German Zeppelin Completes Voyage To America Hoover Makes Tariff Appeal To Eastern Industry

Candidate Strikes At Opposition In Speech In Boston

Democratic Interpretation of Tariff Problem Is Scored By Hoover In His Third Eastern Speech.

Al Not Mentioned

Assails Democratic Formula In Blunt Terms: "Comfort Of American Home" Is Issue, He Says.

BOSTON, Oct. 15.—Herbert Hoover struck out at the opposition here tonight in a manner unprecedented in his campaign for the presidency, assailing in blunt terms the tariff formula laid down in the Democratic platform.

Speaking to the country generally, but to industrial New England in particular, the Republican candidate declared that the adjustment of import duties by the Democratic formula of "effective competition" would mean "a reduction of the tariff and a depression in American wages and American farm prices."

Means Foreign Goods. "It means," he said, "a flood of foreign goods of foreign farm products, and consequent reduction of wages and incomes not only of workers and farmers, but the whole of those who labor, whether in the

Minister's Wife Killed by Train

Mrs. John Carney Dies and Husband Is Seriously Injured Near Snyder; Carney May Die.

ANDERSON, Oct. 15.—There is very little hope for the recovery of Mrs. John Carney, age 76, who was seriously injured here early this morning when a Santa Fe freight train ran into his automobile, killing his wife instantly. It was learned from the emergency hospital tonight.

Her Mr. Carney had spoken at the Sunday evening service at the Baptist church, on prohibition, and was returning home to Cleburne, according to John Wood, who saw the accident. Carney approached the tracks in his car and it came to a stop, then suddenly lurched forward directly in the path of the train, completely demolishing the car. He was well known over Texas for his prohibition activities.

Carried to Snyder. Following the accident, members of the train crew carried the injured minister to a Snyder hospital for treatment. His injuries are lacerations about the head and body, several broken bones and internal injuries. It is reported that in calling for a free will offering at the services he held Sunday night, Rev. Mr. Carney said that he might never be able to use any of the collection.

Brewing In Home Is Violation Of Law, Judge Says

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 15. (AP)—One who makes home brew for personal use, regardless of his character, is violating the prohibition laws and must pay the penalty, Federal Judge William H. Alwell told Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Wyatt of Brownwood here today in sentencing them to jail.

Mrs. Wyatt was given one day in jail and a fine of \$25. Her husband received six days in jail and a \$10 fine. "I like the looks of you young people," the Dallas judge said in pronouncing sentence. "You look like the right kind of folks and I hate to give you a jail sentence. But it seems to me there should not be anyone with the opinion that they can make home brew in their home with safety."

Prominent Texas Clubwoman Talks For Al Smith Here

Mrs. Cecil Smith, of Cleburne, Is Speaker Here In Democratic Rally; Is Strong For Party Man.

"When Al Smith shall take his place as president of the United States, we can look the world in the face and say, 'Behold, America is true to its traditions. No racial, social or religious test shall ever bar one of its sons from high office,'" was the declaration of Mrs. Cecil Smith, Texas clubwoman who spoke to a crowd of about 200 people in the district court room here last night at a democratic rally.

Mrs. Smith, whose home is at Sherman, is chairman of Civil Service, of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs.

Mr. Harris came to the Plains in 1910, moving to Lubbock from Yount county three years later.

Battle for South

Speaker Compares Republicans With Carpetbaggers Of Reconstruction Days Following Civil War.

AUGUSTA, Ga., Oct. 15.—Joseph Daniels, Secretary of the Navy in President Wilson's cabinet, declared in an address here tonight that "no respectable Southern Democrat would leave his party to vote for the Republican party in the government of his state, yet any democratic who votes the national republican ticket votes for corrupt and inefficient federal officers in his state and locality."

"For the first time since the dark shadow of reconstruction, which compelled the South to unite for government, the Southern states are regarded as close battlefields," he said.

G. O. P. Looks to South. "This year, republican politicians turn their eyes to this state and other old rock-ribbed democratic commonwealths in the hope of securing enough electoral votes from the South to make up the losses which they expect to sustain because of a revolt against the policy which has permitted the few to monopolize the bulk of property created by the labor of the many."

"If the secret circulation of literature the republican leaders are ashamed to send out under their names or under the much abused government frank; if the lavish use of money obtained from those enjoying special favors, and the misleading statements as to the republican policies succeed, they hope to temporarily reduce the South from its ancient faith."

No Heresies In Sentiment. "Nobody pretends there is any increase of republican sentiment in the South for republican policies. This would be impossible in view of the record of the republican administration."

Good Roads Group Meet Wednesday

Jed A. Nix, chairman of the Lubbock County Good Roads association, announced yesterday that the petition, which had been sent to Attorney General Claude Pollard, Austin, for his approval, last week, and which has been checked, will commence the latter part of this week. The association will meet Wednesday for the purpose of ratifying and starting the circulation of several copies of these petitions, which will go into every section of the county.

The petition calls for a special bond issue election, for the purpose of financing the building of good roads throughout Lubbock county. All state highways are to be paved and all county roads to be hard-surfaced, as named in the petition. The petitions will more than likely be presented to the county commissioners at its meeting next Monday. It is possible that the election may be called by December 1, the total amount involved to be \$2,000,000.

Germany Jubilant Over Dirigible's Successful Flight

Tension of Past 24 Hours Is Broken As News Of The Ship's Safe Arrival Is Spread Over Nation.

May Open Service

Natives of Friedrichshafen Happiest Over Success Of The Voyage; Ocean Service Is Planned.

BERLIN, Oct. 15.—(AP)—Jubilant, pride and satisfaction reigned throughout Germany as news of the safe arrival of the Graf Zeppelin was broadcast. Thousands admitted as the tension of the past 24 hours was relieved, that they had entertained apprehension lest the great German airship might never reach its destination.

Despite Dr. Eckener's admonition days before the start not to hurry in case the airship failed to arrive on schedule, or in case hours elapsed without a report of her condition, Germans in all walks of life grew uneasy, and pressed, admitted they feared the worst.

Receiver For Klan Asked In Atlanta

ATLANTA, Ga., Oct. 15. (AP)—The Atlanta Constitution tomorrow will say a receiver for the Ku Klux Klan is asked in a petition presented today to Judge Samuel H. Stiles of United States Circuit court, who ordered the suit to be filed tomorrow.

The petition, filed by C. T. Rice, who said he was a member of the Klan, charges Hiram W. Evans, Imperial Wizard, of the order and other officials of the secret organization have expended large sums of money in opposition to the candidacy of Governor Smith, democratic presidential nominee, because of Smith's religion.

It is also alleged in the petition that "Evans has diverted funds from the organization until it has become insolvent, despite the fact that it has collected more than \$100,000,000 from its members."

Calls For Cotton Pickers Continue To Come From Over South Plains Area

More Than Five Thousand Are Needed To Supply Labor Demand At Present, Reports Here Show: Federal Labor Man, Floyd Everhart, Stationed Here

The Lubbock Chamber of Commerce headquarters are being swamped with requests for cotton pickers by farmers of the South Plains, calls for from 1,000 pickers on down coming in from every section and almost every town.

Needs Picking Now. Cotton needs picking, right now, is the emphatic statement, and prospects for a good yield are brightening. Many farmers report evidence of a yield of half a bale to the acre. Some report bigger yields. One farmer, from seven miles north of Lubbock, says he has 80 acres and expects 50 or more bales from it, judging from the cotton that has already opened. Another farmer, who has between 300 and 400 acres to cotton, expects more than half a bale to the acre average, and the cotton is open on most of his acreage.

Hot Time In Old Town' As Germans Fete Ship's Safety

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Germany, Oct. 15. (AP)—There was a "hot time in the old town tonight" when word came of the safe arrival at Lakehurst of the Graf Zeppelin. All sleep was foregone and virtually the entire populace of this birthplace of the airship was on the streets celebrating completion of the voyage.

Directors of the Zeppelin works held banquet at which Dr. Hugo Eckener, his officers and crew and the constructors of the ship were all duly toasted in good German wine. The "Hochs" of the diners were punctuated by the clamor of bells from every temple in town and were almost drowned out by the music of all local bands, reinforced by musicians from nearby communities, who paraded the streets at the head of impromptu processions.

The great silver ship made her bow to the waiting continent at 9:45 o'clock this morning, Eastern Standard time, when she was sighted from Cape Charles, Virginia, northern promontory of the entrance to Chesapeake bay. Behind her were not only 6,000 miles of land and water, but anxious moments when a damaged, horizontal airship had forced her to reduce speed, and long hours of battling winds that were conspiring to keep her from the goal.

Victor Over Elements. "Triumph over wind, weather and ocean, she slipped over the Atlantic coast at 10:15 a. m. at a point six miles north of Cape Charles and from then on with Journey's end in sight, her sturdy motors kept her steadily on the densely populated coastal plain. She paid formal respects to Washington at about 12:30 p. m. alighting over Capitol and White House beneath an overcast sky, and then slipped north to visit Baltimore, Washington, Philadelphia, Trenton and New York, passing as she went many smaller communities which like their more populous neighbors saluted the vigorous voyager from street and house-top.

"It had indeed been a noteworthy voyage for the amazingly long distance record for craft of her type. As her mileage was in the neighborhood of 6,500. Although her hours for sustained flight, approximately 111 1-2, fell short of the record of the ill-fated French Dirigable, which had remained aloft 118 hours, she passed the mark of 100 hours made by the British R-34 in her westward flight across the Atlantic.

Left Germany Thursday. Graf Zeppelin, making the first commercial flight across the Atlantic, lifted her huge self aloft at Friedrichshafen Thursday morning at 2 o'clock Eastern Standard time. With her motors functioning perfectly she made no fuss about her departure for far-away America and went about her assignment in business-like fashion. Biele, Switzerland, heard her at 3:33 o'clock that morning and at 4 a. m. she crossed the Franco-German frontier.

At 7:30 o'clock, New York time, she passed over Lyons, France, and an hour and a half later was above the Mediterranean, Barcelona, Spain greeted her at 1:30 p. m. by New York clocks, a nd last Thursday midnight she hummed over gray Gibraltar.

On Friday, anniversary of the conclusion of Columbus's voyage in the battered Santa Maria, this silver air giant was sighted in the early morning off the coast of Spanish Morocco, and at 8:30 a. m. Eastern time, she was booming over Puncual, Madeira. At 1:49 o'clock Friday afternoon Graf Zeppelin was 176 miles west of south of Horta, The Azores.

Break In Log. Then came a break in the dirigible's log as it was being compiled by the waiting world, for it was 2:30 o'clock Saturday morning before she again was reported. This time the word came that she was

World's Largest Aircraft Ends 6,500 Mile Journey In 111 Hours; Landing Is Greeted by Throng at Lakehurst

THE LOG OF THE ZEP'S VOYAGE

NEW YORK, Oct. 15. (AP)—Graf Zeppelin, proud aristocrat of a long lineage of aircraft, cruised triumphantly up the mid-Atlantic coast today to show herself to millions of Americans who had followed with intense interest and some anxiety the progress of her record breaking voyage from Friedrichshafen, Germany.

Invalides Receive French War Heroes

PARIS, Oct. 15. (AP)—Plans of the French chamber of deputies and senate to reconstitute the Invalides, where Napoleon is buried, as the military Valhalla of France, are being carried forward by circumstance faster than the lawmakers anticipated.

Two of the world war marshals of France who are to sleep their last sleep in twilight glory under the Dome of the Invalides in the shadow of Napoleon's tomb are already within the sacred precincts of the church. Marshal Foch was the latest to be carried there with full military honors due his rank, his coffin followed by Marshals Foch and Joffre, and his charger, in funeral caparison led by orderlies. Marshal Maunoury, who died more than a year ago, also is interred in the Invalides.

Five marshals now living will eventually lie under the Invalides Dome with Foch and Maunoury. They are Foch, Joffre, Franchet d'Esperey, Lyautey and Petain. It is planned to place their tombs closer than any others to the body of France's greatest soldier as a symbol of their country's gratitude. They will lie in one of France's most hallowed spots. It consists of a small church in the form of a Greek cross with Napoleon's tomb as the center. Above the wall of the crypt is a gallery and one arm

Prospector Survives Trek Along Icy Trail As Partner Dies Enroute

Thrilling Tale of Hardship in Northland's Frozen Expanse Related; Airplanes Figure in Rescue Of Prospector; Feet Are Frozen In Jaunt

(By Associated Press)
WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 15.—Having staggered along an icy trail without food and with his feet frozen, while a life-saving airplane circled overhead unable to see him in the blinding ice glare, Thomas Cowan, prospector, was en route today for hospital treatment at Toronto. A companion died on the trail.

Cowan and Joe Rutherford, another prospector, were surveying the territory north of Baker Lake, in the northwest territories, 1,200 miles north of the Pass. They had been taken in by airplane. On the third day, when the plane was to have returned, a blizzard set in. With only a limited food supply and the blizzard threatening to bar rescue indefinitely the two men decided to strike out on foot for a trading post 50 miles away.

For two days they battled the storm, forced to throw away practically all their equipment to expedite their progress.

On the third day Rutherford, died. For five more days Cowan crawled on until he finally reached the post.

An Anglican missionary at the post gave him first aid and got word to the airplane base on Baker Lake. A plane came for him, but in attempting to take off the water crashed, imprisoning Cowan in the cabin. Just before the plane sank rescue boats pulled him and the three other men from the wreckage.

Another plane was sent in and brought him safely out to the Pass whence he came by train to Winnipeg.

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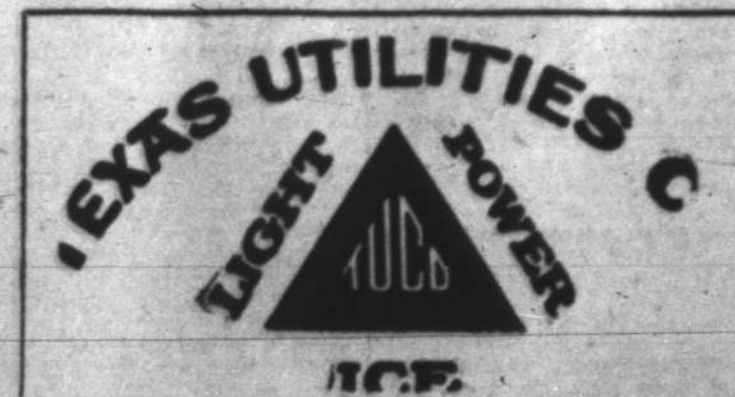

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Daily Markets

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK

FORT WORTH, Oct. 15. (AP)—Generally steady conditions prevailed in the cattle market here today. Steers sold from \$9.00 to \$10.25, cows from \$8.25 to \$9.75, and calves from \$10.50 to \$12.00.

Hogs were steady to 5c higher. The top price was \$9.75, with the bulk selling from \$9.00 to \$9.60. Pigs brought from \$7.00 to \$8.00 and pigs from \$7.00 to \$7.75.

In the sheep market, weathers were weak to 25c lower, selling from \$7.25 to \$7.50, and yearlings weak at \$8.75.

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 15. (AP)—S. D. A.—Liberal receipts of cattle around the 11-market circuit furnished the packers an opportunity to enforce a general decline of 25 to 50c on beef steers and yearlings.

Heavy steers were especially difficult to move and some sales were as much as 75c lower. Other killing classes were weak to 25c lower. Low priced cows off 15 to 25c.

Choice light weight stockers, however, continued to command a decided premium over kinds scaling 600 pounds and above. A short load of prime yearlings at Chicago scored \$18.25, but the practical top was \$17.90. Aggregate receipts were estimated at 145,800, an increase of 35,400 over last Monday and 9,500 short of a year ago.

Hogs were on a steady to strong basis as compared with last week's closing session. The days extreme top of \$11.35 was paid at Chicago. Total offerings approximated 29,300 against 101,347 a week ago, and

city eagerly awaits developments—and the papers get the story—all in the next chapter.)

Recapitalization plans formed the

basis for the advances in several of the high priced stocks. Directors of the American Smelting and Refining company today recommended a 3 for 1 stock split-up, stockholders of the Atlantic Refining company approved the 4 for 1 split-up recently recommended by directors, and sawtooth stores stock holders approved a 5 for 1 split-up. The United States Steel, Union Carbide, International Harvester and case Threshing companies were all mentioned in current recapitalization rumors. The annual dividend on Calumet and Hecla was increased today from \$2 to \$4.

Case Threshing was the spectacular individual feature, soaring 14 1/2 points to a new high record at 398 1/2 and closing near the top. National Tea soared 18 points to a new top at 281 and closed to 281 and Montgomery Ward ran up nearly 12 points to a new peak at 204 3/4 and retained all but a fraction of its gain. Industrial Ration, International Harvester, Motor Products, Otis Elevator, and General Cable all established new high records on extreme gains of 5 to nearly 10 points.

Fresh buying came into the oil shares on expectations of unusually favorable third quarter earnings, particularly by the refining companies. Special strength of Medcan Seaboard, which crossed 9 in a new high, was based on the recent discovery of a gusher well in Kings county, Southern California. Bescor Oil opened with a block of 15,000

shares at 22 and then moved up to a new top at 23 3/4. Predictions of higher copper prices and increased dividends stimulated the buying of the copper shares. Chile climbing more than 4 points to 34 7/8. American Smelting fell back 5 points but recovered most of its loss.

New peak prices for the year also were established by U. S. Steel common, Bethlehem Steel, American Can, Park & Tilford, Simmons Co. International Business Machines and Coca Cola. Chrysler ran up more

than 5 points and Hudson received fresh buying support but General Motors turned heavy. Heaviness also developed in Coty, Curtiss, International Nickel and Warren Bros. Selling of Goodyear, which broke 5 points, was attributed to the delay in the arrival of the Graf Zeppelin.

Foreign exchange rates were slightly reactionary. Sterling cable ruled a shade lower around \$4.85 1/2-3/4.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, Oct. 15. (AP)—The stock market gave an impressive demonstration of strength today in the face of a marking up of call money rates from 6 1/2 to 8 percent. More than 100 score issues were elevated to new high records, several of the gains running from 5 to nearly 25 points. Total sales ran over 4,000,000 shares.

Sale of a New York Stock Exchange seat was arranged this afternoon at the record-breaking price of \$480,000, \$15,000 above the record established only a few hours before and \$30,000 above the high price set last week. A committee of the Exchange was appointed to consider increasing the membership of the Exchange above the present limit of 1100, which has remained unchanged since 1879. An effort to increase the membership by 25 in 1928 was defeated.

Marking up of the call money rate followed the calling of upwards of \$35,000,000 in loans, due to heavy mid-month and payroll demands. The high rate is regarded by bankers as temporary. There was no change in time money and commercial paper rates. With fall commercial demands about at their peak, an easing of credit conditions is considered likely until the holidays begin to make themselves felt late next month.

Marriage Is Co-operative
"Marriage," Mrs. Dougan states, "is a co-operative business. In proposing, the man in reality, is asking the woman if she will cooperate with him in this business and she, by consenting to the partnership, agrees to. The marriage business entails a 50-50 performance, on the part of both."

"Man fulfills his part of the bargain when he goes out into the world and makes sufficient money to support the two. The woman lives up to her bargain, when she runs the home as it should be conducted and sees to it that the man has the proper foods, three times a day, when she prepares the bath for him; has the laundry at her finger tips. If she would do these things in a systematic way, she would find from the economy resulting that she would have more than in the effort to work and have money."

"By giving her husband the proper food, she would find that the happiness would not slip out of her grasp. She would also discover that her husband was more successful in his affairs. For example, you can imagine the mood of a man returning to his work after having a cold plate of beans, or something quite as useless. Of course, he would not be in a mood for any work."

YOUR CHILDREN

Does your child blink his eyes, or rub them frequently? In the morning when he gets up, do the lids stick together and when open leave tiny granulations along the edges?

Sometimes the irritation which causes the blinking and rubbing and the discharge which causes the lids to adhere, may be overcome by the regular use of an eye-wash every morning.

An excellent eye-wash can be made at home by dissolving a level teaspoonful of boric acid in a pint of water. The water should be cooled first and then allowed to cool. While still rather warm add the boric powder into it. The powder will dissolve.

The solution should be put into a clean glass jar or bottle and covered or corked tightly and set away until needed. A little may be poured out at each use. Nothing should ever be poured back into the jar and nothing should be dipped in.

Eye Cup Is Useful
A clean piece of absorbent cotton should be used for each eye and then thrown away. An eyecup costs only 10 cents at a drug store and is very useful. It fits over the eye socket and allows the fluid to flow freely around the eye when the head is tilted. Boric solution is cooling and soothing and is good for tired eyes. Do not make the solution any stronger than the directions.

If bathing the eyes does not help the trouble I should consult a good oculist without loss of time. The eye is the most delicate organ in the body and is not to be trifled with.

There are things a parent can do that often will obviate any necessity for remedies, by minimizing the chances for trouble.

If you find a child reading in a glaring light, stop him at once. Don't allow him to read when lying down, and don't allow him to read too soon after an illness such as measles or scarlet fever or any illness that has left his body in a weakened condition. His eye muscles are as weak as the rest of him.

Reading Rules
Show a child that when he reads he should have the light fall on his book over his shoulder. He should not face the light himself. A book should be held 15 inches from the face. Schools usually regulate these things, but it is home reading that parents must look to.

If a child cannot see the blackboard in school, on which the writing shows plainly to other children, he should be taken to a doctor for examination—or if he has to hold a book close to his face to read.

If children live in a country where there is glaring light on snow, it is well to have them use yellow or brown glasses for part of the time at least.

A child with an abnormality such as strabismus, should be taken to a specialist as early as possible. The cure often depends on the early age at which treatment is begun.

The Woman's Day
By Allene Sumner

Miss Gail Laughlin, member of the National Women's Party, has this to remark:

Most of the discriminations against women are an inheritance from bygone ages. In addition to these survivals of medieval prejudice and injustice, in nearly every state laws have been passed in recent years which restrict the economic freedom of women and which place restrictions upon women in business and in industry, which do not apply to their male competitors.

Miss Laughlin refers, of course, to a limitation on the number of hours which a woman may work in certain industries and, in certain states, the fact that she may not stand more than so many hours a day.

But even the N. W. P. will have a hard time of convincing the world, even if they can convince themselves, that there are no fundamental differences between men and women which alter cases a bit.

Aside from the quarrel with them on the score of removing protective legislation, the N. W. P. does have a very good case on some other scores. Such as their data which proves that in many states a father is sole guardian of his child and may even give it away without the mother's consent, that a wife's earnings belong to her husband in some states; in others, that even though not living with her husband she may not sign a contract nor enter business without his consent, and that the country over she may do the same work for much less pay.

In calling upon Herbert Hoover recently to urge him to support their program, the N. W. P. women produced a Mrs. Mary Murray, a ticket agent on the Brooklyn, Manhattan transit, Mrs. Murray said:

"The proof that laws regulating women in industry are not a protection and are not wanted by working women is shown by the fact that constantly increasing numbers of industrial women are working to secure exemption from such legislation."

"I speak from my own experience. Thousands of us women lost our jobs when the no night work law for women was passed in New York. These laws, which were intended to protect us, took away our jobs and forced women into harder work such as scrubbing floors where pay was less and the competition greater. We women railroad employees worked together for exemption from these restrictions and finally succeeded in having a law passed cancelling all hour limitations for women ticket agents on railroads."

Same old story of so much to be said on both sides! However, employers are about sold on the protection of women idea these days. Why spoil everything that's been done only through a long and hard fight?

How to Achieve Beauty

CARE OF THE CHILD'S HANDS
FEET

Hands and feet all come into consideration during the period when the child is past infancy and quickly going forward into little boy or little girl.

Nails at this time become quite a problem. The child's nails are quite soft, and taken must be taken care of regularly or they will break, split, develop hangnails and become a menace to the comfort and happiness of the child.

Do not attempt to use a file on the child's nails. They are entirely too soft to make this anything but a painful experiment. Manicure once a week, but make it a very simple manicure, cutting the nails across with a small manicure scissors. Avoid cutting down into the corners, for nails grow so fast on the child that persistent cutting this way develops a tendency towards ingrown nails. Attend, in the same way, to the child's feet. You can also, with an orange stick dipped in cotton and moistened with a little cuticle cream, push back the cuticle from the base of the nails. You must be very gentle about this, and I suggest that you make it something of a game so that the child learns not to neglect and not to complain about his manicure.

Watch your child at this stage for the development of habits. The thumb sucking habit, which is not only a menace to health but to beauty, frequently springs into being at this period. Teach your child to keep his fingers away from his face.

Correct shoes are another important consideration to the child now. Beauty as we know it today, is not only a matter of a pretty skin—it is perfection in every detail. And not the least of these details is the shape of the foot. Neither girl nor boy is going to start out in life with the armor of beauty that he or she needs if years of neglect have resulted in broken, down, arch, crooked toes or the corns and bunions which so many have their inception in early childhood. Never try to save money on your child's feet. Economize by all means, on clothes, even on underwear, rather than footwear. It is not a cosmetic matter to the baby that his little suite are of linen or that his socks are of silk, but it is of tremendous importance that his feet are comfortable. Select wide, nature-shaped shoes and get them to fit the baby when you are buying them. Don't figure that in three months he will outgrow them. Teach your child to be a normal, active boy or girl we are dealing with, the shoes will be quite

Moody Denounces Press Accounts Of His Austin Speech

Governor Charges That His Remarks Were Misquoted In Certain Newspapers; Issues Correction.

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Oct. 15.—Governor Dan Moody said today that certain remarks on prohibition at Friday night's local democratic rally were misquoted in the newspapers.

"I said that the democratic party was not committed to the repeal of the 18th amendment, but to an honest effort to vigorously enforce the prohibition laws," the governor explained.

"And that if it is ever committed as a party to the destruction of our prohibition laws, it will thereby, in my judgment, receive the contempt and derision of a majority of the American people, and that the best way to keep the party on the prohibition question was for the supporters of prohibition to stay in the party."

In a statement the governor said "some of the newspapers in attempting to give an account of my remarks," carried the following:

"He urged that if all prohibitionists should desert the democratic party, they would leave it in control of anti-prohibitionists, who would bring shame to it—in my judgment, should that ever happen the democratic party would receive the derision of the people of America."

This was incorrect, the governor said.

His speech was one of introduction of former Congressman James Young of Kaufman, general chairman of the democratic state campaign committee.

Tech Gives Four Extension Classes

Continuing with the efforts to offer the section the best in educational opportunities, the faculty of Texas Technological College is offering four extension classes over the South Plains, according to information gained at the college yesterday.

These classes are given on Saturday and require three hours of lecture, the students getting credit in them. A majority of the students are teachers over the territory.

Prof. R. W. Fowler, of the English department, is offering a class in English at Post. Fifteen students are taking the work. Prof. C. D. Evans is teaching history in Lorensburg to 17 students. Prof. J. T. Shaver has a psychology class with 14 students in the same town. Prof. George Smallwood conducts an English class in Lorensburg, also, having 15 students under his tutelage.

The extension committee of the college has agreed to give graduate credit for work done in these extension classes.

Carrier pigeons of the United States army will literally whistle when they fly. They are to wear whistles like the bamboo tubes attached to the Chinese pigeon above, to ward off hawks.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15. (AP)—United States army carrier pigeons soon will fly with two kinds of notes—official and musical.

To protect their winged messengers from hawks the war department proposes to attach whistles to its military flock of 1,251 birds.

Whistles for pigeons may be an experiment in the United States, but their use is a custom time-honored among the Chinese. Made in the air has for centuries been one of the many novelties of life in Peking (formerly Peking).

A visitor may be approaching old Peking temple when suddenly a flock of pigeons wheels off with a whistling sound, and a melody of sweet notes. The music floats in the wind by a flock of Chinese pigeons sounds like the strumming of many harps in the heavens.

Very light whistles are attached to the tails of the birds soon after they leave the nest. The copper wire is used. Two kinds of pigeon

whistles are used; one consists of bamboo tubes placed side by side; the other consists of tubes attached to a small gourd. The former may have two, three or five tubes. The latter gourd type sometimes carries as high as 12 tubes, each with a different note, thus converting a modest, shy pigeon into a flying callopie.

In every case the pigeons pipes are heavily lacquered to prevent weathering and probably to decorate the birds, because the whistles are painted yellow, brown, red or black.

The care which the Chinese lavish on their pigeon whistles suggests that fear of hawk attacks on the birds is only half the story. If protection alone was the object, one whistle ought to do the job. But the Chinese like their aerial music, so the hawks, it is thought, merely provide a happy excuse for the elaborate, brilliant pipes on Peking pigeons.

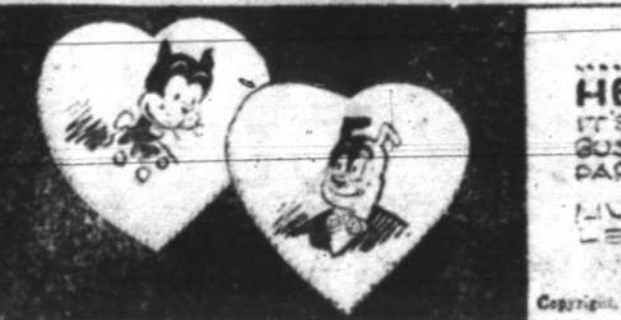

And the bench or the desk. Without referring even indirectly to the Democratic presidential nominee, Hoover stated his own position with respect to the tariff commission, about which Alfred E. Smith spoke at some length at Louisville Saturday night.

"The tariff commission is a valuable arm of the government," the Republican candidate said. "It can be strengthened and made more useful in several ways, but the American people will never consent to delegating authority over the tariff to any commission, whether non-partisan or bipartisan. Our people have a right to express themselves at the ballot box on vital questions of this kind."

"Only One Body Responsible."

There is only one commission to which the delegation of that authority can be made. That is the tariff commission on their own.

"The Congress of the United States and the president. It is the only commission which can be held responsible to his electorate."

Those who believe in the protection tariff will, I am sure, wish to see its revision at the hands of that body which has been devoted to it for 50 years.

"I am sure," he continued, "that the Congress of the United States will forward the revision of the

third Eastern speech of the Republican standard bearer, but he also dealt with government promotion of the nation's foreign trade and maintenance of an adequate merchant marine by private enterprise with the assistance and co-operation of the government.

Stresses Foreign Trade

Stressing the importance of foreign trade, the nominee said that to insure continuous employment and maintain American wages, a profitable market must be found for the surplus productions in this country both of manufacturers and farm produce.

"The Republican standard bearer expressed the hope that the government would ultimately be able to retire from competition with its citizens in the shipping business," but added that it could not do so until we are sure that private enterprise can carry the burden and grow in strength.

Sums Up Talk

Summing up what he described as "the thought I should like to leave with you," Hoover said:

"I have talked to you about the tariff, about international trade, the Merchant Marine and other economic forces which may, at first glance, seem far removed from our daily lives. I have tried to make the point that these subjects are no longer remote from any one of you. The time may have been, at some point, when the tariff was a local issue or foreign trade

Tong Warfare Is On Outbreak Again Throughout Nation

Five Cities Are Struck In Rage of Killing Among Chinese; Rival Tong Are In Arms Again.

CHICAGO, Oct. 15.—Chinese tong warfare, which broke out yesterday in five cities was blamed by police tonight for the slaying of two Chicago Chinese and the wounding of a third.

Police squads patrolled Chinatown, where the rival tong, of Leong and Hip Sings, have headquarters, and other policemen were on watch at railroad stations with orders to arrest any incoming Chinese in the hope that the slayers of tong members in other cities might be caught in the roundup.

Shot In Taxi.
Eng Pa, Hip Sing adherent, was shot to death by two Chinese last night as he sat in a taxi cab in the Chinese quarter and two hours later masked Chinese invaded the restaurant of Willie Took, an Leong member, and shot and wounded him. A white waitress and a negro chef were wounded slightly.

Today the body of Jung Bue, an Leong member, was found in a laundry with two bullets through his body and a pistol nearby. Police blamed his death on the tong warfare, but an assistant coroner advanced the theory that he may have killed himself, after he learned Bue had suffered financial reverses.

Arrested With Pistol.
One Chinese claiming to be a cousin of Frank Moy, known as the "Mayor of Chinatown," was arrested with a loaded pistol. He was believed to be the On Leong Tong and was carrying the weapon for protection.

Zeppelin's Log

1,000 miles west of Madeira heading for Bermuda.

Saturday proved to be a day of anxiety for that morning there came a flash from the ship itself that she had had to reduce speed to repair a damaged horizontal fin part of her stabilizing equipment.

For several hours there was uncertainty as to how badly the dirigible had been hurt, but fears were relieved by a message saying temporary repairs had been made and that the ship was heading on toward Bermuda. The accident had happened between 6 and 7 o'clock Eastern time. Saturday forenoon, but the news did not reach America until some time later.

Reports Conflict

Conflicting reports were received as to her position in the hours that followed the accident, but at 10:30 a. m. she was said to be 300 miles due east of Bermuda.

Another long break in communication with the dirigible followed, and it was not until Saturday night that her position was again made known. At 11 p. m. she was reported 100 miles northeast of Bermuda.

Saturday night and Sunday apparently were her hardest hours, for head winds beat her and she made slow progress. Sunday noon found her 30 miles east by north of Bermuda, changing her course to avoid the blow. At 3:35 p. m. Sunday she was sighted by the steamer Lafayette 62 miles east of St. David's Island.

Passed Bermuda Sunday.
At 6 o'clock Sunday evening she passed Bermuda, flying low and making moderate speed against a 25 mile northwest wind. In another two hours she was a few miles west of the island on a northwesterly course, and at 11:30 p. m. Sunday night she was reported 150 miles west of Bermuda.

Seven o'clock this morning—it was to be the last day of her flight—found her 100 miles east of Cape Hatteras, and two and three-quarter hours later came the flash that America had been awaiting. "Graf Zeppelin sighted off Cape Charles."

Hoc Island, Va., spotted the silver-gray monster at 10:15 a. m. morning. The coast guard station there reported she was changing her course slightly to north northwest, apparently with the intention of greeting the nation's capital.

Twenty-five minutes later Eastville, Va., placed her nose east of Cape Charles. At 11:15 a. m., residents of Cratfield, Mr. got a good glimpse of the ship, which by that time was well out of the unfavorable winds that had plagued her for so long.

Visits Washington.
Washington first spotted Graf Zeppelin at 12:21 p. m. when she approached from the east over the capital. As she crested above the government buildings, sharp-eyed naval observers noticed the hole in her port stabilizer—the rent that had caused the anxiety last Saturday.

President Coolidge took time to have a look at Graf Zeppelin. Leaving his desk in the White House, he stepped outdoors, bareheaded, watched the dirigible for a moment, as everybody else was doing, and then went back to work.

By this time the cities that lay between Washington and Lakehurst eagerly were awaiting the arrival of the aerial visitor, and Baltimore, Wilmington, Philadelphia, and Trenton, N. J., gave her a noisy reception as she hummed overhead.

New York did not know until mid-afternoon whether Graf Zeppelin would pay her respects to the metropolis, but when word was flashed that she intended to swing over the skyscrapers the city prepared an impromptu welcome. The city's official welcome to the dirigible's officers, crew and passengers is scheduled for tomorrow when they arrive from Lakehurst.

its form, although its metallic coat remained dim gray in the dusk. Half again as big as the Los Angeles, which completed a similar journey just four years ago today, the Graf Zeppelin seemed to swell as it approached until it blotched out half the sky.

It showed no lights in the deepening gloaming and its idling engines were inaudible until it was above the field.

Looked Like Shadow

As day turned into night the mammoth ship glided low over the trees that fringe the air station and dipped toward the flying field and the waiting crowd. A turn of the ship brought a lighted cabin window into view, strikingly bright against the gray sky across which the ship slipped like an animated shadow.

A ship dipped earthward, the crowd below raised a wild shout of greeting and some one aboard waved from the yellow window. Many said they could see it was a woman, and if they were right it was Lady Drummond Hay, a British journalist and the only woman on board.

From the top of a tower near the field a light winked the information to Dr. Hugo Eckener, the man who had the ground crew waiting for the dirigible. The ship's engines full throttle to dive downward to a position near the mooring mast.

The roar of the five 500-horsepower engines seemed to make the air vibrate and the sliding ship in a moment became a gray arrow shooting through the darkness.

Ship Is Not Moored.
Contrary to expectation, the ship was not moored at the mast, ropes being dropped to a landing crew of 500 sailors to draw the ship gently to the ground.

As customs agents boarded the ship she then do any docking Atlantic liner the crowd's enthusiasm boiled over and police lines melted before the rush. There was confusion and confusion and confusion in the hangar in plenty before order was restored.

After German and American officials had at last edged their way through the throng to voice congratulations through the hangar, the crowd's enthusiasm held the ship steady, the Graf Zeppelin walked slowly toward the hangar. Its nose almost touching that of the Los Angeles, which was crowded against the hangar's south wall with two navy blimps tucked under its stern, to make room for the aerial Leviathan.

Officials Hurry Out.
Dr. Eckener and Lieut. Com. Charles E. Rosendahl, commander of the Los Angeles and a guest on the Titanic, stepped out of the cabin and hurried to the officers' club. After a short time they returned and climbed back into the Graf Zeppelin's cabin.

A solid line of marines was thrown about the ship to keep all from getting too close and no one was allowed to go in or out of the dirigible as a consultation was held to decide whether to berth the ship in the hangar or take her back to the mooring mast until daylight.

Because of a 15-mile wind across the hangar it was decided at last not to berth the ship tonight. The passengers were taken out and escorted under guard to the hangar and the dirigible was taken to the ship mast close to the light tower where it was a tangle to swing gently through the dark hours.

Reporters Even Queued.
A few reporters managed to get on the ship with the 12 column men, but they were all discovered and ordered out. Brief words were had with a few of the passengers but they consisted almost entirely of generalities, assertions that every one had had a "fine time," and denials that any one had suffered from air sickness.

Great care was taken to avoid any possibility of disaster through explosion of the highly inflammable hydrogen lifting gas stored in the 3,700,000 cubic foot bag of the Zeppelin. As soon as the dirigible was brought out the hangar, another

day at the Natich shoebench he studied oratory and politics, and was such an admirer of Representative Wilson of New Hampshire, that he adopted his name and kept it.

Greene's Death Preserved Problem.
The Democratic convention accepted the nomination of Greeley and Brown and made the Liberal Republican ticket its own, over the protest of Bayard of Delaware, and Voorhees of Indiana.

Everything pointed to a Liberal Republican-Democratic triumph. Greeley had thundered against capitalism as he had thundered against slavery before, and it was not until the bitter things he had said about the Democrats were recalled by the Republican orators, that the tide began to turn. Then a shiver of fear and distrust swept across the country. Would Greeley, who was unable to keep his own newspaper, be able to give the country a business administration?

Would he, who was the victim of every confidence man who came his way, be able to select proper advisers? These questions, combined with his attacks on Wall Street, his effect against him. His wife died a few days before the election, and that, combined with his crushing defeat, was too much for the aged journalist. He was sent to a private asylum an insane man. Less than a month after the election he died.

His death opened a new problem. How should the electors who had been for him vote? Gratz Brown got only 18 votes as his logical successor. Thomas A. Hendricks got 47 votes, while the other 19 were divided among seven other men.

When the electoral count was placed there were duplicate returns from Louisiana, while three electors from Georgia voted for Greeley. The Senate and House failed to agree upon the disposition of the sets of votes in Louisiana, and the state lost its right to participate in the election. The Greeley votes were also thrown out. The same fate met the vote of Arkansas. There was a rule that they could be no debate on the question, when it was found in the Senate that the returns did not bear the seal of the state, they were rejected. The Senate did not know that Arkansas had no seal, and disfranchised the state because of its ignorance.
