Cotton Strippers Wait For Freeze

As the last week of November arrives, the county's cotton producers are wondering where that middle of November freeze went. Mitchell County normally gets a killing freeze during the mid-part of November, but not yet this year.

Since cotton fields have dried out some following a rainy, wet fall, the cotton strippers are lined up, waiting to get into the fields to get the cotton in, but until a freeze dries up leaves on the cotton stalks, nothing can be done.

China Grove Co-op Gin has only had three bales to come through the ginning process there, as most of the farmers in that area are waiting for a freeze.

County extension agent Bob Benson said that the late freeze has not helped the county's cotton crop much, as the weather has been so cold and damp, preventing maturation of cotton

bolts. The cold, damp weather has also hurt feed grains and prevented harvest.

Community Services Set Tuesday

There is a bright side, though, because native grass pastures have had a chance to harden and mature before the freeze comes. An early freeze on the tender new growth brought on by late rains would have resulted in unpalatable feed for cattle during the winter.

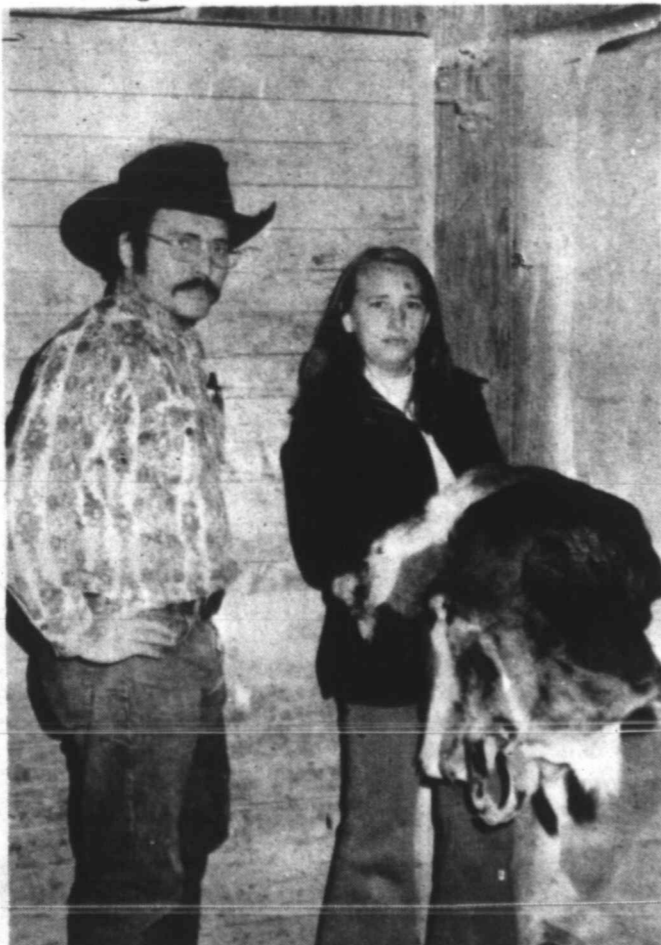

The program begins at 6:30 p.m. in the Colorado High School's cafeteria. County extension agents Bob Benson and Janis Choate will also attend the banquet.

Special guests will include parents, adult leaders, Extension Service officials, representatives of electric cooperatives and others who have supported the 4-H program.

The event is sponsored annually by 11 member-owned electric cooperatives. They include: the electric cooperatives of Bailey, Dickens, Lamb and Swisher Counties and Lea County, New Mexico. Loraine To Get New Post Office

A new post office building has been slated for Loraine and land for the building has already been purchased.

The site, across the street north of the present post office, was bought from Higginbotham Lumber Company at a cost of \$3,750. It encompasses slightly less than an acre of land, said Robert L. McCoy, manager of the San Antonio postal district.

The present post office building is owned by the Masonic Lodge in Loraine, said Mrs. Ruth Butler, Loraine postmistress. It is located on the northeast corner of Main and Colorado Streets.

The new building will be constructed on the southeast corner of the next block north of the present building, said Mrs. Butler, but the address will still

be on the corner of Main and Colorado Streets, she said.

Mrs. Butler said that a Facilities Analyst from Abilene had been to Loraine recently, inspecting the present building and the proposed construction site.

The next step will be to advertise for construction bids for the new postal building.

Mrs. Butler said that pre-

sently two part-time clerks work for the Loraine postal service, Howard Tarrt and Mrs. Melba Kittle. In addition to the part-time clerks, Bobby Hamrick serves as rural mail carrier.

She said that plans for the new building have not yet been sent to her so she does not know what type of building is being proposed.

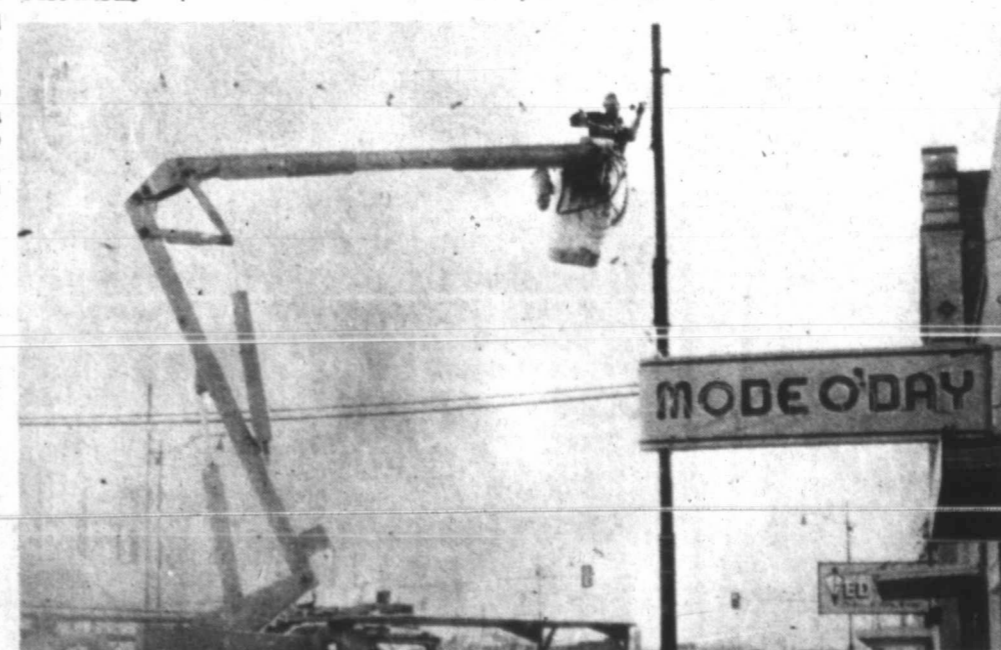

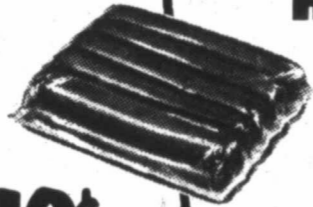

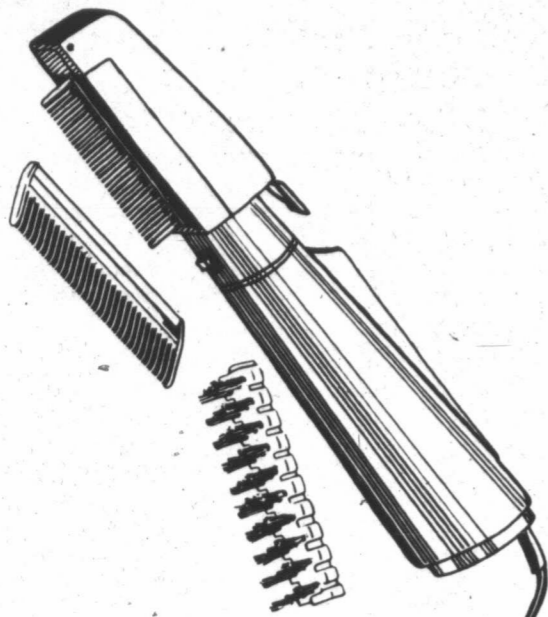

Dear Partyline, What are the duties of the County Treasurer and the County Auditor? Do their duties conflict or overlap?

The county treasurer is elected at each regular election for a term of two years. The duties of the treasurer are set out by law. The treasurer receives all monies belonging to the county from whatever source and pays and applies this money as required by law, in such manner as the commissioners court may require and direct. The treasurer keeps account of the receipts and expenditures of this money, the debts due to and from the county and directs prosecutions according to law for the recovery of all debts due the county. The treasurer presents a detailed report to the commissioner's court of all the monies, incoming and outgoing; debts, for and to the county; and other proceedings of this office to each regular term of the court. The treasurer is custodian of the county's securities kept at the county depository and shall not pay out this money except as specified by law.

The county auditor, appointed by the district judge, performs all the duties required of county auditors by the laws of this state for a period of two years. He is the auditor of accounts and finances for the county and sees to the strict enforcement of the law governing county finances. He has access to and shall examine all the books, accounts, reports, vouchers and other records of any county officer and orders of the commissioner's court, relating to finances of the county. After ten years he may destroy unbound papers of the county with the consent of the commissioner's court. He shall, without notice, examine the cash held in deposit by the county treasurer, to see that all balances and are invested in the manner provided by law. He prepares the forms to be used in collection of county monies. He advertises for competitive bids for materials for county use. He must approve all claims, bills, or accounts before they are submitted to the commissioner's court. A register of all warrants issued by the judges or district or county clerks on the county treasurer and their date of payment are kept by the auditor. He keeps an account with all county officers. He shall make monthly and annual reports to the commissioner's court and the district judge on all his duties as prescribed by law. An annual report also includes an estimate of all revenues and expenses submitted to the commissioner's court for determining a county budget.

These are the duties of the treasurer and auditor as set by law (Vernon's Civic Statutes). Their duties are very specific with some overlap, but not for conflict, but for a system of check and balance to ensure lawful distribution of county funds in an idealistic situation prescribed by law.

Foster Speaks Out For Use Of 2-4-5-T

William L. Foster of Sterling City, a man who has devoted his life to producing beef for American tables, wipes sweat-caked dust from a face perpetually browned by searing West Texas sun and wind and smiles as he answers:

"It would have killed us," he says, matter-of-factly. "It would have destroyed everything we have spent a lifetime trying to do. It would have been a costly mistake and the American consumer would have had to pay."

Foster has waged a continuous battle against the insidious grass-killing spread of mesquite brush over a 65-section ranch put together by his late father, Lester Foster.

"We have seen cattle prices dip so low we couldn't turn a

profit. We have also enjoyed some good years. But this would end them. Rob a rancher of his grass and he is out of business. That is what they will do if they take 2, 4, 5-T away from us." Why does he consider 2, 4, 5-T so important?

Foster said he and his brother watched mesquite spread across much of the ranch, crowding out and destroying lush grassland and growing so thick in many pastures that "a man couldn't walk through it."

Then they began fighting back in the early 30's, hand-grubbing mesquite during the summer slack periods. But even in those days when labor usually was available to the rancher who could afford it there was no way the brothers could turn back the tide or even hold the mesquite in check, Foster said. "It was just too slow. For every acre we would grub clean, mesquite would rob us of five more."

The grass loss steadily reduced the ranch's stocking rate to the point it would carry only about one-third as many cattle as it had in its early natural grass state. "I remember one section where my dad ran 72 heifers one year," Foster recalls. "Today, even after our brush control practices, we are able to carry only 30 head on that section and we are grazing it harder than my dad did when he had 72 head on it."

Just when things looked bleakest, rains came to break the great drought of the 50's and the Fosters began experi-

menting with chemical brush control. Spraying one-half pound per acre of 2, 4, 5-T on the mesquite by air defoliated almost all the mesquite in the first year and permanently killed approximately 25 per cent of the stand in most years, the brothers found.

"This didn't solve our problem by any means," Foster says, "but it did give us a way to co-exist with mesquite. We found that grass re-establishes itself after spraying. Then when the mesquite recovers sufficiently to threaten the grass we can spray it again. We have accepted the fact that we'll never get rid of the mesquite. But we can at least keep enough grass growing to maintain enough cattle to produce a profit in most years."

Since 1960, the Fosters have sprayed from 1,000 to 5,000 acres each year, covering a total of 40 sections--with 2, 4, 5-T. In 14 years, this program has more than doubled the stocking rate on the Foster ranch--to the point the Fosters now stock approximately 25 animal units per section or one animal unit for each 25 to 26 acres. They now run about 850 yearlings and more than 1600 sheep.

Foster doubts that this stocking rate can be increased much more, even with continued spraying and re-spraying each spring. But, he says, the brothers plan to continue spraying "to hold what we've got."

"We are just now getting this ranch back close to its former potential," Foster adds. "If we were to lose 2, 4, 5-T, we'd be in serious trouble. If we let the ranch go 10 years without spraying, the stocking rate will be cut in half. Every year after that, it will get worse. If that were to happen, I'm just not sure that we could find the spirit to go on. Mechanical brush control is too expensive and too slow to help us and it is for sure you can't grow cattle where you can't grow grass."

Foster feels opposition to 2, 4, 5-T spraying by environmentalists is based on erroneous concepts "and wild rumors."

"In all the years we have been spraying," he says, "we have never seen anything to indicate any ill effect on any of our cattle or any person. Me and my sons, Wayland and Bill, have helped the aerial applicators with their flagging many times."

Ranching economics are such already that most any rancher could sell his land, put his money in savings, and earn approximately twice as much in interest as he does ranching. Foster says, "A man just has to love ranching to stay in the business," he adds. "In our case, it has been a challenge and personally rewarding to put our land back in reasonable shape. 2, 4, 5-T is one of our most important tools. Ranching wouldn't be nearly so gratifying without it. I just couldn't take it, sitting here watching the brush push us off."

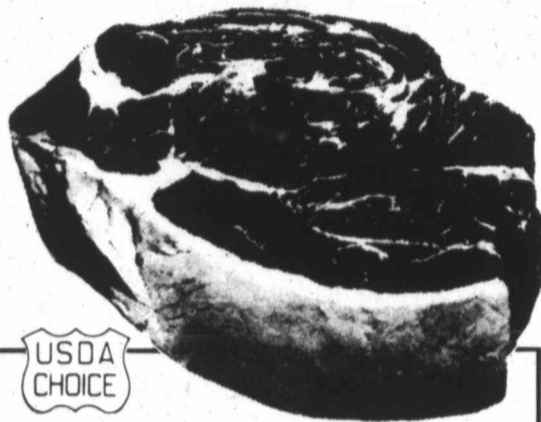

The person who lives and sows only for fame gathers only vanity. The person who sows only works and religion, reaps no peace of mind and no salvation. Salvation does not come from religion or works, but from Christ.

Without God, nothing is wise or strong, or worthwhile. Only to live unto God is wise sowing. "He that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap everlasting life."

Where are you sowing seeds? What kind of seed are you sowing? What will the Harvest be?
