FORD ISSUES STATEMENT ON REDUCTION

According to a statement just issued by Edsel B. Ford, President of the Ford Motor Company, Detroit, a general reduction of \$50.00 a car has been made in the prices of Ford Model T Cars and the Ford 1 Ton Truck, effective October 17th.

"The revision in prices," said Mr. Ford, "is the result of the increased volume of business which our company has enjoyed during the present year, and also, the fact that we now own and operate many of our own sources of raw material, which enables us to continue increasing the quality of our product and at the same time keep the price so low that Ford cars are in reach of everybody."

"Our Production for 1922 is already in excess of a million, which has been an important factor in bringing down costs. Our present daily output is averaging better than 5,000 Cars and Trucks, which means a complete Ford Car or Truck every 5 and one-half seconds of each eight-hour working day. It is an anticipation of this continued demand that price adjustments are again being made in order to keep in effect the policy of selling Ford products at the lowest price consistent with quality."

"Quality, as usual," said Mr. Ford, "will continue to be a prime consideration in the building of Ford Cars. As our business has increased we have constantly increased our equipment and manufacturing facilities, so that this price reduction merely reflects the progressive methods which come as a result of increased volume."

"This reduction, which is the sixth since March 1920, brings the price of Ford Touring Car from \$575, the price in effect early in 1920, to the present extremely low level of \$298, which is nearly 50 per cent less. Corresponding reductions have been made on all other types."

DEMOCRATS MADE A CLEAN SWEEP IN STATE

The Democrats in the General Election held last Tuesday made a complete victory in all of the State offices, at last reports Mayfield for United States Senator was ahead of Paddy to the tune of 5 to 1.

There was a very light vote in Ochiltree County, there were only 273 votes cast and Mayfield received 232 of them.

At last reports Walton for Governor of Oklahoma was way in the lead and that Kansas and Missouri were both going strong Democratic.

VAUDEVILLE COSTING \$1,000 MANUFACTURER-JOBBER SHOW

About \$1,000 will be paid by the Amarillo Manufacturers & Jobbers Association for vaudeville performances to be given during the big exposition to be held in Amarillo November 23, 24, and 25.

The vaudeville is from the biggest circuit in the United States, the United & Keith Proctor Company. Every act sent to Amarillo will be strictly of the highest class, according to Ross D. Rogers of the entertainment committee.

The vaudeville will include either four or five acts. Only one of these is yet known. Madame Phillips, "The girl with many voices" will sing soprano, and contralto and will range from low C to high C. The other acts will be announced as soon as Keiths announces definite information on all the acts not later than November 10.

Although these superb acts from the biggest vaudeville circuit in America and will cost the Jobbers and Manufacturers not less than \$925 and may be a little over \$1,000, it will cost the general public nothing extra. These vaudeville sketches will be a part of the program of the exposition and it is all free after the general admission price is paid.

"It is now planned to give complete vaudeville performance in the afternoon and two at night. This will, of course, be in addition to the exhibit of articles manufactured and wholesaled at Amarillo, the orchestra music and other attractions, all to be given in the Case building, just off Polk Street north of the Rock Island railway tracks."

BOTTLE OF "HIGHLIFE" STRIKES KLAN LEADER

About 500 members of the Ku Klux Klan paraded in Vernon last night, before a crowd estimated at 10,000 to 15,000 people. The bandstand on the courthouse contained musicians, and as long line of klansmen, headed by six men on horseback, swung into Main Street, the music started.

A bottle said to contain "high life" hurled by a member of the crowd, as the klansmen were returning toward their assembling place, struck a mounted leader on the head, and is said to have inflicted a severe flesh wound. The parade continued uninterrupted, but later a search was made for the assailant.

The climax of the Klan entertainment came when a spotlight was turned on the courthouse dome, revealing a robed klansman at each window of the tower, and an erect figure standing on top of the dome, holding an American flag aloft. The crowd broke into applause.—Vernon Record.

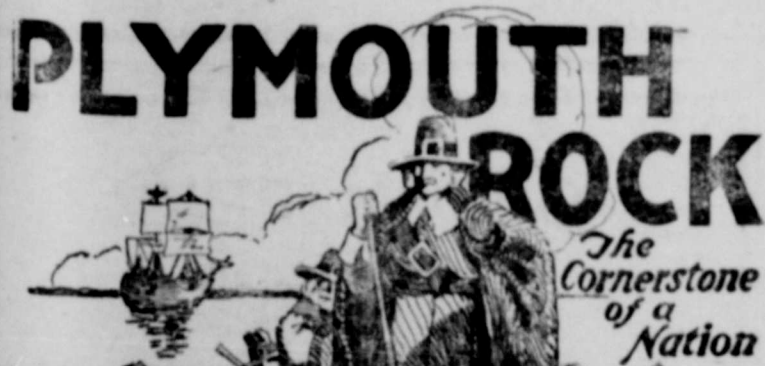

Home Town Helps

FEATURES OF FUTURE CITY

Chances for the Better That Are Assured Simply by the Ordinary March of Events.

Tomorrow you may not know your own city. They have probably begun altering it already, or are planning to do so. If not, it doesn't greatly matter, because certain forces at work will compel far-reaching changes automatically. Tomorrow your city will have wide boulevards cut through its narrow streets. These will accommodate four, six and eight lines of traffic. They will start at the center and run miles out into the country. Thousands of buildings will be torn down. Sharp street corners will be rounded off and the circle and crescent take the place of the checkerboard.

Did your city fathers, years ago, lay out a downtown boulevard or town with a strip of parkway in the center?

That beauty spot will be needed for traffic. But better beauty spots will appear miles from the downtown section. Slums and tenements will disappear, too. There will be a general grading up of living standards, and an equalization of real estate values.

When you drive a car the traffic cop will no longer be able to bawl you out, for he will disappear from street crossings, guiding traffic by electric signals from a point where he can see everything but say nothing—that is, if he doesn't disappear altogether, says a Saturday Evening Post writer. For there will be double-decked street crossings at congested points. And traffic at ordinary street crossings will be speeded up by diffused lighting which kills the shadows that now make them dangerous.

TREES IN BUSINESS STREET

Writer Combats the More or Less Accepted Idea That They Are Somehow Out of Place.

One of the characters in an early-day American romance of the time when the Stamp act was causing all kinds of trouble, is recorded as declaring that New York never would be a real business city because Broadway and Maiden lane were lined with trees, remarks the Indianapolis Star. The VanVrooms, the Stuyvesants, the Artaveltas, and other early settlers of the country saved fine trees about their homes, on the village greens, along the country roads, and in the fields. But one will see no trees nowadays on Broadway, and Maiden lane has been transformed from the pleasant, tree-bordered region of Dutch homes with flower gardens into the busiest wholesale jewelry district in America, if not in the world.

Beauty and comfort gave way to the inroads of commerce, not only in New York, but in most of America's great cities, so that today trees in a business street are a rare sight. There are elm-shaded villages in New England, maple-shaded towns in New York and the Ohio valley, and there are oak-tree streets to be seen in the southeastern states, but for the most part this refers only to small towns or cities—never to the congested centers of population where they should have been preserved.

City Streets Need Shade.

A Department of Agriculture bulletin insists that providing shade on city streets is as much a municipal function as providing lights or sidewalks and should be cared for by public officials. Probably the most efficient way of arranging for proper supervision, it says, is through an unpaid commission of three or five members which in turn employs an executive officer. Methods of organization are described, and numerous illustrations show how trees should be planted. There are chapters also describing pruning, spraying, transplanting, and other subjects of importance to every town or city, whether it has trees or wishes to have them. The bulletin may be had free upon application to the division of publications, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington.

Danger in Inflammable Roofs.

The value of property destroyed by fires communicated through the roof, is reported as \$223,000,000.

Fire-prevention campaigns are being launched in a number of cities as the result of these figures.

Indianapolis, Ind., began such a campaign early last year, with the result of a reduction in 1921 of \$550,000 in fire losses and 350 in the number of fires. During one period, out of 1,100 fires in Indianapolis, 850 were directly chargeable to inflammable roofs.

Affected by World War.

As a result of a physical examination of regular army officers recently army surgeons have found clear evidence by physical deterioration caused by strain incident to the prosecution of the World war. A large percentage of the officers show either excessive high or abnormal low blood pressure.

(6 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, for the purpose of acquiring, improving, extending or constructing an electric light system within and for the City of PERRYTON, Texas, as authorized by Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes 1911, and Article 882, Revised Statutes 1911, and amendments thereto, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas."

The said election shall be held at the Court House in the City of PERRYTON, and the following named persons are hereby appointed managers of said election, to-wit:

J. M. Bull, Judge of Election

Abe Green, Clerk of Election

Miss Nellie Perry, Clerk of Election

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 18, Revised Statutes 1911, and Article 882, Revised Statutes 1911, and amendments thereto, and the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas, and only qualified voters, who are property taxpayers of said City, shall be allowed to vote.

All voters who favor the propositions to issue the bonds shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

And those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws of the State regulating general elections.

USE THE HOME PAPER

Most folks seem to think all the Home Paper is for is to read. That done, it is time to tear it up, use it for wrapping paper, put it on the pantry shelves or use it for kindling. All of which are very good ways to use the back numbers. Why, if we were to keep all the back numbers of any good county paper, in less than a year we would have collected a real library containing several good stories, the cream of the political and religious news of the year, a record of the world's greatest events, and a real diary of the local doings of the entire county. But most of us are not willing to give the Home Paper room for even one short week. As a rule the life of the Home Paper is about two nights and one day. This is one reason it is the most sought publication in all this Nation. For about the time some member of the family thinks of something they wanted to save it's gone.

For this reason we are going to suggest that everybody who takes their Home Paper put up a little line behind a door somewhere and file them away for at least a month. You would be surprised how many times you would refer to its columns. And should you keep them for a whole year your home would become a real bureau of information and that pile of papers the community's encyclopedia. Then, too, if you were to see all at one time what you have received for \$1.50 or whatever the price of your home paper may be for a year, you'd never again kick on the price. Instead you might be happy to pay for it in advance. If the paper alone that you receive by taking your home paper one year were laid down in your home without a letter or line on it, just the plain, blank paper would be worth its cost for conveniences around the home. But it is not this week's paper nor last week's paper that is the most interesting. It is next week's paper, the paper of the future, we are looking forward to all the time. Have you discovered the secret of interesting yourself in your home paper? If you have not, send something to it next week yourself, then count your pulse when you see the wrapper. It is not news that thrills you most. It is the sight of what you sent. That's what makes the home paper mean something to you. To read something you already knew about yourself or your family or your farm or your school; that's worth the price of the paper for a whole year to you.

But there is still a better way to get your money back that you pay for the home paper. And this is just as true of the farmer as the business man of the town. And that is to advertise. Why does the merchant advertise? To let the country folks as well as the town folks know what he has for sale. To get rid of what he has on hand so he can get the cash to buy something else. Why should the farmer and his family advertise? For the self same reason. To let the town folks and their neighbors know what they have that they would like to sell for cash or trade for something they need—worse. The home paper should be the farmer's commercial clearing house. It should be the universal counter over which the possibilities of rural advertising have scarcely been touched. Not even the art of rural advertising has been either studied or taught. When the farm boy goes to town he sees the most artistic cigarette advertisements all over the town, on sign boards as big as the side of a barn. But what of the boy's fine pigs in the pen? What of his sister's registered chickens? Who knows about the butter and eggs; the cream and the milk on his father's farm? Does anybody know about the beans and tomatoes, or the big pumpkins that are going to waste in his mother's garden? And oh, there are so many things the mother and children and the house needs, if they only had the money that is going to waste. But no one reads their advertisement. But almost every week they answer the call of the city advertisers in their home paper or elsewhere and away goes the little cash they have to some foreign city—to get something they have never seen—because it is cheap! One of the richest advertising fields in America is the rural field and it should be cultivated and the crop harvested by the home paper. Isn't it queer that the cities will take advantage of every big tree by the side of the road—the board fences that bound the fields of grain, the bridge banisters, the rocks, if they happen to be near a road, and even the barns and hen houses of the farmers to advertise their wares, but never a word is said about what is in the barn or hen house or the field.

Mother, if you have chickens or turkeys to sell, advertise them. Maybe some of your neighbors would find it out and buy them before somebody steals them. The thieves know who have good chickens, and

where to get them. But no one else does. Son, if you have a bushel of peanuts or pop corn to spare—advertise it. Somebody wants it.

MORE TO EAT

A delicious little morsel found in a dainty tea room is toasted bread and butter spread with scraped maple sugar and cinnamon well mixed.

Maple Sugar Cream Cake.—Mix one cupful of maple sugar and one egg, add one cupful of sour cream, a level teaspoonful of soda, two cupfuls of pastry flour, one-half teaspoonful of cinnamon and a pinch of salt. Mix well and bake in layer tins, top each with boiled frosting, substituting one-half the quantity of maple sugar for the frosting.

Cheese Cakes.—Scald two and one-half cupfuls of sour milk, strain through a cheese cloth and add one cupful of sugar to the drained curd, four egg yolks slightly beaten, the juice and grated rind of a lemon and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt. Line small patty tins with pastry, fill with the mixture and sprinkle with chopped almonds and nutmeg. Bake until the mixture is firm in the centers.

Apple Foam.—Core and bake finely flavored apples. Remove the apple from the skins and put through a ricer and chill thoroughly. To the white of one egg beaten stiff allow one-half cupful of apple pulp and two and one-half tablespoonfuls of fine sugar; add to the pulp and mix until well blended. Chill mixture and serve in sherbet glasses with a rose of whipped cream piped on top of each with a candied cherry cut in quarters tulip fashion on top.

Crooles.—Beat three eggs until thick, add gradually one cupful of soft, light brown sugar. Mix and sift three-fourths of a cupful of flour with one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-fourth of a teaspoonful of ginger. Add to the first mixture and beat three minutes. Add one and one-half cupfuls of pecan nut meats. Fill small fluted tins two-thirds full of the batter and bake fifteen minutes. Spread with maple frosting and decorate with one-half of a pecan meat pressed in the center of each.

DAIRY FACTS

MANY TUBERCULOSIS CAUSES

Department of Agriculture Receives Various Replies on Methods of Spreading Disease.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

What is the most common method of spreading bovine tuberculosis in your community? This question asked by the United States Department of Agriculture in the interest of establishing accredited tuberculosis-free herds brought many answers ascribing the spread of this disease to about a dozen causes.

In North Dakota, where range conditions are typical of those in many other states of the northwest, unrestricted ranging of cattle was given as a common cause. Drinking at the same pool was another. The introduction of the disease was laid to cattle, not properly tested, being shipped into the state.

In parts where the pastures are fenced, the complaint was that the disease is spread by cattle nosing

each other at fence lines. One breeder advocated a double line of fence to prevent this means of contact. In this state, where purebred cattle are generally tested before being sold but grade cattle are not, much of the spread of the disease is laid to infected grade stock. Close housing in poorly ventilated buildings was given as a cause of disease by a few breeders. Some, from observation and experience, laid the spread of the disease to feeding calves and pigs, milk from tuberculous animals. From one source came the claim that it was spread from dead animals by dogs and hogs running at large and feeding upon the carcasses.

From Oklahoma came fewer reasons, but of the same type: Common pasture, importation of untested animals from other states and the sale locally of untested animals, foul stables, and contact with infected cattle in adjoining fields by breachy stock crawling through fences or stock nosing at fence lines.

Among the chief causes given in New England were the low price at which suspected animals are sold, the lack of testing hogs and grade cattle to be sure they, as well as purebred animals, are free from disease when sold, the breeding to a common bull, serving cows outside the herd, the common drinking trough, milk from diseased animals fed to calves and hogs, unsanitary barns, drafty barns, underfeeding, the common pasture or pasturing boarder animals, and nosing at and breaking through fence lines by cattle, some of which may be diseased.

The 12 causes of the spread of the disease reported generally were:

1. Unrestricted range or common pasture.
2. Common drinking pool or trough.
3. Introduction of untested cattle.
4. Nosing at fence lines.
5. Close foul housing.
6. Milk of infected animals fed to calves and hogs.
7. Trading of untested animals.
8. Dead animals eaten by dogs and hogs.
9. Breachy stock.
10. Breeding to a common bull.
11. Serving cows outside the herd.
12. Conditions unfavorable to health, as drafty barns and underfeeding.

PRODUCTION OF CLEAN MILK

Chief Causes of Bacteria Are Found in Unsanitary Conditions and Bad Management.

Health authorities agree that the way to get pure milk is to produce it pure rather than to try to purify it afterwards. The chief causes of bacteria in milk are found to be in the unsanitary conditions under which it is produced. These causes are: Dirty stables; dirty cows; careless, slovenly habits; improper handling; and insufficient cleaning of utensils.

Contamination of Milk.
The milk of one diseased cow mixed with the milk from the balance of the herd will contaminate the whole lot, making it unfit for either human or calf food.

Scrub Stock is Expensive.
Use a purebred sire if there is one in the neighborhood. Scrub stock costs much and returns little. Sell or eat the scrubs.

Watch Condition of Calf.
Watch the condition of the calf's bowels. At the first appearance of scouring or offensive odor, reduce the feed and treat for scours.

Feed Roughage Liberally.
Feed a cow all the roughage she will eat.

NO LAWYERS

There is a city of fifty-five thousand souls where no lawyer is permitted to set his foot or hang his shingle.

It is Aden, on the coast of Arabia, on the Gulf of Aden, at the entrance to the Red Sea. It is a very busy commercial city, where commercial trails from many lands cross. It is under British jurisdiction, and is administered as a part of the Bombay Presidency of India, though it is far from India.

Moslem Turks, African idol worshippers, Hindus, Confucians and Christians from all over the globe are associated in the commercial vortex of Aden. There are many disputes over commercial matters. But never a lawyer.

It is against the law of Aden for any lawyer to even reside in the city. Whenever a lawyer who has entered in disguise is found in the city, he is deported—legally and formally deported.

The supreme court of Aden is the general in command, representing the authority of Great Britain. This personage is called the political resident. Sometimes he calls in doctors or military men to act as judges in cases up for trial. The parties at interest plead their own cases, simply by setting forth their causes and their defenses in an orderly manner, and without formality. The court gives his decision, and that's all there is to it. No person may be employed to plead for another unless he has a direct interest in the case at bar.

This singular condition of affairs originated a long time ago, when Aden was a small military outpost. The British military officers did not want to be "shown up" by professional lawyers when cases were to be tried before military tribunals, so lawyers were excluded from the port. As military men still occupy the benches, except when they call in other professional men, the old prejudice against lawyers still predominates.

The United States consul at Aden reporting to his government on the system of justice in force in the Arabian city, sums up the situation and its results thus:

Under the circumstances it is felt that the introduction of lawyers

would result in the outwitting of the judges and in the miscarriage of justice to a much greater extent than their work would be of assistance in determining the law in the case. As it is, the general opinion is that substantial justice is done, although the reasoning may not in all cases be technically correct.

All these years we've been assuming that no civilized society could operate without lawyers. We have supposed that anarchy would break loose if there were not millions of lawyers to seek out and expostulate the arcane implications of the words that are written in the statute books and in the constitutions of states.

Junior Red Cross Praised for Work Influencing Peace

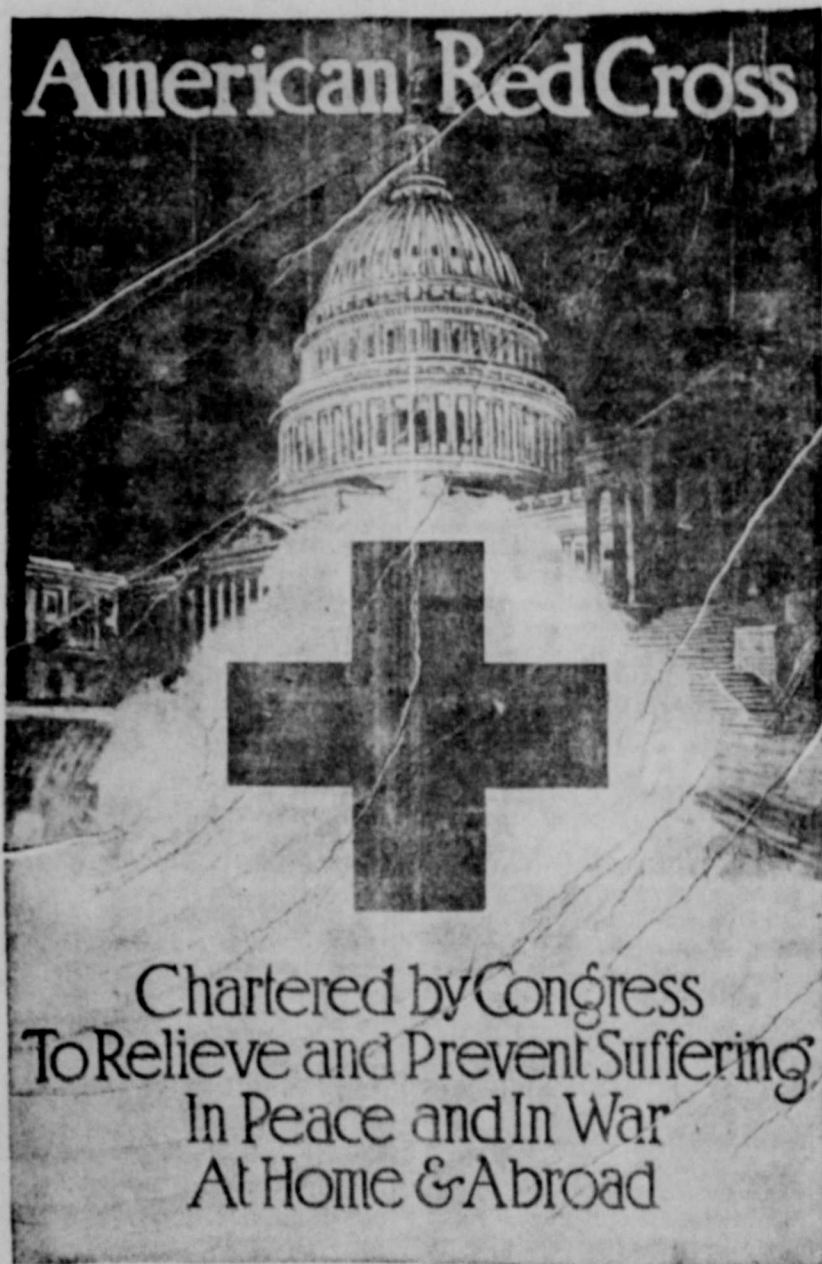
The advancing standard of the Junior American Red Cross made two outstanding gains during the last year—one in the field of domestic activity, which is rapidly linking up the schools with the Junior program, the other a gain of a dozen countries in Europe pledged to organize Juniors on the lines of the American organization. For this accomplishment the American Juniors earned the hearty endorsement of the League of Red Cross Societies for its "creation of an international spirit of human solidarity among young people with a view to preparation of a new civilization for peace."

The forthcoming annual report of the American Red Cross for the year

ended June 30, 1922, will show 24,528 schools enrolled, with a total of 4,483,845 pupils wearing the "I Serve" button of the American Junior Red Cross—the badge of unselfish service earned by each individual member through personal sacrifice.

In international school correspondence 736 classes and schools engaged in friendly communication with 623 schools in European countries, 90 schools in United States territories, 13 in South Africa and 10 in a miscellaneous list of foreign countries. The work in foreign fields in establishing playgrounds, school libraries, sewing and manual training classes, homes for war orphans, school reconstruction in devastated areas, encouraging community gardens and many other activities was financed through the National Children's Fund raised by the Juniors at a cost of \$338,237.40. During the year \$56,922.79 was contributed toward the fund, in which on July 1 there was a balance of \$201,361.58.

Striking New Red Cross Poster



Riveting the attention of the beholder on the fact that the American Red Cross is chartered by Congress as an official volunteer relief organization the dome of the Capitol at Washington, upon which is superimposed a large Red Cross, is the central figure of a new poster for the Annual Red Cross Roll Call. The poster, which has been pronounced one of the most striking of innumerable representations of the famous dome, is the work of Franklin Booth, a New York artist of wide renown. It will be displayed throughout the country during the Roll Call period, Armistice Day to Thanksgiving, when the Red Cross membership for 1923 will be enrolled.

An allegorical concept of the Red Cross as a peace-time ideal is employed by the American Red Cross in a new and striking poster for its Annual Red Cross Roll Call. Spread out before the heroic size figure is the outline of the United States with a Red Cross superimposed upon it while around its borders are sketched scenes depicting the chief activities of the Red Cross today—service to disabled veterans of the World War, disaster relief and promotion of the public health. The poster is the work of Lawrence Wilbur, a New York artist and will be displayed throughout the country during the enrollment of the Red Cross membership for 1923.
