ALL THIS RAINY weather is certainly like old times, wouldn't you say? Heard a man say yesterday "it's a fine come-off when you can't walk down the street without getting wet." And another fellow was beginning to worry about his crops.

Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reports that the City Commission has had an inquiry as to whether the city would give bargain rates on water for lawns and shrubs this summer. That is certainly like old times. It has been about five years since the city had enough water on hand to give bargain rates.

MR. JOHN RODDEN, the water superintendent, reports that Lake Cisco has caught a total of eight inches of new water since Monday. Lake Bernie has caught 18 inches, and streams are still trickling into the lakes. For comparison, Lake Cisco now contains 34 feet and six inches of water at the dam. Most folks are still burning fires these mornings and nights. Maybe this year will be a cool summer. 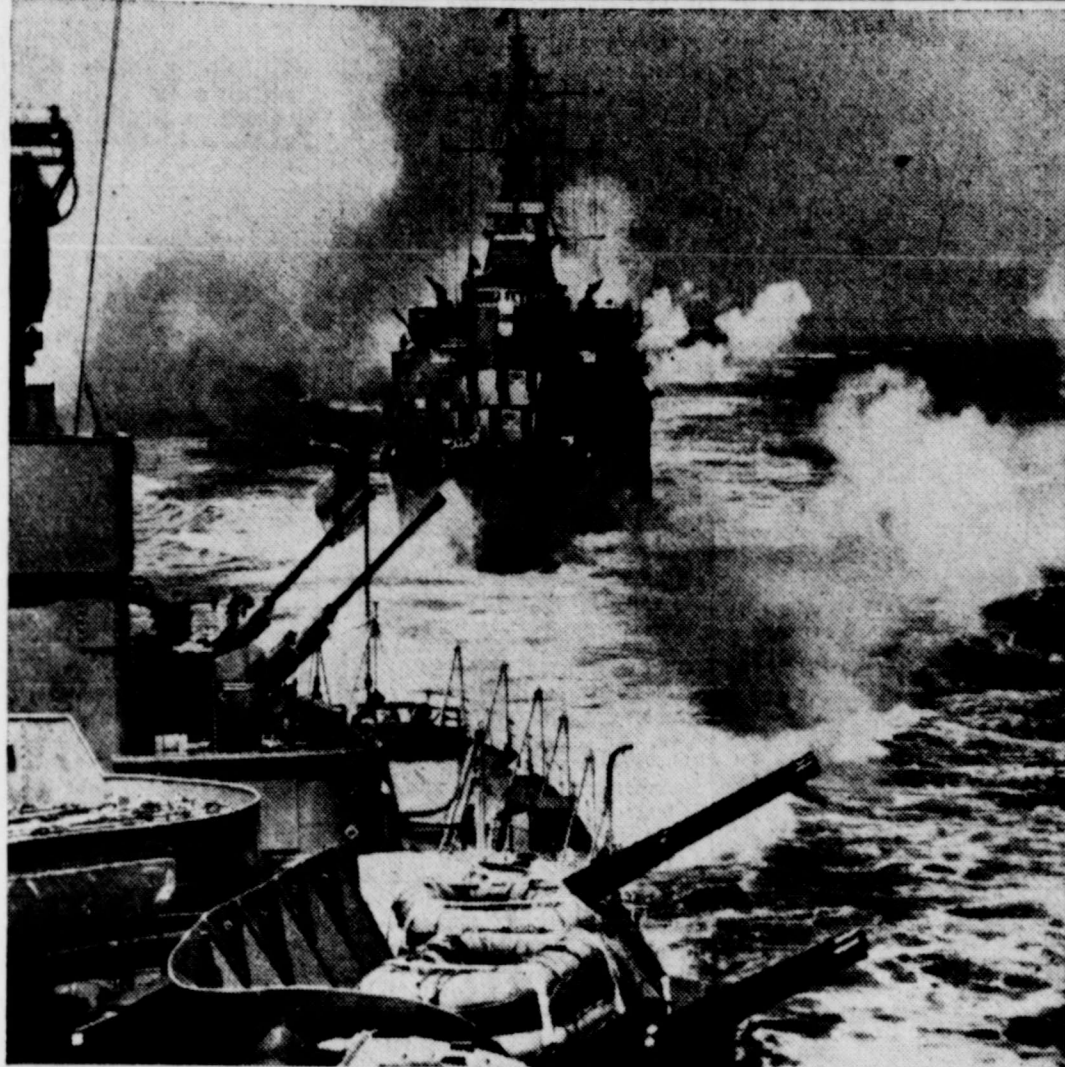

Internal Revenue Workers Needed By Civil Service

U. S. Civil Service examinations for Internal Revenue agents and accountants are again open in this area, it was announced today by officials of the two agencies. In the Dallas Internal Revenue district there are 56 openings.

Two Civil Service grades and starting salaries are represented in the positions available. In the grade of GS-5 with an entrance salary of \$3,410 per year, requirements are three years of progressively responsible experience in commercial accounting or a college degree in the subject. Applications and full information may be obtained at post offices, offices of the U. S. Civil Service Commission, and of the Internal Revenue Service. The examinations for the vacancies in this category will close June 21.

Examinations for Grade 7 special agents at a starting salary of \$4,205 per year also are open and involve somewhat higher qualifications for eligibility to apply. Accountants entering at the GS-5 grade will be potential candidates for promotion to the GS-7 posts and will be given special training which, when successfully completed, will place them on a promotion list.

Written examinations will be required and a grade of 70 on the basis of a possible 100 is requisite. In the accountant groups age limits are 18 to 35 except for veterans who are not bound by the cut-off age limit.

Applicants must be qualified residents of Texas to obtain certification unless an insufficient number of eligibles is obtained by announcement of the examinations.

Cisco Students Are Teaching In NTSC Program

DENTON, May 12.—Two students from Cisco are completing a semester's work as student teachers in the School of Education at North Texas State College.

The student teaching program at North Texas State College is designed to give students practical knowledge in teaching, with supervision from an experienced teacher, before they take over a teaching job on their own.

During the course, usually taken in the senior year, the prospective teacher takes over the whole classroom program — prepares lessons, administers assignments, and carries out the testing program.

The student teacher is guided in and outside the classroom by a supervising teacher who helps in the planning, carrying out, and evaluation of the work. A college coordinator also works with the student teacher during the course.

Golf Is Helping H-SU Youth Get Use Of Bad Leg

ABILENE, May 12.—Golf may be the answer to one of Hardin-Simmons University basketball team's biggest problems for 1954-55.

'Lots of golf' will be what Doyle Brunson, most valuable player in the Border Conference in 1953, will do this summer to try to get his leg in shape for the coming year.

Brunson recently had a metal plate removed from his lower right leg — a plate that had held the bones together since the previous summer when a compound fracture resulted from a job accident in Doyle's hometown of Sweetwater.

As a 6-3 guard on coach Bill Scott's 1953 Border Conference co-champion team, Brunson scored 412 points and led the Cowboys into the NCAA play-offs.

Brunson would have been the only regular returning last year from the championship team and was being counted on by Scott to bulwark an inexperienced sophomore squad.

Then came the accident, and Brunson's activities were limited to such things as could be accomplished with crutches and a hip-toe cast. Early in the year, the cast was reduced to knee length, and then in March an operation removed the plate.

Now with the frequent aid of crutches, Doyle is playing golf almost every day and was runner-up in the fifth flight of the recent Cisco Invitational Tourney.

"If walking several miles a day and hitting golf balls with my weight on the leg won't bring it around, nothing will," Brunson says.

It's still not definite that Brunson will be ready for the December 1 opener with Texas — or even able to play at all this year — but Bill Scott is smiling a lot more these days.

Along with all-conference Bob Tremaine and flashy Delnor Poss, Brunson could make the Cowboys a champion instead of an also-ran this year.

College Corner Stone Gives Information About Early Days Of School, Community

When Coach L. L. Lewis and Professor Homer L. Dorman took sledge hammers to break into the corner stone of the old administration building at the school that had remained sealed in the stone since 1903.

They decided to have a look in the corner stone some four months after the main building at the school burned. After the stone was broken into they found a Bible; a copy of The Gospel Messenger, a Baptist publication, dated March, 1908; a copy of the Baptist Trumpet dated about the same time, and a Britton Training School catalog for the 1909-10 school year.

Unfortunately water had seeped into the stone and the papers were badly damaged, but the catalog was in good enough condition that much information on the old school was available. The school began its first term

on September 14, 1909, after moving to Cisco from Scranton when the new plant was completed. The calendar called for a teacher recital on September 13, the official term opening on September 14, the beginning of classes on September 15. The school year was divided into three terms. The winter term began on December 8 and the spring term on March 8.

O. C. Britton was president of the school and W. F. Flaniken was business manager. Teachers, in addition to the two above, were: A. L. Cornell, Miss Edith Gerhardt, Miss Ruth Doyle Rucker, Miss Lucy Thomas Royce, Mrs. W. E. Flaniken, Miss Fay Locke, Cliff Walker and B. B. DuBose.

The catalog showed that Cisco was a thriving community with a population of 4,000 and that it had a modern water and sewer system that made the school desirable and the chance for disease less than at other schools. It said that Cisco was the easiest town in West Texas to reach since two railroads made junction here. The town boasted an oil mill, cotton compress, light plant, steam laundry, ice factory, bottling plant and ice cream factory.

The school was to have a well rounded program of work and play. A monthly college paper was to be published and a complete sports program was planned. The new school boasted of a football field, basketball courts, tennis courts, baseball diamond, a track and a bath house on the athletic field for the use of those who participated in sports. A. L. Cornell was the athletic coach, and the catalog told that he was a graduate of Texas A&M College

and that he made the All-Southern football team selection while playing at A&M.

The school had a well rounded educational program and fine arts department. Among the courses offered were English grammar, literature, spelling, composition, arithmetic, algebra, geometry, trig, physiology, Latin, ancient history, drawing, writing, letter writing, modern history, education, physiography, English history, physics, chemistry, French, Spanish, piano, voice, harmony, musical history, band, orchestra speech and other relative courses.

One paragraph in the catalog said that building sites near the school were available at very low prices, and people were encouraged to build near the school to "take in boarders to help support

Credit, the system of future payment for goods or services bought now, is so ancient that certain fortunate persons were able to say "charge it" in Babylon, 4000 years back. Today, it has expanded and grown into one of the most useful conveniences of modern-day business and personal life. Cisco people along with everybody else would be seriously handicapped, at least temporarily and probably in the long run also, if all credit throughout the nation were suddenly withdrawn.

Credit may be compared to a high-powered auto. Operated with judgment and discretion, it is one of the most useful things one can have; but operated otherwise, it can damage the driver and others as well. For the individual, good credit, in a sense, is a reflection of that person's good reputation — and needs to be guarded as jealously.

Credit being important and interesting to us all, let's look at its ancient origins and modern-day applications.

There is nothing new about credit. Installment credit was available to the more wealthy

such as excess gambling or drinking. If the applicant has just moved from another city, the credit bureau will check with the bureau there, so that a person's credit record follows wherever he goes.

Sometimes illness, temporary unemployment, or other distress makes it impossible for a completely honest person to pay his bills on time. In such a case, the individual should tell his creditors of his trouble and make new arrangements.

All credit bureaus point out that the fellow who prides himself on "paying cash" for everything he buys is making a mistake. There usually comes a time when everyone has need of credit. When this time arrives for the cash-only man, he may run into difficulty because he will not have established a record of good credit for himself.

Thus, the credit bureau can help you in many ways, so long as you take good care of your credit and don't over-extend yourself. The credit bureau merely keeps your record. You make it.

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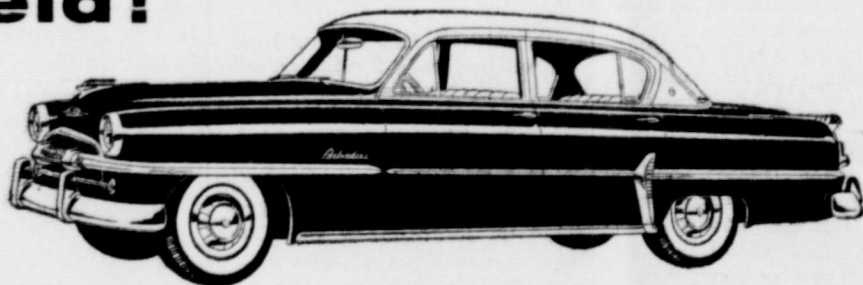

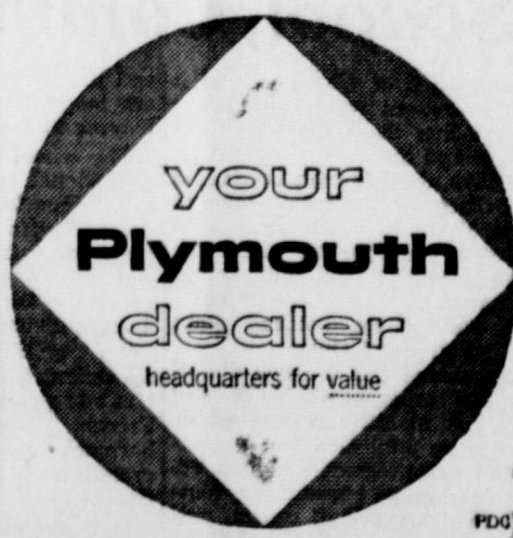

State Capital NEWS

Texas Press Association

Texas' population will stand above the 12 million mark by 1975, according to a survey made by the Texas Research League.

Privately financed, the league makes studies for the state and other units of government.

If Texas' water problem is solved, the population growth will be much faster than the survey shows, said Alvin A. Burger, the league's director.

The state will be wise, Burger said, to anticipate population growth and plan to provide public services for a greatly expanded population.

Not Enough Money

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White was gratified to learn that President Eisenhower had authorized the expenditure of \$10 million to aid five drought-stricken states, including Texas, but he said it wasn't enough.

Ten or fifteen million dollars won't whip the drought problem said White, "but it's a move in the right direction."

Road Situation

For a long time, Texas has had — and still has — a road problem. To build a first-class highway system in this state will take an expenditure of \$1,665,310,000, according to the state highway department.

In a booklet titled "Texas Highway Needs," the department said:

"The trunk or main highway, representing the backbone of the highway system, presents the most critical problem confronting the people of Texas."

"These trunk highways have now become outmoded and obsolete."

Next year, the Texas Good Roads Association will ask the Legislature for an additional tax on gasoline of a penny a gallon to boost revenue for highways.

Radar Rides Highways

Heavy footed drivers will be arresting themselves before long. A radar system has been installed by the Texas Department of Public Safety to facilitate the apprehension of speeders on Texas highways.

Plan Commission

Governor Shivers appointed an Economic Advisory Commission and called a meeting of its members for May 17 to start long-range planning on a number of problems, such as recession, inflation or deflation, drought, and government.

Public officials, legislators, labor leaders, and representatives of business and agriculture make up the commission's membership.

New Officials

Dr. Henry Holle, Texas who has been a United States public health administrator in New York City, was sworn in as this state's health officer. He succeeds Dr. George W. Cox.

Mark Wentz of Big Spring was appointed state fire insurance commissioner to fill out the term.

of the late Paul Brown. H. C. Pittman of Waco was named a member of the Industrial Accident Board, replacing Robert L. Hill, who resigned.

Laughlin Case

On its way to the U. S. Supreme Court is the appeal of former District Judge C. Woodrow Laughlin of Alice, removed from office by the Texas Supreme

Court. Meanwhile, Laughlin is seeking re-election to a new term in the same court.

Junior Colleges

Something needs to be done about junior colleges, which have been growing rapidly in number and size, says Cecil A. Morgan of Fort Worth, head of a State Board of Education committee.

Good work is being done by the junior colleges, the committee said, but new laws should be passed to regulate them. Thirty-one junior colleges are now receiving \$2,610,000 a year in state aid.

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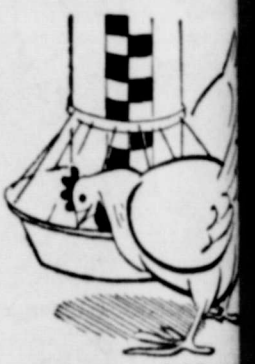
