S. A. T. TEST TO BE GIVEN HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS

Larry Beights, Carla Britton, Don Small, and Loretta Tarrt, Loraine High School seniors who have registered for the College Entrance Examination Board's Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), will be administered the test on January 11, 1964 at Abilene High School. These students are to enroll in colleges or universities require the American College Testing Program test (ACT) instead of the SAT.

The ACT tests will be administered on February 15, 1964 at the various colleges in Abilene to the following seniors: Joe Cushing, Joyce Furlow, Charla Hamilton, David Jones, Cindy Mahon, Judy McDaniel, Stanley Moore, and Carl Williams. Don Williams, a 1962 Loraine High School graduate, will take the ACT tests also.

The SAT test is designed to help colleges make sound choices among students applying for admission. This test is considered together with the student's high school record, letters of recommendations, and interviews which can forecast quite well how each student is likely to do in college. Since the courses, academic standards, and grading systems of secondary schools, as well as the ability of various classes, differ widely, the SAT scores are a means by which all applicants can be evaluated in similar terms. These scores help colleges to make a fair comparison of the student's records with those of applicants from other schools and to predict whether or not they can undertake college studies successfully.

Since the SAT helps predict college success, the student can use the test results to evaluate his college plans. Upon receipt of the test results conferences are held with the student to inform him more fully the meaning of his scores.

The new press is a Babcock Reliance and will print four pages at a time of seven columns in width. This will be one column less in width and a little more than an inch shorter in length of the page.

As we get more familiar with the press we hope we can print a better paper than was the case with our old worn out press. We hope to print more pages each week than we formerly did so the reading matter in the paper will be the same or more. This can be done only if merchants will cooperate with their advertising.

In the near future we hope to expand our operations somewhat by making an area-wide paper instead of being completely local as we have tried to do in the past. By expanding our operations we hope to have correspondents in all the communities in this area who will furnish us with news.

Rainfall In Loraine Area For 1963 About Five Inches Below Normal

Rain fall in the Loraine area during 1963 was about five inches less than normal according to measurements kept by volunteer weather observer J. W. King.

Rainfall during 1963, including the snow in December which made .3 inch of moisture, amounted to 17.85 inches here in town where the official gauge is located.

Rainfall north of town was a little more. Walter Stirl who lives just north of Lone Wolf Cemetery, measured 19.10 inches of moisture in 1963.

There were two months in 1963 when no moisture of any kind fell, January and March. May was the month of the heaviest precipitation when 4.35 inches was gauged. February, July and September were also short moisture

months just producing enough to measure.

In spite of the short supply of rainfall the country produced a good crop because of the moisture stored up during the fall of 1962.

At the present time the ground is fairly wet but the moisture probably is not as deep as it was a year ago.

Farm Facts

There are some exciting new developments in food processing, according to Philip B. Dworkin of the Marketing Economics Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

In "dehydrefreezing," fruits and vegetables are dried to about 50% of their original weight and then frozen and kept frozen. Quality of the thawed and cooked food is equal to that of the normal frozen product, and there are savings in freezing, packaging, storage, and shipping costs.

"Freeze-drying," another development, offers even more convenience and produces foods of high, fresh-flavor quality.

Food (cooked or uncooked) under this process is dehydrated under vacuum while frozen. Freeze-dried foods apparently do not become toughened or shriveled, and when rehydrated, regain their original flavor and texture. Properly sealed, these foods can be stored at room temperatures for long periods of time.

Although present emphasis is on meat products, freeze-dried shrimp are available for the institutional market, and sportsmen can buy complete, already cooked entrees.

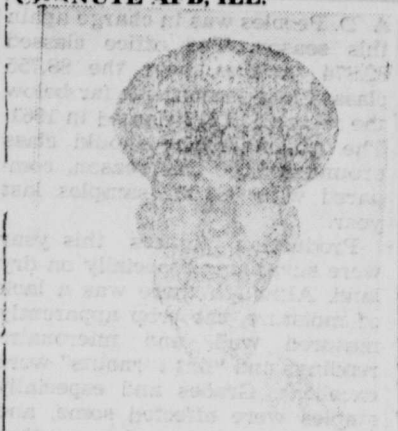

2 cups diced left-over turkey
1 medium onion, finely chopped
1/2 cup chopped celery
1 (3-ounce) can chopped mushrooms, drained
1/4 cup pure vegetable oil
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup milk
1 egg yolk
2 (8-ounce) cans tomato sauce
1/2 teaspoon salt
Bread crumbs
2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper
Saute turkey, onion, celery and mushrooms in 2 tablespoons pure vegetable oil.
Heat 1/4 cup pure vegetable oil in saucepan, add flour and milk. Stir in milk and cook, stirring, until thick. Add to turkey mixture and cook for 10 minutes.
Remove from heat.
Beat egg yolk with 1/4 can of tomato sauce and stir into turkey mixture.
Add salt and pepper.
Chill.
Shape into patties and roll in bread crumbs. Brown in pure vegetable oil.
Make sauce for hash patties by combining remaining 1 1/2 cans of tomato sauce with the chopped green pepper.
Heat to serve over the hash patties.

FAIR WEATHER BRINGS IN THE COTTON

A few days of clear moderate weather have allowed harvesting operations to get underway again. With favorable weather conditions, the cotton harvest should be complete in around 2 weeks, says B. F. Manly, Jr., in charge of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, Texas. Around 470,000 bales will be produced in 23 cotton producing counties served by the Abilene office, and the temporary office at Munday, Texas. The sub-office at Munday is open only during the active ginning season. Mr.

A. D. Pevles was in charge again this season. The office classed 22,874 samples, near the 22,755 classed last season, but far below the record 115,217 classed in 1961. The Abilene office should class around 390,000 this season, compared with 363,932 samples last year.

Production figures this year were surprising especially on dry land. Although there was a lack of moisture, the crop apparently matured well, and micronaire readings and "lint bolls" were excellent. Grades and especially staples were effected some, and they will be discussed in another

article at a later date.

Production from irrigated acreage was not as good as expected in many cases. Insects and a hot dry summer took its toll in the irrigated cotton. Long staple varieties with high "Pressley readings" (an instrument that measures breaking strength of cotton) sold at a premium, bringing up to 2 1/2 cents per pound above the loan rate.

The market was steady and fairly active. At times it was slow but most any time cotton could be sold at a premium over the loan, except those grades above Mid Lt Sp. 3132. Around 2/3 of the local crop sold.

During the past week prices and demand for cotton have been better than at any other period this season. Mid Lt Sp. 1516 is bringing 29.65 to 31.05 cents per pound; SLM Lt Sp and L.M. Lt Sp. 1516 28.85 to 29.10 cents per pound; and Mid Sp. 1516 28.10 to 28.40. The prices quoted above are net prices to the producer, that is, it is the price the producer receives after warehouse and hauling charges are deducted. Some of these prices are below the gross loan price, however, by the time loan charges are deducted, they would be near loan prices.

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. Is there any chance for a woman to get into a VA hospital as a patient? I'm a World War II veteran but was never stationed outside the States.

A. Yes. Women veterans are eligible for VA hospitalization on the same basis as are men. For further information, get in touch with the nearest VA regional office or apply directly to a VA hospital.

Q. Has Congress passed any of the proposed legislation which would furnish special benefits for peacetime veterans?

A. There are several benefits already established for peacetime veterans. Any VA office can give you full particulars. However, the proposed legislation you mean concerning education, home loans, etc., has not yet been passed by Congress.

Q. If I am admitted to a VA domiciliary, what kind of care am I entitled to?

A. Complete care, including medical treatment. Of course, if hospitalization is required, a domiciliary member is eligible for transfer to a hospital.

Q. Should I write Washington, D. C., concerning my GI insurance? My home is in Brunswick, Me., and I pay my premiums to Philadelphia.

A. The VA District Office, 5000 Wissahickon Avenue, Philadelphia 1, Penna., handles your insurance account and not Washington.

Accent on Health

Austin-The very things which delight the hearts of children and make parental eyes glow-the lights and candles and artificial snow-are most often the agents of Christmas tragedies.

But most tragedy is avoidable. Follow these simple rules this year as you plan your Christmas decorations, and the occasion can be as festive and warm as any you have ever experienced.

Use only flameproof crepe paper for streamers. If the package doesn't say "flame-proof", don't buy it. The same injunction applies to other decorations, including the cotton bunting under the tree. Don't use it unless it has been treated with a nonflammable solution by the manufacturer or unless you yourself have treated it under directions supplied by the fire department.

If you think Christmas will not be complete without candles in the windows, use them with extreme care. But never use them on the tree itself. Take special pains to keep them away from curtains, and put them in a sturdy candle holder to guard against their tipping over.

Make certain you use only decoration lighting which carries the tag of Underwriters Laboratory approval.

Even after buying only UL products, pull the power cord from the wall outlet when the lights are off. This is important because insulation failures and overheated circuits could develop while you are absent from home.

Saw your Christmas tree off at an angle at least one inch above the original cut and keep it standing in a pan of water throughout the holiday period. The tree will thus absorb a great deal of water, especially during the first few days, and thereby be less vulnerable to fire. Be sure to add to the water from time to time so the entire stem cut will always be submerged.

As an added precaution, take the tree down as soon as practical after the holidays. If you have had a real tree, dispose of it in the manner and place prescribed by your community. In most Texas towns, the junior chamber of commerce or a similar organization routinely supervises the burning of discarded trees. Check to see if this service is handled by an organization in your town.

Keep these few simple suggestions in mind this year as you prepare for the holidays. They require no extra time or inconvenience, but they will pay you big returns in that they will add to your chances of being around to celebrate Christmas, 1963.

COLLECT SOIL SAMPLES NOW

College Station, Dec. 19-You can get prompt service on samples submitted to the soil testing laboratory during December. C. D. Welch, Extension Soil Chemist at Texas A&M, who is in charge of the laboratory, says that right now they are processing the samples and getting the returns to the producer within a week. They home to maintain this prompt service through January. Welch says, but generally the requests for soil tests increase after Christmas and there is often a delay in getting a reply.

Welch suggests that you consult your county agent on how to take a representative sample. He can also tell you how soil tests can supply you with information that will help you make greater profits from the use of fertilizer.

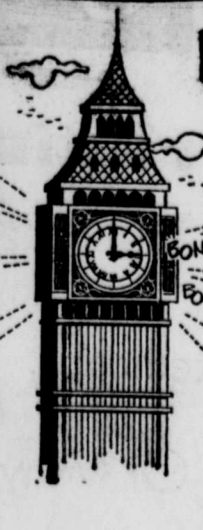
