Dental Inspection Is Completed in County

Mrs. Gladys Davis, Lynn county health nurse, said last Thursday that dental inspection of school children would probably be completed by Friday afternoon.

Dr. Kerrell Farrington of Tahoka and Dr. Ferrell Farrington of this place have conducted the inspections of all students in city and rural schools.

We were unable to secure definite figures from Dr. Farrington as to the number of inspections he had made, but records of the nurse showed Thursday that Dr. Farrington had examined 812 children in the southern half of the county.

Reports of the examination have been sent to the parents of each child, and when special attention is necessary, the child is asked to bring this report with him, so that records may show whether or not he has received the indicated care and attention.

Mrs. Davis said Thursday that the next project will be examination of children for indications of tuberculosis, and that they will be given tests to determine their susceptibility to this dread disease. She pointed out, however, that while most persons carry these germs in their system, they are usually in a dormant state, and that unless specifically informed of a dangerous condition, parents are not to be unduly alarmed if their children have a positive reaction to these tests. County physicians will co-operate in this move.

WPA SEWING ROOM HAS GOOD REPORT

Miss Tessie Coleman, supervisor of the local sewing room, which is a WPA project, reports that the room had one of its best monthly records during February.

During the month ending February 27th, fifteen women received a total salary of \$337.43. They used 678 1/2 yards of material in making 371 garments.

These garments are sent to the county office at Tahoka for distribution among needy or destitute families.

New Jail For Lynn Is Recommended

Before the recent grand jury adjourned, the members of that body thoroughly inspected the jail and thereafter embodied in their report a recommendation that a new jail be constructed. The paragraph containing this recommendation is as follows:

"We have inspected the court house and find same being kept in a good and sanitary condition. We have also inspected the jail and find that due to lack of room and poor facilities and unsanitary conditions, we consider it to be in an unsafe and dangerous condition for the officers and inmates, and we strongly recommend to the commissioners court to take immediate steps toward the erection of a modern and sanitary jail for our county."

In discussing the report, County Judge P. W. Goad stated that he and the commissioners court would not feel justified in taking any action looking to the erection of a new jail until they can get an expression from the people.

Four Classes Of Cows And Milk To Be Judged

The third annual Dairy Day Pro-
gram for this area will be held in
Lamesa, Friday, April 26, accord-
ing to B. J. Baskin, county agent.
Dairymen and breeders are invit-
ed from Scurry, Mitchell, Howard,
Martin, Midland, Gaines, Terry,
Lynn, and Borden Counties as well
as those of Dawson County.

At the Dairy Day programs any
owner of dairy cattle may bring any
dairy animal or dairy product.
These animals and products will
be classified according to their mer-
its. Each cow is rated according to
the Standard of Perfection. Ap-
propriate ribbons are to be award-
ed.

If a cow is deserving of the rat-
ing of "very good" she is given
such rating and a blue ribbon.
In this matter every cow worthy
of a blue ribbon receives one, every
cow worthy of a red ribbon re-
ceives such an award.

Judging contests among the vis-
itors are held, and suitable awards
are made.
Four classes of dairy animals will
be judged, and four classes of milk
products will be judged. Every
person interested in dairying is in-

ited to attend this Dairy Day pro-
gram and take an active part in its
several departments.

It has been announced that E. R.
Eubly, dairy specialist of the Ex-
tension Service, and D. T. Simons,
field representative of the Ameri-
can Jersey Cattle Club, will be
here. Also other specialists on dai-
ry products will be here from the
Extension Department.

New Legislation Extends Benefits Of FHA-Insured Mortgage Plan to Farms

Farmers may now use an insured Mortgage to build or repair houses, barns, sheds, poultry houses, silos, put up windmills or other farm structures.

As much as 90% of appraised values can be loaned in some cases, land may be either bought or refinanced on this plan when 15 per cent or more of the loan is used for materials and labor on the construction or repair of buildings. . . . These loans are made by lending institutions, they are not government loans, but private capital insured by FHA.

The interest is 4 1/2 percent, payments can be made monthly, semi-annually, or annually, in equal installments, depending upon the distribution of the farmer's income throughout the year.

At the discretion of the lender the loan may be paid over a period of 20 to 25 years. This means that the responsible farmer can provide his family with a modern attractive home without waiting years to accumulate the cash—a tenant farmer can buy his own farm—and the farmer burdened with short-term high-interest mortgages can replace them, modernize his farm, and clear the debt completely in convenient payments.

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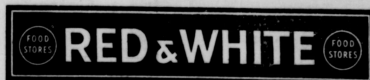
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
