Schools Rate Good Action Urged In 6 Areas

Colorado City schools are receiving a good rating from a visiting team of educators evaluating the system for Southern Association of Colleges & Schools.

Dr. C. L. Ainsworth of Texas Tech University in Lubbock presented a preliminary report of the evaluation to school teachers and administrators Monday.

Although the overall rating is good and above, the visiting team pointed out areas for improvement and "soft spots" which need attention.

Appraisal by the visiting educators parallels principally an appraisal conducted during the last two years by committees of teachers and administrators within Colorado Independent School District.

Dr. Ainsworth, who coordinated the visiting team of 20 educators from across Texas, emphasized the work of the self-evaluation by the local committees before the out-of-towners made their appraisal.

He praised it as "comprehensive" and "revealing of a desire to make specific improvements."

1. Need for curriculum guides and coordination development in various areas of the school system so teachers will know more exactly how their program of study and their students should progress.

2. Professional development policy that would require all teachers to acquire additional experience in their related fields at specific periods of their career to maintain faculty proficiency. This can be accomplished in college course, workshops and other activities.

3. More development of the school's guidance function in line with proposed Texas Education Agency guidelines to meet needs of all students and to serve faculty and parents.

4. Careful study of building needs and use, especially relating to Wallace building for alternative use in relation to future cost and enrollment factors.

5. Study for Colorado High's main building, which needs bet-

ter lighting, laboratories, heating and other facilities should be considered with possible building alternatives.

6. Although recent curriculum materials have been developed in the system's secondary schools, continued development and restructure is needed for the English program in those grades.

Despite the citing of needs for continued improvement and development, the visiting team evaluates Colorado City schools good and above in all 16 major areas.

Leading the evaluation with excellent rating is the school staff and administration.

Next highest at the mid-point of "good" (just two points away from very good) is instructional materials services—library and audio-visual.

Also in the very good bracket, but below the rating of instructional materials, is the general evaluation of instruction.

At other levels of "very good" are subject organization, nature of subject offerings, physical facilities, instructional staff, evaluation methods—all in the subject fields.

Lowest rates in the "good" category were for student activity program, guidance services and school plant (buildings and equipment, etc.).

These ratings—with half of the 16 rating "very good"—are all in the major summaries. Specific ratings almost 50 categories were summarized to arrive at the 16 major key ratings.

The visiting team specifically commended the school staff, students and the relationship of schools with the community.

"The students, at all grade levels," Ainsworth told the school board, "deserve notice for their courteous, good behavior."

Parade Friday To Open Homecoming

Colorado High's homecoming weekend will open Friday with a 4:30 p.m. downtown parade.

From there the activities move to Wolf Stadium for the 3-AAA football encounter between Colorado High and Brownfield.

Homecoming festivities continue after the game with reception and business meeting of ex-students, plus a student council sponsored dance in Wolf Gym.

Reunion of Class '39 will highlight activities Saturday.

The parade will form on Chestnut at East Third, move south on Chestnut, east on Second and north on Oak to the Courthouse.

Steve Kennedy, student council vice president in charge of parade plans, said five floats, two bands and other attractions will be in the parade.

Among those attractions, of course, will be student beauties nominated for homecoming queen—Debbie Hines, Brenda Bodine, Patty Pattillo, Debbie Brown and Teresa Bertl.

One of the five senior candidates already has been selected queen, but her identity will not be known until Supt. Lloyd McKee places the crown upon her head during halftime ceremonies at the football game.

The candidates will be on the student council float in the parade.

Five students groups will have floats in the parade competing for \$100 in prize-money. These are the four classes and Wolverines.

School board members will be in dignitary cars in the parade.

Colorado High Black Knights of Precision Band will lead the homecoming parade and Junior High Band also will be included.

Local dealers will provide automobile and local farm equipment firms will display equipment.

Drivers assigned to the parade are Carl Guelker, Kirk Morris, Jimmy Trujock, Pat Reilly and Eldon Harris—floats; David Benson, Brian Bassham, Jim Wilkerson, Cindy McKee and Sheila Hildebrand—cars.

Ex-Student Association will sponsor a coffee for all exes in the High School Cafeteria after the game at 10:15. Officers will be elected and other business will be conducted at the coffee.

Floats will be moved from the parade to the stadium for display during the game.

Colorado City's newest beautification project receives final touches Thursday with the unloading and spreading of crushed rock.

The rock will become the lawn for two planted parkways on Vine and Hickory, between 17th and 18th Streets, and Austin, between 19th and 20th.

Both are new projects of Colorado City Garden Club, working in cooperation with the city and Operation Pride, and are located on the city's main north-south thoroughfare.

Sixty yards of the crushed rock will be hauled by the city from east of Snyder, approximately 25 miles. City crews, under Garden Club supervision, will spread the rock into the two areas.

Garden Club members earlier in the week, working with a San Angelo landscape engineer and city workers, planted black pines, native oaks in the areas. Earlier city crews had hauled native stone from Lone Wolf Mountain and installed curb and water facilities.

While the parkway project is being completed, City Manager J. A. Sadler is preparing to move into action on another improvement.

He is awaiting final legalities for the city's purchase of the

Greene Estate property which is east adjacent to City Hall.

It will be the new home of police department and Corporation Court following remodeling that will include a new front, compatible to the newly completed Colorado City Historical Museum located south across the street.

\$484 Salary To Food Post

Vacancy Studied

Brown Is Mayor Pro Tem

A city councilman to replace newly resigned Paul B. Hunter probably will be named within the next two or three weeks.

That's the indication from Mayor Mike Burt, who said councilmen were studying the council vacancy individually before getting together to decide on Hunter's successor.

"This has been all of a sudden," said the mayor, referring to Hunter's appointment to the salaried position of Precinct 3 County Commissioner and his official resignation Monday night from City Council.

"We need time to think this over before making an appointment."

Council did fill one vacancy created by Hunter's switch from city to county office. He was mayor pro tem and councilmen voted unanimously Monday at Councilman J. C. Brown mayor pro tem.

Brown, retired executive with Sun Oil Company, has been a member of city council since 1927.

Councilman Eddie Piland presented the motion for Brown's appointment and the second was by Councilman J. C. Britton.

Hunter, who begins Monday as Precinct 3 commissioner succeeding the late J. C. (Jake) Northcutt, submitted his resignation in a brief written note to council.

"I cannot express full degree of my admiration and respect for each of you (councilmen) and the service you are rendering to the citizens of Colorado City," Hunter said in parting.

Whoever is appointed to fill Hunter's place on the council will serve until next April's municipal election. So, you can expect council to seek an appointee who will be a candidate for a full term in April instead of serving only for the few interim months.

To be decided in the April election will be the Hunter position and also the places now held by Mayor Burt and Mayor Pro Tem Brown.
