Graham Beats Bulldogs Friday Night

The Graham Steers unleashed a powerful ground offensive in the second half, adding plenty of insurance to a six point lead and blasted the Burk Burnett Bulldogs 36-8, in a 4-AAA contest in Burk Burnett stadium Friday night.

The Bulldogs had kept things quiet until the third quarter, taking advantage of a 14-8, of the Steers at intermission. Unfortunately the ball should have had a little more life on it for the Bulldogs.

Three fumbles and one set up a touchdown. The Bulldogs had their poor offensive game of the sea-picking up only 84 yards on ground and 17 via the air. The defensive looked stout through the first half but they must have had minds elsewhere during the second period. That was the time in which the Steers iced the game away.

The biggest problem the Bulldogs had was the offensive line, was 185 lbs fullback Bill Ingram who ran up 114 yards, almost all of Graham's 232 yards on ground. Ingram's teammate, Langford, lended a big hand running for 57 yards in the second half. Langford scored two touchdowns and Ingram had a quarterback Preston Pratt for the other two Steer

Pratt singled out end Terry Collins with a conversion pass and the count was 28-8.

With 7:57 to go in the final period, the Steers added their final score. Pratt fired a 12 yard strike to end Phil Birdwell for the tally. The work-horse, Ingram, put the two extra points on the board and the final score was 36-8.

The Bulldogs scored the only time they threatened. They just couldn't generate enough offense to match the Steers in the last half. Graham had to work for its yardage everytime they threatened too.

Three names stood high above the others on defense. They were David Salter, Dean Thompson, and Danny Parrack. Thompson gained 59 yards in 15 attempts followed by Rod Turner, with 21 in 2, and Tommy Olds, with 14 in 5 tries. Hubble, whose passing game was way off, only completed 3 of 12 passes for a sparse 17 yards.

Next week, the Bulldogs are idle and will be preparing for an Oct. 23rd encounter with the Vernon Lions. It's hard to keep youngsters fired up when they're losing, but if the coaches can get the Bulldogs up for the Vernon game, I feel that victory is in sight.

Texas Grocers To Take Part In Food Industry Campaign

Texas Grocers will take part in a united food industry campaign during October centered around the theme "Food is A Bargain," according to Robert E. Crozier, executive vice president of Texas Retail Grocers Association.

Crozier said the campaign was being conducted to acquaint consumers with achievements of the food industry during the past two decades.

"For example, the consumer is now spending only 19 percent of the after tax dollar for food as compared to more than 26 percent less than 20 years ago," Crozier said.

The 19 percent current food expenditure compares with 29 percent spent by British consumers and more than 50 percent spent for food in Russia.

Crozier said government figures show that consumers work fewer hours to earn a month's supply of food — 37 hours in 1963-64 as compared to 60 hours in 1947-49. Each farm worker produces food for 28 people as compared to feeding 14 people in 1947-49.

Wichita Falls Community Singing To Be Held October 18th

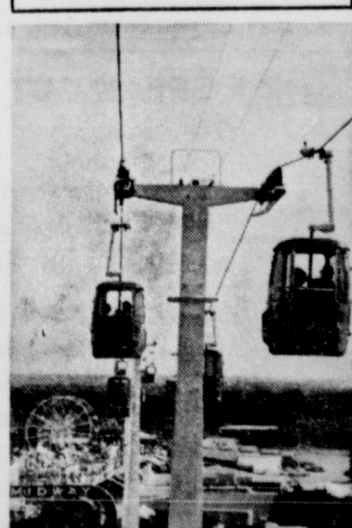

LEGALIZED TAX WASTE

The Rural Electrification Administration, let it be remembered, was created to help finance electric service to farmers who could not then be served on a normal commercial basis. It was never intended that it move into areas where other suppliers of power were doing the needed job. And, most certainly, it was not intended that REA funds be used to duplicate existing facilities.

The original purpose of REA is being changed — and how!

To take just one example, a short time ago, REA approved a \$56,521,000 federal loan to an organization of rural electric co-ops in Louisiana. That action brought this telling comment from the head of one of the state's utilities: "We are extremely disappointed that the Rural Electrification Administration, Washington, D. C. has chosen to approve this large unjustified, uneconomic loan to build an electric generating plant and approximately 1,800 miles of transmission line in Louisiana. These facilities are completely unnecessary as they would duplicate existing facilities of the investor-owned, tax-paying, fully regulated companies in Louisiana. Many of the lines of the private utilities which would be duplicated by construction as a result of this REA loan were built at a cost of millions of dollars to the private companies primarily to serve the local co-ops. This is just another example of the use of taxpayers money to put the federal government in competition with its citizens."

On top of that—as the co-ops pay only token taxes locally and are completely exempt from federal taxes—this involves a very heavy tax loss to government at all levels. And REA loans carry only a two per cent interest rate, which is about half of what the government must pay on its long-term borrowings to supply them money. It is cynical to talk about economy and efficiency in government so long as situations such as this are permitted to exist.

Comment from the Capital —

EAGLE OR OSTRICH?

Maybe the time has come to retire the eagle as our national emblem and replace it with an ostrich.

After all, isn't it the ostrich that hides its head in the sand when it's faced with a frightening situation?

And isn't that the way more and more Americans (including top government officials) are reacting to the very real threats that confront our nation — by ignoring the facts and hoping it's all just a bad dream that will go away if they pretend it isn't there?

Take, for example, the way some people seem to feel about Nikita Khrushchev. It's become fashionable to think of him as a shrewd but amiable clown with a secret affection for America and Americans.

The raw, naked truth, of course, is something quite different. Those who know state flatly that Khrushchev is a ruthless and incredibly powerful Communist dictator dedicated to the total destruction of our nation and its traditional way of life by any and all possible means.

Not a very pretty picture, is it? And so there are those who prefer the "likeable old rascal" version.

And what about this business of communists infiltrating our schools, our unions and government and so on? Nothing to it, say our friends with the rose-colored glasses. Just sensational-seeking witch hunts.

But I wonder how they're going to explain away the recent exposure of Mobilization for Youth — a government-financed "social-service organization to help underprivileged youth." After the organization's director had repeatedly pooh-poohed charges that Reds were using it to incite racial violence, school boycotts and rent strikes and dismissed the charges as "irresponsible" and "shadowy," the FBI decided to find out for themselves. They discovered that nearly 10 per-

cent of the names on the MFY payroll belonged to an ungodly assortment of hard-core left wingers, active communist party members, Chinese Red sympathizers, Castroites and even a Trotsky revolutionary. They discovered, too, that MFY printing facilities were used to turn out inflammatory literature that figured in the bloody Negro riots.



Since Mobilization for Youth has been described as a local prototype of the Administration's new anti-poverty program, a number of Congressmen have expressed alarm at what might happen in that project. And it might well be that their alarm is justified. It's no great secret that high-ranking Washington officials, despite exposures, still continue to tolerate Red sympathizers in government jobs — even in sensitive State Department posts.

Still another horrible example of the head-in-the-sand approach is the endless whitewashing of Castro — a stubborn refusal by those who ought to know better to recognize the obvious fact that Cuba is a communist stronghold established to spread terror, anti-U.S. propaganda and revolution throughout the entire Western Hemisphere.

The New York Times has likened Castro to Abraham Lincoln. Senator Fulbright, in the understatement of the year,

refers to him as a mere "nuisance." And the State Department welcomed the bearded Red to our country as a "distinguished leader."

As a matter of fact, without the continued help and encouragement of our State Department, it's highly doubtful that Castro could have established his communist satellite in Cuba. Who says so? The Senate Internal Security Subcommittee does — in a 12-volume report, *Communist Threat to the U.S. Through the Caribbean*.

Softpedaling the facts and making reassuring myths out of ugly realities is the major interest of our foreign affairs experts these days.

For example, we're told that a moderate and conciliatory U.S. policy toward Russia will, in turn, lead to a moderate and conciliatory Russian policy toward us.

We're told that the doctrine of peaceful coexistence is the only way to avoid an all-out nuclear war.

We're told that the Russian communist empire is falling apart and all we have to do is sit back and wait for its inevitable collapse.

We're told a lot of hogwash. The real truth is that our new-style "appeasement" policy plays right into the hands of the Communists and, as a result, we're taking a bad shelling in the cold war and the hot wars in Viet Nam and the Congo as in Korea and Cuba. We are supposed to fight only with bows and arrows if these are the only weapons our enemies possess. By acting timid and backing down when the going gets rough, we only invite further aggression and eventually the enslavement of all nations in the free world.

When will we learn that we can't compromise with the Reds? The only language they respect is the language of military and moral power and the determination to use such power, if necessary, to protect our vital interests.

You know what I mean—such things as our guaranteeing the credit on the wheat sale aid to Poland (which is shipped on to North Vietnam), arming the Yugoslavians and so forth.

When I read the history books, I failed to find any mention of large-scale poverty in the last century. At that time we didn't have all these modern federal innovations. And yet the rate of progress and growth from one year to the next was a great deal larger than what we have now.

You know, Mr. President.

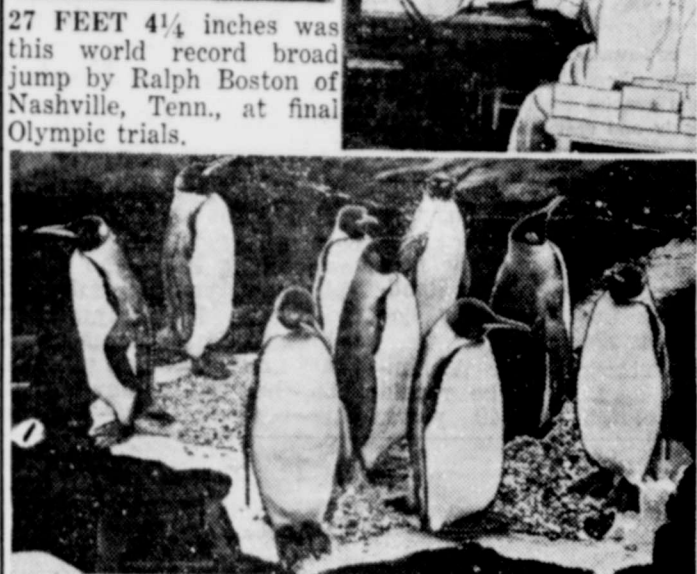

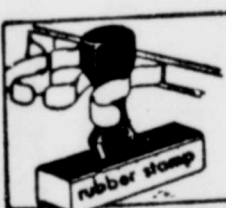

Cotton County \$128,000 Loan

Approved for Randlett, Okla.

A \$128,000 loan to a group of 114 families to develop a water system for the town of Randlett, Oklahoma, has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration, according to Richard P. Maxey, the agency's state director.

The loan will be closed on October 12, 1964, at Walters, Oklahoma.

The loan will enable the Randlett Community to drill wells, construct a pumping station, erect a 50,000 gallon water tank, and lay 15 miles of pipeline.

Approximately 25 people will be employed in the construction of the water system; this includes the engineer, well drillers, operators of the ditch

digging equipment, and day laborers. When completed, the system will be capable of delivering 60,000 gallons of water a day.

The boating industry, it develops, spent the winter under psychoanalysis.

According to one industry spokesman, problems experienced by the nation's 8 million pleasure boat owners the last few weeks were nothing compared with the situation that confronted manufacturers when Fall and football took the play away from sailing in 1962.

While granting owners had annual problems getting boats from backyards to beaches this Spring, Vic Porter, president of Duo, Inc., Decatur, Ind., suggests "manufacturers had situations of much more lasting import on their minds the past 8 months."

Porter contends the nation's boat builders have just undergone a period of sustained soul-searching. "And," he adds, "the time was ripe for this kind of review."



"The reason for a frank look at the boating business is simple," he explains. "In the not too distant future, Americans will be faced with a four day work week. For a nation as industrious as ours is, the prospect of too much leisure time will present the individual with problems."

"One obvious problem," Porter points out, "what to do when there is nothing that has to be done."

Since manufacturers are conscious of this fact, Porter claims "they spent last winter gearing for a surge in popularity."

"This summer," he continues, "the manufacturer will take his message to women. He knows that most often she decides to buy or not to buy a boat. He'll be assuring her she will get just as much fun out of a purchase as the man of the house will."

Cars and trailers are accepted as necessities by countless millions in this country. Porter contends "in the future, pleasure boats will attain the same status as essential elements of modern life."

"For this industry, and all others," Porter points out, "tomorrow is another day. The guessing is that millions of Americans will spend that day on the water."

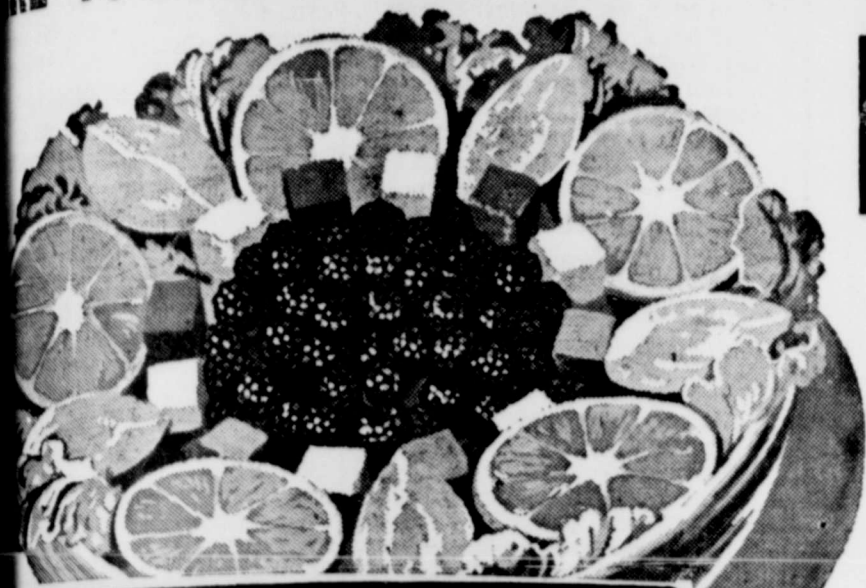
The marine industry certainly hopes so, it will make all that soul searching worth while.

Or a Komondor?



No? Well, don't be too sure! They are all breeds of dogs that can currently be seen in this country, says Tex Fawcett of the Purina Pet Care Center, in St. Louis, Missouri. Basenjis can claim to be true aristocrats of dogdom. Originally the companions of Egyptian pharaohs, they were worshipped in the name of Anubis, the dog-headed god. Basenjis were given special burial like their noble masters. The Komondor is a highly uncommon shepherd dog, generally believed to have originated in Tibet. He's a close relative of the Hungarian Kuvasz, distinguished guardian of nobility in Hungary and the Balkans. The happy little Affenpinscher never guarded kings or anything else for that matter. These dogs originated in Germany during the 17th Century as family pets. The name - German for "monkey dog" - results from their monkey-like chin hair tuft and mustache. There are now 113 official American Kennel Club breeds - about as many types as there are nationalities of men. age diversion for the 1965 feed grain program will be unchanged from 1964. Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman said the announcement was being made early in order to help all farmers, particularly winter wheat producers in making plans for the 1965 crop. Producers who want to use the

wheat feed grain acreage substitution provision in the 1965 wheat and feed grain programs can plan their plantings now with adequate notice. Minimum diversion for participation will be 2 percent of the feed grain base. Any farmer can divert up to 50 percent of his base, or 25 acres, whichever is larger.

Forage testing, an important management tool, allows today's progressive farm operator to become increasingly efficient. It helps him to achieve efficient utilization of forages, improve management practices and strengthen his feeding program.

Forages cannot be properly supplemented if their nutritive value is unknown. If forage is properly utilized and supplemented according to its feeding value, this will be quickly reflected in beef and milk production and in profits.

Although numerous methods are used to evaluate forages, the chemical evaluation method is the most common, says Haws. This method, he explains, should be used in combination with a visual estimation because it will not reveal foreign material, mold, shattering and other conditions which may be present.

Through this evaluation method, determinations are made for percentage of crude protein and crude fiber, and calculated values are reported for digestible protein, total digestible nutrients and net energy. Moisture percentage, says Haws, is usually reported for silage only. Unsightly dead spots in St. Augustine grass may be due to out.

This disease, most destructive during hot, humid weather, tends to be a problem more often where grass is in a weakened condition from drought or improper fertilization and watering.

Symptoms of fading out appear as irregular yellow-brownish areas. As the disease progresses, the grass is killed in small spots which merge to form dead areas a foot or more in diameter.

Fungicides such as Acti-dione

Thiram, Captan or zineb will control fading out, says Haws. Manufacturers' recommendations should be followed carefully and applications are advised when the disease first develops.

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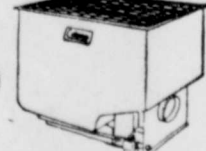

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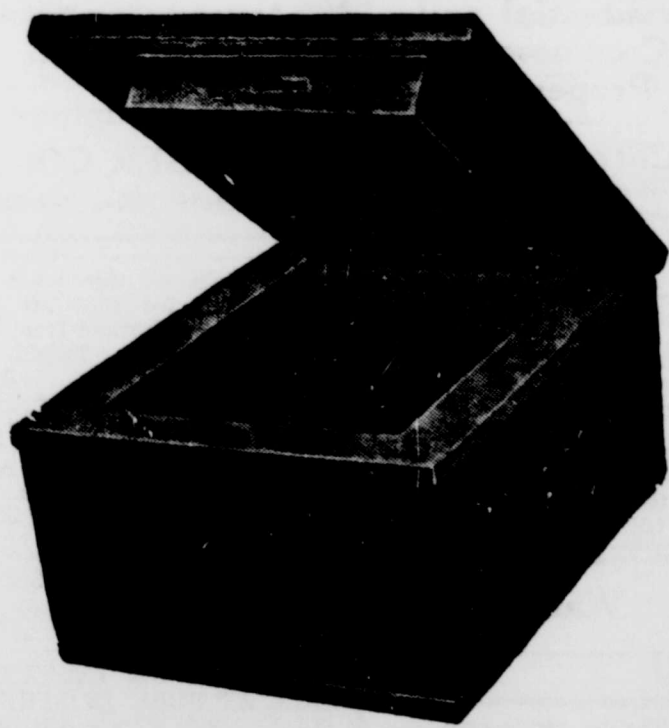

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Preparing sandwiches for school lunches or a future picnic can be a real chore if advance preparation are not made. It can be made easier by preparing a large quantity of sandwiches at one time, then freezing them.

Wrapped in a double thickness of heavy waxed paper, sandwiches can be stored a week in the freezer without loss of quality. If you use a moisture-vapor resistant wrap, you can extend this period to two or three weeks says Thelma Wirges, county HD agent.

Let others help with sandwiches days ahead. The chore can be real fun in place of a dreaded affair that takes too much time.

Some fillings that freeze well are luncheon meats, leftover sliced or chopped roast beef, roast pork, baked ham, chicken, turkey, dried beef, well drained tuna or salmon, sliced cheese, cheese spreads, hard-boiled egg yolks and peanut butter.

You may use these separately or combined with cream cheese, milk, dairy sour cream, applesauce, creamed butter, or lemon, orange or pineapple juice to make spreading easy. Add sliced or chopped olives and pickles, if desired. Spread the butter, softened (not melted) on the bread. This will keep the filling from soaking into the bread.

But don't put in any raw vegetables such as lettuce, celery, or tomatoes. They lose crispness, color and flavor when frozen. Also, the whites of hard-boiled eggs become tough, and jellies or very moist fillings such as egg salad or tuna salad soak into the bread.

Wrap the sandwiches separately. Freeze at 0 degrees F. or below.

Frozen sandwiches can be removed 4 to 5 hours before use. They will be completely thawed, if too large a quantity is not put together.

Once thawed, however, they should be eaten at once. Sandwiches spoil rapidly after they have warmed to 450 degrees F.
