CREDITS FOR INSURANCE IN TEXAS LISTED

BULLETIN

AUSTIN, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Cisco today was awarded a 10 per cent credit on fire insurance, it was announced by Raymond Mask, state commissioner.

AUSTIN, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Credits received a liberalized rating system employed by the state fire insurance will save Texas property owners more than \$650,000 during 1936. Commissioner Raymond Mask predicted today in announcing new ratings.

The credits are on basic rates set for various communities. Credits reducing insurance costs are given for good records and penalties assessed for bad records. The new system permits a maximum of 25 per cent credit.

Marshall, Mineral Wells, and San Angelo will get five per cent credit. Brownwood, Cleburne, Kilgore, and Sweetwater will have neither credit nor penalty.

Five per cent penalty for bad fire records will be given Breckenridge, Eastland, and Terrell. The maximum penalty of 15 per cent will be put on Henderson, Ranger, Longview, Orange, and Overton.

Federal Funds Flow To Social Security

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Federal funds began flowing today to 21 states and the District of Columbia to aid needy aged, blind, and dependent children, under the social security program passed by the last session of congress.

Checks totaling \$4,447,000, representing the first social security grant to states, were mailed by the treasury within 48 hours after President Roosevelt signed the deficiency appropriation bill.

Sudden Cold Wave Strikes Nation

DUST, QUAKES AND SNOW HIT THE COUNTRY

Winter struck virtually the entire nation with new fury today, blocking traffic in many states and imperiling lives on buffeted ships on both coasts.

Dust storms, floods, and earthquakes plagued communities which escaped hazards of the new blizzard and sleet storms.

Two coast guard cutters bucked ice floes in an attempt to reach a fishing vessel reported sinking off the southern Massachusetts coast. They feared they could not reach the ship before 4 p. m. which might be too late.

A British freighter with a crew of 34 was in distress off the Oregon coast. Two coast guard cutters raced to its aid.

Clipper Forced Back—A thousand miles out in the Pacific the great flying boat China Clipper struck such head winds enroute to Hawaii it was forced to turn back to California.

A snow and sleet storm, riding winds which reached 65 miles an hour, glazed highways in New York, New Jersey and New England, and Pennsylvania. Air and rail traffic was held up.

Several hundred persons in 11 South Dakota communities, snow-bound for days, awaited relief by air.

New earth shocks were felt in Helena and Butte, Mont., where residents were fighting snow drifts at 25 below zero. They caused no damage but were the strongest shocks since the earthquake Thanksgiving day.

Norther Hits Texas—Another cold wave swept into Texas early Friday after most of the state had enjoyed shirt sleeve weather.

In less than 12 hours after the balmy spring weather Thursday, the state was visited by sandstorm, rain, hail, sleet, and snow. A wind blew over the northern section of the state. The new cold wave was expected to be short lived. It was believed by the weather bureau that after Friday night the worst would be over.

MERCURY DROPS TO 14 IN CISCO

Descending upon the city with the greatest stealth and suddenness of any this winter, a new norther today sent the mercury scotching for the lower regions in the glass tube. Ciscoans who ventured out into what they took to be a continuation of yesterday's warm sunshine had their hopes dashed and received frost bitten noses and ears for their trouble.

The norther, which had not been predicted by the weather man, struck the city about 4 a. m., driving the temperature lower. It reached 14 degrees at 3 and 9 a. m., having been lower than that mark only once this winter.

Ciscoans who were going about without overcoats late last evening today found that they needed their overcoats and whatever else they had in the way of warm clothing.

By 5 a. m. the mercury had dropped to 30 degrees, two below freezing. At 6 a. m. it had reached 21 and an hour later stood at 18. The minimum temperature, reached at 8 o'clock, was 14 degrees, 18 below the freezing point. From that mark it slowly rose, however, reaching 21 degrees by noon.

Inflationary Bloc Files Petition For Expansion Vote on Bonus Money

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—The house inflation bloc today filed a formal petition seeking to force a vote on the question of paying the \$2,247,000,000 soldier bonus bill by inflationary method. The petition was filed by Representative Wright Patman, d. Tex. It required 218 signatures to force a house vote. Administration leaders doubt that the bloc will succeed in obtaining the necessary number.

COLD DELAYS OPERATION AT WENDE WELL

Operations were reported suspended at the Wisdom and Parsons Number One Gus Wendt test six miles south of the city today after a severe cold wave struck this morning.

Further drilling had been scheduled to begin this morning, after the well had been swabbed out yesterday, operators told the Daily News.

A small oil production was seen in the well as it stands, with gas oiled from it. It was believed, however, that more oil might be obtained by drilling deeper into the Marble Falls lime, of which several feet are thought to remain untouched.

It was reported today that spudding in of other wells in the vicinity of the Wendt would likely begin soon.

Oil men have been watching the Cisco test keenly, in view of the fact that it is in the vicinity of the Schor gasser well which supplied fuel for Humbletown since 1919.

Colored School Is Damaged by Flames

Little damage was reported today when the city fire department answered an alarm for the negro school in north Cisco. The fire was said to have started from a defective flue.

The teacher had the colored pupils move their books from the desks by the time the firemen reached the scene, it was reported.

Junior C. of C. Plans Made Here Thursday

Formation of a Junior Chamber of Commerce here was begun Thursday evening when a group of young Cisco business and professional men met with representatives of the state body to lay plans for such an organization.

Those present at the meeting agreed to work as a committee to form an active organization with a definite membership and constitution to cooperate in the work of the general chamber of commerce program. Last night's meeting was held at the Laguna hotel.

A committee meeting is to be held at a breakfast in the banquet room of the hotel Monday morning.

The new organization will be to a certain extent an outgrowth of the now inactive Cisco Boosters, formed a year and a half ago. It will have a definite membership, however, a drive for which will be made shortly.

State Men Here—John C. Doss, secretary-treasurer of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Dr. Arthur Zappe, director of the state body, both of Mineral Wells, spoke at the meeting last night, making suggestions for organizing the body and ways in which it can fit into the general program. Both urged close cooperation with the senior organization here as elsewhere.

Jed Sharp of Childress and W. J. Stubblefield of New Braunfels, representing The Jaycee News, official publication of the Texas Junior Chamber of Commerce, were present and told of work in other units of the organization and offered suggestions for the Cisco group.

It was pointed out that the old Cisco Boosters affiliation in the state Junior Chamber of Commerce is still effective and can be used for the new organization.

Defense Rests In Blumenfeld Case

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—The defense rested today in the trial of Isadore Blumenfeld, having offered the testimony of over a score of witnesses to prove Blumenfeld was in a barber shop when Walter Liggett was assassinated. Defense counsel announced as court reconvened that it had completed the case for Blumenfeld. Yesterday it called witnesses to support Blumenfeld's contention he was being shaved in a downtown barbershop at 5:41 on Dec. 9, when the editor was slain.

EXTENSION OF PRESENT ARMS LAW APPROVED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—The house foreign affairs committee today reported favorably a bill extending the present neutrality law with modifications until May 1, 1937, and agreed to bring it to the house floor Monday for quick action.

The house bill is virtually identical with the measure reported favorably by the senate foreign relations committee.

This measure is opposed in the senate by a bloc headed by Senator Gerald Nye, r. N. D., chairman of the senate munitions committee, which is leading a fight for enactment of a stricter measure.

There has been a sharp fight since the administration called for more drastic laws to prevent the nation from entering a foreign war, and since the senate munitions committee began its inquiry into events leading to the last war.

Youth Projects To Employ 637 Persons

AUSTIN, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Thirteen new National Youth Administration projects to employ 637 persons at a cost of \$11,333 were announced today by State Director Lyndon Johnson.

Statistics for the Texas state employment service will be gathered by eight youths in Johnson county at a cost of \$195.

Changes of Story of Hauptmann Are Rumored After Lawyer's Interview

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Cryptic statements by Samuel Leibowitz, famed criminal lawyer, today indicated Bruno Richard Hauptmann may have made changes in his story of the Lindbergh kidnapping.

After a long interview Leibowitz said: "Hauptmann broke down and cried like a child. I had a very satisfactory interview. I am coming back to see him Sunday."

Leibowitz to comment on a question of whether or not Hauptmann had confessed.

The noted criminal lawyer had announced that he would take over the defense of the convicted slayer of the Lindbergh baby only after he had talked with Hauptmann and had obtained from him the complete story of his connection with the case.

AGED CISCOANS HURRYING TO FILE PAPERS; APPLICATIONS ARRIVE READY FOR SIGNING

Aged people of Cisco today were hurrying to be among the first to apply for the state old age assistance, under the new pension administration which became effective today, three months after adjournment of the last session of the legislature.

Application blanks were placed at the city secretary's office at the city hall and at the Chamber of Commerce. At Eastland the blanks could also be obtained at the county courthouse.

Owen Shelton of Abilene, district pension administrator, here to deliver the application blanks, told the Daily News that it would be necessary for the applicants to fill out the blanks and have them witnessed by any notary public, county judge, district judge, county clerk or district clerk. The blanks were then to be mailed to the address of the Abilene office printed on the back of the last sheet.

Each application comes with two white sheets and two duplicates, both of which must be filled out in full before the pension can be granted.

Persons eligible are United States citizens at least 65 years of age who have lived in Texas five out of the last nine years including the last year, who have not voluntarily transferred property, who are not habitual drunkards or habitual criminals, whose income is not more than \$360 a year if single or \$720 if married, and who own not more than \$5,000 worth of property if single and \$7,500 if married.

The committee, however, delayed until Monday action on the resolution which has the support of both republican and democratic leaders.

Bell, sponsor of the inquiry resolution, asserted that, in view of charges made against leaders of the Townsend program, "they should be the first to welcome an investigation to determine the truth of the charges."

200,000 BLANKS READY AS PROGRAM STARTS

AUSTIN, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Two hundred thousand application blanks for old age assistance were in city halls, court houses and other public offices in Texas today for distribution as Pension Director Orville Carpenter was sworn into head Texas' first major social security program.

Carpenter resigned as state auditor yesterday after six months in that office. Since mid-November, however, organization of the Old Age Assistance Administration has claimed most of his attention. C. B. Sheffield, Fort Worth, will succeed Carpenter as state auditor.

Prompt action on applications and earliest possible payment of pensions was promised by Carpenter as he took office.

"We are going into the problem of old age security with the hope of doing some real good. I believe that we can relieve a great part of the suffering of old people past 65 (eligible citizens past that age may receive up to \$15 a month). It is my promise on assuming office to be fair, impartial, and administer old age assistance as efficiently as I can," the administrator said.

W. L. PERKINS TO BE BURIED ON SATURDAY

The body of W. L. Perkins, 52, who died Tuesday evening at Marshall, arrived at 1:50 o'clock this morning on the Texas & Pacific for funeral services which will be held tomorrow at 1 p. m. at the First Methodist church.

Mr. Perkins, locomotive engineer for the C. & N. E., since the railroad began in Cisco, died Tuesday at the Texas and Pacific Hospital in Marshall where he has been under medical treatment for the past few months. Mr. Perkins has been in ill health for the past year. He has been a resident in Cisco since the beginning of the railroad.

He is survived by his wife and one step-son, Wilson Lee Graham, who will arrive tomorrow morning from New Mexico where he is stationed in a C. C. C. camp.

Presbyterians Plan Ordination Service

Rev. J. Stuart Pearce, pastor of the First Presbyterian church announced that an ordination and installation of new officers would be held Sunday morning following the preaching service at the church. New officers were elected last Sunday morning. Regular services are announced for the church.

Demands of Texas Teachers

State Superintendent of Public Instruction L. A. Woods called a conference of school executives. Austin was the setting of the conference and the demands were very emphatic "as well as numerous." It was voted by those who participated a "very valuable meeting" and "the executives declared they would like to see it made an annual affair."

Many resolutions were adopted. First that certain subjects that are accredited in the high schools are being discriminated against in the matter of free text books and a pre-emptory call was made upon the legislature to authorize the state board of education to place all accredited subjects on the free list. It was voted that the subject of home economics has been discriminated against in the matter of subsidization from federal funds and a request was made for the federal congress "to allow as liberal a share of federal funds for home economics as is allowed other vocational subject." Moreover, the president and the executive committee of the Texas State Teachers association was asked to appoint a special committee to study the situation with respect to the handling of the school fund with particular attention to "its land and mineral resources" and to recommend a plan for permanently safeguarding and "conserving these resources for the benefit of the school children of this state." Another resolution cited that "in view of the large increase in attendance upon the higher educational institutions during the last several years and the fact that it has been the tendency of the legislature to copy the previous bill and, as a result appropriations have not moved up in keeping with the increased enrollment, that we call upon the legislature and the governor of the state to find means of supporting these institutions to the end that the average appropriation per student shall be in keeping with appropriations in comparable states."

There are confederate pensions. Pensions are coming for all those over 65; the Townsend pension scheme for all over 60 is bobbing up in the states. Senator Borah advises a pension of \$50 a month for all over 60 years of age and this Texas conference of school executives recommends and passes on to the voters of Texas the adoption at the November election Senate Joint Resolution No. 15, providing for the establishment of a teacher retirement system. Well—law makers make the laws and in November 150 representatives and 15 state senators will be elected by the voters in this Centennial year of the Texas commonwealth.

Jobs Demanded for Non-Reliefers

"Jobs for the jobless" continues the demand of the Texas League of Municipalities. Its officials have urged works progress administration officials to relax so that non-relief employables may be given work.

An official of the league said that destitute unemployed who have sustained themselves without relief should not be penalized by WPA rules. An estimated 50,000 cases were made the burden of counties and cities Jan. 1, when state relief was limited to unemployables. Executive committees of the league adopted a resolution somewhat similar to that approved last week by the county judges of Texas and declared for changing the rule to permit the selection of "worthy unemployed people" on WPA projects regardless of the relief status of such unemployed people in the past.

Future relief measures was listed as a subject for 11 regional meetings scheduled for Feb. 21 to July 17. City officials were invited to attend the meeting to discuss municipal affairs and problems. In the last 30 days, 8371 youths have been given part time employment through the National Youth administration work project program. Director Lyndon B. Johnson made a check-up and reported that of the total number actually on the job, 6551 are working exclusively on NYA jobs and 1820 are working alongside adults on WPA jobs.

There is a showdown coming in the not distant future, when the states and the counties will be compelled to provide for their own unemployables and those who are able will be called upon to furnish work for the idle who are able and fit and willing to work.

Texas Topics

AUSTIN, Feb. 14 — Capital City post of the American Legion, at Austin, has taken the lead in Texas in urging all war veterans to keep their bonus bonds until maturity in 1945 or as long as they are financially able to do so, rather than cashing them at once. This stand was taken in support of the recommendation of President Roosevelt, and with the view that if extensively followed the course will be beneficial both to veterans, in saving a nest egg, and to the country, in avoiding to some degree the trend of inflation, and the extreme burden on the national treasury.

A. A. Bullock, formerly of the state department of education more recently in charge of the federal-state emergency education program, is in the race for state superintendent of public instruction, his Austin friends announced in his behalf.

He will oppose L. A. Woods, who now is seeking re-election. Mr. Woods had no opponent in the last race.

It is a healthy sign, as the emergency conditions have passed and the emergency machinery has been discarded in far greater quantity and proportion than most people realize, that the country is so far from relying on those devices, and especially so far from accepting their most extreme phases in bewildered complaisance.

WOMAN, CITY FIGHT DRAW
SEATTLE — (UPI) — The war between Mrs. Martha Hess and the City of Seattle has ended in a draw. After her car collided with a street railway work train, Mrs. Hess was prosecuted for reckless driving and acquitted. Then she sued the city for \$20,000 damages. A jury returned a verdict against her.

FANCY SKATER AT 60
MENASHA, Wis. — (UPI) — Otto C. Kloppe, 60-year-old secretary of the Menasha fire and police commission, shows the younger generation a thing or two about ice skating. Despite his age, Kloppe takes to the ice several times a week for a bit of speed or fancy skating.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Feb. 14 — (UPI) — The Byrds of Virginia, once were the Byrds of Texas. Former residence of the famous family was recalled when Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd, trans-Atlantic flyer and Antarctic explorer, came here this week on a lecture tour.

The explorer's father was born in Austin. Many of his relatives still reside in Texas including descendants of Jones Rivers, great-grandfather of the admiral, who is buried at Georgetown, Tex. Paternal grandfather of the Byrds of Virginia and Texas, was William Byrd, lawyer, editor and soldier. William Byrd in 1857 sought election to the house of representatives from Travis county. He was defeated by Thomas F. McKinney, whose Texas career dated back to the revolution. Four years later, Byrd was appointed adjutant general of Texas. He married Miss Jennie Rivers in 1859. The Rev. W. M. Baker, first pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Austin, read the service.

The father of Admiral Byrd moved from Austin to Virginia as a boy long before the birth of his namesake son, or the birth of Harry Byrd, who became Governor of Virginia.

Governor James V. Allred will have a busy March 2. He will spend part of the day at Washington-on-the-Brazos. There will be a celebration there of Texas Independence Day. The same day he will go to Huntsville to appear with Governor H. H. McAllister of Tennessee, on a program that will be given when J. E. Josey, Houston publisher, presents to the state "Steamboat House," formerly occupied by General Sam Houston. Governor Philip La Follette, Wisconsin, will be Allred's week-end guest and go to both places.

Because of the two engagements already made for the day Governor Allred was obliged to inform Editor Henry Reese of Gonzales that he will not be able to be in Gonzales March 2, to buy the first Texas Centennial stamp which will be issued there.

Centennial events will keep the governor on the jump much of this year. Already he has had occasion to visit Gonzales for its celebration of the anniversary of the opening shot of the Texas Revolution. He has been to El Paso to attend the Sun Carnival reminiscent of the Conquistadores. He has been invited to be in San Antonio Feb. 28 when there will be an observance of the opening of the siege of the Alamo.

San Jacinto's battle anniversary on April 21 will call for his presence there. Other major dates will be appearance at the opening of the Centennial Exposition in Dallas, June 6, and at the opening for Fort Worth's Frontier Show. He also will be invited to local observances in many parts of the state.

sity had agreed to contribute to a fund for the purchase. Negotiations ended when it was announced a sale had been made to the British Museum at a price equivalent to \$500,000. The Codex had been purchased by the Russian government in 1860 for about \$6750.

Temporary headquarters of the Texas Old Age Assistance Administration will be in the building of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, Austin. Offices will be opened there by Pension Director Orville Carpenter to be used until a down town building, in which space has been engaged, is ready for occupancy.

Carpenter said the location of the federation building in the residence section will not handicap the work and the charge per square foot for floor space was much lower than could have been charged downtown.

Old Age pensions furnished the state capitol's quip of the week. An anonymous member of the house of representatives was asked about interest in pensions. "Everybody in my district's interested," he said. "Those that aren't trying to get pensions are trying to get jobs administering the pensions."

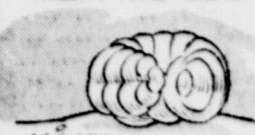

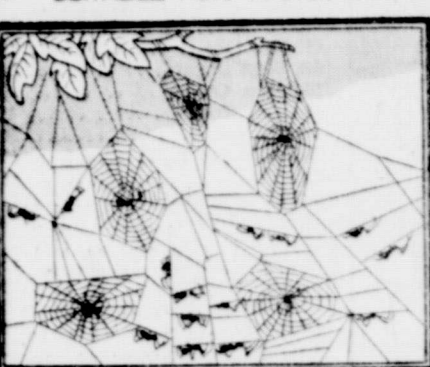

Accidents Studied To Promote Safety

MARTINEZ, Cal., Feb. 14.—(U.P.) School and safety authorities here have adopted a school safety program which they hope to make a model for adoption in schools throughout the entire United States. The program adopted covers six phases as follows:

First: Students must bring into class newspaper clippings of all automobile accidents.

Second: Class discussions will analyze the accident and decide the cause: whether through drunken driving, slippery streets, faulty mechanism, etc.

Third: Students then will decide what steps could have been or should have been taken to prevent the accident.

Fourth: Injuries resulting from the accident will be listed and the proper first aid or emergency treatment decided upon.

Fifth: The situation will then be analyzed to decide what laws and traffic regulations were involved and whether new ones are needed.

Sixth: A study will be made of local conditions, listing all hazards and deciding how such hazards can be overcome.
