COTTON STAMP MEETING IS CALLED FOR MONDAY NIGHT

ALL MEN REACHING AGE OF 21 SINCE OCT. 16 MUST REGISTER

July 1 Set As Date For Registration At P. O. Bldg. Here

Lamb Co. Men To Come Before Board Here Between 7 a. m. and 9 p. m.

The President of the United States has proclaimed July 1, 1941 as registration day for men who have reached their twenty-first birthday since October 16, 1940. All men who have on July 1 reached their twenty-first birthday will present themselves to the local boards having jurisdiction over the address at which they reside and submit to registration. Men who are away from home will register with the board in the city in which they happen to be on July 1, 1941.

All Lamb County men will register at Littlefield, at the Old Post Office building, on West Fourth Street between the hours of 7 A. M. and 9 P. M.

According to the local office of the Selective Service Administration six men will leave here July 10, when the next call is made for men to serve under the selective Service Plan.

Advanced Flying School To Be Built Near Lubbock

To Be Located On Levelland Highway Allocation Is \$4,675,000

Official announcement that an advanced twin-engine aviation training school will be located near Lubbock was made Friday, after Congressman George Mahon had given the first hint that the announcement of the establishment of the school was about to "break", in a telegram sent to Lubbock citizens last Thursday.

The War department has selected a 1,400 acre site 10 miles due west of Lubbock, for the school. Reports are that the buildings of the school are to be erected on sites across the highway from Hurlwood, thus leaving a space available for actual use for flying purposes.

Approximately \$4,675,000 has been allotted for the project, it is reported. The personnel to be assigned to the camp when it is ready is expected to number 3,668 men, of whom 316 are to be commissioned officers, 457 are to be cadets who already have completed basic training flight courses and 2,915 are to be enlisted men—many of them non-commissioned officers.

The Lubbock site is one of five for which war department authorization was announced in Washington last week, according to press dispatches.

The others are to be at Midland, Texas, Victorville, Calif., Sebring, Fla., and Higley, Ariz.

Whitharral Child Fatally Injured

Bill Dowden, four-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Dowden, two miles west of Whitharral, was fatally injured about five p. m. Friday.

The child, it is stated, was struck by an automobile while asleep on a road near his father's farm. Noble Halliburton, driver of the car, was reported to have been blinded by the dust in the road, and did not see the child until he was about ten feet from him. He swerved the car, but one of the rear wheels hit the child. Halliburton called to the child's father, who was plowing in the field, and they rushed him to Levelland. However, the child died enroute to town.

Mr. Dowden reported that the child had been on the tractor with him and had gone to sleep. He placed the child on the ground when he reached the turn-row, and did not realize that he was placing him in the road. The road had been used as a detour on the Whitharral-Levelland highway.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Whitharral Baptist church. Interment was in the Whitharral cemetery.

Besides his parents, the child is survived by a brother and a sister.

Mr. and Mrs. Dowden have been residents of the Whitharral community several years.

Mr. Halliburton, who is a brother to Mrs. Eugene Latimer of Littlefield, resides five miles north of Levelland.

Highway patrolmen who investigated the accident reported it as "unavoidable."

Postponed From Friday Last; All Farmers Are Urged To Attend Session

Realizing that most of the farmers in Lamb county were busy replanting their crops last week, and were unable to attend the hearing on a petition asking that another election be called for the forming of a soil conservation district in this county, the proposed hearing, scheduled for last Friday afternoon, was postponed until Saturday, June 28.

Only a small group of business men and farmers gathered for the meeting Friday, when Luke Ballard of Temple, representative of the State Soil Conservation Board, and W. G. Kennedy of Muleshoe, members of the state board, were present. Both Mr. Ballard and Mr. Kennedy expressed agreement to postpone the hearing, so that representatives from the entire county will be able to attend.

The hearing will be held at 2:30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, June 28, at the First Presbyterian Church.

In announcing this meeting, Mrs. Joe Salem of Sudan, Chairman of the Lamb County Committee, stated that as far as possible not only merchants but their clerks should attend this important discussion of how merchants may participate in the benefits of the Supplementary Cotton Stamp Program, soon to be launched in this area.

She said that in order to be eligible to accept Cotton Stamps for redemption from the Government, merchants must first complete a "Retailer's Statement" form which will be available and fully explained at the meeting.

Mrs. Salem added that \$25,000,000 worth of Cotton Stamps are available for distribution to cotton

Mr. Lacey stated that he had 500 White Leghorn hens, and gathered an average of 320 eggs a day.

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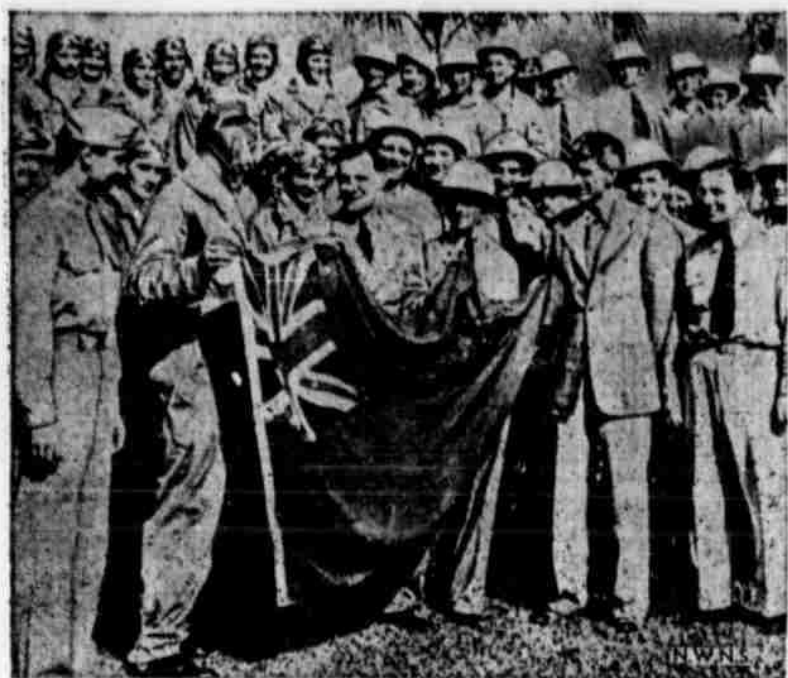

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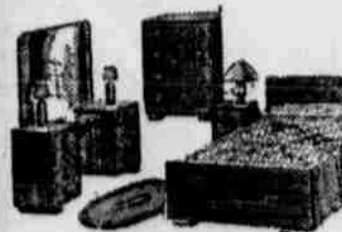

GAS-LESS SUNDAYS

It looks as though gas-less Sundays are coming.

To the people in our town who like to go motoring on Sunday or who use Sunday as a day to drive out to see relatives and friends it would be a definite sacrifice at first to leave the car in the garage all day.

But many of us would welcome the opportunity to make such a sacrifice, if it was evident that by so doing we were strengthening our nation's defense.

As far as the people of this town go, gas-less Sundays would be taken in stride and there wouldn't be any complaining. But the small group in our town who happen to be in the gasoline business, running local stations, would suffer real hardship if their most prosperous business day was taken away from them.

The purpose of gas-less Sundays would be to reduce our consumption of gasoline and oil and that means taking dollars out of the pockets of the gasoline dealers. They, too, will be willing to make that sacrifice if the government finds that it is vital to do so, but we hope, if there are any other practical solutions to the oil problem, such as pipelines to the eastern coast, they will be adopted.

Any action which penalizes one group without affecting others is always distasteful to Americans. We know that one group after another, during the present emergency, will be called upon to sacrifice, but we hope that none will be asked to do so unnecessarily.

STILL ANALYZING THE U. S

The U. S. Bureau of Census is still compiling those facts which everyone here in town, as well as in every home throughout the nation gave to the census-taker months and months ago.

For some time we have known what they found the population of our town to be. We also have seen a lot of other information on incomes and population by age groups, foreign population and so on. But that's really just the beginning.

The Census Bureau first releases figures on one subject, then another and gradually issues complete studies on all phases of the make-up of our country, not only the population but of business as well.

It must be rather a thankless job, handling the census. For after completing the tremendous task of tabulating all sorts of figures on the whole country, when it is all done our first reaction is apt to be, "That's old stuff. Things have changed since then."

That is particularly true in relation to the 1940 census. Because of defense there have been great shifts in population and great changes in the unemployment situation.

The men in the Census Bureau realize all that, but they pay no attention. Their sole job is to give an accurate detailed picture of the United States of 1940, and the many changes which have been taken place since then must be entirely ignored.

He suggests that anyone who has planned a vacation this year should go to the eastern states . . . as the East is "boiling with activity". The west will always be there, but the east probably won't always be like it is now. . . . Everything in Washington has a political tinge . . .

The city of Washington that has been, in former years, an overgrown Austin, where people were happy-go-lucky, and everything was peaceful . . . now has a similar atmosphere to that of New York City . . . where people are rushed to death. In all the government offices, there are three shifts of employees a day.

Traffic on all highways leading to Washington is heavier than in normal times, and people are tense, with their nerves over-wrought, wondering what to expect to happen.

In telling of his trip to the navy yards in Philadelphia, where he witnessed the christening of the big battleship "Washington", he said that everyone who goes in the navy yards must have an official pass . . . and to leave the yards, one must show the pass . . . and to be admitted to all buildings, and about four times on the "Washington" he had to show his credentials.—which proves the precaution the government is taking in guarding the government's property.

While in Philadelphia, he learned that American army officers are in England, teaching the RAF flyers how to pilot the American airships. . . . and these flyers do not take their instructions during trips over the British Isles, but during the air raids into Germany and France. American Flyers are indeed getting opportunities to see the horrors of this war.

In discussion of the President's

press conference he attended, he said there was no need for the American people to become alarmed about the physical condition of President Roosevelt. He has the greatest job of any man in the entire world, and he is more capable of handling it, both physically and mentally.

He learned that those who are in Congress are as much in the dark as to the international situation, as most of us are.

. . . . President Roosevelt has a long-distance telephone conversation with Winston Churchill everyday . . .

He said he was very glad to have seen the situation as it is in the east today . . . but he is glad that we do not have to live that way . . . And—We are too.

House Bill No. 76, passed recently by the Legislature, releases interest as well as part of the penalty on State and County Taxes which were delinquent on or before July 1, 1940. The Bill was approved May 22, 1941 and became effective when signed by the Governor on May 26.

If you have any delinquent State and County Taxes you may take advantage of this remission NOW by paying

ALL TAXES DUE

.. as, if you have two or more years delinquent all must be paid to get the benefits of this law.

THE LAW EXPIRES NOVEMBER 1, 1941

This law does not affect 1940 taxes and the usual penalty will be collected on delinquent taxes for 1940.

As An Example

to show your savings under this law suppose a person has delinquent taxes for two years, as follows:

Year	Amount	Usual Penalty	Present Penalty	Saving
1934	\$100	44%—\$44	6%—\$6	\$38.00
1938	\$100	20%—\$20	6%—\$6	\$14.00

Penalties that are usual and would be collected customarily at this time were, 1934 and all prior years 44 per cent; 1935—38 per cent; 1936—32 per cent; 1937—26 per cent; 1938—20 per cent; 1939—16 per cent. Under the penalty remission bill, only 6 per cent will be collected for each year.

1940 taxes carry the usual penalty which at this time amounts to 7 1-2 per cent, and on July 1, 1941 a penalty of 10 1-2 per cent will be on delinquent 1940 taxes.

Please note that you must pay ALL years delinquent, and that they must be paid before November 1, 1941, to get the above discount.

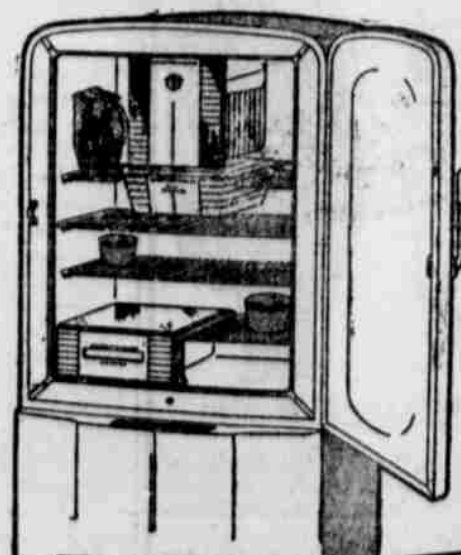

IMPROVEMENTS MADE AT HIGH SCHOOL HOMEMAKING DEPARTMENT

Several new improvements are being made in the High School Homemaking Department this summer. New sewing machine covers of monks cloth are being made; new drapes are being made for the dining room; and other general cleaning improvements are being done. This work is being done by the girls taking the annual summer project work under the direction of the homemaking teacher, Mrs. Dan Hemphill.

The summer project work is voluntary work taken by thirty-five girls having had a year of homemaking previous to this summer. Each girl receives on completion of at least 100 hours of work, one-half credit or the equivalent of one semester of homemaking.

Another requirement is that each girl attend a group meeting at the high school once a week for a period of four weeks. The girls are divided into three groups meeting on the past Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursdays. They have been working on the sewing machine covers and the drapes. They have also completed a flower garden as part of the beautification project of the school system.

In addition to their group projects at school, each girl has taken some phase of home work at which she must spend the 100 hours to complete the course. Some home projects selected by the girls are such things as: sewing for the family, beautification of the yard, redecorating various rooms of the home, gardening and canning. Mrs. Hemphill visits each girl to supervise her work and to help her with her difficulties.

As educational features the group visited the W. P. A. Sewing Room where Miss Lula Hubbard explained

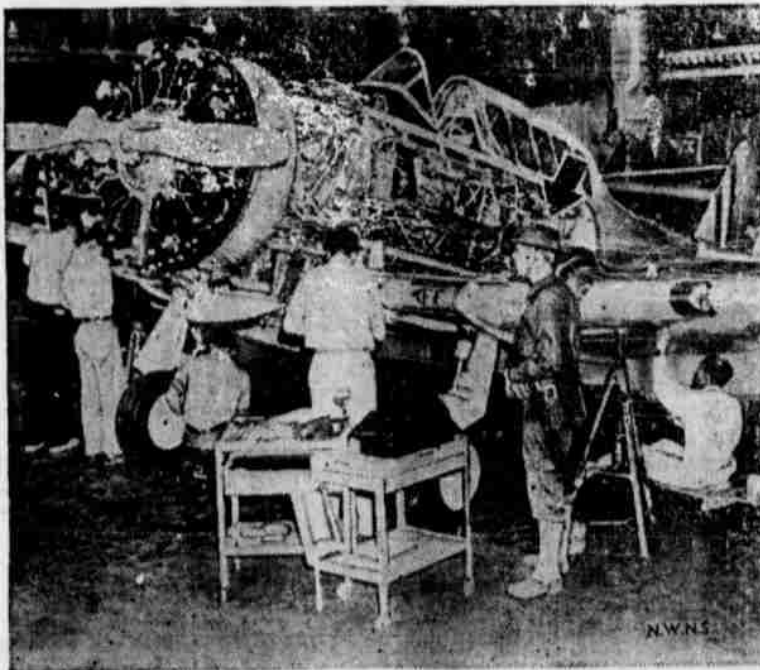
the function of the organization and showed the work being done. They also visited the Housekeeping Aid Project where they were likewise shown what had been done by the women. At the end of the summer, the group as a whole will probably have some type of entertainment.

The project will not be completed until the latter part of August. It is then that the achievement Day is held to show the work of each girl. Each project will be graded and exhibited at the high school. These exhibits are always open to anyone who would like to see what the homemaking girls have accomplished.

In addition to the new sewing machine cover and drapes, the Future Homemakers Club have donated the homemaking department a new iron and ironing board, a garbage pail, a large picture mirror for the dining room and other smaller improvements.

Two Kinds Quotas To Protect Grower

Two kinds of quotas designed to protect the wheat grower's income will be in effect in 1941.

With the approval by 80 percent of the growers voting in the nationwide referendum on May 31, wheat

marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1941 crop. A two-thirds majority was necessary.

At the same time, Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard announced that President Roosevelt had established import quotas on wheat to protect United States farm income from the world wheat situation.

Import quotas, as provided in the Agricultural Adjustment Act, restrict shipments from foreign coun-

tries if they threaten to reduce the effectiveness of the National Farm Program's supply and price support measures, Fred Rennels, assistant state administrative officer in charge of the AAA in Texas, pointed out. "The wheat program is holding the price of our wheat above the world level so that even a slight rise might completely off-set the effect of the 42-cent tariff, Rennels explained.

Import quotas and marketing quotas, combined with already existing portions of the farm program, including acreage allotments, conservation and parity payments, loans, and crop insurance, will provide adequate protection for the U. S. Wheat grower's income in 1941, the AAA officials said, with the result that for the first time in many years, the Wheat farmer cooperating with the AA program will receive parity prices for his products.

German And Italian Assets Are Frozen

The Treasury of the United States Saturday, at President Roosevelt's direction, froze the American assets of Germany and Italy, and simultaneously imposed a strict supervision upon all financial transactions with Soviet Russia or its citizens.

How much the freezing order might accomplish was brought into question, however, by those who recalled that Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau recently said the axis powers, acting in anticipation of such a move, had already withdrawn sizable portions of their American funds.

farmers during 1941, and any merchant unprepared to accept these stamps in trade in the prescribed manner would be at a distinct disadvantage. "The simplest way for merchants to fully understand the program," said Mrs. Salem "is to attend this meeting. They will learn how they may get their share of the additional business; what goods may be exchanged for stamps; the rules and regulations they must comply with in making cotton stamp sales; and how to redeem the stamps for cash."

"By aggressive merchandising methods pushing the sale of cotton goods not only to those using stamps—but to every family in the community—retail merchants will make a substantial contribution toward solving the problem of price depressing cotton surpluses and under-consumption of cotton goods by a large part of our people."

Farmers To Receive Full Payments For Equities

Title Will Not Be Taken Without Public Notice

Govt. To Give Full Value For Cotton If And When Title Taken

Farmers with cotton in the government loan will receive full payments for their equities if the government should take title to the cotton.

This has been emphatically pointed out by Aubrey W. Bingham, county AAA Secretary, when he was advised by the United States Department of Agriculture that title will not be taken to loan cotton without prior public notice.

If the government should take title to loan cotton, the cotton producers would be paid any amount by which (1) the redemption costs of their notes (which include principal, interest, and carrying charges on the pledged cotton) were exceeded by (2) a fair value for the cotton at the time, which would be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture on the basis of the then prevailing average market prices for cotton with reasonable allowances for differences in grades, staple lengths, and locations.

"Don't be misled by false representation to the effect that the government will not give full value for cotton equities when and if it is necessary for the Commodity Credit Corporation to take title to the cotton", the AAA officials warned.

The notes secured by 1938 crop cotton, the maturity date for which was extended to July 31, 1941, are not callable on demand. The notes secured by 1939 crop cotton matured on July 31, 1940. The notes secured by 1940 crop cotton do not mature until July 31, 1941, but they are callable for payment on demand at any time. It is possible that the government may find it desirable to take title on August 1, 1941, to any cotton remaining pledged to secure notes which are overdue at that time. In the event, however, that the government should take title to any of the stock loan cotton, at least ten days public notice of such action would be given by a press release.

Johnnie Lippard Receives Life Saving Medal For Act of Heroism While In Marines

Johnnie Lippard, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Lippard of Littlefield, recently received a Life Saving Medal for an act of heroism which he displayed in the Naval Service.

Lippard has been in the U. S. Marines almost two years, and for the past year and a half he has been stationed at Cavite, in the Philippines. Last month he was promoted to first class private.

In a letter he wrote to his parents, which they received last week, he stated that the Philippine soldiers were doing extensive military training.

The following report appeared in the "Philippine Breezes", official publication for those in training on the islands:

"Last Monday, April 28th, on the 0030 return trip from the Naval Ferry from Manila, One V. E. Jacobson, MM2c, U. S. Navy, serving on board the U. S. ALDEN, was sitting on the gunwale of the ferry and fell overboard while the ferry was halfway between Manila and Cavite.

"A shout of 'man overboard' prompted John B. Lippard, U. S. Marine Corps, attached to the Marine Detachment, Navy Yard, Cavite, a passenger aboard the ferry who was returning from an authorized leave of absence, to jump over the side to save the man who fell overboard without giving much thought of his own life, which was in peril at the time because the sea was choppy and the locality was supposed to be shark infested. Without much delay the ferry swung hard left with search light turned brightly in search for the man who fell overboard. At about 200 feet away from the port bow, Lippard was found holding Jacobson's head above the water. After the ferry had maneuvered closer to the men in the

water and a life buoy had been thrown to them, Jacobson was brought aboard unconscious. Artificial respiration was immediately given after which he came to. Since he was weak, he was sent to the Yard Dispensary on the stretcher, thence to the Naval Hospital at Canacao.

"This act of heroism on the part of the men in the Naval Service proved to be very gratifying and deserves special citation of a Life Saving Medal for Lippard is in order due to his presence of mind and quick action on his part in saving the life of the man who would have been drowned."

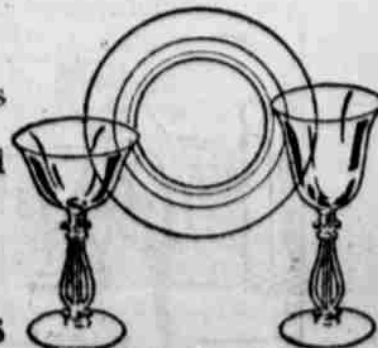

WPA WORKERS AVAILABLE FOR PRIVATE EMPLOYMENT

Wednesday, June 18. WPA District Manager J. O. Jones today reiterated his reminder to farmers and other private employers that all WPA workers are listed with the Texas State Employment Service and are available for private employment.

W.P.A. workers will be released from projects wherever needed to make farm help available Mr. Jones declared. "Prospective employers should consult local representatives of the Texas State Employment Service", he explained, "as this is the duly-constituted agency for referring WPA workers and other persons seeking private jobs to employers".

Rolls of the WPA are constantly open to private employers and no worker who refuses a bona fide offer of employment will be retained by WPA. This regulation is based on the following section of the WPA appropriation act:

"No person in need who refuses a bona fide offer of private or other public employment under reasonable working conditions which pays the prevailing wage for such work in the community where he resides and who is capable of performing such work shall be employed or retained in employment on work projects under the funds appropriated in this joint resolution for the period such private or other public employment
