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# Rains Bring Mixed Blessing To Area

Heavy rains that skipped through the Olton area last weekend improved growing conditions on some farms and dampened crop prospects on others.

The three-day downpour dumped 1.84 inches in the city beginning Friday night, according to James Gallagher of the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. here. A trace was also recorded Monday. The reading brought Olton's June moisture total to 5.25 inches.

Local farmers, however, received as much as 10 inches of rain on fields already soaked by two previous storms this month.

Lloyd Graham, manager of Olton Co-Op Gin, said his 2.3 inch moisture reading came in "a real nice gentle rain."

He estimated most cotton left standing after the severe hailstorm three weeks ago was unhurt by the weekend showers, but he conceded there was considerable disagreement on that point among his customers.

Graham added that feed crops might have benefited from the water, depending, again, on individual conditions.

"It looks as bad as it can look to me," said Earl Douglas, manager of Farmers Gin here, in sizing up current crop conditions.

He figured half the cotton in this area had been destroyed this season by previous rain and hail.

The most recent rain, though not accompanied by hail or high winds, left already-saturated plants standing in unusable water, he said.

Douglas noted no serious damage to feed, soybeans, and corn crops.

A spot-check of the area showed Olton growers fared much better in the weekend weather than many of their neighbors—especially to the north and southwest.

An eight-mile strip between Spade and Littlefield was hammered by marble-sized hail about 6 p. m. Saturday. Rain fell from Friday night to Sunday night, dumping from two to four inches of rain.

Cliff Adams, ginmer at Circle Gin five miles west of Olton reported 2.25 inches of rain over a three day period beginning Friday night. No hail was noted.

"It was a slow, perfect rain, if we'd needed it," recalled C. G. Benningfield, manager of Hart of the Plains Gin.

The 1.8-inch rain that fell there Saturday and Sunday night apparently came too late for 5- percent of that community's cotton which was hailed out in earlier storms this season.

Benningfield said all the cotton in his area had been replanted in soybeans this month.

"This was the first rain of the month that didn't hail in it," he added. "It was like a fall of the year rain."

Ke Bennett, a manager of Hart Producers Co-Op Gin agreed with Benningfield's cotton damage estimates.

He said about 40 percent of Hart's wheat crop has been damaged this month in spotted areas beginning five miles south and east of town and estimated replanted soybean acreage in the area as twice what it was last year.

He also reported weeds were beginning to be a problem in wheat fields too wet to plow.

Bennett recorded 3.25 inches of moisture at the gin from Friday night to Sunday night.

"It's not all that dark," he added. He recalled one customer's boast of having "the finest cotton crop he had ever made in his life" half way between Hart and Nazareth.

The general crop picture in Nazareth, 11 miles north of Hart in Castro County, was painted considerably brighter than in Lamb County.

Olton will host the District Babe Ruth Baseball Tournament in Babe Ruth Park here July 10.

Teams from Muleshoe, Plainview, Canyon, Dumas, Pampa, and Spearman will also vie for victory and a chance to play in state competition later this year.

Winner here will be awarded \$300 from the host team to help defray costs of the trip to the state meet. The contest is sponsored by the Olton Baseball Association.

Double elimination games will pit Spearman against Plainview at 2 p. m. the first day, followed by Canyon against Pampa at 5 p. m. and Olton against Dumas, regional champions for the past several years, at 8 p. m. Olton's team is three years old.

First-round contenders were matched by a drawing. Losers bracket will begin the following day.

Games will be broadcast on Pampa, Canyon, Dumas and Plainview radio.

Local organizers have requested volunteers to man concession stands and handle other chores for the tournament. Workers need not have sons playing in the contest to participate on the sidelines.

Olton City Council last Thursday night denied a request by about a dozen local residents to pave two blocks of W. 10 st.

Council members acted on the advice of City Auditor James Adair during a special meeting called especially to consider the proposal.

Adair said the proposed project would probably require a property assessment and a new street improvement bond. He pointed out the paving was intended for in a current \$60,000 street improvement bond obtained last summer. Most of the money has been used to pave and gutter 25 blocks of city streets, according to Mayor Parley Myers.

Cost of filing for a new bond would be prohibitive for so small a job, Adair predicted, since it could involve lawyer and engineer fees and legal advertising expenses.

Property within the affected blocks is residences and vacant lots.

Vote rejecting the measure was unanimous.

He was active in civic affairs, and was a member of the Methodist Church and Masonic Lodge.

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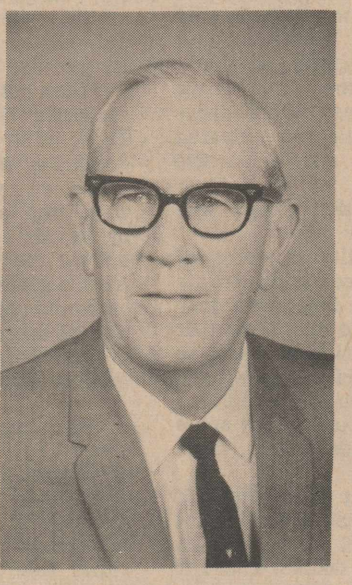
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## Services Are Held For Yates

Yates, 56, died about 11:30 p. m. June 22 when the car he was driving left U. S. Highway 385 on a curve 12 miles north of Dimmitt and struck a tree, according to investigating officers. He was pronounced dead at the scene. The mishap occurred during a rainstorm, officers said.

An Olton resident for 37 years, Yates was elected president of Olton Grain Co. in 1958.

He resigned that position in 1960 to become president of Olton State Bank. Yates began his long association with the bank as a director in 1944, moving to vice president post five years later.

## Nation Without Maturity

We Americans are a peculiar breed of cat. We have enemies who boldly declare they're going to do us in, but we keep hoping they don't really mean it. Or that they'll eventually have a change of heart and that we'll live happily together on this old globe.

So it has been with Russia. We know the Soviet has been our enemy and if we lower our guard the slightest, she'll annihilate us. And we know she has agitated wars, gotten us involved and aided the enemy in killing our boys.

But we go on hoping that things will change.

We've been a little guilty of some of this fuzzy thinking. While realizing Russia has been our enemy and has done some dastardly acts, we've clung to the hope that such a potentially great nation is bound to have some degree of integrity, dignity and maturity. Also we have been heartened with the knowledge that throughout history some nations, with changes in leadership, have changed.

But all our hopes flew out the window last week after viewing the U. N. Security Council proceedings over television. There was no credibility gap to cast any doubts. There it was laid out bare before us in our own living room. We witnessed with our own eyes and ears the sad spectacle of the ambassador of Russia . . . voicing the minute by minute instructions from his country, spouting forth lies, misrepresentation and threats.

Or the Soviet representative's silence in face of the accusations from the Arab countries that the U. S. and Great Britain had taken part in the fighting was abom-

inable. The Russians knew without a shadow of doubt that this accusation was not true. But their silence rang out loud and clear that this nation was woefully lacking in maturity, integrity and decency. Any honorable nation, knowing the true facts as Russia did, would have spoken up, regardless of its feelings toward the accused.

Then followed Russia's vituperative declaration that Israel was the aggressor. This, mind you, in face of Egypt's Masser declaring the Gulf of Aqaba off limits to Israel . . . which, as an international waterway, was an act of war in itself, followed by Nasser's threats to Israel that were heard around the world, then the troops of United Arab nations encircled tiny Israel. Encircled, outnumbered and with the life of every man, woman and child in that small nation hanging in the balance, would you believe Israel was the aggressor?

Who fired the first shot, as far as we're concerned, is of no consequence. The acts of aggression had already been established by Masser and his allies. The situation was so tense a stray dog overturning a garbage can could have set off the shooting for either side.

But Russian for selfish political reasons, persists in branding Israel as the aggressor.

Possibly we should be overjoyed that Russia has publicly displayed its true, untrustworthy colors for all the world to see. But it is a little sad, too, to witness in our own living room a potentially great nation that could be such a tremendous force for good in the world today to expose itself as a cheap, immature, irresponsible country. What a tragic pity.

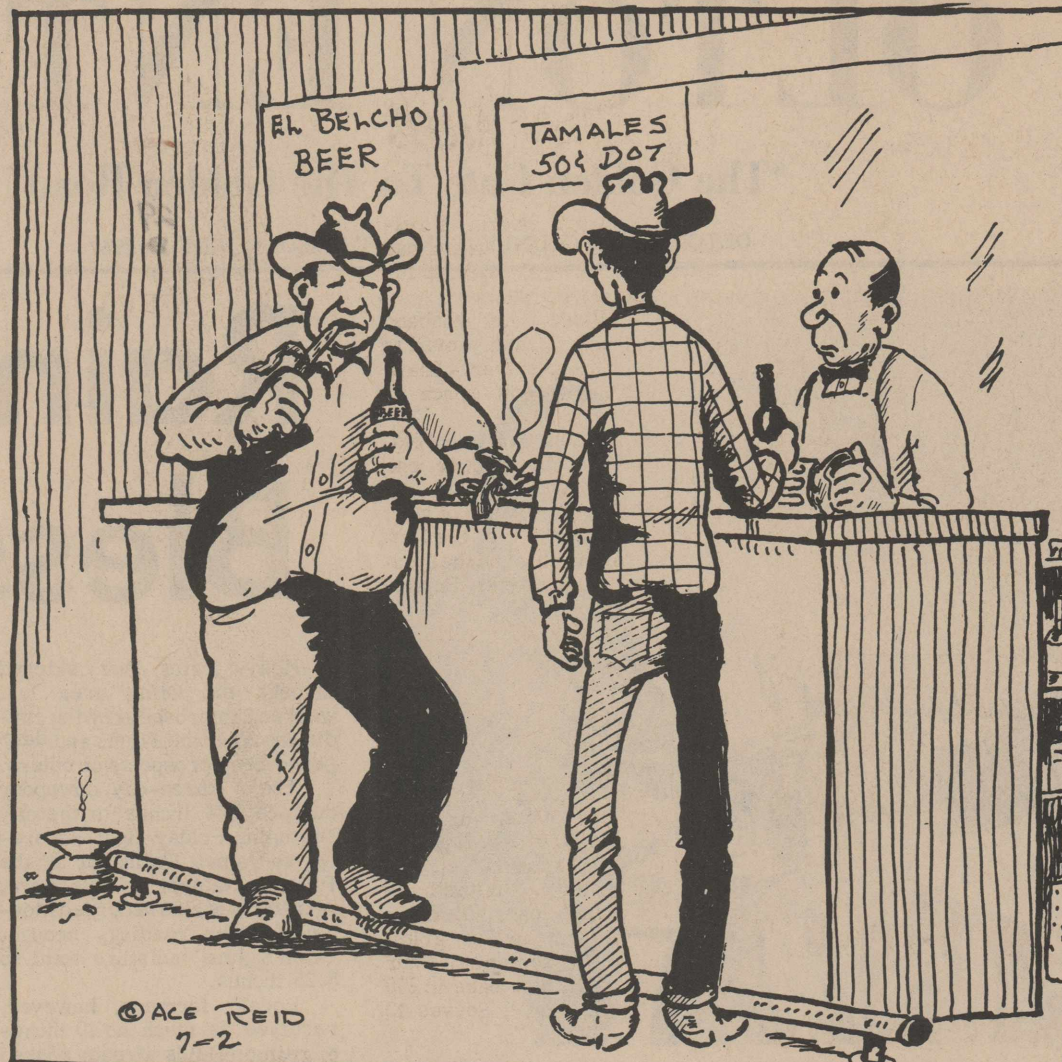
### TEN YEARS AGO

### CHEESE GRITS

- 1 1/2 c. grits
- 6 c. water
- 3 beaten eggs
- 1 lb. cheese
- 1 1/2 sticks butter or oleo
- 3 tsp. savory salt or 2 tsp. salt
- Dash Tabasco sauce

Cook grits in unsalted boiling water until done. Mix other ingredients and add to grits. Stir until cheese melts. Pour into baking dish and bake in 250 degree oven 1 hour. Serves 10 to 12.

Boil pieces of chicken until tender, retain broth. Remove bones, cut chicken into bite size. Combine chicken, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup, onion, garlic salt and pepper.

Grease baking dish and line with Fritos. Add chicken mixture, sprinkle with grated cheese, cover with Fritos. Add 1 cup chicken broth. Bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. If frozen, bake in 350 degree oven for 1 to 1 1/2 hours. Serves 6.

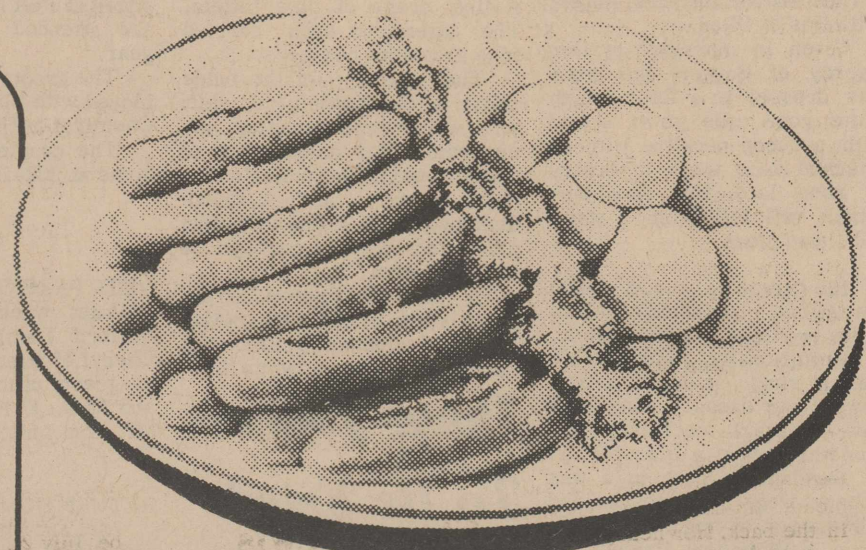

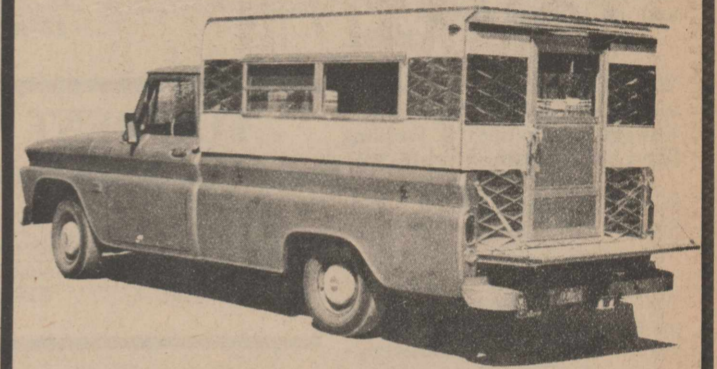

The two men under the AID program will probably go home in September where they are employed by their respective countries' agriculture departments.

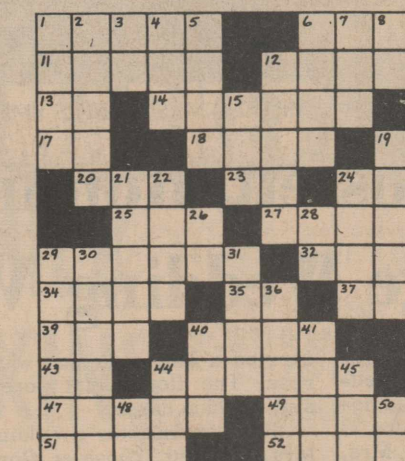

Frost was a member of the Church of Christ and a veteran of World War II.

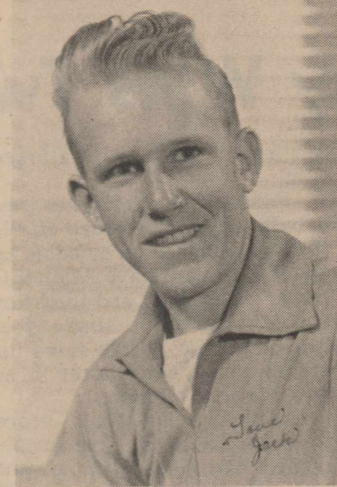

## Former Oltonite In Antarctica

Dale Miller, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Miller of Springlake, is stationed in Antarctica with the United States Naval Expeditionary Forces.

He is one of 800 men, who were sent there Oct. 1, 1966 following three months' training for this particular task at Davisville, Rhode Island. Only 150 of the group are still there and they will be replaced about October 5 of this year.

Miller contacts his parents by radio and telephone. A few nights ago Mr. and Mrs. Miller received a call from Corpus Christi from a radio ham operator who had picked up Dale's message.

The men near the South Pole have had no mail since February but a plane was to land there sometime between June 11 and 24. Due to extremely low temperature Miller stated it would take 10 days to prepare a landing place for the plane.

Mrs. Miller paid 80¢ postage on the letter she recently mailed to her son.

They received his call at 1 a. m. Monday and he told them it was 2 p. m. Tuesday at Camp McMurdo where he is stationed. There are several smaller stations near this supply base.

In a letter written May 30 Dale explained that where he is stationed only a little light each day shown around noon. Warm winds from the north had brought in about 12 inches of snow which is the average annual snow fall for that region. Miller did his first two years of high school work at Olton. After graduating from Springlake he attended Wayland College one semester.

During his nine years in the Navy he spent 18 months at Kodiak, Alaska and one year in Vietnam with intervals spent at the principal base which was established at Sasebo, Japan.

**KITCHEN KORNER**

Vegetables and fruits are beginning to get ready to eat and can. Don't they taste better when they are fresh!

The weather has been so humid it is very hard to make yourself cook the foods we should eat and sandwiches and hotdogs have certainly been a quick and easy food for these busy times but sometimes we just have to prepare a more healthful meal.

Here is a couple of easy and not too much effort recipes.

**HUNGARIAN POT ROAST**

- 4 lbs. boned beef roast
- 1/4 c. flour
- 3 T. shortening
- 3 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1 1/2 tsp. caraway seed
- 2 medium onions, quartered
- 1 1/2 to 2 c. tomato juice
- 1 pkg. egg noodles

Dredge roast in flour and brown in fat. Combine all other ingredients and add to meat, covering and simmering over a low burner until done. If gravy becomes too thick, thin with either water or tomato juice. When done, pour gravy over hot buttered egg noodles.

**PANAMA CREAM ICE BOX DESSERT**

- 18 Panama creams (chocolate oreo cookies), crushed
- 1 c. butter
- 2 c. powdered sugar
- 3 egg yolks
- 3 whites of eggs, beaten
- 1 c. chopped nutmeats
- 1 pt. whipping cream

Place half of crushed cookies in bottom of pan. Combine butter, sugar, egg yolks and nutmeats. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Spread mixture on tops of crumbs. Whip cream and add a little sugar. Spread on butter mixture and sprinkle on remaining crumbs. Chill at least 6 hours before serving.

**DIVINITY ICING FOR PIE**

- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. white syrup
- 1/2 c. water
- 2 egg whites, beaten

Combine sugar, syrup and water and boil until a soft ball will form in cold water. Beat whites of 2 eggs until stiff but not dry, and pour syrup slowly over. Beat until thick and pour on top of pie. Put in oven and brown, or can be used without browning. Coconut or nuts may be added if desired.

On these rushed days try splitting buns and weiners, put a long piece of cheese in center of weiner, wrap in aluminum foil and put on barbecue grill. Serve with salad and potato chips and a fresh fruit plate for dessert-quick, nutritious and easy.

**Hiway Committee To Meet Friday**

The Highway Transportation Committee of the Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will meet in Lubbock at 10 a. m. Friday with Lubbock District Highway Engineer Oscar Crain to discuss prospects for a new road between here and Cotton Center.

The proposed road would begin about three miles south of Olton on FM 168 and run East approximately eight miles to the Cotton Center Highway (FM 179).

Chamber manager Charles Polk said the highway would clear the way to Olton for business which now finds other cities much more accessible.

He said many area residents have seen a need for such a road for years. The committee's primary task Friday will be to convince Crain of that need.
