## 4-H Fat Stock Show Opened Today

### Heaviest Snow In Years Blankets Entire County

#### Fall Estimated At Near Twelve Inches All Told

Moisture Content Totaled .71 Inches According To Government Figures

This section was visited Monday evening and night by one of the heaviest snows in years, when the fall was estimated at about twelve inches.

The clouds were overcast all day Monday, following a severe sand-storm Sunday night. Spits of snow fell throughout the morning, increasing as the day wore on. Until about midnight, however, the snow melted as it fell.

Shortly after dusk the air was filled with large heavy flakes, and within a few minutes the ground was entirely covered. There was no let-up for some two or three hours, when the snow reached its maximum depth. The moisture amounted to a total of .71 inches.

### Five More Men To Be Called To Service April 2

A call was issued this week by the Local Draft Board, which will induct five more Dawson County men into military service. While the call includes six men, only five will be taken, with the sixth serving as an alternate. The order follows:

The following men have been notified of selection by the Lamesa Draft Board for service in the United States Army. Notice has been sent to six men, but the last man on the list is an alternate and will not be called unless one of the men ahead of him is disqualified for some reason. Also if we should have some one or more selectees transferred to this local board from some other board for induction, they would take the place of the last men on this list. However, we would have to receive this transfer before the order to report for induction is mailed out which is from five to seven days before the time set to leave for induction.

### Air Training Base Sites Are Inspected But No Location Yet Announced

It Is Reported That Local Sites Are Favorably Received, But Nothing Definite Announced

Wednesday afternoon no definite information had been released in Lamesa in regard to the location of a primary training base for Flying cadets.

Sites have been made available by local citizens, and one inspection trip has already been made on these. Indications are that these were favorable, but nothing definite has been given out.

The base, as explained before, requires one tract of 640 acres and two others of not less than 250 acres each. It is understood that these are not to cost the people of Lamesa anything, but all expense will be borne by the government.

It is understood that the project will be speeded ahead as rapidly as possible, as it is due to be in operation not later than June 1st, and

More than \$25,000 of the total amount has already been subscribed and paid in, it was announced.

### Many Vehicles Remain To Be Registered Here

According to Buster Herndon, County Tax Assessor and collector, only five hundred automobiles have been registered in Dawson County for 1941, up until Tuesday of this week.

This leaves in the neighborhood of twenty-five hundred to be registered before April 1st, the deadline, if they are to be registered without penalty.

"We can handle the cars if the people will cooperate with us," Mr. Herndon stated. "Those who can possibly do so, will be doing us, as well as themselves, a decided favor, if they will register at the earliest possible moment, as there is bound to be a great rush at the last minute."

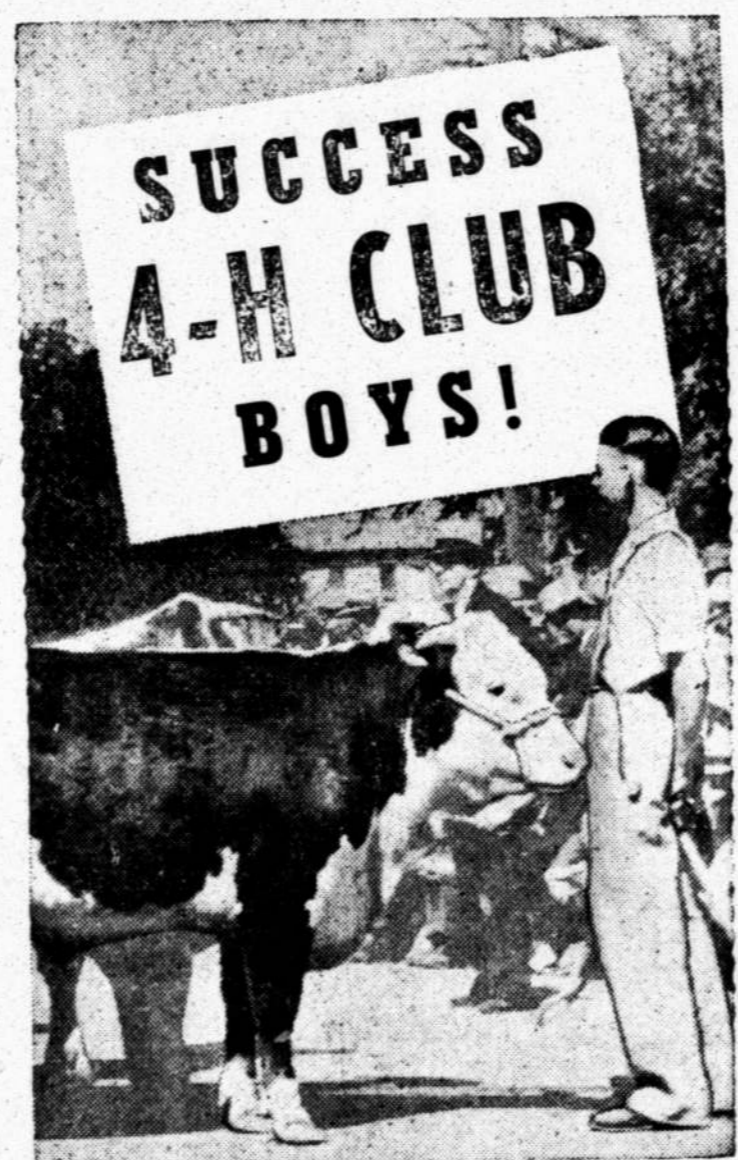

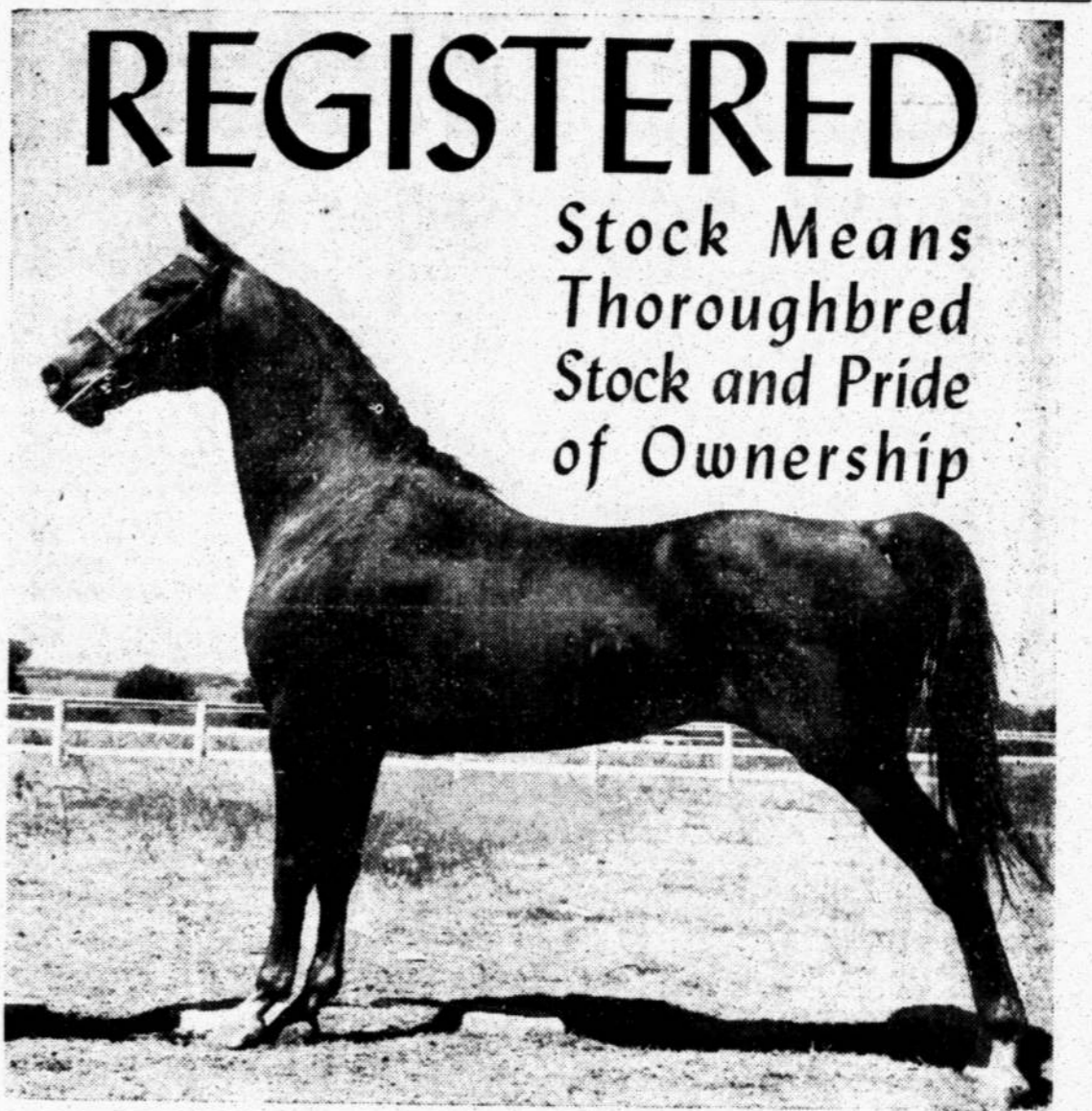

## More Questions Answered On 1941 Cotton Program

Business men and farmers alike will benefit under the supplementary cotton program. In a late interpretation of the regulations, it has been determined that in case the operator or owner is interested in more than one farm not all the farms must earn cotton stamps to be eligible for payment, however, to be eligible none of the farms may overplant the cotton allotment.

Cotton producers in determining whether they will reduce and earn the \$25.00 may first consider the following question: May I expect to net 10c per pound on the cotton produced in 1941?

In the last of the question and answer series this week, the AAA

official discusses how to use the cotton order stamps.

**How To Use Cotton Order Stamps**

26. Q. After the cotton farmer has been given cotton stamps for voluntarily reducing cotton acreage under the Supplementary Cotton Program, what can he do with them?

A. He can use them in any co-operating retail store or mail order house, in exchange for new products made entirely in the United States and entire from cotton fiber produced in the United States. Bindings, buttons and other fasteners and trimmings shall not be considered in determining whether such a commodity is made entirely of cotton.

27. Q. How will he know whether a store is cooperating in the program?

A. By asking within the store. However, experience of the Department of Agriculture with a similar program, the Cotton Stamp Plan, shows that nearly every retail store which sells cotton goods does cooperate. Most cooperating stores will display signs announcing their acceptance of cotton order stamps.

28. Q. Can purchases be made by mail?

A. Stores which qualify under special Surplus Marketing Administration mail order regulations will be authorized to accept cotton stamps on orders sent by mail, in addition to their authority to receive cotton order stamps on over-the-counter transactions.

29. Q. What are some of the cotton products that can be bought with cotton stamps?

A. Cotton piece goods, dresses, shirts, sheets, pants, overalls, children's and infant's clothes, underwear, mattresses, blankets, work gloves, plowlines, stockings, and any other cotton products.

30. Q. May cotton stamps be used to buy second-hand clothes or renovated mattresses?

A. No. Cotton stamps may be used only to buy new products which are made entirely of cotton.

31. Q. Will persons using cotton stamps get the same cotton products as persons who pay cash?

A. Yes, and at the same price.

32. Q. May retail merchants give change to customers using cotton stamps?

A. No.

33. Q. Since merchants cannot give change and since cotton stamps are printed only in 25-cent denominations, what is done when the price of the cotton goods purchased does not come out exactly to 25 cents, 50 cents, or some multiple of 25?

A. Suppose the purchase price is 60 cents. (1) The customer could give two cotton stamps representing 50 cents to the merchant and pay the additional 10 cents in cash, or (2) the purchaser could give the merchant three cotton order stamps representing 75 cents and buy some other cotton goods product that costs 15 cents, or (3) the customer could give three cotton order stamps representing 75 cents to the merchant and receive from the merchant a credit slip for 15 cents which could be used later for the purchase of cotton goods at the same store.

34. Q. Will retail stores accept cotton stamps that have been taken out of the stamp book?

A. No. Cotton stamps must be taken out of the stamp books at the time the purchase is made — except when sent with an order for cotton products to a store qualified to accept cotton order stamps by mail.

35. Q. May anyone other than the person to whom the cotton stamps are issued use them?

A. The person to whom the stamps are issued signs his name on the stamp book. Then, only the person to whom the stamps are issued or a member of his family may take the book to the retail store and exchange the stamps for cotton products. If the retail merchant or clerk does not know the person who brings in the book, he is required to have the person identify himself.

36. Q. May cotton stamps be sold or traded?

A. No. They can be used only to buy cotton or cotton products and only by the person or families to whom they are issued. Any person or any retail merchant who misuses the cotton order stamps will be subject to penalties imposed by Federal Law.

37. Q. May cotton stamps be used to pay outstanding bills or accounts? Or may the stamps be used in connection with a "lay away plan" or other installment buying?

A. No.

38. Q. May cotton stamp books be left with the retail merchant, or signed over to a merchant or landlord?

A. No. Stamp books must be kept by the person to whom they are issued for his use as he sees fit in connection with the exchange of stamps for cotton goods.

39. Q. Can cotton stamps be used to repay advances made against the crop, the landlords share of the crop, or other indebtedness?

A. No.

40. Q. Must the entire amount of stamps be used at any one time?

A. No. One stamp or all stamps may be used at any one time, or over a period of time, until the total amount of stamps has been exchanged for cotton goods.

41. Q. How can retail stores be designated to receive cotton stamps from farmers in exchange for cotton goods?

A. Retailers handling cotton goods who wish to share in this new business should file with the nearest Surplus Marketing Administration office a statement of intention to take part in the program and to observe the regulations under which it operates. (Experience under the Food and Cotton Stamp Plan shows that practically all retailers co-operate willingly in surplus removal programs of the Department of Agriculture.)

42. Q. What is meant by this "new business?"

A. The 25 million dollars worth of cotton stamps which farmers can earn under the Supplementary Cotton Program will be placed as an "order" in regular channels of trade. From 75,000 to 100,000 bales of cotton will be required in making the cotton goods to fill this order. The larger share of each dollar spent for cotton goods, however, goes to employ labor and to pay other costs in manufacture, transportation, handling and selling of cotton products. The program, therefore, will benefit not only farmers, but labor and industry as well.

43. Q. How does the retailer receive payment for the face value of the stamps he accepts in exchange for merchandise?

A. Retailers may file proper

claims for payment, supported by stamps, direct with offices of the Surplus Marketing Administration, (names and places of which will be made public). Wholesalers with whom retailers are accustomed to do business, or banks cooperating in the program, may also act as agents for retailers in presenting such claims to the Surplus Marketing Administration. (Experience under the Food and Cotton Stamp Plan shows that payments normally are made within two to five days after claims are presented. Bankers throughout the country, where the food and cotton stamp plans are in operation, have agreed unanimously to act as agents in presenting the stamps for payment. Their full cooperation has meant much to the success of the program.)

## Snyder Roads To Get Topping

Scurry County emerged Wednesday with a lion's share of asphalt coating work in this section of West Texas, as a result of new lettings announced by the State Highway Commission.

New lettings for the commission's 1941 program in Scurry County calls for temporary top on Highway 15 west from Snyder to the Borden County line. No topping work was announced from the overpass, south east of town, eastward to the Fisher County line, since dirt work is not yet finished in all details.

New asphalt coating for Highway 7, from a point northwest of Hermleigh through Snyder, and on to the Garza County line was also announced Wednesday as a commission letting.

Cheering news for the motorists of Scurry and adjacent counties was provided in the form of an announcement that the entire stretch of Highway 101 from a point one mile southeast of Snyder south to Dunn and on to the Mitchell county line will receive attention soon. Work order for additional dirt work on Highway 101, between Snyder and Dunn, is expected to be received within the next few days, highway commission attaches state. —Scurry County Times.

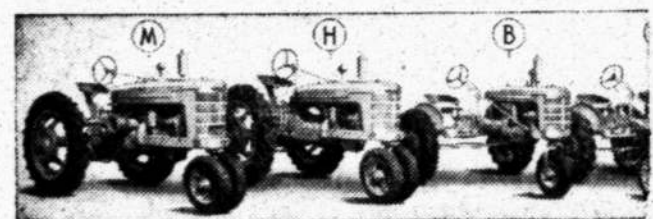

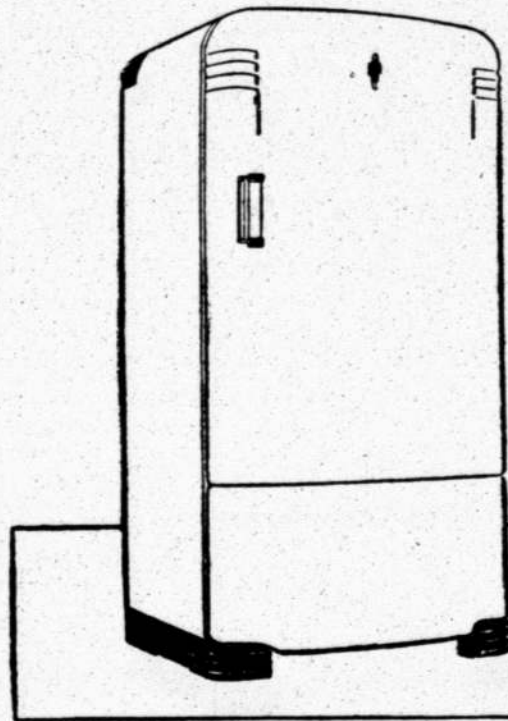

### SHUMAKE HOME DEMONSTRATION CLUB REPORT

When the Shumake Home Demonstration Club met in the home of Mrs. W. A. Tennyson March 11, Miss Phenix gave a demonstration on quilts and spreads.

Use only good materials and cut each piece on the straight of the material to keep the quilt blocks accurate and prevent stretching and puckers when sewing the pieces together. A piece of fine sand paper is a great help in keeping the material from slipping when cutting the pieces for the quilt blocks. Soft harmonizing colors were suggested in piecing quilt tops. Quilts that are to be used as spreads should be larger in size, but lighter in weight than the ones used for cover. When quilting the stitches should be uniform and the edges turned over and either neatly whipped or stitched on the bottom side of the quilt. After the quilt is finished the bottom should be just as pretty as the top.

Some useful hints were given on how to make Cundelwick spread by Miss Phenix. Everyone enjoyed seeing the spreads and quilt blocks and no doubt many new ideas will be used in making quilts and spreads as a result of this demonstration.

We invite all who are interested in this kind of work to come and either visit or join our Club when it meets, March 25 in the home of Mrs. Dan Hall. "How Laundry Fabrics, stain removal, dry cleaning and pressing, and equipment for successful laundry and pressing will be the subjects studied at our next meeting."

### LET'S COVER THE BEDS

"Bedspreads are used to protect the bed and add beauty to the bedroom," said Miss Phenix at the Key Home Demonstration Club meeting held in the home of Mrs. Earl Calhoun Monday afternoon March 17. "If used for protection, it should be closely woven and easily laundered. If for beauty, look for design and blending of colors in the bedroom. The oldest spreads are quilts and if used as such, strive for creative designs and works of art."

Humble maids, austere nuns, grand dames and stately queens; all have shared in the fascination of the quilter's art and have contributed to its advancement. It has figured in many a thrilling episode. **Basketball Set-up Will Be Changed In Texas In '42**

According to a reorganization plan announced by R. J. Kidd, athletic director of the Texas Interscholastic League, the league's basketball set-up in the future will be modeled on the football league.  
 Three state tournaments will be conducted each year, one for Class AA schools (over 500 enrollment), one for Class A schools (200 to 500 enrollment) and one for Class B schools (less than 200 enrollment).  
 The State will be divided into 16 Class AA districts, 32 Class A districts and 64 Class B districts. Eight teams from each class will participate in the State tournaments, presumably at Austin. Class A teams will play to district and bi-district championships, while the other two will follow the present play of district and regional play.  
 Assignment of teams to districts is being completed and will be announced within a few days. Whether district championships are to be determined by tournaments or round robin play has not been announced.

**County Officers In New Offices**

Henry Norris, County Superintendent, is now situated in his new offices, directly across the hall from his former place in the court house.  
 "We have been moved about two weeks, and are now about straightened up to where we know about where everything is," Norris stated.

This allows more room for County Judge Adcock, as well as making his set-up a great deal more convenient.
