

WOMEN FLIERS CHEERED BY CITY

SIX KILLED AS YACHT GOES ON ROCKS

PARLIAMENT MEMBER IS THOUGHT TO BE AMONG VICTIMS

(By Associated Press)
FOWEY, Cornwall, Eng., Aug. 21. — Commodore Henry Douglas King, conservative member of parliament, brilliant soldier and one-time aide-de-camp to King George was believed to have met death with probably half a dozen others aboard the 22-ton motor yacht Islander wrecked here in the night.

One woman, two children and a well known naval surgeon were believed aboard the vessel when it went to pieces after going on the rocks of the Cornwall coast at Lantivet bay. Definite knowledge of the makeup of the yachting party still was lacking this evening. That Commodore King changed his mind about inviting some fellow members of parliament was believed. This apparently spared their lives, since all on board the Islander were lost, according to life guards who battled desperately in darkness under the 265-foot cliff where the tragedy of the English channel was enacted, in efforts to rescue some of those aboard.

Nobody On Board
When a lifeline finally was shot across the yacht there seemed nobody on the craft to catch it. Darling coastguardsmen, lowered from the brink of the rock, said they heard a woman scream in a cabin. The guardsmen could not contrive to get aboard the distressed vessel. Late today the police reported that the bodies of two young children had been washed ashore near the scene of the wreck. At that time the authorities expressed the fear the death toll would reach eight. Much of the night and nearly all of the day had passed without the recovery of any bodies. When those of the children were washed up diligent search began for others.

RAINS RELIEVE DROUTH AREA

FARMERS REJOICING IN TEXAS; MID-WEST GETS SHOWERS

Farmers and business men over Texas had a more optimistic outlook today after light rains in various sections Tuesday abated high temperatures, watered thirsty crops and gave hope for better fall harvest.

Business men said the rains in many places were too light to be of great benefit to crops but constituted a psychological life-saver as a stimulant to trade.

Dallas Girls Rain
One of the longest summer drouths on record in Dallas county was terminated by a shower and light rains were reported at Abilene, Amarillo, Fort Worth, Palestine, Port Arthur, Bridgeport, Brownsville, Dallas, Eastland, Nacogdoches, Weatherford, Ladonia, Nocona, Sherman, Longview, Marshall and Woodlawn.

Winds accompanied thundershowers in the vicinity of Shiloh, Locust Grove and Centerville, wrecking several barns and garages and blowing a few dwellings from their foundations.

ALLEGED REDS BEATEN FIFTY-NINE MEN RULE IN U.S., GERARD SAYS

(By Associated Press)
New York, Aug. 21.—In the opinion of James W. Gerard, former ambassador to Germany, 59 men "rule the United States."

Mr. Gerard compiled a list of these men for today's New York Times, which asked him to amplify a sentence in a pamphlet he wrote endorsing the crusade of Viscount Rothermere and Lord Beaverbrook for British empire free trade and high protection. In that pamphlet he wrote: "Give the 40 men who rule the United States ten years for the development of this industrial empire (the British empire) and no country on earth could approach it in per capita wealth."

Explaining why he, as an American, should write on the subject, Mr. Gerard wrote: "After as my excuse the interest that America, in common with all the world, has in the preservation of British property."

The list includes leaders in American finance, industry, the amusement field and journalism, but omits President Hoover and all others holding state and national offices save Secretary Mellon.

Mr. Gerard explains the actual "power behind the throne" is wielded by men whose wealth and important industrial positions in the nation give them a permanent influence in American life. Statesmen, he said, are usually shorn of most of their power when they retire.

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CONVICT DIES IN PRISON
JIMMY ARNOLD VICTIM OF HEAT AT STATE FARM YESTERDAY
HOUSTON, Aug. 21. (P)—Jimmy Arnold, 36, under a murder charge in connection with the Morgan Point "mystery" slaying of July 2, 1928, died from heat prostration at Clemens state prison farm late yesterday. It was learned here today.

He had been charged several months ago, with the murder of Charles Cowpe, whose companion, Miss Lillian Russell, was seriously wounded in the beach shooting. Subsequently, Arnold was convicted of felony theft and sentenced to seven years.

Remained in "Walls"
He was taken to Humbleville three weeks ago. He remained in the "walls" for four days and then was transferred to the prison farm to pick cotton.

Probation Officer J. W. Mills quoted Mrs. Arnold, the boy's mother, as saying Jimmy never had done anything wrong.

WICHITA, Kans., Aug. 21.—Pauline Bailey, wife of a local farmer, was held today charged with kidnaping 13-month-old Juanita Baker from a tourist camp here. The woman, arrested with the infant in a nearby town, said she was weak from hunger, having spent all her money to buy clothes for the baby.

Mrs. Bailey, who was arrested with the child in Eureka, Kas., yesterday, was questioned by authorities upon her return here last night. She was unable to explain her act other than to say she was attracted toward the child while passing a tourist camp near here. Relating unfortunate events of her marriage in Texas, she said she had hitch-hiked to Wichita and after abducting the child had walked on to El Dorado.

The woman was turned over to Greenwood county officers by W. Cox, a local driver, who gave her a check for \$100. She was weak from hunger and had been spending her last money for clothing for the infant.

'LADY-BIRDS' GO FROM HERE TO NIGHT STOP AT AMARILLO

Mrs. Gladys O'Donnell, comely young matron from Long Beach, Cal., whose husband is also a professional pilot, continued to lead the 1930 Women's National Air derby this morning when she brought her speeding plane across the finish line at Municipal airport here—first in the lap race from Roswell New Mexico.

HOW THE LADY-BIRDS FLEW INTO LUBBOCK

Women fliers entered in the National Air Derby, flew into Lubbock shortly after 11 o'clock today, as follows:
Gladys O'Donnell, left Roswell, New Mexico, at 9:01 a. m. (Houstonian Standard Time), landed in Lubbock at 11:01 a. m. (Central Standard Time). Lap time, 1 hour, 41 seconds. (Note: Time changes one hour at the Texas-New Mexico line.) First lap prize, \$250. First on route thus far.
Marjorie Doig, left Roswell at 9:03 a. m., landed here 11:04 a. m. Lap time, 1 hour, 2 minutes, 55 seconds. Second lap prize, \$150. Second enroute thus far.
Jean LaRue, left Roswell at 9:05 a. m., landed here 11:07 a. m. Lap time, 1 hour, 25 minutes, 35 seconds. Fourth place in lap. Third on route.
Mildred Morgan, left Roswell at 9:08 a. m., landed here 11:08 a. m. Lap time, 1:02:02. Third lap prize, \$100. Fourth on route.
Ruth Barron, left Roswell at 9:09 a. m., landed here 11:08:30. Lap time, 1:03:35. Fifth place in lap. Sixth on route.
Ruth Stewart, left Roswell at 9:06 a. m., landed here 11:08:00. Lap time, 1:02:00. Sixth place in lap. Fifth on route.

Negotiating the 180 air miles between Roswell and Lubbock in one hour and 41 seconds, Mrs. O'Donnell made a beautiful finish as her Waco ship, with a hoarse Wright motor, roared across the line and later made a perfect landing. She added almost two minutes to her derby lead from Long Beach thus far and upon reaching Lubbock was racing her nearest rival, Miss Marjorie Doig, Danbury, Connecticut, by 14 minutes and 21 seconds.

Doig Fights Gaily
Miss Doig, however, continued to cling stubbornly to Mrs. O'Donnell's slender advantage by making into Lubbock in second place, just a fraction over a minute and a half behind the leader. Her time from Roswell was one hour, two minutes and 55 seconds. In the derby thus far Mrs. O'Donnell's time is 7 hours, 34 minutes and 41 seconds as compared with Miss Doig's 7 hours, 29 minutes, 2 seconds.

By leading the way from Roswell to Lubbock, Mrs. O'Donnell has the richer, having won 50 per cent of the \$500 lap prize purse offered by the Chamber of Commerce here. Mrs. Doig, for second honors, was awarded \$150.

Although her plane was the fourth to land, Mrs. Mildred Morgan, Berkeley Hills, Cal., won third place in the derby, with a time of 1 hour, 25 minutes and 35 seconds. She flew from Roswell in 1 hour, 25 minutes and 35 seconds to Lubbock, her total flying time to date 10 hours, 21 minutes and 37 seconds.

Friendship played the hero role in Mrs. Morgan's winning third money and 11-year-old Ruth Barron, of Hollywood, was cast in the leading part. Noting that Mrs. Morgan was leaving the route a few miles out of Lubbock, Mrs. Barron turned her plane, gave chase to the rival flier and at the cost of three minutes of her own time at Mrs. Morgan's side, she was able to finish the derby over the Tuscan, Ariz., trail to 119 miles at the cost of almost ten hours time.

Jean LaRue, darling French aviator from Kansas City, ran her derby time up to 19 hours, 2 minutes and 48 seconds on the Roswell-Lubbock hop. She landed here in place number 5, 1 hour, 35 minutes and 35 seconds, making third place by just 67 seconds.

MARY BAKER CASE HOLDS ATTENTION

Increase Of Milk Prices Revealed

NEW YORK, Aug. 21 (AP)—Small neighborhood grocers today testified large milk companies prevented them from selling milk cheaply even though it was available and they could do so at a fair profit.

Samuel Volman, of Brooklyn, said at a state investigation into alleged price-fixing that he stopped taking milk from the Brooklyn plant of the Dairyman's League when an independent dealer offered him inducements permitting him to lower his price but the independent dealer was "chased out of town."

A dozen other grocers from Brooklyn, Manhattan and the Bronx testified that on Aug. 17 the price of their milk for which they had been paying from 12 to 14 cents per 40 quart, was for them lowered to 10 cents.

When some of them were asked they said they were allowed a slight profit.

WRIGHTSMAN SUE BY CREEK INDIAN

TULSA, Okla., Aug. 21 (AP)—C. J. Wrightsman, wealthy Tulsa oil man and unsuccessful candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States senator, was sued for \$1,000,000 in district court today by Raymond Offutt, Creek country Indian in connection with Wrightsman's acquisition of land in Drumwright and Oilton oil fields.

Offutt now in the Leavenworth federal prison, secured three years sentence on charge of kidnapping, and was released on parole, alleges he was defrauded of a 160-acre tract which he received in an allotment from the government. ALFALFA' BILL IS VISITOR IN CITY

OKLAHOMA NOMINEE OF
DEMOCRATS HERE ON
SHORT VISIT

"Alfalfa Bill" Murray, Oklahoma Democratic gubernatorial nominee, stopped for a brief visit in Lubbock Wednesday night. Bareheaded and smoking a short cigar stub, the famous character refused to comment on the Ferguson-Sterling race in Texas and predicted he would be elected governor of Oklahoma by a margin of at least 100,000 votes.

With red tie flared to the breeze, dark trousers, a white shirt and suspenders, the Oklahoma candidate, known as "The Sage of Tahomango," sat on a cement block in a filling station and talked of Texas history, Oklahoma and Texas politics, school teaching and the drought.

"I never make statements about things I don't know anything about. I have not followed Texas politics," was his reply to a question regarding his pick for the winner in the Texas governor's race.

To Take Rest
Accompanied by Ben Mobley of Ardmore, Oklahoma, Murray was en route to Albuquerque, N. M.

Mobley said the gubernatorial candidate was "hiding out for a rest" and after naming the New Mexico city as his destination said we don't know where we'll go from there.

The pair indicated that they expected to remain outside Oklahoma 10 days or two weeks.

Murray whose nicknames include "Bolivia Bill" as a result of an unsuccessful venture which ended there last year, said that if he were elected Oklahoma's governor, he proposed to "bring the government back to constitutional government and integrity, to readjust taxes, decrease appropriations."

"Well, Alfalfa, Bill and Clint Small is runnin' now."

Walker, commissioner of the general land office. Walker stated that owing to the distressing drought condition in school land territory, many farmers were unable to make the interest payments and that he did not believe the land should be forfeited.

The bulk of the school land that was to be forfeited was in West Texas.

Class B land, however, will be sold as advertised Walker said.

SUIT SEEKS TO ALLOW
WOMEN ELIGIBLE TO
STATE OFFICES

(By Associated Press)

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 21.—A suit designed to force submission of a constitutional amendment making women eligible for major state offices in Oklahoma to voters at the November election, will be filed soon, J. B. A. Robertson, former governor, said today. The action will be introduced in the state supreme court. The amendment would qualify women for governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, state auditor, attorney general, state superintendent of public instruction, state treasurer and state examiner and inspector, Robertson said.

Resolution Passed
In 1923 the legislature passed a resolution to submit the amendment to voters. It was passed at a special election October 2, 1923, by a vote of 173,242 to 86,449 but the vote was

ruled out because the question was not submitted at a general election. Agitation for the suit was revived yesterday when members of the women's Jeffersonian club adopted a resolution asking that a plank be placed in the democratic platform advocating the right of women to hold the offices.

Eating Is Cheap In Campus Cafeteria

AUSTIN, Aug. 21. (AP)—The high cost of living does not bother University of Texas students and faculty members who patronize the University Commons, campus cafeteria, for their meals. During the long session, average meal checks for breakfast, lunch, and supper were 15, 22 and 28 cents, respectively. The checks for the three meals during the summer averaged 18, 25, and 32 cents, respectively. Approximately 375,000 meals have been served by the cafeteria staff since last September. The cafeteria is a non-profit-making institution and is under the direction of trained dietitians.

COLEMAN, Aug. 21. (AP)—Opening of the cotton picking season in Karnes County has aided the unemployment situation in this section. During the past week several truck loads of pickers were sent from Coleman.

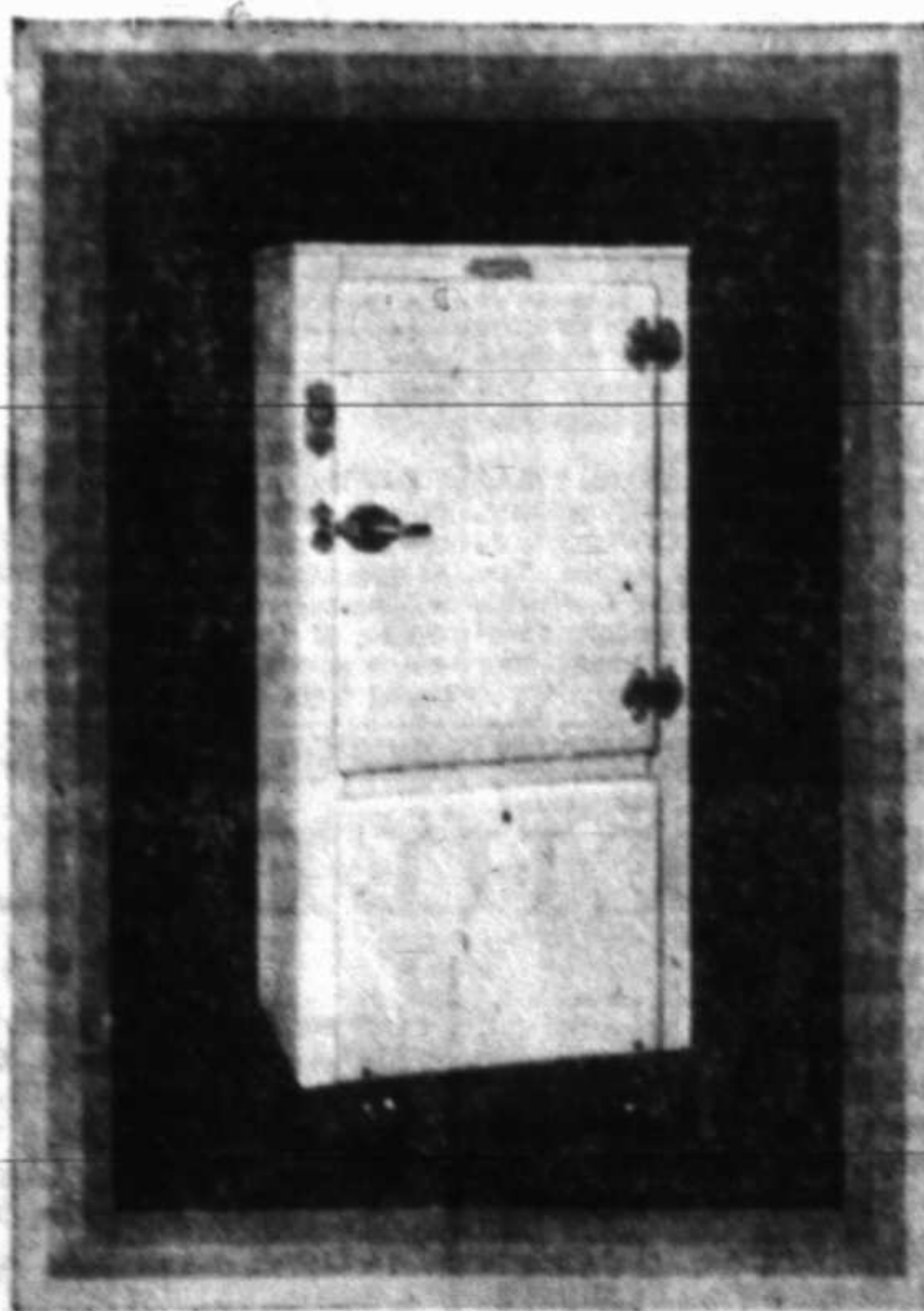

IT'S APPEAR TO HAVE ANOTHER FLAG CINCHED



Coach Henry Frka looked over his Lubbock high school Westerners of 1930 for the first time this week and was silent. Whether his silence meant pleasure or disfavor is known only to himself, but there must have been a slight tinge of regret mixed with his otherwise medium feelings as he surveyed his fifty hopefuls and missed the faces of four men who have had as much to do with moulding public opinion in favor of a championship for Lubbock as any other four men anywhere. These men are gone, swept away by graduation, and the tempo of the pennant tune is slowed down to a marked degree by their departure.

All members of the departing quartet came from the line of the 1929 Westerner team that filled its fans with high hopes for the coming season. They are Bob Rich and Yancy Price, ends, Greer Prizzell, tackle, and Joe Leaverton, center. All were letter men and all were stars. Now that they are gone, the Lubbock lineup does not twinkle so brightly, but by the time of the first game this fall there will be another quartet in the places of the departing stars who will have been trained and treated for the positions. Whether they can go like Rich, Price, Prizzell, and Leaverton remains to be seen. The coaches miss them, but a team cannot rely on memory for success, and Coach Frka and Keelings are grooming a select group to fill the vacancies.

Football fans over the state are clamoring for pre-season dope on their favorite teams, and scribes are letting up a little on baseball to give it to them. Pre-season dope is very little, if any, more reliable than comparative scores. Not even the rosters of teams are definite until the season starts, and the real strength of teams does not make itself evident until the season is well under way. Take it from one who admits getting all hot and bothered over the prospects of the 1929 Baylor University team, especially so after the Bears set a conference record in smashing East Texas Teachers 88 to 0 in the first game of the season and won their next two by scores nearly as decisive, only to see the exalted and over-exaggerated club utterly collapse before T. C. U. and S. M. U. there's not much to the contents of the dope bucket this early.

This year promises to furnish the fans with one of the most sensational gridiron campaigns in several years, and the play in Texas colleges and high schools will be characteristic of the season. Scribes have long since learned to lay off picking winners in the Southwest Conference, though most of them have yet to learn that high schools are nearly as erratic. The difference is that the process of elimination in the state high school race is easier. But for the benefit of those fans who still believe in pre-season dope, we're going to name the favorites, as we see them, in the eight districts of Texas and in the Southwestern Conference.

We shall start with naming three teams in District 1, viz. Amarillo, Wichita Falls, and Lubbock. Two teams are enough in the other districts, though: Ranger and Cisco District 2; Oak Cliff and Fort Worth Central High District 3; Waco and Corsicana District 4; McKinney and Sherman District 5; Tyler and Athens District 6; Port Arthur and John Reagan (Houston) District 7; and Brownville and Brackenridge High (San Antonio) District 8. In the Southwestern Conference, S. M. U. and T. C. U. look strong, and, in a hushed voice, Baylor.

Jinx Tucker, erstwhile Waco scribe, who draws the ire of less sedate sports critics, comments on the Lubbock team as follows: "Most of the stars of the Lubbock team will be back." Coach Frka spelled F-r-n-k-a, Jinx, of the Lubbock club dreads overconfidence, and sends word that he will appreciate it if this writer will say in this column that three of his players have flunked out and another has a broken arm. We will be glad to help out the coach, and for his benefit will add that two more are suffering from heebie jeebies, while two had to be shot because of broken legs. Lubbock need not worry about overconfidence so early. In fact Coach Frka (wrong again) need not worry about it at all. All of the District 1 teams will be laying for Lubbock this year and a couple of them will probably give the Westerners a battle hard enough to destroy overconfidence that might creep into the ranks of the club."

Houston Man Wins In Shooting Meet
VANDALIA, Ohio, Aug. 21. (AP)—Three additional trapshooting champions were crowned in the third day's meet of the Grand American handicap tournament here Wednesday.

F. P. Woodward, Houston, Texas, won the "champion of champions" title in the race between state champions. Representing Texas, Woodward broke 197 out of a possible 200 targets to tie with Ohio's title holder, H. F. Roberts. In the 20 target shootoff, Woodward had a perfect run, while Roberts missed one.

Ohio's Number 2 squad won the state team championship with a total of 277 targets out of a possible 300. Texas Number 1 was second with 273.

BUFFS HAVE EDGE IN LEAGUE'S FINISH

SENATORS AND YANKS HAVE HARD GO

BOB GROVE WINS 21ST VICTORY; BROOKLYN LOSES GROUND

While the National league pennant race goes merrily on without getting very near to a decision, the Philadelphia fans are about ready to hear the news that the Athletics have clinched the American league title for another year.
It will require an amazing winning streak on the part of the Washington Senators or the New York Yankees combined with a wholly unexpected slump on the part of the A's to keep the world's champions from capturing another American league flag. After yesterday's 10 to 4 victory over Detroit, the Athletics had only 31 games left to play and a margin of 8 1-2 games over Washington. If Philadelphia slumps so far as to lose half of its remaining contests, winding up the season with 86 victories and 56 defeats, Washington must win 25 of its remaining 34 games to tie the Yankees, now ten games behind, could lose only seven of 33 games.

Senators Win Also
The Senators continued their case yesterday by trouncing the St. Louis Browns, 14 to 4, scoring a ten run burst in the fifth inning which went a long way toward avenging the indignities suffered in St. Louis. But Washington's 18 hit assault brought no gain while the Athletics were giving Bob Grove his usual backing. Grove did some ragged hurling as he won his eighth straight game and his 21st victory of the season, but he was presented with a seven run lead before the Tigers started to score. The other American league clubs had a day of scheduled idleness.

Leaders Are Beaten
The leaders of the National league were joined in grief yesterday as all three succumbed to their rivals of lower rank in the standings. But Brooklyn was the only club which lost ground. The Robins moved into Cincinnati for a double header with the humble Reds, who had lost seven straight games and 20 out of 25 previous games. But much to their surprise, Cincinnati pitching proved better than Brooklyn's in two games, both being decided by 2 to 1 scores.

The last-place Phillies evidently were destined to win their twelfth game with the champion Chicago Cubs although it required three days of effort to give them a 10 to 8 decision. The four batters started in an eleven-inning tie in the second half of Saturday's double header and failed to come to a decision in a 16 inning second clash Tuesday, finally was played off yesterday and Philie players were triumphant. Five four batters played the important part in deciding the dispute although the Phillies gave away four runs in the first inning and were out, 17-13.

A single homer and a wild pitch by Fred Fitzsimmons were about enough for the St. Louis Cardinals as they downed the New York Giants 3 to 4. Pinch batsmen George Fisher made a four base clout for three runs while the wild heave by the Giant pitcher allowed the tying run to score. Out of the pennant race, Pittsburgh gained a triumph of its own by shutting out the Boston Braves, 5 to 0.

COMMUNISTS BUSY

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Aug. 21. (AP)—A vigorous campaign to free two girl communists from a sentence of three months in the Monroe county penitentiary on charges of desecrating the flag, was launched here today. Rochester communists are raising a defense fund and planning a mass meeting Saturday.

The girls, Aileen Holmes, 22, of New York, and Mae Hula, 20, of Belden, North Dakota, began serving their sentence yesterday. They were arrested after they had refused the proffer of a flag at their camp near Van Etten, where one hundred children under their charge were being instructed in communist doctrines.

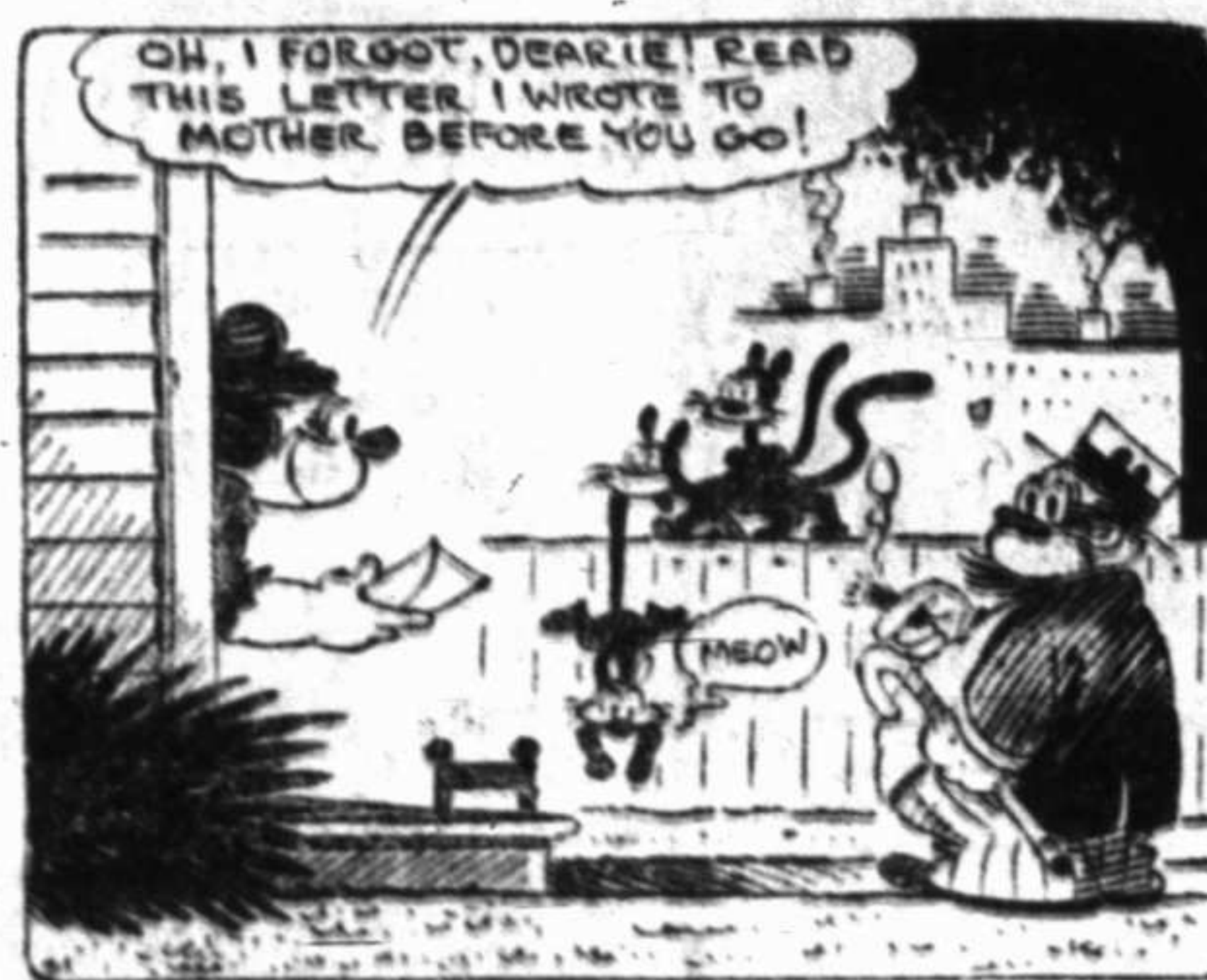

CENSUS REVISED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21. (P)—Revised population figures for five Oklahoma cities were given in a state summary issued today by the census bureau as follows: Oklahoma City, 180,382, an increase of 94,000 or 102.1 per cent. Ardmore, 15,471, an increase of 1,500 or 11.8 per cent. Bartlesville, 14,708, an increase of 343 or 2.4 per cent. Muskogee, 32,078, an increase of 1,729 or 5.7 per cent. Ponca City, 18,833, an increase of 8,610 or 113.2 per cent. The state total was given as 2,381,777, an increase of 302,094 or 17.9 per cent.

REHEARING TO BE ASKED

TEXAS AND PACIFIC TO SEEK ANOTHER PLEA IN EXTENSION

(By Associated Press)
DALLAS, Aug. 21. (P)—G. O. Bateman, attorney for the Texas and Pacific railroad, of which the Abilene and Southern is a subsidiary, said today application for a rehearing on the denied petition of the A. and S. to extend its line from Baling to San Angelo would be filed immediately upon receipt of the interstate commerce commission ruling.

Division four of the I. C. C. yesterday denied the petition, which would have paralleled the Santa Fe for 39 miles. The petition bore the recommendation of R. R. Molster, I. C. C. examiner, that such permission be granted unless the Santa Fe granted trackage rights within 30 days.

"While the three members of division four of the I. C. C. denied our application by a vote of two to one, we feel sure that the entire commission, which consists of eleven members, will look upon it favorably," said Mr. Bateman.

"Application for the rehearing before the entire commission will be made as soon as the decree denying permission is received."

CHURCHES WILL GET ESTATE

BUSINESS SITE TO BE SOLD IN FORT WORTH FOR \$1,500,000

(By Associated Press)
FORT WORTH, Aug. 21.—According to the last will and testament of E. D. Farmer, 72, bachelor, a Fort Worth business site worth approximately \$1,500,000, will be sold as soon as a bidder offers an equitable price, the proceeds to be distributed among Episcopal churches and charities in Fort Worth and in Parker county and a part going to the University of the South.

The site, occupied by the two-story Dundee building, comprises six lots fronting on Houston street on the southeast corner of Houston and Seventh streets and is one hundred by one hundred feet.

Held In Trust
George Beggs, Fort Worth realtor, who has served as executor of the Farmer estate, today announced the transfer of the property to Bishop Harry T. Moore, of the Dallas diocese of the Episcopal church. The property is to remain in trust with Bishop Moore and his successors in office and Beggs acting as a board of trustees to direct the distribution and management of funds.

Of the proceeds from the sale of the property, \$250,000 will go to the University of the South, an Episcopal church institution at Sewanee, Tennessee.

Churches Benefited
St. Andrews Episcopal church of Fort Worth will receive \$200,000; Trinity Episcopal church of Fort Worth \$100,000; St. John's Episcopal church of Fort Worth \$25,000 and the All Saints Episcopal church of Weatherford \$75,000. In each church the fund shall be known as the "Edward Disney Farmer church and charity fund."

Half of each church donation, the will states, will be held in trust and will be distributed to charities and to worthy objects.

PEACE IS SEEN IN CHINA

NEW AGENCY REPORTS NATIONALISTS ARE TO GAIN VICTORY

(By Associated Press)
NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—The Kuo Min News agency, representing the Chinese national government in the United States, said today that victory was in sight for the nationalists and that a complete reorganization of provincial governments was planned following conclusion of the campaign against a northern coalition.

Wang Chung Hui, president of the judicial Yuan, cabled the agency of the reorganization plans and added that China soon would be reunited. He said the Chinese, furthermore, would have complete sovereignty in their country, nearly all foreign powers having agreed to abolition of extra-territoriality.

The agency at the same time was notified by Sun Fo, minister of railways, that all government forces along the Tientsin-Pukow railway have occupied Tainan, the Shantung capital reported captured several days ago.

He said the Shensi army had been hopelessly disabled, the rebels losing more than 7,000 men in attempting to escape the nationalist forces.

ACADIANS HOLD BIG CELEBRATION

GRAND FEE, N. S., Aug. 21. (P)—The American descendants of those Norman-capped and kilted Acadians who with the immortalized "Evangeline" were scattered abroad in 1775, returned today to forgetful under the ancient willows of Grand Pre.

Headed by Dudley J. Le Blanc, of Lafayette, La., president of the Louisiana Acadian association, a party of forty men and women, most of them from Louisiana, celebrated the 175th anniversary of the deportation of their forebears from Acadia.

The village was transformed for the day into a beautiful park. Evangeline's well, the memorial church and other landmarks made famous by Louisbourg's epic were thronged by the modern Acadians. When the visitors departed at
