

While she is working and contributing a substantial amount to the family earnings, life insurance on a wife has become more and more vital to overall family financial planning. If she is not employed, but functions as a housewife and mother, insurance is still important. Simply put, a housekeeper or babysitter or some daycare arrangement would be required to replace her services. If salaried, her coverage should be proportionate to her contribution to the total family income. For the housewife, coverage should be based on the cost of services for which the husband would have to begin paying.

#### How to Can Tomatoes and Peas

**TOMATOES**  
Preparation: Wash and sort fresh, firm, vine-ripened tomatoes. Put in wire basket or thin cheesecloth bag. Dip in boiling water 1/2 minute or until skins crack. Plunge into cold water immediately. Remove core and skins. Leave whole or cut in halves or quarters. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to each pint or No. 2 can and 1 teaspoon salt to each quart.

**One-Step Cold Pack:** Pack tomatoes to 1/2 inch of top of jar, pressing gently to fill

spaces. Add no water. Close and Process.

Containers and boiling water bath time: pints, 35 minutes; quarts, 45 minutes. Remove containers from water bath and cool.

#### Tomato Juice

Preparation: Wash well-ripened tomatoes. Cut away any bruised or green portions. Quarter. If seprosieve is available, put tomatoes through it without heating. Otherwise, simmer 10 mins. in covered pan (without adding water) and press through a fine strainer or cheesecloth. Heat juice to simmer-

ing in a covered pan. Add 1/2 teaspoon salt to a pint or No. 2 can and 1 teaspoon salt to a quart or No. 2 1/2 can.

**Hot Pack:** Pour simmering juice into glass jar to 1/2 inch of top or 1/4 inch of top of plain can.

Close and process. Containers and boiling water bath time: pints and quarts, 10 minutes; No. 2 and No 2 1/2 cans, 15 minutes. Remove containers from water bath and cool.

#### Pears

Preparation: Can only ripe mellow pears. Gather Kieffer pears when they become slightly yellow. Wrap in paper and allow to mellow. This may require 2 to 3 weeks. Summer pears may be canned after ripening on tree. Wash pears. Peel, cut in halves and core. Pack according to one of the following methods.

**One-step, Cold Pack:** Pack raw fruit to 1/2 inch of top of jar. Cover with boiling sirup, leaving 1/2 inch space at top of jar.

Close and process. Containers and boiling water bath time: pints, 25 minutes; quarts, 30 minutes.

Remove containers from water bath and cool.

**Sirup Recipes:**  
Thin sirup: 2 cups sugar, 4 cups water or juice; yield, 5 cups.

Medium sirup: 3 cups sugar, 4 cups water or juice; yield, 5 1/2 cups.

Heavy sirup: 4 1/2 cups sugar, 4 cups water or juice; yield, 6 1/2 cups.

Boil the sugar and water or fruit juice together for 5 minutes. Skim if necessary. One cup of sirup usually covers 1 quart of fruit when it is well packed. Sugar helps canned fruit hold its shape, color and flavor, but it is not needed to prevent spoilage. If preferred, fruit may be canned without sweetening in its own juice, in extracted juice or in water. Process unsweetened fruit the same as sweetened. For instructions on using artificial sweeteners in canning write the manufacturer of the sweetener.

### Land Bank Loans Total \$2 Billion

The Federal Land Bank of Texas has achieved a major milestone in its 64-year history, with \$2 Billion in loans outstanding, announced Thomas H. Benson, president.

### Scanning Social Security

Today's column is informational in nature because of the common occurrence of the events described in it.

Downward changes in the economy, tightening of the rules of issue of social security cards, and the general

trends of more crime in heavier populated areas, creates more loss of purses and billfolds.

When a person loses a purse or a billfold it rarely is recovered as the person taking it does not want to admit

to a crime. This doesn't make it any easier for the loser to recover or replace his lost credit cards, his cards for other purposes or his social security card.

The Social Security Administration has been working with new rules for the issue of social security original and duplicate cards. The new rules were designed to prevent issuing account numbers to those ineligible for account numbers. The program has been working very well.

Tightened regulations include use of original birth or baptismal certificates, use of all forms of identity for all applicants, and documentation certified to on the application by a social security administration employee that the documents were observed personally.

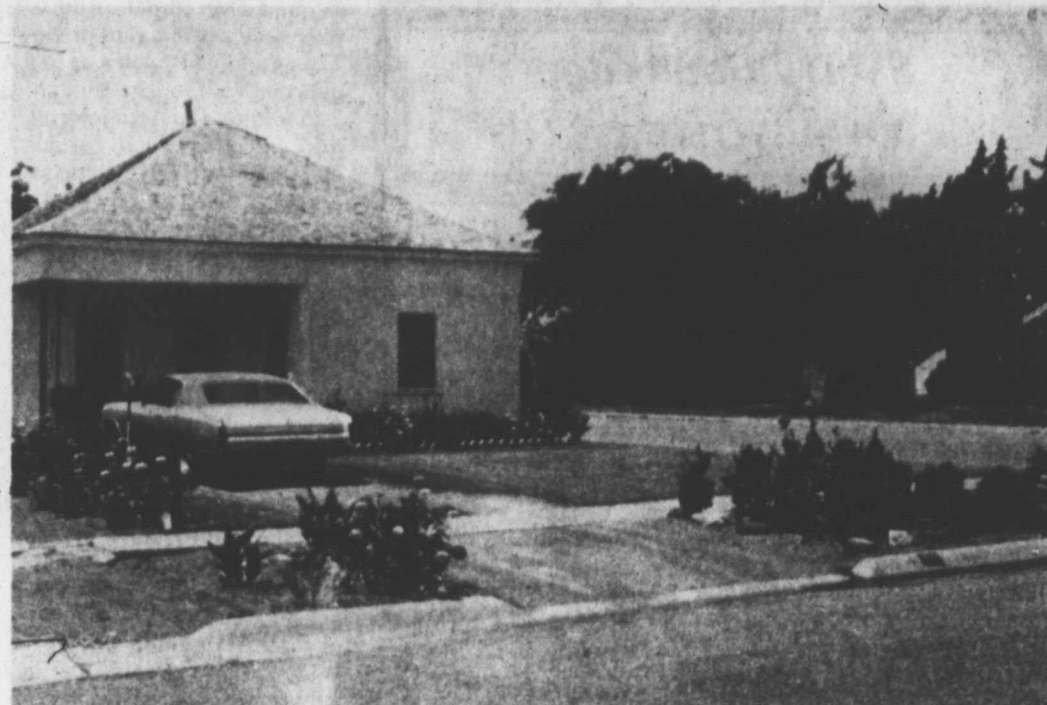

## A Visit With Your County Agent

### Irrigation Awareness Week August 17-22, 1981

Lynn County irrigation farmers will be encouraged to take a close overall look at their irrigation practices and efficiencies during the week of August 17-22, according to Stanley Young, County Extension Agent.

A demonstration of how to determine the efficiency of a pumping unit will be held on Aug. 17. For time and place contact extension office, 998-4650 or SCS, 998-4622.

Procedures of testing and determining the efficiency will be conducted by the Soil Conservation Service and the Extension Service.

Lynn County has approximately 60-65,000 irrigated acres in the county. Most of this acreage is devoted to the growing of cotton.

Obtaining top efficiency for these farmers is most crucial in the times of rising fuel costs and tight economic condition.

Obtaining that peak efficiency is a difficult task that confront producers but suitable efficiency is also one of the most effective means of keeping those irrigation fuel

bills in line.

"Today it's essential to know how much water you're putting out, especially if your per-acre fuel cost for irrigation is \$80-\$100 or more. You need to know what makes your costs this high. Particularly on crops other than corn or alfalfa, if your fuel cost is that high you may be putting on too much water or your pumping is inefficient," says New.

Irrigation pump efficiency testing has been an area of growing emphasis on the High Plains the past several seasons. Tests are performed either by the Extension service or by private firms with the necessary equipment. Efficiency testing is sure to be more important in the near future.

"Our test show that one of every two pumps is less than 50 percent efficient. Reduction of fuel costs would pay for pump repairs in one or two years at today's costs for any pump that's less than 50 percent efficient," says New.

His tests have shown that irrigation pumps in West Texas have an average efficiency of 55 percent, although individual efficiency readings range all the way from a low of 20 to a maximum of 81 percent. An efficiency rating of about 75 percent is generally considered economically attainable.

Efficiency tests that a farmer can have performed on his wells let him know his fuel cost per acre inch of water and per hour of pumping. The test is divided in to two parts, the first dealing with the engine and the second with the pump.

The engine portion of the test measures rate of consumption of fuel by the engine and horsepower delivered on the shaft by the engine. Those figures yield an engine efficiency figure.

The other phase of the test measures shaft horsepower into the pump, gallons of water pumped per minute, discharge pressure and suction lift. All these readings allow calculation of pump efficiency.

The pump efficiency reading is then compared to a 75 percent efficiency standard while engine efficiency is compared to a 24 percent attainable standard. Projected savings at peak efficiency can then be figured and a producer can graphically see his payout time for repairs.

New has projected figures on the influence of pump efficiency on the cost of irrigation with an electric pump, based on an anticipated cost of 8 cents per kilowatt hour, which many producers will likely be paying within the next two years.

Figuring a well pumping 450 g.p.m. and lifting the water 250 ft., New projects that pumping an acre inch of water at 75 percent efficiency would cost the producer \$1.04 per kilowatt hour. If efficiency drops to 50 percent

## COTTON TODAY

### Texas Introduces Natural Gas Deregulation Bill

Rep. Phil Gramm (D-Tex) of Marshall this week introduced legislation to accelerate natural gas decontrol. The bill would (1) remove price controls on natural gas from wells drilled after January 1, 1981; (2) raise existing ceiling prices for other natural gas so that BTU-basis price of natural gas by 1985 would equal price of No. 6 fuel oil; (3) eliminate all price controls on natural gas by January 1, 1985; and (4) repeal the incremental pricing provisions of current law.

**EPA Assistant Nominated:** President Ronald Reagan has nominated Dr. John A. Todhunter as assistant administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency for pesticides and toxic substances. The post was formerly held by Steven D. Jellinek. The Senate must confirm the nomination, and environmentalist groups oppose Todhunter's nomination because he formerly was science adviser for the American Council on Science and Health. The opposition claims ACSH is "a front for industry." Todhunter now is program chairman of Catholic University's biochemistry department.

At the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, John Martonik has replaced Bailus Walker as Deputy Director of Health Standards and will be in charge until a director is named. Martonik formerly was in OSHA's compliance section and the National Cotton Council staff has worked with him on cotton dust issues for more than a year.

**Fall Board Meeting Slated:** The National Cotton Council's Board of Directors will meet September 17-18 at the Peabody Hotel in Memphis, with Chairman Herman Probst presiding. Probst is a cotton grower of Anson, Texas. Since the session coincides with the reopening of the hotel, which was the site of the NCC's organizational meeting in 1938, members of the original Committee on Organization will be honored guests. Other special activities also are planned.

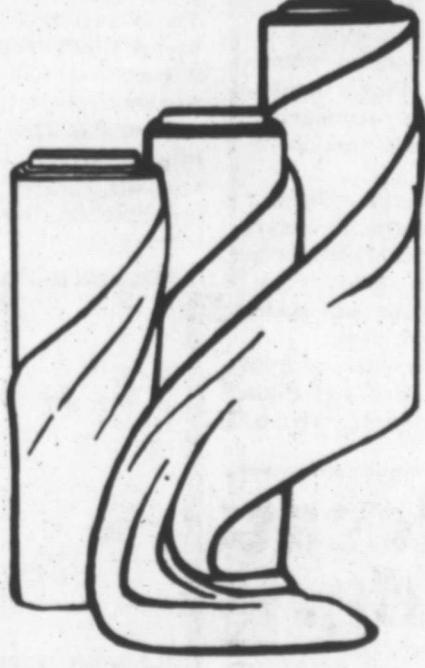

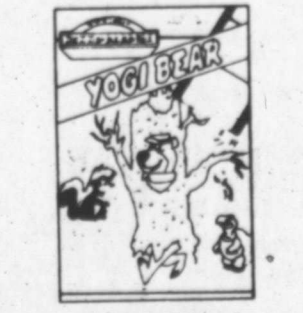

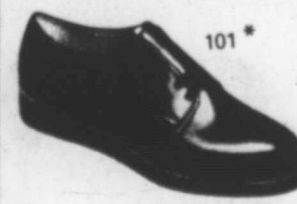
