ADMINISTRATION WINS SWEEPING VICTORY IN TUESDAY'S ELECTION

Cisco Tuesday re-elected Mayor Berry and Joe Clements, and in addition, completed the administration victory by electing W. J. Foxworth as commissioner, taking the place of J. T. Elliott, who was not a candidate for re-election.

Victory Decisive

The administration was given an unmistakable and unqualified endorsement by the voters of Cisco in the municipal election Tuesday.

The re-election of administration candidates was a defeat of the policies advocated by the Citizen, and we congratulate the winning candidates on their splendid victory. We acknowledge our defeat, so far as the personnel of the ticket is concerned, and in this connection the Citizen is too brave to gloat in victory or too proud to cringe in defeat. "Our heads may be bloody but it is still unbowed."

The Citizen has fought for what it believed the best interests of our home city, and fought fairly and conscientiously—openly, for a principle eschewing personalities and billingsgate. The people have rendered their decision, and as to the officers, it is against those candidates whom the Citizen supported. Their decision is final, and being a Democrat, we bow to the will of the majority. We are a good loser, and when we are licked we never bleed outside. This does not mean, however, that the Citizen is bending the suppliant knee before those temporarily in authority, because our cause has gone down in defeat, for we shall reserve the right to criticize the official acts of our elected officers, should we deem it necessary by reason of official misconduct. We hope we will have less cause for "raising hell" in the future than in the past. It is more compatible with our nature to waft bouquets than to toss brickbats.

Though stripped of the emoluments of official full-time salaries there is glory a plenty for the administration by the overwhelming defeat of those who opposed their re-election. This, too, in face of the fact that they lost four of the six charter amendments, all except two of which were initiated by the commission. Originally they only favored the band and gag amendment. They succeeded in defeating the recall, but lost the gag amendment.

Without conceit, the Citizen claims a part of the glory, as only one of the amendments—the recall—that we advocated, failed of adoption. This and the amendment providing that commissioners may only be paid \$5.00 for each regular, and \$2.50 for each called session, and provided further that no commissioner shall receive more than \$150 per annum, with the chamber of commerce, band and zoo amendments, were adopted.

One of the surprises of the election was the splendid vote piled up for W. J. Foxworth, who led the ticket, with the exception of that cast for Mayor Berry. Foxworth, who was played at big odds to lose, came under the wire first in the commissioners' handicap.

Broadway Hotel, One Of The Landmarks Of City, Being Wrecked

One of the oldest landmarks of Cisco will soon be no more. Workmen are now engaged in dismantling the old Broadway hotel, situated on West Broadway and Avenue E. The wrecking of this building was ordered by the owner, A. L. Mayhew, to remove one of the most serious fire hazards in that block. Mr. Mayhew, who owns the buildings on the east and north of the old hotel building, takes this step to lower his insurance rates on adjacent property. Just what will be done with the land on which the building is situated has not yet been determined, but it is probable that it will be acquired by one of the major oil companies for a filling station.

"No, I have not had an offer for the lot for a saloon," Mr. Mayhew stated.

In fact, instead of saloons acquiring the most desirable property, this preference has passed to the filling station.

The lot is, in reality, one of the most desirable in Cisco, and probably will be the site for a more important building than the pile of lumber now forming the old Broadway hotel.

The Broadway hotel was originally built by the late W. L. Harrell, father of F. E. Harrell, some time prior to 1900, and was operated by Mr. and Mrs. Harrell as Cisco's leading hostelry for many years.

Mr. Mayhew has owned this property for about 18 or 20 years.

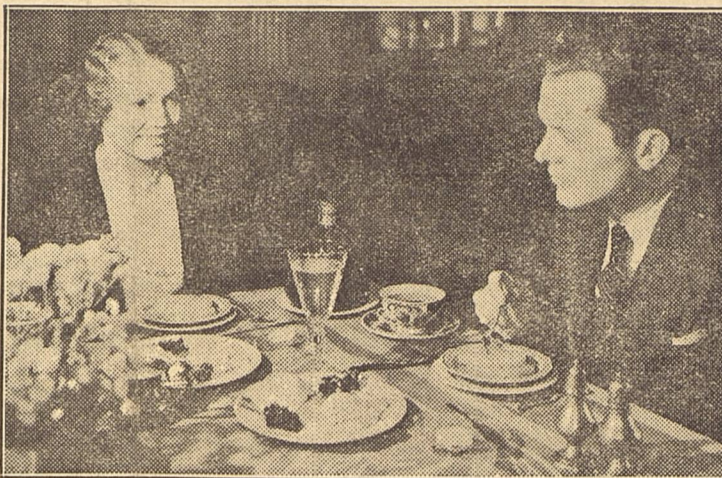

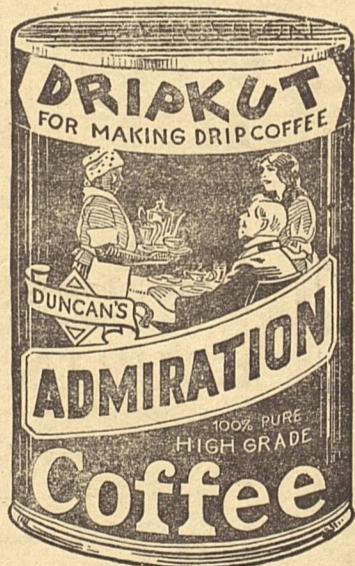

NEW OIL COMMISSION MEASURE ENGROSSED IN HOUSE WEDNESDAY

The new bill, sponsored by the Independent Oil Men's association, providing for a separate commission to have charge of oil and gas production, passed to engrossment in the lower house of the legislature Wednesday. The bill will come up for final passage in a few days, reports from Austin stated.

Should this measure become a law it will take control of oil and gas production and regulation from the railroad commission, and vest this authority in the new commission yet to be appointed.

"THIS CURIOUS WORLD"

There are more strange things
happening among the nation's great
and near-great than are recorded in
the funny papers. The United States
treasury is burdened with securities
upon which the government could
issue eleven billion of dollars, ac-
cording to information from Wash-
ington, yet President Roosevelt is
talking about issuing additional
bonds. The government is paying
interest of twenty billion dollars of
bonded debt and refuses to issue
gold-bearing currency to redeem
half of our bonded debt and save
this enormous interest obligation.

Most of the well-informed public
men declare that our foreign trade
could be increased, and thereby re-
lieve agricultural depression, if we
would take some steps towards re-
monetizing silver, yet we cling to
the single gold standard while in-
dustry languishes.

Banks are importuned to take the
new currency when they already

have more than they can legitimate-
ly loan under depressed security
valuations. We are told that the is-
suanee of the new currency will re-
lieve poverty when those needing it
most have no security to get it from
the banks. The veterans are refused
their adjusted compensation when
all admit this is the surest way to
inflate the currency by getting it
into the hands of the people.

The government, through the R.
F. C., are refinancing the railroads,
insurance companies, etc., while per-
mitting them to pay their presidents
and executives princely salaries of
as much as \$135,000 annually. A
better plan would be to require these
corporations to deflate their salary
list and inflate their wage schedule
to workers, rather than continue the
huge salaries to swivel chair warm-
ers, whose secretaries rubber stamp
their names when their signatures
are required. A larger list of workers
at a living wage would be a quicker
method of distributing the new cur-
rency.

If the government would first use
its own resources to raise the money
for governmental expenses rather
than issue interest-bearing, non tax-
able bonds, the budget would soon-
er be balanced, and the national
debt discharged. It would be silly
for an individual to borrow money
when he already had sufficient to
transact his business affairs. The
country is just another individual
multiplied, but the same policy holds
good and is just as sound.

Last, but not least, so far as the
oil-producing states are concerned,
is the silly effort of the powers to
limit the production of domestic
petroleum while allowing the coun-
try to be flooded with duty free oil,
produced in foreign countries.

An import duty of \$1 per barrel
on oil would open every well in the
nation, and restore prosperity in
three months.

the best brains to head our govern-
ment and they demonstrate the
mind of a child.

PEOPLE MADE C. OF C. A PART OF ORGANIC LAW

The action of the voters Tuesday in
adopting the first amendment to the
city charter gave our chamber of
commerce recognition as part of the
organic law of the city, as much so
as Cisco's water or any other system
of the municipality. Just what its
status, and the legality of the tax vot-
ed for its maintenance is, the Citizen
will not hazard a guess. Probably
some learned jurist may determine
that in the future.

What does the amendment mean,
providing for a levy of two mills for
its maintenance? Is this tax to be
assessed and collected in addition to
the present assessment? If so, it is
illegal, at least one attorney has par-
tially held, for the reason that the
tax rate is already to the constitu-
tional limit, and no additional tax
can be assessed and collected above
the present rate. If this appropria-
tion must be deducted from the gen-
eral fund may it not jeopardize other
municipal improvements? And when
the collections are insufficient to
make the appropriation what will be
the attitude of the chamber directors
should the commission fail to make
the appropriation? Will mandamus
proceedings be resorted to in order
to force this appropriation?

Understand, the Citizen favors a
chamber of commerce, and believes
municipal maintenance is the only
equitable manner of its support. We
are just asking these questions that
some one may consider them and ar-
rive at a proper solution at some fu-
ture date, when similar problems will
likely have to be met and solved.

Then, being an organic law, the
chamber of commerce is a fixed, in-
dependent institution, subject to mu-
nicipal supervision only as fixed by
the amendment just adopted. The
same is true as to the status of the
band and the zoo. The only way Cis-
co can fail to support either institu-
tion is by repeal of these amendments
in the same manner by which they
were adopted--by a vote of the people.
While authority was already vested
in the commission to maintain these
institutions, and this authority was
elastic, which could be curtailed at
the will of the commission.

MAN AND DOG STAGE COMBAT AT HOME OF A CISCO GENTLEMAN

A dog fight is not an unusual occurrence, and is therefore not a matter of news; a man whipping a dog is not necessarily a news story, while it may be classed as a bit inhuman and brutal—but when a dog stages a fight with a man, and that man his master, it is something out of the ordinary, and the Citizen believes it worth recording as a matter of real news. This very occurrence took place at the home of a Cisco gentleman last Friday night, and it was a battle royal between the man and a huge police dog owned by a Mr. Dibbell, of Fort Worth, while the combat was staged on the front porch of the home of Mr. Gordon Tomlinson, 400 west tenth street, last Friday evening.

Mr. Dibbell, in company with Mrs. Dibbell, arrived at the Tomlinson home about dark, with whom he had a business deal. Mr. Tomlinson was at the supper table when his visitors arrived, whom he asked to join the family at supper. Having already been to supper, Mr. Dibbell excused themselves, but stated he would like something for his dog to eat, after Tomlinson had finished eating.

Mr. Tomlinson had only a short time before returned home from his ranch, and was in his working clothes. As soon as he finished eating he decided to change his clothes to be presentable to Mrs. Dibbell, whom he had never met. While dressing he heard a commotion as if two dogs were fighting, and thinking some stray dog had come by the house and attacked the Dibbell canine, paid very little attention to the disturbance. However, before he was fully dressed Mrs. Dibbell called to him to come out there, that "he had Mr. Dibbell down." Still, not realizing the trouble, Tomlinson picked up a broom, the only weapon available, and rushed out on the porch. Both dog and Dibbell were down on the porch floor, with Dibbell trying to get a cord around the dog's mouth, and the police hound jumping at Dibbell's throat. Asked what he could do Mr. Dibbell was too busy to answer, but finally succeeded in getting the cord about the dog's

month, so that he could not bite, and subdued him.

He told Tomlinson to get a rope to tie the dog, which was done, but not until the dog had painfully lacerated his master's hand, and bit him on the arms.

Mr. Dibbell said that the dog was harmless and docile during the day, but showed the nature of its primitive derivative at nightfall, and became more or less vicious, but that was only the second time that he had attacked him, but did attack Mrs. Dibbell on one occasion, when she succeeded in subduing the beast by holding his head so he could not bite her.

The first indication of the bad temper of the brute last Friday, Dibbell told Tomlinson, was when he stopped at a filling station to have his oil tested just before reaching town. They were traveling in a coupe, and as he re-entered the car he pushed the dog over to make room for himself, and as he did so the dog growled at him.

Tomlinson said the dog lunged at his master's throat in every attack, and that Dibbell was not seriously hurt was almost miraculous.

Letter From the Mail

If, in a moment of artificial bravado or pensive dream, you should mail a letter which, come morning, you are sorry you mailed, there is a regulation way of getting it back. I am told that an average of two letters a day are thus recalled in Manhattan and the Bronx, says a writer in the New York Morning Telegraph.

By the Monroe doctrine, or something like that, one's letter belongs to one until the sender gets it in his hands. That's a post office rule.

Here, then, is what you do. Re-address a second envelope, a duplicate of the first, and rush to room 224 at the central post office. This is the office of the assistant postmaster. Give the man your facsimile envelope and ask for form 1509. Fill it in. It asks nothing more personal than your name, we understand.

The post office promptly gets in touch with the substation of the district to which your letter has been sent and with the carrier who naturally would deliver it.

You then go home and wait for notification that the letter has been recalled, whereupon you go down and claim it. Letters to distant points are wired or even cabled for, and the sender must pay for this, but for letters within the city there is no charge. I thought you'd like to know.

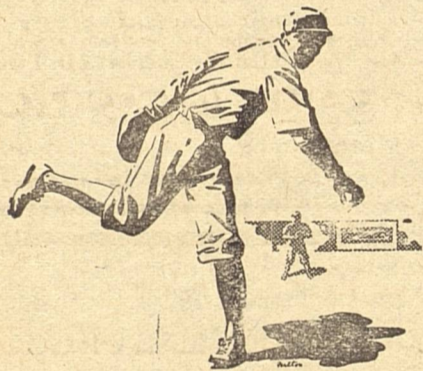
