Plans Underway To Raise Funds for United War Chest

The United War Chest Drive was launched Sunday, October 10, under the leadership of M. C. Lindsey, county chairman. The county has been asked to raise \$10,000 for the United War Chest Fund. The amount to be raised in Texas is \$5,000,000.

Programs are being planned as promotional features of the drive. M. C. Lindsey announced that Henry Norris and Stansell Clement will give 3 minute talks from the platform at the Harley Sadler Show, which will be staged October 15th and 16th, to further the effort being made by this county to meet its War Chest Goal. Proceeds from the show will be shared with the United War Chest Drive.

The United War Chest of Texas is another home-front victory weapon. Through it with one fight the people of this county will support the USO, and 16 other agencies.

You can give your dollars to our community's War Chest, and, through it, to the National War Fund. Through this great over-all agency serving on all three fronts—the Military—United Nations and Home Fronts, your dollars go to seventeen participating war relief services who are joined with our own local welfare agencies in this United War Chest drive.

Christmas Parcels Must Be Mailed By Friday, October 15

Christmas parcels for men in the U. S. Army overseas must be in the mail by Friday, October 15. You have 5 more days in which to mail such packages. You have until November 1 to mail packages to men in the U. S. Navy.

Don't wait until the dead line to do your mailing. More than ten million packages must be mailed to men overseas and if all these are dumped into the mails in a last minute rush, the congestion might easily cause delay that would prevent delivery by Christmas of many packages.

Overseas parcels must not weigh more than 5 pounds, wrapped; and must not exceed 15 inches in length and combined length and girth not exceeding 36 inches. The packages must be marked — "Christmas Parcel."

Be sure that your parcel is put in a strong fiberwood, metal, or wooden box and is tied securely with twine.

The address should be typewritten or written in ink.

County Has 5 More Days In Which To Reach Its Quota

Memorial Service Was Held For Lt. Robt. Smith Sun.

Tribute was paid to the memory of 1st Lt. Robert Hurst Smith, Sunday, October 10, at a Memorial Service held at the Methodist Church. Lt. Smith was killed in a plane crash September 10, about 40 miles southeast from Galveston over the Gulf of Mexico.

The Memorial Service was opened with organ music by Mrs. Carl Rountree, Joe Spikes and Charnell Jobe, Guards of Honor in the American Legion, carried flags to the front of the church. They were followed by members of the local American Legion, who marched in unison to the front.

The Methodist Church choir under the leadership of Mrs. N. H. Price, sang several numbers, and the Rev. E. D. Landreth who officiated at the service brought forth his message of tribute for the young man who so gallantly contributed his services to his country.

Lt. Smith was born at Cutbert, Mitchell County, Texas, in 1920 and is the son of E. M. Smith. The Rev. Landreth reviewed the activities which Lt. Smith took part in—his connection with the school where he was president of his class and a leader of the football team. He spoke of his marriage to Elizabeth Lee Davis, daughter of Mrs. Z. T. Davis.

The Rev. Landreth then told of his fearless, courageous actions in the European area, where Lt. Smith piloted his crew to safety after downing eleven enemy planes.

Lt. Smith was a great soldier—a heroic young man as is shown by his leadership in school, his contribution to his country, and his activities in the church. He was nationally known, and received these decorations from the government: the Distinguished Flying Cross, 2 Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Air Medal.

He was loved and honored by many who observed his fine ideals and brave actions.

The memorial Service ended with Conway King playing taps and with the Rev. Landreth delivering the closing prayer.

The administrative officer of the AAA office, Charles Tarter, announced this week that half of the applications for payment of the 1943 soil conservation have been completed.

This portion of applications have been sent to the state office for approval and checks will be sent to the farmers from that office.

Bond purchases have reached \$544,429.50 up to this time in Dawson County, revealing that the county is far short of its \$1,135,000 quota. These purchases were made through the Federal Reserve Bank recently and have been counted in on the Dawson county quota. \$10,000 bought by the Santa Fe Railway Co., \$2,000 purchased by Planter Gin Co., \$3,000 bought by the West Texas Oil Company, and \$2,000 purchased by the Telephone Company.

The men and women of Dawson County have been given another chance to increase their War Bond purchases and to help complete the \$1,135,000 quota assigned them for the Third War Loan Drive.

The purchase of War Bonds must reach into all homes. This Third War Loan Drive thrusts upon every American an unequalled obligation of self-appraisal. The cash assets and current incomes of every individual must be examined in the light of their true relation to the war today. Every dollar not needed for actual necessities should be put in on War Bonds. Would you set yourself in the cushions of luxury, and let the men at the fighting fronts lack adequate materials of war?

Each civilian on the home front today is a trustee of the future. Sharing in the increased prosperity of war times, we must spend only what is needed for the simple necessities of life, holding the remainder in trust, insuring a sound stable nation for fighting men who cannot taste of these rewards until the war is won.

The government is putting its objective before you in two ways. First, in big round numbers like \$1,135,000. Secondly, but more important, it puts the Third War Loan matter up to you in a purely personal way. It wants you to invest a minimum of an extra \$100 in War Bonds, more if you can. 1943 COTTONSEED IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM WILL BE CONTINUED

The cottonseed improvement program, adopted first for the 1943 season, will be continued in Texas through the 1944 cotton year. According to information to the A. and M. College Extension Service from L. J. Cappleman of Dallas, regional director for the Food Distribution Administration, plans are under way for putting the program into effect. Its objective is to encourage production of single variety cotton, sought especially for military textiles.

The program, which will be administered by the Food Distribution Administration, will assist growers in one variety community to obtain pure planting seed through which the quality of cotton would be further improved, acreage yield increased and production standardized through elimination of several inferior varieties now being planted.

The directing body of the program is a state board composed of representatives of the Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, FDA, and Bureau of Plant Industry, Soils and Agricultural Engineering. The job immediately ahead for the state board is the appointment of a technical committee to work with grower-member committee in designating varieties for the seven zones into which Texas is divided.

Under the 1944 program, which

will be very similar to that of 1943, payments on seed deliveries will be made to grower members of designated one-variety cotton improvement associations who agree to plant seed of the variety approved for their respective zones. These payments range from \$45 a ton for foundation breeder seed to \$23 a ton for first-year increased seed, and will be made through state crop improvement associations. Texas' 110 local cotton improvement associations have received \$85,000 under the plan this year.

According to War Food Administration officials the \$25 for first-year increase seed would enable growers to obtain it at only a small amount above oil mill prices.

Grave Registering Unit Records The Marines' Burial

SOMEWHERE IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC — Greatest fear of Marines going into battle is not they will die. Like all fighting men, they shrink from the thought that they may become "unknown soldiers," that their families will be tortured by uncertainty about their fate.

The job of the Graves Registration Unit of the Marine Corps on Guadalcanal is to know the unknown soldier — and they risked their lives in the front lines checking and recording the temporary burials of men who fell in battle.

All too frequently GRU finds that Marines lose their identifying dog tags or leave them in camp. Then checking is necessary to establish identity, but surprisingly few Marines have been buried in this war as "unknown."

Whenever possible, Marines are buried with full military honors.

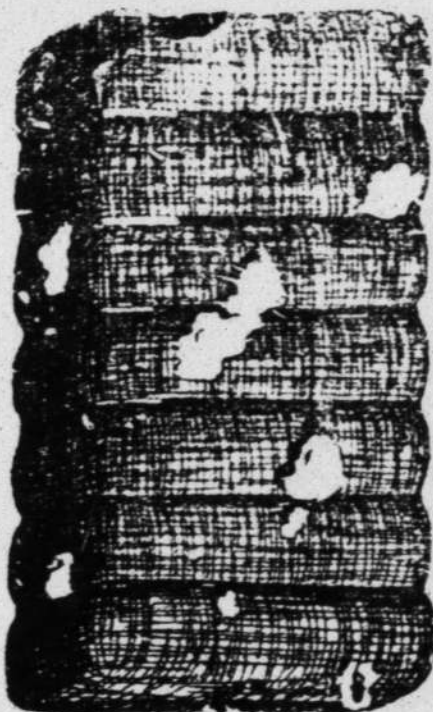

Homemaker Says To Can Foods The Safe Way

Homemakers who do not have access to a pressure cooker and are eager to preserve non-acid vegetables and meats this fall are urged to freeze, brine, dry, or cure them by representatives of the A. and M. College Extension Service.

Mrs. Winifred J. Leverenz, Extension food preservation specialist, quotes a nationally known bacteriologist of California as advising that a pressure cooker only must be used for preserving non-acid foods. This authority, Dr. K. F. Meyer of the University of California Medical Center, says if spores of certain bacteria (Clostridium botulinum) are present in any great number, boiling water will not destroy them.

"No processes should be recommended for the water bath method, and housewives should be instructed not to use this method of preservation for non-acid foods under any circumstances," Dr. Meyer says in a recent letter. He adds that the same principle applies to the open kettle and steam bath methods.

With regard to oven canning, Dr. Meyer says: "Oven cooking should not be used for any canned foods, non-acid or acid, under any circumstances." The reason for this is that the transfer of heat from the air is many times slower than from steam at the same temperature.

Mrs. Leverenz says these statements from a noted authority strengthen the Extension recommendations for home canning which are followed by thousands of Texas homemakers, both rural and urban. She adds a word of caution, however, that if possible pressure cookers should be tested carefully before fall canning, especially the new war-time cookers which may not maintain sufficiently high temperatures and pressure.

Farmers Asked To Report Price Support Violation

While most farmers are receiving more, some are getting less than the support price for cottonseed from buyers, according to reports reach-

ing the state AAA office here. Consequently, officials urge farmer to report such violations of government regulations to their county AAA committees.

Unless processors pay farmers the support price for cottonseed, the government is under no obligation to repurchase the cottonseed products from them at support prices. This price "floor" is assured producers only if their seed is sold in

lots of 10 tons or more on basis of grade, so small producers can profit by pooling seed with their neighbors, says B. F. Vance, state AAA administrator.

Currently, the support price allows the grower about \$53 a ton for average quality cottonseed. This allows for an average grower's margin not to exceed \$3 a ton.

In addition to asking farmers to report price support violations, Mr.

Vance urges farmers to keep accurate records of their 1943 cotton production, since these records usually are used in determining AAA payments, crop insurance premiums, and marketing quotas.

County AAA offices have volunteered to keep gin tickets, bale receipts and similar records for farmers who request this service.

Allied Superiority Of The Air And What It Means

WASHINGTON — The Navy's announcement that we now have the greatest fleet in world history adds the final touch to a picture of complete United Nations' sea superiority.

Aided by the surrender of the Italian fleet and the repair of part of the French fleet, the mighty navies of the U. S. and Britain far exceed in combined strength any force Japan or Germany can hope to bring against them.

Germany, foreseeing the possibility of a blockade 1918-fashion, carefully planned so she would not be dependent on raw materials sources outside Europe. She was not entirely successful, but the blockade of this war is far less crippling than last time.

RAIDING FORCE
Germany's navy was never designed to protect her supply lines, as was Britain's. It is mainly a raiding force, the chief value of which has been the plugging down of a British fleet in the North Sea to meet its constant threat.

Japan, however, has to have a powerful fleet to protect her supply lines, support her island bases and hold on to stolen conquests.

That she is fully aware of the

expansion of our fleet (which is expected to have double the number of fighting ships this year over last) is shown by the careful way she has been hoarding her battleships and carriers and by the plans to evacuate Tokyo because of the certainty of U. S. air raids (perhaps based on carriers.)

New Carriers

We had 11 aircraft carriers and 15 battleships a-building when we entered the war. The Navy has not revealed how many of these mighty weapons are now in service, but we probably have at least four new carriers, the Essex, Bunker Hill, Yorktown and Lexington, out some-where giving the Japs fits. Our total carrier force now may number nearly a dozen big ones according to some reports.

Of the big sluggers, six have been added to the fleet, including the South Dakota, Indiana, Massachusetts and Alabama, all bristling with powerful anti-aircraft defenses that can knock off Jap planes like flies. To add to Japan's naval worries, the surrender of the Italian fleet released immense Allied sea forces in the Mediterranean, and there is little doubt that the bulk of these will be sent at once to India for the approaching sea-borne invasion of Burma.

77 Italians Ships
In all, 77 Italian warships fell into our hands, including five battleships, eight cruisers, 29 destroyers, 19 submarines and one seaplane carrier. While there might be some

Decline In Old Age Assistance During Sept.

The old age assistance rolls made a net decline of 313 cases during September, leaving on the rolls for payments in October 182,305 persons. Total payments amount to \$3,776,807.80, which is \$18,930.32 more than the cost the previous month. The October payment averages \$20.72. Nine hundred thirty-six recipients were removed from the rolls because of current ineligibility and 937 died during September while 1,560 new names appeared on the rolls during the month.

The blind rolls made a net gain of 61 persons. A total of \$112,970 will be paid in October to 4,604 recipients, averaging \$24.54 per person.

The aid to dependent children rolls sustained a net loss of 362 families, representing 838 children. A total of \$233,938 will be distributed in October to 11,018 families representing 24,295 children. The payment averages \$21.23 per family.

WTCC Promoting The War Effort

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce is actively promoting the war effort not alone through its inter-community War and Preservation contest in which more than 100 area towns are entries, but with hard cash. During the Third War Loan campaign the organization bought a \$10,000 bond to bring to \$20,000 its holding of the nation's securities.

Announcement of the all-cash purchase was made at Midland by M. C. Ulmer, president of the regional chamber, in his address to the annual convention of West Texas county judges and commissioners. The \$10,000 check was delivered to Ulmer by WTCC Manager D. A. Barden, following a Lubbock meeting of the organization's officers committee at which the purchase was authorized.

The WTCC's initial \$10,000 bond purchase was made in May 1941, at its Mineral Wells convention, seven months prior to Pearl Harbor.

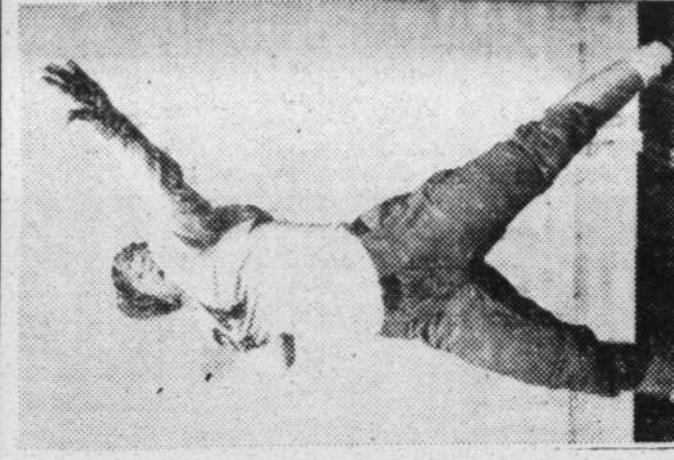

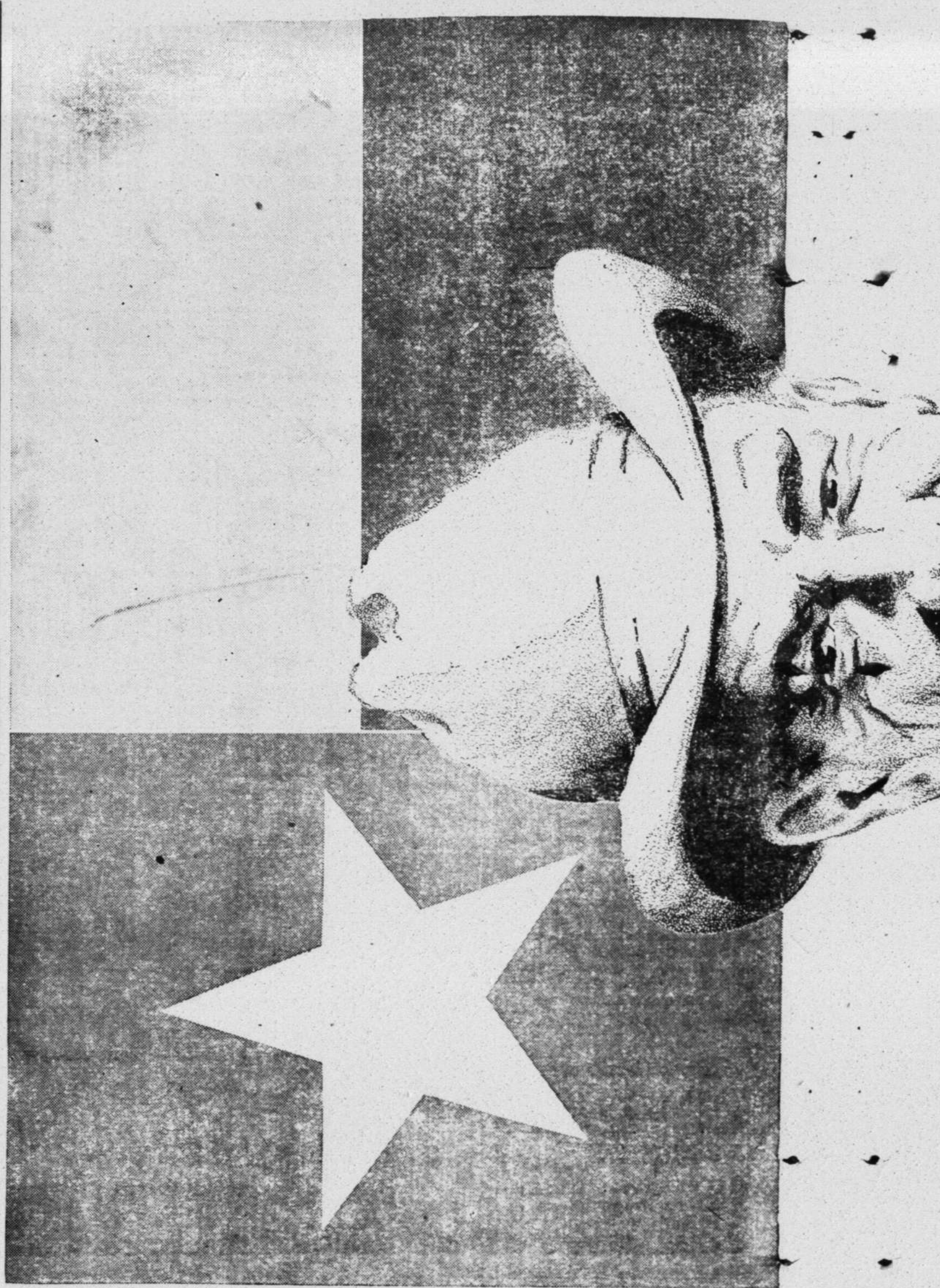

Date Is Extended To October 31st For Recruitment

The Navy Department and the Civil Service Commission, with the approval of the War Manpower Commission, agreed today to extend the deadline to Oct. 31, 1943, for the recruitment of electricians and outside machinists, for the Puget Sound Navy Yard.

Transportation will be furnished appointees to Bremerton, Wash., where critical war work will suffer delay unless men rally to fill the Navy's need for skilled personnel, a Navy Department spokesman said. Men with two years of experience as an electrician or outside machinist can qualify for this essential federal employment.

Outside machinists can meet the minimum requirements with two years of experience in the overhaul and repair of heavy automotive equipment such as shovels, tractors, tanks, etc.

The Navy Department assures appointees that furnished housing units are available at rent ranging from \$26.50 to \$46.00 a month. Dormitory accommodations for single person rent for as little as \$3.50 a week.

The Navy offers good wages and one-half for overtime. Appointments will be made in accordance with War Manpower Commission regulations.
