MISS ELDER LANDS IN OCEAN; SAFE

MANY PHYSICIANS TO BE HERE ON NOV. 7-8

Announcement was made Thursday by Dr. J. G. Douglass, secretary of the Fourth District Medical Association, which comprises about 16 counties of Central West Texas, that more than 100 members of the medical profession would be visitors here on November 7 and 8, when the twenty-third annual meeting of the association would be held.

Dr. Douglass has been busy for the past two weeks preparing a program for the sessions and the program is not yet complete. Some of the best speakers of the medical fraternity of Texas will come here and one of the most successful meetings ever held in the district is expected.

"There are several hundred physicians of this section who are members of the association," Dr. Douglass stated, "but a 100 per cent attendance will be impossible as some of the doctors have to miss these meetings. They can not all be present at the same time. We expect, however, more than 100 from our neighboring cities and some of the most noted physicians of the state will be here and take part in the sessions."

Dr. Douglass said that nothing would be overlooked and that a social program was also being prepared for this convention.

Dr. T. Richard Sealy, of Santa Anna, is councillor for this district; Dr. J. W. Tottenham, of Brownwood, is president. Dr. Douglass has had the assistance of the other two officials in preparing the general program.

KIRK CASE IS DELAYED AGAIN

SWEETWATER, Oct. 13.—Trial of L. Paul Kirk of Abilene on a charge of murder in connection with the death of Crawford A. Tabor in Rannels county in 1923, was postponed tentatively until next week along with the entire criminal docket in Judge Fritz Smith's court here today.

George Mahon, who was appointed district attorney only two days ago, arrived this morning and is working with the grand jury. No definite date has been set for any trials on criminal charges.

Judge T. T. Crosson, of this city, is a special prosecutor in the Kirk case. It was heard in Ballinger two or three years ago and then transferred to Nolan county, where a hung jury resulted in the last trial.

Several citizens of the Wingate community of this county, where Tabor lived, are witnesses in the case.

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Oct. 13.—"I have not prepared a statement and do not intend to do so," said Lynn Talley, governor of the Eleventh Federal Reserve Bank at Dallas, when asked today if he would reply to the action taken at the meeting of thirty-seven South Plains bank executives at Lubbock yesterday in demanding the removal of Talley and Deputy Governor R. R. Gilbert.

The Lubbock meeting criticised Talley and Gilbert of the Federal Reserve bank for the policy of retiring loans to members in smaller cities when the money was needed to advance business credit.

PHYSICIAN AND WIFE SHOT DEAD

(By Associated Press) BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Oct. 13.—Dr. F. F. Blair, former state physician, and Mrs. Blair were found shot to death today, lying on the floor of their burning residence here.

The coroner was undecided as to whether the deaths were due to murder or suicide.

Woman Oil Operator Attains Success in Real Estate Field

(By Associated Press) WICHITA FALLS, Oct. 13.—One of the few women oil operators in the country, Mrs. Mabel Rowan of Wichita Falls, is also a successful real estate operator. Beginning as a real estate broker in Fort Worth several years ago, Mrs. Rowan entered the oil business in the natural course of affairs. Among the properties listed with her for sale was a large block of acreage in Reeves county. That was in the days before that section of Texas became oil producing land.

She acquired a large block of the Reeves county land for herself, subdivided and sold it for farming land. About the time she was ready to place the land on the market, the first oil well in that section "came in." As a result oil leases on Mrs. Rowan's land were sought by large oil companies. It was not long before she formed her own com-

pany and started drilling wells. She went out in the oil fields, dealt with hard-boiled drilling crews, pipe-liners and others, and directed her work personally. Donning overalls, she climbed derricks and sometimes assisted in pulling casing.

Not long ago she made a "location" for an oil well in West Texas. The territory was "condemned" by geologists, but Mrs. Rowan's well proved to be a producer. Recently she invested a large part of her money in Ft. Worth real estate. One lot for which she paid \$60,000, brought her an offer of \$100,000 a few weeks later.

Despite her achievements Mrs. Rowan is still unsatisfied. "I am working every day and sometimes nights," she says, "and expect to be doing the same thing for several years before I call myself a success."

(By Associated Press) Ruth Elder and George Haldeman, in the monoplane The American Girl, are safe on a Dutch tanker, the Barendrecht, approximately 1,000 miles out from Rotterdam and near the Azores Islands, a wireless message informed the Associated Press this afternoon.

The aviators left Roosevelt Field, New York Tuesday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock for Le Bourget, near Paris. They were overdue at the French capital since early today.

Details of the rescue of Miss Ruth Elder and Captain George Haldeman, in the trans-Atlantic monoplane, The American Girl, had not been received by the Associated Press at 2:00 o'clock this afternoon.

PARIS, Oct. 13.—A message to the Paris office of the Associated Press received this afternoon from Miss Ruth Elder, Florida aviatrix, told of her landing at sea beside the Dutch tanker, Barendrecht.

The message which announced that she and Captain George Haldeman were okeh, said the landing of the American Girl, while en route to Paris from New York, had been caused by a broken oil line.

The message did not give the position of the tanker.

It was received at the Paris office of the Associated Press at 4:35 p. m., and had been radioed from the Barendrecht to the steamship Bayano, which relayed it to a wireless station at De Bizzes.

The message read as follows: "Landed by steamship Barendrecht with broken oil line. Both Haldeman and myself okeh. Ruth Elder."

The news of the safety of Miss Elder and her companion came to turn gloom to joy when a growing anxiety was causing conviction that the American Girl had gone to join the other missing trans-Atlantic planes, when word came that the craft had made a successful landing at sea.

Its maximum time limit in the air was almost up and the plane was several hours overdue at Paris, according to Haldeman's estimate.

No word had been received from the plane since Tuesday night when a steamship saw her winging her way overhead, barely started on the long trail leading from New York to Paris.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Informed by the Associated Press that her husband and Ruth Elder were safe after landing at sea, Mrs. George Haldeman said, "Oh, thank you so much. I knew they would be all right."

Mrs. Haldeman and the backers of the flight, H. E. Cornell and T. S. McArdle, all expressed
