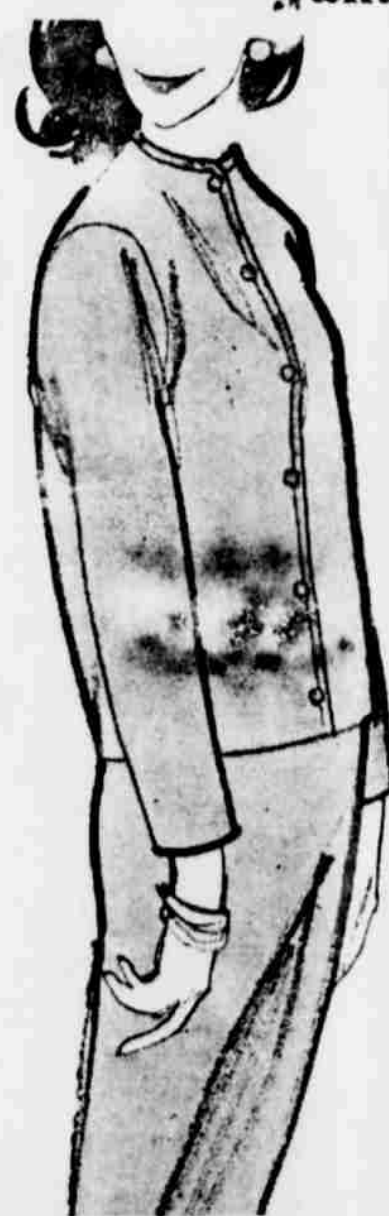

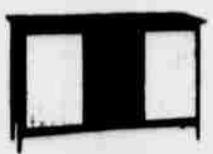

He said it was not an "Alcatraz", but a place where the boys with more problems can be given special attention. At the same time, their influence is removed from the younger boys.

But the expert warned that Texas needs a place for boys who are dependent and neglected, but not yet delinquent, to save them from becoming delinquent.

Too many boys who belong in foster homes are being committed to schools for delinquents, giving them an undeserved stigma, MacCormick said.

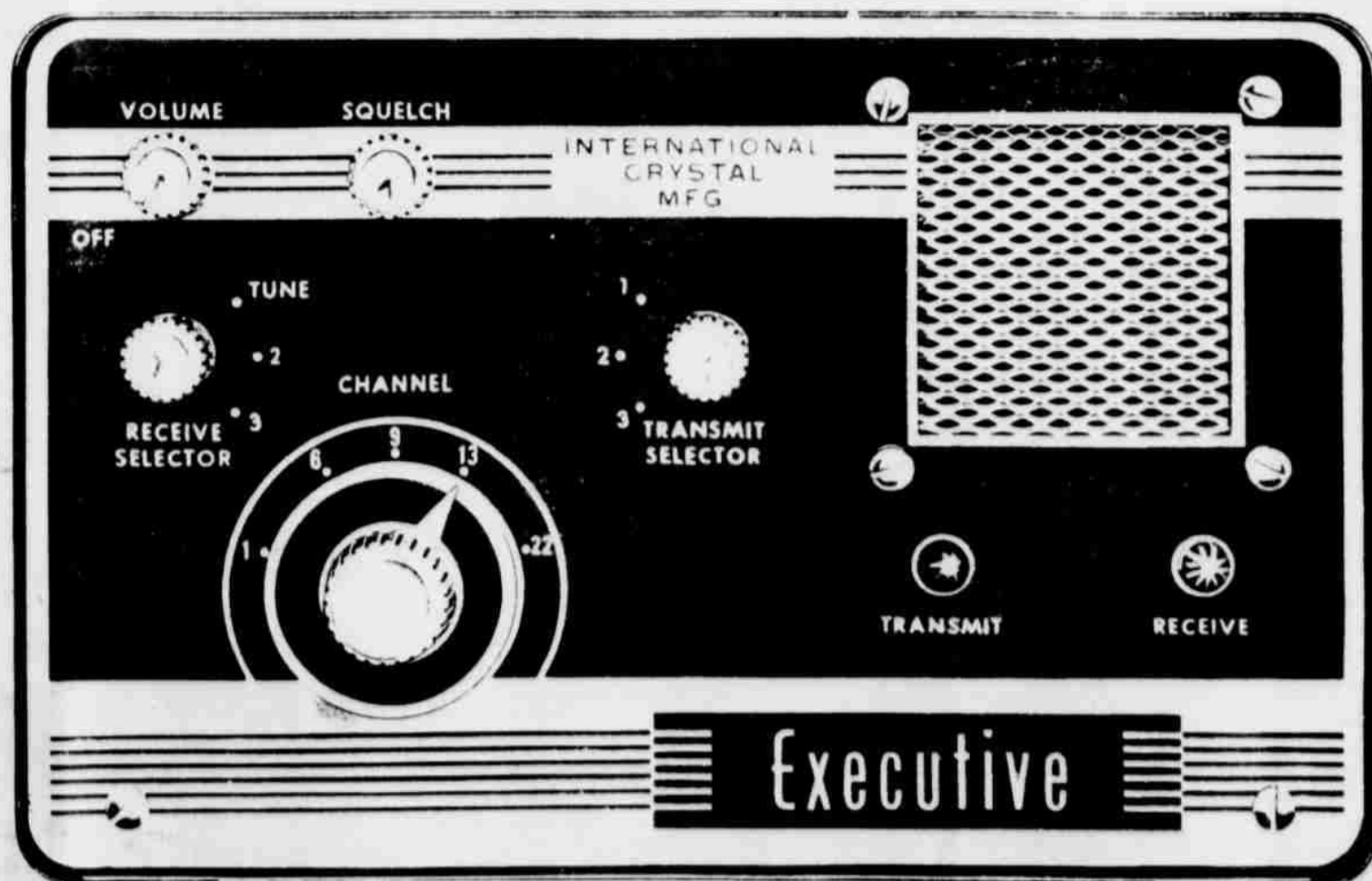

immunization stations.

Three doses of the vaccine are necessary and the dates of the other two Sunday programs will be announced later.

"While there has been a dramatic decline in the number of cases of paralytic polio," Dr. Stafford said, "the disease is not yet defeated. In the United States, there were more than 1500 cases of polio in 1961. More than 800 of these suffered either death or some sort of paralysis from the disease."

"The Sabin vaccine may be the final answer to the fight against this dreaded disease. The vaccine is easy to administer -- no injection; it provides rapid action -- in about one week, and it helps break the chain of transmission by stimulating intestinal resistance to future infection."

"Recent licensing of the Type III vaccine," he added "means that the possibility of wiping out polio as a threat to our children or to their parents is closer than ever before. We have the tools. Now it's up to the community to use them."

Polio is caused by any one of the three types of virus. The government last year licensed an oral vaccine against Types I and II and recently granted a license for distribution of oral vaccine against Type III. 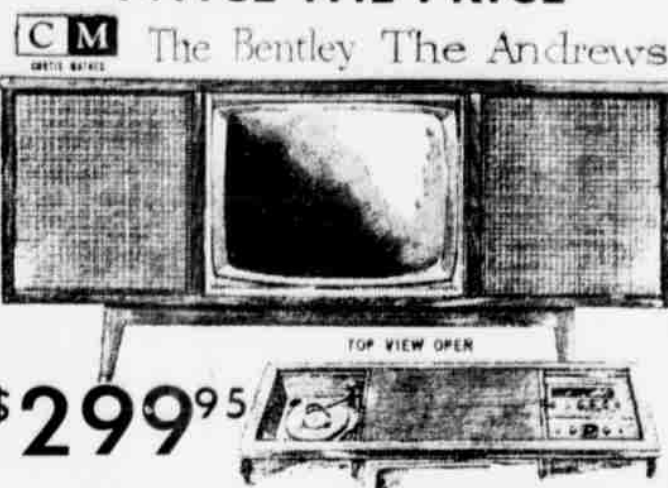

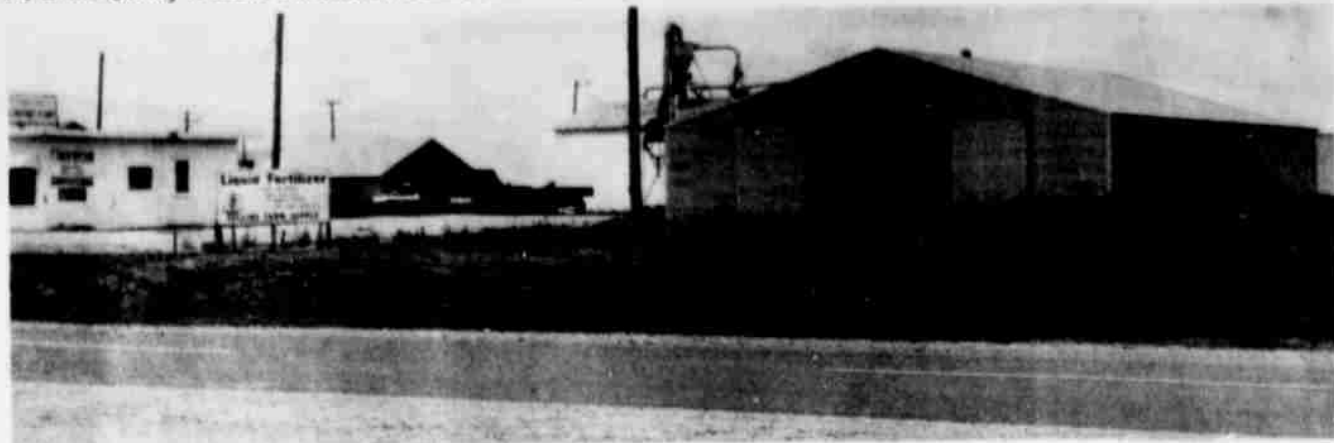

Four years after his first ultimatum to the Western Powers to get out of West Berlin within six months, Khrushchev, in a specially belligerent note has charged the West with fomenting incidents at the Wall and threatened again to sign a treaty with East Germany to "end the occupation regime in West Berlin."

Incidents have increased at the Wall, notably murders of those seeking freedom, over it, under it and even through it. And the Allies do bear the responsibility -- of letting it stand.

President Kennedy received permission Monday to call into active service another 150,000 ready reservists and national guardsmen. He also said he wasn't sure that he would have to call them, but wanted the right to in the event it was necessary.

Here in Littlefield a pound of butter is selling for about 80 cents a pound. In Russia it would cost \$15.20 a pound. I don't eat butter but I am sure glad I don't live in Russia.
