CHRISTMAS CHEER—No, it isn't the formal opening of a new liquor store... it's Sheriff H. T. Melton, City Police Lee Bivins of Munday, County Attorney Tom Bullington and Deputy Sheriff H. C. Stone with liquor officers confiscated when they raided the Wayside Inn, Negro cafe, in Munday Friday. Everything was apparently ready for a big Christmas rush, because the officers found 24 pints of whiskey, 96 half-pints of whiskey, 48 pints of wine, 48 quarts of wine, and 12 32-oz. bottles of beer. James Mitchell, operator of the cafe, pleaded guilty to possession for the purpose of sale, and was fined \$300 and costs in Judge L. A. Parker's county court. Fine and costs totaled \$330.10. Tuesday Mitchell had been unable to pay the fine and was still in jail.

Wichita Falls Accountant To Audit School Records

The Board of Education of the Knox City Schools entered into a contract Tuesday night with Bill Carruthers of Wichita Falls, a certified public accountant.

Carruthers was authorized to begin an audit of the school records for the past two school years, 1954-55 and 1955-56. He was also authorized to begin work on this year's business and prepare to round out the annual audit for the present school year and report to the board.

Supt. Chas. E. Silk said the CPA will audit all financial records of the school, including tax records. He will make recommendations to the board on how the records may be kept so that

they will present a clear financial picture.

Carruthers has audited the records of several schools, cities and counties in this area. He audits records at Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, and also teaches accounting in the university's night school.

Financial consideration for the two school years ending August 31, 1955 and August 31, 1956 is \$400. The annual audit for the present school year will be \$250.

A&E Venetian Blind Co. of Wichita Falls was awarded a contract for blinds for the new high school on a bid of \$740. The Flex-alum blinds have plastic tape and nylon cord. The superintendent said the cost may vary, depending on the exact measurement of windows. Audio visual blinds for the preparation room of the science department, which cost approximately \$39.20 per window are not included in this bid. Additional pull shades will be needed for one room in the high school and one room in the grade school. These will cost about \$12, Mr. Silk said.

A textbook committee was appointed to study textbooks which are up for re-adoption by the state committee. Named to the local committee were Mmes. A. V. Kemletz, W. G. Morris, R. G. Vaughan, Hazel Long, Fuller Shannon, E. R. Carpenter, Melvin A. Lowrey, and Mr. Morris and E. A. Youngblood.

Textbooks to be considered are Basal readers, 1 through 6 grades, band and orchestra, economics, speech, physical geography, commercial law and stenography. The committee will meet the first week in March and the recommended books will be put into use at the beginning of the next school year.

The board appointed Mrs. E. F. Branton, elementary principal, and Youngblood, high school principal, census trustees. The annual school census will be made in January.

The transportation of students to and from home for extra activities was discussed by the board. Members felt that a transportation program would be expensive and hard to administer; that if transportation were provided for one student it should be provided for all students; and that the payment of any expenses on a student participating in interscholastic league activities would be in violation of the amateur rule. The following motion was passed: "... that it be the policy of this board that no transportation be provided for or paid for by the school on students participating in any school activities other than that which is paid for from transportation funds for transporting students to and from school for the regular school day on the regularly approved bus routes."

Open House Planned For Youth Center

The public will be invited to inspect the new community youth center when the building is completed. Paul Hoge, president of the adult council, said Tuesday.

The city expects to complete construction this week. Hoge said, then the teenagers will paint the inside.

The youth center, named The Kennel, is sponsored by the 1946 Study Club. The building is in the city park where the old band stand once stood. It is 30'x40' and made of cement blocks, has a concrete floor and flat roof.

Equipment at the present time will include two ping-pong tables, a record player and a soft drink machine.

Parents of eligible members were sent letters this week asking for their cooperation in acting as chaperones for the teen activities. The letters are to be signed and returned to Rip Collins, Jr., president of The Kennel.

Membership cards are being printed and will be sold for \$1 a quarter or \$3.50 a year.

Mail Cards Now, Postmaster Advises

Postmaster Jeff Graham said today that while the Post Office still has a tremendous job ahead of it, efforts are being re-doubled to deliver all mail on time and in good condition by Christmas Eve. He points out that by taking a little extra care with your Christmas mailings now, you'll avoid disappointing friends and loved ones at Christmas time.

He urged early mailing of Christmas cards, and said all cards mailed through December 10, addressed to local boxes, will be cancelled and ready for distribution but will not be put in the boxes until just before Christmas, if the mailer so requests. Such early mailing would help the post office force considerably, he added.

The postmaster asks your special cooperation to be sure that your return address and the recipient's address are plainly typed or written on all labels and Christmas cards. Use zone numbers, and it's a good idea to include an extra label inside your packages. Parcel post size and weight limitations vary according to destination. Ask about them when you go to the post office to buy stamps.

Speaking about stamps, the postmaster said, "Use three cent postage on all your Christmas cards. This way they will be delivered promptly, and forwarded or returned, if necessary, providing you include your name and address on your Christmas card envelopes." First-class postage on your Christmas cards enables you to include hand-written messages, thus making your Christmas greetings more personal. By including your name and address on each Christmas card envelope, both you and your friends can keep your mailing lists up to date.

The postmaster urges that you mail all of your out-of-town cards and packages immediately, and certainly not later than Dec. 10.

Caution Advised In Decorating

Speaking from his Austin office, J. O. "Jim" Musick, general manager of the Texas Safety Association, issued a word of caution to Texans today, regarding Christmas tree-decorating safety.

Musick pointed out that safety of this type of accident is easily preventable, if only a few common sense precautions are taken. As an example he listed the following eight rules which he considers "musts" in safe decorating:

1. Keep tree outside until time to trim.
2. Place tree away from all heating units.
3. Use non-flammable decorations.
4. Never use candles near tree.
5. Make sure lights, sockets and wiring are in good condition.
6. Anchor tree at top with wire to keep it from falling.
7. Turn off tree lights at bedtime or when away from home.
8. Dispose of tree safely; never burn in fireplace.
