Through the request of many of our advertisers and subscribers, we have decided to set the day of publication of the Ochiltree County Herald forward from Friday to Thursday. This will mean that the paper will go to press on Wednesday night in order to be in the mails early Thursday morning.

The request has come from several of our advertisers who wished to reach the people on the rural routes and in the Oklahoma trade territory a little earlier in the week. At the present time the paper does not reach some of these subscribers until Saturday morning, too late for them to benefit by the week-end specials, which some of the merchants are offering.

By setting the publication forward one day this will mean that everyone in the trade territory will receive the Herald not later than Friday morning, and will not only make advertising more valuable for the merchant, but will also enable the reader to profit from the specials offered.

The new system will probably not be put in effect for at least two weeks for it will take considerable reorganization and detail work that must be attended to before the change can be made, however it can be expected at an early date. It will mean that all advertising copy and news matter must be in the office not later than Tuesday evening, in order that it may be set and made ready to print on Wednesday night.

CROP PROSPECTS GOOD FOR 1926

AVERAGE YIELD OF TWENTY-FIVE BUSHELS ESTIMATED WITH MARKET HOLDING UP STRONG

With a wheat average in the Perryton trade territory, estimated at about 100,000 acres, with an average yield forecasted at around twenty-five bushels per acre, and with prospects good for a strong market, Perryton is looking forward to one of its most prosperous years and probably its best harvest.

The Turkey Red variety of wheat, a hard wheat particularly adapted to the Panhandle, which is grown almost exclusively around Perryton, has had a very favorable winter with much moisture. Drilled into well cultivated land, it has spread and come up very thick. The foliage is especially heavy this year, but the straw seems to be strong enough to hold it up nicely.

The rains during the first part of the week have supplied the growing crop with nearly enough moisture to last until harvest, and with a few more showers a bumper crop will be assured. Although some parts of Beaver County in Oklahoma and the northwestern part of Ochiltree were missed by these showers, yet for the most part the rains were pretty general over the entire section.

Although the crop last year was a total failure, more land was put into wheat this year than ever before in the history of the county, and the prospects for a large yield could not be better.

It is estimated that much of the wheat is going to make between thirty and forty bushels per acre, with the average for the whole trade territory placed at about twenty-five bushels. Authorities have stated that the world's wheat acreage has fallen off three per cent this year, meaning that the market will be some higher.

With the Canadian wheat crop nearly a total failure and the entire northwest suffering from lack of moisture the market is expected to be strong. Should there be a crop failure in the northwest wheat country, the market will probably be much higher than expected. However on the other hand, if they have rain within the next few weeks and a good crop is harvested, the market may fall even below the dollar mark, but it is expected to be somewhere between \$1.00 and \$1.25.

The wheat foliage is a deep green color and is free of all rust and smut. With the growing grain nearly ready to head out, nothing could be prettier than the fields on either side of the road, swaying in the wind.

It is hard to estimate just what the production will be over the entire trade territory, but elevator men are expecting to ship over two million bushels of wheat out of Perryton during the next year.

The Santa Fe is expecting a large crop and already has a large number of wheat cars stored on the sidings, in readiness for the great demand that will be made on cars when the wheat rush comes on.

A large number of combines have been sold this spring by the dealers in Perryton and in addition to the ones already in operation should be able to take care of the crop. Much other machinery has been sold this spring in the form of tractors, headers, and binders, and everything is in readiness for the harvest. From the present prospects, Perryton and vicinity are on the verge of a most prosperous year, and all are looking forward to a wonderful crop and future.

GEO. M. PERRY ELECTED VICE PRESIDENT AT HIGHWAY MEETING LAST WEEK

Jas. W. Wilson and A. J. Kelley, representing the Perryton Chamber of Commerce, attended the eastern division meeting of the Uncle Sam Highway commission which was held Wednesday, May 5, at Vici, Oklahoma.

The purpose of the meeting was to elect officers for the eastern division which includes all town between Perryton and Oklahoma City. Oklahoma State Senator Stanley Shephard, Seiling, Okla., was elected president of the division. Geo. M. Perry, Perryton, was elected vice president, and a Mr. Davis, Seiling, Oklahoma, was made secretary. In addition to these officers, three delegates were appointed at each town in the division to look after the Uncle Sam Highway in their locality.

A wise step was taken in electing Senator Shephard as president of the commission. Being a senator he is in close touch with the Oklahoma State Highway commission and will be able to do a great deal of good in that way. Mr. Davis is a strong booster for good roads and

is a practical road builder. Less of the fact that Mr. Davis was unable to attend the meeting because of his mother's illness, elected to the position of president.

Other business was taken at the meeting, such as the funds to advertise the new Chamber of Commerce at Vici. City informed the meeting the present time they were not people a day over the route.

THINKS MOODY WILL WIN IN FIRST PRIMARY

Austin, Texas, April 27th—Elimination of the need of a second primary is now confidently being predicted at Dan Moody headquarters. As early as March 15, Cato Sells, who was Commissioner of Indian Affairs under the Wilson administration, predicted a "landslide for Moody" with only one primary needed.

Approximately a month later, former Governor O. B. Colquitt, makes the same prediction. Colquitt is a former weekly newspaper editor. He is familiar with the pulse of farms and ranches as well as that of the cities.

L. C. Stewart, of Kirbyville, represented his district three terms in the State Legislature. He gives the result of three polls taken on T. & N. O. railway trains. Of 103 votes, 79 were for Moody. Lynch Davidson had 13, and Mrs. Ferguson 11. The tallies were 38-7-3; 23-4-4, and 18-2-4.

The Herald at Palestine, where Davidson opened his campaign says: "From conversation and observation one is forced to the conclusion that right at this time (April 12), Attorney Dan Moody is the most popular of the candidates in the race for the Governorship of Texas. Things may change before primary day, but the better chance is that Moody is going to continue to gain strength."

The Sherman Daily Democrat says it is against Ferguson but hasn't committed itself yet to Moody or Davidson. It is sport enough, however, to give top position to one of its readers, E. J. Roberts, who in a letter to the editor urges him to "Get on the Moody wagon before it is too late," meaning that there may not be room if that editor delays. Roberts points out that Davidson got only one vote in five in July 1924, and was beaten by both a Klan candidate and a woman.

FORD MAKES NON-STOP ENDURANCE RUN

A non-stop endurance run the equivalent of half way around the world with wide open throttle and three times normal load is obviously a punishing test for any motor, yet that is exactly what happened to a Ford motor recently in the Ford Motor Company Highland Park plant. Although the test was arranged primarily to test a steel formula for use in a part of the motor, it produced results which were most interesting, from the standpoint of engine performance.

Except for the experimental part being tested, the motor was stock, having been picked at random from the motor assembly line. Thus equipped, the motor was coupled to a dynamometer and started. Inasmuch as the trial was devised to wear out the experimental part, all the punishment the motor would withstand under normal conditions was intensified. With throttle wide open, the motor was made to carry a load of about three times as great as that borne by the car under normal driving conditions. Cooling was purposely retarded so that the radiator at all times registered a boiling temperature and the exhaust pipes were constantly red hot.

For seventeen days and nights the motor roared, while Ford engineers awaited the inevitable result. Not to allow any respite from the intense heat, even the oil was changed on the run, the speed was not varied from thirty-six miles per hour and the load was at no time reduced. At the end of 412 hours of this grueling punishment, the motor was stopped and disassembled for inspection.

Examination disclosed that the part to be tested had been burned by the terrific heat. But aside from the experiment part, the motor was practically unaffected and apparently ready to repeat its performance. Some of the results of the experiment are as interesting to the auto-

mobile owner as to the automotive engineer. During the test, the motor ran the equivalent of 14,832 miles and 795 gallons of gasoline were consumed; the average consumption 18½ miles to the gallon notwithstanding the overload and excessive heat. Those fond of figures may be interested in the fact that in the course of the test, each piston moved up and down in its cylinder approximately 38,080,000 times and the crankshaft made an equal number of complete revolutions. Incidentally each piston moved a distance of 4,618 miles, during the trial, or 18,472 miles for the four of them.

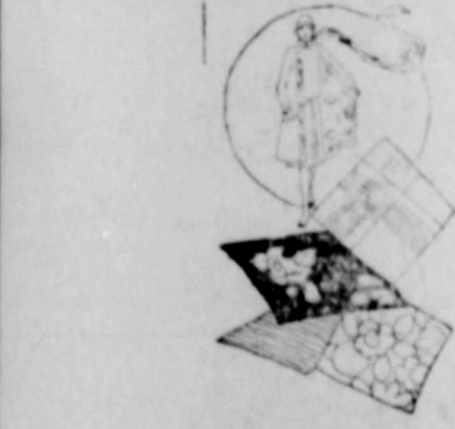

W.T.C.C. CONVENTION NEXT MONTH

AMARILLO NOW MAKING PLANS FOR ENTERTAINING THOUSANDS OF VISITORS

Amarillo, May 20, 1926.—It is now but four weeks until Amarillo will entertain the eight annual convention of West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which takes place here June 21-22-23. Preparations for this mammoth gathering of the West Texas Citizens are being started in earnest with a general program already outlined in its main features—a program that promises, to say the least, the most attractive features of any program yet carried out by the West Texas organization during its annual gatherings.

All the experience that has accrued from seven preceding conventions has been brought to the task of formulating this program. Every feature that has contributed to the success of a past convention has, whenever possible and practicable, been incorporated; and in a like manner every feature that has proved a detriment has been eliminated.

With such a wealth of experience, and with the hospitality and resources that Amarillo has to offer, there is no doubt, it is declared, but what the big gathering will this year prove amply true to expectations.

One of the biggest tasks that confronts the committee in charge of the general arrangements is the problem of properly housing the guests of Amarillo during the three days. "Amarillo is going to take care of her obligation in this respect with the full assurance that every man, woman and child will be accommodated," asserted O. V. Vernon, chairman in charge of housing.

The detail that must be disposed of in the preparations are multitudinous. O. C. Goodwin, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and Board of City Development of the city of Amarillo, and his assistants are being kept strenuously busy in attending to the numerous matters that come up for decision. Homer D. Wade Assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, who has established offices in the Chamber of Commerce here, is giving full co-operation to the local organizations in their work of preparation.

Mr. Wade has announced that the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has secured convention rates, a fare and one-half for the round trip, to apply to the convention here on all railroads in the state. This, it is pointed out, will mean a vast saving to those who attend the big gathering.

One new feature incorporated in to the program of the convention this year is the "My Home Town" declamation contest in which school children, taking the legend above as their subject, will declaim for cash prizes, and loving cups to be awarded by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Information on this contest can be secured from the headquarters of the West Texas organization at Stratford, Texas.

Another feature that has been made paramount in past conventions, is the band contest. Already 40 bands have entered, more than ever before, while it is anticipated that there will be at least 60 before the opening date.

These are but two details out of a mass. To judge from the intense preparations that are being made there will be no lack nor stint of legitimate amusement or profit. Never was greater enthusiasm shown in the development of plans, and never a greater interest displayed in full-

In the Kitchen with 6 Famous Cooks

NOVEL MEXICAN DISHES Pacific Coast Expert Tells How to Prepare Them

(Editor's Note: This is one of an unusual cooking series contributed to this paper by six famous cooks. Cut it out and paste in your cook book.)

Enchiladas, picadillo, Spanish rice, beans a la Ayre, and refritos!

Those words conjure up pictures of most palatable and spicy dishes to the Spaniard. And many an American has fallen for their tempting tooth-someness.

Mrs. Kate Brew Vaughn, home economics director, Los Angeles, and author of several cook books, was taught how to make these dishes by a Mexican lady.



Fragrant and Delicious
Mrs. Vaughn gives the following directions for making enchiladas. The gravy may be made the day before. Its ingredients are: 4 ounces chili peppers, 1½ pounds tomatoes, 2 slices hard toast, 1 small onion, 1 pinch each of clove, thyme, pepper, sugar, and salt.

Open peppers, and if it is not desired very hot, remove veins and seeds. Boil in boiling water about 10 minutes. Skin tomatoes by holding over flame. Put toast and onion through food chopper and then strain all the ingredients in order to make a smooth gravy. Melt two tablespoons shortening in frying pan, add gravy, and simmer slowly until smooth and thick.

Filling for Enchiladas (Picadillo)
1 pound pork
1 tablespoon shortening
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 clove of garlic (chopped)
¼ cup chili sauce
1 tablespoon chopped green olives
1 tablespoon chopped, blanched almonds
1 tablespoon raisins (chopped)
1 teaspoon vinegar
1 pinch salt
1 pinch sugar
1 teaspoon olive oil
Boil pork until tender, then chop fine. Melt shortening and fry pork until brown. Add onion, garlic, and chili sauce, and fry for three minutes. Add olives, almonds, and raisins, and cook two or more minutes. Just before removing, add vinegar, salt, sugar and olive oil.

Make Tortillas, Too
1 quart white flour
1 cup lard
2 teaspoons salt
Enough water or milk to make dough sufficiently thick to roll out like biscuit.
Divide into balls size of turkey egg and pat between the hands until thin and round and cook on top of the stove without grease. After frying, dip in hot gravy, place on plate, and place 1½ tablespoons of filling in center. Roll tortilla loosely and garnish with gravy, grated cheese, sliced onion that has been soaked in salt water a few minutes, a green olive, blanched almond, radish, and a sprig of parsley.

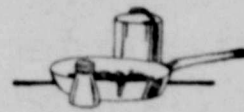
Spanish Rice
1 cup rice
1 tablespoon shortening
1 tablespoon chopped onion
1 clove of garlic
¼ cup tomato sauce
1 quart boiling water
Pepper and salt to taste
Melt the shortening, add the onion, and partially cook, hot allowing to brown. Add to rice and fry until brown. Add the tomato sauce a little at a time, allowing each portion to almost cook dry before adding more. Add the boiling water, do not stir, and allow to simmer slowly until done. If it is necessary to add more water, be sure it is boiling. Do not stir. Requires about 1½ hours of cooking.



Delicious String Beans

Here's a new way to prepare string beans—a la Ayre. Use 1½ pounds string beans or green beans, 1 egg, and 2 teaspoons cornstarch. Cook string beans until tender. Separate into bundles of eight or ten. Make batter by beating whites of eggs until stiff. Add slightly beaten yolks. Continue to beat, adding cornstarch. Place a bundle of beans on a large tablespoon and place in batter, working batter around the beans with the spoon. Fry in hot fat until brown on all sides. Serve with the following sauce:

1 teaspoon shortening
1 teaspoon garlic
1 teaspoon chopped onion
1 small tomato
1 teaspoon cornstarch
salt, pepper, and sugar
Melt shortening in frying pan and cook for a few minutes. Add the tomato chopped fine, and cook until almost dry. Add cornstarch and enough water to make a smooth sauce. Add salt and pepper.



"Pink Beans," Too

"Pink beans" (kidney beans) are very filling. Their Mexican name is "refritos." Take one pound of them, 2 ounces of cheese, and 2 small Mexican sausages. Wash beans well, and cook with enough water to cover well. Boil about 2 hours. When adding more water be sure to add cold. When beans begin to get soft add the salt. When meaty and tender, drain juice from them, setting juice to one side. Melt fat in frying pan. Add cheese and skinned, chopped sausages. Fry one minute, then remove to dish temporarily. In the same frying pan pour beans and fry for three minutes. Mash, add the cheese and sausages, juice from beans, and mix thoroughly. "You will find these dishes very appetizing," Mrs. Vaughn says. (Watch this page next week for another interesting cooking article.)

CONTROLLING CUT WORMS

By R. R. Reppert, Entomologist
Reports from various sections of the state indicate that garden crops are being cut off by cutworms, and as soon as cotton appears, it is almost certain that heavy losses to this crop will occur. We consider the situation as serious.

Cultural measures at this time will be of little avail. Dependence must be placed now in the poison bran mash, made up as follows:

Coarse Wheat bran 25 lbs.
White arsenic or Paris green 1 lb.
Cane or sorghum molasses (avoid corn syrup) 2 qts.
Lemons 6 fruits
Water enough to make a wet mash

that can be readily sown.

Mix the poison thoroughly with the bran. Squeeze the lemons and grind the rinds in a fine meat chopper, and add both to two gallons of water, add to this also the molasses. Now mix the liquid thoroughly with the bran-poison mixture so every particle is wet. The mash should be thoroughly moist, yet so that when sown it readily falls apart.

Application of the Mash—Damage may be expected to crops over patches where weeds or grass were growing just previous to soil preparation, or bordering weedy fence rows. Here it may be well two or three days before the crops appear above ground, to sow the mash broadcast using twenty-five pounds to two or three acres. In case the worms attack the plants after these show above ground whether in garden or field, place about one-fourth tea spoonful of the mash at the base of each plant, or in case of row crops, apply a thin stream of the mash along the rows.

Wingless May Beetles—The same poison bran mash will control the Wingless May Beetle otherwise known as the "Four-o'clock Bug" if sown where they are found doing damage. We anticipate an infestation of these this spring.

Grasshoppers—We do not expect a general heavy infestation of grasshoppers. Sow the bran if they appear.

BLUEWEED ERADICATION PROGRESS

In parts of West and Southwest Texas the Blueweed, a close relative of the common sunflower, becomes a troublesome pest when the land is in cultivation. Experiments were conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, at the Lubbock station 1917 to 1919 looking to the control of this pest and the results were published in Bulletin No. 292. The publication proved very popular

and the edition was quickly exhausted so that it has become necessary to reprint this bulletin and any one interested can secure a copy now by writing Dr. B. Youngblood, Director, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station, Texas.

The experiments showed that the weed propagates itself largely from the under-ground stems which live over from year to year and are very persistent and although the weed produces a large seed crop, the seeds are of very low viability and there does not seem to be very much, if any, reproduction from this source. The test showed conclusively that the Blueweed can be killed out completely in two seasons by plowing at intervals of about two months during the growing season. Plowing seven inches deep proved more efficient than plowing four inches. Listing, or cutting the weed at the surface with a hoe proved less effective as a means of eradication and would require a longer time for eradication than plowing. A combination of deep plowing, another crops and clean-tilled row crops will prove effective on the larger and more thinly infested areas. The badly infested patches should be uncropped and the weed eradicated by more intensive measures. Reports received at the Experiment Station indicate that liberal use is being made in sections of West Texas of the methods of Blueweed eradication described in this Bulletin.

RETAIL CHEVROLET SALES GREATEST IN HISTORY

It has come to me repeatedly that there is current a report that if I should be elected to office of County Judge that I would agitate the immediate building of an expensive court house. I do not know how much a report could become current for the only reason I entered the race was to hold the matter of taxes down until we could get our heads above water. On the campaign I had printed, just after entering the race, the following:

"WE ARE FOR

Reducing all taxable values at least 33 1-3 per cent. Keeping all levies within the constitutional limit. Laying aside all ambitious building programs until we can at least raise a few crops. Reducing expenditures to necessities for administration purposes. Raising the standard of the County to that of the District Court. MAKING NO MORE DEBTS UNTIL WE PAY A PORTION OF WHAT WE ALREADY OWE. Applying business methods to all county business and watching the performance of school district trustees statements of their accounts."

I am not for a bond issue of any kind until the taxpayer shall be in a better position than at present to meet additional burdens. It is my honest judgment that while the present crop, if it makes as it now promises, will be a great relief to many still by the time back interest, delinquent tax judgments and court costs together with the natural expenses attendant on harvesting, marketing and reseeded another crop have been paid, there will be little surplus left in the pocket of the producer. It will take more than one crop like the present to justify additional taxation. country seems to have gone mad on the proposition of debt. Installment buying, liberal borrowing issues and sumptuary legislation all along the line has placed us all in an unenviable position. It is hoped the lessons we have learned in these hard, troublesome years will profit us much in future.

I would not have entered this race but for the fact that men in whose business judgment confidence requested me to, and because I thought from my knowledge of the county affairs of past service, as well as intimate acquaintance with financial conditions generally by contact with people, I could be of real service. If I have been mistaken in this it was an honest mistake. The den of taxation has become a real burden to me personally, having gone from year to year upward and I have been unable to justify it with the tangible results obtained in so far as I am able to gather and understand them.

In conclusion will say that I am not running in the hope of bettering my financial condition. I doubt if the office will do that, but in a sincere hope to make conditions better for the man who pays the bill and in so doing, help myself. It is the duty of every man on election day by his vote to make such a selection for this important office as he would make from the available candidates to manage, control and take care of his own personal affairs. I do not believe that the voter wants to be fair has the right to use care and business precautions in selecting those who will handle his personal business affairs, and then on the slightest pretext or whim select for the management, control and handling of public affairs a man or men that he would not turn his own personal business to. If he does, he has either purposely or otherwise done his neighbor as well as himself injustice. If this is not logic and common sense then we invite some one to point out to us our error.

One other thing, that is, the matter of prohibition is being worked over time by opponents different candidates in this race, the proposition being that if a man does not believe in the law will not enforce it. In so far as this argument may be applied to the office of the County Judge, I say to you that the County Judge, nor the court over which he presides, has any jurisdiction either enforce or not enforce this law. Not a single crime that can be committed under the prohibition law of Texas could ever come before the county court of this or any other county in Texas. The "Dean Law" which is the prohibition law of Texas, makes every offense defined by the law and punishable thereunder of the grade of felony of which only the District Court has or could have jurisdiction. The opinion of the County Judge of this, or any other county in this state has no to do with the efficient enforcement or non-enforcement of this law, than his opinion on the question of graduated tariffs.

We have no ax to grind, no fence to build, we are not asserting we need the office and if the office, in your opinion, does not need us, then select the man that the office does need and in so doing discharge a duty that rests upon every good citizen. A Christian citizenship if it shall endure, establish and maintain efficient government among men wherein it may carry on its work in orderly fashion.
