Ordinance On Garbage Haul Is Approved

City commissioners Tuesday afternoon passed a second reading of a proposed ordinance governing the collection of garbage, thus opening the way to institution of a systematic free service in this district by the city.

The ordinance must pass through two other readings and be published before taking effect. Two special trucks with hydraulic jacks for packing garbage already are on hand for use when the law becomes effective. They have been given trial trips in some streets.

Under terms of the ordinance passed on Tuesday, the city would remove all business, commercial and private residences to dispose of their garbage. City trucks are to pick up and haul away certain types of refuse through the city system.

Portable garbage cans, constructed of galvanized iron or other suitable metal, with two handles and a tight fitting lid, must be furnished by owners and individuals affected. The containers must have a capacity of not less than five gallons nor more than 32, and a diameter not to exceed 22 inches.

These cans are to be placed just inside the property line abutting on the street, or in event there is no gate, on a platform so it can be reached from the outside. Where there are no alleys, cans are to be placed on the front curb line.

Directions for packing rubbish and trash also were given in the ordinance. Special permits will be given by the city for hauling such types of garbage and rubbish not practical for collection by the trucks. None can operate without a permit, however.

The ordinance clearly sets out regulations for disposing of the garbage and provides penalties for failure to do so. Every day of violation constitutes a separate offense under terms of the proposed ordinance.

RAIDS INCREASE IN FURY

Six Deaths, Heavy Damage Reported As Carolina Streams Go On Rampage

Roads Closed,
Some Towns
Isolated

Water Mains Destroyed,
Communications Crippled

ASHEVILLE, N. C., Aug. 14 (AP)—Mountain streams, swollen by torrential rains of the last three days, surged out of their banks today wrecking damage to roads, crops and lowland industrial plants expected to run into millions of dollars and claiming at least six lives.

Highways were blocked by washouts, landslides or inundation.

North Wilkesboro, N. C., a town of 4,000 persons, was cut off by the flooded Yadkin river, and damage there was estimated by Police Chief John Walker at \$3,000,000.

Water mains here were destroyed, and residents were cautioned to use water from an emergency reservoir sparingly. Water, light and communication facilities at North Wilkesboro were paralyzed.

A woman excitedly grabbed an electric wire near North Wilkesboro and was killed when flood waters surged about her automobile. A man drowned when his boat was swept over a dam near here.

Two persons were drowned in southwest Virginia, two others in east Tennessee.

Hundreds of persons were driven from their homes along the swirling streams.

Many industrial plants were flooded.

Officials of several communities expressed fears that dwellers along the rapidly rising streams were drowned before they could evacuate their homes.

City Manager P. M. Burdette called on all residents to conserve on water as the level in the reservoir, just above the city, fell.

Flash floods, sweeping out of the mountains and foothills of western North Carolina and eastern Tennessee, aroused fears for the safety of many.

Torrential rains followed a hurricane that raked the coast of South Carolina and Georgia last week. Property damage was expected to run into millions.

Highway Patrolman Claude Buckles said several persons in the Elizabethton area may have been trapped in their beds by the swift Watauga.

Dies Considers Calif. Hearing

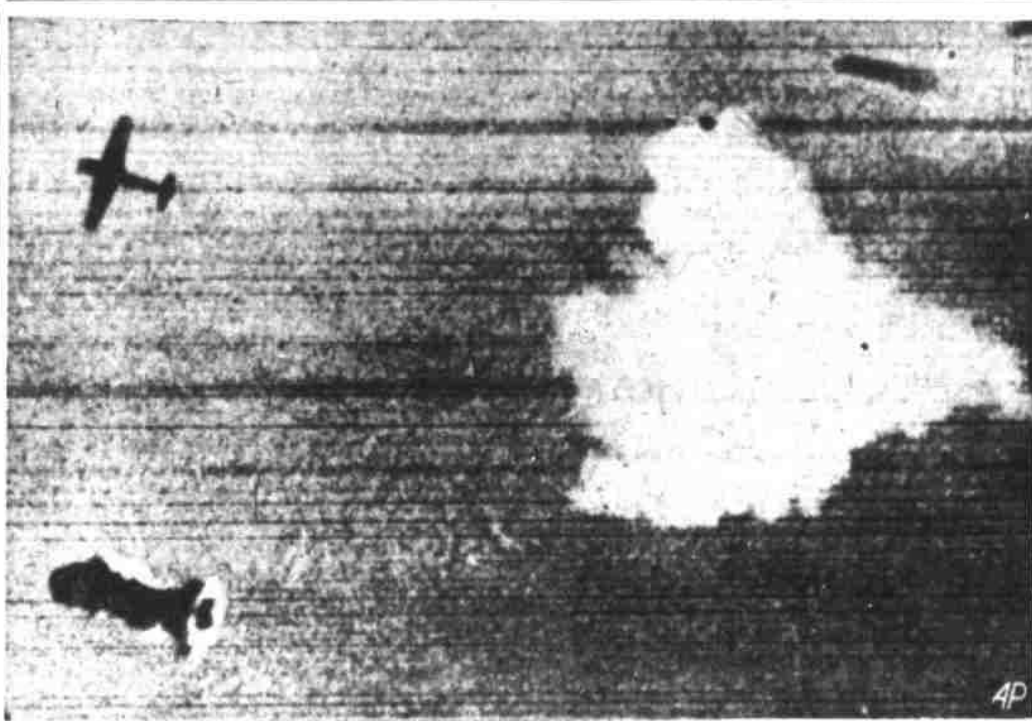
Mrs. Jenkins said that she left her husband at Sweetwater, "atill in bed," and that they were there to be with his mother who is seriously ill.

Western Gaiety Prevails As 7th Annual Rodeo Opens

Over 60 Contestants On Hand For
Opening Performance; 19 Sponsors

Big Spring took on the old celebration atmosphere Wednesday noon as preparations for the seventh annual rodeo were climaxed with a big mounted parade through the downtown district, followed by the opening performance at the rodeo grounds.

All morning long crowds milled around downtown and there was a steady line of cars driving out to the grounds and back. Sunburned cowhands, here for a whack at prize money, swamped rodeo clerks with entry appeals.

At noon Wednesday there were 63 contestants listed from 33 cities and towns and from four states.

County Gets More Rainfall

Heavy showers Wednesday morning further reduced the dry areas in Howard county as crop and range prospects continued to grow brighter by the day.

The eastern quarter of Howard county came in for heavy downpours that reached proportions of young flood in the edge of the late flat country and across to Coahoma. Good showers were reported as far west as Sand Springs, seven miles east of here.

Frank Reeves, Fort Worth, said that the rain appeared heavy between Sweetwater and Coahoma, and that there were times this morning when it was almost blinding. Noble Read, who ranches east of Coahoma, said he had a big rain.

However, there were no reports of additional overflow going into the two city lakes in the southeastern part of the county. Foran was said to have had a good rain.

Heaviest rain report over the state came from Del Rio where 1.26 inches was recorded. Other points reporting rain were: Wichita Falls .75, Vernon .36, Ballinger .25, Brownwood .23, Childress .35, Fort Stockton .30, Haskell .50, La Mesa .21, Muleshoe .39, Plainview .41, and Snyder .26.

REPUBLICANS CONFIDENT OF CARRYING TEXAS THIS YEAR

BEAUMONT, Aug. 14 (AP)—Inspired by fiery oratory and armed with a brilliant new platform of declarations and principles, Texas republicans today marched forth to carry this state for Wendell Willkie.

If they did—and speakers at the republican state convention concluded here yesterday roared that they would—it would be the second time since reconstruction days that Texas had landed in the ranks of the grand old party.

The first was in 1928 when Herbert Hoover shook this traditionally rock-ribbed democratic citadel by snaring a majority over Alfred E. Smith.

In addition to adopting a platform criticizing the new deal, the convention nominated almost a complete ticket to oppose the democrats in the general election for state offices.

No Friend But England, Says Frank Knox

New Cabinet Member
Urges Adoption Of
Conscription Bill

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP) — Secretary Knox urged the house military committee today to approve compulsory military training legislation because if England should be defeated "we will be left without a friend in the world."

Repeatedly asserting the United States faced the most serious crisis in history, the navy secretary declared:

"In the event, that England goes down—and I pray to God that that won't happen—we'll be left without a friend in the world."

However, Knox said, in event of a British defeat, there would not be an immediate attack on the United States but rather a German effort to "calm our fears" and to "interrupt preparedness measures we are taking."

Knox recalled that he had previously said a 300,000-man army would be adequate with a two-ocean navy.

"That was said before the collapse of France," he added. "What I may have said about a land force then does not apply."

He testified that "even if we weren't confronted with imminent menace, the principle underlying this legislation is sound."

"Faced with a very grave crisis as we are—and it is impossible to exaggerate the gravity of that crisis," he declared, "we must supply trained men if we are going to use these instruments we are buying at such a great cost."

Ten senators, thus far non-committal, were reported to hold the fate of opposition efforts to compel a substantial modification of the bill.

The show-down will come on the compromise proposal of Senator Maloney (D-Conn.) to defer conscription until it was proved that voluntary enlistments could not produce the necessary army manpower by January 1.

At the opening of the fourth day of the draft bill debate, administration leaders disclosed an informal canvass had shown that, with the exception of the uncommitted legislators, the senate was almost evenly divided on the Maloney proposal.

The leaders were not optimistic about reaching a vote before next week.

'Chutes Found In England

LONDON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Seventeen parachutes bearing German markings were found today in midland villages, as the ministry of home security appealed to the public to report urgently any information they may have about parachute troops landing in England.

Police and home guards stopped all traffic in the area where the 'chutes were found.

A farmer who found several of them said he could locate no trace of any men near them. (The Midlands is England's great industrial area, and a few parachute troops might be able to conduct extensive sabotage there.)

Findings of the 'chutes intensified a day-long search.

The ministry said police, the military and home guards were continuing a widespread search begun immediately after reports were received that parachutes had been found in two areas in England and one in Scotland last night and early today.

Earlier reports said eleven German airmen (not parachute troops) had been captured in the Midlands after they had bailed out of stricken planes and left hostile parachutes behind them. Seven were reported taken in one group and four in another.

The ministry communique made no mention of such captures.

Bank Appropriation Given Approval

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Over objections of the republican minority, the house banking committee closed hearings and reported favorably today legislation to give the Export-Import bank \$500,000 to assist South American trade.

Rep. Wolcott (R-Mich.) described the measure as a "roundabout method of assisting British blockade of Germany," and said if enacted into law it would be "an act of war."

ATTACKS ARE DIRECTED ON DOVER AREA

Signs of a fast-approaching "zero hour" for Germany's threatened invasion of England mounted ominously today even as nazi bombers, attacking in great waves, spurred the 4-day blitzkrieg to new heights of fury.

These danger signals for Britain were noted:—

1. Six nazi mine-sweeping trawlers were discovered by British destroyers somewhere in the North sea—obviously engaged in clearing the waters for a possible crossing of troop transports.

2. Increasing numbers of German-marked parachutes were found in England's industrial Midlands — 17 at an early count—and the ministry of home security appealed to the public to report urgently any information about the landing of parachute troops, who might seek to paralyze the areas's factories.

3. Public dancing again was barred in Germany, as it was during the nazi blitzkrieg against Poland and during the offensive against Holland, Belgium and France.

4. German bombers concentrated in fierce, huge-scale attacks on the area of Dover-Channel "gateway" for a possible land invasion.

Dover is 22 miles across the channel from the German-held French coast.

DNB, the official nazi news agency, said (the fighting was still raging at 6 p. m. (10 a. m., C.S.T.), with an estimated 25 British planes shot down and only five German planes destroyed.

A London dispatch said England's vast industrial zone in the Midlands was subjected to the longest and fiercest bombing since the war began. Five persons were killed.

Other waves of German bombing and fighting planes turned England's south coast into a battlefield in a series of fights involving 300 planes.

It was the fourth straight day of aerial blitzkrieg, with Britain carrying the raid to the rooftops of her axis foes before dawn in two long-range raids into Italy and Germany.

Flying high out of sight, German Heinkels penetrated British coast defenses and bombed the industrial Midlands while swarms of Messerschmitt fighters engaged British Spitfires and Hurricane pursuit planes at lower altitudes.

Spectators said the British quickly broke up the German strategy of "flying circle" attack, diving into their midst and chasing them into individual dogfights.

A Berlin dispatch meanwhile said "inquiry in competent quarters elicited no denial" of reports that Germany was using long-range big berthas to shell the English coast from emplacements across the channel.

Striking back, Britain sent her airmen on a 1,000-mile round trip across the Alps to rain death on Italian cities while another RAF flight threw a 47-minute air raid scare into residents of Berlin.

The Caproni factory at Milan and the Fiat plant in Turin, two of Italy's major aircraft works, were badly damaged, the British declared.

"War with its terror now is at your doors," said leaflets dropped by night raiders from the island kingdom.

Despite murky weather, nazi warplanes attacked Britain's great industrial midlands during the night and returned again early this afternoon for a fierce, large-scale attack on the already bomb-scarred south coast.

RAF defense squadrons clashed with the raiders in dogfights involving 150 planes, and spectators on the shore saw at least four planes crash into the sea in flames.

Anti-aircraft guns hammered at the nazi craft, which attacked barrage balloons and sank a channel lightship with a six-plane salvo of 12 bombs.

Other German raiders swarmed along the coast in numbers approaching the 500 which stormed Britain's first-line coastal defenses yesterday. About 300 planes fought all along the south coast.

British destroyers also went into action in the heightening struggle.

The British air ministry reported 140 German planes were "definitely destroyed" and 140 others "probably destroyed" in the last two days of intensive raiding.

The air ministry announced that the RAF's spectacular sortie into Italy caused "heavy damage" to aircraft factories at Milan and Turin.

At least 30 British planes were believed to have engaged in the attack—the first big smash at Italian cities since the war began—in a flight that carried them more than 1,200 miles round trip from England.

The air ministry said all returned safely, except one which made a forced landing a few miles from the English coast. Its crew was rescued.

Berlin reported that British raiders penetrated to the region of Potsdam, 20 miles west of Berlin, but were turned back by anti-aircraft fire before they could reach the capital.

Air-raid warnings sent Berlin residents bounding from bed to the safety of air-raid shelters, however, and residents of the capital's suburbs said they heard the sound of distant gun-fire.

Flood Refugees Are Returning To Homes

CROWLEY, La., Aug. 14 (AP)—Hundreds of refugees headed homeward today to contemplate the huge damage caused by floods which spread over southwest Louisiana during the past week. Waters were receding rapidly today.

Storm and rain took a toll of six known dead, hospitalized scores, ruined crops on thousands of acres of rich alluvial land and wrecked many homes and buildings.

Milton C. Tainter, secretary-manager of the Louisiana Farm Bureau Federation, estimated 50,000 head of livestock perished. Federal agencies were feeding thousands more near starvation.

Crowley and Gueydan, worst hit in the flood zone, were being prepared today for the return of refugees.

All but 25 of the inhabitants of Gueydan had been evacuated. Half of Crowley's population fled. Red Cross agencies were still active aiding the approximately 25,000 homeless in various concentration camps on the edge of the affected area.

Mexico Is On Guard Against Disorders During Vote Count

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 14 (AP)—Political circles today called the Havana broadcast of General Juan Andreu Almazan revolutionary and the government took stringent precautions to prevent disorders during congressional tabulation of election results beginning tomorrow.

The gist of comment by various deputies and senators was that the independent presidential candidate has adopted a frantic attitude of violence, had placed himself outside the law and that all his future activities should be regarded as illegal and subversive.

Even as armed guards were thrown around congress to protect it against a rumored attempt by Almazanistas to seize possession, 172 candidates for the chamber of deputies and 58 for the senate on Almazan's ticket filed a joint injunction suit to restrain the federal attorney general from "depriving us of liberty."

They charged he had issued orders to take them into custody to prevent them from organizing their own legislature.

The capital's second civil court granted the injunction temporarily and fixed a hearing for Saturday.

The statements in Almazan's address Monday night that drew the particular fire of the federal legislators were:

That no American government would lend "moral or material aid" to any attempt to "impose" the official candidate, General Manuel Avila Camacho, on the nation.

That as the legal choice of the Mexican people for president he would return to the country at an "opportune moment" to take the oath of office.

That he would know how to fulfill his "obligations" to the people who voted for him.

They asserted such statements were tantamount to a call to arms. To safeguard the capital from a repetition of the violence and bloodshed that marked the July elections, the ministry of national defense disclosed the 6,000 troops now stationed in the capital and 3,000 cadets in military colleges.

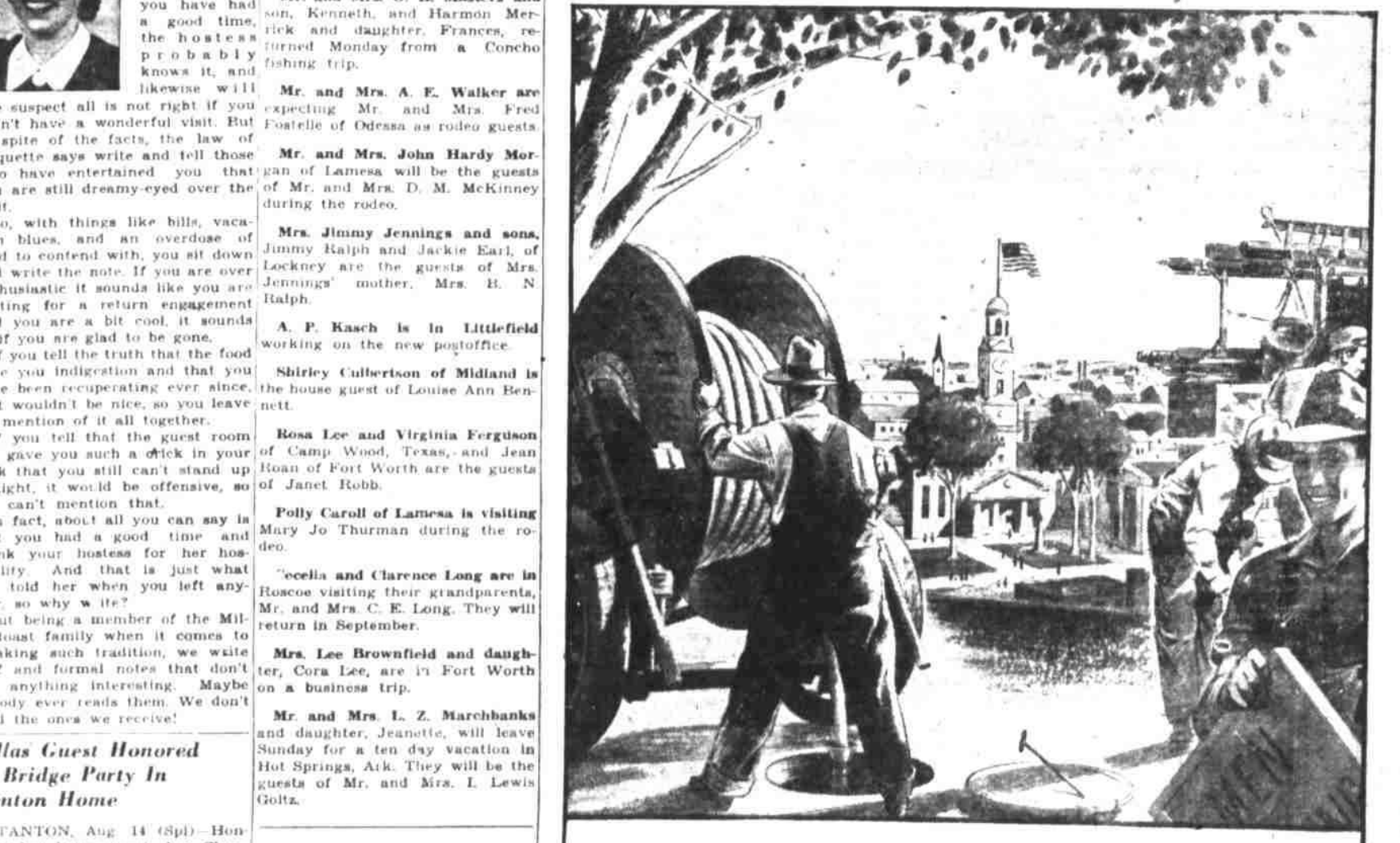

Willkie, the republican's 1940 nominee, said he agreed thoroughly by Landon was his guest.

Willkie settled down today to complete the acceptance address he will deliver Saturday in his home town, Elwood, Ind.

A major section of the speech is expected to deal with military conscription. While rumors have circulated that the nominee favors the idea, there has been no word from Willkie.

EQUIPPED ARMY OF 2,000,000 SEEN BY OCTOBER, 1943

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—Defense Commissioner William A. Knudsen advised congress today an army of 2,000,000 could be placed in the field fully equipped by Oct. 1, 1943.

Knudsen's memorandum to the house ways and means committee followed a question several days ago by Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) as to how long it would take to put such a force in the field.

Knudsen said there was at present no program for 2,000,000 men but rather a program for complete equipment of 1,200,000 and the procurement of 800,000. This program, he asserted, would be completed by the end of 1942.

CADET KILLED AS HIS PLANE CRASHES

DALLAS, Aug. 14 (AP)—John C. Knight, 22, U. S. army air corps cadet from Rotan, Tex., was killed today when the training plane he was piloting crashed nine miles north of Carrollton.

Air corps training detachment officials at Love Field said they were notified the plane had gone into a spin at an altitude of about 300 feet.

Young Knight enrolled at the training detachment June 25.

He was alone on the flight, piloting one of the new PT-19 training ships received at Love Field recently to replace the old PT-3 models which the student fliers have been using.

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Military Draft Would Take A Third Of Southwest Gridiron Players Conn-Pastor Fight Delayed To Sept. 5

DALLAS, Aug. 14 (AP)—In the next six weeks the lashing of a wounded world may kick history's most inviting Southwest conference football race into wreckage.

Military conscription, being argued in congress halls as a Sept. 1 possibility, would place on the eligible list nearly one-third of the lads in Southwest conference football on forms.

Out of the seven-school membership that has given the nation

its No. 1 football team the past two seasons, an Associated Press survey revealed that approximately 145 of the 450 listed on club rosters were 21 years old and physically able to play football and shoulder arms.

Scores of others were on the borderline. But the seven coaches gave sane view to the situation. The general feeling was summed up by Coach Homer Norton of Texas A. and M., the man whose national championship team of 1938—returning almost intact—

would be gutted if all eligibles were selected in a draft:

"If the national emergency becomes so grave as to demand conscription, then football would become very unimportant to me."

The wind-blown Texas stars would be missing.

Giant John Alec Kimbrough, the all-American fullback, Marshall Foch Robnett and seven more regulars off the magnificent Texas Aggie team; the fine Baylor backfield trio of Jack Wilson, Jim Witt and Milton Merks; co-captains Clarence Alexander and Logan Ware of T. U. U. and Fred Dawson and Jimmy Grubbs of Texas; Ken (Tuffy) Whitlow, Rice's thunderbolt center; running, passing and kicking Ray Mallott of S. M. U.; Arkansas' great end combination of Howard Hickey and Maurice Britt.

The list goes on—the standouts of the conference. Veterans who have reached the conscription age limit.

The Aggies would be the hardest hit. Thirty of the listed 56 members of the squad would be eligible, including regulars Kimbrough, Robnett, and Will Buchanan, tackles Ernest Pannell and Chipp Routt, guards Charles Henke, center Tommie Vaughn and Odell Herman, backs William

Conatser, Derace Moser and Marion Fugh. Most of the strong replacements also are of age.

Twenty of Arkansas' 45 squad-mates are available for duty, including probable regulars O'Neill Adams, Howard Hickey and Maurice Britt, ends Jan Carter and Robert Allison, tackles; Milt Simington, guard; Jay Law-hon and Estes McDaniel, backs.

The youngest squad in the conference, Southern Methodist, nevertheless, would have 19 men of the squad's 57 total on the eligible list. From the team slated to hold down the favorite's position with the Aggies would go such lads as Mallott, center Ray Pope, guards Ed Bianchi and J. R. Fawcett, tackles Lynn Barnett and Fred Harris, ends Bob Ruess, Bob Collins and Gus Tunnell; backs Bobby Brown, Foster Elder, Clinton McClain and Gerald Gelse.

Also losing 19 would be Texas Christian, the established "dark horse." Besides Alexander and Ware, quarterback Jack Odell and Rusty Cowart, the passing duet; tackles Woodrow Adams and Dick Everett, guards Bobby Sherrod and Ray Standley, and fullbacks Frank King and Paul Smith, would go.

Seven men counted on doing regular duty for Rice Institute,

and 11 others, would be passing from the squad of 55. They include end Doug Tipton, tackles Fred Hartmann and Louis Kunkel, guards Lyle Bassett and Hugh Stevens, center and captain, Whitlow and Earl Glasie, fullback.

Seven Texas regulars would be caught in a selective draft, while 17 on the squad are of age. Included would be guards Ted Dawson and Woody Johnson; tackles Glenn Jackson, Don Williams and Derwood Fetter; ends Preston Flanagan, Mike Sweeney,

and 11 others, would be passing from the squad of 55. They include end Doug Tipton, tackles Fred Hartmann and Louis Kunkel, guards Lyle Bassett and Hugh Stevens, center and captain, Whitlow and Earl Glasie, fullback.

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Fall Fish Distribution Starts

NEARLY 900,000 BABY FISH will be distributed in West Texas streams during the next few weeks by the State Fish Hatchery at San Angelo. Another finny "crop," destined for "harvest" by thousands of sportsmen, will be sown later in the year by the Federal Fish Hatchery here.

Between them, the two local hatcheries will release nearly 2,000,000 black bass, crappie, catfish, bream, and perch in streams and lakes of this area during their fiscal years.

Picturesquely near the South Concho River just south of town, the State Fish Hatchery is directed by Haskell White, who came here from Tyler at the death of Edgar Mosel. He has a bumper crop at his disposal, including a record number of catfish which are especially "tricky" to raise successfully.

Fish to be distributed are first seined from the large rearing ponds and transferred to concrete-lined holding tanks. They are taken from the holding tanks as needed, counted, loaded in the special hatchery truck, and carried to the stream or lake which will be their new home.

Through the use of special tanks which receive a constant supply of fresh air, from 6,000 to 7,000 fish can be carried safely and easily in one pick-up truck. An air compressor works off the truck motor when it is running. In case of a breakdown, or if the driver stops for lunch, a small gasoline auxiliary motor on the side of the truck supplies the air.

There's a standing invitation from the U. S. Forest Service to use your woodland hideaway any time. Thousands of forest rangers and forest service employees are ready to help.

Name your preference — cool woods, streams, lakes, mountains — there's a spot for you to meet the most critical specifications for an outdoor vacation.

Want A Summer Home?
You even can get land for a permanent summer home in many national forests for a \$15-\$25 annual rental.

The greatest good to the greatest number is the basic rule of U. S. forest management. The choicest spots for camping are reserved for the general public, and facilities for recreation have been set up there.

The next most desirable spots are set aside for group recreation sites—such as 4-H club camps and civic group camps for underprivileged children.

Then, in certain areas where there is plenty of space beyond the needs of the general public and community public, the forest service leases sites for summer

For the more effete there are some swank inns, such as Timberline Lodge on Mount Hood, Ore. They are operated like other vacation inns, and cost about the same.

But the facilities of the average recreation camp are free. Uncle Sam provides cooking facilities, camp sites and supervision. Bring your own blankets and grub and your tent and have yourself a time.

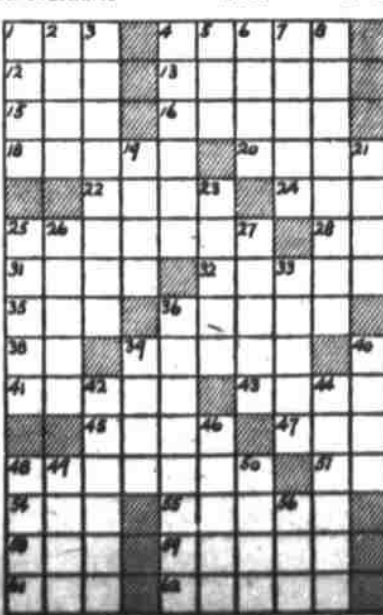

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Editorial

Perhaps there was never a time when Big Spring should rally any stronger support of the Big Spring Cowboy Reunion and Rodeo association than as today and Thursday when the seventh annual shows will be held.

There was never a time since the institution came into being in 1934 that the rodeo needed support as much as it does now. For this reason, response of the public to the show may in a large measure determine its conduct in future years.

Whether you are wild about rodeos or not, it must be admitted that the rodeo is a community proposition, that if there is any benefit to be derived from such a show, the community as a whole receives it. While the statement from last year's show would indicate that not always are rodeos profitable, the fact remains that if any profit should accrue it would stay at home and would go back into improving the show and making it bigger and more entertaining.

Moreover, there is the angle of community cooperation back of the venture. Not only have businessmen backed the rodeo to the extent of

\$1,000, but they have generously participated in a series of four booster trips over the area and have gone further than that by purchasing blocks of tickets. Obviously they want to see it succeed, because they see it as proof that pulling together does pay.

From the entertainment angle, the rodeo should prove worth the admission cost. The average person loves action in his entertainment above all else, and nowhere can more action be found than at a rodeo. There is variety, too, and enough color and music to make an afternoon or evening thoroughly enjoyable.

Certainly not all the fine traditions of the old west can be inculcated or preserved in a rodeo, but such events are suggestive of the days gone by. They do serve as reminders of the heritage of a "cow country" where a man's word was his bond, his roping and riding his power of earning, and his thumbtack his final law.

For all these things the rodeo deserves support at the hands of Big Spring this season, and the only effective support is that kind which shows at the gate.

Washington Daybook

WASHINGTON Political notes for today: I spent hours on separate occasions recently talking to two men high in the ranks of the two major parties and, if I have it right, both the democrats and republicans are counting on splits within the opposition to win victory.

There's nothing new or amazing about a party's efforts to split the opposition. The thumb-rule of battle, "divide and conquer," is as hoary in politics as it is in warfare.

What is amazing is that this year ranking politicians in BOTH parties insist that the time was never ripe for applying the split-and-win technique.

Said the democrat: The conduct of the "Old Guard" republicans; manifested toward Wendell L. Willkie at Philadelphia, has poisoned. Many conservative republicans, outside of the Wall Street crowd, are more lukewarm to Willkie now than when he steamrolled over the convention floor. They may not bolt outright, but they can't put their hearts in electing a man whose ideas are so close to those of the new deal and who out the staunch fighting spirit of the "Old Guard." The G. O. P. is whipped Willkie split the republican party in Philadelphia and it isn't politically possible for him to back up enough now to bring them in line. Without these leaders to guide them in the way they should go, there will be more republicans voting for Roosevelt this year than ever before.

Said the republican: Why just look at the parade of bolshies at party sessions. Burke and "L. H. Smith" to name a few, a former democratic national committee chairman, Lewis D. Brown, a John Hines and former Senator James Reed and that's just the beginning. Roosevelt split the democratic party by his decision to run for a third term and by the high-handed methods

of his managers at Chicago. For every one of these men of prominence, there are hundreds of thousands in the rank-and-file who feel the same way and are swinging over. There'll be more democrats in the ranks of republican voters in November than at any time in the history of the party.

Says I: These two men are astute politicians; just suppose they are BOTH right. Where's the vote in November then? Right back where it started, with the balance of power not with bolshies at all but with the 10 or 12 million floaters who have nothing to bolt from because they steer clear of party affiliations.

Speaking of minor prophets, the anonymous author of a book called "The New Dealers," published in 1934, said: "Edward J. Flynn is the coming man of national democratic politics."

Incidentally, the fellow described him as "a reasonably well-educated man, has read widely, collects Pennell etchings and knows something about economics. He can carry on an intelligent conversation on almost any subject, has a delightful sense of humor and plays a fair game of golf. He's just like a successful uptown business man."

He went on to say that the new national democratic committee chairman is "shrewd and able, far able than Farley."

Observers here don't bother to argue that... it couldn't be proved one way or the other. But what they do say is that Farley and Flynn are better than the "New Dealers" and that the democrats this year have got themselves, in effect, TWO national chairmen.

Evidence that the campaign is getting vicious. Johnny Dem. "Willkie's the futility candidate, he hasn't got a chance." Tommy Rep. "It'll be just like the case of the Duke of Windsor, a king departing with his Wallace."

Man About Manhattan

MONTICOLA, Va. This is an old plantation house about 25 miles from Charlottesville, where Paramount is filming in technicolor a motion picture called "Virginia." The legend is that Thomas Jefferson built this house for one of his daughters, but whether this is fact or fiction cannot be ascertained.

This much is known: The house with its gracious balconies and red brick walls nestled on this hill, surrounded by ancient cedars and oaks, since the year 1825. It was already old when Jackson and Stuart passed by. It is weather-beaten, and some of the porch planks are loose. But the ivy clings valiantly to the imported brick. There is laurel on the hillside, and a thicket of scrub-oak where a Paramount cameraman, or even a Yankee, might hide. It is the home of Miss Emily Nolting, born and grown old there. She is proud of Monticola and its tradition; proud of its name and its ancient stone; proud, too, of her nephew whose name is Buford Nolting and who is a newspaper man in New York.

But this is a strange scene for Monticola to be witnessing. Under the oaks, on long plank tables, negroes are getting the noon-day meal for 775 actors, actresses, directors, extras, technicians and cameramen. All the baggage of Hollywood is there: the giant cranes, the cameras, the fans, the tremendous 12-ton generators. They are scattered in groves and across lawns where a peacock might strut and preen at home. The mechanical equipment of a Hollywood studio does not off to the left, Fred MacMurray, in overalls

and boots, and wearing a sweaty blue shirt, is pumping water from a well. The sun is hot at noon day at Monticola, but the water from this well is so cold it hurts your hands. In the tub at the end of the trough MacMurray's little five-year-old "daughter," Carolyn Lee, clad only in postage-sized white panties, is splashing water on Fred, and laughing.

Near at hand Madeleine Carroll is telling a reporter that she has a bubble-free sting to match her vaccination. "I am beautifully symmetrical," she says. "My new vaccination is on the left thigh and the bee stung me on the right."

Wearing a soft straw hat and a light, cool suit, Producer-director Edward H. Griffith is explaining that he had to rebuild six bridges between Monticola and Charlottesville, because the bridges accommodated only 5-ton trucks, and his generators weigh 12 tons. Mr. Griffith, however, is at home in this case. He is from Lynchburg and is an old friend of Carter Glass.

Through "Virginia" is a story of Virginia and of a Virginia family, there is only one native Virginian in it. This is Tom Rutherford (the family spells it Rutherford), and there was a lot of excitement, not all of it pleasant, when he changed the spellings who used to be a reporter on a Richmond paper. There is a legend that Tom has had the new spelling of his name insured by Lloyd's, and that he gets \$1 every time it is misused. But when we asked about it he laughed and said it was only a story.

Hollywood Sights And Sounds

HOLLYWOOD "The Great McGinty" Written and directed by Preston Sturges. Principals: Brian Donlevy, Muriel Angelus, Akim Tamiroff, Allan Josslyn, William Demarest, Louis Jean Heydt, Steffi Duna.

Fresh in treatment and timely in theme, "The Great McGinty" tells the story of a city man who got in with a crooked political machine and rose, by logical if unconventional processes, to be governor of a state.

Dan McGinty (Donlevy) came from a bread-line to earn a few bucks voting, at \$2 per vote. He voted so industriously that the Boss (Tamiroff) saw a future in him. He was as tough as the Boss, and took no back talk.

Pretty soon Dan was a city slicker, and ripe for the majority on the reform ticket. To win women's votes, they figured, he had to have a wife, and there was a nice girl (Angelus) who didn't mind marrying him on a platonic basis. That was Dan's first mistake. He fell for the dame and vice versa, and then when he won the governorship she talked him into trying to be honest. It was fatal.

That's how you get the story as Big Dan, now a barkeep in a tropic joint, tells it to a torrid rhumba cutie (Duna) and a suicide bent youngster (Heydt) who had been dishonest for "one crazy minute" just as Dan for one crazy minute had been honest.

There are no big names in the cast, but there's more good acting than in a raft of epics. The Angelus girl is strikingly good, Donlevy is a riot, Tamiroff and Demarest as the politicians are perfect. But the real star is Sturges, who

wrote the story and directed the picture (this first) to bring out every laugh, every satirical jibe, and every story value.

"Queen of Destiny" Anna Neagle, Anton Walbrook, C. Aubrey Smith Directed by Herbert Wilcox.

As in "Victoria the Great," Miss Neagle again triumphs in a characterization of the queen who gave her name to a golden era of British Empire progress.

Not a "plotted" movie, but rather an episodic and authentic account of outstanding events in Victoria's reign, the film is impressive for its pageantry and performance. The young queen's romance with Albert (Walbrook), his wife counsel through their married life until his death, make the more interesting portions.

Done in color, in England, with the royal castles at the film's disposal, it is an interesting contribution to movie biography.

"The Villain Still Pursued Her" Hugh Herbert, Alan Mowbray, Anita Louise, Buster Keaton, Joyce Compton, Richard Cromwell, Margaret Hamilton, Diane Fisher.

Based on a century-old play, "The Fallen Saved," and played straight, it's a novelty which doesn't quite come off. The audience is invited to hiss the villain and cheer the virtuous, just as in various stage presentations reviving the lush over-acting and scenery-chewing of that period.

What the screen lacks, and the theatre provides, is intimacy and beer and pretzels during the show. It's pretty funny at times, but misses badly at others.

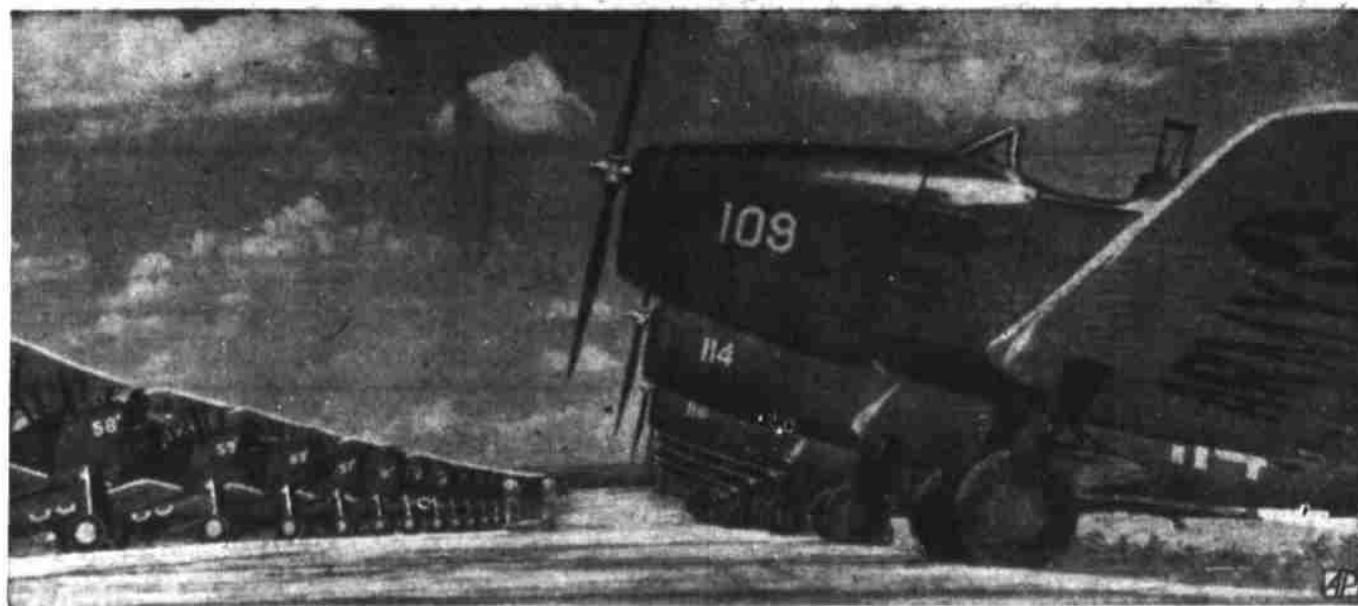
