As the war in Europe grows more wide-spread in scope and more serious to the safety of the democracies from Hitler's domination, more serious attitude toward defense is being taken by Uncle Sam. The acuteness of the defense program is reaching out into the small communities of Uncle Sam's domain. Just last week a transient passing through the country on a bicycle, lugging along about everything in a camper's outfit, was taken into custody by Odessa officers upon information given them by an officer from the military camp at Midland. It was purported that the transient had been hanging around the military camp taking pictures and making maps. However, upon investigation, it was found that the suspect carried the proper discharge papers of a World War veteran, and objecting in no way to lengthy questioning by officers, he was released. But it goes to prove the strict watch the Army is keeping to guard and protect our national defense.

Many large communities have organized Home Guards not only to protect their local interests from any fifth column movement, but to aid the U. S. in carrying out its defense program. Smaller communities are giving consideration to launching a home protection movement to "keep an eye on" suspicious characters that might be in the community or passing through it. As the European war grows more serious in its effect upon the democracies, more acute will become the situation in every community large or small to defend its defense security as well as that of the United States. This will mean that every community will have a protective organization that will scrutinize the movement of every stranger who happens in its midst.

As all are aware this community is practically only a stone's throw of a border country that is infested by spies and by most very nationality, most of whom can be bought for the price of a hamburger. We all know that a snooter is good at pitching dollars "swine" that will do a "job" for him.

REPORTER, this week, is devoting much space to one of Martin county's prominent ranchmen, B. T. Hill of the Circle Bar Ranch, in the northeastern part of the county. The feat he has performed as a sheep feeder this year and as a cattle feeder in past years, is worthy of high commendation, and it's the duty of this newspaper to broadcast the commendation to the "four corners of the earth," if it be possible. The project that Mr. Hill has carried to a successful completion this year is one that reveals that to the sheep feeding industry in Martin county can compare the success as the feeding lots of the Northern states, as the story of Mr. Hill appearing elsewhere in the Reporter, will testify.

Mr. Hill has proved that cattle and sheep raisers of Texas are not compelled to send their livestock to out-of-state feed lots to be finished for packing house consumption. The finishing process can be done in the home feed lots of Texas ranchmen.

Prior to the past year Mr. Hill won top market honors with cattle shipped to the Fort Worth market that had been finished in the feed lots on his own ranch. He entered the sheep feeding experiment for the first time, under a condition that odds for success were very much against him. He could gather no information from sheep raisers as regards to a course to pursue in feeding lambs. He met with a discouraging aspect on that score. But with confidence that he could make the "same grade" in lamb feeding as he had in past feeding cattle, Mr. Hill bought 5,000 head of lambs and delivered to his ranch last

WAGE STATEMENTS WILL BE ISSUED BY SECURITY BOARD

**BIG SPRING OFFICE
WILL FURNISH CARDS
IN SUCH QUANTITIES
AS DESIRED**

The Big Spring Social Security Board field office has on hand a supply of post cards, already addressed to the Social Security Board, bearing a printed request on the opposite side with space provided for the sender's signature, his social security account number, and postoffice address. This card, when signed and mailed, will bring to the individual signing the card a statement of all wages credited to his old-age and survivors insurance account. Robert M. Mayne, manager, said today.

"Every worker should be interested in knowing the status of his old-age and survivors insurance account," Mayne said, "since the amount of his insurance benefits are based on wages credited to his account. To obtain a statement as to his wage credits, a wage earner must only secure one of these post cards, fill in the blanks as indicated, attach a one-cent stamp, and place it in a mail box. Within the time necessary for the card to go to Baltimore and come back to his mailing address, he will be in possession of the information requested."

Mayne emphasized the importance of securing wage statements in cases where the workers have been or expect to be inducted into the military service and persons change from covered to non-covered employment. "It's just like a savings account," he said, "and anyone possessing a savings account wants to know how much he has put away for a rainy day."

The Big Spring Social Security Board field office will be glad to furnish these cards to individuals or employee groups in such quantities as desired, upon request by mail or in person, Mayne concluded.

SOIL CONSERVATION MEETING HELD AT COURTNEY MONDAY

**MOVING PICTURES
SHOWN OF SOIL WASTE
AND CONSERVATION
OF WATER**

Delightfully entertained and chaperoned by County Agent George Bond, a representative of The Reporter attended a soil conservation service meeting Monday night at Courtney. To make sure he did a good job chaperoning us, Bond drove a brand-spanking new late model automobile right up to our front door and loaded us in for the 8-mile journey to our destination. The car is sort of a lazy man's vehicle. The driver stops, starts, goes etc., by manipulating a lever on the steering wheel and it was Bond's first attempt at engineering an automobile equipped with new driving device. However, this fact was not made known to us by Bond until we were several miles out of town, and I could see ourselves climbing telephone poles or riding a-straddle a barbed wire fence. But we made the sound trip o. k.

The first meeting of a schedule of several billed for Martin county, was the Monday night meeting at Courtney. Few farmers of that community were present. Included among them were T. B. Stewart, J. W. Blocker, Walter Kelly, and J. D. McCrless, and among the ladies, Mrs. S. F. Jones.

It was the first of an educational program launched in behalf of soil conservation service. To interest farmers to prepare their land to prevent erosion from wind and water, and to conserve the moisture on their soil, etc.

County Agent Bond was master of ceremonies, opening the meeting with a brief but factual talk on the higher productivity of land terraced or contoured than land that is not.

Glen L. Fenner, of San Angelo, representative of the soil conservation service, explained the activities of the conservation agency, followed by a brief talk from O. P. Griffin, county agent of Howard county.

Following talks by the speakers, Mr. Fenner, with his movie machine, showed on the screen many interesting pictures including soil erosion, both from wind and water, and the destruction of grass lands by overpasturing and permitting water from rains to run at will without providing a method of conserving it—the same was pictured of farm lands; the destruction of wild-life habitats by plowing up the lands. It was shown the value of wildlife to the land owners in that birds destroyed insects destructive to crops and the value of fur-bearing animals through the marketing of the fur for ladies' coats, etc.

The object of the meeting was to interest the farmers of the Courtney community to plan now for next year preparation of lands to stop the waste of water and land erosion through a system of terracing and contouring. It was explained by Mr. Fenner that to carry on the plan of conservation it would be better that the farmers organize themselves in groups of from five to fifteen to carry on the conservation project as the preparation of the lands through the group procedure would be an advantage in saving time compared to the time it would require in moving machinery to individual farms scattered about the community.

Applications for conservation service for farmers of the community were made available by Mr. Mann of Big Spring, a representative of the soil conservation service to fill out and send to the office of the SCS.

EXPECT TO MOVE TO NEW QUARTERS SATURDAY NIGHT

**JACK JONES GROCERY
AND MARKET TO
OCCUPY SPACE IN THE
KONZ BLOCK**

From what appears now to be the fact, workmen will complete their task on the Konz buildings this week-end, especially, completing the interior work on that part of the building the Jack Jones Grocery and Market will occupy. A room 52 wide by 90 feet long, has been built for the grocery store to occupy, making it a very spacious and attractive building for this, one of Stanton's most progressive enterprises. Jack Jones, the proprietor, stated Thursday, that he expected to move both stocks, the grocery and meat, and all fixtures Saturday night.

The entire front of the building is plate glass with large display windows, walls painted white as snow, and concrete floors.

Sufficient space has been left at the rear of the store for the loading and unloading goods for the store from trucks, and the building connected with the city's water system, and toilets, connected with the city's sewer system.

The Jones Grocery is moving from its location in the Bristow building on the new highway facing the T&P depot, a location the store has occupied the past two years. This store has grown from a "hole-in-the-wall" to one of considerable proportions since its establishment a few years ago, accredited to hard work and business sagacity of its proprietor, and that friendly greeting and hearty welcome that always greet the customer and the stranger alike as he comes into the store.

A few months ago Mrs. Florence Konz of Austin, a former pioneer resident of Stanton and owner of considerable property purchased the buildings and site on which they were located. At the time of her purchase of them the property was in a pretty well dilapidated and run-down "at the heel" condition. When all present work is completed on these buildings, they will be attractive to the town and to the eye of the stranger, and thanks goes to Mrs. Konz for her enterprise in converting what appeared more of a "dumping ground" spot into one of civic beauty.

The corner building next and south of the Jones Grocery, will be re-occupied by the Bentley shoe shop, behind which will be office rooms to Mrs. Graves beauty shop at the rear. The entire buildings have been connected with the city's water and sewer systems.

FOR IDEAL KITCHEN
VENTILATION

Since odor and heat rise better heat ventilation can be had by lowering windows from the top. Windows should reach within six inches of the ceiling. VERY ABLE TALKS AT
MEETING OF BROWN CLUB
BY MEMBERS

"It has long been admitted that the democratic form of government is more suited to modern social conditions than the monarchical government. Power to make decisions was invested by a group of people rather than in one ruler who has power to make decisions. Important questions are decided by a vote of all the people who hold citizenship rights. Since the democratic form of control has proved more satisfactory to large groups of people, the family group has adopted it too. No longer does 'the head of the house' make all the decisions but in most families every member has some voice in deciding important matters," said Mrs. Hughey Warner in her discussion of "The Democratic Family" Thursday, April 17, when the Brown home demonstration club met with Mrs. J. Hughey Barrow, president.

In her discussion on the Parent-Child Relationship, Mrs.

Belton Hill, poultry demonstrator for the Brown club, said: "There's no substitute for mother nor the rest of the family. We can substitute the brooder for the hen but we cannot successfully substitute the orphan's home for the happy family. Parents owe their children a happy home because the future success of the child's life depends on the type of childhood he has had."

"Recent studies show that 23 percent of the criminals come from broken and maladjusted homes. If parents will pay more attention to the high chair, society will pay less attention to the electric chair."

"Of all the songs inspired by love of home, 'Home, Sweet Home,' has been the most enduringly popular. Like many another favorite it was written for the stage. Its author was John Howard Payne, was living at the time in Paris, France. He had been sent there by an English theatrical company to find
