BRIDGEMAN AND CECIL GO TO LONDON FOR CONFERENCE

(By Associated Press)
GENEVA, Switzerland, July 18.—A sensation was caused here late today by the official announcement that Earl Cecil, member of the British delegation to the tripartite naval conference, will return to London tonight and W. C. Bridgeman, head of the British delegation, tomorrow, for the purpose of consulting with the British cabinet and elucidating the British position at the naval conference.

Captain Edgerton of the British delegation also will return.

The journey to England will mean several days' suspension of the naval conference.

Others To Remain
The British declined any further statement except to say that the remainder of the delegation will stay on in Geneva.

It is believed here that the London consultation was considered necessary because of the serious issues with which the British representatives view the problem of the size of secondary cruisers and the calibre of their armament.

The American delegation is contending for the right to build large size secondary cruisers capable of supporting eight inch guns to which the British are opposed.

BUCS GO HARD TO ANNEX TWO FROM PHILLIES

HARTNETT'S HOMER AID CUB WIN BUT GIANTS TAKE SECOND

(By Associated Press.)
The Pittsburgh Pirates today were again on top of the National League by the narrowest of margins over the Chicago Cubs who took the lead they took from the Cardinals earlier in the month.
Chicago managed to get an even break with the Giants yesterday but that wasn't enough for a club with championship aspirations. Meanwhile the Pirates were avenging a double defeat at the hands of Philadelphia. Donie Bush's club drove Tony Kuffnaut off the mound in the third inning of the opener and won 9 to 7. In the second the Pirates pounded Ferguson out and snatched a 6 to 5 win, although the Phillies rallied with three runs in the ninth.

Cubs Break Even
Gabby Hartnett's home run in the tenth inning of the first game gave the Cubs a 6-4 margin on the Giants but the New Yorkers beat Charlie Ross in the next game, 6 to 3. Harper clinched the contest with a homer in the seventh.

Hughie Critz was almost the whole show at Boston in Cincinnati's 2 to 1 victory over the Braves in 10 innings. The Reds' second baseman drove in two runs and scored another on a home run.

Brooklyn and St. Louis were halted by rain.

George Sisler hit a home run with the bases loaded in the ninth at St. Louis but the Yankees beat the Browns nevertheless, 10 to 6. Lay Gehrig took the home run lead away from Babe Ruth by knocking out of Sportsman's park in the eighth. Gehrig now has 31 homers on his list, one more than Ruth.

Red Sox on Rampage
The lowly Boston Red Sox went on a batting rampage in their first game of their double header with Cleveland, pounding four Indian pitchers for a 14 to five lacing. Cleveland stood the Carrigans on their heads in the second, winning 4 to 6.

Sam Gibson shaded Lefty Grove in a pitching duel at Detroit and the Tigers beat Philadelphia, 5-3. Fothergill's home run in the first inning with two on really won the game.

The Chicago White Sox were easy for Irving Hadley, Washington's rookie pitcher from Birmingham. Hadley turned in a five to one victory for Washington, the Sox getting their lonesome tally in the ninth. Ted Blankenship was hit hard.

TECH ATHLETIC SHARKEY SAYS STAFF WILL BE 'SNEAK PUNCH' REORGANIZED IS ONLY FEAR

VICTOR PAYNE, RECENT ADDITION, TO AID WITH FOOTBALL

Following the selection of Victor Payne, Jr., last week as a member of the athletic staff of the Texas Technological college, Coach E. V. Freeland today announced a complete re-organization of the staff for the coming year of competition.

Continuing their football work, Freeland and assistant coach Grady Higginbotham will direct the eleven. They will also be aided by Payne who has had considerable coaching experience with grid teams.

Mid-Winter Football
Following the close of the football season Payne will be in charge of the basketball squad and Freeland and Higginbotham will hold a mid-winter football training period for recruits and veterans for the next fall.

Higginbotham, who has seen service in the "big show," will direct the drafting of the baseball team in the spring while Payne will have charge of the cinder path squad. Freeland will attend to the administrative duties of the staff during the spring and summer and plan for the coming season.

"Vic" Payne, as he is affectionately called by his admirers, is very highly recommended by Freeland and he places much confidence in the new coach's ability to turn out winning teams. Payne was a stellar performer in his scholastic and athletic career and saw much service in practically every branch of sport.

Star Abilene Athlete

He was for four years a star athlete of Abilene high school. He was captain of the football team and basketball team and a member of the track team. He played football on the eleven, guard in basketball, first base in baseball and was a weight man on the track team. Leaving high school he entered Simmons and continued his brilliant performances. He was captain two years of the football team, playing guard, tackle, and half; he was captain of the basketball team one year and selected as all T.I.A.A. guard; on the diamond he played catcher, first base and right field; in track he was weight man. With the outbreak of the World War he enlisted and served as a second lieutenant.

Entering school after the war he played end and half at Bethany college in West Virginia. He was a member of the team which won a 12-0 victory over Ohio state, met the Army, Navy, Washington and Jefferson, Carnegie Tech, Marietta, Georgetown and other larger schools of the north and east.

Leaving school he came to Abilene Christian college as head coach in 1923 and placed winning teams in every branch of sport. His eleven lost only three games in the two years he was coach. He accepted a position as co-coach with Shotwell at Simmons in 1925 and then later made director when Shotwell resigned. Since then his teams have been champions of the Texas conference in football and track.

Preparations are going forward for a large enrollment for the fall training camp which opens here September 6. Coach Freeland said today.

Bridges To Confer With Simmons Heads

ABILENE, July 19 (AP)—Frank Bridges, former Baylor University coach who was recently appointed director of the Olympic club, San Francisco, met here Monday evening with the Simmons university board of trustees at the board's request.

RUMOR OF DEMPSEY'S ARM INJURY SAID INCORRECT

(By Associated Press.)
NEW YORK, July 19.—The only thing Jack Dempsey fears in his battle with Jack Sharkey Thursday night at the Yankee Stadium is that the former champion may pull a "sneak punch," as his manager calls it, or in plainer terms, land a lucky blow.

Sharkey himself dismisses the idea with a gesture. He is confident Dempsey won't be able to slip anything over at any time. He feels that he will be ready to meet the ex-title holder on any terms or in any style of fighting. But his manager, Johnny Buckley, doesn't want any chances overlooked.

Too Much Confidence

"I don't want Jack to be too confident," Buckley declared today. "The only thing he has to fear is that Dempsey may slip one through a sneak punch. A lot of things can happen in the ring but I don't see how Sharkey can fail to win by a knock out, any way you figure the two Jacks is younger, stronger, faster and more accurate, if not a harder hitter than Dempsey."

A Profession

Pioneer practitioners of the den-
tal trade were called tooth car-
penters, and they functioned more
in the bungling manner of barn
raisers than in the precise style of
the skilled cabinet maker.

Their was crude work, if ever
crude work were done.

In the social scale, the early den-
tist was ranked perhaps above the
rattlesnake medicine peddler, but
never was he such a figure in the
community as the horse doctor.
The dentist then had to apologize
for his calling. He was browbeat-
en by the ordinary run of pill doc-
tors, he could not gain admittance
to the semi-sacred gatherings of
the country medical associations, and
his existence was a sorry one in-
deed.

Of late years the trade has been
picking up. The Carnegie Founda-
tion for the Advancement of
Teaching now reports that there is
one dentist to every 1750 or so pos-
sible patients, while the run-of-the-
milline physicians number one to ev-
ery 750 potential customers, and the
percentages are gradually becom-
ing more nearly equal.

The pioneer attitude towards
tooth carpentry was more or less
mechanical. You waited till you
had a toothache, and then went in
to suffer. You waited till your
teeth broke down, and then you
went in to the shop for repairs—
bridge work, shaving, scaffolding,
abutments, falsework, masonry or
superstructure. Now, there is such
a thing as preventive dentistry.
You go to the dentist's twice a
year and literally stop the tooth-
ache before it happens.

The big gain in prestige for
dentistry has come through the
discovery that all sorts of maladies
are traceable to bad teeth. Kidney
trouble, rheumatism, heart failure
—these and other maladies, appar-
ently in no way related to the
mouth, were traced to tooth decay,
and with this discovery, the high
hat pill doctor found that it was
necessary for him to call dentists
in consultation.

The natural corollary to this is
that the dentist has had to become
more than a carpenter with some
knowledge of sawing, mining, mas-
onry and general blacksmithing.
He must now go to college and not
just serve an apprenticeship. He
must know anatomy, and he must
know materia medica. Anesthetics
and the X-Ray are now a profes-
sional man who can hold his own
with the pill rollers in any Rotary
Club of the country.

Appearance

Civic pride is demonstrated in
many ways but in none is it re-
flected in a more appreciated and
commendable manner than clean-
liness.

Is a stranger visiting Lubbock
for the first time asked what
feature of the place made the most
pleasing appeal, if possible, he
would directly say cleanliness, for
he would well know that no greater
compliment could be paid and that
such a compliment would be ap-
preciated. The stranger visiting
Lubbock particularly notes the ap-
pearance of the streets, the lawns
and vacant lots, just as upon in-
troduction to a person one natu-
rally is attracted or repelled by per-
sonal appearance. In like manner is
the visitor impressed by the out-
ward and visible signs of the place.

Few cities, if any, are financially
able to employ sufficient force to
keep the place clean and free from
rubbish, bits of paper and refuse
of various kinds which are so often
thoughtlessly thrown in the streets
and on the lawns, the appearance
of which can but impress both the
visitor and the resident in an un-
desirable way. While the city can-
not be expected to do all this work,
the individual can do it with prac-
tically a minimum of effort, and
with additional care to refrain in
the first instance from making
such a condition impossible, a scrup-
ulously clean place will be the
result, of which every citizen may
be justly proud.

An unclean appearance is a re-
proach to the city and whether you
want to share in that reproach or
not, it will fasten on you if that
uncleanliness prevails in that part
of Lubbock in which you live.
Obey that impulse and do it now.

EX-SENATOR OWEN RE-
PLIES TO DAWES SLAP AT
MALIGNED PRIMARY LAW

WASHINGTON, July 19.—It's
cheaper to buy a political conven-
tion than a whole state.
This indubitable fact may not be
foremost in the minds of those who
would abolish the popular primary,
but the defenders of popular govern-
ment do not hesitate to assert that
it is the principal inspiration of the
anti-primary movement.

Former Senator Robert L. Owen
of Oklahoma, president of the Na-
tional Popular Government League,
who recently went after Vice Pres-
ident Dawes for his attack on the
primary system, insists that the
whole thing boils down to a matter
of economical corruption and says
he can prove it.

"We've seen them buy conven-
tions, legislatures and primaries,"
Owen told your correspondent the
other day. "It only cost about \$100,
000 to get a Senate seat for Lorimer,
but cost Smith and Vane ten times
as much."

Owen is among those who favor
making it harder to buy high offices
rather than easier. He believes,
however, that Vice President
Dawes is perfectly honest in his
views and has only been misled
by his friends.

THE VALUE OF THE FLIGHTS

The year 1927 undoubtedly will go
down as having marked the great-
est forward stride in aviation.
The Atlantic has been crossed
twice and a third plane is on its
way. The hop to Hawaii has been
accomplished.

Some skeptics may see no prac-
tical advantage in these accom-
plishments. It is true that it will
be a long time before such ocean
flights will be every day affairs.
But the value of the feats of
Lindbergh, Chamberlin, Levine,
Matthew, Hegenberger and Byrd
does not lie so much in the fact
that they have proved the flights
possible as in the measure in which
they have aroused interest in avia-
tion.

The attention of the whole world
has been fixed on flying and the
public sentiment thus awakened is
bound to give aviation an impetus
not even second to that given it by
the great war, in which flying first
began to come into its own.

And the United States, which has
heard itself constantly chided for
its backwardness in the develop-
ment of the use of the airplane, is
justified in the pride it feels in
the fact that all the ocean liners
are Americans.—Kansas City Post.

CARE IN DRIVING CARS

The increasing number of fatal-
ities from automobile accidents is
such as warrants all drivers to ex-
ercise extreme care. Almost every
night in fifteen minutes time one
can count a half dozen cars on the
streets without lights. Many have
no tail-lights. Cars and other ve-
hicles left in the streets or on the
highways account for a large num-

IN NEW YORK SEE-SAWING and BROADWAY

NEW YORK, July 19.—That par-
ticular hollow-square in the heart
of the Wall Street district, where
European passports are issued, now
begins to resemble Broadway on
the night of a big winter premiere.

and ink speed limit until after clos-
ing time.

recently made her maiden voyage,
are "sidewalk shops" in imitation

places. While riding home it be-
came possible to catch up on all
the shopping neglected in Paris.

This ship also has a built-in
playground for children that in-
cludes a merry-go-round. There
are "sidewalk cafes" to give the
atmosphere of the Paris streets and
the "largest dining room afloat,"
which accommodates 600 persons.

There is a church chapel two decks
in height. Paintings of the Paris
ultra-modern artists decorate the
rooms. Twin beds take the place
of berths and lacquer and gold
decorate the salons. There is a
waterway along which boats can
be towed and a shooting gallery to
keep wives in practice in case they
hear reports of hubby's goings on
when they return from abroad.
There is a room done in marble
from the Pyrenees. All lighting is
indirect.

This is but a sample of the fu-
ture of traveling. Comfort and
grandeur heretofore unknown upon
the sea is planned and one skips
about the world now-a-days as
though in a floating hotel. There
are those who still insist on the
sense of really being at sea and
haunt the small ships for their at-
mosphere.

New York is cluttered with per-
ennial travelers. There are certain
men who go abroad with as little
preparation as salesmen who jump
between Chicago and Manhattan.
And there are employees of cer-
tain ships who know most of the
famous ones of the world through
ship contact.

On the Leviathan there is a chief
steward who greets a dozen celebri-
ties by their first names and who
can tell you all about royalty, mil-
lionaires, heiresses and dignitaries.
He has handled them by the thou-
sands, seen their shipboard rom-
ances come and go, watched them
in their unconventional moments,

Battle Continues As Talk Of Labor

WASHINGTON, July 19.—The fighting at Central Nicaragua, where 200 followers of General Somoza were reported killed, continued today to be the subject of agitation at the convention of the Pan-American Federation of Labor, despite the explanation from the state department that the American forces involved were the objects of attack by bandits.

Coincident with receipt of official report from Rear Admiral Solles, commanding American naval detachments in Central American waters, advising the conduct of the marines and the Nicaraguan government troops engaged, delegates from the Central American republics drew up a resolution at the labor congress asking that organization to go on record against the presence and activities of the United States marine corps in Nicaragua. The resolution urged President Coolidge to order American withdrawal immediately.

Malt Situation Here Is Studied By Iowa Lawyer

Studying the situation developing from an edict recently issued in Lubbock county which labels the sale of malt extract as generally unlawful here, M. J. Donnelly, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, legal advisor to the National Malt Products association of Chicago, spent yesterday afternoon in Lubbock talking with store-keepers and county officials.

Mr. Donnelly is particularly interested in a new law recently issued in Lubbock which included the sale of a quantity of malt extract. As legal representative of the malt association, Mr. Donnelly has represented sellers of malt extract in Michigan, Kentucky, Missouri, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Washington, D. C., North Dakota, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, Pennsylvania, Oklahoma, Alabama and other states.

Mr. Donnelly has been legal counsel for the malt makers for the past ten years. He was accompanied here by J. C. Spaeth and L. J. Otto, both of Dallas, representatives of the Premier Malt Products company.

TRIAL OF SUIT IS RESTRAINED

TRIAL JUDGE MAY NOT BE QUALIFIED, HIGH COURT RULES

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, July 19.—The supreme court today issued an order restraining trial of a suit of H. H. and C. D. Lennox against the Texas Farm Bureau association, pending in Red River county until the higher court decides a question of disqualification involving Judge R. J. Williams, before whom the case originally was pending.

Williams disqualified himself because he is related "in the third degree" to officials in the Farm Bureau and Judge P. G. Blackburn of the sixth district was appointed to try the case. The bureau contends that Judge Williams is not disqualified, holding that the kinship is not close enough and does not figure in the transactions involving the bureau.

In his opinion, Chief Justice C. M. Cureton said that he believes the bureau in some senses is a corporation but declared the question involves many considerations and issued orders restraining trial of the case, and prohibiting the Lennox brothers from proceeding further in the litigation until the supreme court acts on the disqualification question.

Final action cannot be taken before October next term of the court.

TWO CONVICTS STILL ON FAST

ABSTINENCE CAUSED BY HOT WEATHER SAYS PRISON OFFICIALS

(By Associated Press)

BOSTON, July 19.—The voluntary abstinence from food of Nicola Sacco and Bartolomeo Vanzetti today entered its third day with state prison officials still inclined to attribute their fast to hot weather rather than to admit the condemned men were actually on a hunger strike.

Vanzetti continues to sip coffee and to refuse other food while Sacco has declined everything. Both men, however, have running water in their cells.

May Not Drink Water
Dr. Edmund V. Wilson, assistant superintendent of the city hospital, said that if the men drink no water they could not live longer than ten days.
