CANDIDATE FOR STATE OFFICE SPEAKS, SPENDS NIGHT IN CITY

The first candidate for a state office to file for a place on the ballot in the Democratic primary July 24 did some campaigning Tuesday. He spoke here and spent the night in Cisco.

C. T. Johnson, 43, Democratic candidate for Lieutenant Governor from Austin, is running on a platform that calls for a state communications commission elected by the people to regulate and "reduce high telephone rates," and a state wide water conservation program as a dire necessity. Johnson, a homebuilder and life insurance man, is receiving state attention staging a one man war against the high telephone rates. He stated "such regulation of telephone rates has been found successful in 45 of the 48 states."

In proposing an elected state telephone and telephone utility commission, Johnson stated that the wrangle over phone rates is becoming uniform all over the state.

"Definite need for such a commission exists due to the weak-

ness of most Texas city governments in controlling rates," he said.

In his statewide water conservation program, he proposes a plan to build 100,000 small dams in Northwest Texas and a vast canal parallel to the Gulf coast crossing the States ten rivers as a means of saving Texas from deadly droughts. He said, "The small dams would benefit West Texas particularly and the vast canal would also benefit the entire gulf coast region." "Small dams on the farms of the arid regions of the Western part of the State would establish water banks for use during droughts as well as insurance against soil erosion," he stated.

Johnson also proposes \$100 per month pensions for eligible citizens at the age of 65. He declared that Texas ranks forty-fifth in the nation with an average of \$34 per month old age pension and this "is definitely not an adequate plan."

"The employment outlook for the older person today is dark," he added.

Johnson also desires a \$1,000 bonus to all veterans, and states that all veterans should come under the benefits of the Texas Land Grant Bill.

Johnson was born on a farm near Moulton in Lavaca County. Left fatherless at the age of seven, he worked to aid his family while attending elementary and high schools and later the University of Texas. He is a veteran of World War II, a nominee for "Austin's Most Worthy Citizen for 1953," a member of the Baptist Church, and an active worker in Community Chest, Cancer Crusade, Salvation Army, and other community projects.

He and his wife, the former Gladys Miller of Lockhart, have one daughter, Denel, 2. This is his first political race.

Record Missions Budget Approved By Baptist Board

DALLAS, June 9. — The executive board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas Tuesday approved a record missions budget of eight and one-half million dollars for 1954-55.

The board's 191 members, meeting in quarterly session in Dallas, also gave Decatur Baptist College the go-ahead signal for launching a \$250,000 building fund campaign and authorized the trustees of San Marcos Baptist Academy to borrow \$300,000 for construction of a new dormitory for girls.

When the multi-million dollar budget is accepted by the Baptist General Convention of Texas in Fort Worth next October, it will be the largest ever adopted by Texas Baptists. The Convention is now operating on a seven million dollar budget.

In addition to the eight and one-half million dollar objective for missions, the board also set a goal of eight and one-half million for major gifts from individuals for buildings and endowments of Texas Baptist educational and healing institutions.

Half of the eight and one-half million dollars expected to be received from Texas Baptist churches will go for state-wide causes. Of this \$4,250,000, a total of \$1,572,656 will go for state missions general, direct missions and promotion, the Baptist Standard, evangelism, retirement plans, rural and city extension, and miscellaneous and emergency items.

Bethany Quartet Will Sing Here

The Male Quartet from Bethany Peniel College at Bethany, Okla., will be at the Cisco Church of the Nazarene for special services Friday, June 11, at 8 p. m.

The Rev. Bill Burch will accompany the quartet, and will speak in the interest of the college.

The Quartet will be singing during the summer in churches in 14 districts in seven states. They will also sing in camp meetings, youth meetings, youth camps, conventions and assemblies.

The public was invited to attend the Friday service and hear the well known singers and the Rev. Burch.

Earl Smiths Attend Graduation Services

Mr. and Mrs. Earl H. Smith have returned to Cisco from Houston where they attended graduation exercises at the University of Texas School of Dentistry at which time their son, Earl, received his degree.

Dr. Smith and his wife and son are moving to El Paso where Dr. Smith will practice dentistry.

While in Houston Mr. and Mrs. Smith also visited their oldest son, Earl, Jr., and his family. He is engaged in the general practice of law with a Houston law firm.

Studies Underway On Game Harvest Plans This Year

AUSTIN, June 9.—The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said staff employees in various parts of the state are making studies preliminary to setting major game harvest seasons.

The Commission will meet in Austin in July to make its recommendations on waterfowl, whitewing dove and mourning dove regulations to the United States Fish and Wildlife Service which sets the seasons.

At the same time, the Commission will determine harvest specifications for areas where it has regulatory powers, including the major zones West of the Pecos and in the Panhandle and in smaller regions at scattered points in the state.

The seasons on big game and quail for the state at large are set by law.

Now, Commission staffers are surveying the antelope herds, checking potential whitewing flights in Mexico and inventorying mourning doves.

Meanwhile, meetings between sportsmen and Commission representatives are going ahead in the Panhandle, West of the Pecos and in smaller areas over which the Commission has regulatory authority to determine harvest dimensions on the basis of current developments.

Data likewise is being accumulated, according to the Executive Secretary, to background the state's recommendations to Federal authorities on the duck and goose seasons.

The Director of Wildlife Restoration, W. C. Glazener, reported that the first completed census — that on antelope in the Big Bend area — indicates possibility of too few mature bucks to warrant an open season there this fall. The area has been scourged by drought.

The aerial survey in the Panhandle which last year had its first antelope hunt in modern times, after successful restocking is just getting underway.

The whitewing dove studies in the Rio Grande Valley and in the area southward in Mexico where the fleet birds sometimes concentrate, have been rather pessimistic to date, according to Glazener. The whitewing population, harassed by habitat shrinkage, reached an all-time low last fall and the annual harvest was disappointing.

Clifton Osborn of Dallas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shy Osborn of Cisco, is spending several weeks with his parents here while on sick leave from his job with Interstate Theaters in Dallas. He is recovering from a severe virus and blood infection.

Clifton has been with Interstate for the past several years, with the exception of the time he spent in the Marine Corps. He was recently transferred to the Inwood Theater in Dallas, Interstate's most exclusive suburban theater.

He plans to return to his Dallas job in about two weeks.

Mrs. A. L. Farley was in Throckmorton last week with her grandson, Mike Morrison, who underwent a tonsillectomy there. Mike returned to Cisco with his grandmother for a week's visit.

Cisco Soldier Is In Army Parade

FORT CAMPBELL, KY. June 8.—Pvt. Warren T. McMurray, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert McMurray, 201 I Ave., Cisco, Texas, participated in the annual Armed Forces Day Parade here recently, it was announced today.

Pvt. McMurray entered the service in September of 1953 and was assigned to Camp Chaffee, Arkansas, for his basic training. In February of 1953 he was assigned to "C" Battery 89th Airborne Field Artillery Battalion of the famous 11th Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Ky., where he is now serving as a cannoneer in a 105mm. howitzer section.

The parade was the climax of a day of activities put on by the 11th Airborne Division as part of the Armed Forces Day for 1954. The day is designed to acquaint the public and our Allies with our military strength and latest equipment used by the Armed Forces. The parade was particularly colorful since it was with the complete dress uniform including scarfs, white gloves and white boot laces.

Several Cisco Methodists are in Fort Worth this week as the Central Texas Conference opens its annual meeting, and others plan to go later to attend a part of the meetings. The annual conference was to begin Wednesday at the First Methodist Church in Fort Worth.

Carlos J. Turner was named delegate from the Cisco First Methodist Church and J. W. Slaughter was named alternate. Turner was at the conference Wednesday and Slaughter was to be here Thursday.

Others from the First Methodist who are there include the Rev. and Mrs. Leslie Seymour and the Rev. and Mrs. E. H. Lightfoot. Mr. and Mrs. S. H. Nance and Will Reagan plan to be there Friday through Sunday.

Marvin Johnson was named delegate from Wesley Methodist Church and H. G. Haning was named alternate. Both Mr. Johnson and Mr. Haning planned to attend a part of the sessions.

The main business to be considered at the conference is the assignment of pastors to the various churches in the Central Texas district. A new pastor will be assigned to Wesley Methodist Church to replace the Rev. Bob Sanders who accepted work in Massachusetts.

Rev. Lightfoot has served as pastor of First Methodist Church for four years, and there was a possibility that he would be assigned to other duties. There was also the possibility that Rev. Seymour, district superintendent, would be re-assigned. He has been in the Cisco district for some four years. It was believed, however, that both would be returned to Cisco.

B. A. Butler, manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce for some 10 years and a resident of Cisco and Eastland County for a quarter of a century, submitted his resignation to the board of directors at the regular semi-monthly meeting Tuesday afternoon.

President Anton White announced the resignation of Mr. Butler and reported that the executive committee, composed of the officers, would take steps soon to obtain a new manager.

Mr. Butler plans to become editor and publisher of the Rising Star Record, a weekly newspaper, on July 1, he told The Press today. Negotiations to purchase the paper from F. D. Hicks were completed Tuesday.

Mr. White said that his executive group, including himself and James P. McCracken and W. B. Wright, held a brief meeting following the board session Tuesday. They agreed that it would be in the best interests of the city to employ a professional Chamber of Commerce man rather than an inexperienced man, Mr. White said. Mrs. Peggy Gallagher, office secretary, will continue in that capacity. Mr. Butler's resignation will be effective July 1.

"Mr. Butler has done a lot for our community and we are reluctant to lose him," Mr. White said.

A veteran newspaper man before he joined the Chamber of Commerce staff, Mr. Butler will be returning to a field of endeavor in which he spent many years. He began work as a cub reporter on the Mexia Daily News. In 1924, he came to Eastland County to work for the old Oil Belt News at Eastland for a year and a half.

Following three years as editor of the Breckenridge American, Mr. Butler came to Cisco in 1928 as editor of The Press. He remained with the local newspaper until 1941 when he went to Eastland to spend two years as editor of the old Eastland County Record. He returned to Cisco in 1944 as manager of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Butler grew up in North Texas where his father spent many years as pastor of Methodist churches.

Over the years, Mr. Butler has been active in civic, church and community work. He has served as president of the Chamber of Commerce, president of the Cisco Rotary Club, and is active in various other organizations. He is secretary of the county youth dairy committee and long has been a worker for Cisco Junior College.

In purchasing the Rising Star paper, Mr. Butler said that it had long been his ambition to be the owner of a country weekly newspaper. Mr. Hicks, who is selling the paper, plans to retire. Mr. and Mrs. Butler and their daughter, Verita, will move to Rising Star next month. Sale of their home here was expected to be completed this week.

Miss Zelda Sandler and her fiancé, Leonard Rozin of New York City, who will be married in ceremonies in the garden of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Sandler, Sunday evening, arrived in Cisco Sunday from Lawrence, Kansas, where they have been attending the University of Kansas.

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ATTORNEY GENERAL URGES CHANGES FOR INSURANCE LAWS

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has recommended 29 changes in the Texas laws which he said would "close the present gaping loopholes allowing insurance promoters to profit from innocent policyholders, shareholders and creditors."

The Texas Attorney General reported to the Legislative Council all of the actions and investigations taken by his office against insolvent insurance firms, and recommended 19 changes in the Insurance Code, 6 changes in the Securities and Banking Acts, and 4 additions to the Penal Laws to remedy present statutes on insurance.

He proposed the formation of an Industry-Wide Advisory Committee to assist the Legislative Council in its investigation of the proposed changes in insurance laws and practices.

His suggestions are now under study by the Council. Shepperd's recommendations included the following:

1. A uniform law making it a felony for an officer, agent or employee of an insurance company to convert money or property of the firm.
2. A uniform law making it a felony to convert any special fund of an insurance company.
3. A uniform law making it a felony to submit a false report or statement to the Board of Insurance Commissioners.
4. A uniform law making it a separate felony for a bank or real estate appraiser to misrepresent funds or real property appraised for insurance companies.
5. A study of all acts relating to insurance in the civil or penal statutes.
6. More examiners for the Board of Insurance Commissioners to conduct examinations of insurance firms.
7. A strict examination by the Board before granting original Certificates of Authority.
8. An audit by the Board, paid for by the company, of all securities and properties used as assets.
9. Statutory requirement for

appraisal by three real estate dealers of real property reported as assets.

10. Authority to be given the Board of Insurance Commissioners to require affidavits concerning the actual cash value of any property used as an asset in the capital structure of any insurance company and authorize the Board to require additional evidence as may be desirable, before approval of any charter or charter amendment in the same manner as now provided by the general laws regulating private corporations.

11. Authority to the Board to refuse to allow an officer, director, promoter or organizer of a company placed in receivership to organize other insurance companies in the State if such officer or promoter was responsible for the insolvent condition of the previous firm.

12. Amendment of the Insurance Code to prevent a person responsible for the failure of a previous firm from serving as an agent of any insurance company at a later date.

13. Authority to the Board to make rates and require uniform policies in the field of health and accident insurance.

14. Require Lloyd's type companies to submit charters, or amendments to charters, to the Attorney General for approval.

15. Requirement for stringent and thorough audit of an insurance company's assets by a qualified accountant when an increase in capital is made out of surplus.

16. Provisions requiring licensing of agents made to apply to all agents from all types of companies.

17. Hearings before the Board and appeals therefrom to be uniform in nature under the law.

18. The Attorney General or any Assistant Attorney General to be prohibited from representing any insurance company before the Insurance Board in the courts for a period of two years after holding office with the State.

19. Inclusion of all laws relating to insurance and insurance companies in the Insurance Code.

20. Simplification and clarification of the Code with confusing or conflicting provisions eliminated.

21. A "non-assessable" policy, approved as such by the Board of Insurance Commissioners, should not be assessable by an agency of the State, insurance company or individual.

22. A guaranty fund, similar to that used in New York, to be set up to pay claims of insolvent companies.

23. An emergency fund to be set up by insurance companies themselves to tide participating companies over any individual financial crisis. A similar provision is now included in the New York law.

24. Supervision of financial structure of insurance companies under either the Secretary of State or Board of Insurance Commissioners with adequate standards for rigid enforcement.

25. Elimination of stock manipulations possible under the present Texas Securities Act by tighter legislation, with particular interest given to trust companies.

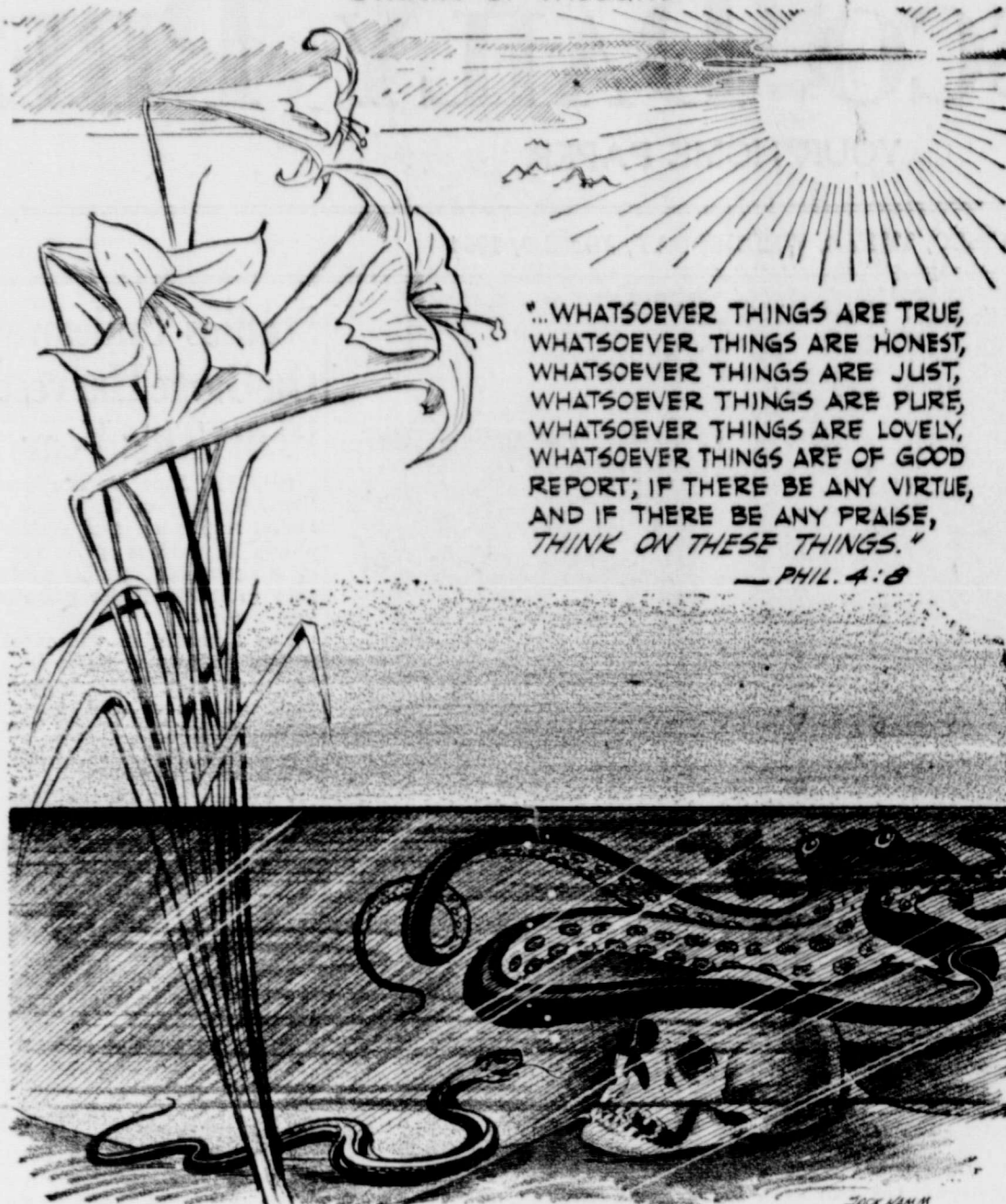
26. Provisions of Article 1303b under which proposed insurance companies operate prior to chartering should be clarified, modified or repealed. The 1100 companies now exempt, by a decision of a district court, from examinations because they do not sell bonds should be brought under the Securities Act.

27. The authority of the Banking Commissioner, now practically nonexistent, should be strengthened and adequate provisions made for enforcement of penalties of companies under his supervision.

28. The provision allowing the Secretary of State to order certain practices stopped by a company pending a hearing has been held unconstitutional by a District Court, and objections to it should be erased by a curing amendment.

29. Our Securities Act should conform to recent rules adopted by the Securities and Exchange Commission and otherwise be amended to prevent abuses in advertising securities offered to the public.

Rescuegrass, Once Pest, Now is Valuable Forage

Cows like to graze rescuegrass, a very palatable cool weather grass. It is a useful pasture grass, especially at times of year when fresh herbage is at a premium and dairy herd production is usually at the seasonal low point.

In the mid-South rescuegrass is a short-lived perennial which reseeds itself profusely. Seedlings that sprout in the fall from shattered seed are just "stand insurance." Farther south it generally acts as a reseeding winter annual.

The grass is being used as a base in row-crop rotations, for grazing, and for hay and seed production. Four of these uses are outlined briefly by B. H. Hendrickson in CROPS AND SOILS.

(1) When rescuegrass is grown as a temporary winter cover crop, preferably in combination with crimson clover, sod is turned under in March as green manure in preparation for a summer row crop such as corn.

(2) When it is desired to retain rescuegrass and reseed crimson clover in pasture, cattle are removed about April 1st. Seed of both crops matures and is generally combine-harvested together. Crimson plants die; a good proportion of rescue plants survive the summer, supplying light grazing until fall. Then the perennial plants form a dense stand of rescue and crimson clover which is utilized for the second year's winter grazing.

(3) Dwarf grain sorghum is grown in rows as a summer catch crop on disked-down, rescue-reseeded crimson clover stubble, following late May seed harvest. Three combine-harvested seed crops are obtained—grass, clover, and grain annually—in addition to self-seeding of

the sod crops. Subsequent winter grazing is available on fenced cropland fields.

(4) The rescuegrass and reseeded crimson clover are permitted to stand without further tillage. Seed crops and summer grass hay are harvested. This stand appears to be adequately self-maintaining for two years at least, and presumably longer. Considerable controlled winter grazing is available on these fields also.

There is little doubt that rescuegrass foliage and seed yields can be considerably increased by high-rate fertilization, particularly of nitrogen. 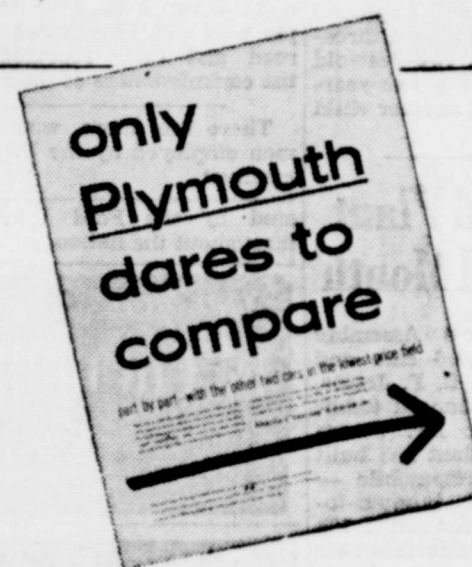

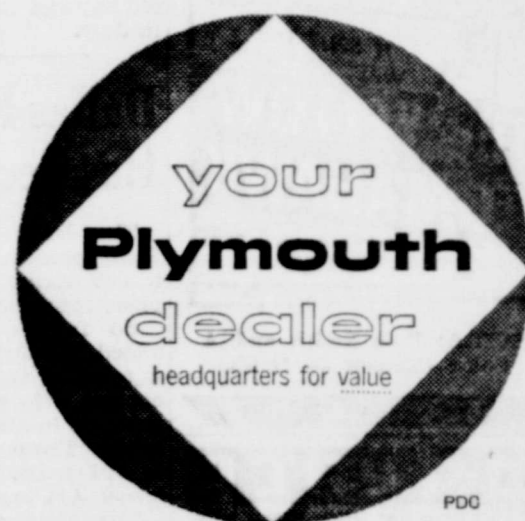

Dallas Ford Plant Has Record Month

The Dallas Ford Assembly Plant produced 12,096 cars and trucks during May, C. F. Jessee, plant manager, announced today.

So far in 1954, Mr. Jessee added, the Dallas plant has built a total of 63,648 automobiles — enough, if placed bumper-to-bumper, to stretch for about 193 miles. The daily production rate is 576 units, highest consistent production in the plant's history.

The plant employs 2617 people on two shifts, with a monthly payroll of more than \$1,000,000. Total disbursements during May for materials, supplies, freight, etc., amounted to about \$21,000,000.

The May production brings to 1,462,720 cars and trucks "built in Texas by Texans" since Ford began assembly plant operations in Dallas in 1913 — 41 years ago.

The Dallas Ford plant customarily supplies the needs of dealers in Texas and most of Oklahoma and Louisiana. It is one of 15 assembly plants oper-

The petition presented to the court was as follows:

"We, the undersigned, do hereby petition the Eastland County Commissioners Court to connect the farm-to-market roads numbers 570 to 571. It was our understanding that this link would be black-topped with construction beginning in November 1954; however, due to the many rumors and mis-information being circulated, we feel very strongly that we should have the assurance of this Court that this road will not be sacrificed in order to appease other groups.

"We understand the necessity of the new Staff road project and were cooperative; however, we feel justified in requesting the Court to declare its intentions at this time that work on said road will be started in November of this year and completed as soon as possible.

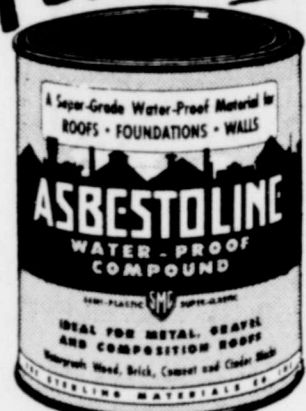
