Mrs. Webb and Ellison were found in their home last week after being shot by an unknown person or persons. An intense investigation is being conducted locally by police to try and find who was responsible for the brutal killings.

Vivian attended Dunbar High School. She was employed for 13 years by Texas Instruments, Inc. in Lubbock. She was once a member of the Federated Women's Club of the Stokes-Parker District. She was the mother of a son and two daughters.

She is survived by two daughters -- Ida Bozeman and Misty Webb, both of Lubbock, Texas; her mother, Mrs. Ida Freeman of Lubbock, Texas; two step-daughters -- Felitha of Lubbock, Texas and Yvette of Dallas, Texas; two sisters

-- Helen Thornton and Viree Freeman, both of Lubbock, Texas; two step-sisters -- Hazel and Janice, both of Fort Worth, Texas; two brothers -- James Freeman of Lubbock, Texas and Don Freeman of Palestine, Texas. She is also survived by three grandchildren, twenty-one nieces and nephews, twenty-six great nieces and great nephews, and a host of relatives and friends.

### We Don't Like It!!

They happen because we allow those illegal joints to park their rears in our community, we don't say a mumbling word about them. The location of the house in east Lubbock had been called into the Lubbock Police Department several weeks ago, but apparently, there was no involvement on the part of the residents of the area. Now, if we want to take care of these kinds of situations, we are going to have to get involved and help take care of illegal situations.

We must rise above all these kinds of negative activities which are hurting our community. We're not saying this only happens in East Lubbock, it is widespread, but we don't want it to happen in East Lubbock; or any part of Lubbock.

We need are citizens who will refuse to have these kinds of activities to happen in the neighborhood. We need parents who will tell their kids to leave the drugs alone! Perhaps, we can't stop the pushers and dealers of drugs, but we are in a position to keep our kids from the the stuff. If this is done, then there will be no demand, and therefore, they (pushers and drug dealers) will have to move elsewhere.

If ever there was a time in Lubbock, there is a need for strong, dynamic Black male leadership to see to it that we discontinue all these kinds of negative things in our community, and this begins at home -- the family.

Our Black kids need our help, and with those kinds of acts last week in East Lubbock will not help us. Will you help East Lubbock, by letting those in authority know about negative activities in our community. You are valuable, but don't sit back and let these kinds of things happen.

Now, we can't do anything about what has happen, but we can began stopping those negative things which are happening in our community. If we continue to let what happened last week happen, it will be unsafe to walk the streets in East Lubbock or any part of Lubbock.

Would have thought the Lubbock Ministerial Alliance would have made some kind of statement or taken some kind of action on these brutal killings. It needs to be done, Rev. Kado Lang, president of the alliance.

Let it be known, gangland murders are not wanted in Lubbock. There is no need for them, must not let them continue, and definitely will not tolerate these kinds of acts.

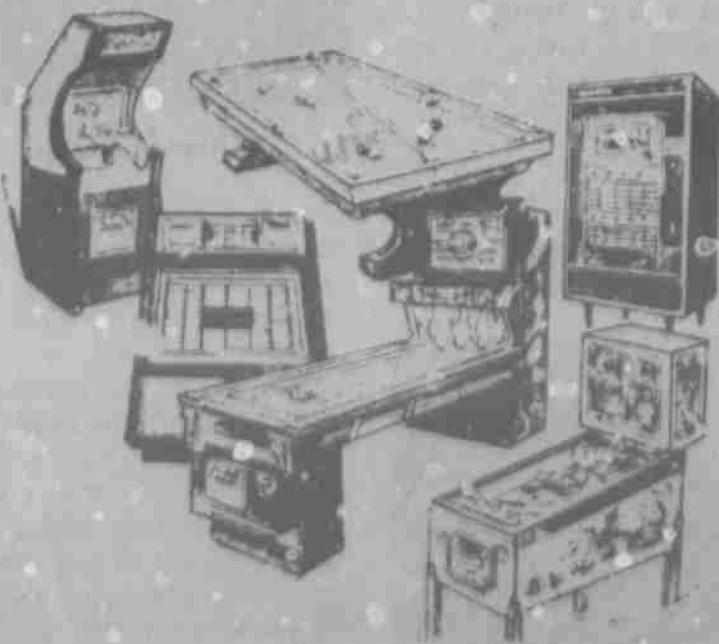
**BLACK FOLK ART EXHIBITION TO OPEN**

## It Needs To Be Said

Tear filled eyes and grief laden hearts are the normal aftermath of a tragedy. Even those not directly involved tend to treat the situation in a grief-laden manner. In man-made tragedies, we should take a few minutes of deep soul searching to determine our part in the tragedy. The gangland style murders of three of our community residents one day followed by a single murder the next day, should make each of us search our conscious for the reason. Man made tragedies do not occur without warning signs nor do they occur in this instance, without the cooperation and encouragement from the community.

Sensational killings within our community is occurring all too frequently. Can we as a community of law abiding citizens prevent or deter further killings of this nature? Let's have a deep conversation with ourselves about this subject.

How many times have you said "I don't want to get involved?" Your neighbors house has been robbed and you saw a strange car parked near by or you

know of illegal activities within your neighborhood and you keep quiet because you "don't want to get involved." How many times have you did nothing with "after the fact" information. Would you agree, that there is very little that happens within east Lubbock that "after the fact" information about who, what, when, where and how an incident happened is not widespread. And what do we do with this information, excuse it with "I don't want to get involved or it's none of my business." Remember, this is a conversation with yourself, don't lie.

Remember the "common sense" article, well common sense should tell us if someone continuous to do the same thing, it will become boring and they will move to a higher level. When we allow a person to get away with a petty crime, we unconsciously give encouragement to do it again. By ignoring the criminal and allowing them to go unpunish we reinforce their mind that they will get caught. Therefore, they become bolder, upgrading their activities to include carrying a weapon which they will not hesitate to use.

The weapons used in the multiple murders were easily capable of traveling through one house into the next. What would have been the results had one of the victims ran out into the street, would the killer have

Now, what do you think the killer or killers think of our community? Evidently, they feel they can come into our community, do whatever, to whomever, whenever and get away without any accusing finger coming

forth. Do you feel they are so naive not to consider someone just may see them?

These tragedies reflect just how much we have ignored our total community life style. Our community is like weeds, out of control and at an extremely serious level. A majority of us are

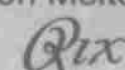

### BAPTISMAL REGENERATION VERSUS BLOOD REGENERATION

I recently read an article which referred to the man of Ethiopia and Philip in Acts 8:26-39 which said that the Ethiopian "was baptized for the forgiveness of sins". This is a false teaching by the Church of Christ denomination, Catholics and others who believe that the waters of baptism brings about the salvation and forgiveness of sin for a lost sinner. This is a false doctrine called "Baptismal Regeneration" or "Salvation by Baptism". The reason that these false religions of our day use sprinkling as a mode for baptizing infants is that they believe infants and everyone else must be baptized in order for them to have salvation. It is not the traditions of men who determines the salvation of the human race but it is the authority of the Word of God that will judge the whole world. Acts 5:29 tells us that "We ought to obey God rather than man." The forgiveness of sins or washing away sins by baptism is not found in Acts 8:26-39 or any other scriptures in the Word of God. On the contrary in Acts 8:35 it states that Philip "preached unto him Jesus" and after the man "believed with all his heart that Jesus Christ is the Son of God," Philip baptized him after the man "believed" and his sins had already been forgiven.

The only way that the sins of a lost sinner can be forgiven or washed away, is by the precious "BLOOD" of Jesus Christ. Hebrews 9:22 says "without shedding of blood is no remission." The word "remission" in Greek means to receive a pardon; be delivered and have forgiveness of sins. Leviticus 17:11 says "It is the blood that maketh an atonement for the soul." The word "atonement" in Hebrew means: to cover; cancel; cleanse; forgive and pardon the sins of a lost soul. Jesus said himself in Matthew 26:28 "this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for the remission of sins." God's Word says in 1 John 1:7-10 that "the blood of Jesus Christ his Son cleanseth us from all sin. If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say that we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us." The Bible says in Revelation 1:5 that Jesus Christ "washed us from our sins in his own blood." Colossians 1:13-14 says that the Father "hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the Kingdom of his dear Son: in whom we have redemption through his blood, even the forgiveness of sins." The word "redemption" in God's Word in Greek means: a ransom paid in full, salvation and deliverance from sin.

The Word of God says in Luke 3:3 that John the Baptist came "preaching the baptism of repentance for the remission of sins." The word "of" in the term "baptism of repentance" means in English: baptism as a result of salvation or because of salvation. The word "for" in the term "for the remission of sins" also means in English: baptism as a result of salvation or because of salvation, that a person has repented of their sins and have "brought forth therefore fruits worthy of repentance" as it says in Luke 3:8. The Greek meaning for the word "repentance" means that God changes a lost sinner's mind and direction toward God only for salvation and God turns us from our sins and God transforms us and makes us into a new creature in Christ. 2 Corinthians 5:17 says "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things have passed away; behold, all things are become new." In Acts 2:37-38 we have another passage of scripture which means the same as in Luke 3:3 which reads: "Now when they heard this, they were pricked in their hearts, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, Repent, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Please notice that Repentance comes always before Baptism. Also notice that the word "for" in verse 38 means that baptism is a result of salvation or because of salvation and were to be baptized because they had already received salvation. They were commanded to "repent" of sins or perish in hell as Jesus says in Luke 13:3-5. All must believe in the finished work of Christ on the cross at calvary, that Christ died for our sins, was buried and rose again the third day according to the scriptures and shed His blood for the remission or your sins. Acts 10:43 says "To him give all the prophets witness, that through his name whosoever believeth in him shall receive remission of sins." Acts 13:38-39 says "that through this man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins: and by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses." The word "justified" in Greek means: to be made holy; just or innocent; free from sin and made righteous in God's sight. Acts 2:41 says "Then they that gladly received his word were baptized:" and in Acts 2:47 says "And the Lord added to the church daily such as should be saved." Those that "gladly receive" the Lord Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Savior should then submit to baptism as a result of salvation and because of salvation by the GRACE of GOD only, through the "BLOOD" of Jesus Christ for the forgiveness and remission of all sins. Salvation by BLOOD. REGENERATION.

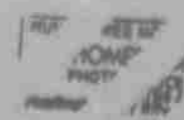
