SOLDIERS SEND MONEY BY RADIO

American soldiers overseas except those in Alaska, Hawaii, Panama Canal Zone and Puerto Rico may now send money home by radio. In a recent week more than 9,000 soldiers sent nearly \$1,000,000, in amounts of \$10 or more, with no maximum limit. Money may be transmitted to an individual payee, or to a bank. The process is speedy and sure. If a soldier desires to do so, he may also purchase war bonds by this method.

Contract Let For Paving Tuco Highway

At expense of the state and federal government it appears early improvement of 9.3 miles of Farm Road 34 in Hale county will be made. The Uvalde Construction Co., Dallas, was low bidder at \$94,645, on this stretch of road, the state highway department's Austin office reported Wednesday last week. The road will connect U. S. Highway 87 (Lubbock-Amarillo route) with the pavement that runs from Plainview to Petersburg, at the Lemmie Ragland corner, about five miles east of Petersburg.

Specifications call for soil-cement stabilization base and mixed-in-place bituminous concrete pavement. This type of road does not bleed after its construction and is very similar to pavement used in army camps in this area.

This highway extends from Littlefield, via Spade, across Hale county and into Floyd county to a junction leading to Floydada. It also extends across Bailey county, westward from Lamb county, and on into New Mexico. It is an important cut-off and diversion route on livestock truck movement from the Texas-New Mexico border country into Ft. Worth. (It goes between Lubbock and Plainview and runs straight as a ruler toward Ft. Worth, Commissioner L. M. Rankin, who has been active in working on this route for many years, once said.)

Lamb county's part of the road is being paved now, from the Hale county line westward. The other portion of this road in Hale county, from U. S. 87 to the Lamb county line, has been widened and improved, and may be paved in some future date, Rankin predicts. Part of the route in Floyd county has been surveyed, but right-of-way has not been secured for the full route there as it has in Hale, Lamb and Bailey counties.

1941 COTTON LOANS EXPIRE

The commodity Credit Corporation will acquire title to all 1941 cotton loans, which have not been redeemed by the borrower, Sept. 15. Any cotton not redeemed by that time will be placed in a pool and sold by the CCC. Producers will receive their payment when the pool is liquidated. Loans on 1942 cotton are extended indefinitely.

POSTPONE CALLING STUDENTS

Induction of students 18 or 19 years old may be postponed until the end of their academic year, according to a law signed by the president this month. If the student's call to the armed forces comes during the last half of a school year, induction will be postponed until the end of the term. This applies to high schools and similar institutions.

Dear Buford and Family,

This is the letter I have been wanting to write you for a long time. I am finishing up nine months of the finest and hardest training that any man could ever wish for. I'll receive my wings and 2nd Lt. commission Thursday, July 29. After that, I do not know what is in store for me. Other than we have a job to do and the quicker the better. I do not like the idea of being away from my wife and two small daughters, whom I hardly know at all, but that is just a small sacrifice compared to those who give up loved ones. I refer to V. L. Hall whom all of us knew and part of us went to school with him. No one knows what punishment he went through before he died. There are many more taking the same punishment that we will never know about.

Buford, I have enjoyed the Review very much. The truth about it is the Review is just about a big, long letter from home telling the boys in service where every one is and what the folks back home are doing. There isn't any use of sending the Review to me any more until I send you my future address. Best of luck, Earl Crow.

Dear Buford:

I know I should have written sooner, but I haven't much chance. I graduated from my range finder school, the 26th of June, with a third class fire controlman's rating (FC3-R). I was 8th high in my class. Sixty-three of us graduated out of 78 that started out. I was transferred to General Detail on July 5, with five days leave. I spent three of the five days, and two more, in the sick bay with tonsillitis. I got out July 13, and on July 18 was back again. I'm still here. This time they are going to remove them. That is as soon as I get well enough. I got the Review today and was I proud of it. I've been reading magazines and books of all kinds, but I don't know the people in them like I do the paper, so I was pleased to get it, naturally, as I always am. My address now is as follows: Cleatus A. Lebow FC3c (R), General Detail, U. S. Receiving Sta., San Diego 36, Calif. Best regards, Cleatus Lebow.

Dear Buford:

On the move again, so I thought I'd advise you of my change in address. Came through Washington, D. C., and saw the Lincoln memorial, the Washington monument, Pennsylvania station, Bronx and Brooklyn. I saw all of these from our train.)

You know the Yankees may have something up here. I'm sold on it. Lovely beaches—the last two miles up the coast was solid with beaches—and swimmers. The railroad followed the coastline. Came through New London, the home of the XXX, and saw a lot at a distance. That's where "XXX" was filmed.

We had to use a blanket last night—first time since winter for me. I saw a Filipino chief and a Negro private arguing this morning and they were really jabbering.

We are XX miles from Boston, 199 from New York, and XX from Providence. I'm on a three-month detached duty here. I'm head of a detail of six men. Tell all hello and have some of them to write me. My address is: Sgt. Ralph Havenhill, USMC, Link Celestial Navigation Training School, U. S. Naval Air Station, Quonset Pt., Rhode Island. Best of Luck, Ralph.

HALE COUNTY DRAFT CALL IS FOR 118 MEN IN JULY AND AUGUST

Hale county is scheduled to furnish 118 men for induction into military services within the next five weeks. Fifty nine men are to be inducted on July 26 and a like number on August 25. Of the 59 to be called this month 16 are supplementals those called to fill the places of men who were rejected because of physical defects. A larger per cent of men than usual have failed to pass physical examinations in recent calls, draft board officials said. In one call of six men from Hale county early this month only one was accepted. He is Cletus Eason, a transfer from Amarillo.

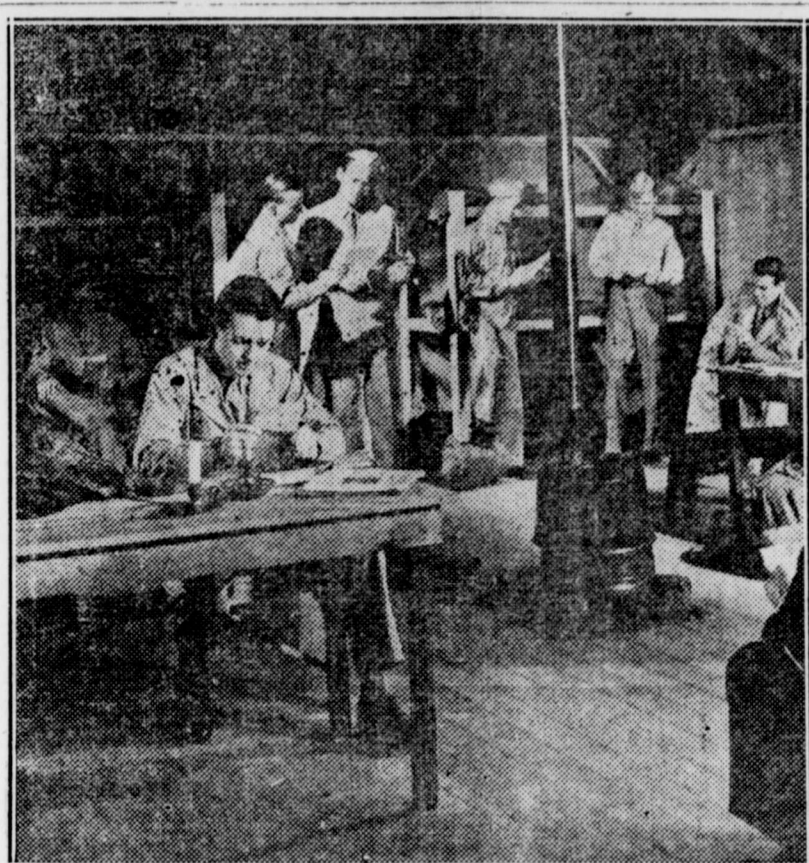

WRITE YOUR CAR LICENSE NO. ON GAS RATION STAMPS

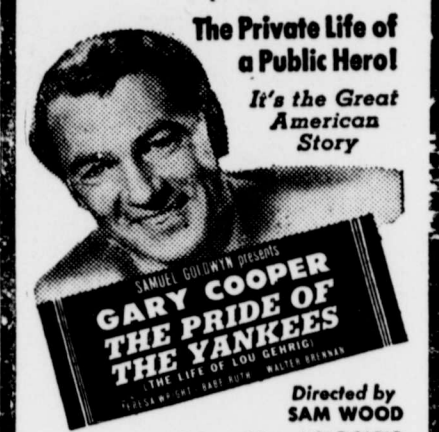
