Special session of the legislature took on today as both houses working earnestly on their respective calendars. The house tackled the automobile registration fee and was "up to its eyes" when recessed until tomorrow. The 20 per cent cut in the passenger license fees was increased to 35 per cent reduction. The senate passed the board of education providing for appointment of nine members and the support of public instruction by the state. The house bill would leave the office of superintendent an advisory one and Senator Joe Moore of Greenville, who attempted to amend the senate measure to respond predicted that the house would not agree to an appointive superintendent. He said that he would use his influence to the defeat of the bill passed by the senate.

Raise School Law

The senate also passed the bill raising the compulsory school attendance law from 18 to 19 years, conforming to the child labor law. Governor Moody sent two messages during the day, submitting a survey committee and asking for action of the fortieth legislature in inadvertently repealing an act.

BRADY, May 14. (AP)—A Texas cowpuncher who 33 years ago invested his savings of 25 years to purchase a half a section of land, but sold it because "it wasn't enough to graze a cow pony," today ranks as one of Texas' foremost breeders of registered Hereford cattle.

This erstwhile cowpuncher, is F. M. "Buck" Richards of Brady, owner of a 12,000 acre ranch, and a thousand pure-bred whitefaced steers.

Makes No Apologies
Richards has no apologies to make for his present ranch holdings consisting of some of the best pasturage in the state. Besides his registered cattle, he owns a thousand long haired Angora goats of excellent breed type, and a hundred pedigreed sheep.

The quiet unassuming breeder sprang into prominence four years ago when he ventured his first exhibit to the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show—a carlot of fattened Hereford calves—and won the championship award. Two years later he added grand champion to his laurels, when his calves were declared the best animals over every age and sex in same show. Since then he has been a consistent winner in numerous other exhibitions.

Worked With Cattle
"Buck" was born in Sherman, Texas, 73 years ago. At the age of 16, he landed his first cattle job near his home town. Within two years he was made "boss."
