## Barn Destroyed In \$5,000 Blaze

A fire of undetermined origin destroyed a large barn on the R. H. Holland farm, 15 miles northwest of Perryton Friday noon with an estimated loss of \$5,000. Several sheep from a flock of 850 were burned.

Four members of the farm crew were eating dinner and were unaware that the barn was ablaze until notified by neighbors who aided in extinguishing the fire with a bucket brigade.

The large 160 by 60 foot barn was also used as store house for a quantity of feed and grains and was comparatively new.

No insurance was carried on the loss according to Mr. Holland.

## First February Draft Quota Is One; Selectees Allowed Certain Articles

The Ochiltree County Selective Service Board has been notified that this county will be asked to furnish for induction on February 6, one man (not selected). It is likely that a second call will be made in the latter part of the month for an additional quota.

Mrs. Scott Amend, secretary of the local board, stated that from the 150 questionnaires sent out to registrars approximately 40 have been or will be classified in Class 1A composed of those available for immediate induction.

It has been pointed out that until the President issues a proclamation calling for the registration of all young men, who have reached the age of 21 since October 16, 1940, these men will not be registered. This of course will not prevent their volunteering for induction.

Following are the articles the draftees are allowed and requested to take with them when they are accepted for the year's military training.

**BAGGAGE**—Only minimum hand baggage should be brought. There is no provision for transporting or storage of trunks. Barrack bags will be issued at RECEPTION CENTERS. Post Lockers will be issued when Selectees arrive at his organization.

**SHOES**—One pair of comfortable and serviceable shoes in good state of repair is essential.

**AUTO**—Private autos prohibited.

**ATHLETIC EQUIPMENT**—Selectees should be encouraged to bring any athletic equipment they have.

## Ochiltree Is The Leading Wheat County

Last year Ochiltree County produced 2,088,110 of the 19,039,000 bushels of wheat placed in Government Loan by Texas farmers or 11 per cent of the total. The figures released by the State AAA Office showed this county to be definitely the leading wheat county in the state.

A total of 145 farm-storage loans on 398,981 bushels was exactly one-fourth of farm storage loans for the state.

Wheat placed under elevator loans amounted to 1,689,129 in the county which was 9.7 per cent of the total 17,446,299 bushels for the entire state.

Approximately 80 per cent of the wheat produced in the county was placed under the loan as compared to 65 per cent for Texas as a whole.

### American Red Cross Direct British Needs

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Chairman Norman H. Davis announced today that the British Ministry of Health has notified the American Red Cross that in the future all British requests for doctors, nurses, hospital supplies and surgical equipment would be referred to the American Red Cross through the British Red Cross.

The British statement was made, Davis said, in an effort to coordinate the relief activities and to conserve vital shipping space and priorities for the types of medical supplies most needed in Great Britain. The letter from the British Ministry of Health, submitted thru the American Red Cross Committee in London, follows:

"We fully recognize that the American Red Cross holds a predominant position in all matters affecting doctors, nurses, hospitals and medical supplies, both because of the conventions under which it was established, and because of its very widespread organization. For these reasons the Ministry proposes, in the future, to send all requests for medical and nursing personnel, hospitals and hospital equipment and medical and surgical equip-

ment and supplies through the British Red Cross to the American Red Cross. Consequently, from this date, no requests for these kinds of aid shall be forwarded to any other American organization. Furthermore, offers of American aid which fall within the above defined limits will be referred by the Ministry through the British Red Cross to the American Red Cross for consideration and approval.

"You will, of course, appreciate that there exists current and previously accepted commitments between the Ministry and other American organizations which cannot be withdrawn. It is our intention to complete our existing commitments with these organizations insofar as they do not conflict with the above-stated position.

"I am anxious further to emphasize that no request will be put forward by the Ministry that is not a request to meet a real need and to make up deficiencies whether of personnel or material which either cannot be met at all or where, as is the case of surgical instruments, production is extremely slow.

"I trust the procedure I have outlined is one that will meet with the concurrence of the American Red Cross, but I am anxious to say, that important as it is that a clear and simple procedure should be adopted, it would not be right that I should close this letter without expressing our most sincere and warm appreciation to the American Red Cross for the generous assistance it has afforded us in the past and for its equally generous offer to continue to help."

Davis pointed out that it has been the policy of the American Red Cross from the day war was declared to ship only those medical and surgical supplies which have been specifically requested or cleared in advance with the British Red Cross through the American Red Cross Committee in London. All such supplies have been new articles. The same applies to civilian clothing and other relief supplies for civilian victims, which the American Red Cross distributes through the Women's Voluntary Services of Great Britain.

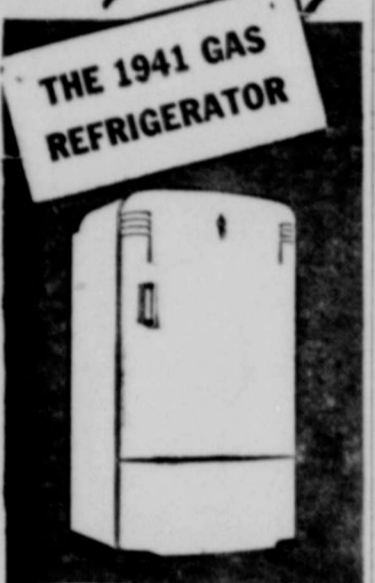
### Roosevelt Begins Third Term at Historic Ceremonies

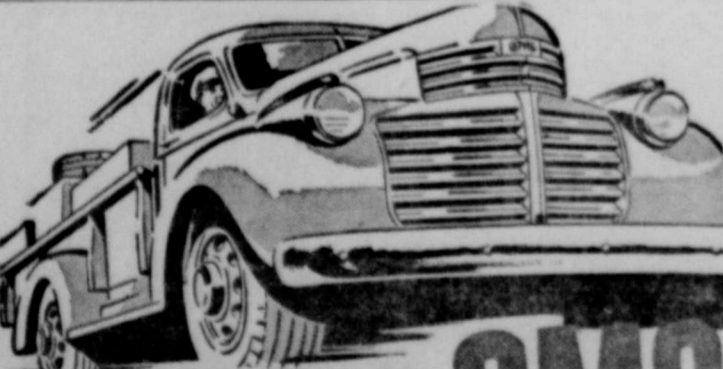

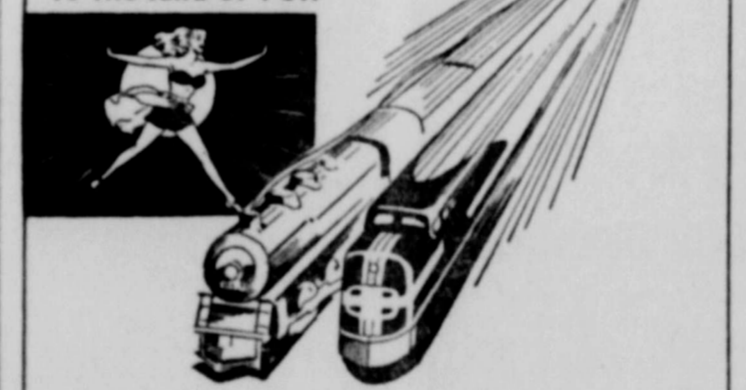

### Ochiltree Leads State in Number of Loans on Farm Stored Wheat; Total 145

Texas wheat producers placed 63 per cent of the wheat they produced in 1940 under the government loan, receiving an average of slightly more than 64 cents a bushel with protein premiums taken into account.

Of the 29,355,000 bushels of wheat produced in the state last year, 18,039,000 were placed under the Commodity Credit Corporation loan. Charlie L. Thomas, state AAA committeeman and Pampa wheat grower, announced. The total amount loaned in the state was \$12,955,523.

Ochiltree county led the state in number of farm-storage loans and the total number of bushels placed under the loan, the committeeman said, with 145 farm-storage loans on 398,981 bushels. Addition of 1,609,129 bushels of warehouse-stored wheat brought the total to 2,088,110 bushels for which the growers received loans totaling \$1,556,570.

Hale county was first in the number of warehouse loans, making 1,478 loans on 1,017,159 bushels.

The final report on the loan in the state follows: 727 farm-storage loans on 1,593,216 bushels; 12,021 warehouse loans on 17,446,299 bushels; total, 19,748 loans on 19,039,515 bushels.

Slaughter supplies in the fed-lamb marketing season this season may show a moderate increase over last year's market during the December-April season, according to the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

The 1,500,000 4-H Club members in the United States produce yearly products having a market value of around \$30,000,000.

## INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

### Brotherly Love in Democracy

The International Uniform Sunday School Lesson for Feb. 2 Text: Habakkuk 2:15; Genesis 4:9-12; Mark 9:42-48; 1 Thessalonians 5:22

AS Jesus found out when tempted by the devil, Scripture can be used to support almost any kind of argument or cause. Jesus was able to refute the devil's words, however, by quoting Scripture with nobler purpose and better effect.

Those who have used the Bible against advocates of temperance and to uphold the use of alcoholic liquor as a beverage have to contend against some bitter Biblical indictments. These are based upon the evidence of the evil and misery that have inevitably been in the wake of the use of strong drink.

The opening verse of our lesson is one of these. It is strong and devastating in its pronouncement. "Woe unto him that giveth his neighbor drink," and it is scathing in its characterization of the results when alcohol has taken away man's ordinary reason and restraint.

TODAY we are in a lax age as regards drinking and drinking habits. Public sentiment and practice, which a generation or less ago were strongly on the side of total abstinence, had changed toward laxity. What have we gained by it, as individuals, or in our social life? Temperance need not be confused with total abstinence, but total abstinence, while the drinking of alcoholic liquors has done plenty of harm, and the

between use and abuse has never been very clearly marked. "Touch not, taste not, handle not," was a good motto and it will come back to its own some day, for the fruits of intemperance are becoming increasingly manifest.

But a temperance lesson should go much farther than inculcating abstinence from strong drink. There have been tyrants and scourgers of their fellowmen who never drank a drop of liquor, the world's present-day scourge, is said to be an abstemious person. Man has a social responsibility that cannot be fulfilled in abstinence from anything. Its fulfillment can be only through positive attitudes and acts of good will and service.

Cain slew his brother, and then tried to sidestep responsibility for his foul act by asking, "Am I my brother's keeper? A man does not need to be a murderer to assume that attitude and ask that question. It has been asked again and again by respectable, but selfish and self-centered, people. The Christian says, "What can I do to help my brother? To ask anything less is to be something less than a Christian.

We are in days when social obligation lives at the very heart of maintaining successfully a democratic society. It is only as we share common aims, common hopes, a common heritage of liberty, and common responsibilities that we can make democracy effective. When a man ceases to feel any responsibility for his brother, the ship of a democratic state is being weakened below the water-line.

## Farmers' Happy Seesaw

With one hand the United States Department of Agriculture gives good news to the farmer. With the other, it distributes news not so good.

It is a case of seesaw, but the net result is that on the seesaw, the farmer remains on the up side rather than on the down.

The Bureau of Agricultural Economics has made a survey of the farm situation in 1941 as it will probably compare with the year just ended.

It finds that the income of the farmer this year will be larger than that of last year. But it also finds the farmer's production costs will be more. The tendency of the one is thus to cut down the net of the other. Nevertheless, on a balance, the farmer stands to be the gainer.

At present the ratio of prices received by the farmer to prices paid is about 17 per cent below the pre-World War base of 100. In the months which preceded the outbreak of the new war in September, 1939, the same ratio showed 25 per cent below the pre-World War base of 100.

Although a great many markets for the sale of export farm products are closed as a result of the European war, there is still a chance food may be sent to some of the hungry people of Europe by agreement between the belligerents.

Even if that fails, there will almost certainly be an increased consumption of food products right here at home, thanks to the increased number of men going into active employment. The big cities, where are located many of the plants engaged in the nation's rearmament program, will soon be humming with activity. Full pocketbooks for the workmen always mean purchase of more and better food. Bigger purchases mean better times for the farmer.

So there is room for optimism among those who guide the plow and reap the harvest.

## Crop Loans Are Possible

Emergency crop and feed loans for 1941 are now available to farmers in Ochiltree County, and applications for these loans are now being received at the courthouse, Perryton, by John L. Jones, Field Supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain a loan from any other source, including production credit associations, banks, or other private concerns or individuals.

As in former years, the money loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash needs in preparing and cultivating his 1941 crops or in purchasing or producing feed for his livestock.

Borrowers who obtain loans for the production of cash crops are required to give as security a first lien on the crop financed or, in the case of loans for the purchase or production of feed for livestock, a first lien on the livestock to be fed.

Your 1940 TAXES are now due and must be paid before the first day of February, 1941 to avoid penalty.

Both men and women are required to pay their poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of.

Those who were 60 years of age or more on January 1, 1940 are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1940 are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1940 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January, 1941, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year; no charge is made for these exemptions.

In 1941 automobile license fees cannot be paid before February 1st, 1941, but must be paid between February 1st and April 1st, 1941.

## Virginia Vaughn Reviews Book

Wild Geese Calling by Stewart Edward White is one of the best of the current releases in new novels of adventure. It is the story of John and Sally Murdock—two people who, although they had been reared in widely different habitats, were yet born with a pioneering spirit which found expression in ever roaming, ever reaching out toward new lands and a new frontier. They were invested with a high-hearted courage and an indomitable will which wrested a civilized existence from a wilderness.

The north woods, Seattle, a swarming Alaska frontier town just before the Gold Rush, and finally the magnificent Alaskan wilderness—these form the background of a novel rich in action, drama, and living characters.

At the time when John and Sally felt that their wandering feet had found a permanent niche and a settled home, Len Saunders came into their lives with his vision of Alaska. It became a paradise of hunting and fishing, of cold, swift rivers, high mountains, endless forests, so they bought a boat; and the three of them embarked upon the perilous voyage to Alaska. Here John, Len, and Sally were caught up in the shifting tide of miners, gamblers, adventurers, fortune-hunters—all the varied colorful flosam and jetsam which washes up along a frontier. Going farther into the woods to make their home, they found that they must daily pit their strength against loneliness and hardship and danger. The terrible day when the results of months of effort were swept away by a avalanche; John's heroic desperate voyage to Klaskan in a raging storm to get help for Sally; these are only two of the high points of a narrative whose interest never lessens.

Wild Geese Calling is a full-bodied, well-rounded, exciting story. John and Sally Murdock are two real people; their story ends on a note of challenge; for, their wanderings over at last, they are faced with the long task of making a wilderness into a home.

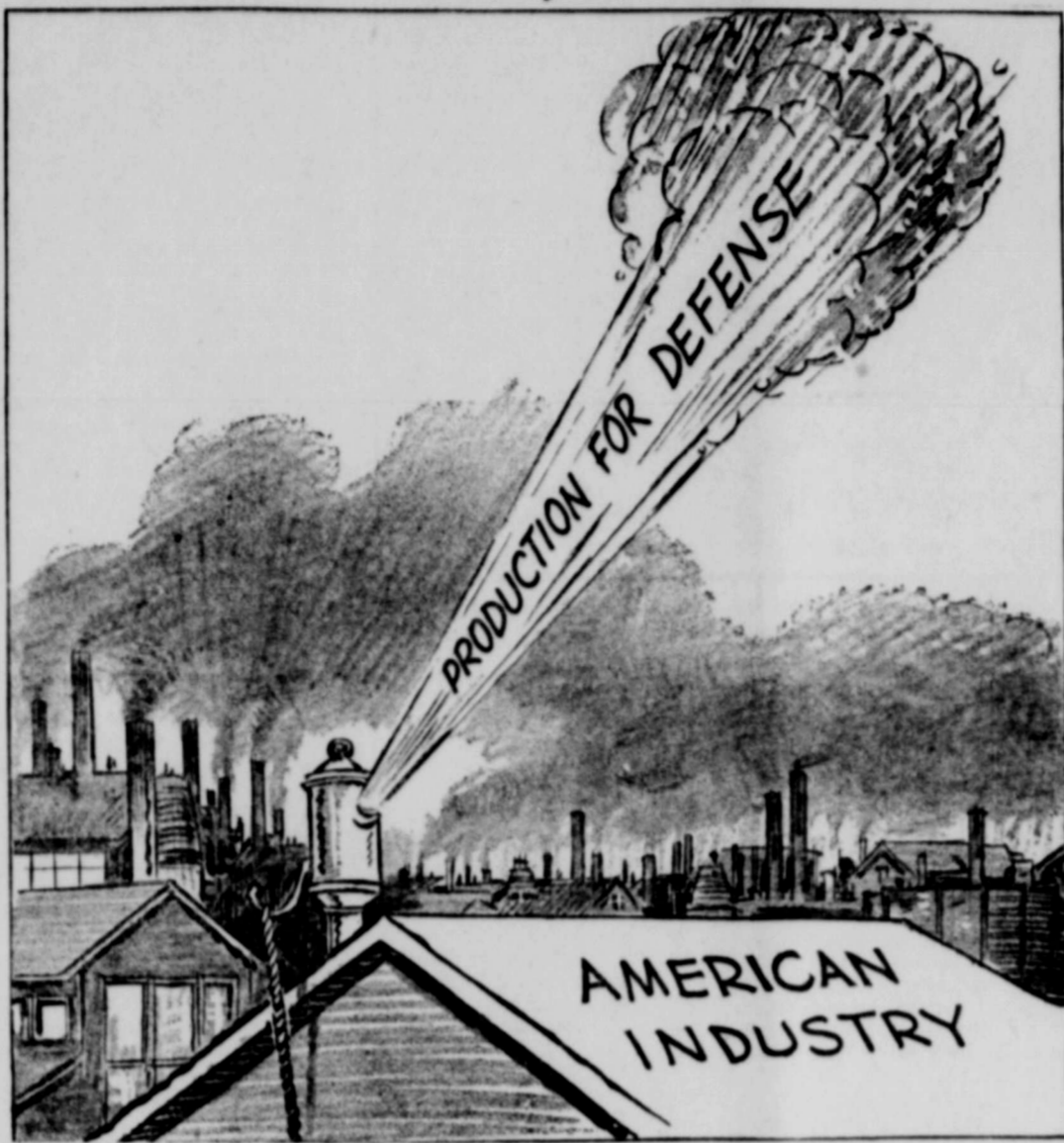

## Diphtheria Can Be Held to Minimum

AUSTIN, Tex.—The public health value of immunization against diphtheria has been remarkably demonstrated in Texas in the last eight years, information collected by the State Health Department reveals.

The diphtheria death rate has steadily diminished during the period from 14.3 deaths per 100,000 population in 1932 to a tentative rate of 1.9 per 100,000 for the first ten months of 1940, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

The 1939 cumulative deaths from diphtheria—1989 statistics are the latest on which final tabulations are obtainable—are 78 per cent lower than the 1932 total of 850 deaths.

The 14.3 rate per 100,000 in 1932 was high for the decade, and each succeeding year saw diminished rates to the decade low, 1940's tentative 1.9 per 100,000.

Dr. Cox attributed the very significant decrease in diphtheria deaths and prevalence to the increasingly positive effects of public health and greater appreciation by the parent of the child's well-being. Dr. Cox pointed out that "the increased attention to the well child, using periods when the child is well to protect against future illness, represents an intelligent approach by parents to the health needs of their children."

In the many areas of Texas served by full-time health services, the past four years have seen the immunizations of preschool children against diphtheria more than double in number. The influences of the full-time public health services in this matter cannot be considered minor. Diphtheria immunization has been a major public health platform in protecting the health of Texas children. The success of this program is indicated by a health survey based on a cross-section encompassing 145,999 school children in areas with and without public health services.

Children entering school in counties maintaining full-time county health units showed 69 per cent immunized against diphtheria as contrasted with 29 per cent where local health units were absent.

Dr. Cox reiterated that no child need have diphtheria, as it is one of the most easily prevented diseases. Every child six to nine months of age should be immunized with toxoid to develop immunity to diphtheria. Six months after immunization, a harmless skin test, called the "Schick test," should be given to determine if the child has been given enough immunization to render him completely immune. If the test indicates that the child is not fully protected against diphtheria, additional immunization can be given, after which there need be no further fear of the disease.
