VALUE OF JUNIOR COLLEGE IS EXPLAINED IN ROTARY SPEECH

Rotarians were told of the advantages of Cisco Junior College to the community, the area, and to the young people of the area at their regular weekly meeting at the Hotel Victor Thursday.

Carlos J. Turner, president of the college, was the speaker at the meeting. He was presented by Rotarian G. C. Rosenthal, program chairman for the day.

President Turner began his talk by telling of the history of the junior college movement. It began, he said, with the establishment of Decatur Baptist College, the oldest junior college in the nation, in 1898. Now, he said, there are over 600 junior colleges in the nation serving more than 2 million students.

There are 32 state supported junior colleges in Texas, Turner said, serving over 40,000 students. California leads all states in junior colleges with 75.

Turner explained what a junior college is and what it offers. He told of its benefits to students of the area, and said that the junior college served as a means of

transition from high school to a larger college or university.

He said that Cisco Junior College was created by a special act of the legislature, and paid tribute to R. N. Cluck, who was school superintendent at that time, and the board for their efforts in bringing the college to Cisco. He said that the community now owned a plant that was valued at half a million dollars and one that was of unestimable value to the youth of the area.

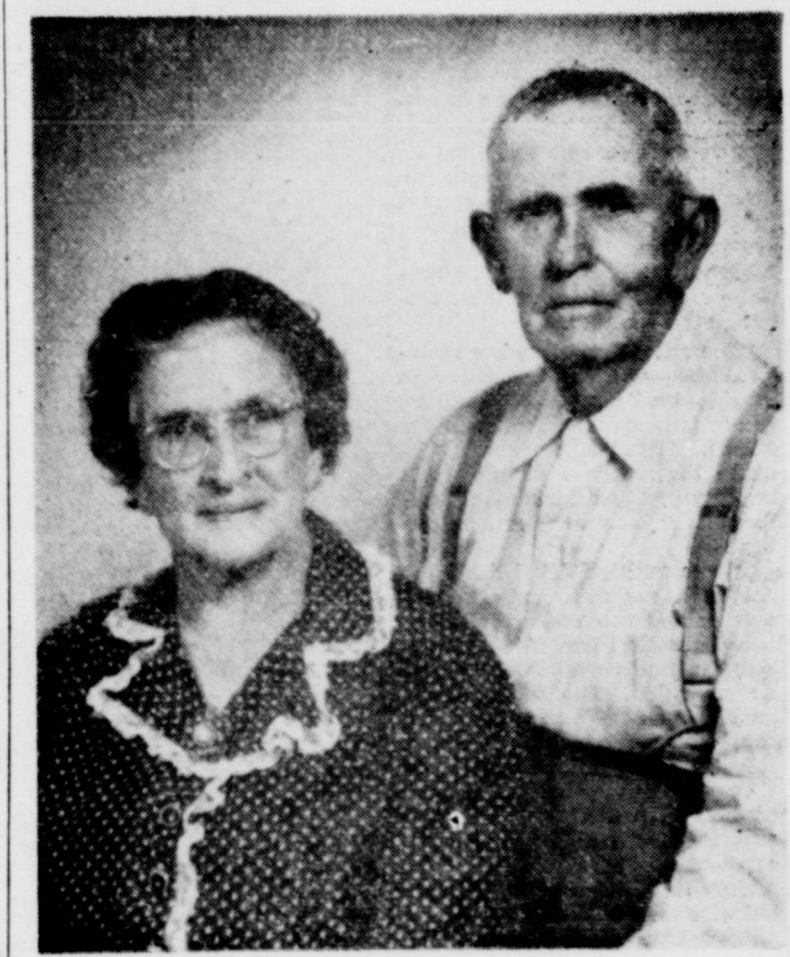
Former Resident Dies At Midland

A Cisco area man received fatal injuries late Friday in a bus-truck crash on U. S. Highway 380 some 13 miles northwest of Cisco.

Dead was Thomas Jefferson Wharton, 53, who lived at the Lone Star Gas Company's Pueblo plant on Rt. 1, Cisco. He was driver of the truck involved in the crash.

Four others, all passengers in the Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma bus, received various injuries and received treatment at Graham Hospital here.

Injured were Miss Donna Edmonds, 73, of Dublin; Mrs. Jackie Reed, 53, a nurse in the Stamford hospital; a Mrs. Murry, 74, of Lueders, and Kenneth L. Strickland of Lubbock, driver of the bus.

Mrs. Murry and Strickland were released from the hospital Friday night after receiving first-aid treatment. Mrs. Reed and Miss Edmonds remained in the hospital Saturday for further examinations and treatment. It was not thought that their injuries were critical.

According to Highway Patrolmen Ray Hatter and Douglas Womack, the accident occurred as the Lone Star truck, driven by Mr. Wharton, was attempting to make a left turn into the Pueblo plant. The bus, which was following the truck, struck the truck from the rear. The truck was turned over and Mr. Wharton was thrown from the cab. The truck came to rest upon the driver. The truck and bus were both headed west on that section of the highway. The accident occurred at about 4:40 p. m.

Wharton was carried to the Eastland hospital by Wylie Funeral Home ambulance, but was pronounced dead on arrival. His body was taken to Killingsworth Funeral Home in Ranger. Three of the injured were brought to Graham Hospital by Thomas Funeral Home ambulance.

Funeral services for Mr. Wharton will be held at 4 p. m. Sunday at Killingsworth Chapel in Ranger with Sanford Tune, Moran Church of Christ minister, officiating. Burial will be in the Eastland Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth Funeral Home in Ranger. Lone Star Gas Company employees will be pallbearers.

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PUBLIC SCHOOL PROBLEM

Texas and finances, these are the keys to the current national public school problem. The National Association of Manufacturers has reported that educational facilities are not keeping pace with the growth in population or with the rise in national income. Serious shortages of teachers and classrooms exist and "the situation is getting worse," the NAM said.

"Our schools need more money," the association pointed out. "We are spending proportionately less of our income on schools today than we did in 1930 and even then the schools were inadequately supported."

Reporting on a study of public schools, the NAM said the number of children entering schools is continuing to rise at a rapid rate, too few teachers are being trained, school construction is lagging behind needs, and tax support is not increasing at a sufficiently rapid rate.

The study, made by a committee of educators and industrialists who worked with the NAM's Education Department, showed that public schools face even greater influxes of new pupils in the years since the war.

Enrollments in public elementary schools rose by less than 4,500,000 in the last eight years, the report noted. But in the next two years, it pointed out, a 2,400,000 increase is expected and by 1958 the total may reach 26,000,000, or 4,000,000 above the number now in school.

"The school problem is a state-local one — it cannot be solved in Washington," said the report, which is being distributed to the NAM's 20,000 members. "So, while the nation-wide picture is important, the best statistics are those for your own school district."

The committee devoted a large part of its report to analyzing tax sources and the obstacles which school districts face in seeking to increase funds available for public education. The report urged businessmen to accept membership on school boards and help solve financial problems.

One of the most serious aspects of the school situation, the report explained, is the critical shortage of teachers. This is now felt mainly in the elementary schools, but is certain to affect high schools and colleges in the next few years.

Regarding tax sources, the committee emphasized that each state is responsible for its public schools and that state aid should be adequate to enable "poor" school districts to provide educational facilities comparable to those of districts with larger local tax support.

The committee said much can be done to strengthen and improve school tax laws at state and local level. It pointed out that many restrictions on amounts that can be raised are outmoded or unrealistic and many tax laws are in need of re-examination.

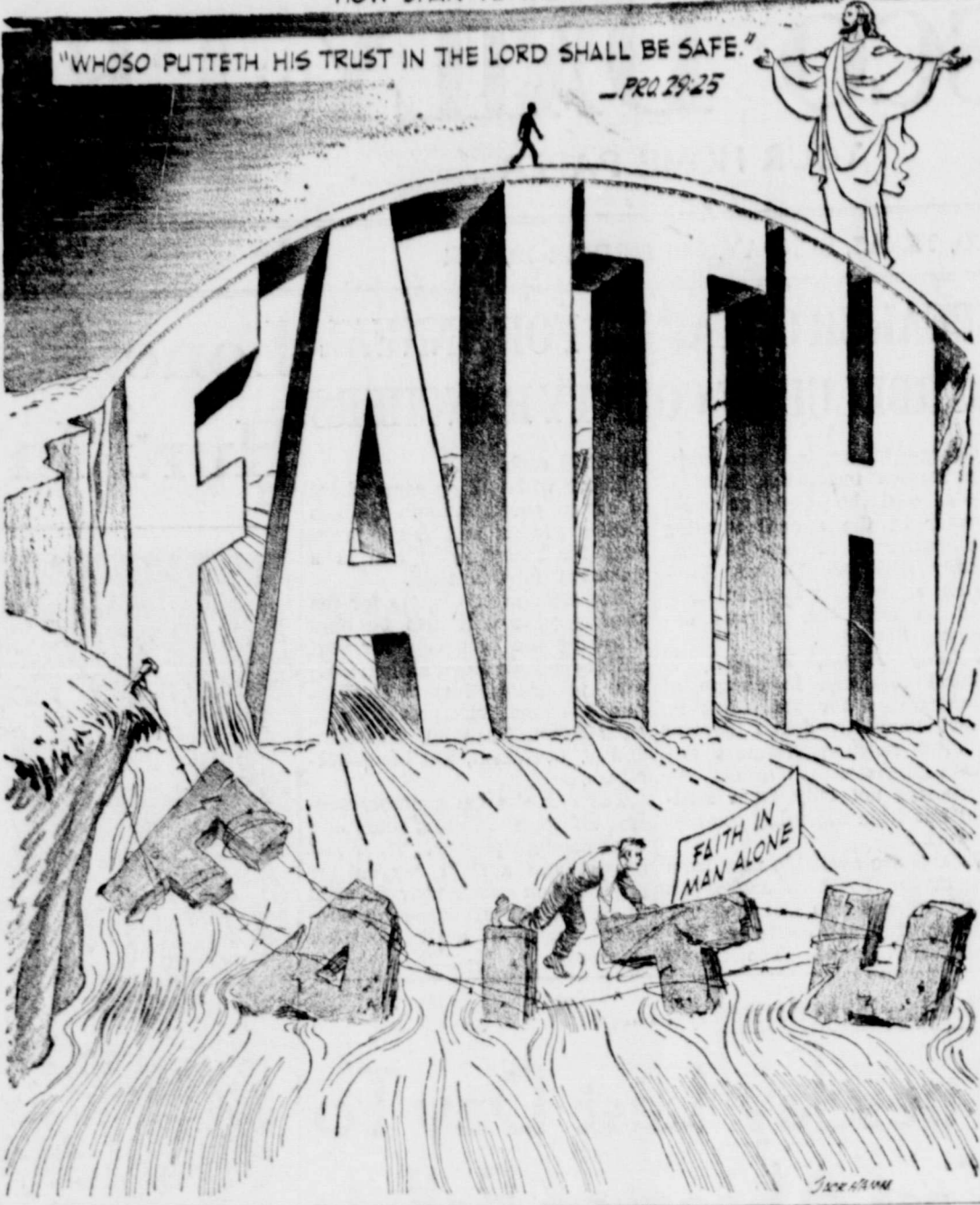

Accident Toll Is Running Ahead Of Last Game Season

AUSTIN, Sept. 18. — The Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission said the accident toll for 1954 hunting season was running ahead of the recent yearly rate.

Reports showed four fatalities compared with nineteen deaths from firearms for all of Texas throughout the entire state during the 1953 wildlife harvest.

Two of the deaths involved mourning dove hunters, who came out in force for the north zone opener on September 1.

One hunter was killed by his own shotgun when he stumbled. Another, a 12-year-old boy, died instantly when struck in the head at close range by a shotgun held by his 19-year-old brother.

In the other hunting deaths: A West Texas rancher was killed as he pulled his shotgun toward himself, muzzle first.

A Central Texas boy, age nine years, was fatally wounded while squirrel hunting when a rifle held by his brother-in-law was accidentally discharged.

Another death involved a South Texas hunter whose gun fell and

was discharged as he went target shooting with his young son.

The Executive Secretary said actual game shooting results in the north dove zone were "generally satisfactory." He said reports from some areas indicated a high dove population while other field observations showed that the doves, as is their nature, "were here today and gone tomorrow."

The Executive Secretary said game wardens' reported fairly good hunter discipline, with some violations concerning over-limits and a few involving shooting bobwhite quail. The quail season under the General State Law does not open until December 1. Some arrests have been made for taking doves in the South Zone where the season does not open until October 1.

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING AN ELECTION TO DETERMINE WHETHER A COMMISSION SHALL BE CHOSEN TO FRAME A NEW CHARTER, PROVIDING FOR THE ELECTION OF A COMMISSION TO FRAME SUCH CHARTER AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Cisco in Eastland County, Texas, as follows:

(a) That an election be held at the City Hall in the City of Cisco, on the 25th day of September, 1954, to be participated in by the qualified voters of said city, for the purpose of submitting to said qualified voters the question "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?", and electing a Commission of fifteen persons to frame such charter, should the majority of the qualified voters voting on said question vote in the affirmative and appointing George Davis judge of said election with authority to appoint such assistants and clerks to assist in holding the same as he may deem necessary.

(b) That said election be held as provided for by the charter of the City of Cisco and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

(c) That the ballot to be used in said election shall be substantially as hereinafter set out:

You may vote for the proposition "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?" by writing an X in the box by the word "Yes," or you may vote against the proposition by writing an X in the box by the word "No" as follows:

"SHALL A COMMISSION BE CHOSEN TO FRAME A NEW CHARTER?"
() "Yes"
() "No"

Regardless of whether you have voted for or against the proposition: "Shall a Commission be chosen to frame a new charter?", vote for a Commission to frame such charter in the event a majority of the voters voting at such election vote in favor of choosing a Commission to frame this charter.

The fifteen persons whose names appear below were selected by the City Commission to serve as a Charter Commission. You may vote for those persons by writing an X in the box by their names or you may vote for other persons by writing their names on the lines opposite the names of the persons selected by the City Commission and drawing a line through the names of the persons you do not wish to vote for; but do not vote for more than fifteen persons. Those selected by the City Commission to frame a new charter in the event a majority of the voters voting at said election vote in favor of choosing a Commission to frame a new charter, are as follows:

(e) That notice of this election shall be given by publication of a copy of this ordinance signed by the Mayor and attested by the Secretary of the City of Cisco, Texas in each issue of some daily or weekly paper published in the

with July, Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator, announced today.

On a daily basis producers regularly supplying the Central West Texas marketing area delivered an average of 333,438 pounds per day as compared with 342,777 pounds during July and 259,129 pounds during August

1933. The daily production per farm during August was 447 pounds which is a decrease of 21 pounds per day from July and 16 pounds per day from August 1933. There were 746 producers delivering milk to the market during August as compared with 732 producers during July and 560 producers during August 1933.

The average daily Class I sales (whole milk, skim milk, flavored milk, and cream) during August amounted to 357,506 pounds, a decrease of 3,285 pounds per day from July, but an increase of 94,706 pounds per day over August 1933.

The minimum uniform price to producers for August deliveries was \$5.47 per hundredweight for 4.0% milk f.o.b. handlers' plants located at Abilene, San Angelo, Sweetwater, and Stamford. For milk delivered to handlers' plants located at Midland and Lamesa, the price was \$5.62 per hundredweight and for milk delivered to Brownwood, the price was \$5.27 per hundredweight. The price for milk delivered to Mineral Wells, was \$5.22 per hundredweight.

Health Outlook For Children Is Better Than Ever

AUSTIN, Sept. 16. — Chances of today's school age children — 5 through 19 — dying of disease have been cut by two-thirds in the past 15 years, a State Health Department statistical summary shows.

Thus, excluding accidents, the readin' writin' rithmic set has three times as much chance of living to collect high school diplomas than had the class of '38. State Health Officer Henry A. Holle attributes healthier school life in 1954 to improved environment at home and school, immunization and vaccination programs, improved drug therapy, and education of the lay public on the importance of disease prevention.

One of every 594 school-age children in 1938 died of disease. By 1953 the ratio had been cut to one in 1785.

Parents of Texas one and three-quarter million scholastics can breathe easier knowing that 1953 diphtheria death rates have been reduced to one-tenth of the 1938 rate, influenza and pneumonia to one-sixth, scarlet fever to one-third, and malaria and typhoid fever to a flat zero.

Fifteen years ago, the summary shows, school child deaths from all causes reached 3389, compared with 1698 deaths last year. And enrollment in public schools last year was greater by 70,000 than enrollment in 1938.

"Typhoid fever and malaria are excellent examples of what can be accomplished by simply

cleaning up mosquito and fly breeding areas, improving sewage and garbage disposal, and improving housing conditions," Dr. Holle said.

Malaria caused the death of 39 school children in 1938, and typhoid killed 144. Neither dis-

ease claimed a single life last year. Significantly, it was in 1938 that the State Department of Health began operating on its present scale.

The figures concerning accidental deaths aren't as bright as these on disease-produced fatali-

ties. Accidents only 223 in 1938, or 46.7 percent of the total. Accident probably responsible for 46.7 percent of the total, Dr. E.

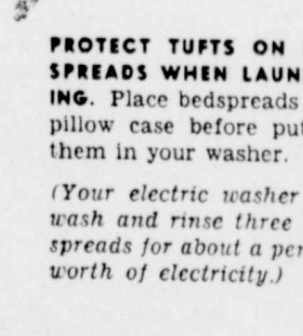

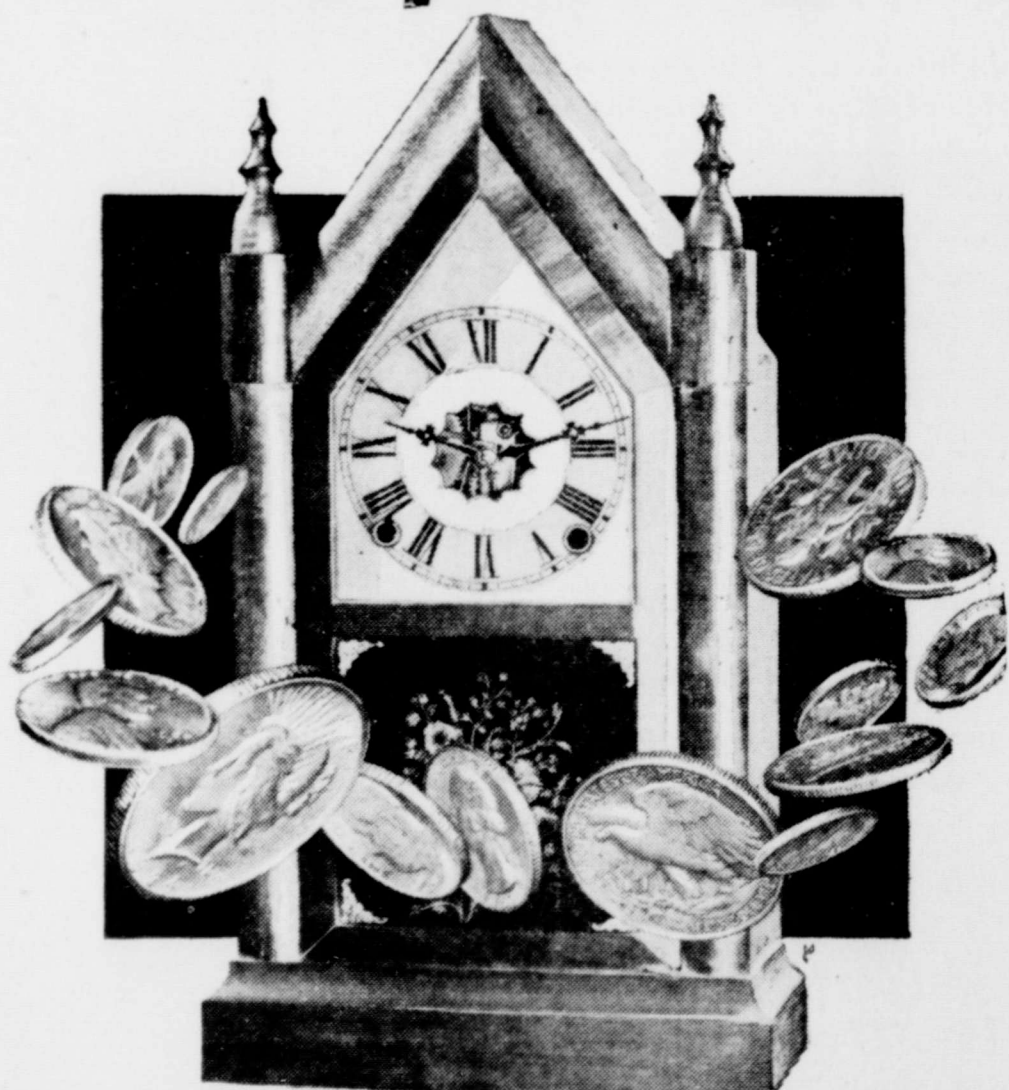
