Nicholson's Work Upheld

FORT WORTH, April 22.—State Senator C. C. Small of Wellington announced here today he would be a candidate in the gubernatorial democratic primary, July 26.

Small's campaign headquarters will be established in Fort Worth within a week, he said.

He did not announce his platform, explaining his formal announcement will be made shortly. "I am in the race to stay, and I will make a militant campaign all over the state," he said.

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TAX VALUATIONS INCREASE \$121,000 IN LUBBOCK COUNTY DUE TO MCGEEHEE

Property valuations for purpose of taxation in Lubbock county have been increased \$121,000 by inclusion of the intangible assets of the Ft. Worth and Denver South Plains railway in this county, due mainly to an investigation conducted by Judge William McGeehee, of Floyd county, it was revealed here today.

Judge McGeehee's investigation, started several months ago, has proved that the Fort Worth and Denver had been properly taxed on its main line, but that it had not been rendering taxation on intangible assets on its South Plains subsidiary.

said Robert H. Dean, Lubbock county judge. "In all counties traversed by the South Plains branch the company had been paying taxes on road bed valuations only."

The State board on intangible taxes ruled that such taxes be included in payments hereafter.

"We are indeed grateful to Judge McGeehee for his efforts along this line. It means that hundreds of thousands of dollars in valuations will be included in forthcoming tax rolls in the counties affected."

SIGNATURES ARE AFFIXED TO DOCUMENT

FOURTEEN WEEKS OF NEGOTIATIONS ARE CLOSED IN ACT

LONDON, April 22.—Representatives of the five dominant naval powers of the world, America, Great Britain, Japan, France, and Italy, this afternoon affixed their signatures to an epoch-making treaty, limiting and reducing the navies of three of them, and restricting the navies of the other two.

Colonel Henry L. Stimson, American secretary of state, and his colleagues on the American delegation, were the first to sign the historic document. M. Briand, French foreign minister, J. Ramsay MacDonald, British prime minister and Admiral Giuseppe Siranni with their delegations followed.

Japanese Sign Last

Reiji Wakatsuki, former prime minister of Japan, and those of the Tokyo delegation who have worked with him through the three months and one day of long and difficult negotiations, were the last of the five power representatives to affix their signatures.

TWO CHARGED IN SLAYINGS

ALSP AND BOYT ARE INDICTED TODAY IN HOLDUP PLOT

(By Associated Press)

FORT WORTH, April 22.—Murder indictments were returned by a grand jury today against John Alsup and A. P. Boyt, charged with the slaying of Isaac (Will) Tate and George Terrell, negroes, during the holdup of the First State Bank of Polytechnic April 19.

The cases were set for trial May 5, announced Assistant District Attorney Walter Morris.

Straight murder indictments were returned against Alsup. The first read that he "unlawfully, voluntarily and with malice aforethought did kill Isaac Tate by shooting him with a gun," while the second was worded the same with the name of Terrell inserted.

The indictments against Boyt read: "He did advise, command, encourage and agree with John Alsup to aid him with the said murder and did render aid for the purpose of assisting John Alsup to commit the said murders."

No action was taken in the case of Will Vincent, negro chauffeur, charged with being an accomplice.

INQUIRY MADE INTO DISASTER

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 22.—Tales of heroism and of hesitancy in the face of disaster were told today within the grim walls of the Ohio penitentiary where 317 convicts, locked in their cells, were burned to death and suffocated last night in one of the most life destroying fires in history.

As guards and inmates of the prison recounted details of the catastrophe, a state commission appointed by Governor Cooper sought to learn what caused the blaze and why the prisoners were not liberated in time to escape.

276 Identified

In the horticultural building at the state fair grounds, scores of undertakers worked to prepare the victims for burial. Identity of 276 of the dead convicts had been established. The others, trapped in their fire bound cells, were so badly burned identification was almost impossible.

More than 130 other prisoners were in the penitentiary hospital, and a score of these were in a critical condition from burns and from smoke they inhaled while fire raged in parts of four cell blocks.

The penitentiary housed 4,300 convicts, some 2,500 above the capacity for which it was intended, when the fire, believed of incendiary origin, and fanned by a stiff wind, swept through the upper tiers of the four blocks, spreading death and suffering in its wake.

Scream To Be Released
The flames were discovered shortly before 5:30 p. m. Within several hours the fire had been brought under control, but the suffocating smoke continued to take its toll among the convicts. In the adjoining cell blocks men screamed to be released. And when the prison officials capitulated to their demands the streaming mass of gray clad men poured out.

Before two hours had passed this mass of men, picking their way among countless bodies spread over the yard, became a threatening menace. Some of them cut the fire hose which continued to play upon flames that spread to the prison cotton and woolen mills. Others hurled stones and slugged the guards that were trying to maintain order. In the dining hall dishes and tables were upset.

Gun Protects Entrance
Every available policeman in Columbus was summoned for duty both within the prison and on the outside. A sub-machine gun in the guard room protected the entrance to the prison yard.

Two companies of regular army troops and 1,500 Ohio National guardsmen were stationed at strategic places about the penitentiary. Every guard on both day and night shifts was on duty.

When the thousands of milling prisoners in the yard were ordered to assemble in the dining room many refused. Later they were ordered into the remaining cell blocks and dormitories, but they insisted upon staying in the yard, crowding about the bodies arranged in long rows five and six deep.

Incendiarism Believed
Apparently the flames broke out in several places simultaneously, officials said. Everything pointed to incendiarism, they indicated.

Lieutenants C. Schooley, Cleveland councilman serving a term for participation in a playground fraud, was at work in the deputy warden's office on the opposite side of the prison yard. He saw smoke rising from the cell blocks.

About the same time Charley Sholkey, prisoner quartermaster in the damaged building, sounded an alarm on range two of section H. Sholkey, a practical joker, was not taken seriously by his fellow convicts until they saw the red reflection in the windows of a manufacturing plant near the penitentiary.

Then a great scream emanated from sections G and H. In each there were six ranges of seventeen cells, housing four prisoners to the cell. The flames and the smoke were eating toward them rapidly.

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DAMAGE IS LIGHT

Material damage and loss of life were grotesquely out of proportion in the Ohio penitentiary fire. While hundreds of convicts lay dead, officials announced the damage was only \$11,000.

SCENE OF BREAK

The fire started in the same cell tier at Ohio penitentiary where three prisoners last Saturday night attempted to save their way to freedom through the bars, only to be apprehended and recaptured by guards.

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HIGHLIGHTS OF OHIO PEN FIRE

CONDEMNED SAVED

COLUMBUS, O., April 22.—By some irony of chance, all the prisoners awaiting execution in death row escaped last night when fire in Ohio penitentiary claimed more than 315 lives. When the blaze menaced their cells, they were transferred to the solitary confinement section.

"RISONER ON GUARD"

A hero of one prison "break," and one of the foremost trustees of the penitentiary, Tack Latimer, former major league baseball player, serving a life sentence for murder, was given a shot gun as soon as the alarm became general and scores of prisoners were released from their cells.

Latimer, who has been guard at the outer door for several years, stood vigil through the night.

TELEGRAMS SENT

Scores of telegrams clicked over the wires to all portions of the United States today as prisoners who escaped the tragedy communicated with their families.

"This was the gist of every telegram sent."

GIRL IS HEROINE

Perhaps the outstanding hero of the fire was Miss Ananda Thomas, daughter of Warden Preston E. Thomas, who maintained her place during the disaster.

She directed the work in the office of the penitentiary. On her cheeks, however, were signs of weeping.

"KIDDER" SPREADS ALARM

Barry Sholkey, convict, known in the penitentiary as a "great kidder," sounded the first alarm—but the guard, thinking it one of his jokes, laughed at him. Refusing to become excited, he waited, and a few minutes later roaring flames, spreading under a stiff wind, told the story.

Of Educational Nature
Better Homes in America is a non-commercial, educational organization which has for its object the improvement of housing conditions and the promotion of a wholesome type of home and family life. Its program is adapted to local needs by each of the thousands of communities which have been established throughout the country. The campaign is sponsored locally by parent-teacher associations, women's clubs, civic associations, and in some communities by schools and colleges, as a part of their educational program. This is done in the study of home economics, manual training, civics, English and art.

A man or woman who is active in civic affairs is appointed in each community to serve as chairman of the Better Homes Committee for that place. This chairman then selects a committee of representative men and women to conduct the campaign. These campaigns vary according to the size and conditions of the community, and include programs of lectures, demonstrations, and contests. Wherever possible a house is planned and built, or a suitable one borrowed and furnished. In this way families of modest means are encouraged toward home-

ownership and are shown how a house of good design and construction can be built at a cost within their means. Through such demonstrations, prospective home owners receive many helpful suggestions for the planning, purchase or building of homes, and many families are inspired to make necessary improvements in their homes. The complete furnishing of such demonstration houses on a restricted budget is helpful in showing to those contemplating the furnishing or refurnishing of a home the standards of good taste combined with economy.

Used In Schools
When the Better Homes campaign is carried on as a school project, the furnishings for the demonstration house are usually selected and placed by students of home economics. Several houses used for demonstrations in past campaigns were built by students of carpentry and manual training classes.

The demonstration of reconditioning an old and perhaps dilapidated house, to make it comfortable and convenient, is another phase of Better Homes work. Such houses are usually furnished with done-over furniture and both house and furnishings then become worth while objects lessons.

Contests Are Held
The house demonstration is supplemented by contests, such as small house and garden competitions, lot improvement contests and kitchen improvement contests. Schools participate usually through essay and poster contests, taking home building or homemaking as their subject. Students of home economics give public demonstrations of the use of labor-saving devices and methods of performing household operations. All of these programs have their culmination in Better Homes Week, which will be observed throughout the country, April 27 to May 3.

The central office of Better Homes in America at Washington acts also as a clearing house for information on all phases of home building and home life.

Football has regained the spotlight in Lubbock this week as two squads go through their drills in preparation for the 1930 season. On the Tech gridiron, Pete Cawthon and Del Morgan continue their daily instruction to the ambitious Tech varsity candidates while on the Lubbock High school practice field, the Westerners gridsters inaugurate their second spring training session of the year.

While the new Matador coaches cannot expect to develop a world beater from the raft of inexperienced players in camp, the spirit shown by the Crimson forces since the coming of Cawthon leaves no doubt that Lubbock fans will see a hustling ball club in action when the fall campaign opens. Several prospective regulars on the 1930 Tech eleven have been unable to join the squad in spring training but the best combination of ball players we have seen thus far finds Williams at quarterback, Wesner and Hodges at half positions and Doozee at full, Wesner hails from Breckenridge and is probably the fastest member of the quartet but he is not far ahead of the Veteran Hodges or Doozee in speed. The last two named are fast starters and should go great next fall on Cawthon's favorite off-tackle smashes.

Cawthon and Morgan are far from pleased with the outlook for the Matador forward wall. The line candidates have neither weight nor experience. Thus far the best bet looks something like this, Teal and Whitesides at ends; Langford and McWilliams at tackles; Jones and Parkinson at guards; Durham at center.

Floyd Woodridge, Tech's quarterback back during the first three years of the school's history, has been working on Coach Payne's track team this spring, but is certain to be among those present when the regular field general is picked next fall. Woodridge is a capable signal barker as well as a classy ball totter.

Millions of candlepower of glareless light will illuminate the diamond so that the highest fly balls and the longest home runs can be seen by both the player and spectator.

Lee Keyser, president of the Des Moines club, became enthusiastic over the night sports idea after he had witnessed several high school and college football games by electric lights. The lighting system which has been installed at Des Moines features a much greater intensity of light, the system including 146 floodlights, mounted in batteries atop six 90-foot steel towers.

Two of the towers are installed back of the grandstand, behind home plate, and to each side of the plate. Each of these has a battery of 13 projectors, one pointed toward home plate to assist the catcher and the other two pointing into and over the field to floodlight the diamond itself and the catcher's area. Down the outer base lines and behind the bleachers are mounted the next two towers, each with 36 projectors. These beams project over the area from the outfield to just short of home plate. The other two towers, beyond left and right field, sweep the entire playing field with their batteries of 24 projectors each. The altitude of the projectors eliminates glare and the way in which the beams from the different batteries cross each other eliminates shadows.

The idea behind night baseball of course, is to increase attendance by making it possible for business men and day laborers to attend games. There are thousands of fans who are unable to get away from their work to afternoon games who would gladly see night baseball come to the fore, but there is little likelihood that the new experiment will prove successful. First of all there's nothing like the good old summer-time weather to make baseball what it is today. It takes a beating sun to make a pitcher to get his old soupbone to working and those who have seen night baseball tried declare that the ball does all sorts of capers on its return trip to earth after it has been given a long ride off the end of some slugger's war club.
