Says War May Be Caused By Oil Condition

World Competition Seen As Threat By Independent

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—World competition for oil fields was held out today as a potential cause of a great war by Russell B. Brown, Tulsa, Oklahoma, secretary of the governors' oil relief conference.

From headquarters established by his group in Washington to sponsor a drive for a tariff and embargo on foreign petroleum products, Brown directed a statement at the conference on the oil cure of war, opening his sixth session today, urging that it note the possibilities.

America, he said, could promote peace by ceasing to import "so much of the bloodstained oil of South America."

"With immeasurable quantities of oil already located in this country, and with the possibility of discovery," he said.

Slayer Is Denied Bond

State-Wide Bond Plan Is Introduced

200 Million Dollar Proposal In Resolutions And Bill WOULD STOP AID

Cotton Acreage Reduction Measure Introduced

AUSTIN, Jan. 19 (AP)—The \$200,000,000 statewide highway bond issue proposal hit the senate today in the form of two resolutions and one bill.

Resolutions drawn by Senators Walter Woodul of Houston and W. A. Williamson asked that the constitution be amended to allow the levying of taxes by the state for state highway purposes and to permit the extension of credit of the state. The proposal would also reimburse the counties and districts for money expended by them in building and maintaining state designated highways.

The bill which was introduced in connection with the resolutions would do away with county aid in highway building and lift burdens of road building from counties.

The resolution carried provisions for retiring \$30,000,000 in bonded indebtedness in the counties and road districts. Of the remainder of the \$170,000,000 for construction, not more than \$20,000,000 could be spent in any one year.

Real property would never be taxed to pay off these bonds, Senator Woodul said.

The state highway bond proposal was in the platform of Ross S. Sterling, who becomes governor tomorrow.

Such a proposal two years ago precipitated a long hard fight, before being defeated by a few votes. Another intense battle was predicted for this year.

Father Of Girl Recently Found Dead Accused

PORT ARTHUR, Jan. 19 (AP)—A. Johnson, who slew 22 year old Orla Lee Adams here Saturday night, was bound over to the grand jury without bond at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing today. The defense offered no testimony.

When Justice B. H. Wiley announced his decision, Johnson's lawyer, C. W. Howth of Beaumont, requested permission to confer with his client in a private room. This, the justice granted.

After the conference Howth said he would file habeas corpus proceedings in district court at Beaumont, in an effort to obtain bail. The state offered only three witnesses, C. J. Trosclair and J. P. Collier, owners of the pressing shop where Adams was slain, and City Detective C. E. Brown. Nothing not already announced by the witnesses was adduced in the hearing.

Declines
Howth, who declined to cross-examine any of the state witnesses, asked as Brown, the last witness, left the stand, that the justice agree to a bond of \$10,000 on which the police had released Johnson two hours after the killing.

Assistant County Attorney B. T. McWhorter, Jr., rose to announce: "The state has no particular recommendation. The proof offered seems to make it evident the crime was committed."

"There is no dispute," answered Howth, "but I think your honor (the justice) understands what the shooting was all about."

Justice Wiley, who had told newspapermen Johnson had made no explanatory statement of the shooting to him, said nothing in reply except to announce "I will hold him without bond for the grand jury." That body now is in session.

Went With Her
Adams had been "going with" Johnson's 16 year old daughter, Elizabeth, before she died from a bullet wound mysteriously inflicted on December 28, police said.

The girl died as she sat in an automobile in front of the First Methodist Church, South, to which she, her father and Adams all belonged. Robert Williams, Texas University sophomore, her fiancé, had taken her there hoping the pastor would be able to patch up a quarrel they had had, he told investigators. His explanation was that when he came back to the automobile where he had left the girl, she was dead, slain by a bullet from a .22 calibre rifle with a sawed off stock.

Williams, though originally charged with murder, was "no-billed" by the grand jury.

Today's hearing was held in an office above a department store. The office itself and all the surrounding corridors was jammed with spectators.

Johnson's aged father was in the crowd as were many of his friends.

Negro Killer Dies As Mob Crowds Near

Peritonitis Beats Would-Be Lynchers To Prisoner

KILLED TWO OFFICERS
Three Mob Members Break In, And View Black's Body

SHREVEPORT, La., Jan. 9 (AP)—Death in the form of peritonitis claimed Lemar McDaniel, negro, at midnight, and dispersed a mob of 1,500 persons, who milled about the hospital where he was being treated for wounds suffered in a police gun fight. The shooting was fatal to two officers.

A few members of the crowd climbed an unguarded fire escape to the negro ward on the third floor, but left after three of the group had been called into the negro room by Dr. E. L. Sanderson, superintendent, and shown the body.

The entire police force, augmented by sheriff's deputies and a score of city firemen, held most of the crowd to the ground floor.

Mayor J. G. Palmer, Sheriff Tom Hughes and Captain Harry Stahl of the National Guard unit here, made speeches.

The negro was brought to the hospital after a raid Saturday night upon his grocery which was led by three policemen wearing old clothes and with faces blackened. The officers said they suspected the grocery of hiding a gambling den.

In the fight, Teddy Williams, policeman, was shot dead, and Lee Allen Williams, his fellow officer, wounded fatally.

McDaniel denied shooting the officers, naming another negro as the slayer. This negro was arrested and spirited away to jail.

S. A. Jones, the third policeman, escaped the bullets by lying on the grocery floor. He said McDaniel fired the fatal shots.

The first shots were fired from the grocery. Police said they believed the negroes mistook the blackfaced policemen for bandits.

The raid was part of a drive against lawlessness, the city recently having experienced a series of robberies.

Brother Of T. & P. Chief Clerk Dies

Funeral services for J. M. Danner, 44, long-remembered vice president of the Waco, Beaumont, Trinity and Sabine railway, who died at Homan's Sanitarium, El Paso, Monday, will be held in Fort Worth Tuesday at Harveson and Cole Funeral Home.

He was a brother of F. L. Danner, Big Spring, chief clerk of the Texas and Pacific Railway. He was well known in railroad circles.

He is survived by his widow, two sons, John E. Groesbeck, J. M. Fort Worth, one daughter, Dorothy, Groesbeck, his father, W. C. Danner, and two brothers, Edward Danner of Fort Worth and F. L. Danner of Big Spring.

Enforcement Commission Report Filed

Hoover To Submit Findings To Congress At Once

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—The law enforcement commission's prohibition report was submitted to President Hoover today.

Chairman Wickersham arrived at the White House proper just before 9 a. m. He carried the long-awaited document in a bulky envelope.

The President soon went to his office, but whether to study the report was not revealed. He is expected to submit the commission's findings to congress without delay, possibly Tuesday or Wednesday.

At that time it will be available for publication.

The report of the commission as a whole has been described as largely factual, but embracing recommendations for improving conditions in connection with Volstead enforcement.

Word has been given that no recommendation for repeal or modification is included in this main report, at least. Sources close to the commission said no effort is made to gloss over facts either favorable or unfavorable to the dry laws, however.

The report includes individual opinions from among the 11 commissioners. How many dissented from the majority report is expected to be made known only through publication of the documents.

From the commissioners themselves in recent weeks have come assertions that unanimity could not be hoped for.

The task of studying and reporting on all the nation's laws was put in the hands of the commission.

ONE SHOT IN BANK

Cisco Chief of Police Fatally Wounded In Gun Battle

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 19 (AP)—The last of a quartet of "Santa Claus" robbers who held up the First National Bank of Cisco on Dec. 28, 1927—Robert Hill, alias Bobbie Catcher—was captured here last night by El Paso officers as he started across the international bridge to Juarez, Mexico.

Marshall Ratliff, wearing a "Santa Claus" costume, entered the Cisco bank with three companions, among them Hill. They obtained \$12,000 in loot and in the ensuing gun fight with officers, G. E. Bedford, police chief, was shot dead and G. W. Carmichael, police officer, was mortally wounded, dying on January 7.

Louis Davis, another member of the bandit quartet, was wounded. He died Dec. 24 in the Tarrant county jail at Fort Worth.

Ratliff was shot down Christmas Eve, near South Bend, Texas. His companions, Henry Helms and Hill, escaped in the Brazos river bottoms, but later were captured near Graham.

Hill escaped from the Wynne state prison farm Sept. 23, 1929. He was among eighteen convicts who made a successful break for freedom. Helms paid for his crime in the electric chair on September 6, 1929.

Ratliff, on Nov. 18, 1929, shot Tom A. Jones, special guard in the Eastland county jail, where he was being held for a sanity hearing. Jones died two days later. Ratliff was taken from the jail by a mob at Eastland and lynched on Nov. 19.

Former Midland Banker Arrested

EL PASO, Texas, Jan. 19 (AP)—Bert F. Ross, former assistant cashier of the First National Bank at Midland, indicted on charges of violating the national banking act, surrendered to the United States commissioner here today. He posted bond of \$2,500, signed by Midland sureties, and it was approved.

Ross was named in a secret indictment while in Brownsville, he returned to Midland, arranged for bond, and came here to surrender. The indictment charges misapplication of \$7,111 and \$49,111, also false entries.

10 Million Naval Construction Bill Given Approval

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 (AP)—The administration's \$90,000,000 naval construction bill was approved today by the senate naval committee, including provision for a six inch gun cruiser, which was reported by the house naval committee.

The committee voted unanimously to report the bill which provides for one aircraft carrier, one flying deck cruiser with six inch guns, one six inch gun cruiser, and four submarines.

An amendment, recommended by the navy department, to appropriate \$5,000,000 for experimental work with Diesel engines also was approved. The aircraft carrier, completely equipped will cost \$27,650,000; the flying deck cruiser, \$20,780,000; the six inch gun cruiser, \$18,000,000; and the four submarines, \$4,400,000 each.

Magician And Girl Kill Selves, Leaving Reason

ATLANTA, Jan. 19.—The "last act" of Jose Cruz, 30-year-old Filipino amateur magician, and his wife, Asa G. Cruz, Jr., was written into DeKalb county records today as the murder of Miss Gladys Frix, 19-year-old stenographer, and his own suicide.

After discovery of the bodies of the couple yesterday in a parked automobile on the Candler estate officers found a note in the Filipino's room, scrawled on a child's slate, which said: "This is my last trick and I hope you enjoy the performance."

On Cruz's body was found an unguessed note which said:

"To whom it may concern: We, Gladys Frix and Jose Cruz, are taking our own lives because we love each other but due to objections of Louise Frix (sister of Gladys) and Mrs. J. T. Clay (grandmother), we cannot find a way to be together in peace."

The coroner's jury did not believe there was a suicide pact since the note bore no mark from the girl. Testimony before the coroner's jury showed that Miss Frix's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Frix, had forbidden her to call at their home or to see their daughter. Frix is a railroad engineer and was on his run to Chattanooga when his daughter's body was discovered. Other testimony from relatives of the girl said she had feared Cruz. She made her fatal date with him Saturday night through her cousin, 15-year-old Miss "De" Adair, at his request.

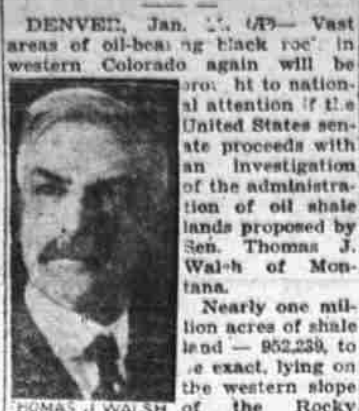
Several Forms Of Drivers' Licenses Specified In Bills

AUSTIN, Jan. 19.—Three forms of drivers' license bills are before the legislature, and a fourth measure, to make the universal license unnecessary, is to be offered.

Sen. Frank Parrish of Lubbock is drawing a bill to penalize the driver who is intoxicated by adding to the present conviction a bar against his driving a car for periods of one month to two years. That will make it unnecessary to "license all drivers to catch a few," Senator Parrish said.

Vast Oil Supply In Colorado Lands Where Walsh Urges Senate Inquiry

DENVER, Jan. 19. (AP)—Vast areas of oil-bearing "black rock" in western Colorado again will be brought to national attention if U.S. United States senate proceeds with an investigation of the administration of oil shale lands proposed by Sen. Thomas J. Walsh of Montana.

Nearly one million acres of shale land—850,000, to be exact, lying on the western slope of the Rocky Mountains, form the center of a controversy brought to head recently by charges of Ralph S. Kelley, former chief of the geological land office in Denver.

Before he was dismissed by Secretary of the Interior Wilbur, Kelley charged there had been a "steady encroachment on the public domain in the form of concessions which enabled several large oil companies to obtain shale lands against the best interests of the public."

He said "political pressure" was brought to bear on Wilbur in the leases.

President Hoover denounced Kelley's attack as an attempt to start an "odious oil scandal." An investigation by the department of justice found Kelley's charge to be unfounded. Later Senator Walsh proposed a senate investigation.

Colorado's shale deposits have been estimated to be worth potentially 40 billion dollars. They consist of layer after layer of friable rock, all filled with the shells of small crustaceans and skeletons and scales of fish from lagoons that existed thousands of years ago.

From 10 to 65 billions of oil may be taken from a acre of shale. Geological experts say this shale possibly may control the future oil supplies of the world.

Dean E. Winchester, geologist, reported to the President through the federal oil conservation board his estimate of 79,625,998.00 barrels in the Colorado shales, of which he figured 47,625,998.00 barrels recoverable.

Mrs. Catt Defines 'Cause And Cure' In Peace Session

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19. (AP)—Carrie Chapman Catt, veteran advocate of world peace, opening today the sixth annual conference on cause and cure of war defined what she termed "the one cause, the one cure."

From countless definitions submitted Mrs. Catt said in the address prepared for the initial session, the studies of the eleven women's organizations in the conference had simmered down to this: "Competition in armament building is the chief cause of war."

"Facts of peace and of disarmament are the chief cures of war." All nations now recognize these facts, Mrs. Catt said, whereas six years ago there was "a veritable mental and political chaos on the subject of peace and war."

"The crucial question now is how may our nation be persuaded to assume world leadership in the

SPORT SLANTS

Bobby Jones and Big Bill Tilden, both bowing themselves out of the competitive sports picture into the motion pictures for 1931, leave a record of strange contrast, though each rose to the very pinnacle of achievement and fame in the performance of their specialties.

Tilden was a world's champion tennis player before Jones captured his first national golf title. Big Bill is nine years older than Bobby, but their chief accomplishments were spread through the same decade, the period of 1920-30 that has been the glamorous and clamorous era of American sport.

Jones was a golf prodigy from the outset, gifted with doing the right thing naturally, but with a temperament that needed to be readjusted. Tilden, just fair as a schoolboy performer, was blessed with an unquenchable "will to win" from boyhood and sufficient persistence to master the stroking technique of tennis by prolonged practice. Tilden, as a result, was 27 when he won the National Singles for the first time, Jones just 21 when he captured his first National Open.

Jones has quit competition at the very zenith of his powers, with all the world's major titles in his possession. Tilden has finally stepped out after many a strange episode and after having passed the peak of his ability by a margin of at least three or four years.

It would have been bigger "news" if Tilden had quit amateur tennis when he made his last great stand in defense of the Davis Cup in 1927. As a matter of fact, I believe Big Bill was persuaded not to solely through personal desire to help bring the famous tennis trophy back from France. Tilden loved a good tennis fight, and the French were able to accommodate him.

In the last few years Tilden has been able to muster only flashes of the form that made him a world's champion from 1920 through 1925.

Bo McMillin's hair is graying but the one-time All-American quarterback and field leader of the famous Praying Colonels of Centre College still can weave a mean hip or pluck a pass out of the air on the run. Under restricted conditions he gave a demonstration for the benefit of football coaches at their annual clinic in New York as part of a discussion of backfield technique.

"If there was any secret to whatever success I may have had, as a player," remarked Bo, "was in planting my feet properly for the purposes of balance, plus position for going some place quickly."

My erstwhile colleague, Mr. Brian Bell, has always contended that the story of Mr. McMillin's first game against Harvard was one of the classics of football. Harvard won the game, but McMillin was the individual star of the fray, giving the Crimson plenty to worry about. As the game ended "Tiny" Maxwell, the referee, dived into the last pile-up of players, extracted the ball, turned to McMillin and said: "Here's your ball, Mr. McMillin."

In Contempt?

QUESTIONING the loyalty or the
wisdom of a judge is ordinarily
not a safe thing unless you know
your judge.
Judge Felix R. Smith of the 32nd
district, which includes Howard
county, is a conscientious man. He
has firm ideas about the sanctity of
the constitution, and the law and
naturally does not minimize the
power and authority of the court.
His recent action in Sweetwater
when a newspaper reporter of that
town was sent to jail for three days
for what the judge felt was con-
tempt of his court, has aroused
quite a furor.

The judge, it appears, is sur-
prised that the public has taken so
much interest in the case. When
the reporter's fellow club men vi-
sited him en masse and newspaper
of larger cities offered the re-
porter legal aid in gaining his freedom
Judge Smith apparently was sur-
prised.

A man serving as judge of a
court, a section where no large
city exists is naturally not so
familiar with the relationship be-
tween courts and daily newspapers
as many judges are.

Dallas usually holds more stead-
fastly to the principle of the news
man that his first duty is to give
his readers a fair and accurate re-
port of things they wish to
transpire in his own com-
munity, as well as others—regard-
less of pressure that may be at-
tempted toward them.

Whether an incarcerated re-
porter acted wisely is a question
upon which there is and perhaps
will always be considerable dif-
ference of opinion.

It is our belief that a reporter
should always cooperate with of-
ficers of the law, and make every
effort to be conscientious in ef-
fort to force the law and be reasonable
in their requests.

Often times a district attorney or
a district judge, who however is
not the prosecutor, rightfully re-
quests that certain things be kept
out of the public prints or that
publication be delayed until men
under indictment are arrested.

In the Sweetwater case it ap-
pears the reporter, when first re-
quested to hold news of the in-
dictment in question out of his pa-
per until the defendant was found,
would have done so had he not
known news of the indictment al-
ready was being circulated by word
of mouth.

He felt, and rightly so, that if
the district attorney and the judge
wanted to keep secret the fact that
indictment had been returned, he
would join in keeping the secret.

But, when he went on the streets
he learned that the "secret" he had
been asked to keep had leaked out
through other sources.

He apparently felt, on learning
the secret was "out," that he no
longer should be held accountable
for keeping it, and that the request
that he not publish it should no
longer be enforced.

But it was the court, according
to dispatches, has said he can cite
30 law upon which his action was
based. His chief motive, it appears,
was to make good his oath that if
the article were printed he would
send the reporter to jail.

The reporter who caused to be printed
the secret that no longer was a
secret, in fact.

The court had his way. He made
good his oath. The court, we
take it, is a person whose every
action on the bench should be gov-
erned by law. If no law can be
cited by him to cover this particu-
lar action, he may as well be
admitting that he made a mistake,
even though he felt at the time
the sanctity of the grand jury re-
cord had been violated.

We wouldn't be surprised if Judge
Smith, who is a very loyal person,
has not learned some sort of lesson
through this affair.

Freedom of the press must al-
ways be protected. So should
sanctity of the law be preserved.
Newspapers have done more to
help enforce law than all the or-
gans of prosecution. It is the
duty of magistrates, carefully
formed verdicts of juries, specta-
cular arrests by officers.

But, those men and the institu-
tion should always be the actual
agencies by which law is upheld.
If freedom of the press is re-
duced by courts' action, then the
law is reduced and the people are
reduced to their own chance of

maintaining control of public opin-
ion and action toward the law.
And when a newspaper is asked,
under threat from a man who is
protected and from whom no im-
mediate defense may be made, not
to print facts that would seem to
prove not to be secret, it is being
asked to violate fundamental ethics
of the newspaper business—to de-
ceive readers by omission rather
than commission.

The Danger In The Road Bond Proposal

Wichita Falls Times:
ANY doubt that the highway bond
act passed would not be urged
in the legislature this year has
been dispelled by the highway
commission's recommendation to
the effect. With a former mem-
ber of the commission, and an en-
thusiastic advocate of highway
bonds, in the governor's chair, it
may be taken for granted that the
proposal will be vigorously pushed.

So far as results are concerned,
it doesn't matter what the legisla-
ture does about it. The defeat of
the bond issue, submitted at any
time in the next 10 years, seems
to us to be as certain as taxes, and
not excepting death and taxes, can
be. The opponents of the bonds
should feel no special concern the
legislature should promptly and un-
animously vote to submit the ques-
tion.

There is a danger, however, that
involves other things, than the bond
issue itself. There is the danger
that the bond question will be al-
lowed to dominate the legislature's
work, just as the prison relocation
question did in the last legislature.
There in the danger, to Mr. Stek-
ling, that by lending his influence
to the proposal, he will jeopardize
his leadership in the legislature,
forfeit his influence on other mat-
ters.

Some big tasks confront the leg-
islature. Some of them are far
more vital than highway construc-
tion. The latter question should
not be permitted to overshadow
the other measures. It isn't im-
portant enough. It wouldn't be
important enough were there a
ghost of a chance of its winning at
the polls. In the event of such a
chance, it should not be permitted
to impair or delay the legislative
program as a whole.

How Is Your HEALTH?

RIGHT-HANDEDNESS

Approximately 95 per cent of hu-
man beings are right-handed. Five
per cent, for one reason or another,
use the left hand.

Numerous theories have been ad-
vanced to explain the reasoning for
the preponderance of right-handed-
ness. To date, few of them have
proved completely convincing.

Habit, social tradition, and the
theory of primitive warfare are
common explanations. The last
theory ingeniously suggests that
mankind developed the right-hand
habit by using the left hand as the
shield arm to protect the heart,
and the right for his offensive
weapons.

A less ingenious, but more cred-
itable, hypothesis explains right-
handedness on the basis of brain
localization.

The movements of the right side
of the body are controlled by the
left side of the brain, and the left
hemisphere is thought by some sci-
entists to be more highly develop-
ed.

Psychologists have been much
concerned with left-handedness.

In a normal group of children,
numbering more than 2,000, it was
found that 4.1-2 per cent of the
girls and 5.1-2 per cent of the boys
were left-handed.

In a group of 5,000 delinquent
children, 6 per cent of the girls
and 11 per cent of the boys were
left-handed. The percentage of
left-handedness was larger still in
a group of feeble-minded studied.

Whether left-handedness and ab-
normal psychology or mental con-
ditions have a causative relation or
merely an accidental relation has
not as yet been determined.

At the University of Chicago an
ingenious study of handedness in
rats was made. The results of the
studies demonstrated that the ma-
jority of normal rats of either sex
are right-handed.

6. It would emphasize to the boys the fact that school authorities put honor, fair play and clean athletics above winning. To bring in players from other schools tells the boys in the loudest possible

AGUA CALIENTE, Mexico, Jan. 19. (AP)—With the lion's share of the \$25,000 prize money from the Agua Caliente open tournament in their pockets, John Golden, Noroton, Conn., the victor, and George Von Elm, "business man golfer," led the wanderers of the fairways back into the United States today.

The golfing army will rest until Thursday, when the \$5,000 motion picture match play tournament, the final winter skirmish in the West, opens in Los Angeles.

Golden beat Von Elm 70 to 79 for the Agua Caliente title here yesterday in an 18-hole playoff after having tied with scores of 293 in the 72 holes which ended Saturday.

While the two leaders agreed they would divide evenly first place money of \$10,000 and second prize of \$3,500, giving each \$6,750, the 18-hole medal test was necessary to decide who should claim the title and the diamond studded gold medal.

Golden jumped into the front on the first hole and was never headed, although Von Elm caught up with him at the eighth and rallied vainly again at the fourteenth. As a result, the solid Easterner turned the first nine in 37, one over par, compared with the businessman golfer's 38, and increased his advantage to five strokes on the first three holes of the home round.

Superior approaches gave Golden the edge, although Von Elm putted poorly. The victor came back in 38, two over par, for a 75, while the blond Los Angeles expert took 41 to 79.

Golden's score was excellent, for a heavy wind swept the course and made the shots uncertain on many of the other holes.

8. The rule would be an injustice to the player who adjusts himself to the situation and puts his regular school work above football. In fact, it would be a means of emphasizing to the boy who changes schools that football is not the thing of chief importance in his school life.
9. It would, no doubt, be the best thing for a boy to be barred from football during his first year in school so as to give him opportunity to get in touch with its regular work. The boy who plunges into football as soon as he comes into the new school is likely to lose much in his work. It is not right to exploit such a boy and rob him of his education for the benefit of a group of gamblers, and the school people of the state should see that it is not done.
10. We are going to have to provide some means of putting football in its proper place in our educational program. To have a situation where the hiring of players is possible naturally puts football first and gives it an undue emphasis. Even if we grant that the one-year residence rule works an injustice in some cases, we had better do an injustice to the few than to lose sight of the proper objectives for the majority.
11. If the present practice of recruiting players from other schools continues, those now interested in football in the smaller schools will soon lose their interest. This will be true of school authorities, students and the supporting public. In fact, it is already extremely difficult to support football in many of the school in the state.

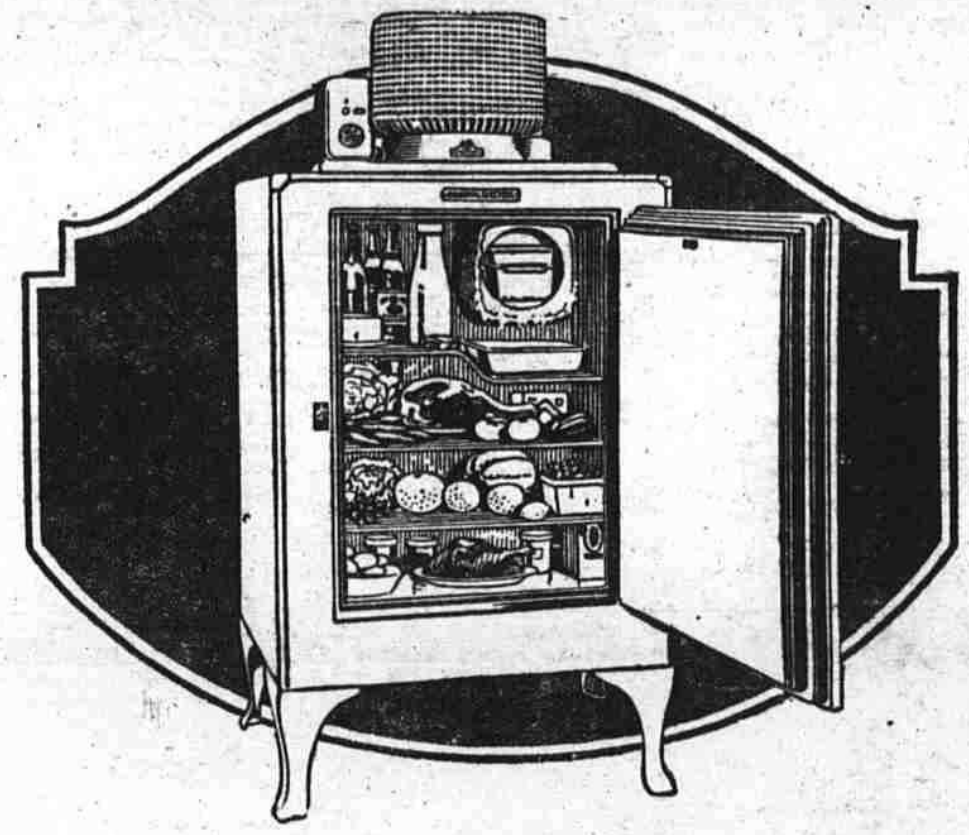

Mitchell Court Favors Changes In Truck Taxes

COOBA, Jan. 10.—Expressing concern because of the alleged "unrestricted and unregulated" operation of commercial trucks and buses on the highways, county commissioners today, in a resolution, adopted a resolution strongly condemning the practice and calling upon the state senator and representative from this district to support regulatory laws to govern the same.

The "road hog" came in for attention by the court in passing of the resolution. "Said operation constitutes a menace not only to the good roads, but to the safety and welfare of the public at large," the resolution outlines.

The resolution, passed unanimously by the court and ordered recorded in the official minutes, follows:

"Whereas, the unrestricted and unregulated operation of heavily loaded motor trucks and buses, moving at a high rate of speed over our good roads and highways, has reached a point where such operation constitutes a menace not only to the permanent safety of said good roads and highways but to the safety and welfare of the public at large, in its use thereof; and

"Whereas, the operators of said trucks and buses are using and gradually destroying said good roads and highways, without just or adequate compensation to the taxpayers whose money did go into the construction of same;

"Now, therefore, be it resolved that this, the Commissioners' Court of Mitchell county, hereby petition and urges its Senator and Representatives to foster and support such legislation as will place these motor trucks and buses, operating for commercial gain over the roads and highways of Texas, under the same strict regulation and supervision as now govern the railways, with whom they are competing; this legislation to provide penalties of so definite and drastic a nature and of such simple application as will permit its ready enforcement and insure obedience thereto on the part of said truck and bus operators."

Callahan, For Whom County Was Named To Rest In New Grave

AUSTIN, Jan. 10.—An Indian fighter, defender of the white settlers in the battle of Plum Creek, near Lockhart in 1842, who has lain in an unmarked grave in the lost town of Pittsburg, Blanco county for 74 years, will come to his final rest Saturday, January 24, in the Arlington of Texas at Austin.

He was James Hughes Callahan, for whom Callahan county is named, noted frontiersman who once, a minute-man of the brush country army, invaded Mexico single-handed and caused the rest of the army to have to invade the hostile country to rescue him.

Callahan was killed in an encounter in 1857. He was buried in the new Blanco county seat town of Pittsburg. Soon after, the county seat was moved a mile away and a new town built, which was named Blanco. Pittsburg disappeared from the map.

Through efforts of L. K. Kemp, chairman of the Texas historical and landmark commission, Callahan's grave was located, and his body will be removed to the state cemetery. Funeral services will be arranged, probably to be held in the capitol.

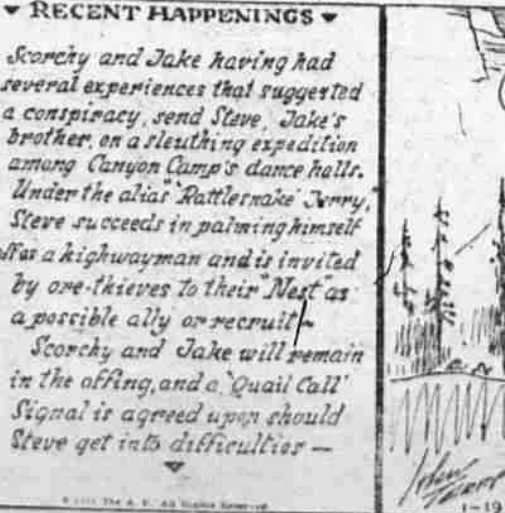

How the famous London fog figures in a newspaperman's job of getting about and digging out the news in London, amusing sidelights on the work of obtaining stories from the thousands of people of importance who visit London annually and other high spots in an American correspondent's life in the British capital will be explained. He will offer an opportunity for a peek behind the scenes at such important gatherings as the London naval disarmament conference and many other important assemblies that were held there during 1930.

British Princes Sail From Spain

SANTANDER, Spain, Jan. 19 (AP)—After an exciting trip from Paris, the Prince of Wales and his youngest brother, Prince George, were en route today aboard the liner Oropesa on an 18,000-mile journey which will culminate with their inauguration of the British trade exhibition in Buenos Aires in March.

The two princes were... many hours late in reaching Santander, where they found the Oropesa, hauled up to a creak ready to begin the trans-Atlantic trip. After stopping at Coruna today, the vessel will proceed to Hamilton, Bermuda, and Kingston, Jamaica. The royal passengers will touch Central America and go on down the west coast of South America.

The prince's trouble began late Saturday night when their train was held up 30 miles below Bordeaux by the derailment of a northbound train from the Spanish frontier. Awakened by the halt, both watched the work of clearing the track.

French railroad officials at Bayonne sent a special train north to pick them up and carry them to Hendaye.

There, already four hours late, they transferred to motor cars, beginning a dangerous ride over sloppy mountain roads to Santander, watering place of the Spanish kings. At Bilbao the automobile occupied by the Prince of Wales careened into that in which Prince George was riding but no one was hurt.

The two princes flew Friday to Paris, spending the remainder of the day and Saturday there. They will not return to England until late in March.

Anniversary Of Robert E. Lee Observed Today

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 19 (AP)—From Virginia to Texas, the boundaries of the old confederacy, the 124th anniversary of the birth of General Robert E. Lee was observed today.

Probably no more impressive service was held than that at Washington and Lee University which General Lee headed after the war between the states.

Virginia honored the memory of her famous son with a holiday in state and municipal offices banks and schools. Exercises were held at Battle Abbey by the United Daughters of the Confederacy. Services were held yesterday at old St. Paul Church in Richmond, and at Stratford, the Lee home in Westmoreland county.

In many parts of the south Lee Jackson Day was observed since the 107th anniversary of General Thomas J. "Stonewall" Jackson is January 21st. The memory of Jackson will be further honored in Richmond Wednesday at the annual ball of the Stonewall Jackson Camp, Sons of Confederate Veterans, with Governor Pollard and his staff as guests. Proceeds of the ball will be used to erect an equestrian statue of General Jackson at Manassas, where he won the title of "Stonewall."

The beginning of the confederacy was recalled in Alabama where Governor B. M. Miller was to take the oath of office in the building that was the first capital of the confederacy. It was here that Jefferson Davis took the oath as president of the confederate states.

Today was a legal holiday in Kentucky.

Banks were closed throughout South Carolina and the U.S.C. sponsored services in North Carolina. Arrangements were made to eulogize Lee before the Texas legislature at Austin. In Louisiana the Kappa Alpha fraternity planned exercises at the Lee statue in New Orleans.

His engagement list was held to the minimum that he might devote the entire day to the task. He ex-

pects to send it to congress tomorrow noon.

No summary of the long document will be issued. The conclusions of the majority of the commission have been placed at the very beginning of the document.

eral members declined to sign, many holding it unconstitutional. The bill would set up a commission to determine the acreage of each farm in Texas to be planted in cotton.

The bill, if passed by the Texas legislature would not become effective until at least four other major cotton producing states had adopted a similar bill.

Amendments

Two proposed constitutional amendments were introduced. One by J. R. Donnell of Hillsboro would give the state highway fund "one-fourth of the revenue derived from state occupation taxes, except that received from a tax on gasoline or other substances used for propelling motor vehicles all of which revenue shall go to the highway department."

The other would permit retired officers and enlisted men of the national guard, army, navy and

marine corps to hold public office.

The resolution asking congressional aid on the proposed Red River dam was offered by Elbert M. Barron of Sherman and Speaker Fred Minor of Denton. Preliminary work on the projected dam has been completed congress was urged to take action to provide funds as soon as possible.

A total of 18 bills was introduced with about 20 others ready for introduction when the house adjourned.

A bill to make it a felony for a person to cohabit with a husband or wife which has been married without the state when such person has living another husband and wife, was introduced by Albert G. Walker of Vernon. The bill was offered as the result of a recent decision of the court of criminal appeals which held a man could be prosecuted only for adultery if he cohabited with a wife, married in Texas, although he also had a wife in Oklahoma. Adultery in Texas is classed as a misdemeanor.

Auto Fee Matter

Automobile owners seeking registration licenses would be required to present a receipt showing payment of ad valorem taxes if the vehicle before given a license, under a bill introduced by Joseph McGill and H. P. Jackson of El Paso. McGill said about 80 percent of the automobile owners were evading payment of ad valorem taxes on automobiles.

A bill to equalize the ages of males and females in delinquency cases at 18 was introduced by R. H. Holland of Houston. Present statutes set the ages of males at 17 and females at 18.

Holland also introduced a bill to allow judges, in trial of civil cases, to charge the jury in a general way and not confine the charge to special issues. He said, charging special issues "balled up" the jury and often resulted in mistrials. Another to reduce the number of mistrials in civil cases was introduced by Holland. The bill would make it necessary to prove that misconduct of an officer in charge of a jury had influenced the jury's decision before a reversal or new trial was granted.

A bill placing cleaning and dyeing plants under the supervision of the state fire marshal was introduced by Holland.

W. M. Harman of Waco introduced a bill validating the extension of the limits of cities of more than 50,000.

A bill by McGill and Olen R. Van Zandt of Tioga to permit nine members of a jury trying a civil case in the district court and five members in a county or justice's court of the peace court to sign a verdict was introduced.

Solution Of Girl's Death Is Expected

FORT MORGAN, Colo., Jan. 19.—(AP)—Sheriff Rupert Johnson said solution of the two months old mystery of the disappearance of Miss Enid Marriott, Wiggins, Colo., school teacher, appeared imminent today.

Johnson announced Harry E. Moore, a road worker, had been arrested in connection with the investigation and held incommunicado since last Wednesday.

Sam E. Lee of the state law enforcement department said evidence which caused the arrest of Moore included a handkerchief initialed "M" and a bloody shirt stuffed under a bridge over the Bijou irrigation canal. Lee said that when Moore's wife was first shown the shirt she said she believed it belonged to her husband but later denied the identification.

Lee said Moore admitted he was in Wiggins the night of November 16 when Miss Marriott disappeared but denied he knew the school teacher.

Pajamas identified as belonging to Miss Marriott were found yesterday in the Bijou canal. The identification was by Mrs. C. G. Carlson of Greeley, Colo., Miss Marriott's sister.

Search for her body will continue today, when investigators expect to chop their way through ten feet of ice to reach the bottom of a hole twenty feet deep in the canal. It is at this point, authorities say, that livestock drowned in the ditch is found.

covery of still greater fields," he said, "we are entering needless competition with other nations for control of oil fields in other lands thus sowing the seeds of war which another great war may sprout."

"It has long been recognized that whatever may be the price of the next war, the primary cause will be economic and that the race to obtain oil will be the most significant of those economic causes."

"If we look behind a scenes of revolutions and recent minor wars, we will find this competition for oil is the bomb which has often started hostilities."

"If we abandoned unjustifiable competition with less fortunate nations for oil that does more harm than good when imported here, we would materially relieve an international situation that may, at any time, become strained, to say the least."

"Did Mr. Johnson make any remark?"

"I didn't hear anybody say anything. He (Johnson) was in there just about time enough to fire two shots and turn around and walk out."

"When the shots were fired I jumped five feet. I was hit my-

self—grazed—on the right hip. "I went on to the back door and saw Mr. Adams on the ground. I called an ambulance. He seemed to be gasping for breath."

During the hearing a photographer attempted to take a picture of Johnson, who averted his head and whispered to his lawyer. The lawyer told the justice he objected to any photographs and the justice interrupted the proceedings to say that no picture could be taken there and that if any had been taken they must be destroyed. Subsequently Deputy Sheriff H. F. Baker wrested the camera from the photographer, having left Johnson, meantime, in the lobby of the building.

Leon Wilson, from whom the camera was taken, an official of the Port Arthur News, attempted to take the picture because of inability to find a professional photographer to do so.

The editor of the News telephoned Sheriff W. W. Covington at Beaumont to ask him by what authority Baker took the camera which was later returned, and was told that the sheriff knew of no such authorization.

Baker took Johnson to Beaumont, the county seat, shortly after 11 a. m.

Collier's testimony in the hearing was substantially the same as that of Troclair, except that he testified he "felt off" the body and didn't find anything in the nature of a weapon.

Detective Brown said that after the shooting he did not send for

Johnson, but that the latter "came in."

"He said he had shot a man and wanted to give up. He gave me a gun."

Johnson stands charged with murder in a complaint filed by Police Chief M. B. Word.
